Radford alum named new Christiansburg police chief

CHRISTIANSBURG Major Chris Ramsey, a veteran of more than 20 years with the Christiansburg Police Department (ČPD), has been named Chief of the agency, effective Sept. 1, 2023.

The Town Council decision to promote Ramsey was announced Tuesday night at the Christiansburg Council meeting.

"We welcomed several applications with a variety of backgrounds and experiences," Christiansburg Mayor Mike Barber. "Through the interview process, we found that the most qualified, educated, and

experienced candidate Deputy Sheriff, Patrol was already within our organization.'

Ramsey is a graduate of the 261st session of the FBI National Academy. He earned a Bachelor of Science in Psychology from Virginia Tech, followed by a Master of Science in Criminal Justice through Radford University.

Since 2017, Major Ramsey has served as the Assistant Chief of Police for the Christiansburg Police Department, after holding the position of Operations Division Captain from 2009-2017. Ramsey climbed the ranks throughout his career, first beginning as a clerk,

Officer, Patrol Sergeant, Patrol Lieutenant, and Professional Standards Lieutenant. He has completed more than 24 career development programs including Crisis Negotiations, Managing Police Discipline, and numerous tactical and SWAT command trainings. He has been recognized as Officer of the Year, received a Police Star, Combat Ribbon, and multiple Meritorious Service recognitions, amongst others.

During his time at the CPD, Major Ramsey has been crucial in helping serve the community through various response

efforts. He is credited with developing the agency's first Emergency Response Team (SWAT) and served as First Commanding Officer; served as one of the first responding officers to the 2011 Interstate-81 shooting, resulting in capture and conviction of a murder suspect; and served in the incident command post for various critical events in the region, including the William Morva manhunt and April 16th shootings at Virginia Tech.

"It has been a privilege to have served my community alongside the men and women of the Christiansburg Police Department for the last

NRCC announces three percent tuition increase

A new EMT certification offered this fall

New River Community College in the emergency medical services (NRCC) tuition will increase for the first time in five years.

The three percent increase of \$4.61 per credit hour will go into effect for the 2023-2024 academic year.

Recognizing the impact of mandatory cost increases, which include statewide adjustments for compensation and benefits, the State Board for Community Colleges recently voted unanimously to increase tuition at all 23 Virginia Community College System institutions. The new rate is \$158.61 per credit hour, or \$2,379.15 for a 15 credit-hour

At about one-third of the comparable costs of tuition of Virginia's public fouryear universities, NRCC continues to be an affordable option for those in the college's service region. With programs like Access to Community College Education (ACCE), G3 tuition assistance, and scholarships through the NRCC Educational Foundation, NRCC remains committed to assisting students reach their educational goals.

In other New River Community College news, the school will offer the Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) career studies certificate program this fall.

The 16-credit program consists of five courses that can all be completed in one

The EMT program is designed to lead to entry-level employment opportunities

field. The program prepares students to assess and care for patients at the basic life support (BLS) level. Students who successfully complete the required courses can sit for the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians EMT certification exam.

Program courses include HLT 105 Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), EMS 111 Emergency Medical Technician, EMS 120 Emergency Technician— Clinical, BIO 141 Human Anatomy and Physiology I, and ENG 111 College Composition I.

The program is based on the Virginia EMS Education Standards (VEMSES) which are derived from the National EMS Education Standards (NEMSES). The EMT program is also approved by the Virginia Office of Emergency Medical Services.

Small Animal Community Practice re-energized in its commitment to clients and students

CPRAC is back on open to everybody."

Animal Community Practice (CPRAC, commonly pronounced "SEEprak") is a clinic within the Veterinary Teaching Hospital (VTH) at the Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine that accepts pets from a 35-mile radius of Blacksburg.

"It's small animal primary care here at the veterinary college," said Jenny Marin, who joined the community practice as a clinical assistant professor in 2022. "We do a lot of preventive care, vaccines, parasite prevention, disease prevention, things like that. A lot of holistic care, looking at the whole animal and making sure we're addressing every little thing from their eyes and their ears to the heart and their ability to get around."

These referrals, but community members who bring their pets for checkups and basic health care, as they would with any privatepractice veterinarian.

"CPRAC, along with the emergency room, are the only two services that you don't need a referral to access," said Anthony administrator. "These are our services that are

"I think a lot of our clients who come here enjoy interacting with the students," Nappier said. "It's just fun for them. Many of our clients are in some way involved in education, whether here at the university or local K-12 schools."

One advantage to clients utilizing the community practice is the resources of the full Veterinary Teaching Hospital and its many specialties being easily accessible.

"When I need to get an echocardiogram, it's usually the same day," Nappier said. "I can get an ultrasound exam the same day, we have anesthesiologists consult, we have a lab that I can just run my samples to on foot." "When they come to

see us, they are essentially coming to see the whole hospital," Freeman said. Freeman said the

clinic strives to make its care affordable for clients. "I feel like the one

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

"Keys left in the car are precautions people is far and away No. 1, regardless of whether the vehicle is locked," National explained James Walker, VFBMIC senior claims that more than 1 million includes spare keys to any vehicle sitting in the driveway. I've seen situations where every car is stolen out of the driveway in one night."

In addition to never leaving keys or fobs in cars, drivers should park in protected or well-lit areas, close and lock windows and doors, and never leave the area with the vehicle running—a quick trip into the house or store is prime opportunity for a thief.

Items left in plain sight also entice thieves. 'Don't leave valuables

in the back seat," Walker advised. "Lock them in the trunk, cover them up—thieves will break the window and steal a backpack or gym bag just to see if there's anything good in it. While they're in the car, they'll go through the console to see what else is worth stealing.'

While vehicles' antitheft systems can deter thieves, using secondary security devices like steering wheel locks adds protection and

Protecting your privacy on Meta's new app, Threads New users signing up for Threads, search history, and purchase history.

Meta's response to Twitter, should be aware of the app's data collection capabilities, says a Virginia Tech privacy expert. 'Threads collects user data

across 25 different categories, surpassing Twitter's data collection capabilities," says Donna Wertalik, a professor of practice in marketing for the Pamplin College of Business at Virginia Tech and Voices of Privacy co-host. For more than a decade,

Wertalik's research has focused on the growing importance of information privacy. Wertalik is watching Threads closely and says the current state of the app is akin to Twitter in 2007.

Because the social media platform is so new, there are privacy concerns - specifically when it comes to your data. Essentially, all of your information is fair game for Meta,

Threads launched in more than 100 countries on July 6, but not the European Union due to privacy concerns tied to two recent rulings. Some of the data Meta can collect on its users includes location, contact information, contacts, user content (photos, videos, messages),

Wertalik offers these tips for

people using the app so they understand what they are signing up for and can protect their privacy.

Decide whether to make your account public or private. This allows the user to control who sees their content.

Understand Threads policy for deleting your account. Meta's policy prohibits users from deleting their Threads profile without also deleting their Instagram account. Most apps you can delete, and Wertalik says a policy that forces the consumer to delete both has never been done. "Perhaps this is Meta's way of having more control and strategies toward future monetization for Threads.'

Walk through all settings in the app. This will allow the user to in some cases limit what data is collected by the company and thirdparty users. There are seven settings that limit what you see on the app. Two of them limit accessibility to your posted content by other users. Since the app is connected to Instagram, your privacy choices should apply there too.

Donna Wertalik currently serves as director of marketing strategy and analytics and is a professor of practice in marketing in the Pamplin College of Business at Virginia Tech. She has diverse corporate and academic experience, training, and acquired skills in the identification of marketing opportunities, brand management, social media engagement and measurement as well as overall product development. Her role encompasses branding, marketing and metrics for the business school, as well as leading the strategic efforts of Pamplin's Virtual Identity through Virginia Tech's Social Media Organization, Prism.





New table for CT scanner allows examination of large animals at Veterinary Teaching Hospital

BLACKSBURG - You can lead a horse to water, but you can't get one easily into a CT scanner.

Until recently, clinicians at the Veterinary Teaching Hospital in the Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine couldn't use CT, or computed tomography, for large animals. But the recent purchase of an \$85,000

table for large animals that can be wheeled to the CT scanner now allows for that option, particularly useful for studying conditions inside the heads of equine animals.

"We commonly use the CT scanner for imaging dogs and cats," said Gregory Daniel, professor of radiology in the Department of Small Animal Clinical Sciences.

animal's skull, teeth, and cranial cavities, providing

much more detail than X-ray radiographs can reveal. "When you look at the radiograph of a horse skull, it's is a two-dimensional

image of a three-dimensional object," Daniel said. "A radiograph is composed of shadows from multiple overlying structures, superimposed over each other. When you've got a complex anatomy with a lot of overlying bones and cavities, a radiograph can be challenging to interpret."

Radiographs work fine for most problems involving teeth or the more outward bone structure, but become more difficult to rely on when issues extend into the nose or other interior parts of a horse's face and head.

The Veterinary Teaching Hospital in Blacksburg will be the only veterinary hospital offering the capability to employ CT scans for large animals in a radius extending roughly 240 miles, to as far away as North Carolina State University's veterinary college in Raleigh and to the Marion duPont Scott Equine Medical Center (EMC) in Leesburg, where there is a CT scanner that allows equine animals to stand during the exam.

RU accuser ordered out in open

U.S. District Judge Michael Urbanski has ordered a Radford University baseball player, who came forward accusing his former coach of mistreating players, to no longer stay

He must no longer be listed as "John Doe" in the lawsuit against former

Coach Karl Kuhn. Now, he must list his name in all court documents.

The court said it's unfair to Kuhn, who resigned in the midst of player complaints. Urbanski called it an "inequality" in allowing the accuser to proceed pseudonymously while Kuhn is forced to defend himself publicly.

The former player said he sought to protect the privacy of his academic and medical records. In the suit, the student,

who is black, said Kuhn prohibited players from attending a racial justice rally, which was being held on campus. A second accusation said Kuhn grouped minority players together in an area of the locker room.

Kuhn has denied the allegations.

The court said it would take the request under advisement for the next days, during which the former player must amend the suit to include his real

The unknown player has said he was targeted by his former coach after

"leading" a group of players about their concerns over longtime verbal abuse.

Kuhn is the current pitching coach for the Charleston Southern Buccaneers, who are in the same conference as his former team, Radford.

In 2019, he was named the head baseball coach at Radford University. Three years later, he resigned in the midst of the investigation by the university's human resources department. He was 47-64 at the school and was previously the pitching coach at the University of Virginia.






