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Radford City school year underway

RADFORD – School has begun at all Radford City Public Schools for the 2023-24 school year.

School officials are alerting families that all students can eat breakfast and lunch for free this year, and making families aware the bus schedules are still being updated daily as ridership has increased. They are also making the public aware that passing a stopped school bus is against the law.

“RCPS would like to thank the RCPS school community for their patience and understanding as we open the 2023-2024 school year and adjust to new routines, new school schedules, and

new expectations,” school officials announced.

“Bus routes are being updated daily,” the announcement continued. “Ridership continues to increase, creating more routes and longer travel time. We are hopeful that as the routes become more consistent, our families will have a more predictable bus pick up and drop off time. Your patience is always appreciated as we work through transportation issues.”

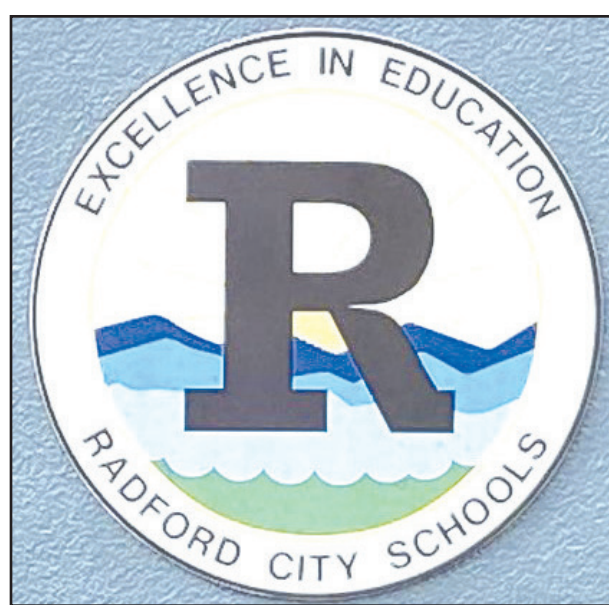
“Please remember that passing a stopped school bus, in which the bus is stopped on any highway, private road or school driveway for the purpose of taking on or discharging children, in Virginia is a form of reckless driving and is a crime,” RCPS announced. “A conviction will remain on a driver’s permanent criminal record and cannot be expunged.”

Free lunch and breakfast are available to all students because Radford City Public Schools is participating in the USDA’s Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) for the 23-24 school year. The Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) is a non-

pricing meal service option for schools and school districts in low-income areas.

“Students attending Radford City Public Schools will be provided a nutritious meal for breakfast and lunch each day at no charge to the household,” RCPS announced. “Households will not be required to submit a meal application form to receive meals at no charge. Students who wish to purchase extra food choices will need to pay for those as they are in addition to the meals falling within the CEP.”

Radford VP Angela Joyner tapped to participate in prestigious leadership academy

Radford University’s Angela Joyner, Ph.D., was recently chosen as one of the select higher education leaders who will take part in the Executive Leadership Academy (ELA) for 2023-2024.

The ELA is a yearlong program that prepares qualified provosts and vice presidents to ascend to positions of greater responsibility, and it enables them to develop the wide-ranging skills that rising senior executives and university presidents require in today’s educational environment. The academy is sponsored by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AACSU), the Council of Independent Colleges (CIC) and the American Academic Leadership Institute (AALI).

Joyner currently serves as Radford’s vice president for economic development and corporate education. In that role, she strategically enhances and expands the university’s economic development and its corporate partnership efforts while also forming collaborative relationships to promote institutional programs and learning opportunities.

The ELA received applications from around the country, all from candidates holding cabinet-level positions, but Joyner was one of just 36 chosen to comprise this year’s cohort.

“It is such an honor to be selected for the Executive Leadership Academy. I am truly looking forward to participating in the program and grateful to have the

RADFORD – The return of the Wildwood Park Nature Lecture Series has been a well-received addition to Radford’s summer offerings, with good-sized crowds heading down into the heart of Wildwood Park to learn about the local flora, fauna, geology and more.

The last two installments of the lectures are set for September. On Thursday, Sept. 7 the talk will be about Native Plants, led by the Virginia Native Plant Society. On Thursday, Sept. 21, it will be an evening of Nature Inspired Poetry and Song.

The lecture series takes place in the heart of Wildwood Park at the Outdoor Classroom (pavilion). To get to the site, attendees can park at the Sundell Drive parking lot for Wildwood Park and take the walkway into the center of the park. The talks start at 7:30 p.m. and are held rain or shine unless there are thunderstorms.

The biggest crowd of the year thus

far turned out for Frank Talyor’s lecture about salamanders. With the help of Justin Lucas and Radford University Professor Matt Close, Taylor told the crowd about various types of salamanders and had dozens of live salamanders for attendees to get an up-close look, much to the delight of children and adults alike.

Taylor is a retired biology teacher from Radford High School who has found success on YouTube post-retirement with his educational channel, Nature At Your Door.

The channel has had a whopping 4,301,451 views as of Thursday and has more than 41,000 subscribers. Taylor launched the channel in 2016.

“I have the distinct honor of having the most-watched video about stink bugs on YouTube, followed by National Geographic and Animal Planet,” Taylor

Blacksburg Volunteer Rescue Squad Technical Team applying unique skills to specialized rescues

The Blacksburg Volunteer Rescue Squad is a fully volunteer-supported organization, so when special situations come up that require technical expertise in saving a life or recovering a loved one, the Technical Team steps up.

Using skills from their full-time jobs or other areas of expertise, they aid in areas including heavy technical extrication, trench, structural collapse, and confined space or light technical water, rescue, cave rescue, rope rescue, and search and rescue, according to www.blacksburgrescue.org.

The Technical Rescue Division formed through the consolidation of the SAR (Search and Rescue) team, Cave Rescue Team, and the BVRS Heavy Technical Rescue team under a single structure. The SAR team, formerly known as the Southwest Virginia Mountain Rescue Group (SWVaMRG), was formed in 1985, joined BVRS in 2006, and specializes in locating missing persons and extricating them from remote areas. The Cave Rescue Team, formerly known as the Blacksburg Cave Rescue Group (BCRG), was formed by a group of VPI Cave Club members specially trained in rescue and joined BVRS in 2015. By these teams being under a single structure they're able to benefit from additional funding, a unified administrative team, and strong training programs that often overlap between disciplines.

"Our cave team is one of the best cave rescue teams in the nation, I believe," Joshua Quesenberry, Heavy Technical Rescue Coordinator for the Technical Rescue Division, said.

Technical Rescue Team members train for situations in which an individual needs to be rescued from a confined space, but it is difficult to find this kind of specialized training. The Blacksburg Rescue Squad, including the Technical Rescue Team/Division, attend the Virginia Association Volunteer Rescue Squad, or VAVRS, Rescue College for training.

"Previously, the Rescue College was an avenue for confined space rescue training, but 10-15 years [ago] the class stopped being offered," Quesenberry said.

This past spring, the Technical Rescue Team was able to pay for a 40-hour Confined Space Rescue Technician course, which 14 of their members

completed. Additionally, they continue to train on their own.

"We will do an exercise, and I fully expect that the exercise will go in one direction, but sometimes it is something that it is not what we do in confined space rescue, but it is done in cave rescue, and it works for both," Quesenberry said. "There must also be a unified agreement on the choice of rescue technique the squad will use for safety reasons. If I don't feel safe to go in, I'm not going in."

What is considered a confined space? Per OSHA, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, a space large enough that an employee can enter with their body and perform a task is a confined space. You may have one way to get in and that is the same way to get out. Thirdly, it is not intended for long-term occupancy. Some examples of a confined space are a crawl space in a house, an attic, manholes, grain silos, technically trenches are confined spaces, as well as vats.

In this region of southwest Virginia, Roanoke city, Roanoke County, and Salem have a combined technical rescue team, but none exist in Montgomery County.

"So, we kind of fill that void," said Quesenberry. We respond statewide for missing persons too. If a surrounding state wants to request us, they can. We like serving anywhere that we can get to, not just locally."

However, the technical rescue team must follow the protocol of a (MOU) Memorandum of Understanding, which takes care of all the legalities for them to enter a different locality. They do not and cannot self-respond but must be requested to aid in rescue.

Recently, the Blacksburg Rescue Squad has increased to approximately 150 members. Less than half of the squad does Technical Rescue, with confined space rescue groups consisting of a much smaller number.

"Our goal is in the coming months and years to get a better understanding of what kind of confined spaces are in the area," Quesenberry said. At the end of the day, our area is Blacksburg, and then we branch out from there. Virginia Tech is technically the responsibility of their rescue squad, but I am working with them to explore our plans in case something happens there. There is a lot

we don't know about that is right in our backyard."

A Confined Space Rescue Pre-plan is a very important survey that is conducted, prior to entering a confined space, and helps rescue teams in an unfortunate situation that a rescue is needed. A pre-plan survey is also a part of training that each technical rescue member must be able to complete. The plan should involve things like knowing the expert authorities at the location that know about the confined space. These individuals can provide necessary and quick information to the technical team in determining the safest pathway to take. Other information such as dangerous chemicals in the location or machines that could injure a rescue member can help as well.

Quesenberry and his team are doing several things to work with the community to provide better plans for businesses that may have confined spaces in their environments.

"Currently, we are in conversations with the 9-1-1 Center to make the response time more streamlined," he said. "A confined space mock rescue with Virginia Tech is in the works with a date yet to be determined; possibly happening in the spring. The Technical Rescue Team tends to train once a week on average, with heavy technical team training once a month focusing on confined space and vehicle extrication to be the exercises more recently."

If a company is regularly performing

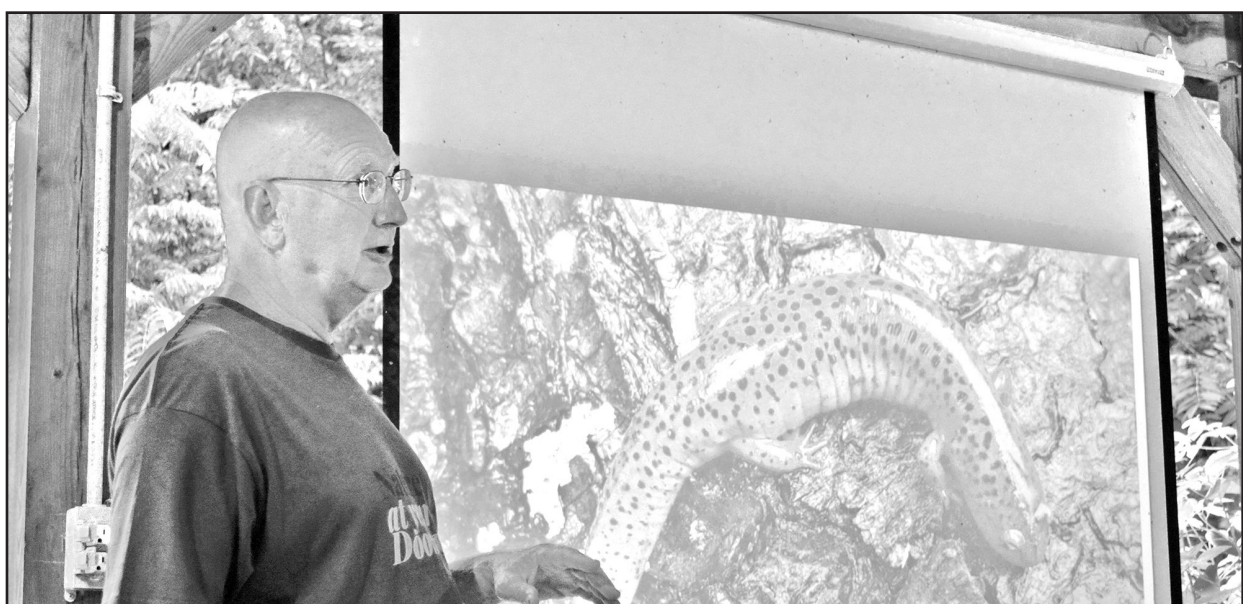

and they will assemble again for another meeting next spring. In the interim, the group will follow a highly individualized Professional Experience Plan (PEP) designed to enhance expertise and experience; will receive mentorship from the ELA program director and their current presidents, as well as additional executive coaching; and, over the coming months, will attend peer-to-peer webinars, regional gatherings and other activities.

Since 2009, more than a hundred of the individuals who have completed the ELA program have gone on to be appointed as presidents or chancellors, and even greater numbers have risen to an array of senior positions. “It is more essential than ever that

risky or potentially dangerous tasks, they should train and maintain their own standby rescue team, utilizing those individuals that are trained and authorized to enter their confined spaces.

"Assisted rescue is always the first thing we want people to try to do," Quesberry said. "If the ambulance shows up, they can't go in until someone with higher training arrives, but if

someone that works in the space regularly can safely get the person out, preferably through non-entry rescue, then it is a much better situation."

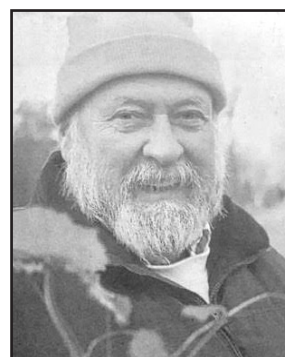

Radford U announces women's basketball 2023-24 non-conference schedule

Radford University women's basketball head coach Mike McGuire announced on Wednesday, Aug. 16 the program's 2023-24 schedule, which includes an exciting slate of first-time opponents and first-time locations.

"We have an exciting and challenging non-conference schedule this season," said McGuire. "Including our exhibition game, we have seven contests in the Dedmon Center against some high quality mid-major opponents. This is the most home games we have had in quite some time. We are excited to continue our Education Day game with the local school systems on November 15. We also have some challenging yet exciting road trips to Puerto Rico and Niagara Falls this season. This non-conference schedule will prepare us for a wide open Big South Conference race this season."

After an exhibition against Bridgewater on Nov. 2, the 52nd season of Radford Women's Basketball officially gets started on November 6th in a bout with Concord in the Dedmon Center. The Highlanders will then travel to Cullowhee, N.C. on Nov. 9 before returning home to finish the week with a home battle against Norfolk State on November 12.

The Highlanders will utilize the home court throughout November, as the next three games will be played inside the Dedmon Center. On Nov. 15 Radford hosts ETSU for the team's annual Education Day game. Radford will then host UNC Greensboro on November 18 in a rematch of a 2022 meeting. The final home game of the month, and until mid-December, comes against Virginia University of Lynchburg on Nov. 20.

The Highlanders will catch a plane south for their first unique road trip of the season as the program travels over 1,500 miles to Puerto Rico to compete in a Thanksgiving Tournament against two opponents. Radford is currently scheduled for a Thanksgiving battle with Indiana State, a first-time

opponent, and will face another program-first on November 24 in Northern Illinois.

"During Thanksgiving week, we have the opportunity to travel to Puerto Rico to compete in a two game MTE against Indiana State and Northern Illinois," commented McGuire about the trip. "This is a once in a lifetime trip for our program and we are grateful to the Big South Conference and our athletic administration for helping to make this possible. Not only will we compete against two excellent institutions, this will provide an outstanding educational experience for our ladies."

The road trip flips from south to north as the Highlanders will make two visits in the American Northeast. Closing out November, Radford and Penn State will meet for the first time since a Highlander victory in overtime of the first round in the 2018 WNIT tournament.

"We are returning to Penn State for the first time since 2018," said McGuire about the return to University Park. "The last time we were in State College, we competed in the post season WNIT and were able to come away with an overtime win. Returning to Penn State will bring back a lot of great memories with our 2017-18 team - which is a special one to me."

From there, Radford travels all the way to the

United States-Canadian border to face Niagara on Dec. 2. To close out the six-straight road games, the Highlanders will play a pair of games much closer to home. Radford and Virginia Tech renew an NRV rivalry facing off on December 10. Radford also reignites another rivalry with a former conference rival in Liberty on December 13.

"We are also returning to Virginia Tech this season. What Coach Brooks has done to lead his program is remarkable," said McGuire about Radford's scheduled contest against Virginia Tech. "It will be a great opportunity to compete against a program that competed in the Final Four and was very close to playing for the national championship last season. I want our ladies to know what it feels like to play a high-level NCAA tournament team and helps us value high level preparation heading into Big South Conference play."

Radford finally returns home on December 17 for their final home game of the nonconference slate. In a return visit, Queens (NC) makes their first-ever visit to the Dedmon Center. From there the Highlanders close out the first half of their season with contests against College of Charleston (December 21) and ring in the new year with Vanderbilt (Dec. 31).

Hokies announce non-conference schedule

Virginia Tech men's basketball revealed its 2023-24 non-conference slate Tuesday, featuring 11 matchups over the first two months of the season. Season tickets are

now sold out. Interested people can sing up for a list when additional ticket options become available, including non-conference single game tickets going on

sale in September. The Hokies will tip-off head coach Mike Young's fifth season in Blacksburg on Nov. 6 vs. Coppin State in a season-opening doubleheader with women's basketball.

As previously announced, Tech will compete in the Hall of Fame Series vs. South Carolina on Nov. 10 at the Spectrum Center in Charlotte, N.C. The Hokies return home for a pair of games against

Campbell (Nov. 15) and Wofford (Nov. 19), the latter marks the first time Young will face his previous squad as Tech's head coach. Young spent 17 seasons in Spartanburg, S.C., leading the Terriers to five NCAA tournaments and five Southern Conference tournament titles.

Tech then makes its return to Orlando, Fla., for the ESPN Events Invitational (Nov. 23-26) inside State Farm Field House. The tournament will serve as a homecoming for Orlando native Hunter Cattoor, who has a knack for playing well in his home state. Matchups for the Thanksgiving event were announced last week, with the Hokies opening against Boise State, which has qualified for back-to-back NCAA tournaments.

From there, VT will swing up to Auburn, Ala., to square off with the Tigers in the

inaugural ACC/SEC Challenge on Nov. 29. Tech closes out its non-conference slate with three home games against Valparaiso (Dec. 9), Vermont (Dec. 16) and American (Dec. 21).

The ACC schedule has yet to be announced, but the Hokies will welcome Boston College, Clemson, Duke, Florida State, Georgia Tech, Louisville, Miami, Notre Dame, Virginia and Wake Forest to Cassell Coliseum. On the road, Tech will clash with Florida State, Louisville, Miami, North Carolina, NC State, Notre Dame, Pitt, Syracuse, Virginia and Wake Forest.

Game times and television designations for non-conference games will be revealed at a later date.

Softball adds Bailey, Hanson to staff

During her time with the Hokies, Bailey was named to the All-ACC team three times, as well as

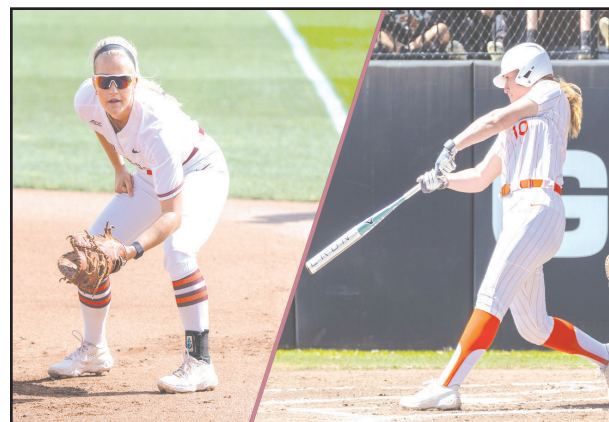

Regional jet ski competition in NRV

Pulaski County is announcing the American Jet Sport Association (AJSA) will be holding its 2023 Regional Championship at Claytor Lake State Park on September 9 and 10.

AJSA was originally formed as the Chattanooga Jet Ski Club in 2019. During its early stages, the club experimented with different jet ski courses and buoy riding at a local lake. By 2022, the club had grown to over 500 members and, that same year, hosted the largest race in the country with nearly 100 racers.

Shortly after, the American Jet Sport Association was born.

Today, AJSA is focused on hosting races exclusively in the southeast region of the country. With its headquarters located in Chattanooga, Tennessee, the group works to limit its races to within a six-hour circle of the city so that participating racers will not have to drive extreme distances to compete.

On Saturday, September 9, and Sunday, September 10, AJSA will be hosting its Regional Championship at Claytor Lake State Park in Pulaski County. The event is open to both spectators and jet ski riders of different classifications.

Saturday’s racing events will begin at 10:00 am and conclude

around 5:00 pm. Sunday’s racing events will also begin at 9:00 am, but will end around 3:00 pm. Start and end times along with delays are dependent upon the weather and other varying circumstances.

“Pulaski County is thrilled to have landed an event of this caliber at Claytor Lake for our local and regional competitors to race, and spectators from around the southeast to come and enjoy,” stated Laura Walters, Chair of the Board of Supervisors. “It takes a tremendous amount of planning and coordination to host such a prestigious championship event and we

couldn’t have done it without Claytor Lake State Park, the Pulaski County Administration and Tourism Team, the AJSA, Pulaski County ACCE, and many others. We are grateful for this opportunity and look forward to it being a successful day on the lake.”

OUTDOOR REPORT: Study reveals disappearance of Hellbenders

The gigantic, slimy salamanders known as hellbenders, once the apex predators of many freshwater streams, have been in decline for decades, their population constantly shrinking. No one knew why.

William Hopkins, professor in the Department of Fish and Wildlife Conservation and director of the Global Change Center at Virginia Tech, suspected the hellbenders’ plight had connections with environmental changes engineered by humans.

Hellbender males select nesting sites on stream bottoms and guard the eggs laid there by females — and occasionally the salamander dads snack on the eggs, consuming them before they ever get to hatch. A study that Hopkins led, conducted through eight years of snorkeling in ice-cold Southwest Virginia streams and scheduled to be printed July 1 in *The American Naturalist*, determined that in deforested areas, hellbender fathers are far more likely to eat their entire brood than in areas that still have lush foliage.

This behavior, known as filial cannibalism, probably evolved as a survival tactic for enduring harsh conditions. Prior to Hopkins’ results, scientists were not aware that hellbenders’ filial cannibalism drastically increased in cleared lands, actively speeding the species out of

existence.

“This is an animal that has been resilient over millions and millions of years, and something that we’re doing to the planet is severe enough that it’s causing them to disappear, and disappear quickly,” Hopkins said. “I feel like we have an obligation to solve this problem.”

A solution to the mystery of the large salamanders’ accelerating disappearance stayed out of reach because the animal’s reproductive cycle was so difficult to study. “These animals nest under large boulders in streams, and you can’t get under the boulders to study the nest,” Hopkins said. “Even if you could lift the boulder, you would destroy the nest site and there would be nothing left of it.”

Years ago at a conference, Hopkins learned of a project undertaken in concert with the Saint Louis Zoo that involved placing concrete boxes in streams where hellbenders live. Hellbenders nested in the boxes, from which eggs could be collected for captive rearing at the zoo. “I almost came out of my seat. I realized this could be a research tool, something we could actually apply in the field to study these animals. I wanted to have these out all over the place in good habitats, bad habitats, so we could start to study this animal’s reproductive biology.”

Once the study began, it took years of trial and error to perfect the use of the concrete boxes in the Tennessee Valley streams. Yet almost right away, Hopkins and his team noticed a pattern that became increasingly evident as more and more of the salamanders used the boxes as nest sites. “Within a couple of years, I started to realize that what was happening with reproduction was really different in bad habitats and good habitats,” Hopkins said. “We were immediately seeing this pattern, that males were eating their eggs and that this was more pronounced at these degraded sites.”

Scaling up and conducting the study was a cold, wet, painstaking process. “We put out hundreds of these shelters underwater and observed them closely. We do it all by snorkeling, and you wear a full wetsuit because the streams are so cold,” he said. “It took us eight years of field work to collect enough data to publish that paper.”

The unprecedented long-term access to these creatures has yielded more than the study originally sought. “We’ve discovered two parasites new to science that nobody knew existed, one is a leech that we think specializes on hellbenders, and the other is a microscopic blood parasite, a trypanosome. We’ve also been able to

describe the hellbenders’ hormone cycles. Now we’re equipping these boxes with infrared underwater video cameras that record nonstop, so we can document their behaviors for the first time.”

There’s plenty more to investigate. “We still don’t know the mechanism that triggers this cannibalistic behavior in males. But by showing that this abnormally high frequency of the behavior is related to upstream forest cover, we answered this really big question, and potentially we’re getting closer and closer to solving this entire mystery, which can lead to solutions.”

Yet even without the specific mechanism identified, the results suggest urgent steps to take. “Things we can do include protecting and re-establishing forest cover around streams, and adopting best agricultural management practices that prevent livestock from entering streams,” Hopkins said. “The benefits of doing so are far reaching — what is good for hellbenders is also good for other aquatic animals like mussels and fish, many of which are also declining. Reforesting stream corridors is also good for terrestrial wildlife like migratory birds. And of course, better water quality is good for us.”

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ACC Network announces fall Tech coverage

Virginia Tech’s Olympics fall sports will be on ACC Network eight times this fall, with women’s soccer and volleyball appearing three times and men’s soccer appearing twice, as announced by the network on Monday.
