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### City seeks comment on CDBG 2023 Annual Action Plan

RADFORD - Each year, the City of Radford is awarded money by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program to help low-to-moderate income residents.

The city is currently seeking public comment on the proposed draft of the 2023 Annual Action Plan for Radford's CDBG

CDBG activities benefit low and moderate- income people by making improvements throughout the City, taking into consideration the public input received. Funding for the 2023 fiscal year will be \$255,683 for the CDBG program, of which \$51,000 has been rolled from prior year

The proposed Housing and Community Development goals for 2023 are to support affordable housing, prevent and end homelessness, and support non-homeless special needs.

The Chairmen of the Board are a national and international R&B, soul and pop singing group from North

With one of soul music's all-time great group names, the Chairmen of the Board has pleased music lovers for over 30 years. Formed in Detroit, Michigan, the Chairmen were one of the first acts signed by songwriting legends Holland, Dozier and Holland for their Invictus label following the writers' departure from Motown. The group came out of the box strong in 1970 with the wonderful "Give Me Just A Little More Time," a classic early 70's radio smash highlighted by lead singer General Johnson's emotive, plaintive vocals. "Give Me" was the foundation of the group's excellent debut album, which also featured the infectious "(You've Got Me) Dangling on a String".

Over the years, the Chairmen of the

Board were among soul music's most consistent hitmakers, scoring big with "Pay to the Piper", "Finders Keepers",

"Chairman of the Board", and the blissful "Everything's Tuesday".

The Chairmen continued to record with moderate success, scoring a surprise hit in Europe in the early 2000s with the joyous "Bless Your Heart", a great tune and performance that sounds like it was plucked from their early 70s catalog.

Group leader General Johnson died on October 13, 2010 at age 67. At the request of General Johnson to keep the group's legacy strong, 38 year member Ken Knox continues to lead the group touring with members Thomas Hunter and Patrick McGuire and six musicians.

The Chairmen continued to record with moderate success, scoring a surprise hit in Europe in the early 2000's with the joyous "Bless Your Heart," a great tune and performance that sounds like it was plucked from their early 70s catalog. In 2015, the group scored a #5 record on the UK Soul Charts with "Reach Out

The band was inducted into the North Carolina Music Hall of Fame.

### Radford Physician Assistant faculty Luke Swatyzna named 2023 Virginia PA of the Year

RADFORD - Assistant Professor of Physician Assistant Studies (PA) Swatzyna, M.S., PA-C has been named the 2023 Virginia PA of the Year by the Virginia Academy of Physician Assistants (VAPA).

Swatzyna, who is also a 2011 graduate of the PA program at what was then Jefferson College of Health Sciences (now Radford University Carilion), accepted the award at the VAPA state conference in Virginia Beach

"Receiving this award is a huge honor," Swatzyna said, "but I'm not doing anything differently from any other PA. I feel very strongly about that. I work with physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants and other professionals every day that are highly skilled and dedicated. Caring for a patient is not a one-person endeavor — it's a team effort."

Swatzyna compares his recognition to being an MVP on an athletic team. While one player may get the spotlight, he couldn't make

it there without the support of his teammates and his family.

"You're only as good as the people you surround yourself with," Swatzyna says, "and I work with excellent colleagues at RUC and in my practice. My family and partner are incredibly supportive, and my clinicians whether they are M.D.s, N.P.s, D.O.s or PAs - have been very important throughout my career. They deserve this award as much as I

Swatzyna began his career in Carilion Clinic's Family Medicine Residency as the first PA assigned to the Southeast Family Medicine and Roanoke-Salem Family Medicine clinics. During his time caring for patients at those clinics, he was able to interact with many leaders at Carilion. As a result of those relationships and being the only PA working there, he served on several boards and advisory

"I have a hard time saying no," Swatzyna says with a laugh, "but that work is meaningful to me as well. If I can help improve people's lives, I will always take that opportunity."

That volunteer spirit is one of the ways Swatzyna ended up back at his alma mater, teaching tomorrow's students. practicing as a PA, Swatzyna would return to give guest lectures or help with interviews of prospective PA students.

Swatzyna recalls, "I always said, 'when [PA faculty member] Dr. [Bob] Hadley retires, I want his job.' I love practicing medicine, and I precepted PA classes for years, but there was something about working with students that really spoke to me. I found it very rewarding." Last year, Hadley did retire,

and Swatzyna was offered the

opportunity to join the PA faculty. He quickly accepted and has been teaching fulltime since January 2023. He hasn't left his PA career behind completely, however.

the VAPA recognition, he ultimately gauges his success in day-to-day interactions with students and patients. "I like teaching a student

who has an 'ah-ha' moment or talking to patients who come back and tell me that my convincing them to go to the ER saved their lives," Swatzyna says. "Those are the really meaningful moments

The Virginia High School League has issued the following guidelines.

"Proper heat-acclimatization plans in secondary school athletic programs are essential to minimize the risk of exertional heat illness (EHI)

during the preseason practice period. Gradually increasing athletes' exposure to the duration and

intensity of physical activity and to the environment minimizes exertional heat illness risk while improving athletic performance. "

According to the VHSL and experts, in conjunction with the pre-participation exam, student-athletes should be screened for risk factors or a history of EHI. Athletes should be acclimatized to heat gradually over a 7-14-day period. Special considerations and/or modifications are needed for those wearing protective equipment during days of high heat and humidity. Athletes should remain well hydrated and replace fluids lost through sweat during activity, including conditioning/training sessions, practices and games. It should be emphasized that athletes should have free access to readily available fluids at any time, not just during breaks. It is imperative that relevant personnel be trained in prevention, signs and symptoms, and treatment of

EHI.2

When high temperatures and/or humidity is forecasted, those supervising practices and competitions should make accommodations based on these conditions, including increasing frequency and duration of water breaks; increasing frequency and duration of rest breaks; reducing the amount of equipment worn during activity; modifying total amount of time engaged in practice; and changing activity location.

While these services can provide guidance for planning purposes, they should never replace the "real-time" evaluation of environmental conditions on-site at the activity location. Weather forecasts tend to be generalized over a large area, can and do change frequently, and ultimately may not be specific for the

Exertional heat illness range in severity, according to the VHSL, from exercise associated muscle cramps to exertional heat stroke.

Exercise associated muscle cramps are sudden or sometimes progressively and noticeably evolving, involuntary, painful contractions of skeletal muscle during or after exercise. These cramps are temperature and can present during exercise in warm, cool or temperaturecontrolled environments, though excessive sweating is often present. Proposed contributing factors to exercise associated muscle cramps are as followed: dehydration, electrolyte imbalances, altered neuromuscular control, fatigue or

Signs and symptoms: visible cramping in part or all of the muscle (group); localized pain, dehydration, thirst, sweating; and fatigue.

any combination of these factors.

Treatment: rest, passive stretching and rehydration using a high sodium/ carbohydrate beverage.

Heat exhaustion is the inability to effectively exercise in the heat, secondary to a combination of factors, including cardiovascular insufficiency, low blood pressure, energy depletion and central fatigue. This condition is manifested

by an elevated core body temperature, usually less than 105 degrees F, and is often associated with a high rate or volume of skin blood flow, heavy sweating and dehydration. It often occurs in hot or humid (or both) conditions, but it can also occur in normal environmental conditions with intense physical activity. Heat exhaustion occurs most often in individuals who are heat-unacclimatized or dehydrated. Signs and Symptoms include excessive fatigue, syncope, collapse, headache, dizziness, confusion, vomiting, nausea, lightheadedness, and

low blood pressure. Treatment: remove equipment and clothing to facilitate cooling, move to a cool, shaded or indoor area, cool with cold towels and fans as needed, monitor vital signs, have athlete rest lying on their back, elevate legs above heart, and activate EMS if athlete does not show signs of improvement within 30 minutes.


The key in all of this is the hydration, hydration and more hydration. This is also important for anyone working outside for long hours in this heat.

National Championship, North Carolina has been selected as the preseason favorite following a vote of the league's 14 head coaches.

The Tar Heels, who were ranked No. 2 in the Preseason United Soccer Coaches Poll released last week, are coming off a 20-win season and their 31st appearance in the College Cup. UNC, which received 10 first-place votes and 166 points, returns nine starters to this year's squad, including preseason All-ACC Team members Maycee Bell, Sam Meza and Ally Sentnor.

Defending ACC champion Florida State was slotted second in the annual preseason poll after receiving two first-place votes and 146 points. Despite advancing to their third consecutive College Cup, the Seminoles saw their season cut short with a 3-2 loss to North Carolina. FSU returns eight starters to a team that finished 17-3-3 a season ago, including preseason All-ACC honorees Jody Brown and Cristina Roque.

Virginia was slotted third with 139 points and a first-place vote after closing 2022 with 16 victories. The Cavaliers earned a trip to the national quarterfinal for the ninth time in program history but fell to eventual national champion UCLA in overtime. Maggie Cagle, who ranked second in the ACC with 12 assists last season, was the lone Cavalier to land on the Preseason

All-ACC Team. Notre Dame, which ended


