# Partners for Excellence Foundation presents significant donations to RCPS

RADFORD – For more than a decade, the Radford City Schools Partners for Excellence Foundation, Inc. has supported Radford City Public Schools with financial resources to help fund a variety of projects.

On Nov. 7, the foundation presented two large donations to Radford City Public Schools at the school board

meeting.

"The first check for \$130,000 will help defray the cost of the Radford High School (RHS) locker rooms renovation project, and the second check in the amount of \$75,000 helped pay for the recently completed update of the science rooms and laboratories," the Partners for Excellence announced. "All funds were

donated by generous Bobcat supporters who believe in the Foundation's mission."

Formed in 2012, the Radford City Schools Partners for Excellence Foundation, Inc., a 501c3 non-profit organization, "focuses on facility upgrades that support and enhance the academics, arts, and athletics for our city's children through business and individual partnerships." The foundation has raised more than \$500,000 for projects since its inception. Previous projects include continuing the restoration of Arnheim, the ancestral home of the City of Radford's namesake, Dr. John Blair Radford, supporting the RCPS Food Hardship Fund, and assisting with the fund-raising for the Chimney Swift habitat on the grounds of McHarg Elementary School. Air Force Guardsman Justin Jones also addressed the audience, welcoming veteran supporters that partner with the military students in assisting with bringing



# NRV Glean Team helps bring fresh fruit and vegetables to the region's food banks

It is difficult to imagine what a total of 42,000 pounds of potatoes look like but to put it in perspective, they would fill a

regular size tractor trailer. The NRV Glean Team has been providing the work and support to supply area nonprofit food pantries with this essential staple of potatoes, as well as other fresh vegetables and fruit, for several years. They "glean" through accepting and delivering vegetables that are leftover from farms and are protectively stored.

On Friday, Nov. 10, a team of approximately 75 volunteers gathered at the Montgomery Christmas County divide these root-based vegetables into carts. New River Valley organizations that run food banks will be filling the needs of hungry NRV community members for the upcoming holiday seasons.

"We had requests from 30 different food banks, and we told them how many pounds that they could expect to get when they got here, and we are putting those in piles with their names on it, for example Beans and Rice, "organizer and foodgrower John Galbraith said. We actually aren't distributing to individuals here but are the middlemen between the farmers

On Friday, team members various organizations pulled into the parking lot and NRV Glean members assisted in loading their vehicles. Some Glean members had raised additional winter squash, along with some apples that the team was able to pick up, so those would be distributed as well.

Bringing potatoes from Maine, grown in the summer months, may sound like a daunting task but the coordination of the farmers, the Glean members, and the organizations working together have seen a great success in the project. "We lose about 1%, so 99%

of them look just like in the store," Galbraith said.

The team, many of whom are NRV Master Gardeners, have previously coordinated with a variety of organizations and individuals across the region to grow more fresh food for area citizens in Southwest Virginia. According to an article www.nrvmastergardeners. com, locations at the Turfgrass Research Center, Virginia Tech's Urban Horticulture Center, and St. Mary's Catholic Church are some of the locations that have



Dear Editor,

The Blacksburg Police Department Citizen Advisory Board is posting this resolution to inform the residents of the Town of Blacksburg that deadly drugs are present in our community. Our citizens, especially our Virginia Tech students and young people, need to be aware of this reality. Parents, educators and faith leaders are encouraged to educate themselves about drug availability in the community so that they can alert children, young people, and others to the dangers to which they can be exposed, even inadvertently.

The most life-threatening drugs in our community at this time are opiates, including fentanyl. There is a life-saving antidote to these drugs, naxalone (Narcan) which is available without a prescription at any pharmacy and is also available free for those who are trained in its administration. We advocate that Narcan should be widely available in the community and as many citizens as possible should be trained in its simple administration with a nasal spray.

Our community has experienced overdoses and fatalities in recent months. While these dire events have occurred at a lower rate than in other communities in the

New River Valley, clearly we are not exempt from trends that are threatening citizens in our nation, in our state, in our region and, yes, in the Town of Blacksburg. People of all ages, races, incomes and education levels have fallen victim to this scourge

The Citizen Advisory Board is informed of local and regional law enforcement issues by meeting monthly with Blacksburg Police Chief Todd Brewster and also by meeting frequently with other community leaders such as representatives of NRV Community Services and the NRV Regional Commission. Individual board members have conferred with the NRV

Public Health Department and have attended local conferences.

Through these sources, the Board has learned that these dangerous, addictive, and life-threatening illegal drugs are being sold and consumed in our region and in our community. The most lethal of these drugs is fentanyl, which can kill in very small quantities. Methamphetamine and other opiates, widely available, are also responsible for accidental and sometimes fatal overdoses. All of these drugs have been intercepted by our police department in the

# Applauding governor's executive order on drug overdoses at school

Now that the dust has settled from Election Day, it has become clear that the Democratic party has prevailed by a slim margin not only in the Senate of Virginia, but in the House of Delegates as well. These results are certainly disappointing, but they come on the heels of historic redistricting that saw dozens of new candidates running—and in many cases, succeeding—in brand new districts. It's now incumbent upon Republicans to work together to solve the real problems facing Virginians, while standing as a bulwark against policies that would seek to make us more like California or New York. There will be plenty of time in the months ahead to discuss and debate how we arrived at this point, but right now, I'm interested in getting back to work on the topics that matter to our community.

With all of that being said, I want to bring to your attention a recent action brought forth by Governor Glenn Youngkin's administration to combat fentanyl abuse in our schools. By way of background, over a span of three weeks, eight students at a Loudoun County high school overdosed on what authorities believe to be fentanyl. Four of these overdoses occurred while at school, and several students required the administration of Narcan and/or CPR to be revived. Parents were not notified of these overdoses until weeks after they occurred, which eliminated the possibility for parents to talk with their kids about the danger and prevalence of drugs like fentanyl. In response, Governor Youngkin announced an Executive Order to ensure that parents are notified within 24 hours of any drug overdose that occurs on school property.

The fact of the matter is this: parents who are informed can warn their kids away from these dangers, or at worst intervene should they already be involved in the usage of drugs. Parents are responsible for their children, and schools should empower parents with information that may contribute to their child's safety. Parents who are left in the dark are left without the tools to ensure this safety. As a member of the Opioid Abatement Authority, which seeks to treat, prevent, and reduce opioid usage in Virginia, I'm proud to see any and all steps taken in order to combat the opioid crisis. Our children are counting on us to be vigilant and to

protect them, and we must not let them down. I appreciate all who supported me in this past election, and for those who didn't, I hope to earn your support in the coming months. It is my honor to represent you in Richmond, and I want you to be fully informed what your government is doing for you. As the Delegate representing the 12th District (soon to be the 42nd District due to redistricting), your concerns are my greatest priority. true; experts say to be suspicious of anything marked down 55% or more. Also be wary of any product or websites that offer popular or hard-to find products at a steeply discounted price. Purchasing products on these sites can lead to shoddy products being delivered

or receiving nothing at all. Worse, the site could steal your payment information or upload credential-stealing malware onto your device.



Predictions for this weekend: Christiansburg 28, Magna Vista 27 Radford 49, Appomattox 30.





It is also known that substances such as cocaine, marijuana and methamphetamine have been adulterated with fentanyl, unbeknownst to the users of these street drugs.

These substances sometimes being produced locally and sometimes arriving with dealers driving to Blacksburg. Drugs are also ordered by individuals over the internet. With 30,000 college students residing in Blacksburg, criminals consider our community a marketing target. Investigations, arrests and prosecutions of those that provide these substances in the Town of Blacksburg are ongoing. The Blacksburg Police Department partners

with law enforcement agencies in the region, the state and with federal authorities in this All law enforcement officers

in the Town of Blacksburg,

the Town of Christiansburg, County Montgomery Virginia Tech havé been trained on the use of Narcan which can reverse the fatal effects of opiates, including fentanyl. They carry Narcan while on duty. Training and providing of Narcan has also been made available to town

employees, the members of

the Citizen Advisory Board, educators and others. A recent infusion of opiate lawsuit settlement funds, as well as federal grants, has made it possible for all of our NRV governments to participate in a regional task force, the New River Valley Recovery Program. Ecosystem Advisory Citizen urges Blacksburg government and other leaders, as well as the Blacksburg Police Department, to participate fully in this effort which is being directed by the NRV
