



Danilowicz joins area college presidents for 'Future of Talent Summit' panel

Radford University President Bret Danilowicz joined the heads of several area colleges for a leadership panel discussion at the first Future of Talent Summit on March 7 on Roanoke College's campus.

initiative to cultivate and strengthen

The event was part of an ongoing

bonds among regional educators and industries and to unify the workforce and economic development efforts of higher education officials, employers and government agencies. Across an hourlong dialogue, Danilowicz and four other presidents

 Mirta Martin of Ferrum College,
John Rainone of Mountain Gateway Community College, Robert Sandel of Virginia Western Community College and Frank Shushok of Roanoke College – addressed a host of central issues. Chief among those: The need to

help Virginia students develop into skilled workers; the best ways to connect them with viable employers and lucrative jobs; and the importance of retaining them locally. The panel discussed incentives and

advantages for students - internships, but also options including co-ops and micro-partnerships.

"We need to advocate for our businesses to stand up to make those opportunities for students who come here," Danilowicz said. "And then they become the future leaders and industry members of this region."

Sandel also pointed to the wide range of today's students and their needs, with some seeking undergraduate or advanced degrees but others earning associate degrees, licensing and technical certification. He praised the current partnerships between community and four-year colleges, such as the articulation agreement signed last year between Radford and Virginia Western.

"Things don't just happen; you've got to make them happen," Sandel said. "We work diligently to make

things happen."

Asked about today's students and the new and increased educational alternatives they face, Danilowicz offered advice to those entering higher education.

'I ... tell freshmen or transfers, the biggest mistake you will make at Radford University is if you don't, within your first month, go to career services and start talking about internships and employment,3

He also pushed back against longstanding modes of viewing some degrees as less marketable and, therefore, less desirable.

"There's too much conversation nationally that says, 'Don't study that, there's no employment in that," he explained. "What we have to do as institutions is to say, when you are passionate about that field, when you go into Career Services, the conversation should become 'Here's how you take that field, get a degree in it and align it to places where there's demand in the region.

"It is not about the degree ... it is about the professional track that the student is taking. And we have to show them where those kinds of employment areas are," Danilowicz

Keynote speaker Kirk Cox, president of the Virginia Business Higher Education Council and a former speaker of the House of Delegates, said the state's schools and industries remain highly ranked and points of pride for residents across party lines.

"At a time of great political division, there is something on which Virginians of both parties strongly agree," Cox said. "It's time to invest in Virginia talent."

In his early remarks to the audience, Roanoke College President Frank Shushok celebrated the fact that both business and educational professionals were uniting in their efforts, and he urged them to make constructive connections.

"The most important thing about this gathering is that we're in the room together," he said.

In a break-out session designed to help meet the modern priorities of younger generations, Radford's Director of Career and Talent Development Lee Svete described

one objective at Radford as "helping students become career- and lifeready.... They come in the door, we help recruit them and then we develop a four-year plan that's comprehensive to make them marketable in this competitive world of work.' Later in the day, the summit also

offered four "Lunch and Learn" panel-led sessions, variously focused developing healthy talent pipelines, capitalizing on grants and other financial incentives, career and technical education programs and meeting the modern priorities of younger generations.

That fourth panel was joined by two representatives from Radford University - career coach Thallya Díaz and Lee Svete, who is Radford's new director of Career and Talent Development and serves as finance director for the Virginia Association of Colleges and Employers (VACE).

Svete described one objective at Radford as "helping students become career- and life-ready."

"It's the holistic point of developing relationships with students early in

their college career," he said.

"They come in the door, we help recruit them and then we develop a four-year plan that's comprehensive to make them marketable in this competitive world of work.'

This is the first year the Future of Talent Summit has been held, and it marks a collaboration by the Roanoke Regional Partnership and its satellite, Get2KnowNoke; the Greater Roanoke Workforce Development Board; the Roanoke-Blacksburg Technology Council; Onward New River Valley, Virginia Talent + Opportunity Partnership; the New River/Mt. Rogers Workforce Development Board; and the central colleges and universities in the Roanoke and New River Valleys.

The Future of Talent Summit is funded by grants and support from such entities as GO Virginia and Growth4VA.

Public hearing set for H20kies, New River Valley Aquatics lease request for new building construction

CHRISTIANSBURG - Possible construction for a building to provide additional space needed for the Christiansburg Aquatic Center has prompted a 30-year lease proposal for town property adjacent to the swim

H20kies Head Coach and Director Scott Baldwin presented a lease proposal for a portion of town property at the Christiansburg Aquatic Center, located at 595 North Franklin St. for

Coaches, staff, parents, and officials are the "unsung heroes" that make these events happen, Baldwin said. However, the peak hours of the facility are already at max capacity, and in the next year or two will have over 300 swimmers in the program. "Without the manpower that

H20kies Aquatics brings to the table, those meets don't happen; we don't get those bids for those meets," Baldwin

The Aquatics Center is seeking more space for additional equipment that meets with the needs of the evolving sports of swimming while also providing a place for community youth to have a safe space to practice or utilize the

"We are not asking Christiansburg to pay for any of this...we are not asking the town to pay with any of their tax money," Baldwin said. Balzer and Associates, Inc., a

design, and construction development company, has been working with the Aquatic Center in the process of this facility's construction, upon lease

Since 2010, the Center has given over \$60,000 in donations to continued operations for competitive swimming and will continue to do so. Town Council Member and

Christiansburg Aquatics Center Council Representative Samuel Bishop questioned Baldwin on whether the town will be paid anything for the "For the last over 12 months we

have sent the ground lease back and forth, back and forth, and you know lease or rent was never brought up," Baldwin said. "So, we wanted to come here tonight and highlight, you know, a lot of the things that we are doing already behind the scenes that make this facility as successful as it is.'

Baldwin added that 8,600 volunteer that include parents contributing their own time and energy for free, asking that council considers this when considering a paid rent or lease agreement.

"I am thrilled that you want to do this for the athletes that you guys train and that all you're asking for is a small parcel of land to build a building on to do this is pretty amazing to me,"

Council member Tim Wilson said.

Citizen comment was opened to the public by Mayor Michael Barber following the presentation of the Aquatic Center Director.

My question is, if you are going to do a lease, then have it be a lease and there will be money involved. If not, call it what it is, you're ceding the town's property for 30 years. Why not sell it? And I would encourage everyone to watch the budget work session, because ya'll look like ya'll are ready to spend money like drunken sailors on shore leave, you know, shifting money from one pot to the other. I see tax increases in our future," Christiansburg resident Chris Waltz said.

The fact there is we continue to own the land. We're not going to give it away, we're going to own the land and the building...," Mayor Barber said.

The land proposal public hearing will be set for the next council meeting, on March 26.

The Airport Authority, we were established in 2001 by the General Assembly as a regional government entity to run and operate the airport, so we are comprised of the that additional 1,000 Town of Christiansburg, the Town of Blacksburg, Montgomery County, and Virginia Tech," Holt said.

In 2020, Holt said, the airport runway extension

New River and Roanoke project was completed, taking the runway to 5,500 feet; a 1,000-foot extension. The project was 98% supported by federal and state grant funding as well.

"So, the addition of feet allowed the aircraft, which, many of which were already visiting our airport anyhow to be able to take on more fuel with us," Holt said. "Our fuel sales went from about

116,000 gallons per year to 220,000 gallons per year, so almost doubled our fuel sales."

Holt also pointed out that the Virginia Tech-Montgomery Executive Airport can support Fortune 500 business flight transportation but also sees a lot of local economic support travel that occurs due to the utilization of the airfield, including the Chicken Salad Chick franchise in Christiansburg.

A 2019 report showed an economic impact of \$10.5 million in economic activity, Holt said, and he is looking forward to seeing increases in the new report. VTMEA becoming self-funded is a goal in the future and Holt said the airport is seeing progress in reaching that goal.

The first electric airplane also recently landed in February at the VTMEA. The airport has an electric airplane charging station, making new emerging technology available to

Hokies kick off spring practice

Virginia Tech football coach Brent Pry began his first spring press conference Tuesday by congratulating Kenny Brooks and the ladies' basketball for a successful season.

The praise turned to phases as Pry pointed to the next one for his team.

He said following a successful Phase One, which occurred during the winter and focuses on fundamentals, strength and conditioning, mental toughness and competition, the script now flips to Phase Two.

Phase Two, commonly referred to as spring ball, provides the coaching staff the opportunity to install their base schemes and employ more strategic player development.

The third-year head coach is optimistic about what is happening in Blacksburg. This season received a boost with the return of 86 percent of its productivity from last year. A large number of players decided to return to Blacksburg, something Pry is happy about. He is also happy that 11 members of the coaching staff receiving contract extensions through at least 2026. "I'm just as excited about

the retention of our staff as I

was about the retention of our

players," Pry reflected during Tuesday's press conference. "Stability, and consistency, especially when you believe in a process is critical." His attention now turns to work on the field. The program will have 15 practices during

the spring to evaluate talent

and focus on specific areas of

improvement. Spring practice

began Friday, March 15. Spring ball is Phase Two. Fundamentals, techniques, base installation of schemes, improve on things that we didn't do well enough," said Pry. "We've identified those through film study, whether it's a technique issue, whether it's a schematic issue, where we need to be better. February, there was a lot of professional growth and development. For instance, the defensive staff from Iowa was in town for a couple of days. You trade ideas, you swap ideas, you grow, you learn. So, implementing some of the things in all three phases that we learned through our professional development."

His defensive coordinator Chris Marve agreed.

"What we're looking for this spring from an objective standpoint, is certainly we want to establish an identity," defensive coordinator Chris Marve stated. "One that plays consistent, that plays together, plays extremely fast and creates mayhem in ways that I know that we can."

"Yeah, Kyron's going to get the ones reps and continue with the continuity, the development, the operation of what we're doing offensively.



Some days guys going with the twos, some days that rotating back with the threes to make sure that they're getting reps with the right guys so we can make a true evaluation," Bowen said.

The Baylor transfer Drones played in all 13 games, starting 11 at quarterback. He set a Virginia Tech bowl record and Military Bowl record with 176 yards rushing in a 41-20 win over Tulane and also passed for 91 yards and two touchdowns and was named Military Bowl

RU, Tech scratching heads over men's basketball

Radford Both University and Virginia Tech have not had the men's basketball season they had hoped for.

2023-2024 came to a screeching halt for Radford this past week. Tech still has an outside shot at running the gauntlet during this week's ACC tournament, but this season has been rocky.

Tech Coach Mike Young did manage to win the tourney three years ago, but the wins and success has hit a speed bump.

Meanwhile Radford University's Darris Nichols has reached

for the gold ring but keeps missing in the Big South Conference. Nichols just finished his third season. The

native son of Radford is the eighth head coach in program history at

RU. Nichols' plan to return Highlanders to their winning ways came to fruition in just his second season at the helm, leading the program to a 21-15

overall record, including a 12-6 mark in Big South play, during the 2022-23 campaign. Radford came one point away from playing in the conference championship, still earned a bid to the College Basketball Invitational.

This included a 11-18 record in his debut season.

Before returning to the New River Valley, Nichols spent six seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Florida. While at Florida he helped coach the Gators to a 123-75 record that included four straight 20-win seasons. Nichols and the Gators also tallied four straight NCAA Tournament bids.

The 2016-17 season was one of the best, while Nichols was at

UF. Florida earned a

27-9 record and reached

the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament. The Gators finished second in the SEC with a 14-4 record, matching the secondmost conference wins in team history. Florida climbed as high as 12th nationally in both the AP and coaches polls and hit No. 3 in RPI

and KenPom rankings. Nichols, a member of Coaches 4 Change, garnered a spot in ESPN.com's 40 Under 40 in the summer of 2020, rated #17 on the national list that included both head coaches and assistant coaches. He was also rated the #2 assistant coach in the SEC in a Stadium poll of coaches around the league. Young also came to

the New River Valley with lots of optimism. He is also a native of Radford. Initially, he was hired

in 2019 and steered the Hokies to their first-ever ACC men's basketball championship Ьy winning four games in four days in Brooklyn, New York in March

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
Blacksburg starting pitcher Brice Abbott earned the win for the Bruins, with seven strikeouts in four innings against Auburn.

His resume includes some very successful times at Wolford.

He has made the NCAA Tournament in seven of the last 13 seasons, including being the fastest Virginia

Tech coach to make The Dance. Under his watch in 2020-21, he led Tech to being 4-0 versus the AP's Top 25, with the four wins being tied for the most ranked wins in a season in

school history. This all includes being very successful in beating some big time programs and their legendary coaches like Mike Krzyzewski, Jay Wright, Tom Izzo, Jim Boeheim, Roy Williams and Tony Bennett.

He joined the Hokies after a record-setting 17-year tenure as the head coach at Wofford. The Terriers posted a 30-5 overall record in 2018-19, including a perfect 18-0 mark in Southern Conference play, and registered a convincing 84-68 win over Seton Hall in the first round of the 2019 NCAA Tournament.

The 2019 Sporting News Coach of the Year, Young built the Terriers into one of the Southern Conference's preeminent programs and a perennial NCAA Tournament participant. He guided Wofford to five NCAA Tournament berths over the past 10 seasons and five Southern Conference championships. In addition to the on-court success of his teams, 100 percent of Young's studentathletes at Wofford who completed their eligibility graduated.

This year, Tech has only managed to stag 18 wins and fell to near the basement of the ACC conference. A late season surge of winning did push them back to the middle of the pack. But that's where they remained.

Already fans are asking if changes need to be made to one or both programs. Both Young and Nichols deserve another year to right the ship.

The future has not been written, and with the idea of the transfer portal, things could change on its own. But with this, both programs are hungry - hungry for winning ways.

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
