Optimism characterizes latest Radford University Board of Visitors meeting

A string of recent accomplishments and institutional initiatives brought a higher level of excitement and optimism to Radford University's latest quarterly Board of Visitors meetings, held June 6-7 at Kyle Hall.

Key achievements discussed by the board included double-

digit enrollment increases signaled for the fall semester – fueled by Radford's newly implemented a new 1.5% tuition rebate that in-state undergraduates will receive over the next year; the election of the board's new rector and vice rector; and a significant makeover of both Radford's brand and its website,

among other milestones.

"I do believe that a little bit of celebrating is in order today," President Bret Danilowicz announced at the start of his report to the board. "Radford University's accomplishments over the past year

BLACKSBURG- The Town of Blacksburg will be participating for the first time in the annual nationwide Find Waldo Local event created by Candlewick Press and the American Booksellers Association. Candlewick Press and the American Booksellers Association have held the Find Waldo Local event for 12 years by partnering annually with over 300 independently owned bookstores each year. This year is the first in which they have partnered with Blacksburg Books and brought this event to Blacksburg and its residents. The event is part of an initiative to support local businesses and have fun in the community. Similar to the books by Martin Handford, residents will search 25 Blacksburg stores for the iconic Waldo. This event is entirely free to participate in and lasts all month long starting July 1, 2024.

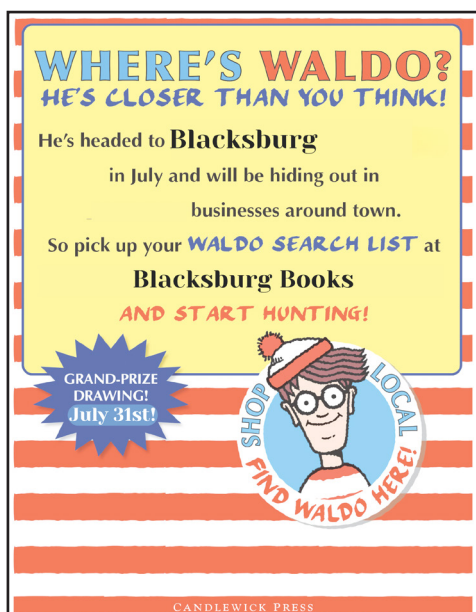
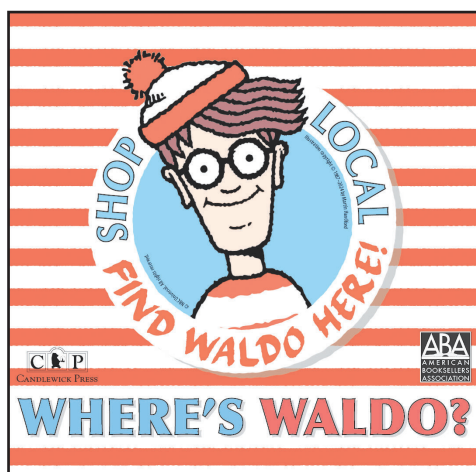
"To join in the fun," Blacksburg Books' press release said, "people can simply pick up a 'Find Waldo Local in Blacksburg' stamp card at any of the participating stores. With each miniature Waldo they spot, shoppers get their card stamped or signed by the participating shop. Collecting store stamps or signatures at fifteen or more businesses will entitle diligent seekers entry into a grand-prize drawing for Waldo books and other prizes, including gift cards! All

participants are welcome to attend the celebration party at Blacksburg Books on July 31st at 3pm. Mayor Leslie Hager-Smith of Blacksburg will be there to hand out the grand prize!"

Blacksburg Books and its fellow Blacksburg small businesses like the Lyric Theatre, Our Daily Bread and Fringe Benefit, will have stamp cards for participants to begin their searches for the red-and-white striped shirt and black glasses that have been popular since the 1980's.

"Each of the participating businesses will have a six-inch Waldo figure," Ellen Woodall, manager of Blacksburg Books said, "hidden somewhere on their premises. Participants have the entire month to find the Waldos and get their cards stamped. Those who find all the Waldos will be entered in our grand prize drawing, which will include gift cards from local stores and – of course – Waldo books. And the mayor herself [Blacksburg Mayor Leslie Hager-Smith] will be at our Waldo presentation of the grand prize! There will also be prizes along the way."

"We're excited," Woodall said, "because it's an incentive for kids and their parents to visit a multitude of local businesses – including some that they might not have been in before. If we can raise awareness and foot traffic to locally-owned shops, we call that a win. In many towns this has turned into a fun annual tradition, and we're hoping for the same in Blacksburg."

Two Alpha Gals working together to educate and spread the word about Alpha-Gal Syndrome

MONTGOMERY COUNTY- The Two Alpha Gals work through their podcast, blog, social media and conference events to spread awareness of a lesser known and researched tick-borne condition called Alpha-Gal Syndrome.

Candice Matthis and Debbie Nichols are two friends and colleagues who both live with Alpha-Gal Syndrome. According to the CDC, Alpha-Gal Syndrome or "The Red Meat Allergy", "is a serious and potentially life-threatening allergic condition that can occur after a tick bite." The CDC also states that the lone star tick is the species of tick most commonly associated with Alpha-Gal Syndrome but one can be bitten by another species of tick as per the research that is on-going, these other species have not been ruled out as triggers for the syndrome. According to the CDC, the tick bite triggers a molecule named galactose-a-1,3-galactose which is found in most mammals. This makes it so that when people eat red meat or other mammalian products, their body reacts to it as an allergen, hence why it is commonly referred to as the "Red Meat Allergy".

"This could mean," Nichols explained regarding reaction, "anaphylaxis. It could mean GI distress. It could mean nothing. So, a certain percentage of people will get bitten and will actually contract Alpha-Gal syndrome, but will have no symptoms whatsoever."

Debbie and Candice explained that their reactions to this allergy are on the severe side to the point where they are both fume-reactive, meaning they can have an allergic reaction

because they are in a space where meat is being cooked and they breathe in those particles and it sends their bodies into distress.

"Alpha-Gal is different," Matthis explained, "because you look at other tick-borne diseases; they're bacterial or viral. Alpha-Gal is not. It's an IGE response. It's an allergy. When you research Alpha-Gal, other animals, most other mammals, carry it [the molecule galactose-a-1,3-galactose] naturally. They genetically have this carbohydrate, which we [humans] don't."

The allergy reacts to mammalian byproducts, which from its nickname makes people believe that it is just food based, however Debbie and Candice explain that mammalian byproducts like tallow, gelatin, or dairy, exist in our everyday lives in household products like soap, laundry detergent, candles, paint and even crayons and therefore this allergy cause an entire lifestyle change where its not solely about watching what you eat. The Two Alpha-Gals explained that this even restricts what kind of medicines someone who lives with Alpha-Gal Syndrome can use as gel capsule medications often have gelatin in them which is a pork by-product. This can also mean, because companies can change their chemical formulas, that a product that was once safe can become no longer safe for people with this allergy.

Since 2019, the Two Alpha-Gals have been spreading knowledge, doing research and advocating for people with this allergy as they explained that it is not on a typical allergy table or a tick-borne disease test. Matthis and Nichols explain that oftentimes people react to this

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC OF AN APPLICATION BY ATMOS ENERGY CORPORATION FOR APPROVAL OF A 2024 SAVE RIDER PROJECTED FACTOR AND TRUE-UP FACTOR CASE NO. PUR-2024-00094

On June 7, 2024, Atmos Energy Corporation ("Atmos" or "Company") completed the filing of an application ("Application") pursuant to § 56-603 *et seq.* of the Code of Virginia ("Code"), known as the Steps to Advance Virginia's Energy (SAVE) Plan Act, for approval of its annual update of its SAVE Rider, consisting of a revised Infrastructure Replacement Current Rate ("Projected Factor") and an Infrastructure Replacement Reconciliation Rate ("True-Up Factor"), under the Company's approved SAVE Plan. Pursuant to Code § 56-604 E, the Commission shall approve or deny, within 90 days, a natural gas utility's proposed SAVE rider adjustment.

In support of its Application, Atmos states that, pursuant to the Commission's prior orders regarding its SAVE Plan, the Company is filing this Application for approval to implement updated SAVE Rider rates, effective with the first billing cycle in October 2024. Atmos has requested a Projected Factor revenue requirement of \$2,428,914 for the upcoming SAVE Plan year as well as a True-Up Factor revenue requirement of \$84,298 related to the Company's fourth year of investment under its SAVE Plan, for a combined 2024 SAVE Rider revenue requirement of \$2,513,212. As proposed, the 2024 SAVE Rider rate for residential customers will be \$2.99 per month, an increase of \$0.90 over the current rate of \$2.09 per month for such customers.

The details of these and other proposals are set forth in the Company's Application. Interested persons are encouraged to review the Company's Application and supporting exhibits for the details of these proposals.

TAKE NOTICE that the Commission may adopt rates that differ from those appearing in the Company's Application and supporting documents and may apportion revenues among customer classes and/or design rates in a manner differing from that shown in the Application and supporting documents.

The Commission entered an Order for Notice and Comment that, among other things, directed the Company to provide notice to the public and provided interested persons an opportunity to comment on the Company's Application.

To promote administrative efficiency and timely service of filings upon participants, the Commission has directed the electronic filing of testimony and pleadings, unless they contain confidential information, and required electronic service on parties to this proceeding.

are definitely having positive impacts on our performance metrics, but also on our community spirit."

He cited the most recently recorded freshman deposits, up from 1,119 last year to 1,552 this fall, indicating an increase of 27%, and the rise in deposits for transfer students from 533 to 812, which represents a 52% spike.

Nursing deposits for the next semester are up as well – 58% for freshmen and 28% for transfers – as are deposits from first-generation, Pell-eligible and military-affiliated students. Campus visits by prospective students and families exceeded 1,000, or about 60% more than last year.

"We appear poised to experience a significant enrollment increase for new students starting in this fall semester," the president said, adding: "We will be using the Radford Tuition Promise to stabilize enrollment as we planned, but at a higher enrollment than even I had envisioned. And that's a very positive place for us to be."

Danilowicz, in his remarks, also thanked Dannette Gomez Beane, vice president for enrollment management and strategic communications, for her role in that progress.

In unveiling the Business Affairs and Audit report, that committee's chair, Tyler Lester '15, called the tuition rebate "a result of strategic and conservative budgeting on the part of the university, combined with generous increases in state supports from the governor and the General Assembly."

"That translates to a net zero increase in tuition for Radford students and families this year, which is substantial," Lester said.

"This is really tremendous," Rector Debra McMahon said of the rebate. "It's the nature of this board to do the right thing by the student, and this is an example of exactly that."

In keeping with that spirit, the board agreed to renew the Tuition Promise for a second year.

Jeanne Armentrout, chair of the Academic Excellence and Student Success Committee, delivered her report, which included the announcement of the selection of the new dean of the Davis College of Business and Economics, Donna Weaver McCloskey, and the board approved her faculty tenure effective July 10. McCloskey most recently served as associate dean of undergraduate programs at Widener University in Chester, Pennsylvania.

Armentrout also discussed her committee's ongoing curriculum analysis, which continues to examine academic structures and to create or modify programs "to make sure that we are meeting students' needs, teaching efficiently and growing appropriately."

"Enrollment and retention are stronger than they have been in many years," Armentrout noted, adding that transfer enrollment "is particularly strong this year."

"That is all reflected in the work that was done because of the Tartan Transfer initiative, which should be finalized with up to 10 regional community colleges before the fall semester," she explained.

Further into the meeting, in a pair of unanimous votes, the board chose Marquett Smith '85 to become its next rector, for 2024-2025, and named Tyler Lester '15 as vice rector. Smith, the current vice rector, has held that title since June 2023.

"It's really wonderful to have Marquett and Tyler in these positions," McMahon said after the vote. "It's a really great warm-up for this coming year, hitting the ground running already, and we couldn't be in better hands."

McMahon and fellow board members Robert A. Archer, Jay A. Brown and Georgia Anne Snyder-Falkinham will complete their current terms on June 30. Brown has previously served as

vice rector; McMahon was rector for the past two terms; and Archer spent three terms as rector and another as vice rector. Snyder-Falkinham first joined the board in 2012, and Archer, Brown and McMahon each came on in 2016.

During the June 7 meeting, the board recognized their service with resolutions of commendation.

"It has been such a great pleasure to serve on this board," McMahon said. "It has really taught me a lot about people and higher education, of course, but the collegiality of the board has been unique in my experience, and I just feel so honored to have been a part of it."

Also receiving commendation from the board: Professor of History Kur Gingrich, who joined Radford's faculty in August 2000 and whose research concentrates on the British Empire and the history of the Atlantic World. Gingrich is concluding his term as faculty representative to the board.

As she presented Gingrich's resolution, board member Jennifer Wishon Gilbert read a quote from one of his students, who noted: "His tone is passionate, his insight profound and his witticisms acute."

Troy Stallard '24, this year's student representative to the Board of Visitors, delivered his final report, offering updates on such projects and initiatives as the Peer Mentoring Program; the Health and Wellness Task Force; and the recent Virginia Women's Veteran Appreciation Ceremony, which honored Radford's faculty, students, staff and alumni who are also female veterans.

Stallard, an Air Force veteran himself, was active in the Radford University at Carilion (RUC) Office of Student Affairs and helped establish RUC's Military Resource Center. He graduated with a degree in emergency services and minors in biology and chemistry. In May, he started work as the resident director for the medical and health science governor's school at RUC.

"I will take the lessons that I've learned from all of you and this university," Stallard told the board, "to point my mentorship lens toward our next generation of health professionals and efforts to combat healthcare shortages, and [to] draw gifted students to our New River and Roanoke Valley universities and colleges."

Some of that work is already done. Board member Archer, a 30-year veteran of the U.S. Army, noted that recent data indicated an increase in incoming veteran students.

"Troy had a lot to do with that, so thank you very much," Archer told him. "Thank you for your service."

Additional reports to the board included:

Several recommendations and ongoing analysis from Radford's Artificial Intelligence (AI) Task Force from that group's co-chairs, Executive Director of the Vinod Chachra IMPACT Lab Matt Dunleavy and Director of the Center for Innovative Teaching and Learning (CITL) Charley Cosmato.

An overview of response planning for campus unrest, led by Dean of the College of Humanities and Behavioral Sciences Matt Smith.

An examination of data concerning standardized testing scores – currently not required by Virginia's colleges and universities – presented by Vice President for Enrollment Management and Strategic Communications Dannette Gomez Beane.

June's sessions marked the board's second set of gatherings in 2024. Its next meeting will occur July 21-23 as a board retreat, and following that, the group will reconvene on campus for its penultimate 2024 session on Sept. 5-6.

AARP Virginia fraud alert: Lost wallet? What's next

We've all been there; you reach for your wallet and find nothing in your pocket or purse. The panic we feel in that moment is real because our wallet can be a treasure trove for criminals, who can go on to perpetrate credit card fraud or identity theft. Most times that feeling is short lived but sometimes that wallet really is gone. Here's what to do if this happens to you.

First, cancel all debit or credit cards. By reporting them lost or stolen ASAP you may be able to avoid illegal charges. This is especially important for debit cards which are gateways to your bank account.

Next, file a fraud alert. With your driver's license in hand, identity

thieves can do a lot of damage. You can request that the credit bureaus — Experian, TransUnion and Equifax — place a fraud alert on your credit. (Contact one and the others will add the fraud alert, too.) A fraud alert notifies creditors, lenders or anyone viewing your credit report that someone may be trying to apply for

credit in your name.

Lastly, if you think your wallet has been stolen, call your local precinct to get a police report on record. Even though the police may not be able to recover your missing wallet, it's a crucial piece of documentation to have on hand.

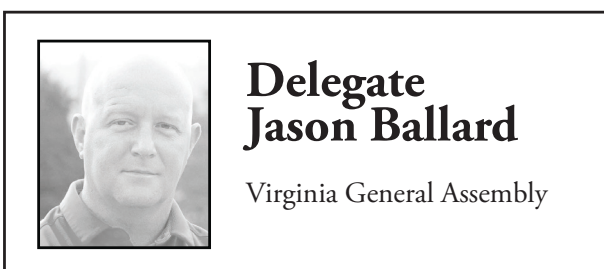

Delegate urges fix to Virginia Military Survivors and Dependents Education Program

This past week, the Senate of Virginia had an opportunity to take the first real step in fixing the Virginia Military Survivors and Dependents Education Program (VMSDEP), a topic that I have written about several times over the past months. During hours of work in Richmond, the Senate failed to even consider any legislation to fix the program. To say that Senate Democrats made a hash of last week's session is an understatement.

Both the committee hearing for this legislation and session itself began hours late, and neither considered any bills. This was a huge inconvenience to the hundreds of Virginians who travelled to Richmond in order to testify in favor of VMSDEP's importance to veterans and their families. As multiple senators noted, there was a bill pending that would have repealed the VMSDEP changes that have caused consternation, which would have cleared the way for the House to act on that same legislation when we return to Richmond on June 28. This would have given peace of mind to those Gold Star, combat disabled, and first responder families who depend on this program for their children's education. Yet for some reason, the

senate took up no bills at all, either in committee or on the floor, leaving VMSDEP families in limbo for even longer. Democrats in the Senate insisted that they are simply acting to preserve the viability of the program, yet as Senate Majority Leader Louise Lucas said in her opening remarks, Democrats coupled VMSDEP legislation to skill games legislation, possibly to use it as leverage to force that bill's passage.

The most recent analysis of the program by General Assembly Appropriations staff shows that VMSDEP has grown to serve more than 8,300 Gold Star families, at a price tag of \$84.9 million this fiscal year. Legislators on both sides of the aisle agree that the program needs

reform, but most believe that the reform needs to happen during a regular General Assembly session where stakeholders can play a major role in the process.

The solution is simple. We must adopt bipartisan legislation that will repeal the changes passed in the budget, utilize the Preserving VMSDEP Task Force to issue recommendations, and then return in January and work through the legislative process to reform the program. A bipartisan majority in the House is ready to return on June 28 to do just that. What is vitally important to me is that we keep our promises that we make to the Commonwealth's Veterans and their families. Their sacrifice means they deserve nothing less.

As the Delegate representing the 42nd House District in the Virginia General Assembly, your concerns are my greatest priority. Average Virginia gas prices lower than last week

Average gasoline prices in Virginia have fallen 4.5 cents per gallon in the last week, averaging \$3.31/g today, according to GasBuddy's survey of 4,081 stations in Virginia. Prices in Virginia are 15.6 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 1.6 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has risen 2.4 cents in the last week and stands at \$3.76 per gallon.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Virginia was priced at \$2.89/g yesterday while the most expensive was \$3.99/g, a difference of \$1.10/g. The lowest price in the state yesterday was \$2.89/g while the highest was \$3.99/g, a difference of \$1.10/g.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 0.3 cents per gallon in the last week, averaging \$3.41/g today. The national average is down 18.8 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 14.4 cents per gallon lower than a year ago, according to GasBuddy data compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

"With summer now officially here, we've seen the national average price of gasoline holding most steady compared to last week, with some states seeing their traditional price cycling every couple of weeks, while others have seen prices slowly slip," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy. "For now, gasoline prices may see little movement ahead of July 4 as oil prices have risen above \$80. But the good news is that instead of the national average jumping to follow the rising price of oil, it's holding steady. The bummer is that the decreases we hoped for will have to wait, thanks to oil's climb."

Another Blue Demon headed to Concord

Another Christiansburg High School baseball player is headed to Athens, West Virginia to play for Concord University.

Rising senior Gavin Dow announced his commitment this past weekend to play at the school. Of course, CHS and Concord are no strangers on the diamond.

Concord recently appointed Drew Bailey, a Christiansburg graduate, as its new head baseball coach. In four seasons previously at Bluefield State, Bailey compiled a record of 95-79, highlighted by the most successful season in program history as BSU went 33-15 this spring and won its second HBCU World Series last week in Montgomery, Alabama—the second such title in the last four seasons.

Under Bailey's guidance, Bluefield State steadily improved from 15 wins in his first season to the program-record 33 win

While Bluefield State was Bailey's most recent head coaching stop, the Christiansburg native brings nine years of coaching experience to Athens. From 2014-17, Bailey was an assistant coach at Bluefield University where he helped the Rams to a 32-21 record in his final season.

The first head coaching opportunity Bailey received was for the 2018 season at Division III Averett University in Danville, Virginia.

Beginning in 2018, Bailey was the head softball coach at Bluefield University. After his stint as the head softball coach in Bluefield, Virginia, Bailey was a volunteer assistant coach for Concord during the fall of 2020 before being hired away by Bluefield State in January 2021.

Meanwhile Concord has become Christiansburg-West with as many as four other former Blue Demon players dotting the school's baseball roster over the past three years. Those include MJ Hunter, Connor Brizendine, Dawson Gragg and Marshall Basham. Recent graduate Jeremiah Thompson is also headed this fall to Concord and its baseball program.

The Bailey and Christiansburg connection is a main reason for Dow in making his decision.

"The main reason I chose Concord is because I wanted an opportunity to play for coach Drew Bailey," Dow said. "Also, they have my academic major and the other key part was their nice facilities and the upgrades there making to them."

Concord University is a public university and has a current enrollment of 1,375 students. The university is known athletically as the Mountain Lions and is an NCAA Division II school, and a member of the Mountain East Conference.

Dow has primarily played third base while on the field at CHS but moved over to shortstop this past year. He was second team for the River Ridge and Region D all-star teams after leading the team in hits and average (.375).

"In college, I hope to continue to grow as a player and contribute to the success of the team," he said. "I also hope to accomplish winning the conference championship and make the NCAA Division II tournament."

"Another goal of mine is to keep the Christiansburg legacy going at Concord University as there's been many great players from Christiansburg that went on to be successful at Concord. All in all, I just wanna win," he said.

At Concord, Dow plans to major in business and minor in education.

Everything falls in place for first-year coach

Two years ago, Sean Gaynor was coaching an all-star travel softball team and was helping with the program at a dominant Auburn High School, who had won as many as five of the last seven state titles.

Turn the clock to last summer when the opening at Christiansburg High School popped up. Gaynor did not think twice and applied for the job.

"I've always coached softball and in all honesty, I feel more comfortable in being in the dugout or the dirt. Saw it as an opportunity," he said.

Gaynor led Christiansburg to its first ever state championship, rolling through regional and district competition to finish with a 24-3 record. Max Preps ranked them as number four in the entire state across all six classes. The team outscored its opponents by a 215 to 64 mark, while establishing itself as one of the top homerun hitting squads in the Commonwealth.

Two years ago, Christiansburg was 12-9 and was 33-21 combined over the past four seasons.

"O," as he is commonly known, instilled a sense of fun and confidence in a group that had seen their ups and downs.

"One of the things I have always stressed if

you're not having fun then you shouldn't be here (on the softball field)," he said.

The key toward the end of the season, he said was telling the girls they were playing their best ball and, "I told them they would be just fine."

Last week, Gaynor was named the Class 3 coach of the year. Purdue-commit and Christiansburg's ace pitcher Kady Camper was named the state's player of the year. Christiansburg teammate Addison Reaser (third base) joined Camper on the first team.

"It was super exciting and super humbling," Gaynor said in winning the state's top honor. "God has smiled upon us."

Camper won 20 games and 277 strikeouts this season and 600 in her career.

He sang Camper's praise. "It was nice having such a dominant ace in the circle."

Gaynor is optimistic the future is bright for the Christiansburg program as they only lose four seniors. Of course, it includes the graduating Camper, but the cabinet is not bear. Seven starters return to a team that has depth including the UVA-commit in Reaser. The state run also included bringing up two talented players from the junior varsity.

"I feel really good about that. I've got several good pitchers coming back so we should be good. Kinda excited what we've got going," he concluded.

If Brand does work out at QB, he could play multi-positions as he has been listed as an overall athlete in this recruiting process.

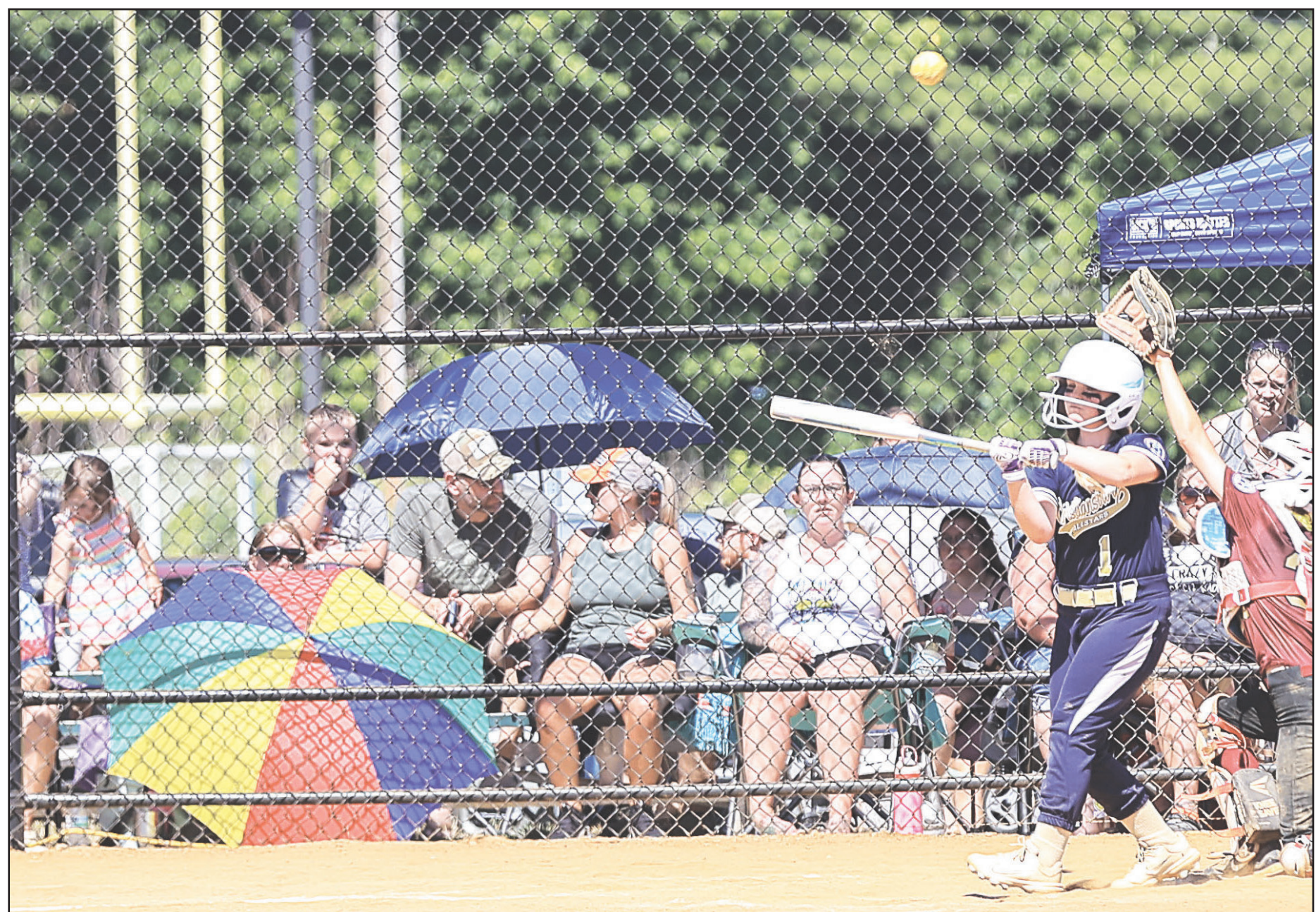

information with shock and awe or revelation because it shows people who have been struggling with the symptoms that this syndrome is a possible cause for their ailments. The test for Alpha-Gal is typically covered by insurance and they advise adding it to a tick-borne disease test if you suspect being bitten.

"If you're in a place," Nichols said, "where you're potentially getting bit by deer ticks that give you Lyme, you're probably in a place where you have the potential to get bit by lone star ticks, so people with Lyme who are not seeing relief from their symptoms; it would be worth it to check for Alpha-Gal syndrome because the symptoms can also be joint pain and all these symptoms that look like Lyme and other tick-borne diseases, and the lifestyle shift [need if you have Alpha-Gal] makes all the difference."

The Alpha-Gals mission is to give people the tools,

education, confidence and empowerment to live with Alpha-Gal Syndrome. As there is no medical way to prevent Alpha-Gal Syndrome, those who have it will have to make a lasting change to their lives and work with medical professionals to help give them relief from their symptoms. The Alpha-Gals also tackle the mental health and holistic aspects in their endeavors and try to help grow awareness in the overall community. As more research is occurring rapidly regarding Alpha-Gal, Matthis and Nichols have a food allergy mentorship program they run and advocate for others. They have a podcast, blog, and many social media platforms they use to help spread information and educate. They are in the process of launching a non-profit which would be a bigger and louder platform for them called the Alpha Gal Foundation where they can fundraise to help more of the Alpha-Gal Syndrome community and bridge that gap between healthcare, the underdiagnosed and lifestyle change. They aim to help more people.

"We just want people," Nichols and Matthis said, "out there who are living with it and suffering to know so that they can make changes to really bring joy back to their lives."

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
