## New House redistricting map brings changes to Greenbrier Co.

With the release of the results of the 2020 census, the West Virginia Legislature met to redistrict the state to reflect the most recent data. Members from both the West Virginia House and Senate convened in a special session in Charleston between Oct. 11 and Oct. 20, as per a declaration from Governor Justice.
Lawmakers had several tasks at hand - change the borders of state House and Senatorial districts as well as redistrict the federal congressional districts, which dropped from three to two. While the House of Delegates and State Senate are responsible for their chambers respectively, both will weigh in on the question of federal redistricting.
There were many proposals as to how to divide the two Congressional districts of West Virginia. After a rather unceremonious process of elimination with minimal debate, the new map for the state's congressional districts will be a north/south split, leaving Greenbrier County's representation unchanged in Congress. The Congressional representative for the southern district is Carol Miller ( R - Huntington). She has already announced she will run for reelection, but will not be pitted against any of the incumbent representatives. Two incumbent Republicans from House Districts One and Two, however, will have to duke it out for the new single northern district.
This change comes through the passage of Senate Bill 3033 in both chambers, and the new Congressional Districts now await the signature of the governor. If the lack of vigorous debate is any indication, the governor

Alderson Mayor Travis Copenhaver appeared in Greenbrier County Magistrate Court on Wednesday, Oct. 20, for a preliminary hearing with Magistrate Judge Tim Stover. The hearing's purpose was to determine if there was probable cause for three felonies: child neglect, burglary, and conspiracy, which were charged against Copenhaver after an incident in June. He was also charged with one count of misdemeanor assault.
According to a criminal complaint filed in magistrate court, Copenhaver, Copenhaver's 12-year-old son, and Lloyd "Billy" Lightner entered the home of Charlie Baldwin in Alderson without his consent, tampered with belongings, urinated in a bed, and removed a rifle and compound bow from the premises. Baldwin's girlfriend arrived at the residence while they were still on the property and alleges they harassed her and "boxed her in" with a vehicle.
Lightner is facing separate charges stemming from this incident. Baldwin rented the home from the Lightner family for nearly eight years, and eviction proceedings had been filed against him on the same day of the incident. During a court interview, Baldwin stated that he was notified he had seven days to remove himself from the property. Copenhaver's attorney stated that the men believed the house to be abandoned, as the power had been turned off, and they claimed Baldwin was not residing in the Alderson residence, but instead living with his girlfriend at her residence in Ronceverte. Baldwin argued that wasn't the case, and said he stayed at the home the night before the incident and was home that morning. While he had spent some time at his girlfriend's house after he was involved in a car accident, he says that he never abandoned the property. Baldwin also said that the power had been turned off after he missed his bill due to his accident. Copenhaver's attorney stated that the mayor was acting as a designated driver for his brother-in-law, Lightner, on the night of the in cident. Lightner directed Copenhaver to take him to Baldwin's house

 <br> <br> By Sarah Richardson}for the purpose of conducting an inspection. Copenhaver and his son then drove Lightner to the home, where all three entered the house. Lightner located the rifle, which was loaded, and the crossbow, inside a locked cabinet. Lightner then passed the loaded rifle to Copenhaver's son for him to remove from the house and put in the vehicle.
The defense argued that Lightner wanted to remove the weapons as they were a safety issue. However, Baldwin said he stored other loaded guns in the cabinet where the rifle and crossbow were kept, which were not removed. Baldwin said that in order to access the weapons you had to use "a screwdriver" or something similar.
Copenhaver alleges that he didn't see who urinated in the bed, but West Virginia State Trooper Ethan Beard stated that there was "back and forth" on who did it when he was conducting interviews.
Copenhaver's son saw headlights approaching the house, causing the men to exit the home, where Baldwin's girlfriend saw them outside as she approached. There was a confrontation, during which she called Baldwin, who arrived shortly thereafter. Baldwin called 911 to report the incident. After the men left, Baldwin discovered they had been inside the home when he found the front door "ajar," items strewn about, and his rifle and bow missing. Baldwin said that Betty Lightner, Billy Lightner's mother, called him later while apologizing and brought back the rifle and crossbow. "She kept apologizing about Lloyd and blaming alcohol," said Baldwin.
He said that he didn't stay at the home that night as he felt "uncomfortable" doing so, but met State Police there the next day to do a walkthrough.
After hearing from Officer Beard, Baldwin, and Baldwin's girlfriend, Judge Stover ruled that there was probable cause for the felony charges. "It bothers me that there was a 12 -year-old there," he said
The case will now move to Greenbrier County Circuit Court More details will be released as the case progresses.

## Locals among judicial applicants for new Intermediate Court of Appeals

West Virginia will be receiving a new layer of appellate court in the coming months. Senate Bill 275 received the governor's signature on April 9, 2021, creating the West Virginia Intermediate Court of Appeals, The new court will be a three-member panel with elections staggered into three levels: Judge One will serve 2.5 years, concluding Dec. 31, 2024. Judge Two for 4.5
years, concluding on Dec. 31, 2026. Judge Three for 6.5 years, concluding on Dec. 31, 2026. Judge Three for 6.5
years, concluding on Dec. 31, 2028. The first three juyears, concluding on Dec. 31,2028 . The first three ju rists will be appointed by Governor Justice and
cial Vacancy Advisory Commission (JVAC).
Each judge elected thereafter will serve a ten-year term. This tiering prevents all judges from being up for election in the same year.
To sit on the new court, either by appointment or election, judges must; be a member of the West Virginia Bar Association for at least 10 years, be a resid bent West Associria for at least five years, and must be devoted full-time As such members must resign if they become full-time. The only court above the new Intermediate court will be the WV Supreme Court, which may choose to take any civil case from the intermediate court "on its own accord." Parties to civil cases may also go above the Intermediate court, appealing directly to the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court can accept such an appeal if it represents an issue of "fundamental public importance" or "involves exigencies."
The Intermediate court, perhaps most importantly, will "have binding precedent for the decisions of all circuit courts, family courts, magistrate courts, and agencies unless the opinion, order, or decision is overruled or modified by the Supreme Court of Appeals." As such, the new court will wield a great deal of power over future family court proceedings, making these positions ones which will be very consequential for local litigants. Out of the 25 names released by the governor's of fice Thursday, Oct. 14, three area residents have applied to be on the Intermediate Court of Appeals; Robe Frank, James J. Rowe, and Christine B. Stump
Robert J. Frank of Robert J. Frank \& Assoc. has been licensed to practice law in West Virginia since 2008 Born overseas while his father was serving in the Navy, Frank was raised in Colorado. He then graduated Cum Laude from Cornell College in Mount Vernon, Iowa in 1987. Frank received his Doctorate of Jurisprudence (JD) in 1990, graduating "With Distinction" from the University of Iowa College of Law.
Christine B. Stump, also a local Lewisburg attorney, graduated from Tulane University School of Law in 1986. After being a part of the Attorney General's Honor Graduate Program, Stump served as an assistant U.S. attorney in Virginia and North Carolina. Leaving the Dept. of Justice in 1998, she began practicing law in West Virginia ever since, specializing in family law. James J. Rowe, formerly a judge on the state's 11th Circuit serving Greenbrier and Pocahontas Counties, was born in Alexandria, VA, and received a B.A. from WVU in 1972, and his JD from George Mason University in 1977. Rowe served on the WV Circuit Court's 11th Circuit for nearly 20 years after being appointed by former governor Gaston Caperton in 1997. worked carefully with the worked carefully with the board of directors to ensure that rehearsals and the performance will adhere to CDC guidelines and the recommendations of the American Choral Directors Association. The board has met almost monthly since the pandemic began to make it possible for the group to resume performing. Although chorale members have not sung together in person in the past year and a half, they did manage to record a virtual performance of one of the songs scheduled for their cancelled concert. It was quite an undertaking. After only one Zoom practice, the singers made a video of themselves singing their part and then uploaded the files to Google Drive. Lutz was impressed that so many of the members, a number of whom are retirees, were willing and able to learn the process, which involved singing into a camera on one device while listening to an audio file of their part through another.
The circumstances that brought about
the virtual performance were unfortunate, but a happy consequence was that a number of people who had moved away or for some reason stopped singing with the group were able to sing along from the group were able to sing along from files were in place, Kiersten White of One Woman Show Creations wombined One Woman Show Creations combined all the individual files into a video that can be found on the chorale's websit www.greenbriervalleychorale.org.
As rewarding as the virtual
As rewarding as the virtual experiment was, nothing beats getting together and singing in person, so the excite-
ment was palpable as the group met in ment was palpable as the group met in the Carnegie Hall auditorium for the first rehearsal. Special masks have been
ordered that are specially designed to ordered that are specially designed to
make singing easier. Until they arrive, make singing easier. Until they arrive, the members are wearing their own masks as they sing. Rather than rehearsing on stage, Lutz has spaced the singers throughout the auditorium to allow for social distancing.
Lutz was not sure what kind of response she would get when she announced that rehearsals were starting up again. She said she expected maybe 30 people to respond out of the group that usually numbers between 45 and 50 . To her amazement, 44 people signed on, including six new members.
"That turnout says to me that the members feel comfortable with the protocols we have put in place. I was just thrilled so many came," Lutz said. Because of the recent surge of the Delta variant, rehearsals started a month later than usual, and to keep within safety guidelines, rehearsals are only lasting an hour and a half instead of the usual two hours. ## Nature's Way

## Invasion

Have you driven through a national forest and noticed owering hedge-like forms which resemble animals and creatures covered in large leaves standing amongst the trees? You might have thought that looks cute. Turns out that's kudzu, an invasive species. Back in 1876, it was introduced to the US for controlling erosion from banks along highways and roadways. It was thought to be attractive as a blooming ornamental vine and good forage
for cattle for cattle.
If you head down to the southern states, you will see kudzu consuming roadsides along highways and climbing up telephone poles and trees en masse. It is known as the plant that ate the South and is a creeping vine that has been found as far away as Oregon. The vines can grow as long as 100 feet in length, climb up healthy trees, and then compete for sunlight which both the trees and vines need for photosynthesis. The vines eventually win out. In times of drought, kudzu sends its roots down deep to source water and survive easily in dry periods. The heavy vines break tree limbs and will often uproot large trees, hence they destroy trees and can grow a foot per day. Whoa.
Non toxic control methods employ goats or cattle who will eat the kudzu. You can cut the vine if you can locate its source and keep mowing the area during its growing period. Let the vines die down on their own after cutting and don't pull on them because they are practically glued to the bark and will take most of it with them as they fall.
It is illegal to grow this devastating plant in many states. Herbicides can be used but are predicted to take about ten years of persistent applications to eventually kill the vines and eradicate them.
English Ivy is another invasive plant that many homeowners introduced for ground cover but it won't stay on the ground. Anything near it will be overtaken as it creeps along brick walls, smothers trees, and eats through wooden structures, your house for instance. It settlers as a decorative landscape plant. Easy to grow, it
ser settlers as a decorative landscap
survives drought and poor soil.
Recommendations for removal: wear gloves because it can cause allergic skin rashes, cut it with clippers, bag it up and let it dry out inside the bag and die and then dispose of it. You can make a solution of vinegar and salt in water mixed with a tablespoon of liquid detergent as a natural herbicide to spray the spreading vines. This mixture works great on mold and weeds, too
English Ivy is still sold at plant stores and the fast growing vine may be tempting but it is toxic to animals and humans. Periwinkle or vinca are also toxic to dogs if ingested. Skip those! My favorite ground cover is carpet bugleweed, aka ajuga. It is hardy in our state, spreads slowly and can be controlled easily by hand removal. It grows to 2-4 inches in height, likes sun or shade, good

## Lessons learned from 1918 influenza pandemic

By Irma Smith Cadle, Grassy Meadows The 1918 flu pandemic was the deadliest in recorded history. It claimed at least fifty million lives globally and probably more - over a period of nine months. Remarkably, even though this was dubbed the "Spanish" influenza, the first reported cases were reported among soldiers at Fort Riley, Kansas, in March 1918. As troops were sent to Europe during WWI, they carried the disease with them and infected both soldiers and civilians with whom they came in contact. It is believed it began as a mild virus and mutated in the European camps. The first reports of deaths came from Spain, hence its name. The pandemic spread quickly and by summer of that year, thousands had died worldwide. Pneumonia was a common and deadly complication, as there were no antibiotics to fight viral or bacterial infections at that time. Indeed
ered.
In October 1918, the West Virginia Superintendent of Health ordered county health officials to report all cases of the virus, to quarantine all affected persons, and to close all public places. Many people wore masks in public and while caring for the sick. Regardless, some 71,000 West Virginians had contracted the disease in one month's time and 2,800 had died from it. During that year, $25 \%$ of all deaths in WV were from influenza and complications thereof. These numbers cannot be considered exact, as the medical profession was quickly During the height of the pandemic in WV, most people were cared for at home as there were few hospitals. Many communities had no medical assistance available at all. There were severe shortages of medical staff, sup-
plies, and caskets. This disease was unlike any other plies, and caskets. This disease was unlike any other
known at that time. Patients could be fine in the morning and succumb by day's end. Others died more slowly from fluid buildup in their lungs. And it did not discriminate. It struck rich and poor, farmers and city dwellers. Huntington, WV, had more than 3,000 cases, with 200 deaths. Charleston recorded similar numbers. As things began to wind down, a druggist in Huntington declared on Oct. 18, 1918, that he believed the worst was over. The next day their Mayor, Mr. Leon Wiles, died from the disease.
West Virginia University was closed. Theaters, churches, and public gatherings were banned. A fraternity house at WVU was turned into an emergency hos-
pital. It was also reported that the epidemic ran rampant through the WV coal fields. Some mines were closed
then for six weeks because there were so many miners sich

In the U.S., the disease struck as much as $30 \%$ of the population and killed half a million citizens. Then, nearly as mysterious as its beginning, the epidemic went away around November 1918. Since 1918, the world has experienced three additional pandemics - in 1957 1968, and 2009. The 1957 H2N2 and the 1968 H3N2 each resulted in an estimated one million deaths globally, while the 2009 H 1 N 1 pandemic resulted in less than 300,000 deaths.
Many factors contributed to the 1918 pandemic. The world was still engaged in WW I and troops were all overcrowded while in transit and in the military camps. Health services were extremely limited; and a large percentage of the medical professionals were engaged in the war. Furthermore, diagnostic testing and remedies were non-existent; and technology and intensive care support was unavailable.
Fast forward to 2019. As mentioned earlier, penicillin was discovered in 1928. Diseases, such as polio, diptheria, measles, mumps, and smallpox, have been allbut eradicated due to aggressive vaccination programs mandated around the world. The United States has developed no less than three vaccines for COVID19. However, despite the vaccines' availability, the disease has claimed well over 700,000 lives in the U.S., alone, and more than 5 million worldwide. WV has had a quartermillion cases, resulting in nearly 4,000 deaths of our friends, family, coworkers, medical staff, and emergency responders. WV has one of the lowest vaccination rates in the nation - just $50 \%$ have been vaccinated. The state is racking up over 1,000 new cases every day - about 250 of whom are hospitalized in intensive care units - and 40 -some people die in the state every day. We have the tools, technology, knowledge and equipment to make this virus go away. But it will take everyone's cooperation. This does not just affect you, as an individual. It affects your entire household, your community, your county and state, your country - indeed - the entire world. Please step up and do your part to end this terrible pandemic. Get vaccinated. It's easy; it's free; and it's your responsibility as a citizen of the it's free; and it's your responsibility as a citizen of the world.

Additional tips to keep in mind include:

- Never feel pressured to donate immediately.
- Be suspicious of charities that ask for donations in cash, gift cards or via wire transfer.
- Ask how much of an individual donation directly supports the desired cause.
- If the charity is unfamiliar, gather as much information as possible about the organization.
- Never rely on a group's sympathetic sounding name or its similarity to a well-known, reputable entity.
- Be wary of unsolicited calls that thank you for donations that you do not recall making.
- Verify any local chapter is authorized to solicit funds on behalf of its parent organization.
- Go directly to the charity's website instead of clicking on a link to the desired group. Also, confirm the website starts with https:// as the " s " verifies a secure connection.
- Be wary of any charity refusing to detail its mission, use of donations or proof of tax deductibility.
- Keep records, including a letter confirming the charitable status of the organization, for contributions in excess of $\$ 250$.
International Charity Fraud Awareness Week involves a broad coalition of charities, regulators, law enforcers, financial service providers, representative and umbrella bodies, and other not-for-profit stakeholders whose goal is to raise awareness and share good practices in tack ling fraud and cybercrime.

## G ov. J ustice announces billion-dollar broadband strategy

Gov. Im Justice has unveiled a billion-
dollar strategy to bring broadband availability to 200,000 more West Virgini homes and businesses. The plan will combine funding from federal, state, and local governments, along with matching investments from private-sector partners to accelerate the expansion of high-speed internet to under-served areas of the state. The plan represents by far the largest investment in broadband in the state's history.
The Governor's strategy will add a $\$ 236$ million state broadband program to $\$ 362$ million in Federal Communications Commission funding and $\$ 120$ million from other state and federal sources, for a total of $\$ 718$ million in government fund ing expected to be allocated by fall 2022
The funds will be allocated through com. The funds will be all ocated through competitive programs that draw matching
funds from private-sector and local govfunds from private-sector and local gov-
ernment partners, generating more than ernment partners, generating more than
$\$ 1$ billion in total broadband investment. The state Broadband Office estimates The state Broadband Office estimates
that this combination of resources will that this combination of resources will
expand broadband availability to at least expand broadband availability to at least
200,000 new locations in West Virginia A ccording to FCC data, at least $30 \%$ of According to FCC data, at least $30 \%$ of the state's rural homes and businesses currently lack adequate broadband access, leaving West Virginia with one of
the nation's lowest broadband connectivthe nation's lowest broadband connectivIty rates. Broadband expansion in West Virginia has been hindered by the cost of extending networks into mountainous rural areas.
"This is surely a landmark day for West Virginia," Gov. Justice said. "We' ve been talking for years about how to fix the rural broadband problem. Now we're fi-
nally going to do it nally going to do it
"West Virginia students deserve to be able to do their homework," Gov. Justice continued. "O ur seniors deserve access to telehealth. Our businesses deserve to be able to reach their customers and suppliers. And all our residents deserve to be able to interact with their government, stay informed as citizens, and do all the hundreds of things that take high-speed internet. Starting today, we're going to make that possible.
"This couldn't have been done without the hard work and commitment 0 our Legislature," Gov. Justice added. "The state's legislative leaders, including President Blair and Speaker Hanshaw
tremendous credit for their dedication to extending broadband to all West Virgin ians. It's an honor to work with them on this issue."
Governor Justice's broadband strategy focuses on coordinating a diverse set of federal, state, local, and private funding sources to maximize broadband expansion. The state has spent more than two years comprehensively mapping broadband access around the state, resulting in a detailed inventory of under-served locations that will allow pinpoint funding allocation.
The primary programs involved in the billion-dollar initiative are as follows 1. Rural Digital Opportunity Fund The Federal Communications Commis sion's (FCC) Rural Digital Opportunity Fund (RDOF) offers internet service pro viders (ISPs) funding to extend service to under-served areas. The program centers on a reverse auction in which ISPs com pete for grants to connect under-served census tracts, with each tract awarded to the ISP that can connect it with the least amount of federal subsidization teat Each participating ISP
Each participating ISP must provide of its grant award to ensure that its work of its grant award to ensure that its work creates a major hurdl for smallor ISPs. In September 2020 how a tice issued an executive order, GO 66 under which the staterir, under which the state provides a financia backstop for spsthat opening the door to vastly expand Thank to Gation in West Virginia Thanks to Gov. Justice's financia commitment, West Virgice now has highest per-capita rate of RDOF funding in the country at $\$ 202$ per person, for total of $\$ 362$ million. This RDOF funding will be complemented by private in vestment from participating ISPs to create a minimum expected RDOF impact of $\$ 500$ million. The program is expected to provide broadband availability to ap proximately 119,000 homes and businesses over five years
2. West Virginia State Broadband Initiative: The strategy's second majo component will be operated by the state Office of Broadband and Broadband Council, using American Rescue Pla Act (ARPA) and state-budget funding ARPA's Capital Projects Fund includ $\$ 136$ million for broad band in West Virginia. And - earlier - Governor Justice placed on the Legislature special session call an ad ditional $\$ 90$ million ap propriation of ARPA State Fiscal Recovery funds for broadband projects, along with a $\$ 10$ million appro-
funds for wireless broadband projects. These sources will provide $\$ 236$ million in combined funding for the state's own competitive broadband projects initiative.
Developed by the state Office of Broadband and Broadband Council concert with leading national broadband experts, the state initiative comprises four award programs, each of which will allocate funds through a competitive ap plication process:
(a) Line Extension Advancement and Development (LEAD): The LEAD program will award competitive grants to ISPs to expand existing fiber and cable networks. A pplications will be accepted in multiple rounds from N ovember 2021 through January 2022, with funding decisions made on a rolling basis through early 2022.
(b) GigReady Initiative: Local governments in West Virginia have been located more than $\$ 500$ million from the ARPA Local Fiscal Recovery Fund and many of them intend to invest that mone in local broadband expansion. The GigReady Initiative will provide matching state funds for local governments that develop projects to pool their broadband develop projects to pool their broadband mitted beginning Navember be subfunding decisions will be mad 2021 and funding decisions will be made on a roll ing basis through early 2022
(MBPS): Th M BPS project Strategies (M B FS). The M B PS program will focus on large-scale multicounty projects that require additional resources to achieve rapid implementation. A pplications will be accepted and funding decisions made in multiple rounds from early 2022 through fall 2022
(d) Wireless Internet Netw orks (WIN) The WIN program will use $\$ 10$ million in state general revenue funds to expand and improve existing wireless internet networks. Wireless networks are a special ized solution useful in remote or sparsely populated areas that are difficult to reach with fiber optic cable. Funding decision will be made through early 2022.
All four components of the statebased program will competitively score applications from prospective funding recipients and will award funds based on evaluations by independent nationa broadband experts. Evaluation criteria include matching-fund contributions, speed to market, technical feasibility, and digital equality (providing service to under-served areas and populations). Participating ISPs will be required to include a low-price service tier that is affordable for lower-income West Virginians
LEAD program projects must be com
ped, and projects in other categories must
e completed within 24 months of being wrinu. All projects will be subject to their implementation to ensure early identification and correction of problems. The Broadband Office projects that the first homes and businesses to be connected in the state-based program will gain broadband access by the end of 2021. The program's matching-funds requirement is expected to generate at leas $\$ 150$ million in investment beyond the $\$ 236$ million state contribution, for a total state-based program impact of at least \$386 million.
3. Other federal and state funding sources: Other existing funding sources, primarily federal, are expected to con tribute at least $\$ 120$ million to broadband development in West Virginia over the next five years. These include the Federa Communications Commission the Unit ed States Department of A griculture, the A ppalachian Regional Commission, and the National Telecommunications and Information A dministration. The state Of fice of Broadband and Broadband Council will coordinate with those programs to ensure that state funds are allocated efficiently and maximum broadband cov erage is obtained
