Her life and story has earned her countless awards and recognitions, including the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2016, and has inspired works such as the book & movie Hidden Figures.

Virginia man found deceased at Anthony Boat Launch

On Saturday, May 21, at approximately 7:22 a.m., the Greenbrier County 911 Center received a call from an individual reporting a body lying in the parking lot of the boat launch at Anthony on the Greenbrier River in Greenbrier County.

Members of the Greenbrier County Sheriff's Office, West Virginia State Police and White Sulphur Springs EMS responded to the location. Arriving officers found a male individual deceased, lying in the parking lot. The officers secured the scene and requested the Greenbrier County Sheriff's Office Crime Scene Unit respond to the location. Members of the Crime Scene Team subsequently

processed the scene for evidence.

The victim was identified as James Courtney Simpson Jr., 58, from Covington, VA. His body was transported to the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner in Charleston for an autopsy to determine cause of death.

This is an ongoing investigation. Anyone who may have observed activity in that area during the early morning hours of Saturday, May 21, 2022, is asked to contact the Greenbrier County Sheriff's Office at 304-647-6634.

Lieutenant G. R. Workman of the Greenbrier County Sheriff's Office is the lead investigator.

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WRON Radio celebrates 75th Anniversary

WRON AM 1400 became Greenbrier County's first on the air radio station on May 7th, 1947 in The Grand Theatre Building in Ronceverte. It was the first radio station serving a city of under 10,000 people in the USA. Behind the microphone was Bill Blake III of Ronceverte, owner and manager, who had experience in radio. Blake is quoted from an old newspaper article as saying, "I did a little bit of every-

thing, newscaster, announcer and disc jockey. We would broadcast the football games from all around the area. The Ronceverte Ice and Produce Company, RIPCO, would bring one of their trucks and I would sit upon it and broadcast the games." Remembering people from the halls of WRON, Blake mentions, "We've had people go from here to bigger stations, but I guess one of the most famous people we've had

work here was Tom T. Hall. He wrote "Harper Valley PTA while working here and you know the rest of the story." Among other famous people to visit the station were Bill Monroe and his bluegrass band, Tex Ritter, Grandpa

Jones, and Johnny Olson, said Blake. WRON Radio has had just a few owners over the years including Roy Wooster, Elaine See "WRON"



Nature's Way

Power of ONE

According to an old Three Dog Night song, one is the loneliest number that you'll ever do, but I beg to differ. I get lots accomplished when I am alone and uninterrupted. When I take my daily stroll through the woods with my dog running ahead of me, my imagination takes over. I hear my inner voice composing poems about the trees, plans of new art projects start to take root, and garden ideas blossom. What about you? Do you enjoy your "alone" time? Are you comfortable with your own company? Hopefully, you ARE your own best friend.

When I am in the garden alone pulling weeds or planting seeds, staking tomatoes, or watering thirsty plants, my thoughts are percolating on projects. If something seems like a good idea, I give it a day or two to mull over and flesh out the details and then, I go for it. I have learned long ago that procrastination kills incentive and drive. Energy comes from fresh ideas and feeds them. Doubt sinks in as time passes and too many questions or outside opinions take over.

That doesn't mean that you leap without looking. It means that you trust yourself to TRY out some of your ideas. See what happens. If the idea is a good one, more energy will flow from it. If you find yourself drained and bored after you initiated a project, let it go till the thrill returns, maybe it won't. It doesn't mean you failed or made a mistake. It means you gave birth to an experiment. Life really is one big experiment, isn't it? We can't experience success or failure if we don't try.

A big project stands out in my lifetime that I proudly carried forward to fruition by starting out alone and ending with numerous volunteers who were just as eager as I was to jump in. Years ago, my yoga instructor asked if I would be interested in growing vegetables on her acre of empty land in exchange for giving her daily produce from the garden. She was a vegetarian and wanted to clean, organic produce for her meals. What could be fresher than food coming from her own yard? So, without any debate, I accepted. What I had wished for, free land to grow food on, was manifesting right in front of my eyes. Thrilled, I took over the plot of lawn and with the help of two men-my husband and a friend. We cleared it off sod, had a tractor trailer load of mushroom compost delivered and dumped, put up a simple three strand electric fence, and I began a huge produce garden. From that came weekend visits to our local farmers' market to sell the bushels of food that this small garden created. Since we were the only organic growers at that time (this was in the early 90's), we would sell out within a few hours including our lovely flower and herb bouquets and our clients became regulars.

Word eventually got around the neighborhood and volunteer gardeners came to help daily with the chores which were plenty. These were folks who didn't have a place to garden and wanted some fresh air. One volunteer who gave a few hours daily was in real estate and he longed to

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get out of the office at lunch time and get his hands dirty! Hauling in compost, weeding, watering, planting, etc. was too much for one person (me!), and again, the trade of food for labor was feasible and in favor of all.

Eventually volunteers became "subscribers" and the acre was split up and shared. Each person received their own plot of garden space to care for themselves. Ongoing group chats taught newbies what to grow and how to grow it. What started as just one person growing turned into 8 people who put their own imagination to work for their own self fulfillment. They brought their spouses and children, too. My own satisfaction of acting on a hunch was reinforced by many. Though I started out alone and loved it, having like-minded folks around me strengthened my belief that the power of one can be pretty powerful, not to mention rewarding. And guess what? I learned from their ideas and dreams, too.

New Internet Assistance Program

There are many programs to help low-income people pay for their electric, gas, water and telephone utility bills. However, until now there has been little in the way of assistance for internet service. During the pandemic, the Federal Communications Commission created the Emergency Broadband Benefit program. That program ended December 30, 2021, and has been replaced by the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP).

ACP offers a discount of up to \$30 per month toward internet service for qualifying households. Participants may also be eligible for a one-time discount of up to \$100 for the purchase of a computer or tablet from participating providers. The sellers are required to contribute between \$10 and \$50 toward the purchase price. The ACP is limited to one monthly service discount and one device discount per household.

According to Frontier and Suddenlink, the two largest internet service providers in the state, customers can request an internet package that costs \$30 per month. When paired with the ACP, you could get basic internet service at little or no cost.

Households qualify for the ACP if the household income is at or below 200% of the federal poverty guidelines (\$55,500 for a family of four), or if a member of the household meets at least one of the following criteria: received a federal Pell Grant during the current award year; is eligible for a participating provider's existing low-income internet program; or participates in SNAP, Medicaid, federal public housing assistance, Supplemental Security Income, WIC, veteran's pension or survivor benefits, or Lifeline.

If you think you may qualify, go to ACPBenefit.org to apply. Then contact your preferred participating provider to select a plan and have the discount applied to your bill. Some providers may have an alternative application that they will ask you to complete.

The Public Service Commission does not regulate the internet, so we can't resolve complaints against internet service providers, regulate their rates or force them to provide service in specific areas, but we are pleased to help low-income customers find resources that can make it easier to pay for the service.

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
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



I am trying to recycle an empty can of cleanser. It is made of cardboard and has a metal top and bottom, both of which I cut off with a sharp knife. I was able to remove the cardboard remaining on the metal bottom, but not the cardboard on the metal top. Now what?

Housecleaner

Dear Housecleaner,

Good job preparing an item for recycling. The cardboard can is recyclable with cardboard. Be sure to wipe out the inside of the can with a dry cloth to remove any remnants

of the cleanser. Before recycling the metal bottom, determine whether it is steel or aluminum and place it in the appropriate recycling bin. Unfortunately, the metal top with the cardboard stuck in it goes in the trash.

Is bubble wrap recyclable? If not, how does one get rid of it?

Popper Dear Popper, Bubble wrap is recyclable with plastic film, but only after all the bubbles have been popped. You might need to find a kid to help you out with this! Bubble wrap and bubble pillows are highly useful for packaging medical and fragile items. However, each year enough bubble wrap is used for all kinds of packaging to wrap around the Earth's equator 20 times - a distance of five million miles! Disposing of this much bubble wrap is a problem, especially since it takes up to 1,000 years for it to decompose. Fortunately, there are several alternatives to putting bubble wrap in the trash. It can be saved to use for future packages, for protecting stored items, or for art and DIY projects. It can also be used for insulation. Place it in your grocery bag to help keep cold foods cold or use it to protect plants from frost damage or to insulate outdoor plants doing the winter.
