

Nature's Way

By Karen Cohen Master Gardener/Photojournalist/Artist Waste Not, Want Not

Since I was a kid, I helped my mom in our backyard planting flowers and annual tomatoes. I credit her with my green thumb and deep interest in growing things from seeds. As I grew up, I continued to learn about gardening and was lucky to score a job at an organic farm/ produce market. Long story short, the universe smiled on me and said, "This is what you want, and this is what you need."

I enrolled in many types of gardening programs over the decades and have adapted biodynamics and organic ways to grow food. Many folks who plant gardens aren't familiar with these methods of growing; my best suggestion is to order a book online or go to the library to see what they offer for growing food naturally. Books I highly recommend are Square Foot Gardening by Mel Bartholomew, No Work Garden by Ruth Stout, and any book by Elliot Coleman. Two of these writers I have been lucky to have met in person!

Just the other day a young man at our local grocery store asked me what the word organic meant when he saw me selecting organic lettuce. For those not familiar with growing food without chemical help, here is the definition straight from the internet. Organics: relating to or derived from living matter and/or food and farming methods produced or involving production without the use of chemicals or artificial agents. Does that sound

Way back in time when your grandparents planted their vegetable gardens they used manure for fertilizer from their chickens, goats, horses, or cows. Applied in the fall or early winter, the manure would break down over months and worms would multiply in it and break up the soil clods. It was an easy and natural way to repurpose waste materials, methods passed down from the preceding generations. Weeds, vegetable waste, grass and hay clippings would be tossed into a big pile that would shrink in size as it decomposed, giving a warm spot for the worms to gather and chomp away. Worms produce something called worm castings also a great fertilizer. They eat something and excrete the waste which becomes worm castings. You can buy this or just go the natural route as explained and grow your own worms! As the saying goes, build it and they will come, as long as it doesn't contain any chemicals.

Just as important as worms are to our gardens, so are the bees. Bees have always been and still are nature's pollinators. Without bees, we wouldn't have many of the vegetables and flowers that rely on their pollen being carried on the hairy legs of bees from plant to plant. According to some sources, bees are responsible for \$15-30 billion annually in various crops. Albert Einstein said many years ago that if bees disappeared all together, humans could survive about four years before our own extinction. Why? Food crops would not be pollinated as

they are now with bees. A pollinated plant produces a flower, fruit and/or vegetable. Did you ever try pollinating a plant by hand? I once used a paint brush to tickle off some pollen from one plant to pass it to pollinate another. It is time consuming and highly impractical on a large scale. Big scale food production relies on bees to pollinate fruit trees, blueberries, cherries, some nut trees, avocados, grapefruits, the list goes on and on. It is essential that we keep our bees alive even if you fear them; they are key to our existence.

This month I read a suggestion from a natural gardener and I held off mowing our lawn to allow buttercups, violets, and any flowering weeds to attract and feed bees. When we eventually mow the lawn, we will rake up the cut grass and add it to our compost piles along with brown leaves and spent coffee grounds. I'd rather feed the earth in a productive way than feed a dumpsite we call the landfill. If you love gardening like I do, you will always be exploring new options and ideas.

Lucky to be at Greenbrier **Health Care Center**

It took only a couple of hours for me to realize how

lucky I was to be at the Greenbrier Health Care Center

at 1115 Maplewood Ave., Lewisburg. I was made comfortable in a regular hospital bed while nurses and aides flittered around me making sure I was clean and com-On Christmas Day when my feet caught on a small kitchen rug, I found out just how granite hard our li-

noleum floor is as my left hip cracked and broke. The EMTs arrived in no time, and from then on for quite a while, my life was not under my own control. After surgery, Medicare allowed me to go to either a

rehabilitation facility for in-patient therapy three hours

a day, or to go home and have therapy for three hours a week. I chose the in-patient option for more intensive therapy. I missed my family, but that was one of the smartest decisions I ever made. That increase of therapy gave me the push I needed to get on my feet much faster. When the aching managed to seep through the pain pills, I tried not to think about the rod that had been

hammered down my left leg bone almost to my knee and another one into my hip, both being held in place Every morning I was given a menu-of-the-day and the choice of eating in the spacious dining room decorated

with lovely matching tablecloths and colorful curtains hanging from long windows, or I could have my meals in bed. I chose the latter because dressing in bed after eating turned out to be the easiest and fastest for me. Aides helped me dress. Then a physical therapist introduced herself, and off we went to the huge physical therapy room where I spent as much time as I could

exercising. The super PT/OT crew helped me use the

therapy machines and watched me like mother hens so I

wouldn't fall. I felt very safe. There were five therapists each specializing in different areas. Sarah, the activity specialist, offered entertainment in another large room filled with tables and chairs for playing games or doing puzzles. Sometimes she showed movies. When I looked around, I saw smiling faces. Sarah kept us all laughing and having a good time. Most of the time I was too tired to take part, but when I did, it

was lots of fun.

I'm writing about these personal experiences because firstly, I want to thank everyone at the Greenbrier Health Care Center for their excellent care during a difficult time. And secondly, I want people to know that if they should find themselves needing a nursing home or rehabilitation center, I wholeheartedly recommend The Greenbrier Health Care Center. My further recommendation is that, if you have a tendency to trip yourself up like I did, throw out your scatter rugs.

Sen. Manchin introduces bipartisan bill to establish Space National Guard U.S. Senator Joe Manchin (D-WV), member of the service within a reserve component organization that

Senate Armed Services Committee (SASC), introduced the bipartisan Space National Guard Establishment Act to create a National Guard for the U.S. Space Force. The legislation would allow Army and Air National Guard currently performing Space Force support missions to continue to serve their states and country through a Space National Guard. Companion legislation was introduced in the House of Representatives last year.

"West Virginia has a rich history of contributing to achievements in space, from the important work of 'Hidden Figures' Katherine Johnson and 'Rocket Boys' Homer Hickam to the many West Virginians working at NASA and serving in the Space Force today," said Senator Manchin. "We are grateful for the men and women serving in space-based missions for their sacrifices and dedication that keep all Americans safe. I am proud to lead this bipartisan bill to create a Space National Guard to ensure National Guard personnel in West Virginia and across the country can continue their represents their specialized space-based missions.'

Senator Manchin was joined by Senators Dianne Feinstein (D-CA), Marco Rubio (R-FL), John Hickenlooper (D-CO), Lisa Murkowski (R-AK), Michael Bennet (D-CO), Marsha Blackburn (R-TN), Rob Portman (R-OH), Rick Scott (R-FL), Alex Padilla (D-CA), Mike Braun (R-IN) and John Cornyn (R-TX).

In 2019, active-duty space units were moved out of the Air Force and placed in the new Space Force, but no corresponding move was made to create a Space National Guard. There are currently more than 1,000 National Guard members serving the space mission from within the Air National Guard. The Space National Guard Establishment Act would correct this disconnect and ensure that Space Force personnel who leave active-duty can continue to serve within the Space Force. Additionally, the legislation would eliminate funding obstacles between the Air Force and Space Force, facilitate mobilization and inspection processes and enhance the culture of the Space Force.



A Look Back.

Shown in this week's photo from the late 1800s is James Nelson Montgomery (sitting on the porch) and his family at their home on Lewisburg's Randolph Street.

Montgomery was born in Goshen, Virginia, where his father and grandfather were involved in the development of Augusta Academy and Liberty Hall that evolved into what is now Washington and Lee University in Lexington.

After moving to Lewisburg in 1845, Montgomery married Ann S. Jacob of Wheeling in 1847. James Montgomery was a merchant, farm-

Bank of Virginia in 1854, but the bank collapsed as a result of the Civil War. He served as a trustee of Lewisburg Academy and as a Ruling Elder and Clerk of the Session of the Old Stone Presbyterian Church. The Montgomerys had six children, and some of their descendants still live in Greenbrier County. James Montgomery died in 1886 and Ann Montgomery died in 1897. Both are buried behind the Old Stone Presbyterian Church.

Still standing, their brick home was built circa 1845. John Dunn, a master mason, was most likely the builder. Interior woodwork is charcraftsman. Except for the addition of a larger porch, the original part of this well preserved house looks much like it did when it was constructed. Two major additions were made to the rear of the house - one in 1856 and another one in the 1960s. The current owner, with the benefit of historic preservation tax credits, has continued stewardship of this lovely home.
