Impressive slate of homes on the roster for annual Home and Garden Tour

With tickets now on sale for the 39th annual Greenbrier Valley Home and Garden Tour on Saturday, June 8, the descriptions for the seven homes on the tour have been released. Houses on the tour this year include Spring Valley Farm located at Second Creek, The Stone House aka "The Capone House" in White Sulphur Springs, the Venable-Mathew-Moore home on Washington Street in Lewisburg, Mirapaso in Lewisburg, The Lafayette House in downtown Lewisburg, the Andrew Edwards Victorian cottage in Lewisburg, and the Leadman/Kohn house on Church Street in White Sulphur Springs.

• Leadman/Kohn - 120 Church Street, White Sulphur Springs, was originally built in 1897. The house was purchased in 2020 by Drew Leadman and Megan Kohn, and renovation began. The home has its original room layout both up and down with updated kitchen and baths. The biggest surprise was the discovery of walled-up windows in multiple locations. Drew says the home's parlor and large porch are reminders of a quieter time and urge the couple away from their busy electrified lives

Jeff Bryant retires as Superintendent of Greenbrier Co. Schools

At a special meeting of the Greenbrier County Board of Education on Wednesday, board members accepted the retirement of Superintendent Jeff Bryant. According to the agenda, it will be effective on Mar. 29, 2024.

Bryant is a longtime educator in Greenbrier County Schools, with a history in area schools dating back to 1980. He previously served as a teacher, band director, and principal at Greenbrier East High School before the board hired him as superintendent in May 2016.

Bryant graduated from Berklee College of Music in Boston, MA, with a bachelor of arts. Then, he achieved a Master's Degree in Leadership Studies from Marshall University and a Master's in Music Education from Radford University.

He didn't immediately return our request for comment before publishing.

Board of Education President Jeanie Wyatt told RealWV, "Jeff has decided he needs to spend time with his family. He loves this job but after all these years, he

Monroe County Sheriff Jeff Jones resigns, Michael Miller sworn in as interim sheriff

On Monday, Mar. 18, the Monroe County Clerk's Office released the following statement:

"The Monroe County Commission held an emergency meeting this morning to accept the resignation of Jeff Jones as Sheriff of Monroe County and begin the search for an interim Sheriff who will serve the remaining nine months of Sheriff Jones' term until his duly elected successor takes office on Jan. 1, 2025.

Sheriff Jones' resignation effectively ends the civil litigation that began when the Commission passed the resolution to remove him from office on Oct. 26, 2023.

This has been a difficult process for all parties involved and the Commission wishes to express its gratitude to Mr. Jones for electing to resign rather than proceed with a contentious hearing. The Commission wishes Mr. Jones the best in his future endeavors."

The next day, on Tuesday, Mar. 19, a Special Session was held to select an interim sheriff to fill the vacancy.

"With guidance from the West Virginia Secretary of State's Office, the Monroe County Prosecutor, and following West Virginia State Code (§3-10-8) the Commission,


Earth Day Fashion Forward event celebrates sustainable fashion and Appalachian creativity

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Monongahela National Forest plans spring prescribed burns

Monongahela National Forest staff plan to conduct prescribed burns on 3,667 acres in Pocahontas, Greenbrier and Tucker counties from March through June, weather permitting. The purposes of these treatments are to re-establish fire's natural role in the forest ecosystem, improve forest health and wildlife habitat, and reduce the threat of catastrophic wildfires.



drive appropriately for the conditions.

Each burn area will be closed to the public on the day of the burn, and may be closed for several days after, to ensure public safety. Signs will be posted on roads near all prescribed burn areas before and during burning. Residents and Forest visitors may see and smell smoke for several days. If you encounter smoke on the highway, slow down, turn on your vehicle's lights and

Prescribed burns are conducted under specific weather conditions and are designed to accomplish pre-determined forest management goals. Monongahela National Forest follows strict guidelines for conducting prescribed burns, and takes into consideration environmental factors such as temperature, humidity, smoke dispersion and wind. If any environmental conditions are not within limits, the burn will be postponed.

Local radio stations will be alerted to burn activities ahead of time. When burning begins, information, photos, and maps will be available at https://inciweb.wildfire.gov/.

· Spring Valley Farm - This farm is currently a wedding venue and working cattle farm, and was historically known at the Richard Dickson Farm. Located just over the Monroe County line at Second Creek, the house was placed on the Historic Register in 1974, and Henry Clay stayed here during one of his presidential campaigns. According to wvculture.org, "The Dickson home on Second Creek in Monroe County, WV, began as a twostory log cabin built by John Knox in the late 1700s. In 1834 the property was purchased by Richard Dickson, Knox's brother-in-law, who extensively enlarged the structure between 1837 and 1841 with the addition of the main, or big house, to the original log unit."




• Venable-Mathew-Moore Home - Referred to as the Venable-Mathew-Moore home (named after previous owners) on Washington Street in Lewisburg, this home was originally built in 1850 and expanded in 1870. Located in Lewisburg's Historic District, this 17 room, two-story home is a blend of Neoclassical and Victorian era architecture. Construction is wood frame and lap cedar siding with oak hardwood floors, its most distinctive features outside are its 16 Queen Anne style windows and inside, its high ceilings and large bright rooms which were unusual for the period. The parlor and ballroom, with their bright airy space, as well as the dining room with its beautiful built-in leaded glass cabinetry are so far our favorite spaces (it's hard to choose only one). Renovation began two years ago- come see the improvements.



The Stone House at 749 Stone Creek Lane is often referred to by White Sulphur natives as "the Capone House." Legend has it the Chicago mobster owned the house in the late 1920s and early 1930s. The stone heart of the house was built in the 18th to 19th century style with a fireplace in each room and an entirely stone structure rather than wood. The house was likely built in the late 19th century and renovated in the late 1920s, when a kitchen and other rooms as well as electricity and indoor plumbing were added. The present owners renovated from 2020-2023, updating all the home's additions and utilities.



• Lafayette House - Built in 1794, The Lafayette House at 332 Lafayette Street in Lewisburg is a beautifully appointed property boasting modern comforts while maintaining integrity of the historic home. Hand hewn beams, knotty wood floors and exposed brick walls give a cozy, nostalgic feel. Guests of this vacation rental are able to enjoy peaceful relaxation surrounded by oak leaf hydrangea, forsythia, and English ivy as well as being just steps away from exploring all that downtown Lewisburg has to offer. It is lovely space in a truly lovely place.



• Mirapaso - This Mediterranean style house was built in 1926-1929 by Mr. and Mrs. Waller C. Hardy from Charleston, WV, as their summer home near the top of Caldwell Hill in Lewisburg. The Hardy's named the house "Mirapaso" which is Spanish for "view of the pass." The pool was built during the initial construction and was one of the first pools in the area. This estate features six bedrooms and four full baths and three half baths. The guest house has three bedrooms and two full



• Andrew Edwards - This charming Victorian cottage with a wraparound porch was built in Lewisburg in 1897. There are numerous custom features but he has not changed the original footprint of the home. You will notice many unique types of wood brought here from LA. The home is resplendent of magnificent art. Located at 324 Lafayette Street, Lewisburg.

This funding is available from Volunteer West Virginia as part of their Sept. 11, 2024, Day of Service and Remembrance Grant program, and has been designated to recognize and assist the preservation or stabilization of local and family cemeteries, which may contain interments of veterans and persons from underrepresented communities.

The program provides a minimum grant of \$1,000 to the maximum of \$10,000 and requires a dollar-to-dollar match by the applicant. Applicants may be state or local government agencies, not-for-profit organizations, private citizens, religious organizations, educational institutions, or Certified Local Governments.

Dear Recycle Lady,

Dear Recycle Lady,

In one of your columns, you said that small plastic bottles less than 3 inches were not acceptable at the Recycling Center. Does the three inches apply to the diameter of the base of the bottles or to the height of the bottles?

Need Clarification

Dear Need Clarification,

Actually, both the diameter and height of a plastic bottle must be greater than 3 inches. Bottles smaller than this can fall in the machinery bringing everything to a halt. There is also another factor to consider when recycling plastic bottles - their content, which is more of a problem than the measurement. Most small bottles originally contained prescription medicines, vitamins, or over the counter medicines of some kind. Left over residues of any of these products could become a contaminant for an entire batch. Thus, the buyers of plastic recyclables will not accept these smaller plastic bottles or larger plastic bottles that have contained prescription medicines, over the counter medicines or vitamins.

Dear Recycle Lady,

Are perfume bottles recyclable? Can old perfume be poured down the sink?

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Smelling Good

Dear Smelling Good,

Perfume bottles are made of both glass and plastic, but only the plastic bottles can be recycled locally. As with all plastic bottles, be sure perfume bottles are clean and dry before placing them in the recycling bin. One word of caution when disposing of leftover perfumes: According to wikihow. com/Dispose-of-Perfume, perfumes are made with strong ingredients and chemicals and should not be poured down the drain as they are made with potentially hazardous materials. At this time, no regulations exist for the disposal of perfumes, however, pouring them down the drain is not a good idea. Not only are the chemicals not good for the water supply, but the scent may also linger quite a long time! Treat old or unwanted perfume as you would left-over paint. Put the perfume in a container, mix it with kitty litter or coffee grounds to change the liquid into a solid, and put it in the trash. Although not recyclable, many perfume bottles are made of glass and can be repurposed. See Fragrance.com for 15 ways to upcycle perfume bottles.

I have a large round cardboard core that is very hard and came out of a roll of Gorilla Package Tape. There are smaller versions of this core in rolls of scotch

> tape. Can cardboard cores be recycled with cardboard?

Dear Packer,

Cardboard cores tubes are used as a core by packaging, tape, and storage industries. The cores are made of layers of paper held together by glue. They can be recycled with cardboard, although they are more difficult to recycle than flat cardboard. Essex Tube Windings Ltd., an Eco-friendly corporation, makes these cores out of 100% recycled fiberboard.

Good News: The Scouts/ Montwell project of Lewisburg Boy Scout Troop 70, led by Eagle Scout candidate Cole Morgan of Renick, has now collected 950 pounds of plastic film! It looks like they will meet their goal of 1,000 pounds of plastic film by next week - less than two months' collection time!

Recently, Charleston's Municipal Auditorium was named to the Preservation Alliance of West Virginia's Endangered Properties list for 2024. Earlier this year, the auditorium was shuttered unexpectedly and with no notice due to structural and electrical issues. The auditorium was completed in 1939 and described at the time as "one of the grandest and most monumental examples of the Art Deco architectural style to grace the skyline of Charleston for six decades." The concrete and steel structure was designed by Charleston architect Alphonso F. Wysong and engineered by C. P. Fortney.

City councilman and charter member of the Community Music Association (3,000 members in 1935) Harry Silverstein was a motivating force to build the auditorium. It was funded by a \$412,000 grant from the Public Works Administration, one of President Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal programs, and a \$250,000 municipal bond. The original seating capacity was 3,569 (later reduced slightly to better accommodate accessibility). An additional 1,500 seats can be put on the 8,400 square foot stage. When completed, it was reported to be one of the largest performing halls in the eastern United States.

The famed French violinist Zino Francescatti performed to 4,000 at the inaugural performance on November 7, 1939. Although the facility was segregated, the Charleston Chapter of the NAACP, with help from Harry Silverstein, brought Marion Anderson to sing before an audience of 3,500 in 1940.

The auditorium has touched the lives of many West Virginians, especially children who came with their families to see the annual Shrine Circuses and Holiday On Ice performances. Major orchestras, including the Cleveland Symphony with George Szell,

Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra with Eugene Ormandy, and the London Philarmonic Orchestra with Hebert Von Karajan have performed there. Big bands include Sammy Kave, Liberace.

and Guyi Lombardo. Jazz greats like Louis Armstrong, Count Basie, Al Hirt, Nat King Cole and Marilyn Horne came to Charleston. Through the years there have been hundreds of touring Broadway plays with actors like Betty Grable, Ethel Barrymore, Olivia De Havilland, Betty Davis, Gary Merrill, John Ireland, Tyrone Power and Faye Emerson. The 1950s and 1960s brought an avalanche of rock and roll stars including Elvis Presley, Chubby Checker, Paul Anka, Lavern Baker, The Coasters, The Drifters, The Shirelles, Bo Didley, and Fats Domino. Among the many country and western musicians who performed on the auditorium's stage were Dolly Parton, Johnny Cash, Loretta Lynn, George Jones, Tammy Wynette, and Porter Wagner.

The auditorium has been used for a multitude of other events, including large church gatherings and gospel sings, beauty pageants, and political activities. Presidential candidates Wendell L. Wilkie, Thomas E. Dewey, Senator Robert Taft, and Harry Truman spoke at campaign events. In 1941, Eleanor Roosevelt spoke on the stage in an effort to raise funds to build a hospital in Miton for crippled children. For many years the building was home to the Charleston Symphony and Charleston Light Opera guild. In the 1950s, Morris Harvey College's basketball team played their games on the stage.

In 1999, the Charleston Municipal Auditorium was added to the National Register of Historic Places. Although in many ways modest by today's signage, the National Register nomination form notes "the name 'Municipal Auditorium' is cast in concrete and prominently emblazoned across the front of the building with large letters with an Avant Garde typestyle painted in deep red." This West Virginia landmark seems worthy of sav-



Bluefield High School in Mercer County placed first, and James Monroe High School Team 1 of Monroe County placed second at the Concord University (CU) regional competition of the 2024 Academic Showdown. The wins secure both teams a place in the finale on Apr. 23 at the West Virginia Culture Center in Charleston.

The CU regional featured the following schools: Bluefield High School, Greenbrier East High School, Greenbrier West High School, James Monroe High School, Mingo Central High School, PikeView High School, Princeton Senior High School, and Summers County High School.

Approximately 90 teams registered to

compete in the 2024 Showdown, making it the largest competition field since the Showdown began in 2022. Seven weeks before their graduation ceremony, fourth-year students at the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine (WV-SOM) learned where they will begin their medical careers after years of hard work in medical school. The Class of 2024 attained a perfect residency placement rate, with 188 students receiving spots in residency pro-

Medical students learned of their 100% residency placement rate on Mar. 15, a day designated as Match Day by the National Resident Matching Program, the organization responsible for placing medical school graduates into residency programs. On Match Day, students preparing to graduate learn where they will complete residencies and what specialties they will enter.

Linda Boyd, D.O., the school's chief academic officer, praised students and their faculty and staff career advisors for their work in reaching the 100% residency placement. "Congratulations, you did it. This is what

you've all worked so hard for," she told the class. "Not only did we receive a 100% residency placement rate, but we did so in highly prestigious specialties." After completing medical school, new phy-

sicians serve in residency programs for three to seven years to qualify for medical licensure. During this time, physicians are trained in the specialty they will spend their careers

While WVSOM's main mission is to produce primary care physicians, graduates of the school can practice in any specialty. A total of 104 students in the Class of 2024, or 56%, are entering primary care residency programs, which encompasses family medicine, internal medicine and pediatrics. A total of 41 students matched to family medicine residencies, 48 matched to internal medicine and 15 matched to pediatrics.

Other popular specialties for members of the Class of 2024 include emergency medicine, with 28 students; psychiatry, with nine students; and general surgery, with nine stu-




