

# Monday Mashup sees food trucks coming to downtown Lewisburg

After months of logistics and planning, Monday Mashup will soon be starting in downtown Lewisburg. This never-before-held weekly event will see a selection of food trucks available in the Coolest Small Town in America each Monday.

Every week, expect to see several food trucks set up on Church Street downtown selling their food items. Monday Mashup will start out with no more than three trucks. but has the potential to expand. Church Street itself will continue to be open for vehicle traffic dur-



ing the events, and the food trucks will be open from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

"We are hoping to kick it off in the next few weeks," states Lewisburg's City Manager Misty Hill, who originally floated the idea to City Council in June of 2024. At that time, she clarified that the food truck ordinance for the City still stands, "they wouldn't be able to place food trucks wherever or whenever they want," but would be operating on special permits submitted to City Hall for review and approval. At the 2024 meeting, Councilmember John Little said that the public has been asking for food truck permissions "for forever," and voted in support of the idea, along with all other councilmembers in attendance.

# WVFF releases information on local government spending of opioid settlement funds

The West Virginia First Foundation (WVFF) has released the 2025 West Virginia Annual Qualified Settlement Fund (QSF) Expenditure Report for Local Governments for the time period from July 1, 2023, until June 30, 2024. The report outlines how the 24.5% share of opioid settlement funds distributed directly to Local Governments was used during the past fiscal year.

The WVFF was established to carry out the terms of the West Virginia First Memorandum of Understanding (MOU): a landmark agreement between the West Virginia Attorney General and Local Governments that ensures opioid settlement funds are invested strategically and transparently across all regions of the state.

Under the MOU:

- 72.5% of the funds are managed by WVFF, a private nonprofit charged with the long-term, evidence-based distribution of funds across six regions.
- 24.5% are distributed directly to Local Governments. Although WVFF does not oversee or direct how these local funds are used, it is required to collect and report on local expenditures each year per the MOU.
- 3% are allocated to the Office of the West Virginia Attorney General, supporting enforcement, compliance, and coordination. These funds are also outside of WVFF's oversight.

Although WVFF was not a plaintiff in any of the national opioid litigation, the Local Governments who were parties to the lawsuits agreed, under the MOU, to submit expenditure information annually. This level of local reporting is both novel and unprecedented, positioning West Virginia among the few states in the nation to publicly disclose how direct local opioid settlement dollars See "Settlement Funds" \_\_\_ Page 3

Man arrested after breaking and entering at local business

apply for associated levels of funding. We will continue to take applications year-round to meet the needs of our Hope families," Treasurer Pack said.

The Hope Scholarship award amount varies each school year depending on the amount of state aid funding per pupil provided to county boards of education for public school students. The scholarship amount for the 2025-2026 school year is \$5,267.38.

Program participation grew from 2,333 students during the 2022-2023 school year to and now over 10,000 students in the 2024-2025 school year. The Treasurer's Office expects nearly 19,000 students will take part this upcoming school year.

To qualify for the Hope Scholarship, a student must be a West Virginia resident and be either:

- Eligible to be enrolled in a kindergarten program. • Enrolled full-time in a public elementary or second-
- ary school program in this state for the entire instructional term during the current academic year immediately preceding the academic year for which the student is applying to participate in the Hope Scholarship Pro-
- Or, enrolled full-time and attending a public elementary or secondary school program in this state for at least 45 calendar days during an instructional term at the time of application and remain enrolled and attending public school until a decision is reached on the student's Hope Scholarship application.

In addition to filling out the application, state law also requires participating families to fill out a notice of intent to participate in the program with their local county superintendent. A sample template for that notice as well as Frequently Asked Questions regarding the notice are

also available online at the program's website. Families are reminded to notify the Hope Scholarship Board via email at hopescholarshipwv@wvsto.gov if they are awarded the Hope Scholarship for 2025-2026

"This is a critical part of our mission; not just to distribute funds strategically through the Foundation's own grantmaking, but to help the public understand how every opioid settlement dollar is being used across the state," said Jonathan Board, Executive Director of WVFF. "Local Governments have flexibility in spending their share of the settlement in accordance with the outlined Approved Uses, and our job is to make sure their efforts are reported clearly and accurately, in keeping with the MOU."

In collaboration with the Office of the West Virginia Attorney General, WVFF is also developing educational materials and resources to help Local Governments responsibly and transparently use their settlement funds. Updates and guidance will be made available at wvfirst.

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## Governor Morrisey announces additional Breeze Airways flights to Capitol City Airport

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

This 1951 photo shows Ronceverte's Cedar Street underwater. In the background is the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad depot, and on the right is the Post Office. The flood was a result of a June afternoon cloud burst in Fairlea that caused a torrent of water to flow down Montgomery Hollow. With four feet of water in Ronceverte's business district, it caused an estimated \$500,000 in damages and left 4-10 inches of mud. Mayor C. W. Shanklin called it the worst flood in Ronceverte since 1911. The mayor probably meant the July 6, 1911 flood that devastated Ronceverte. It was caused by a storm very similar to the one

A north end stable floated from its foundation and crashed into a poultry warehouse that collapsed. A two-story building broke in two and floated down Frankford Street. Two other stables collapsed leaving horses to float or swim to higher ground. Buggies, traps and surreys floated away. The railroad tracks were covered with wreckage and water, and the telephone and electric lines were down. In both floods there were no reported fatalities.

Do you recycle odd and various shapes and kinds of batteries? If not, do you know anybody else in the Lewisburg area or Greenbrier County who does take batteries for recycling? Thanks for your help!

Hopeful

Dear Hopeful, The Recycle Center in Ronceverte only accepts car batteries, lawn mower batteries and rechargeable large batteries, such as cordless tools. It does not accept alkaline batteries, which includes AA, AAA, C, D, and 9-volt batteries. However, the good news is that TerraCycle offers the recycling of 10 pounds of alkaline batteries for \$44. They will send you an UN-certified container with a Life Latch lid, a poly liner, tie, instructions. terms & conditions and a pre-paid return shipping label. They also send tape for covering the battery terminals as required by DOT regulations. Be sure to weigh the container before mailing as its weight must not exceed 10 pounds. TerraCycle is known for recycling hardto-recycle items. They have free recycling for 111 products which keeps a lot of hard-to-recycle items out of the landfill. Center Recycle participates in their free recycling of toothbrushes, toothpaste tubes, and floss containers, which is sponsored by Colgate Oral Products. "TerraCycle is working to eliminate the idea of waste." They have been developing recycling solutions for over 20 years, have over 40,000 clients, with recyclers in more that 20 countries. What is green methanol? Not a Chemist

#### Dear Not a Chemist,

According freetheocean.com, green methanol is a cuttingedge fuel extracted from food wastes in landfills. (This process is similar to the one at the Raleigh County landfill that generates enough electricity to heat 2,400 homes in the Beckley area by processing methane captured from their landfill.) The shipping giant Maersk is a pioneer in green methane-based fuel; an eco-friendly fuel that can reduce emissions from the ship by 65-70%. In 2024, Maersk embarked on its first voyage powered by green methanol. According to esgroday.com, this was the world's first carbonneutral methanol fueled container ship. Kudos to Maersk that has ordered 25 more of their current vessels be retrofitted to run on green methanol. shipping Globally, companies are working to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and reduce air pollution in ports as they contribute approximately a billion tons of carbon dioxide (C02) annually. Green methanol is one way they can reduce their carbon footprint.


