## Taco Taco brings authentic Mexican taqueria to White Sulphur Springs

Jesus Vazquez owned a restaurant in Mexico before accepting a job as a chef at The Greenbrier in 2019. He worked there and then moved on to be executive chef at The Schoolhouse Hotel. On Thursday, Vazquez, along with his brother and their wives, opened his own restaurant in the community that he now calls home.

“Our whole concept is to recreate a Mexican taqueria - as authentic as you can get,” he said.

“People come in, they place their order - your order won’t take more than eight minutes.”

Vazquez said Taco Taco is not a restaurant - it’s a taqueria. It differs from other Mexican restaurants in that

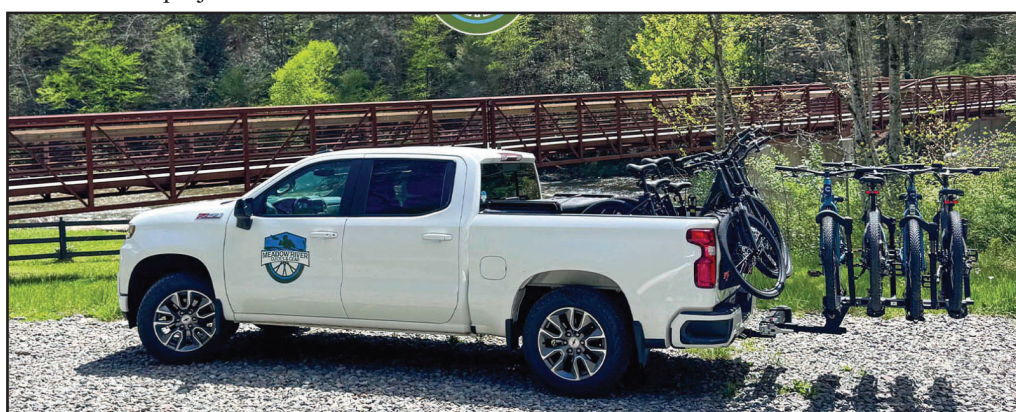
## Grand opening for Phase III of Meadow River Rail Trail in Rainelle

The Meadow River Rail Trail is holding a grand opening for Phase III of the trail, and the public is invited to attend. On Friday, June 12, at 10 a.m., there will be an opening ceremony at the Rainelle Trailhead, on Snake Island Road, Rainelle, with speakers and representatives from the project.

There will be parking available across the street from Fruits of Labor, with MTA busses running between the lot and the trail starting at 9 a.m.

Project Coordinator Matt Ford will be on site to discuss the trail, which is a project of the Fayette and Greenbrier County commissions. Phase III design and construction has been funded by WVDEP Abandoned Mine Lands Economic Revitalization Program, and has been in the works for the last several years.

This section, Phase III, of the trail connects the Town of Rainelle with the scenic views that can be found along the Meadow River Rail Trail. With approximately 20 miles of trail open and plans to expand all the way to the Gauley River, the Meadow River Rail Trail is connecting world class outdoor recreational opportunities with communities in Fayette and Greenbrier County.

The Meadow River Rail Trail is just one part of the Adventure Meadow River Outdoor Recreation Plan, which provides a strategic framework to guide the Meadow River Valley Association and its partners in enhancing

outdoor recreation, connectivity, and sustainability throughout the Meadow River Valley.

According to their website, “The Meadow River Valley Outdoor Recreation Plan is a community-driven initiative designed to create a strategic roadmap for enhancing outdoor recreation, connectivity, and sustainability across the region. Covering the Meadow River Valley Watershed, which includes portions of Nicholas, Fayette, and Greenbrier Counties, this plan aims to extend regional recreation opportunities while promoting responsible growth. Led by Meadow River Valley Association, Inc. and funded by grants from New River Gorge Regional Development Authority and Partner Community Capital, the plan seeks to strengthen ecotourism and outdoor activities. The goal is to protect river and land areas, enhance accessibility, and strategically expand recreational assets. The plan envisions increasing the economic impact of outdoor recreation, improving quality of life for residents, and elevating current assets to ensure long-term environmental sustainability and economic growth.”

## Most of WV Medicaid recipients aren’t aware that work requirements are coming, survey finds

Beginning next year, work requirements will be a condition of eligibility for more than 161,000 Medicaid recipients in West Virginia, and most state enrollees are not aware, a new survey found.

About 55% of West Virginia recipients surveyed were not aware of the new Medicaid work requirements. The same percent of Medicaid recipients nationally did not know about the work requirements.

The Health Management Academy, a health system research organization based in Arlington, Virginia, did the survey of 1,974 Medicaid enrollees in April. Of the respondents, 38 were from West Virginia.

Beginning Jan. 1, 2027, people aged 19 through 64 who are part of the Medicaid expansion population will have to work or train for 80 hours a month in order to qualify for the program. Expanded Medicaid includes those who qualify for the program because they make up to 138% of the federal pov-

erty line, or about \$45,540 for a family of four.

Exceptions will be made for pregnant people, Native Americans, caregivers of children under 14 or disabled adults, and others.

The changes are part of the One Big Beautiful Bill Act, which President Donald Trump signed into law last summer. The federal legislation makes historic cuts to healthcare and food assistance. All four members of the state’s congressional delegation, all Republicans, voted in support of the bill.

Sen. Shelley Moore Capito, R-WV, has said the changes coming to Medicaid and to federal food assistance in the bill are necessary to eliminate “waste, fraud and abuse,” and to preserve the programs for those who deserve them.

State officials have said they expect the state’s Medicaid enrollment to decline when the requirements are in place, but they have not said by how much. The state enlisted West Virginia University Health Affairs to help with project management and systems requirements for the work requirements, officials said.

As of earlier this year, West Virginia’s Medicaid expansion population included 161,184 people.

The poll also found that nationally, another 27% of respondents said they had heard something about the work requirements, but were unsure of the details. About 85% of those polled did not know that Medicaid eligibility determinations will be done twice a year beginning next year, the survey found.

A study earlier this year found that in West Virginia, between 40,000 and 75,000 people will lose their healthcare because of the work requirements and more frequent eligibility checks. The actual number of those

who lose coverage will depend on policies the state of West Virginia put in place, the study said.

States are required to start outreach to Medicaid recipients to let them know of the program changes by June 30.

A spokeswoman for the West Virginia Department of Human Services did not respond to questions for this story.

Rhonda Rogombe, health and safety policy safety net analyst at the West Virginia Center on Budget and Policy, said she was not surprised but disappointed to hear that most West Virginia Medicaid recipients were not aware of the forthcoming work requirements.

She said the state learned during Medicaid unwinding - when people were removed from the program as it returned to pre-pandemic eligibility requirements - that people can be difficult to reach. During that time, 75% of those people who lost coverage did so not because they were not eligible but because they didn’t complete necessary paperwork, she said.

“That just goes to show that there’s a lot more that we, as advocates and others, can do to ensure that people stay connected to their coverage and understand what’s going on,” Rogombe said.

Rogombe noted that the state has a new website that explains the changes that are coming to Medicaid. She said the state has also started sending postcards to affected families and will follow-up with detailed notices, as is required by federal law.

She said the Department of Human Services has been working with West Virginia University and with advocates on its plans for implementing the Medicaid

## WVABCA expands enforcement efforts under new Vape Safety Act

The West Virginia Alcohol Beverage Control Administration (WVABCA) is expanding its public safety and enforcement responsibilities following passage of House Bill 5437, known as the "Vape Safety Act," which provides the agency with new authority to regulate, license, and enforce operating requirements for qualifying vape and smoke shops across the state.

"The Vape Safety Act provides important tools to strengthen accountability and improve oversight of products being sold in communities across West Virginia," said WVABCA Commissioner Fred Wooton. "Our goal is to help ensure businesses operate responsibly while protecting children, families, and consumers from unsafe or improperly marketed products."

The legislation comes as vape and smoke shop businesses continue to expand rapidly throughout West Virginia, raising growing concerns among educators, medical professionals, law enforcement, and community

leaders regarding mislabeled, unregulated, and youth-marketed products.

The law builds upon Senate Bill 679, passed in 2023, which expanded regulatory oversight of products including Delta 8, hemp, and kratom. Since that time, the WVABCA has worked alongside the State Tax Division and other state and local agencies to strengthen enforcement efforts and improve compliance across the industry.

Under the Vape Safety Act, the WVABCA will oversee licensing, compliance, and enforcement requirements for qualifying vape and smoke shops operating within the state. Agency officials say the expanded authority will help improve consistency, accountability, and compliance with West Virginia law.

## West Virginia Humanities Council seeks grant applications

it is focused on one thing - tacos. The selection includes, chorizo, pastor - pork butt cooked on a rotating broiler - beef brisket, marinated chicken thighs, and a mushroom option for vegetarians. Tacos are served in corn tortillas unless flour is requested, and can also be made into burritos. Desserts are churros and rice pudding. A daily drink called agua fresca, is made with ingredients such as hibiscus water, lime with chia seeds, orange, and mint.

The dining room seats up to 32 people, and a patio is in the works.

"Our food is what you get on the streets in Mexico City - we just put it inside of a building," Vazquez said. "People can get lunch for \$15. The food is prepared fresh - the whole concept is a very quick-paced service."

Vazquez said his family loves the White Sulphur Springs area and community.

"People have been very nice, and we want to share a bit of our culture with the people. Everyone has wel-

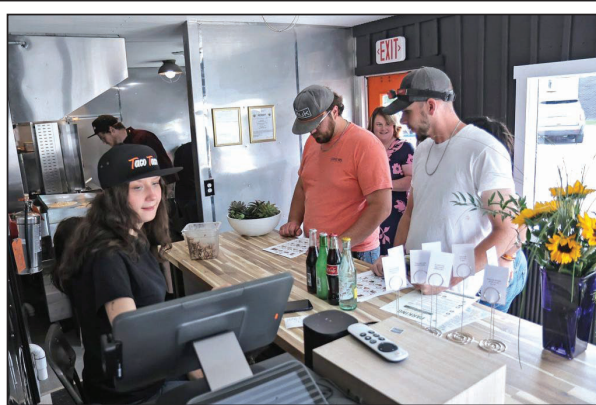

changes.

"All of these things have been, I think, really good for getting this off the ground," Rogombe said. "But it's only as good as its ability to reach the people it's meant for. So, I think that that is like the next biggest challenge."

Michele Goldman, executive director of the West Virginia Association of Free Clinics, said with the changes coming to Medicaid, member organizations have been gearing up to take on patients who no longer have health insurance.

Goldman, a nurse who formerly ran a free clinic, said she's most disturbed that people will deal with losing their healthcare coverage by rationing medications. People don't understand that skipping dosages of blood thinners can lead to strokes and heart attacks, she said.

"Our concern is hospitals are going to be overrun with patients, because that's one where they're going to go get care if there's no place else (to go)," she said. "And two, because they're going to be so sick, they're going to need more specialty care. West Virginia - another issue we have, is there's so many healthcare deserts because of just the geography of the state."

The association represents four of the seven free and charitable clinics in the state of West Virginia.

Goldman said free clinics in the state are considering expanding telehealth or opening satellite offices to fill in some of the gaps where there aren't other healthcare providers.

Telehealth is one aspect of Gov. Patrick Morrisey's plan for the Rural Health Transformation Program, a

## Sex offender sentenced to prison

Greenbrier County Prosecuting Attorney Nicole G. Campbell, announced that John F. Willis, III, 56, of Greenbrier County, has been sentenced to prison following convictions for multiple felony sexual abuse offenses.

Willis previously pleaded guilty to three counts of Sexual Abuse in the First Degree. On May 26, 2026, he was sentenced to consecutive prison terms of one to five years on each count, along with \$30,000 in criminal fines, court costs, and full restitution for the victim's medical and psychological treatment.

In addition to his prison sentence, Willis will remain on extended supervised release for 50 years following his release from custody. Conditions include strict prohibitions on contact with minors, geographic restrictions near schools and playgrounds, mandatory sex offender treatment, random testing, and intensive monitoring of any approved electronic devices.

Willis was remanded to the custody of the West Virginia Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation following sentencing.

Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Ryan R. Blake represented the State of West Virginia throughout the proceedings, and the investigation was conducted by Lt. Hudnall of the Greenbrier County Sheriff's Department.

five-year federal program that has allocated \$199 million to West Virginia for fiscal year 2026.

"I think everybody's going to try to do their best with what they can do with funding. It's pretty competitive to get (Rural Health Transformation Program) funding," she said. "I'm not sure that the free clinics will be able to get as much as we would like, so we're actually looking at other ways of getting some funding to do telehealth too."

"I think across the country it's going to be difficult for people, especially because I don't think people are really paying attention to what's going on, and I think they're going to be surprised when all of a sudden they don't have their Medicaid coverage," Goldman said.

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# Dear Recycle Lady

## Dear Recycle Lady,

I enjoyed reading your information about honeybees last week, so now I want to add a shout-out for wild bees! When we talk about beekeeping, we're primarily talking about European yellow and black striped honeybees that live in a hive and produce honey. Although they are indeed vital to our food production and have suffered from Colony Collapse Disorder in past years, by and large these colonies are doing ok, according to <https://worldbeeproject.org/2025/12/07/>.

On the other hand, our wild bees, pollinators, and insects are declining and much of our natural environment and foods within the ecosystem are pollinated by these wild bees, also referred to as native bees. There are 4,000 species of native bees in the U.S and 15 species of native bees in West Virginia. Bumblebees, mining bees, carpenter bees, mason bees, leaf-cutter bees, long-horned bees, large and small carpenter bees, squash bees, and sweat bees all are native to West Virginia.

These bees do not live in a hive or produce honey and they mostly live underground. They are most active in late spring through early fall and most of these bees are non-aggressive and will not sting you. Some of them live in colonies, others live in solitude; some produce honey and some don't, but whether they are honeybees, native bees, or wild bees, they are all are good for your garden as they are all great pollinators.

### Save the Pollinators

#### Dear Save the Pollinators,

Thanks for a most informative description of wild bees. It seems that protective ideas apply to all bees whether they are European bees or wild bees. More protection is needed for West Virginia's honeybee population as it declined an estimated 40% from 2024 to 25, according to <https://wvpress.org>. This decline was due to a variety of factors including harsh winters and an invasive species of mite. A statewide beekeeping rights bill, the Bee Bill, passed in the 2026 WV Senate to provide extra protection for West Virginia bees and the beekeepers. Protecting and improving the bees' natural habitats is vital. One effective and attractive way to increase pollinator populations is to plant a small area of your garden with native plants and flowers and avoid the use of pesticides. "Rewilding" parts of your lawn allows small plants such as violets, clover, buttercups and dandelions to play host to a wide variety of pollinators. The No Mow May movement also suggests mowing your lawn less to support pollinators, reduce water use, and create a healthier yard.

#### Dear Recycle Lady,

I have undertaken to organize all the photographs I have collected over the past years, and I have lots of

duplicates. Can photographs be recycled?

#### Dear Organizer,

According to [conserve-energy-future.com](https://conserve-energy-future.com), photographs can't be recycled as they contain silver, mercury, and selenium, all of which are considered hazardous waste. These chemicals are used to make the photo paper that images are printed on. Photo paper also has coatings and protectors, which contain plastics and metals. Perhaps you could make a collage with the photos and send it to family members. Be sure to identify everyone in the photograph and include dates, if possible. Readers, do you have any ideas for Organizer? If so, I am happy to print them. I am sure many of you have duplicate photographs in drawers and need to do something with them.

**Interesting News:** Denmark designers have created the first mass-produced door made from an underground root-like mushrooms sprout. The mycelium is grown inside a door-shaped mold and framed with scrap wood that would usually be thrown away. It takes two weeks to grow one door. That's more sustainable than cutting down trees to build one. The design is currently being tested. Its designers said it's as safe and strong as a standard door and has natural soundproofing properties. (The Week Junior)

# A Look Back

Seventy-five years ago, this June, Greenbrier Valley residents had a treat when the Meyer Davis Orchestra and the Populaires performed at Lewisburg's Carnegie Hall.

For many years, one of Meyer Davis Orchestras played at The Greenbrier at afternoon teas and in the ball rooms. At one time, orchestra leader Meyer Davis had 80 bands. Known as the "society band," his orchestras were sought after for weddings and debutante balls. Davis' orchestras played seven presidential inaugural balls from Coolidge to Kennedy. Musicians who performed as part of the Meyer Davis Orchestras include Benny Goodman, Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey and Kate Smith.

For over forty years the Populaires played in The Greenbrier's Old White Club. Initially known as

the Four Populaires, the band was organized in New York City in 1945 and began appearing at The Greenbrier in 1949. The original members of the band were Bill Sloane (tenor who played accordion and piano); Bill Walz (baritone who played bass and piano); Chuck Bills (bass singer who played saxophone and clarinet); and Mike Powers who played guitar. The quartet would play in the Old White Club from April through November. In the winter, they performed in Florida at Pier 66, the Breakers Beach Club, The Everglades Club, and Jack Valentines Restaurant.

Mike Powers dropped out of the band in 1957, and Kenny Martin who had played with Guy Lombardo, Sammy Kaye and Jimmy Dorsey came on as lead vocalist and played the trombone and drums. The band became a quintet when Don Bay-



ton joined as the drummer. They recorded eight LPs under the Squire Records label and one by Greenbrier Recording Company. During the Populaires tenure at The Greenbrier, the resort was owned by the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad (C&O). A story was told that the C&O brought the Populaires to

Cleveland to play for the annual board of directors' Christmas party and paid them with C&O stock certificates.

When alcoholic drinks could only be served in West Virginia in private clubs, The Greenbrier's Old White Club served cocktails and was where guests gathered for after dinner dancing. Undoubtedly, many romances were kindled and rekindled there while dancing to music by The Populaires.

## 2026 RABIES CLINIC

WV Code § 19-20A-1 Rabies vaccination procedure for dogs and cats will check the spread of rabies for the immediate preservation of life, health and safety and from becoming a menace and danger to people, livestock, poultry and game. After June 1st, whoever obtains an unvaccinated dog or cat shall at once have such dog or cat properly vaccinated against rabies with a vaccine capable of producing immunity for two years.

Dogs and cats need not be vaccinated before the age of 3 months, but must be vaccinated by the age of 6 months: Provided, that dogs and cats entering the state of WV temporarily cannot be kept within the state of West Virginia for a period of more than 30 days unless properly vaccinated.

§19-20A-6, Offenses and penalties, Whoever owns, keeps or harbors a dog or cat and fails to have such dog or cat vaccinated or re-vaccinated against rabies, shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than \$10 nor more than \$50, or be confined in the county jail not less than 10 days nor more than 60 days, or both. Any person failing to have dogs or cats vaccinated on or before August 1, 2026 will be subject to the penalty provided in the West Virginia Code.

The above clinics will be attended by a 2026 licensed Veterinarian, a Deputy Assessor and a Deputy Sheriff

Vaccination Fee for Each Dog or Cat is \$10.00.  
Dog tax/tag is \$3.00 in County and \$6.00 within City Limits.  
Any Vicious Dog requires an additional \$10.00 tax/tag.

Dog shall at all times wear tags to be properly licensed by law.

**Carroll Bassett's artistic history:**  
Prior to moving to West Virginia in 1997 I had a very active career in the arts. From 1977 to 1981 I worked as Studio Coordinator for Albert Paley in Rochester, NY, who I met at an intensive workshop at the Peters Valley School for Crafts. This was a very formative period for me during which I worked on several important commissions of Albert's design, most notably a set of very large gates for the Senate Chambers in Albany, NY.

After moving back to New Jersey I established a small studio producing forged metal items and sculpture. After receiving two awards at a show in Short Hills, NJ, I became acquainted with two high end decorators working in Manhattan, NY. For the next roughly ten years these two women kept me very busy with commissions ranging from thick glass topped tables and furniture to wall and free standing sculpture. This was an extremely profitable period for me but the culture of the very rich became philosophically harder to bear.

For a brief time, through contacts with other metalsmiths, I became involved in the restoration of the Statue of Liberty and the Ellis Island Restoration Project in NY Harbor. This association led to work on the restoration of the William Penn Sculpture atop city Hall in Philadelphia, PA. Working with the Philadelphia Museum of Arts conservator required that samples of the surface of the roughly 40 ton bronze sculpture be taken and the surface be photographed. Access for this work was through the hollow casting using single rope techniques I learned from the caving community in NJ since the statue was about 550 feet above

ground. That phase completed, the statue was surrounded by scaffolding allowing detailed restoration of its entire surface.

This introduction to the caving community on this last project brought me to West Virginia and Greenbrier County to explore and map caves and subsequently to purchase my farm in Friars Hill, WV. Having been spoiled by the economics of the New York arts scene, I began developing tools for the caving and rope rescue community as well as developing tools to break rock to further the entrance to caves and assist with cave rescue problems.

About six years ago I was introduced to the wood turning community here and began producing turned objects at my shop in Friars Hill, WV. What you see here is the result of those efforts.

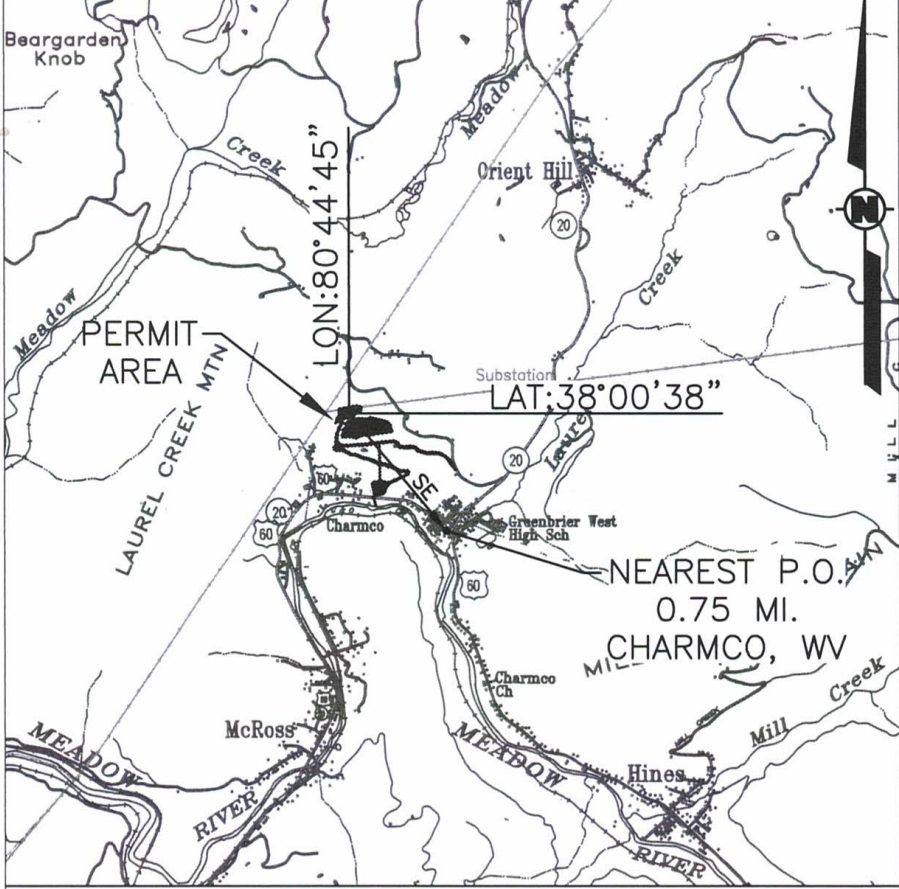

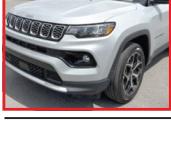
