Lewisburg in the running to be Hallmark’s Merriest Christmas Town

The holiday season could be a little more festive in Lewisburg this year. The Coolest Small Town has been selected as a contender in Hallmark Channel’s search for the Merriest Christmas Town. Residents, visitors and fans of Lewisburg can cast their vote daily until Sept. 4 to move to the next round.

Lewisburg is known for its small-town charm, vibrant community and cheerful holiday traditions. The locally owned shops coordinate the Magic of Christmas in Lewisburg. A season-long event that welcomes holiday shoppers with Christmas activities such as carriage rides, the annual tree lighting, parade and Santa’s Mailbox. Mayor Beverly White responds to all letters that have a return address. Since its inception in 2020, she has written 1,000 letters.

Before the Legend: Dolly Parton’s deep, sometimes overlooked ties to Greenbrier County

Dolly’s death will be told in history books, at least some.

In her death, she was able to unite President Donald Trump with former Presidents Joe Biden and Barack Obama. Celebrities from rapper Eminem and social icon Shania Twain to Taylor Swift, Beyoncé and Céline Dion. Presidents and prime ministers of nations around the world.

The announcement of Dolly Parton’s death has garnered more individual responses from people than could be recorded. Sociologists and historians have compared it to the media coverage surrounding Queen Elizabeth II’s death in September 2022.

They agreed on her contribution to not only modern American culture but also her timeless ability to speak - to anyone - and captivate, if not their serious engagement, at least their suspicious interest.

They praised her for talents as a singer, musician and songwriter. But according to her sister, (and even Parton herself), they stayed for something they were looking for from Parton and it was usually related to Parton’s body and public image.

Dolly’s response when Barbara Walters interviewed her in the late 1970s?

“You’ve been laughing at me. But I know what I can do, and I know what I’m doing. So, the joke’s on you.”

Since her passing, the praise has been prolific. But Parton’s connection to West Virginia, and specifically Greenbrier County has been largely overlooked.

The story of any connection Parton, as a proud Appalachian, had to West Virginia - the only state completely located within Appalachia - is often told through the familiar story of books.

Alderson unveils strategic reuse plan

During the August meeting of the Alderson City Council, Mayor Travis Copenhaver revealed the Town of Alderson has received the planning report for the Strategic Reuse Plan of the Opportunity Center property, formerly the Alderson Elementary School.

At present, there are several users of the facilities on the property. The former school currently houses a local food pantry that prepares and distributes food to residents, a dog grooming business, and a medical business. The main building is occupied by The Greenbrier County Family Support Center. The football field on the property is used for a fireworks show on the 4th of July, and provides green space for community recreation.

The project is divided into three phases and is expected to be spread over 6 to 8 years from the date construction begins. The date construction will proceed is yet to be determined.

Phase One will be the initial site improvements. These include improvements to the wayfinding system, renovations

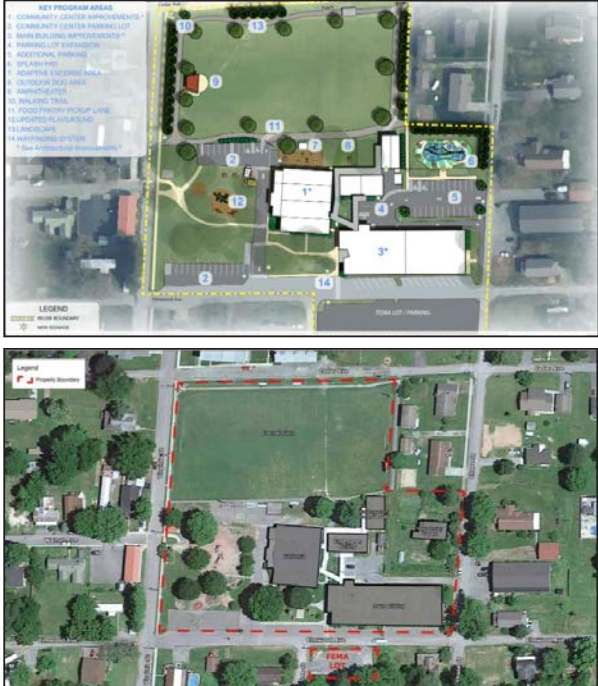
in the community center and the main building, as well as their parking lots, an updated playground, and landscape work.

Phase Two will include continued site structure, site plantings, parking lot, and sidewalk expansions and improvements. permanent restroom facilities, cafeterias, and outdoor recreation areas as well as spaces for private parties and community events.

Phase Three will see the construction of an amphitheater, an adaptive exercise area, and splash pad. According to the plan, saving these developments for the last phase allows flexibility to decide if these are appropriate uses of the site.

The purpose of the planning report is to prepare a preliminary strategic reuse plan for the former school property so the property continues to serve as a community asset, and so local decisionmakers have a clear direction on how to reuse the property. The plan will help guide future decisions for the project. West Virginia

Greenbrier County Commission authorizes \$27,000 GigReady Broadband draw request, approves several grant related matters

At its regular meeting Tuesday, the Greenbrier County Commission approved Draw Request #21 for the GigReady Broadband Project, the county’s ongoing broadband expansion initiative aimed at providing nearly 170 miles of new high-speed fiber across the county.

Attending via Zoom, Amanda Smarr, Region 4 project specialist, informed the commission that the draw request in the amount of \$27,600 pertained to two invoices from Thomson & Litton, the engineering firm working on the project, for \$12,600 and \$15,000. Greenbrier County is responsible for \$6,900 of the total draw request.

Funded by a grant award from the West Virginia Department of Economic Development as part of its GigReady and Major Broadband Project Strategies Program and a matching 25% proportionate investment by Greenbrier County, the project operates through incremental releases of funding - known as draw requests - once construction milestones have been met or verified expenses are identified and approved.

The commission also approved a request from the project contractor to be able to work weekends. Commissioner Woody Hanna asked for clarification whether the contractor was asking for additional money for working weekends, and after Smarr informed the commissioners the contractor was not seeking additional funding, the commission voted unanimously to approve the request.

Additionally, the commissioners voted unanimously to sign resolutions and approve grant acceptance paperwork for the Community Corrections Grant for \$263,000 and the Justice Reinvestment grant for \$71,735.

Deputy Billy Mitchell, Jr. spoke at the meeting on behalf of the Greenbrier County Sheriff’s Department and asked the commission to vote to allow the department to apply for a Homeland Security Grant to purchase three ballistic shields for the SWAT team. Mitchell stated that although the grant proposal would identify the shields as for SWAT team members, the equipment would be available to any law enforcement officials in the county for use. The commission voted unanimously to approve the grant application.

In addition to the approval of several administrative items on the agenda that included employment status changes for two county employees, the commissioned also considered approval of a letter of engagement with Claytor Enterprises LLC to prepare financial statements for the county for fiscal year 2026, as the firm did the previous year, and the commission voted unanimously to approve the letter.

Prior to the commission’s adjournment of the meeting, Commission President Lowell Rose announced future meetings which included two sessions of the Hotel Occupancy Public Hearing, which will be held Sept. 2 at 11 a.m. and Sept. 3 at 6 p.m. in the commission’s reading room, and the two sessions of the Zoning Ordinance Public Hearings, which will be held Sept. 14 at noon and Sept. 15 at 6 p.m.

USDA Rural Development announces \$1.7M investment in community facilities to benefit Town of Rainelle

Investment Will Help Provide Critical Community Infrastructure for 1,190 residents

U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development West Virginia State Director John Reisenweber has announced that the Town of Rainelle will receive \$1.7 million for new sidewalks throughout the town.

“At USDA Rural Development, we are working every day to ensure our rural communities have the resources they need to access safe and reliable infrastructure,” said State Director Reisenweber, “These upgraded sidewalks will make Rainelle safer, more connected, and improve stormwater drainage systems. This investment strengthens the town’s long-term vitality and supports rural prosperity.”

“This Community Facilities Grant will make needed investment in the safety and well-being of West Virginians across the Town of Rainelle,” said Senator Shelley Moore Capito. “By securing this funding, the town will be able to repair and improve their sidewalks, making them safer and more accessible for residents. I’m proud to have secured resources for these upgrades to strengthen Rainelle’s infrastructure, prevent further damage from stormwater, and improve accessibility for West Virginians in the community.”

The grant investment, provided through USDA’s Community Facilities Program, will rehabilitate aging and deteriorated sidewalks throughout the Town of Rainelle. These improvements will increase safety, accessibility, and walkability for residents and address uneven surfaces, cracks, and drainage issues. The improvements will also strengthen the town’s infrastructure by redirecting stormwater away from roadways, helping to reduce long-term maintenance needs and protect public investment.

In 2022, the country music legend went to Charleston to celebrate the statewide expansion of her Imagination Library, a program that now makes free books available to young children across all 55 counties.

But in Greenbrier County, Parton’s story reaches back much further.

Long before she became a global superstar, before Dollywood, “9 to 5,” “Steel Magnolias” and countless awards, Parton was part of the country music tradition that regularly brought nationally known performers to the Greenbrier Valley.

Her name remains among those of the biggest entertainers ever to take the stage at the State Fair of West Virginia site in Fairlea.

Before anyone in the corporate music industry cared who she was as a musical artist, She performed on the Grandstand stage alongside Johnny Cash and June Carter Cash, Roy Rogers, and others.

The State Fair itself is deeply rooted in Greenbrier County history. What became the modern State Fair of West Virginia grew from agricultural fairs held in the Greenbrier Valley, including the Greenbrier Agricultural Society’s first annual fair in 1854. The Greenbrier Valley Fair was established at the present Fairlea site in 1921, and the state Legislature designated it the State Fair of West Virginia in 1941.

By the 1960s, the fair had developed a grandstand large enough to attract national entertainers. That helped transform fair week into something more than an agricultural exhibition. It became one of the Greenbrier Valley’s most important annual entertainment events.

“The concerts stepped up to the next level, hosting nationally known artists, right here in Lewisburg,” fair historian and longtime fair employee Steve Collins said. Among those artists was Parton.

But Parton’s legacy in the region will likely be found in books:

In June 2016, catastrophic flooding devastated portions of southern West Virginia. Rainelle, in western Greenbrier County, was among the hardest-hit communities. The Rainelle Public Library was inundated by approximately 5 feet of water, destroying its entire print and digital collection and leaving most of its furnishings beyond repair.

Parton’s own Imagination Library website documented the devastation.

“For two public libraries, Rainelle and Clendenin, the destruction is unimaginable,” the organization reported at the time.

The connection was particularly poignant because the Rainelle library was located in a community that had already been part of the broader Imagination Library effort. Parton’s organization urged supporters to help the damaged libraries rebuild.

The story eventually came full circle. Greenbrier County was not merely a name on a statewide map.

The Greenbrier County Public Library in Lewisburg participated in a statewide “Dolly Day” celebration in August 2023, hosting a reading event for local children. Forty children and 20 parents attended the event, while 135 children had participated in the library’s summer reading program.

The library’s assistant director and children’s programming coordinator, Christy Carver, emphasized why such programs matter.

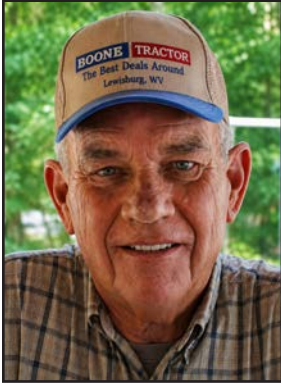

The symbol shown below is beginning to appear on more and more items and there is some confusion about this symbol that needs to be clarified. One of the most confusing parts seems to be the recycling category, which is paper. The category “paper” isn’t just newspapers and office paper. It also includes magazines and cardboard. All four of these categories: newspaper, office paper, magazines and cardboard, are made from trees. According to www.science-abc.com, cellulose fibers from wood pulp are made into a slurry, treated, dried and pressed through rollers to flatten the paper. It goes without saying, this is an oversimplification of the process, so for more exact and interesting information on the process as well as the history of the invention of paper by the Chinese as early as the 2nd century BCE see the above-named website.

The four types of recyclable paper are: Cardboard, Newspaper, Office Paper, and Magazines.



There are three parts to the “how2recycle” symbol.

1. The triangle of arrows that indicates that this item is recyclable.
 2. The word PAPER that indicates the RECYCLING CATEGORY of the item to be recycled.
 3. The word BOX indicates that THE ITEM TO BE RECYCLED is a Box made from paper {cardboard}.
- In summary the above symbol tells you that the item is recyclable, that the recyclable item to be recycled is a BOX and that the BOX recycles with PAPER.

The recycler must then determine in which of the four types of paper the box belongs: cardboard, newspaper, office paper or magazines. At the Recycling Center there are four bins, each labeled with one of these four TYPES of PAPER. More information next week on the plastic recycling category. A Look Back

In 1963, the champion steer and lamb raised by 4-H club members were auctioned at the West Virginia State Fair for a prestigious event. Following the fair, in September, a chapter of the Chaîne des Rôtisseurs held an extraordinary dinner at The Greenbrier’s Kates Mountain Lodge. Appetizers included oysters and clams “opened to order,” Quiche Lorraine, beer-battered shrimp, succulent spare ribs and bratwurst and onions.

Entrees included a choice of round of beef or marinated club steak from the champion steer, the champion lamb, Chukar partridges with juniper berries, ham from 4-H club members, Maine lobster, and Alleghany trout. Side dishes included compote

andalouse, Idaho baked potatoes, vine ripe tomatoes, and red and white slaw. The meal ended with cheeses and fruit. Cigarette smoking was not allowed so as to not dull the taste buds. From start to finish, the diners had their choice of the best Bordeaux wine or old German beer. All the while, the party was sere-

naded by The Greenbrier’s Populaires.

The Chaîne des Rôtisseurs dates back to the 13th century when France’s Louis IX ordered the establishment of several professional guilds, including the “Ayeurs” or goose roasters. In 1509, the guild’s interest was extended to include the preparation of

other meats and poultry, including game, and it took the name “Rotisseurs.” The guild system was dissolved during the French Revolution, but the Chaîne des Rôtisseurs was revived in 1950 by a small group of gastronomes. Since then, it has grown to a national association with chapters in 75 countries.

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Urology physicians impacted by residency program make contribution to scholarship

A group of physicians who spent time in Charleston Area Medical Center's (CAMC) urology residency program, which was co-created and developed by James Tierney, D.O., have shown how much the program impacted them through financial contributions to a scholarship in Tierney's name.

The James Tierney, D.O., Legacy Scholarship was created in October 2024 in honor of Tierney, a 1980 West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine (WVSOM) graduate. A year later, Samuel Deem, D.O., and the WVSOM Foundation, the school's nonprofit office responsible for philanthropic efforts, worked together to encourage other physicians to donate. The scholarship currently totals \$94,992.

"Creating the urology residency at CAMC developed as the need for urologic care in West Virginia was so great. I thought the best way to increase the number of urologists and establish a high bar for quality urologic care was to establish a residency," Tierney said. "Starting any residency can be daunting, but with the AOA [American Osteopathic Association] and CAMC on board, the idea took off. My initial goal was to attract WVSOM graduates to urology knowing that, if successful, this would provide generations of urologists for West Virginia patients. I am proud of how our program has developed and continues to thrive."

Deem, a Class of 2004 graduate, along with Joshua Lohri, D.O., Class of 2006; Faith Payne, D.O., Class of 2007; Cordell Davis, D.O., Class of 2008; Stephen Phillips, D.O.,

Class of 2012; Nathan Hale, D.O.; Michael Stencel, D.O.; and Matthew Allaway, D.O., and his wife, Kelli Allaway, founders of Perineologic, a medical device company focused on developing technology that improves safety in precision, have financially contributed.

"J.P. Tierney influenced my life even more than I realized at the time. He made me want to be a better surgeon, physician and man," Deem said.

Deem was the second resident in the urological program and graduated from the residency in 2010. He has been involved with every resident trained at CAMC and is now program director of the residency built by Tierney.

"We all owe a great deal to Dr. Tierney for his steadfast belief in creating and developing what I consider to be one of the greatest residency programs in the state. He didn't lead by pacifying us and being nice. He made us understand what a truly difficult calling it is to be someone's doctor," he said. "His disciplined approach is hands down the greatest influence on my successful career. Giving back in his honor while he is still here to see it was an important small step to show my appreciation for all that he has done for me."

Matthew Allaway worked at CAMC with Tierney as part of the West Virginia University Urology Residency Program. At the time, each chief resident was assigned to Charleston for six months. Allaway, who completed the rotation in 2001, was the first D.O. to be accepted into WVU's urology program.

"The mission and vision for the WVSOM scholarship

were very compelling and we both felt that this was a cause we wanted to support," Kelli Allaway said. "I was raised in southern West Virginia and recognize some of the hurdles many young West Virginians may face. Focusing on keeping our talented physicians in the area is something we feel strongly about."

The Allaways' medical company values giving back through fundraising.

"Organizations that prioritize philanthropic efforts can have a significant positive impact by providing resources, opportunities and support that may not otherwise be available," Kelli said. "The hope is that this will create long-term benefits by empowering individuals and communities to improve their quality of life."

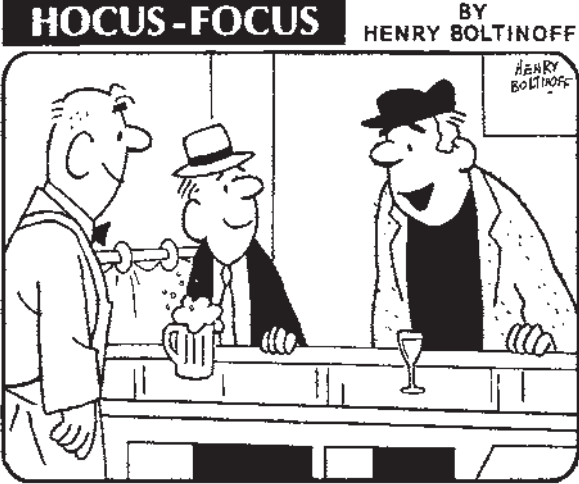
The James Tierney, D.O., Legacy Scholarship will be distributed to a WVSOM student for the first time in spring 2027.

Deem said it is a blessing to see what the funds can do for a current student on their medical journey.

"I received a scholarship while at WVSOM and was honored to do so. I hope others can benefit in that same way and see a small token of the generosity from Dr. Tierney that I saw firsthand for many years," he said.

Tierney has been a urologist at Charleston Area Medical Center since 1987. His postgraduate experience included an internship at Pinellas Park Hospital in St. Petersburg, Fla., followed by two years of general surgery at CAMC and a four-year urology residency at the University of Pittsburgh before returning to CAMC to practice.

Tierney and CAMC officials realized the need for urologists in West Virginia, so he and other physicians began the hospital's urology residency program in 2006. He stepped away as program director three years ago but continues to promote the residency program through workshops at WVSOM.

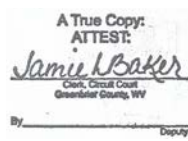

This Week in WV History

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

Aug. 30, 1862: Confederate raiders under the command of General Albert G. Jenkins attacked and occupied Buckhannon, where they captured 20 prisoners and 5,000 stands of small arms.

Aug. 31, 1945: The USS West Virginia led American battleships into Tokyo Bay two days before the formal surrender of Japan on September 2, 1945.

Sept. 1, 1671: Thomas Batte, Robert Hallom and Thomas Wood set out from Petersburg, Virginia, to explore west of the Appalachian Mountains. Batte and Hallom are credited with being the first explorers to document the New River. Their expedition later bolstered England's claims to the Ohio Valley.

Sept. 1, 1777: Fort Henry, located at what is now Wheeling, was attacked by Indians for the first time during the Revolutionary War. Nearly half the militia were lured outside the post and killed. The fort would be attacked again in 1782.

Sept. 1, 1907: Walter Phillips Reuther was born to German immigrant parents in Wheeling. Reuther was a founder of the modern labor movement and a long-time president of the United Auto Workers.

Sept. 1, 1921: By this date during the Battle of Blair Mountain, miners had captured half of the 25-mile mountain ridge and were ready to descend upon Logan. President Warren Harding placed the strike zone under martial law, and ordered federal troops and a squadron of bomber aircraft into the

state.

Sept. 2, 1722: Frontiersman William Crawford was born in present Jefferson County. He was a farmer, soldier, surveyor and the land agent of George Washington.

Sept. 3, 1851: Mollie Gabe was born into slavery in Flatwoods, Braxton County. After emancipation, she became a widely respected midwife, washerwoman, farmer, and community leader who raised a large family while preserving Appalachian traditions. She died in 1951.

Sept. 3, 1890: West Virginia Wesleyan College opened in Buckhannon as the West Virginia Conference Seminary. In that first year, 201 men and women undertook a largely preparatory school curriculum. Gradually the school added college-level studies and awarded its first five degrees in 1905.

Sept. 3, 1946: Fiddler and banjo player John Morris was born in Ivydale, Clay County. He and his brother David created the influential Morris Family Old-Time Music Festival in the late 1960s and played an important role in founding the Vandalia Gathering. In 2020, John Morris was named a National Heritage Fellow, the nation's highest honor in traditional arts.

Sept. 3, 1966: President Lyndon B. Johnson dedicated the Summersville Dam and Reservoir. Summersville Lake (now State Park) is located on the Gauley River in Nicholas County. It is West Virginia's largest lake, with 2,790 surface acres at summer pool stage and over 60 miles of shoreline.

Sept. 4, 1862: General Albert G. Jenkins and his men crossed the Ohio River and became the first to raise the Confederate flag on Ohio soil during the Civil War.

Sept. 4, 1894: Jessie Maynard was born in Williamson. Two of her husbands were killed in violent incidents during the Mine Wars: Cabell Testerman during the shootout at Matewan in 1920 and Sid Hatfield on the steps of the McDowell County Courthouse a year later.

Sept. 5, 1861: Sutton was occupied by 5,000 Union troops. Later in 1861, Gen. Rosecrans bivouacked 10,000 Union troops there, including a future president, William McKinley.

Sept. 5, 1936: Baseball Hall of Famer Bill Mazeroski was born in Wheeling. He played all 17 years of his career for the Pittsburgh Pirates. His walk-off home run to win the 1960 World Series over the New York Yankees is one of the most famous moments in baseball history.

Sept. 5, 1950: Appalachian Bible Institute opened in Sylvester, Boone County, with an enrollment of seven students. Now called Appalachian Bible College, it has served thousands of students since moving to Raleigh County in 1956.

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Five weeks of world’s wildest Whitewater to return to WV

Last weekend of Gauley Season to coincide with Bridge Day

In just a few weeks, the New River Gorge National Park will once again transform into a world-renowned white-water rafting destination, offering some of the most intense whitewater runs in the country. Every fall,

more than 60,000 visitors from around the globe flock to West Virginia to experience the exhilarating five-week period known as Gauley Season. The season will officially kick off on Friday, Sept. 11, with the first

controlled release from the Summersville Dam. Scheduled releases will continue for five weeks, sending more than 44 million gallons of water into the Gauley River at speeds exceeding 50 miles per hour. These

forceful flows create premier rafting conditions, releasing enough volume to fill one Olympic-sized pool every 10 seconds!

This year, visitors can experience two of West Virginia’s most iconic adventures in one weekend as the final weekend of Gauley Season coincides with Bridge Day, West Virginia’s largest single-day festival. Guests can witness BASE jumpers taking the daring plunge from the New River Gorge Bridge from a one-of-a-kind vantage point while navigating these limited-time rapids.

Known for the legendary “Big Five Rapids,” the Upper Gauley challenges even the most experienced rafters with its series of challenging Class IV and V rapids, the final being a jaw-dropping 14-foot waterfall. This section is steep, fast, and technical, earning the nickname “Beast of the East.” Adventurers seeking swifter speeds without such daunting drops are encouraged to raft the Lower Gauley, which offers a less intense float.

Head to Summersville from Sept. 17-20, to attend Gauley Fest, the largest paddling festival in the world. Held each September at Veterans Memorial park, this energetic event draws over 5,000 paddlers worldwide for a weekend packed with live entertainment, gear vendors, camping, and endless whitewater action.
