# **Preserving Botetourt History:** *Kathy Austin, board member of BCHS*

The Botetourt Historical Society (BCHS) and Museum provide visitors a chance to revisit some of Botetourt County's history through education, exhibits, and activities. The museum's 57-year history saw a couple of massive changes last year. One of those changes stemmed off of the county courthouse renovation project, causing the museum to successfully find a new home.

During this series, The Fincastle Herald will feature interviews with some of the individuals who love Botetourt's rich history and help make the Botetourt County Museum of History and Culture a must-see destination.

Kathy Austin is a voting board member of BCHS who grew in Botetourt County. She was raised on a 600-acre farm in Fincastle and is a graduate of James River High School.

"My family's been here for generations," Kathy said in a recent interview. "I grew up in Fincastle on a farm that's still intact that my cousins live on."

Kathy's been a member of BCHS for approximately a decade. Her father's first cousin, Garland Stevens, was a member of the society for many years. Garland is who Kathy considers to be her biggest influence in bringing her into the Historical Society.

"He (Garland) would inform me of things going on [with BCHS] and encourage me in that direction," she added. "I've always been interested

in history. My father encouraged an interest in history for myself and my three brothers, but Garland was the main reason I was interested in the Historical Society."

Kathy mentioned the historical significance of Botetourt County is something to be proud of, which include interesting factoids about the area. 


# Botetourt County History

Charlotte Ann Thompson made them from flax that was grown, spun, and made into linen thread on the Botetourt Thompson farm. After knitting the stockings, Charlotte embroidered a design of pansies down their front. The wild pansy is symbolic of the renewal of nature and the first days of spring. During the Romantic period of the 19th century undergarments lost the simplicity they had during the 18th century. Thanks to the Romantic ideology, love became a mandatory requirement for marriages. Women embroidered or detailed their stockings, which showed beneath the fashionable shorter dresses. Charlotte Thompson was the daughter of Colonel Anderson Thompson and married Captain Archibald Mann McClintic. Weir Thompson donated these stockings to the Botetourt Museum of History and Culture in 2002. He was the great-grandson of Colonel Thompson.

# Innovative honeybee vaccine receives conditional license

The rollout of a new vaccine is a pretty sweet deal for honeybees, plus the flora and crops they pollinate, according to a news release from the Virginia Farm Bureau.

Honeybees can now be protected against a common bacterial disease called American foulbrood, thanks to a vaccine recently introduced from Georgiabased Dalan Animal Health Inc. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Center for Veterinary Biologics granted a conditional license for vaccination of honeybees against Paenibacillus larvae, a disease that weakens and kills colonies.

The vaccine is mixed in a "queen candy" paste, which is digested by worker bees. That substance is transferred to their glands that produce royal jelly, which is fed to the queen and transferred to her ovaries, making her larvae more immune to infection. Tests show no negative impact on queen fitness or honey quality. The vaccine will be available for purchase in the United States later this year.

One-third of the global food supply relies on pollination, and healthy commercial hives are essential for high crop yields.

"Global population growth and changing climates will increase the importance of honeybee pollination to secure our food supply," said Dr. Annette Kleiser, CEO of Dalan Animal Health Inc. "Our vaccine is a breakthrough in protecting honeybees. We are ready to change how we care for insects, impacting food production on a global scale."

American foulbrood is one of the most widespread and destructive of the honeybee brood diseases, according to the USDA.

But Virginia's beekeepers have done their part to stop the spread of American foulbrood, said Keith Tignor, state apiarist with the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

"We rarely see this disease in Virginia," he said. "Last year no incidence of AFB was reported. Preventive

measures by beekeepers to reduce AFB spore exposure are working well in the state."

Virginia Tech researchers say the condition is caused by bacterial spores that infect honeybee larvae up to three days old. AFB's millions of spores can remain viable in honey and beekeeping equipment for over 40 years. Bees inadvertently spread the spores throughout the hive, and humans can transmit the disease by exposing a healthy colony to contaminated bees or equipment.

Before now, there was no safe and sustainable solution for AFB prevention.

"There is an abundance of interest in the vaccine methodology and for its development,' Tignor continued. "The methodology may be applicable to development of vaccines for other maladies such as European foulbrood and a number of viruses that are more prevalent in honeybee colonies."



production plans of New Belgium brands right here in Botetourt County," says Botetourt County Director of Economic Development Ken McFadyen.

New Belgium's new brewing facility will not include the restaurant/tasting room previously attached to the former brewery which closed in 2019.

"For a company growing as fast as New Belgium, there's no challenge more urgent than boosting our ability to make enough beer to meet growing demand," said New Belgium CEO Steve Fechheimer. "We're excited to join the Daleville community, and we're confident this facility and its local team will help us fuel our growth for the foreseeable future. We greatly appreciate the partnership we've seen from distributors and retailers over the past several months as we've worked to find a solution."

As part of the deal, New Belgium and Constellation Brands will enter into a co-packing agreement, under which New Belgium will manufacture select brands for Constellation at Daleville, including the recently launched Fresca Mixed, among other select beer brands. In the future, New Belgium will explore ways to leverage the facility's FMB, seltzer, and RTD capabilities, which provide new avenues to expand the company's legacy of innovation.

"We understand that the current 60 employees of Constellation Brands have been offered jobs at current or higher wages to remain with New Belgium, which we very much appreciate for the workers and their families," said Botetourt County Administrator Gary Larrowe. "I understand there will be more information coming out as the agreement is finalized."

"The Roanoke Region has built a strong reputation for its craft brewery culture. New Belgium's announcement in Botetourt County adds to our strong food and beverage cluster and brings incredible energy to what we're doing here," said John Hull, Executive Director at the Roanoke Regional Partnership. "It's such an awesome place to walk into," Kathy said of the theater. "It's like walking back in time."



# Spring gobbler forecast

As is often the case with all things hunting, Virginia's upcoming spring gobbler season offers a mixture of good and bad news.

Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources (DWR) Upland Game Bird Biologist Mike Dye believes that hunters should expect solid action; however, turkey numbers have declined in pockets over the past half-decade or so.

"Generally, two-year-old gobblers make up the bulk of the harvest," he said. "They gobble the most and are also the age group most likely to come to calls. In 2021, we had a relatively good poult per hen (pph) ratio of 2.7, which was much better than the 2020 and 2022 pph ratios, each of which was 1.9.

"There is a caveat with the 2020 figure, though," he continued. "That year was the beginning of the pandemic, and staff drove fewer miles looking for birds, which definitely affected the number of sightings. But the reality is that there probably won't be as many three-year-olds and jakes around this spring."

Dye believes the turkey population decline is not because birds are being overhunted or because of coyotes and other predators.

"Mortality from weather is the number one killer of turkeys, specifically poults under two weeks of age," he said. "Poults can't fly up to roost until they are from 10 days to two weeks old. And for the past several springs during that time of vulnerability, we've had unseasonably, cold, wet rains. The change in weather patterns and the ill-timed weather events do appear to be linked to changes in the overall climate.

'This isn't unique to Virginia," Dye continued. "States all over the Southeast are experiencing the same population changes, and now it's starting to spread to the Northeast states as well. Some people like to blame the population declines on raccoons and covotes. But the last 20 years, we haven't seen a population increase in raccoons, and studies show that covotes actually may have a positive effect on turkey populations because they prey on some of our nest predators. Hunters often report that they've seen coyotes stalking or chasing turkeys. But coyotes are usually about as successful catching healthy, adult turkeys as my dog is catching squirrels in my backyard."

Around the state, the biologist believes the Tidewater region continues to offer the best turkey hunting because of the region's patchwork of woodlots and agricultural areas. The mosaic-type habitat in our flatlands is ideal for this big game bird. Runner-up in the turkey parade is the Southwest Mountain region. This area is basically from Blacksburg to the Tennessee line with the band of counties along the Kentucky border (Scott, Wise, and Dickinson) being the outlier as turkey numbers there are lower.

The South Piedmont (Nottaway, Lunenburg, Brunswick, Campbell, and Pittsylvania area) ranks third. Elsewhere, the Northern Mountain region continues to harbor fewer birds. This is basically the swath of counties from Botetourt to Rockingham County. The counties in the Northern Piedmont (Fauquier, Loudoun, and Culpeper) are making some significant increases as are several of the counties in the northern Shenandoah Valley (Frederick, Clarke, and Shenandoah).

Youth and Apprentice Hunter Weekend will be April 1 and 2 this year (with the regular season beginning April 8). Dye said participation in this weekend seems to have stabilized, with harvests the past two years being 651 and 613, respectively. In 2022, hunters could pursue gobblers all day an extra week, and that caused the afternoon kill to increase from 4 to 8 percent.

Overall, the afternoon harvest only made up eight percent of the total

harvest, but it made up 17 percent of the week three kill, 23 percent of week four's, and 28 percent of week five's. The biologist speculates that the relatively high afternoon harvest in week five came from hardcore hunters who were trying to tag a bird before the season ended. This spring all-day hunting begins April 24, and the season runs through May 13.

So, pattern your guns, conduct some scouting, and practice your calling. Virginia's spring gobbler season is right around the proverbial corner.

Crawford will playing for Emory & Henry College next year after choosing the Wasps from a variety of schools who desired his services. He feels he can contribute as


a freshman.

# James River softball is undefeated after three games






Nolan Medley pitches for LB in last week's game with Brookville.


The Lord Botetourt baseball team dropped two games in Salem around a win over Brookville in their final baseball games before spring break.

Radtke won a third singles and Ridge and Chase Dozier took second doubles as the Cavaliers picked up the win.


