

The Botetourt Historical Society (BCHS) and Museum provide visitors a chance to revisit some of Botetourt history through County's exhibits, education, and activities. The museum's 57-year history saw a couple of massive changes last year. One of those changes stemmed off of the county courthouse renovation project, causing the museum to successfully find a new home.

Leading up to the move of the old Breckinridge Law Offices that formerly housed the history museum, The Fincastle Herald will feature interviews with some of the individuals who

love Botetourt's rich history and help make the Botetourt County Museum of History and Culture a must-see destination.

Khari Ryder is currently going into his third year as Executive Director of the Botetourt County Chamber of Commerce. In his time at the chamber, Ryder has also become a member of the Botetourt County Historical Society's (BCHS) Board of Directors.

Historically, according to Ryder, the role of Chamber Director wasn't a responsibility to be involved with BCHS. However, due to Ryder's interest in history-particularly what he learned about the county when he first took over at the chamberhe wanted to learn more about

the history of Botetourt and the legacy of the historical society.

"For me, history has always been a huge love of mine," Ryder stated in a recent interview. "I really have a deep love for history. When I came into this position and started getting a feel for the community and the county, and coming to realization of the history that's here, I was really stimulated and personally wanted to be involved.

Ryder has a history of working in marketing, tourism, and hospitality. When he first came to Botetourt, Ryder could see how Botetourt's history can potentially play into the county's growth and also potential growth

Fincastle Town Council meets this Thursday



The Fincastle Town Council assembles for the April meeting this Thursday at the Fincastle Volunteer Fire Department Training Room at 7 p.m.

Council plans to review the Special Use Permit application submitted by Kevin and Michael Hix to operate a mobile restaurant located in the 200 block of Botetourt Road between the intersections of Route 220 (Botetourt Road) with Back Street and Federal Street. Last month, Town Council approved the food truck rezoning and remanded the item to the Planning Commission for recommendation. One correction from The Herald's report on the previous month's meeting is that the Town Council didn't approve the food truck itself. There was a public hearing, but the council made no decisions. The rezoning for the mobile restaurant was the only thing approved within the proposal at the March meeting.

A public hearing will be held regarding the

Botetourt County History



This simple wooden desk is from the historic Wren building at William & Mary College, which is the oldest college building still standing in the United States. The building contained classrooms, a dining room, a library, a faculty room, living quarters for the president and professors, a kitchen and servants rooms. When the Colonial government moved from Jamestown to Williamsburg, this large building was used as the temporary government headquarters from 1700-1704 until a capital building could be built. It was known as "The College" until 1931 when it was renamed for the famous English architect, Sir Christopher Wren.

This desk was donated to the

Emily was the longtime Executive Director of the Museum until her death in 2003. The desk was prominently displayed in the Main Gallery of the former museum behind the courthouse before that building was vacated in March of 2022. Now the desk is in storage.

Many of the other artifacts were moved to 26 East Main Street in Fincastle where the museum is now located. It is free to visit Monday-Saturday 10-2 and Sundays from 2-4.

On March 2, 2023, Appalachian Power Company ("APCo" or "Company") filed a petition ("Petition") with the State Corporation Commission ("Commission"), pursuant to § 56 585.1:9 of the Code of Virginia ("Code"), seeking approval of two new projects to provide broadband capacity to Internet Service Providers ("ISPs") in areas of Virginia that are unserved by broadband. Specifically, APCo requests approval of: (1) a project to provide middle-mile broadband Internet capacity in unserved areas of Patrick, Henry, and Franklin Counties, Virginia (the "PHF Project"); and (2) a project to provide middle-mile broadband Internet capacity in unserved areas of Giles County, Virginia (the "GC Project") (collectively, the "Projects"). Pursuant to Code § 56-585.1:9, the Commission must issue a final order on the Petition within six months of the date of filing.

According to the Petition, with the proposed Projects, APCo seeks to expand middle-mile broadband capacity in the unserved areas of Patrick, Henry, Franklin and Giles Counties. The Company states that the areas targeted by the Projects are "unserved by broadband" pursuant to Code § 56-585.1:9 D. The Company states that, for the PHF Project, the Virginia Telecommunication Initiative of the Department of Housing and Community Development ("DHCD") has issued a grant or loan to construct a broadband service project within the last 18 months, and the grant or loan recipient is the ISP to which the utility proposes to lease capacity. The Company further states that, for the GC Project, the DHCD has certified within the last 18 months that the designated area is unserved.

The Company states that the PHF Project entails the installation of approximately 380 miles of 288-strand fiber optic cable on the Company's distribution system, and the GC Project entails the installation of approximately 100 miles of 144-strand fiber optic cable. The Company states that these installations will also provide a communications platform for APCo's own distribution grid network backhaul requirements.

The Company states that it will lease a portion of the middle-mile broadband infrastructure to RiverStreet Networks of Virginia, the ISP selected by the counties to provide service to unserved areas in Patrick, Henry, and Franklin Counties, and a separate lease to GigaBeam Networks, LLC, as the ISP selected to provide service to unserved areas in Giles County. APCo states that the estimated capital investment for the PHF Project is approximately \$56.9 million, and the estimated investment for the GC Project is approximately \$12 million. APCo is not requesting cost recovery through a rate adjustment clause at this time, but expects to do so in a future filing.

Interested persons are encouraged to review the Petition and supporting documents for the details of these and other proposals.

The Commission entered an Order for Notice and Hearing in this proceeding that, among other things, scheduled public hearings on APCo's Petition. On June 27, 2023, at 10 a.m., the Hearing Examiner assigned to this case will hold a telephonic hearing, with no witness present in the Commission's controlm. for the purpose of receiving the testimony of public witnesses. in the chamber and thought that it could be advantageous for the chamber director to have a role of the BCHS Board of Directors.

One of the first aspects of BCHS that appealed to Ryder included the intimate connection that the families and individuals that make up BCHS are a living part of Botetourt's history.

"It's rare you find that," Ryder said. "The families start being the repository for the history of the area. Their daughters belong to it; their sons belong to it. Having seen that here, it's just so rare to find that. To find someone like an Ed Holt who can tell you about traditions that have gone on since the 1700s... I think we to trivialize and minimize the historical impact that we all as individuals have if we continue to carry it on. "You know the mantra 'don't live in the past, be in the present.' We can be all three things (past, present, and future) all at once. Anymore, we don't equate the past with anything. It's all about living in the now or looking to the future, but without knowing your past, experiencing present, the and preparing for the future, you've got nothing. It's impressive the sheer fact that all of this that I mentioned ties together in this locality, in Botetourt and Fincastle, specifically." Some of the factoids Ryder finds interesting included that Churchill Downs ties with the Breckinridges of Fincastle. Ryder started out his professional career as a horse trainer. His knowledge of the equestrian world brought him closer to Louisville, Ky. and Churchhill Downs, the site of the annual Derby Kentucky horse race on the first

Saturday each May.

"I'm a horse guy. I knew about the Breckinridges of Kentucky. When I came here (to Fincastle) and saw the historical law the Botetourt County offices I'm thinking, Historical Breckinridges) & (the moved west to east, bothistsoc.wordpress. not starting here and going out there. That's located at 26 East Main one of the pieces that Street in Fincastle and really astounded me. is open to the public Thinking, 'Man, this is Monday where it started.' For me Saturday to be in Louisville three a.m. to 2 p.m. and on or four times a year for Sundays from 2 p.m. the last 30-something until 4 p.m. years of my life and now tying it all together, that's been eye-opening and something I never suspected."

Recently, the chamber and BCHS have worked together to produce the "Haunted History" walking tour of Fincastle fall, 111 and also working along with the Botetourt Preservation Partnership (BPP) in producing the historic banners v now on display around the beginnings of the courthouse renovation project which begins with the physical move of the old Breckinridge Offices (the Law former location of the Botetourt Museum of History and Culture) several feet from its current location. Ryder's vision is to help BCHS spread the significance of Botetourt County and its history so that younger members of the community can hopefully take an interest as well. "History's tangible. Some people don't see it that way, but I do. People come to this area, love the beauty of it, but they're living here and have no concept of where they're truly living. I ask, 'have we fulfilled our vision?' There in lies the foundation of my passion—to help promote and perpetuate the county's historical

significance. It ties into my job but also ties into the bigger picture: the history of Botetourt County."

Response to library comments at supervisors meeting

After reading last week's article on the public comments made at the Botetourt County Board of Supervisors meeting regarding public library content, I must respond. Many of my fondest memories as a child are of our weekly trips to the Fincastle Library, particularly when school was closed for the summer. I found the library to be a treasure trove of unlocked adventure, imagination, a cornucopia of world travel to exotic places. The more I read, the thirstier I became for literature, storytelling, culture, science fiction, and the unsolved mystery. I was a just little girl from Springwood, but the library was my magic carpet.

The public commentary quoted stated libraries are housing "confusing and sexually indoctrinating" content. Since there is no public transportation in Botetourt, children are taken by a parent, guardian, caretaker. Furthermore, children under 13 must be accompanied by an adult. Isn't it up to a child's parent to decide what content is appropriate and relevant to his/her child? Is it the position of the five speakers that they know more about what your child should be allowed to read than you (the parent)?

Another quoted commentor stated there should be "an equal number of professing Christians to give a true voice" on the reconsideration committee. I was flabbergasted that a Board of Supervisors member (Billy Martin) stated that he agreed with removing referenced books from the library, while simultaneously admitting he had "no knowledge" of the content or the books. May I remind the Board of Supervisors that this country was built on Freedom of Religion and Freedom of Speech?

The ability to access free and uncensored information is a core ideal of what it means to be an American citizen. The public library (first founded in 1731 by Benjamin Franklin) is one of last socioeconomic equalizers in this great country and separates us from the likes of China and Russia. Big government has no place in deciding what Americans are "allowed" to access in a public library.

Robotics Club has averaged 8-10 members in the last couple of years, according to Painter. They compete against teams with 20 to 30 members, if not more.

"We often joke that they are 'The Little Engine That Could' because they work so hard and do so well against larger teams with greater funding," Painter said. "I am very proud of their accomplishments and we couldn't do it without dedicated sponsors, supporters, and team mentors. We have several fabulous club volunteers that devote countless hours, as do the team members, to these endeavors. Special thanks to Larry Etzler, Ralph Hayslett, Katie Jones, and many other adults and parents that chip in to help the team."

After three recent competitions, Team 3939 managed to place 39th out of 122 teams and won two awards. The road to the districts started in Blacksburg last month where Team 3939 ranked 20th with a record of 8-8 picking up a creativity award. Then, on the weekend of March 24-26, the team competed in Glen Allen, where they ranked 13th with a record of 7-6-1 and won the Industrial Design award that celebrates the team that demonstrates industrial design principles, striking a balance between form, function, and aesthetics. Last weekend's competition was the final event FIRST Chesapeake's six-week district championship contests.

"We were very proud of how we managed to perform against schools from all over Virginia, D.C., and Maryland," junior Ethan Spickard said in a recent email. "After all three of our competitions, we managed to place 39th out of 122 and won two awards, one for Creativity in our

robot design and one for Industrial Design. The things that make me most happy about how our robotics team did is that we were able to hold our own against teams with 10x the amount of people we had, teams that came from Governor's schools, and teams that worked very closely with some colleges and universities. It was also a very nice opportunity for us to meet other students from all over Virginia who had the same interests as us and had the same exact drive and dedication into building a good robot as we did."

FIRST Chesapeake is an independent non-profit that brings STEM-based leadership programs to middle and high school students in the District of Columbia, Maryland, and Virginia. Robotics is the means to teach technical concepts and practical know-how, as well as to build leadership skills and develop teamwork.

"We are always looking for upper middle school to high school-aged youth to join our team and we also welcome new sponsors," Painter added. "If anyone is interested in more information on how to join this group or to become a sponsor, they can feel free to contact me at 540-928-3210."

4-H has a long history of supporting robotics programs through 4-H clubs, after-school programs, camps, and curriculum. Through robotics, 4-H'ers learn teamwork, problemsolving, critical thinking, engineering, and design.



42nd Chance Crawford **Benefit Softball Tournament** shifts to Botetourt County






