Election 2023:

June's Republican primary candidates and voting precincts

2023 election quickly approaches. Among the offices to be on the November ballot, Board of Supervisors seats in the Blue Ridge, Fincastle, and Valley districts will be up for grabs. In terms of the upcoming Republican primary, the Blue Ridge and Valley districts are the only districts with contested races where candidates are seeking the Republican nomination. This means only four of the 10 county precincts will be open on June 20. Amsterdam, Buchanan, and Fincastle districts do not have any contested races for the primary.

Current Blue Ridge District Supervisor Billy Martin will run in the upcoming primary against Walter Michael. Mac Scothorn, current board chair, seeks the party nomination in the Valley District with Robert R. Young as

Uncontested candidates receiving the Republican party nomination that will not appear on the June ballot consist of Brandon W. Nicely for Fincastle District Board of Supervisors, Matthew T. Ward for Sheriff (incumbent), Donna C. Boothe for Treasurer (incumbent), Chris T. Booth for Commissioner of Revenue (incumbent), John R.H. Alexander II for Commonwealth's Attorney (incumbent), Terry L. Austin for House of Delegates, 37th District (incumbent), and Chris Head (current delegate in 17th House district) for Va.

Senate, 3rd District. In-person absentee voting begins at the Botetourt County Elections and Voter Registration office at 2 East Main Street in Fincastle, Friday, May 5. The office is open Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. After Memorial Day (May 29), the deadline to register or update voter registration for the

Science, agriculture, and Botetourt County are three good friends looking for place to have a good time. Fortunately for them, they'll have their day in the sun along with the local community at the first Eagle Rock Science Festival on May 13.

The inaugural event takes place from 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. at Blue Ridge Vineyard. This event will feature county science fair projects, interactive games, and hands-on activities for kids of all ages.

"Since I moved back home (Botetourt), I've always wanted to do something like this," Eagle Rock Ruritan Club President Beth Leffel said in a recent interview. "Science education is very important to me and helping people understand that science is a lot more than standing in a lab over a beaker. Agriculture is also very important to me. Agriculture and STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics) are a perfect match.

Leffel wanted to "marry" science and agriculture toward putting on an event in northern Botetourt. The Eagle Rock Ruritan Club members put their heads together and came up with the idea for a science festival with a focus on community outreach.

"We haven't been able to do anything for a couple of years because of COVID and everyone was excited to get back into the swing of things," Leffel said of

the Ruritan Club's involvement in planning the event. One important component of the Ruritan Club is promoting small businesses and community leaders. The club reached out to local business owners that





Letter to BOCO families about tackle football signups

Dear Botetourt County Recreation Sports Families, You spoke and we are listening!

We have received a lot of feedback requesting two tackle football teams in each age division and that one of those teams practice in northern Botetourt. Our goal is to have two tackle football

teams in each age division - one in the southern part (Blue Ridge, Daleville, Troutville, Cloverdale) and another in the northern part (Buchanan, Eagle Rock, and Fincastle). In order to do that, we need to have more tackle football athletes register. The teams will mirror the high schools in each part of the county - Cavaliers & Knights (which we think is pretty cool)!

Here's the skinny and what you need to know. We need at least 40 athletes to register in each age division by July 8, 2023, to create two teams. Here's a look at the age divisions: (Part of the County - Age - Division

Registration Cost) Southern BOCO (Cavs) - Ages 7 &

Southern BOCO (Cavs) - Ages 9 &

Southern BOCO (Cavs) - Ages 11 & 12 - \$100

Northern BOCO (Knights) - Ages 7 Northern BOCO (Knights) - Ages 9

& 100 - \$100 Northern BOCO (Knights) - Ages

11 & 12 - \$100 We want to create teams based on geography and schedule practice within those areas. We realize that in recent years Northern BOCO families had to

travel to Daleville to practice due to not enough athletes in Northern BOCO signing up to play. We understand this is not sustainable or easy for our families. This is where we need your help. Please help us with football recruitment by sharing this information with your community. We will also be partnering with James River High School to help with recruitment efforts and events. While we are working hard to have

at least 40 athletes registered in each age division to create two teams, we have to plan what youth football will look like if we don't get the numbers that we are hoping for. If we don't get enough players

registered to have two teams, we will combine registrations into one team like we did in 2022. If this happens, the max number of players we can have on one team is 31. If we don't reach our goal of having two different teams, then those that registered after the first 31 players

will receive a refund (registrations will be verified based on the time stamp of the registration meaning the first 31 players that register will get to play). That being said, it's very important to REGISTER EARLY so your child is guaranteed to play! If families from northern BOCO decide they don't want to play for a combined team, then we will offer a full refund.

And.... just because you live in Southern BOCO doesn't mean you can't register your child to play in Northern BOCO. You as a parent get to choose if your child will be a Cav or a Knight! We will be updating the website periodically to let the public know how close we are to our goal.

Nikki, Jennifer, and Shelby, we want to thank you for your dedication to youth recreation sports. As a mom of a child who will get to play recreational sports for the first time this year, I know firsthand how important sports are in a child's life. 

Personal letters of the era also tell of the devastation to Buchanan caused by the war including the burning of Col. John Anderson's home known as Mount Joy, the three-day Federal occupation of Oak Hill, the Anchorage, the Presbyterian Manse as well as other private homes and offices throughout town. The battle flag of the Botetourt Artillery was said to have been made from the wedding dress of Cassandra Anderson, owner of Mount Joy. The Town of Buchanan

is part of the larger Virginia Civil War Trails Program, specifically the Hunter's Raid Trail. Buchanan has four Trail markers which may be found throughout the town. The Virginia Civil War Trails Program invites visitors to experience the Civil War dramatically by tracing the five different Civil War Trails throughout the state - more than 400 sites tell stories never before told through pictures, battle maps, and clear interpretation. Travelers can spend two days or two weeks following the campaigns fought in Virginia through 79 cities and counties. Each

had a focus in ag and science to be a part of the festival

performing demonstrations and other activities for participating festival-goers, all while promoting their Some of the experiences planned for the festival

include a traditional "science fair" setup. Kids of all ages have the opportunity to participate in noncompetitive presentations. When women's fashions changed from having wide shirts or undergarments with pockets to a slim Regency style with no room for pockets, French designers created this style of drawstring bag to be carried around the wrist. 


