The Botetourt County Board of Supervisors recognized the Botetourt Chamber of Commerce Agricultural Committee and the Botetourt 4-H Extension Office for their partnership purchasing new jackets for the county's 4-H Livestock Judging Team. The funding for the new jackets was provided by the Ag Committee who donated \$500 and the remaining balance was paid for using funds from the Virginia Cooperative Extension's Botetourt office.

Buchanan District Supervisor Amy White introduced members of the committee and Livestock Judging Team to the board.

Public comments from board meeting address concerns over library content, Rails to Trails, and Rocky Forge wind project

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During the public comment portion of last week's Botetourt County Board of Supervisors citizens meeting, expressed about the content found in Botetourt County libraries.

The board heard from five individuals who claimed county libraries are housing books containing "confusing" and "sexually indoctrinating" content.

One citizen said she spoke with Virginia Congressman Ben Cline and Del. Christopher Head, who she claimed gave written support for the county to remove content held in which question,

claimed was purchased with county tax dollars "without approval." She presented solutions that included an "easy to find" removal request form and for the reconsideration committee to include "an equal number of professing Christians to give a true voice" when it comes to collection development in county libraries.

One Fincastle resident claimed he "looked online" to see what reading materials were available for children in the county's library system. He mentioned two titles he came across in his research.

The first title he mentioned is called

"Making A Baby" by Rachel Greener, a book about how families begin, which acts as is a tool for parents and their children to engage conversation on the subject. According Botetourt Library Director Julie Phillips, "Making A Baby" is not found in Botetourt County libraries based on the Roanoke Valley Libraries website (RVL. info), a shared database for library books found in the public libraries in the Roanoke Valley.

The same Fincastle resident brought a book he found in the Fincastle Library, "The Every Body Book: The LGBTQ+ Inclusive Guide for Kids About Sex, Gender, Bodies, and Families'

Board accepts developer's withdrawal request

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The Botetourt County Board of Supervisors last week approved the removal of the application submitted by TPB Enterprises LLC (Thomas Builders of Virginia). TPB Enterprises LLC (Thomas Builders of Virginia) submitted an application to the county for two special exception permits to construct the project, recommended by the Botetourt County Planning Commission by a 3-2 vote last February. Consideration of the project was then tabled by the Board of Supervisors on Feb. 28 at the request of Thomas Builders to allow the company time

to consider improvements to the project.

The initial Special Exemptions Permit (SEP) application requested increasing the number of multi-family dwelling units allowed per acre and to increase the maximum building height above 45 feet for the apartments development located along the frontage of U.S. 220, College Drive, and Old Estates Lane in Daleville.

The county sent out a press release on the Friday prior to the March 28 meeting, explaining the developer's decision to remove the request explaining

Virginia DWR announces new regulatory processes

The Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources (DWR) recently posted two new proposed regulation amendments on its Regulatory Processes on the DWR's website (https://dwr.virginia.gov/ regulations). Both of the recently proposed amendments would affect Botetourt

4VAC15-90-89: The proposal is to add private lands in Augusta, Botetourt, and Page counties to the earn a buck regulation and establish a single requirement for all counties to earn a buck regarding the number of antlerless deer (one) that must have been taken before hunters can take their second antlered deer of the season.

Within a license year and within in each individual county listed in this subsection, a hunter must have taken at least one antlerless deer on private lands in that county before taking a second antlered deer on private lands in that county. In those counties listed in the subsection east of the Blue Ridge Mountains, a hunter must have taken at least two antlerless deer on private lands in that county before




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Botetourt County History



Farming has been a part of Botetourt's history since the first colonist settled the rich land. Although oxen are not commonly used today they were important for farming because of their strength and gentle nature. This wooden yoke was made circa1815 and was used for breaking in young oxen. A yoke is a wooden beam used around the neck of a pair of oxen to teach them to pull together. Grown oxen are powerful animals and as a team can pull 12,000-13,000 pounds. (A team of horses can pull 22,000-32,000 pounds.)

It was donated to the Botetourt History Museum by Fulton T. Waid (1898-1973), who went by "Pullie." He was married to Helen Houseman (1898-1970) and they had three children, Dreama, Billie (Sis), and Robert (Bobby). Helen's parents owned and operated the Housman store, which was where the voting registrar's office is now. Pullie was a traveling salesman, a WWI Marine and a farmer. They lived at "The Farmhouse," which is at the corner of Oak Ridge Road and the Blue Ridge Turnpike. After moving to the corner of Carper and Monroe Street in Fincastle, they moved to 25 East Main Street. It was the first house in Fincastle to get a house number and is now across from the museum. Pullie was the mayor of Fincastle and an important figure in shaping the history of the area. See https://bothistsoc. Wordpress.com.

Crouch spent time sorting glasses, Heinlein loaded and unloaded the washers, and the Burtons read the prescriptions using specialized equipment and packaged them to be sent to needed locations.

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

noted that there isn't a Daleville Fire & EMS, which she believes necessary when adding an apartment complex the scale of the proposed development. said adding additional apartments would cause the need for a localized fire and rescue department. She noted that at a March 2019 board meeting a consultant spoke of Daleville needing an emergency rescue station. Blue Ridge

resident, who works in the affordable housing industry, claimed the county board broke state laws when saying that the proposed development wouldn't contain Section 8 housing. He shared thoughts that individuals who claim Section 8 will move into these apartments. The man

said the investors "won't fill the apartments" and "will find people who will." He claimed that people on Section 8 are "fantastic" but are of "low skill and will not boost our (Botetourt's) income." He further claims to the board that the developers who own the current site will potentially end up selling it in a couple of A Buchanan resident

claimed the board was "turning Botetourt County into Roanoke City" (low-income housing) and shared concerns about overpopulated schools and major transportation issues. A Cloverdale resident

recalled the 2022 meeting where the Gateway Crossing Overlay was approved by the board. He claimed their decision rushed without enough vetting. The Cloverdale man noted Exit 150

(the old truck stop exit) hasn't improved. He referred to the countywide apartment analysis in Feb. and stated that more work needs to be done with the overlay. The man then referred to the county-wide apartment analysis in Feb. and stated that more work needs to be done with the overlay and to resend and review all ongoing projects in the county.

Another Botetourt resident spoke of concern about the graveyard located next to the proposed apartment development. claimed the gravestones could disintegrate due to the vibrations from construction and is worried some of the more historic properties in Daleville would be damaged. She suggested more thought about what goes in the development site so Daleville's historic aspects are not "graded



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



Washington Jefferson National Forest is closing the Craig Creek bridge on the Appalachian National Scenic Trail for public safety. The footbridge that crosses Craig Creek, in the Brush Mountain Wilderness in Craig County, is closed to all use indefinitely.

Hikers should not use the existing bridge and should follow directions posted signs. Appalachian Trail hikers can walk through Craig Creek within 100 yards levels to recede or utilize

Every one of the world's billions of people will face injury and illness in life. No one can escape pain and suffering. When we hurt, we usually seek help. We bandage wounds, take medication, visit a physician all in an effort to gain healing.

sin? Why don't we deal with it as we do other ailments? God provided a solution for sin: repent, confess, and forsake the sin. Yet we often ignore it or let it go until it looms full-blown and potentially life-threatening (Psalm 38:5,6).

The best time to address sin is when we first experience sin symptoms. It's best to remove a sliver before it gets infected, even though it may cause momentary discomfort. In the same way we should dig out any scrap of embedded sin before it leads to something worse.

by Rachel E. Simon. He claimed the book is "basically an introduction to sex and LGBTQ lifestyles for children.' He claimed the book was located "four feet away from the Dr. Seuss display."

These and other children's materials are accessed only under the direct supervision and consent of an adult caregiver. According to Phillips, no children under the age of 13 are allowed in libraries without a parent or chaperone, and parents have full control of their children's library accounts until they turn

18 years old.
"One of things that I think people don't realize is that we have a policy in place where children are not allowed to be in the library by themselves," Phillips explained. "If they're under 13 years old, they must be accompanied by a responsible adult, who is at least 18 years old. "We expect them

(the adult) to be fully

engaged and aware of direct involvement in what that child is doing, accessing, and reading within the library space. It's the parent's right and responsibility to determine what's family and for their child. Different parents have different ideas about what's appropriate and when."

"I think the role of the library is to be as broad-based and as allencompassing as possible and to provide knowledge to people," Clinton explained. "There's a process for selecting books. There is a process for reevaluation of ones like these (books) that might be in question. As far as why libraries would carry such books, the whole idea is to shape knowledge, to connect people, and to be as are selected by a team open as any democratic institution ought to be. I think that's the very essence of the library's mission."

An Oriskany resident asked to cease the proposed Rails to Trails project on the Craig Valley railbed, claiming turning the abandoned railbed into a trail for outdoor enthusiasts as a "bad idea." He noted that over eight miles of the 26-mile trail is currently used for "regular vehicle traffic, has poor visibility," and is "not a place for vehicles and cyclists to share safely." Additionally, another

Eagle Rock citizen opposed the trail, sharing her worries about horse-riding on the trail, alleging that "bikes frighten horses." She said the building of the trail will impact residents who paid for their land along State Route 817 who live there for its serenity. She believes the multi-use trail could cause a "very dangerous situation" based on research she compiled when studying the Virginia Creeper Trail located in Abington. Another resident on State Route 817 wondered why the "residential area" along the proposed the trail is being targeted for the project with other trails that she claimed were available.

An Eagle Rock resident expressed concerns about air navigation in the proposed area of the Rocky Forge wind project. The citizen claimed that an aircraft was recently spotted in the Rocky Forge area, flying low above the resident's home close to where the proposed wind farm will be located. The woman shared concern about the project allegedly being "at no hazard to air navigation." She presented the board photographic evidence of the lowflying aircraft. The counties subject to the provisions of this subsection are Accomack, Albemarle, Amherst (west of Route 29), Augusta, Bedford, Botetourt, Carroll, Clarke, Culpeper, Fauquier, Floyd, Franklin, Frederick, Grayson, Greene, Hanover, Henrico, James City, Madison, Montgomery, Orange, Page, Prince George, Pulaski, Rappahannock, Roanoke, Rockingham (east of Routes 613 and 731), Shenandoah, Stafford, Warren, Wythe, and York.

Within a license year and within each individual county listed in this subsection, a hunter must have taken at least two one antlerless deer in that county before taking a second antlered deer in that county. A hunter must also have taken at least three two antlerless deer in that county before taking a third antlered deer in that county.

The counties subject to the provisions of this subsection are Arlington, Fairfax, Loudoun, and Prince William (except on Department of Defense lands).

Within a license year and within any city or town, except the cities of Chesapeake, Suffolk, and Virginia Beach, a hunter must have taken at least one antlerless deer in that city or town before taking a second antlered deer in that city or town. In those cities and towns east of the Blue Ridge Mountains, a hunter must have taken at least two antlerless deer in that city or town before taking a third antlered deer in that city or town.

The Earn A Buck Program does not apply to the cities of Chesapeake, Suffolk, and Virginia Beach.

Private land deer population indices for Augusta, Botetourt, and Page counties have exceeded population objectives in the department's deer management plan despite having full-season, either-sex firearms regulations already in place. Adding the earn a buck requirement is the next step to increase the harvest of antlerless deer. In addition, establishing earn a buck in Page County will make it consistent with all the other counties in Disease Management Area 2 (DMA2).

The earn a buck requirement has resulted in increased antlerless harvest and reductions in deer populations in most areas where it has been in effect. However, there has been little to no measurable difference in deer harvest or population impacts in counties having the requirement that two antlerless deer (i.e., Arlington, Fairfax, James City, Loudoun, Prince William, and York) vs. one antlerless deer (i.e., 27 other counties) must have been taken before hunters can take their second antlered deer of the season. This proposal would simplify and standardize this provision of the earn a buck regulation, requiring hunters in any locality with earn a buck to harvest only one antlerless deer prior to harvesting a second antlered deer.

4VAC15-50-11: The proposal is to add two weeks of general firearms season in 35 counties in southern and eastern Virginia and remove the three-day early firearms season from 26 counties in northern and western

Virginia, including Botetourt.


This proposal is designed to address both recent and longer-term black bear population trends to achieve objectives in the Black Bear Management Plan, which is under revision. Besides certain counties in southwestern Virginia, where the draft population objective is to slightly reduce bear populations, draft objectives for the rest of Virginia are to stabilize the bear population at 2020 levels. Increasing black bear populations in several southern and eastern management zones supports stepwise approaches to increase bear harvest in order to stabilize bear populations. In contrast, recent and ongoing bear population declines observed in several western and northern management zones necessitate reductions in harvest. Specific changes are recommended in both the general firearms seasons (Nov. and Dec.) and early three-day firearms seasons

New MLB rules getting good revues

The new Major League Baseball season is here and the question everyone keeps asking is, "How do you like the new rules?" For the most part, it seems like most people like them. The game is definitely moving along

faster. Through the first weekend the games have been an average of 20 minutes shorter than in previous years, and they're still longer than an average basketball game so that's still plenty of ball game to watch.

The difference isn't so much the length of the game, but the quality of the game you're watching. There's more action with less "down time" between pitches, and that was really the point of contention when people were saying the games were boring. No one wants to see a pitcher walk around the mound and rub up a ball, or a batter step out of the box between every pitch and adjust his gloves, helmet and whatever he's wearing under his uniform pants.

With the new rules the batter has to be in that box and the pitcher has to be ready to serve it up or there will be consequences. Here's a couple observations I had in the first games of

I was watching a game on opening day, and you know where they list the score, count, outs, batter and pitcher in a corner of your television screen? Well, on opening day that bit of information also included the clock counting down for the pitcher. I found that to be extremely distracting while watching

The next game I watched, on a different network, didn't have that and I really didn't pay attention to the pitch clock unless the umpire called an infraction. That was much better, in my mind, as far as enjoying the game.

And another thing. I'm watching the ESPN Sunday night game between the Phillies and Rangers. Trea Turner of the Phillies is on first and takes off for second. He gets a great jump and surely has the base stolen, but the pitcher doesn't start his motion in time and the umpire behind the plate calls time as Turner is running for second. A "ball" is called on the batter and Turner has to go back to first. To me, this is helping the team that

was supposed to be penalized. If I'm the pitcher I'd much rather have a ball called than have the runner advance a base. If that's how it's going to work, and I'm the pitcher, I'm going to hold the ball until the clock goes off if I think the runner got a great jump at first and won't be thrown out. Unless there are

three balls on the batter at the time, I'm sending that runner back to first. That's something they're going to have As far as the larger bases, they really

don't look any larger to me while watching on TV. The Salem Red Sox had the larger bases last year and I never would have known if I hadn't known. The bases are three inches wider on each side, and that's supposed to help

the would-be base stealers because it's

an extra three inches they don't have to

cover. I've heard that a bunch of times but, honestly, how many times is that three inches going to make a difference? Hold your fingers three inches apart and tell me, with a straight face, that's going to make a big difference. I do think it will be safer for the first basemen, who will have less of

a chance of getting stomped on by a runner heading for first. Then again, if they really want to make that safer then use the double-bag deals like they do in slow-pitch softball, where the first baseman stands on one bag and the runner can step on the adjoining one. Finally, I love the rule that says

two fielders must be on each side of second base and have their feet in the dirt. I hated those shifts. I got so tired of seeing a batter smoke one up the middle and the shortstop is right there behind the bag, or a left-hander drilling a ball that should be a base hit, only to have a "short fielder" field it for an out. There are balls that are struck that are supposed to be hits from the time you play Little League ball, and I felt like those batters were getting cheated.

Now, I heard that some teams are considering moving the leftfielder into short right when a left-handed, "dead pull," hitter comes to the plate. That's somewhat circumventing the new rules, but apparently there's no rule against it. Hopefully, there will be

All in all, I think folks like the new rules. I, for one, never complained about a baseball game being too long. When I was a kid and went to Phillies games at old Connie Mack Stadium tried to get my dad to take me the ballpark when there was a doubleheader. Back in those days you paid one price for two games, like you do in the Carolina League now, only the big league games were nine innings each instead of seven like the Salem Red Sox play. And, when the second game was over, I found myself still wanting more. My dad didn't, but I

All in all, I give the new rules two thumbs up. And if one of the thumbs gets you a stolen base because the bag is three inches closer, then so be it.
