Botetourt County History

This ink sketch of the "Blacksmith Shop-Fincastle " was done in 1978. It was donated to the Botetourt History Museum by Julia Klapproth from Blacksburg in May of 2023. The Wysong Blacksmith Shop (circa 1840) was generously shared by the Wysong family and is on Main Street across from Courthouse Square. Their ancestor Flat Wysong was a blacksmith in Fincastle. Historic Fincastle Inc. envisioned a working blacksmith shop in this building for many years. In 1992 HFI obtained a construction loan of \$12,000 from The Bank of Fincastle and through donations and volunteers restored this historic property. It will be open for tours during the Fincastle Festival September 23.

Botetourt County is pleased to announce that our Community Development Department has received two prestigious awards from the American Planning Association (APA).

During the APA luncheon, Botetourt County received the 2023 Holzheimer Economic Development Award. This statewide recognition was given to the county for its recently adopted Gateway Crossing Overlay, which is a zoning tool intended to transform an underutilized and underperforming area of the county into a vibrant, mixed-use community that benefits residents, businesses, and visitors alike. The Gateway Crossing Overlay was born out of the Gateway Crossing Area Plan, a small area plan adopted into the county's Comprehensive Plan in 2017. The plan highlights and prioritizes connectivity, mixed-use structures, multi-family residences, and enhanced

pedestrian and bicycle connections. The plan builds off existing amenities such as the Appalachian Trail and the location along three major roadways, Interstate 81, US Route 220, and US Route 11.

While developing the overlay zoning tool, county staff forged relationships with stakeholders and the broader Botetourt community through multiple meetings and workshops, online engagement tools, and direct conversations with citizens, planning commissioners, and elected officials.

This project stood out to the Awards Committee for many reasons, including: • The county's initiative to capitalize on a once-in-a-generation redesign of a major road interchange

• The innovative approach to encouraging development in a predefined growth area

• The county's use of online

engagement tools and outreach methods to encourage input

McCoy

Botetourt County Planner Jonathan McCoy was the winner of the Foxhound Award for Distinguished New Professionals. McCoy serves the community with a wide portfolio of responsibilities. He handles longrange planning projects, integrating community engagement and outreach into these projects. In addition, he serves as a staff contact on land use cases that go before the county's Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors. He is also a member of the Roanoke Valley-Alleghany Regional Commission's Transportation Technical Committee, manages contracts, pursues grant funding opportunities, and serves on the county's Budget Task Force. McCoy was also recognized for completing the American Institute of Certified Planners

(AICP).

Julie Chop, AICP, CZA, Vice President of External Affairs for APA Virginia, noted that "Jonathan's contributions to his colleagues are considerable and outsized when compared to most planners at this stage of their careers. His accomplishments demonstrate that he has the full confidence of his department's leadership, demonstrating dedication, poise, and excellence in his service to the community's planning needs."

Community Development Director Nicole Pendleton and McCoy also presented information about Expanding the Housing Landscape in Botetourt to planners attending the conference from all over the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Center undergoes major construction projects.

Three years ago, the market chose to host a Tomato Festival because of Botetourt's rich history in growing and canning tomatoes. According to an article published in 1903 by The Times Dispatch in Richmond, "Botetourt pack[ed] more tomatoes every year than [were] packed in any other county in America, save Harford County, Md. There [were] between 125 and 150 canneries, large and small."

This year's festival will

feature new attractions, including food trucks and the Homestead Creamery Ice Cream Truck. Local Botetourt musicians who are part of the Trinity Tree Travelers Old Time Band return once again to play on stage throughout the festival. Everyone can enjoy free heirloom tomato tastings and read up on dozens of agricultural fun facts posted throughout the festival. The Tomato Sandwich Contest has been postponed this year due to location change challenges.

The Botetourt Farmers

Market usually sets up each Saturday at the Daleville Town Center, but all of the market vendors will be located at the festival at Buchanan Town Park on July 29, selling local produce, meat, baked goods, and artisan crafts.

1 Samuel 18:1 through 20:42 "In everything he did he had great success, because the Lord was with him"

(1 Samuel 18:14).

If ever there were ample reason to justify retaliation, David certainly qualified. Repeatedly wronged by King Saul, David always responded with respect and love. Even when he had the opportunity to kill the treacherous king, David restrained himself. Because of his willing submission to Saul's God-given authority, David was crowned king over Israel. There are times when we too are wronged by those in authority over us. At such times, we often feel justifi ed in rebelling, thinking that we are simply standing up for ourselves. But rebellion will only reduce us to the spiritual maturity (or immaturity) level of the authority who is hurting us. Instead of rebelling, we should seek to discuss any problems with our abusive authority (Romans 12:18). If our authority continues in the abuse, then we, like David, must do all we can to protect ourselves by leaving the abusive situation. Leaving, however, does not imply license to judge our abusive authority. Only God has the right to judge and to vindicate.

Thought for Today: Abusive people are wounded people, and wounded people often hurt others.



Virginia Western expands classroom space at Greenfield

After about three years of instruction in modular classrooms, the welding program at Virginia Western Community College (VWCC) just completed its first semester in a muchanticipated expansion of the Botetourt Center at Greenfield.

The 8,900-square-foot facility includes four airy classrooms in a building adjacent to the main center and the program's welding lab. The new classrooms easily enable multimedia instruction and give instructors flexibility.

"I'm thrilled to have this opportunity right here," said Gary Young, the faculty member who leads the Welding and Metal Processing Career Studies Certificate program.

The program prepares students for careers in arc, gas, MIG and TIG welding as well as metal fabrication.

"Any of our hands-on classes are restricted to 14 students per section," Young said. "But say we have a metallurgy class – we can bounce that up on to 28. Or blueprint reading class - that's mainly a lecture class, so we can expand those numbers, and these classrooms can handle it." The facility also has space for commercial heating, ventilation and airconditioning instruction.

The new classroom space contains plenty of room for VRTEX virtual reality welding simulators made by Lincoln Electric. During a class this spring, two of Young's students donned VR headsets and practiced stick welding and metal inert gas (MIG) welding on two machines where instruction had been held earlier in the day.

As student Josh Simmons practiced stick welding, the display indicated with green to red indicators if he was on track for his angles,

travel speed, distance off the work piece, and other measures. "This will allow him to simulate very closely, without using any consumables, and without even needing supervision," Young said. "They can use this on their breaks and before class."

Simmons said he came to the welding field because of an early hobby of blacksmithing. "I was looking at other professions in metalworking. So Ι thought about welding, and I went online to see if there was any schools near me that offered welding classes, and Virginia Western did, so I just signed up."

Next to him, Josh Waldron worked on a VR simulator to practice MIG welding.

"Back in high school, I did some stick welding, my freshman year at BTEC, and since then, I haven't really thought about it," Waldron said. "I've been figuring out what I wanted to do.

So last summer I went and got a job at this company that showed me how to MIG weld. And once I started MIG welding, I fell in love with it immediately. So, I decided to go to school for it, and November of last year decided I wanted to go to welding school to get certified.

Simmons and Waldron were in the fast-track Career Studies Certificate program, which covers 17 credits of coursework in four months. Students completing the program come out with American Society Welding

certifications in stick, MIG and TIG (tungsten inert gas) welding. Demand for workers is high, with some job openings literally out the facility's back door, at Greenfield industries such as Munters and Altec.

Their classmate Sophia Lovejoy said that the program's sense of community, and how that parlays into industry was an connections, unexpected aspect of the program. "It's definitely stressed to keep the connections we made here," she said.

Lovejoy began at Virginia Western in a different program. "I decided to take a trade, and my whole family suggested welding. I was kind of not sure about it until I got here, but it's been really good so far," she said. Having the option of a fast-track program is an advantage. "It's one semester and then you get your certifications."

With the expanded classroom space Greenfield, gai at gaining those certifications is a smoother process than ever. "This is actually ideal for what we do,' Young said.



The Botetourt Metro is a one day event that replaced the old Bob McLelland Metro Golf Tournament. The McLelland Metro was cancelled by the COVID pandemic in 2020 and was not revived. In 2021, BG&SC pro Jeff Sprinkle decided to hold a one-day tournament to replace the event and this will be the third annual Botetourt Metro Invitational.

"We decided to make it a one day tournament to start the season," said Sprinkle. "The McLelland Metro was two days, but that's too long for this early in the season."

Blacksburg won the initial Botetourt Metro in 2021 and Jefferson Forest edged Salem by one stroke to win last season. Sprinkle had 18 teams signed up for the tournament this week and was expecting a few more before tee-off on August 1. Also included in the event will be the awarding of a scholarship in the name of Kip Nininger, a former state wrestling champion who was killed in a car accident in May of 2021. Chris Nininger, Chris' father, is a good friend of Sprinkle's.

Both Lord Botetourt and James River have signed up for the Metro. Lord Botetourt will have a new look as all six starters from last year's team graduated, including Virginia Tech signee Ashton Harper.

"The kids have been playing a lot this summer and it's going to be a fun group to work with," said LB coach Todd Smith. "We won't have the big gun like we had last year with Ashton, but I think they will continue to get better as they gain more tournament experience." James River coach Donna Cox is

James River coach Donna Cox is excited about her team.


