Nicely and Obenshain contend for Fincastle District supervisor

Election Day approaches this Tuesday. In Botetourt County, there are 16 items on the ballot this year, featuring a contested race for Fincastle District supervisor. The two candidates running for Fincastle supervisor are Brandon Nicely (R) and Don Obenshain (I).

Nicely moved to Botetourt from Alleghany in 1978. He is a small business owner and farmer who retired after over 30 years of service in various positions in local government (19 years in Botetourt). He currently serves on the Botetourt County Planning Commission as the Fincastle District representative. Nicely is a husband, father, and a grandfather. His family has owned a farm in the


county since the 1890s. Obenshain is a 10th generation Botetourt resident who grew up in Troutville. He

The Botetourt County Board of Supervisors unanimously approved the development of a new private school in Blue Ridge during a public hearing at its October meeting last week.

The proposed development is to operate a new private school located in the 78,000-sq.-ft. building that formerly housed the old Colonial Elementary School. Six Forty Corp. will be the owners and operators of the school. Six Forty is a registered non-profit specializing in expanding Christian education options and mission opportunities to students in Southwest Virginia. The

RVRA appoints Lanford as new CEO

The Board of Directors of the Roanoke Valley Resource Authority (RVRA) recently announced the appointment of current Botetourt County Assistant Administrator Jon Lanford as its new Chief Executive Officer (CEO). He will succeed Dan Miles, who is retiring after 16½ years in the RVRA CEO position. Lanford's last day as acting County Assistant Administrator is Nov. 10.

The RVRA is the regional solid waste management organization serving residents and businesses of the cities of Roanoke and Salem, Roanoke County, and the Town of Vinton. It operates the Tinker Creek Transfer Station in the City of Roanoke, the Salem Transfer Station in the City of Salem, and the Smith Gap Landfill, processing approximately 250,000 tons of regional solid waste annually. The CEO is responsible for directing the staff and operations of the Authority and reports to a ninemember board of directors made up of representatives of the four member localities. At its meeting on October 25, the RVRA Board of Directors approved an employment agreement with Lanford.

Board Chair Rebecca Owens said, "We are pleased to have found someone



Elections 2023: Delay in results expected; candidates

Election Day is just around the corner and the anticipation of who will be With reporting elected grows daily. totals by precinct for all absentee voting comes the increased time after the polls close to obtain the unofficial results.

"Results may not be available as early as in past elections," County Registrar Traci Clark said in a recent email. "This is due to the change in reporting absentee totals by precinct and the time it takes for the results tapes to run once the polls are closed. There are more offices and candidates on this ballot than last November's ballots as well. It took over 45 minutes for the final results tape to run with less than 200 ballots being scanned during our logic and accuracy testing. There are also several offices that have candidates running write-in campaigns which also increases the time to run the results tapes.

'Some precincts may take less time depending on the number of offices and candidates on their ballots but overall, you may notice a delay. Be assured that my office and the election officers will work diligently to get the results reported as accurately and soon as possible.

For town offices, there will also be a delay due to the write-ins for the open seats. Write-ins will not be reviewed until the day after the election during the canvass of votes. The total number of write-in votes will be reported on election night but the breakdown by specific name will not come until after canvass is completed. Again, these results will be reported as soon as possible.

"As leaders in the parties, county, and as candidates, I ask that you help spread the word on the potential delay, Clark added. "Voters have little concept of the processes required after the polls close on election night and I am sure a delay may fuel rumors of misconduct. As laws change, so do the processes and usually they add time to the end-of-night requirements. No totals can be pulled until the polls close at 7 p.m. per state

Saturday, November 4 is the final day for early voting. The Registrar's Office will be open 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m. Voters must report to their assigned precincts

on Election Day to vote. No voting takes place in the Registrar's Office on Election Day. Voters can check their polling location on the Virginia Department of Elections website (vote.virginia.gov) or by calling the Registrar's Office at 540-928-2120.

The 2023 Election Day Ballot

Write-in candidates are allowed on all offices if not choosing a listed candidate. Offices with multiple seats open can have multiple write-ins. The total number of candidates a voter can vote for is listed below each office name on the ballot. Below is a list of the items on the November 2023 ballot in Botetourt County that include the state Senate race in the 3rd District between Christopher Head (R) and Jade D. Harris (D) and the 37th District House of Delegates contest between Terry Austin (R) and Stephanie R. Clark (D).

Seats are open in the elections for Buchanan (2) and Troutville (3) town councils. Marlon Rickman (Buchanan) and Laura Bumgarner (Troutville) are the only names on those ballots for both town's council seats, respectively.





project will be overseen by a board of directors. Enrollment is proposed to be Kindergarten through 12th grade. Hours of operation will be from 8:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. No external changes are being proposed to the site.

Blue Ridge District Supervisor Billy Martin shared during the hearing, "It's something that they (Six Forty) are proud of. It's something they've worked on for months. They want to see this (school) start and use it for what it's been used for in the past and that's to educate children. I would certainly support this and I would like to see us approve this so they can get on with the work and get this thing opened up and working for the community. I think they've done good work trying to get this built up."

The building will feature administrative office space, approximately 20 classrooms, an auditorium, a library, a multimedia center, nurse's office, music room, gymnasium, and cafeteria. The former elementary school facility hasn't been used since it was vacated in 2021.

Repairs are required to the interior of the building, primarily caused by damage to the building's roof. In addition to education and administrative staff, the school will employ both a building manager and a maintenance manager. According to Six Forty's website, the school seeks to occupy at least 92% of the building's allowable occupancy in order to achieve financial self-sustainment. A building and zoning permit will be required to show conformance to

all applicable building and zoning standards. In addition to educational and administrative staff, the school will employ a building manager and a maintenance manager.

A county representative shared that they received comments prior to the meeting "all in favor" of the request. During the hearing the board heard comments from citizens who also spoke in support of the new school and thanked the supervisors for their consideration of the project.

party and that led him to receive an appointment at West Point. After four years and graduating at West Point, Stan selected the infantry branch and began training at Fort Benning, Ga., including Airborne and Ranger school. He then reported to Fort Bragg, N.C. for duty with the 82nd Airborne Division. Stan tells us he was married the day after Easter in 1957 to Connie, whom he met on a blind date and were only together seven times before they married. At Fort Bragg, their daughter Lesa was born and we laughed when he said she was born 9 months and 7 days later!

Stan was sent to Mainz, Germany for three years in the 504th Airborne Battle Group as first lieutenant and became an adjutant up in the headquarters. His primary job was executive officer of Airborne Riffle Company. In Germany their son Eric was born. In 1961 Stan returned to Fort Benning for the Officers Advance Course, followed by two years at the University of Southern California to earn master's degrees in both Aeronautical and Mechanical Engineering. He then served three years on the West Point Faculty in the Department of Earth, Space, and Graphic Science.

During his teaching he taught the first computer course to the cadets. Stan said they brought the first modern day computers into the classroom and it was as tough on them as it was the cadets! In 1967, Stan headed for Vietnam, served with 173rd Airborne Brigade six months on the staff and then six months out in the field during the major military assault of North Vietnamese and communist Viet Cong with South Vietnam. One experience Stan tells us of the first big day of the TET Offensive, he was in a little Air Force plane flying over Northern Vietnam dumping out leaflets. It was one of many dangerous days to be there when both Vietnamese and U.S. military forces suffered massive

Stan went to the Pentagon after graduating from the Command & General Staff College in Fort Leavenworth, Kansas and served in the office of the Army Assistant Vice Chief of Staff. We did find it interesting that when he was operation officer he had to write the "Battle of Dak To," writing a presidential units citation for the 173rd Airborne Brigade; the writing of the battalions that were hurt badly but were heroes. The draft was written up and approved later on.

Stan also worked on and reviewed the recommendations to the Chief of Staff when he was in the Pentagon with the Assistant Vice Chief of Staff. This was also a challenge as he said no one liked them as this was a difficult job making this job description for the

Four-Star Officer. During his time at the Pentagon he was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel. In 1972 Stan deployed to Korea and the 2nd Infantry Division, where he commanded 1st Battalion (Mechanized), 17th Infantry.

A year later, he was assigned as Assistant Chief of Staff of the Continental Army Command at Fort Monroe, Va. It was interesting to learn how the towns there have changed over time as the houses are now all occupied by civilians and not soldiers. Stan also attended the Army War College at Carlisle Barracks, Pa.. then returning to Fort Monroe. His last assignment was Chief of Training Development and Director, Programs, and Resources for the Deputy Chief of Staff for training.

In 1980, Stan retired from military service and joined Burdeshaw Associates in Bethesda, Md., as their second employee. He became Chief Financial Officer as the company made the INC 500 list and grew into a successful business. Stan continued to impress us when in 1993 he returned to work for additional 10-year career with Cubic Defense Systems as Director of Eastern Business Development.

It was a grandchild that brought them to Troutville where they have resided since 1988. While sitting next to Connie on the couch, we were fascinated by her unique pewter like bracelet with Stan's name engraved from USMA. She said it was Stan's napkin ring holder that he used everyday in the mess hall all four years as a cadet. The bracelet is absolutely stunning and Connie never takes it off to this day. Stan celebrated his 90th birthday last March with a large gathering of his family and friends at the local Stoney Brook Vineyard in

Fincastle supervisor says Ruhl's statements untrue

I am writing this letter to correct gross misstatements made in the letters to the editor in last week's Fincastle Herald, and is now being broadcast across social media in a last-ditch effort to sway voters as we approach Election Day.

In his letter in support of the Independent candidate for the Fincastle Board of Supervisors seat, Charles Ruhl stated that the county is "\$119 million in debt." His statement is intended to lead the reader to believe that the county has borrowed this amount of money. This statement is not true. In fact, the county's most recent audited financial statements show that the total amount of the county's borrowings is \$74.8 million. This balance is comprised of the following:

Construction of the new Colonial Elementary

School – \$19,780,000

Firefighting Equipment, a remaining school loan and debt premium costs - \$3,680,683 Remaining balance on Jail Construction Costs -

Remaining balance on James River High School

renovations – \$5,525,000

Multiple School Building Renovations Greenfield Industrial Park Expansion

Planned construction of a new County Courthouse

\$27,550,000

Total - \$74,799,633

Mr. Ruhl's comments are intended to imply fiscal irresponsibility on behalf of the board. This, too, is untrue. The county works with financial advisors to carefully plan any potential financing, and to ensure that appropriate debt limits are maintained. For fiscal year 2024, debt payments comprised 5% of the total county and school budgets. The county holds a bond issuer Aa1 credit rating, and its debt level is in line with, or less than, comparable Virginia localities. This board has performed its duties and met its obligations in a fiscally responsible manner, all the while keeping taxes low (as he notes in the final sentence of his letter).

The county's financial statements are subject to annual independent audits, and these independent auditors, in their associated reports, consistently commend the county's fiscal management. In addition, for the past 16 years in a row, the county has been recognized by the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) and has received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting. The amount of the county's borrowing to support

county services and facilities, and ultimately what level of services is appropriate, is a fair topic for public debate. Misrepresenting the facts for partisan promotion of a candidate is inappropriate and The Fincastle District needs a pragmatic and

dedicated leader to protect our fiscal strength, with a proper mix of development and diversification of our tax base. That leader is Brandon Nicely. Additionally, the Valley District needs to re-elect







Cavaliers move into third in region with win over Northside in football

Last Friday's Lord Botetourt win over Northside, combined with Christiansburg's loss at Salem, moved the Cavaliers into third place in the Virginia High School League Region 3D standings with one week to go.

Botetourt is now behind only undefeated Magna Vista and 8-1 William Byrd in the standings. Magna Vista has a rating of 27.7 and plays 2-7 Mecklenburg County this week, so the Warriors are all but locked into the top spot. Byrd is at 26.5 and the Terriers finish up with a trip to Northside, the 11th ranked team out of 13 Region 3D teams. LB is now at 25.1, and a win over Class 5 Franklin County in Rocky Mount Friday would lock up the third seed and an opening round home game in the playoffs with a possible rematch with William Byrd in the region semifinals.

"Right now all I'm worried about is staying healthy," said LB coach Jamie Harless. "We've been battling some injuries and we need to be as healthy as possible for the playoffs. We had some kids out last week, but some others stepped up and did a good job for us."

Even with some backups in key spots the Cavaliers had little trouble with Northside, winning 47-21. The Cavs jumped to an early 14-0 lead when Jakari Nicely scored on a seven-yard run and Cody McConnaughey recovered a fumbled snap on a punt attempt in the Northside end zone.

The Vikings answered with a 15-yard well to beat them.'

TD pass but Nicely scored on a threeyard run, then passed to Tristan Overbay for a 15-yard score to give LB a 28-7 lead

Northside's Mykell Harvey cut the lead to 28-14 with a 72-yard TD run early in the third period, but again the Cavaliers answered. 
Lord Botetourt wins district volleyball tournament

to 13-8 on the season. They're the




