

A new convenience store could be on the way to Daleville

Bohler Engineering recently submitted a Special Exception Permit (SEP) to the Botetourt County Planning Commission for the development of a convenience store with fuel sales on the southwest corner of Roanoke Road and Glebe Road in Daleville. The project scope includes the development of a onestory, 5,915-sq.-ft. convenience store with gas on a 56-acre parcel.

The proposed site area will be 2.22 acres. The existing site is currently vacant. In the application, the applicant states that the proposed convenience store and fuel station will provide a much-needed service to both residents and commuters in the vicinity, offering essential goods and fueling services in a convenient location.

In other matters on the planning agenda, Fralin & Waldron Inc requests

a change of proffered conditions that would amend the Core, Edge, Workplace areas shown on the Designated Use Plan for the Daleville Town Center, located adjacent to Glebe Road (Route 675) and Broad Street and identified as tax parcels 88-G(1)1 and 88-33C.

Also, the Botetourt County Board of Supervisors has authorized consideration of a Comprehensive Plan amendment to show certain Western Virginia Water Authority CIP projects on the Sewer & Water Infrastructure Map #37 in accordance with Section 25-581.4 Comprehensive Plan amendment and review of the Botetourt County Code.

Botetourt County Sheriff's Office reveals new uniforms

The Botetourt County Sheriff's Office revealed their new uniforms in the fall after a uniform committee recognized the need for a new uniform that meets the needs and the demands of modern policing.

The decision to transition to a new uniform was made after careful consideration and feedback from both the uniform committee and Sheriff's Office staff. The committee collaborated with leading uniform manufacturers and distributors for public safety professionals, to ensure they were getting a practical, durable, and functional uniform.

"Our new uniform represents a significant step forward for our department by equipping our deputies with the best tools to perform their duties," said Sheriff Matt Ward in a fall release. "I understand the importance of fiscal responsibility, and I am pleased that the transition to our new uniform

was accomplished without any additional financial burden to the

taxpayer or our budget.' The Botetourt Sheriff's Office received its fifth re-accreditation award in December. The county played host to the Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commission (VLEPSC) meeting. Botetourt County Sheriff Matt Ward is currently one of the state's 12 commissioners. The Sheriff's Office was reviewed through an evaluation of over 189 files consisting of thousands of comprehensive standards and best practices the agency was required to meet. In addition to file reviews, personal interviews were conducted with various staff members, reflecting all ranks levels and assignments. The assessment resulted in 100% compliance with all program standards under the process for accreditation by VLEPSC.

4-H staying active in the county

Botetourt County 4-H plays an important role within the community. In 2023, the organization involved in local events in an educational and entertaining capacity. 

Lord Botetourt girls finish third in big Tennessee basketball tournament


