



First Bank Fall Run scheduled for October 19

First Bank Fall 5K and 10K Run is scheduled for Saturday, October 19, beginning at Central Academy Middle School and winding through the beautiful and historic Town of Fincastle. Registration is available at First Bank Fall 5K & 10K Run (runsignup.com). The Fall Run has an

extensive history. Each year First Bank is asked the same question: "Why do you continue?" Well, after so many years, they have many reasons why but when it comes down to it ... they say it's about loyalty and commitment. When Richard Pauley,

a local cross-country advocate, approached The Bank of Fincastle (now First Bank) in 1985, the bank seized the opportunity. The idea of contributing to the health and physical wellness of Botetourt's children while involving people from all areas of the county was a project the bank welcomed. Each year prior to the

First Bank Fall Run, the bank sends information and posters to promote the race in the schools of Botetourt County. The Botetourt County Public School system graciously serves as a joint sponsor for the event, providing the use of the school grounds in and around Central Academy Middle School for the race. During the early fall local middle and elementary schools form teams and begin practices. They learn team building and set goals together. First Bank is proud of how this event has become an intricate part of the community.

The Fall Run is always the third Saturday in October. In 1987, the first race began with just over 150 runners. In 2023, more than 600 registered! This year the bank expects to break that record as participants run through the streets of Fincastle toward the finish line. Many different individuals participate: young, old, serious worldclass competitors and some who simply walk for the sheer pleasure of it.



Bank everyone to have a good time doing something that promotes a healthy lifestyle while building community and character. People have asked, "What do you do with all the proceeds from the race?" The proceeds go towards scholarships to students at James River and Lord Botetourt High Schools. The scholarship application process is very thorough and requires that students have competed in at least one of First Bank's Fall Runs. Included with their application they need letters of recommendation and to be involved in a running sport at their high school. The scholarships are in the amount of \$1,000 per student. The recipients this year were Lord Botetourt graduate Erna Dietrich and James River graduate Drew Whitson.

The low entry fees help cover the cost of the custom shirts. The bank wants any child who wishes to participate to be able to afford it. First Bank Regional President Todd Ross said,

"You just have to be there. It is amazing to see the faces of each runner as they start and finish their run. It all begins with 'Runners, take your mark,' then you hear the smack of running shoes on the pavement and the cheers and clapping of those who faithfully watch from the sidelines. In just under 15 minutes the first runner will cross the finish line, exhausted yet exhilarated. Then, runner after runner crosses the finish line, each one a winner because they had a goal and they accomplished it. Few people realize the magnitude of organizing an event of this For the first 30 years

Richard Pauley dedicated thousands of hours managing and organizing the race. Now a dedicated team of bank employees forms a committee to oversee the race. They, along with many other volunteers from the bank and community serve as road guards, split timers, packet pick-up and registration helpers.

Local student artists are invited to submit an entry into a contest to design the logo for the race shirt. This year the winning artist was Colonial Elementary School student Scharlotte Rock. She will receive a \$100 check as her award in addition to having her artwork displayed on hundreds of race T-shirts.

First Bank teams with Mountain Junkies to provide professional chip timing. The chip timing system allows for accurate and almost instantaneous race results. Every bib has a chip attached that begins the runner's time when they cross the mat at the starting line and ends when they cross the mat at the finish.

On the day of the race the Botetourt County Sheriff's Department closes the streets to keep runners

Early voting underway in Botetourt County

general November 5 election began last Friday, Sept. 20. All registered oters can vote early in the Registrar's Office at 2 East Main Street in Fincastle, Monday-Friday 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. The office will also be open on Saturday, October 26, and Saturday, November 2. The last day to vote early in person is November 2.

This year's elections will cover the offices of President of the United States, United States Senate, House of Representatives 6th District, and local elections in the towns of Fincastle, Buchanan, and Troutville.

This year's

will also include a proposed Constitutional Amendment regarding a tax exemption currently available to the surviving spouses of soldiers killed in action that the exemption should or should not also be available to the surviving spouses of soldiers who died in the line of duty. Absentee ballots were

mailed on Tuesday, September 17. Those ballots can be returned personally by the voter to the Registrar's Office, put in the drop box in the office vestibule, or through the mail. If a resident received a vote by mail absentee ballot but wants to vote in person (either during early voting or on Election Day), the resident needs to bring the

MAAG Gala celebrates 65th anniversary

MAAG Gala in Eagle Rock, a part of the MAAG Group, a global leader in customizable process technology systems for the polymer, chemical, petrochemical, food industries, is its 65th marking anniversary. Originating in the

late 1950s, MAAG Gala began as Gala Industries, founded in a basement in Eagle Rock. The first product was the Di-D-Klip, a small

stainless-steel clip for baby \$5,000 in its debut year. pharmaceutical, and By 1988, with the advent of disposable diapers, the Di-D-Klip operation was sold. In the mid-1960s,

Gala founders Vernon "Buck" Dudley and John Pauley designed and built Gala's first dryer in an Eagle Rock garage. The second and third dryers

were manufactured in diapers, generating under Eagle Rock at its current facility. The early units were shipped to Japan and Germany. By the late 1960s, Gala expanded with land acquisitions four miles south of Eagle Rock, developing the John Pauley Plant from an initial 6,500 square feet to its current expanse of





In defense of books Sen. Head wants removed from library

At the August meeting of the Botetourt County Board of Supervisors, State Senator Chris Head challenged two books in our county library, saying they should be removed (The Roanoke Times, 8/27/24). His staff later told me the two books in question were "You Know, Sex" by Silverberg and Smyth, "Queer, There, and Everywhere: 23 People Who Changed the World" by Prager. Prompted by Senator Head's challenge, I've read both books in

their entirety, and I feel compelled to respond. He claimed one

book (presumably "You Know, Sex") showed a cartoon assortment of boys and girls, all in the nude, while discussing menstruation. The closest I could find was a group of females, all clothed, having such a discussion. Furthermore, he is reported to have claimed the same book advises children to watch pornography to learn about their sexuality.

While the book acknowledges that pornography exists, the book, if anything, is steering youth away from pornography, based on these quotes from pages 360-364: "Porn is made for adults... as a fantasy." is not meant to teach us anything. What we learn can be inaccurate and confusing." "It's not made for young people and not made to teach...it doesn't help us think through our confusion." Also in the same section, the authors even warn of possible addiction.

Head called the other book "blatant revisionist history." In this book, the author has descriptions of 23 individuals, and for each the author cites something about the person that highlights their contribution to the world, in addition to providing information which indicates or substantiates that the person was also in the LGBTQ community. The author does not appear to have just created speculation about the 23, as she included multiple references regarding each person. I suggest this is not so much revisionist history, as it is an



Botetourt's role in the Battle of Point Pleasant - Part 1

Editor's note: This is the first of two articles to recognize the 250th anniversary of Dunmore's War, the 1774 conflict that culminated with the Battle of Point Pleasant on October 10 of that year. This article summarizes some of the reasons that led up to the battle that was fought in what was then the four-year-old Botetourt County. The second article next week will examine the battle itself, the colonists involved and the aftermath that some historians credit as the first battle of the American Revolution.

The stage was set five decades before Dunmore's War and its defining battle at the mouth of the Kanawha River where it meets the Ohio River at Point Pleasant, now West Virginia.

The river intersection was in Botetourt County in 1774, and on October 10 of that year - 250 years ago - Point Pleasant became the bloodiest encounter that colonists and Native Americans would have.

The Battle of Point Pleasant ended with victory for the militia units from Botetourt County and and the recently formed Fincastle County (now the Commonwealth of Kentucky), and it provided Virginia's colonial governor, John Murray, Lord Dunmore, the opportunity to officially extend the British controlled areas of the western and southern frontier to the Ohio River. That came with the Treaty of Camp Charlotte right after the Point Pleasant encounter. That agreement with some of the Native Americans made the Ohio River the dividing line between Native American and British territory. It was supposed to cool the conflicts with settlers in what had been considered the Natives' territory since 1763.

But all of the Native American tribes did not subscribe to the new boundary.

The Treaty of Camp Charlotte was just the latest in a series of treaties that were supposed to divide the Native American grounds from those of the British colony. Among them was the 1722 treaty that was supposed to establish the Blue Ridge Mountains as the dividing line, leaving the Valley of Virginia to the Natives. But settlers ignored that line and began moving up the valley from Pennsylvania, even settling in what is now Botetourt County by the 1740s.

An incident in 1742 near the mouth of what is now the Maury River at the James River that left settlers and Natives dead resulted in another treaty that set the middle of the Appalachian Mountains as the dividing line, allowing more settlement in the Valley of Virginia.

As with previous and subsequent treaties, the colonial government failed to enforce the treaties' provisions on settlers and land speculators.

The next significant treaty came at the end of the French and Indian War.

It was nearly a dozen years from the end of the French and Indian War until many of those living in the 13 colonies had enough of Great Britain's "overreach." Taxes, regulations, no representation in the British Parliament, required tax support for the Established Anglican Church of England and a condescending approach created "family" tensions between the Motherland and her American colonists. Near insurrection had already raised its head in other colonies, and in Virginia, Lord Dunmore was challenged by the growing sentiment that Virginians were not being treated as full British subjects.

The end of the French and Indian War/Seven Years War resulted in the 1763 Treaty of Paris when France gave up its claim to all the land east of the Mississippi River. Shortly after, Britain established a Proclamation Line that was supposed to prevent colonial settlements beyond the Appalachian Mountains, in the hopes it would appease Native Americans and reduce the chances of another extended conflict.

There was a problem, though. The Treaty of Paris helped open the frontier to even more settlers who poured up the Valley of Virginia and across the Blue Ridge Mountains looking for opportunities and cheap land. They didn't adhere to the line established by Britain as a western "border," rather

continued cross the Appalachian Mountains into what is now West Virginia and Kentucky. This created more conflicts between settlers and the Native Americans to the point that attacks on settlers became common. In Virginia, land

speculators, the gentry class and veterans of the French and Indian War took exception to the Proclamation Line because many had been promised land grants from 50 to 5,000 acres as part of their service during the war. Many of those grants were in the Kanawha River Valley and along the Ohio River. In

a way, it was a sleight of hand, and a grievance that Lord Dunmore hoped to assuage with his frontier war in 1774.

There was much suspicion about Lord Dunmore's motives leading up to the war's major battle at Point Pleasant. Four months before the Battle at Point Pleasant, Lord Dunmore had dissolved the Virginia House of Burgesses because it had passed a resolution making June 1 a day of fasting, humiliation and prayer. That was in recognition of the day the Port of Boston was being closed by the British Parliament over perceived

insurrection in that city.

On May 27, 87 members of the justdissolved House Burgesses met at Raleigh Tavern Williamsburg and formed an "Association" to defend "the constitutional rights and liberty of British America" and proposed an annual "general congress" of the colonies, according to Jim Glanville's historical look at The Fincastle

Resolutions published in "The Smithfield Review" in 2010. Three days later this new association issued a summons to all the members of the former House of Burgesses

August 1 in Williamsburg. Glanville wrote, "The summons noted oncoming 'alarming crisis' and said the convention would deal with matters of "lasting importance to all America." The former members

of the House were instructed to meet with citizens of their respective communities to get a sense of what the counties desired. Generally, the committees that met under these instructions passed resolutions and sent them to the August convention with their representatives.

Since Botetourt County and Fincastle

engaged with preparations for Lord Dunmore's War, their committees did not send resolutions until early 1775. But those resolutions were stronger than many of the ones from the first 40 county committees to adopt language with grievances government.

against the colonial As these events were unfolding across Virginia and in other colonies, the militia units from Botetourt and Fincastle Counties were preparing and beginning their marches to the predetermined meeting point at Point Pleasant where Lord Dunmore



"They're a spread team and they appear to be pretty athletic," said Harless. "They have three or four kids who could play for anyone.'



River girls take third volleyball tournament in Springwood



The Cavaliers were scheduled to open BRD play Tuesday in Moneta against Staunton River but results were too late for publication. On Thursday they host




