Christiansburg Parks and Recreation receives tourism marketing grant

The Town of Christiansburg Parks and Recreation has received a \$1,250 grant for its Rockin' Main Street Concert Series.

The town will partner with local groups to supply \$625 in matching funds for the project. Each spring and fall the Town of Christiansburg invites the community to come out and celebrate food and music in downtown Christiansburg. The Rockin' Main Street Concert events feature live performances by a variety of bands and local food and drink vendors.

Virginia Governor Glenn Youngkin

announced that Virginia Tourism Corporation (VTC) awarded more than \$2.7 million for 259 local and regional tourism marketing programs across the state to help increase visitation and revenue for Virginia's localities through tourism.

"We are so excited to be selected for this grant that will help in our efforts to bring community members to downtown events," said Parks and Recreation Director Brad Epperley. "Events like our Rockin' Main Street Concert Series provide a connective and fun atmosphere that our residents, businesses, and visitors alike

can enjoy. This is another stepping stone for the Town of Christiansburg as we continue to emphasize our town as a vibrant and progressive place to live, work and play."

Regional representatives are also recognizing Christiansburg for its efforts to bring residents together.

"What a way to help kick off National Travel and Tourism Week," said David Rotenizer, executive director for the Blacksburg-Christiansburg-Montgomery County Regional Tourism Program. "It is yet further proof of Christiansburg's

role in helping to make our community a regional and statewide destination."

"These grant funds provide an important opportunity for communities across the commonwealth to accelerate recovery efforts and continue with their best-in-class marketing initiatives to attract new travelers," said Rita McClenny, president and CEO of Virginia Tourism. "Increased visitation translates directly into revenue generation, underscoring tourism's important role in stimulating economic growth and expansion."

Virginia Breeze ridership rebounds, Radford becomes a popular stop

Ridership on the Virginia Breeze intercity bus service has been rebounding, with overall ridership up 56% from March 2021 to March 2022.

With the Highlands Rhythm launching last year, Radford has demonstrated itself to be a popular stop for riders. Ridership on the new route has nearly doubled since it started in November.

Highlands Rhythm launched in November 2021 with 639 riders. It had 1,126 total passengers in March 2022. After Harrisonburg, Radford is the second-most popular departure location with 86 people departing from there in March 2022. Another 85 people rode the Breeze to Radford as their destination stop, again, the second-most popular destination stop after Harrisonburg.

The Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation (DRPT) launched the Virginia Breeze intercity bus program in 2017, providing a vital transportation connection between rural Virginia communities and the national bus network. The Virginia Breeze started with the Val-

ley Flyer (Blacksburg-Washington), and then added two new routes — the Piedmont Express (Danville-Washington) and Capital Connector (Martinsville-Richmond-Washington) — in summer 2020. The Highlands Rhythm route connecting Bristol and Washington launched in November 2021.

"The Virginia Breeze opens the doors for people who don't have cars or don't drive, who have limited means, to connect to other parts of Virginia and beyond," said Jennifer DeBruhl, Acting Director of the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation. "Intercity bus services are essential transportation infrastructure because they operate in areas that lack transportation options for Virginians."

The COVID-19 pandemic hit the intercity bus industry hard, including the Virginia Breeze halting its service for almost four months from April to July 2020. Since then, ridership has steadily

Glencoe Mansion marks Earth Day with tree plantings

RADFORD – Some 15 representatives from local communities gathered on Earth Day, April 22, to plant trees purchased with money from a clean water and reforestation grant project underway at Glencoe Mansion and the Mary Draper Ingles Cultural Heritage Park in the City of Radford.

Nick Lancaster, Radford city horticulturist, told the group that the project represents much more than planting trees. "It also provides education and public outreach," he said. "The undertaking is the result of a partnership between Glencoe and the city. Not only do these plantings improve aesthetics, but they also add to the tree canopy and reduce runoff and erosion."

Johnny Vest, area forester for the Virginia Department of Forestry, which funded the grant, pointed out that projects like this one help the commonwealth toward its goal of improving urban watersheds. "We're also pleased to contribute to making this a beautiful, picturesque setting," he said.

Thompson Tire bought by Tire Discounters

Tire Discounters has extended its footprint in Virginia, acquiring two more dealerships in the state with a combined seven locations.

The Cincinnati-based family-owned dealership said it is acquiring Thompson Tire and its six retail stores and Bobby's Tires & Auto Care, with two locations.

Radford, Va.-based Thompson Tire has locations in Christiansburg, Pulaski, Radford, Roanoke, Salem and Wytheville, while Bobby's Tires' locations are both in Franklin.

Financial terms were

not disclosed.

Late last year, Tire Discounters acquired Tire Outfitters Inc., a single-outlet dealership in Winchester.

The recent flurry of activity boosts Tire Discounters to 170-plus locations in Alabama, Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio, Tennessee and Virginia. Tire Discounters now operates a dozen retail stores and one commercial center in Virginia.

Tire Discounters President and CEO Jamie Ward called Thompson Tire a perfect match for the company.

"Virginia is a terrific market where we have an incredible opportunity to grow," he said. "Adding Thompson Tire is a great fit for us because they are family-run stores, which are the heart and soul of the tire business and the heart and soul of Tire Discounters."

Ward noted that Thompson Tire is a Goodyear dealer, just as Tire Discounters is. In addition, Thompson Tires, founded in 1968, aspires to the same family values and dedication to its community as Tire Discounters.

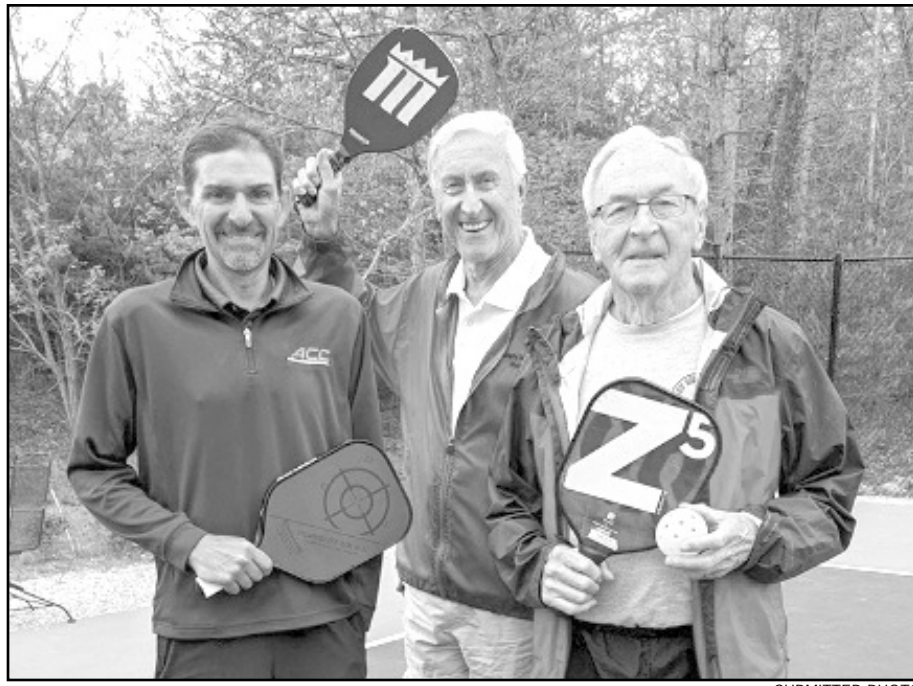

in each garden throughout the day to assist the garden owners in answering questions related to the garden. Master gardeners also promote and highlight the sustainable features of each garden such as drought tolerant plants, mulching methods, and irrigation techniques.

The city was also represented by Mayor David Horton, who praised the project and shared his thoughts on how trees are time capsules that tell the story of a community. “This state grant helps us continue to make Radford the special place it is,” Horton said. “We’re bringing more public awareness to what trees can

do for a community.”

Scott Gardner, Glencoe’s director, exceeded the program and talked about how the museum continues to bring recognition to the city. Gardner said that the facility has been recognized on both the Virginia Landmark Register and the National Register of Historic Places.

“Our latest project, the Cultural Heritage Park, is home to a stunning statue of the colonial heroine Mary Draper Ingles and the award-winning New River Train Observatory,” Gardner said. The property, he added, has also been recognized as a Virginia Treasure by the Department of Conservation and Recreation.

increased on all four routes. In March of this year, 4,834 people traveled on the Virginia Breeze across the Commonwealth.

Ridership for the Valley Flyer, which runs along Interstate 81 in western Virginia and is the busiest Virginia Breeze route, has returned to levels seen prior to the pandemic. In March, the Piedmont Express had its highest ridership since beginning service in August 2020. The Capital Connector also saw year-over-year growth. And the Highlands Rhythm has nearly doubled its ridership since the route started.

The Virginia Breeze program is funded through the

Federal Transit Administration’s Intercity Bus Program. Additionally, the Highlands Rhythm, which travels along most of Interstate 81, was among the first multimodal projects to receive funding through the Interstate 81 Corridor Improvement Program. The Interstate 81 funding offsets a portion of the Highlands Rhythm operating costs and will fund improvements at some stop locations.

The Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation is currently conducting a study to explore the possibility of adding a fifth Virginia Breeze route, serving eastern Virginia.

Two receive outstanding community service awards from DAR chapter

The awards were given by the Alleghany Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution for Outstanding Community Service by Karen Spicer Finch, Regent of the Alleghany Chapter.

A lifelong resident of Blacksburg, Campbell is the president of the Sojourner Center for Hospice Care. The center will offer a home-like environment to the terminally ill, which means clients can avoid the impersonal nature of a hospital and have their families with them as they approach the end of life, yet have medical care available when needed. In a progress report to the group, Campbell said there are no similar hospice facilities in the New River Valley at this time. In her remarks, she also said that twenty-seven acres of land in the vicinity of Warm Hearth and LewisGale Hospital-Montgomery have been donated for the project. Campbell is a retired

OB/GYN nurse practitioner with LewisGale Hospital-Montgomery and was at Radford Community Hospital as a registered nurse. She has been quoted as saying "Death is similar to birth in that we have only one chance to get it right." Campbell has also served on the Montgomery County School Board's committee to develop the first Family Life Education curriculum and has served on various committees and boards including Planned Parenthood, Perinatal Care, and as a teacher of various community and hospital-based education programs for teens and preteens, contraception, osteoporosis, and genetic testing in pregnancy. He was on the advisory committee for The Women's Center at Virginia Tech.

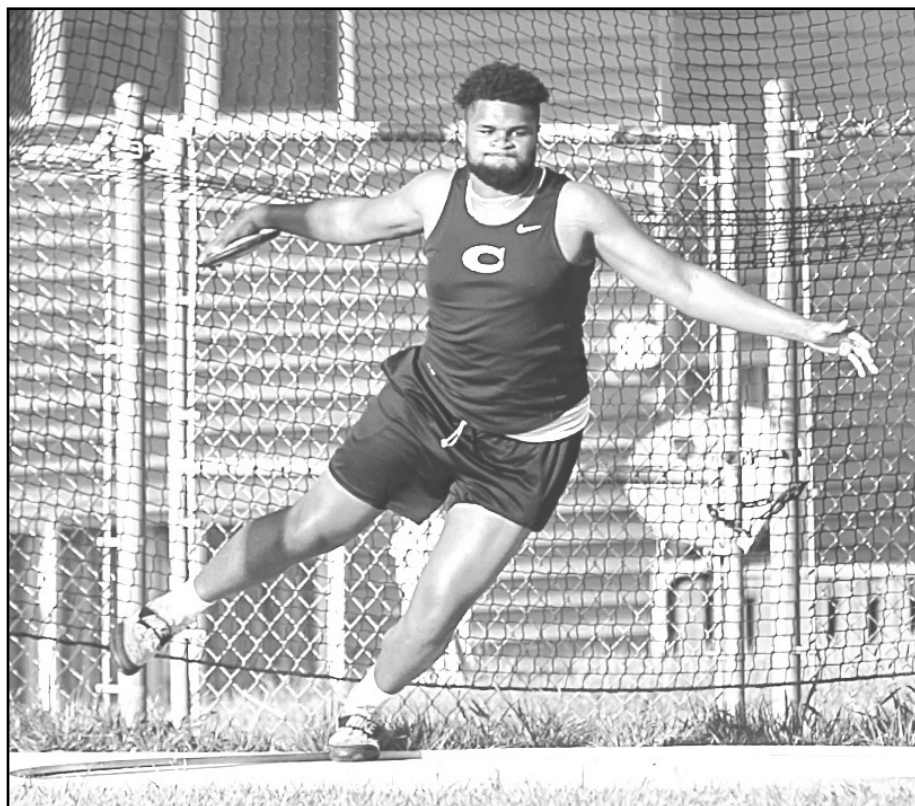
Debbie Sherman-Lee is a Christiansburg native and a former teacher at Christiansburg High School. She is chair of the Board of Directors of Christiansburg Institute, has been active with the Montgomery County Christmas Store since it began in 1982, is a member of the Steering Committee for Dialogue on Race, and is a member

of the board of Community Housing Partners. Sherman-Lee was recognized for her work in preserving and restoring the remaining building of Christiansburg Institute, a school for African American students begun in 1866 at the conclusion of the Civil War. At one time CI was the only Virginia secondary school for African Americans west of Roanoke. It was an academic, industrial and cultural training school modeled after the well-known Tuskegee Institute and Hampton Institute, the alma mater of Booker T. Washington.

Sherman-Lee spoke about the efforts to create a museum and restore the Edgar A. Long Building, named after the long-time superintendent of CI. She also gave a brief summary of the history of the school, which was the only accredited school in Montgomery County when school de-segregation caused the school to be closed. She spoke of regret that she was a student there for only one year before Montgomery County decided to close the school and send its students to the formerly all-white public schools.

After participating this past season in football, basketball, and track and field, Christiansburg High School's Tyrique Taylor was named the school's athlete of the year this past week.

As a football player standing 6'2" and weighing in at 225 lbs., Taylor was selected a first-team all-region defensive end, an honorable mention all-district and all-region tight end, the News Messenger/News Journal all-county defensive lineman of the year.

Taylor led the Blue Demons with seven sacks while making 22 solo tackles and five tackles for loss.

In basketball, he was a first-team all-district and first team all-region player

and scored in double figures nine times this past season.

In track and field, Taylor was a state qualifier in both shot and discus, placing third in the state for discus last year. He holds the school record for the discus with a throw of 153'4."

All these awards and his success as an athlete came after Taylor often thought about quitting football. His freshman year, he was brutally honest in saying he thought about giving up on football.

"I guess it started earlier than that. I was always so much bigger than kids my age all the way back to recreation football. So, I never got to catch, run or throw the ball. I had to play the offensive and defensive line," he said.

Growing up, he came from a home with a single mother and admits the fam-

ily struggled. He credits his mother for being the driving force that kept him on the gridiron. "She was a great example for me and always had my back," he said.

Taylor tore an ACL that freshman year, so there was a second strike against the sport, and again he had his doubts about ever playing again.

"I said I never wanted to do it again, but thanks to my mom and coaches like (Zach) Leonard and (Alex) Wilkins I came back," he said.

The coaching staff placed him on the line and even allowed him to play some at tight end. This is when the next step in his career started to make a little bit more sense. He became a natural at defensive end.

"The coaching staff created a family-type atmosphere, and I think that is

something I needed," he said.

In the classroom, Taylor maintained an "A" average and was consistently on Christiansburg's honor roll.

"Sports being in my life helped me to maintain my grades," he said.

Taylor will attend Emory & Henry College in the fall. His long-term goal is to receive his degree and become a teacher and maybe even a coach.

"I think I have a lot to offer other kids like me. I wanna be an influence on them like others were for me," he said earlier this week.

He also reminded others that when things get tough, you can either sit down or run through it. Taylor chose to run through it and will carry that motto to the next level on the football field.

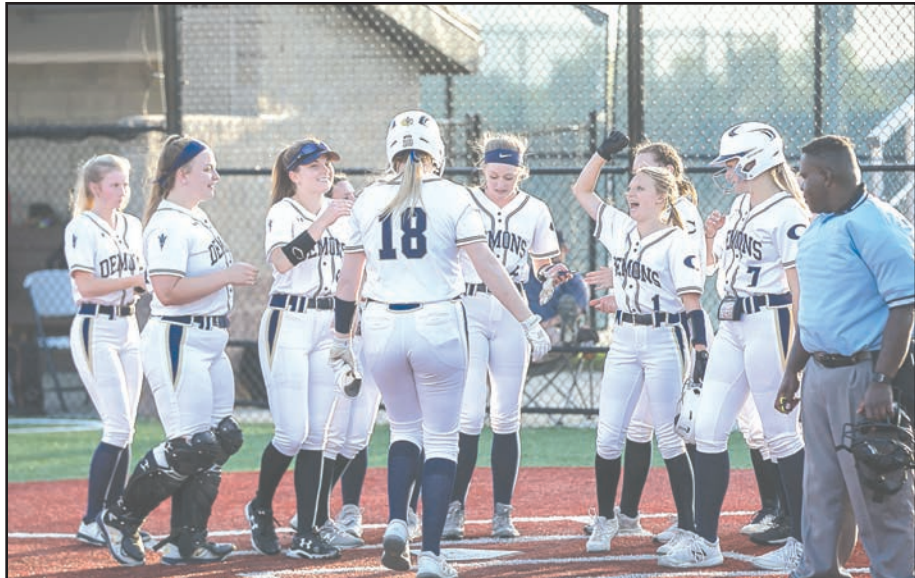

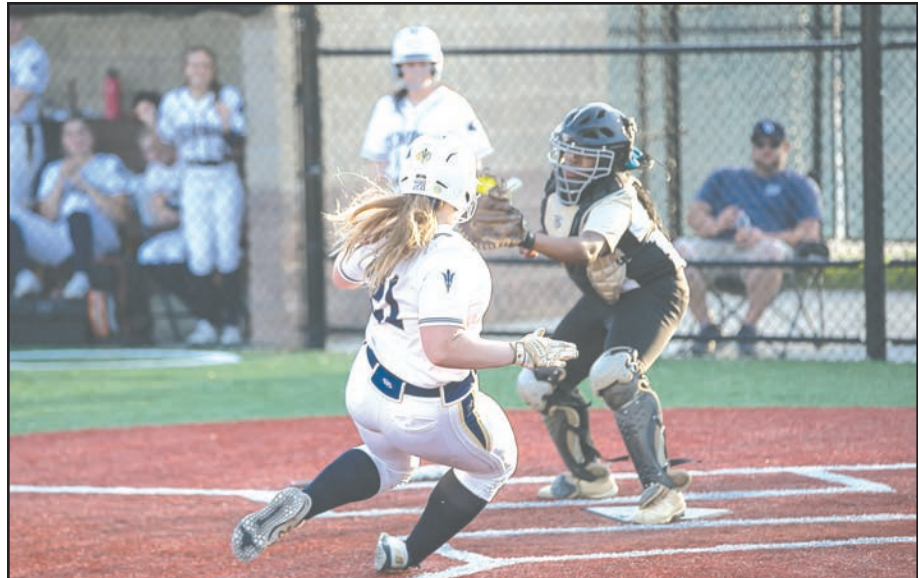

VT pitcher Keely Rochard taken second in softball draft

Virginia Tech pitcher Keely Rochard was the second overall pick in the recent Athletes Unlimited Softball Draft. The senior pitcher was one of 13 players drafted. She is the first Hokie drafted professionally since Courtney Liddle was drafted in 2013.

Rochard was named the third All-American in program history in 2021 and the second first-team member. She was also named the 2021 ACC Pitcher of the Year. Earlier today and this week was named a Top-10 Finalist for USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year.

The right-hander went 22-2 in the regular season, leading the Hokies to the 2022 regular season ACC title. She currently leads the conference in strikeouts with 283 and ranks third nationally. She is averaging 11.6 strikeouts per inning with a 1.76 ERA.

The Athletes Unlimited sea-

son begins on July 29 with all games played at the Parkway Bank Sports Complex in Rosemont, Ill.

Currently in its 20th season, the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year award is considered the most prestigious individual honor in Division I college softball and recognizes outstanding athletic achievement by Division I softball players.

The top three finalists for the award will be revealed on May 18 prior to the NCAA Women's College World Series, which is scheduled for June 1-10 at the USA Softball Hall of Fame Complex.

This is the first time Rochard has been named a Top-10 finalist. She currently has 93 wins in her career, tied for second in school history. She most recently posted her 1,000th career strikeout, the second Hokie in school history to do so.

Shepherd said Roanoke was her choice for multiple reasons.

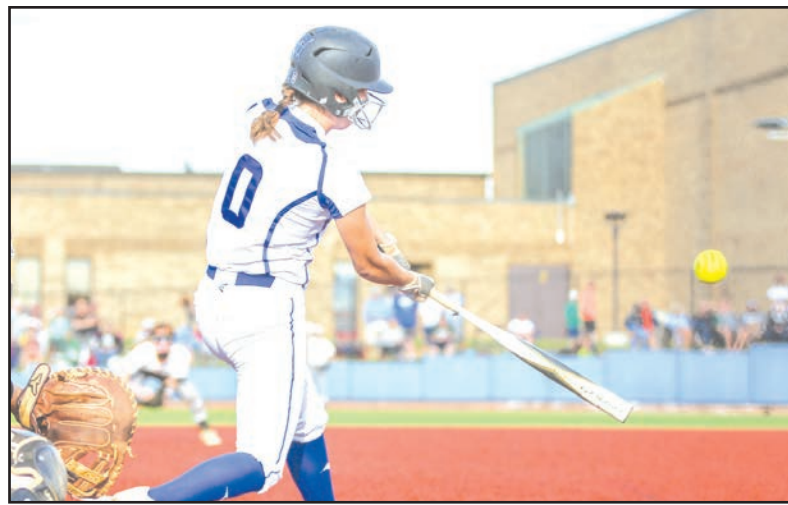
"It's a great school with lots to offer. I will be getting a great education and have the ability to continue to play the sport that I love. I get all of that while still being close to home."
