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# Virginia Tech, Radford rated among best value colleges in Virginia

Where are college students in Virginia getting the most return on their educational investment? SmartAsset has released a study comparing the best colleges and universities in each state by measuring them across five metrics: scholarships, av-

## Repairs scheduled for Jacob's Ladder Trail in Poverty Creek Trail System, Montgomery County

The entire 1.3-mile trail will be temporarily closed today, Saturday, May 14 and Sunday, May 15, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. during the repair work.

Volunteers with the Poverty Creek Trails Coalition will be using a mini-excavator donated by a Roanoke-based trail club to repair the trail tread and improve drainage to prevent future erosion issues.

"Thank you so much to

our volunteers and partners who put the work in to help the Forest Service maintain these trails," said Beth Christensen, Eastern Divide District Ranger. "These trails see a tremendous amount of use, and we are fully aware of how essential this resource is to the Blacksburg community."

The Jacob's Ladder trail connects the Poverty Creek trail (Forest Service trail #1000) to Horse Nettle Trail (Forest Service trail #985) and is part of a system of over 24 miles of trail.

## VT research team seeks to develop batteries with long life and fast-charging capability

It doesn't come on fast. It may take weeks to notice. You have the newly recharged lithium-ion AA batteries in the wireless kitty water fountain, and they last two days. They once lasted a week or more. Another round of charging, and they last one day. Soon, nothing.

You would be forgiven if you stood there and questioned your own actions. "Wait, did I recharge these?"

Relax, it's not you. It's the battery. Nothing lasts forever, not even the supposed long-lasting rechargeable batteries, be they AAs or AAAs bought in store or the batteries inside our cellphones, wireless earbuds, or cars. Batteries decay.

Feng Lin, an associate professor in the Department of Chemistry, part of the Virginia Tech College of Science, is part of a new international, multi-agency/university study published today in Science that takes a new look behind the factors that drive a battery's lifespan and how those factors

actually change over time in fast-charging conditions.

Early on, the study finds, battery decay seems driven by the properties of individual electrode particles, but after several dozen charging cycles, it's how those particles are put together that matters more.

"This study really sheds light on how we can design and manufacture battery electrodes to obtain a long cycle life for batteries," Lin said. His lab is now working to redesign battery electrodes with the goal of fabricating electrode architectures that provide fast-charging capabilities and sustain a longer life at a fraction of today's cost, as well as being environmentally friendly.

"When the electrode architecture allows for each individual particle to quickly respond to electrical signals, we will have a good toolbox to charge batteries fast. We are excited to implement the understanding to next-generation, low-cost, fast-charging batteries," Lin said.

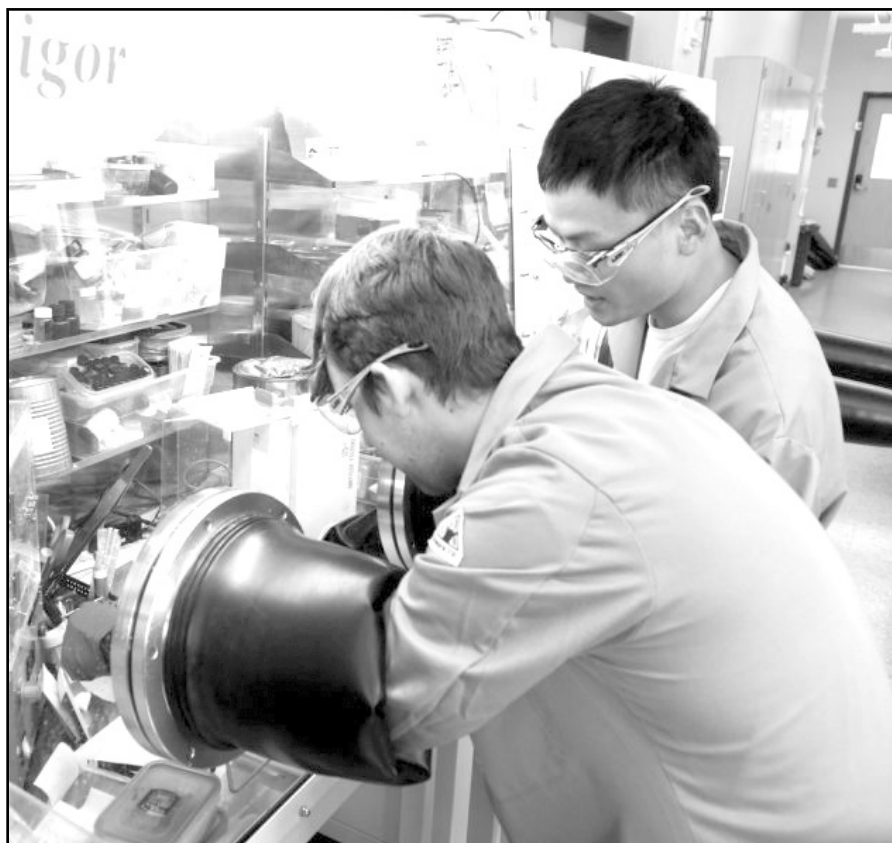

der Black House main galleries, 204 Draper Road SW in Blacksburg.

Admission to the exhibit is free. The exhibit will be available for viewing Tuesday through Saturday from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. An "End of the Line" reception open to the public will be held on Friday, May 27, from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m.

"End of the Line" is a multimedia exhibition by Bill Ratcliffe that examines the final destination for most consumed goods, the landfill.

"In the United States alone, an estimated total of 146 million tons of material went into landfills in 2018.

Sites such as those featured in this body of work address aspects of the burial of solid waste," said Ratcliffe. "As much as we love to buy things, no one wants to pay for their disposal. Many regional public landfills are self-funded."

The exhibit allows for the viewing of sites rarely seen by the general public. As Ratcliffe considers the spaces occupied by our waste, "They represent the idea of a magical place called away where things can be sent and forgotten. With examination, these places may help us to heal from our obsession to consume at

all costs."

Ratcliffe is a native of southwestern Virginia who first worked in a darkroom in 1993 and went on to earn a BFA and MFA with a fine art photography concentration. He has since worked as a freelance photographer, an exhibiting artist, and a photography instructor. He has exhibited in numerous solo, group, and juried shows across the country. His images have been published in magazines in the United States and the Philippines, and he has received numerous awards for his photography.

## McCoy, Fred Douglas "Doug"

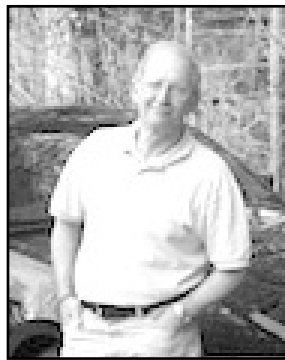
Fred Douglas "Doug" McCoy, 79, Savannah is also where he developed of Radford, passed away Wednesday, May 4, 2022.

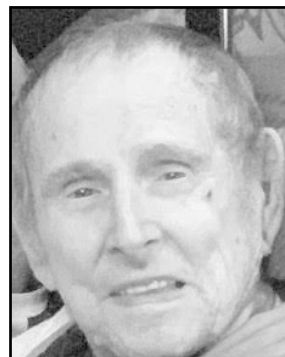

## NIL reshaping college athletic landscape

The idea of college athletes having better control over their name, image, and likeness (NIL) has been filled with lots of criticism. So Monday the NCAA's Division I Board of Directors issued guidance to schools regarding the intersection between recruiting activities and the name, image and NIL environment.

In a statement, the group said the guidance is intended to provide clarity for those engaging in a rapidly evolving NIL environment, acknowledging that the environment will continue to evolve, and ongoing attention will be needed to ensure student-athletes are able to benefit from these opportunities.

The guidance was developed by a task force of national leaders with student-athlete opportunity at the forefront of discussions.

Specifically, the guidance defines as a booster any third-party entity that promotes an athletics program, assists with recruiting or assists with providing benefits to recruits, enrolled student-athletes, or their family members. The definition could include "collectives" set up to funnel name, image, and likeness deals to prospective student-athletes or enrolled student-athletes who might be considering transferring. NCAA recruiting rules preclude boosters from recruiting and/or providing benefits to prospective student-athletes.

The guidance is effective immediately.

Board chair Jere Morehead, who is also the president of the University of Georgia, said this is a significant first step to address some of the challenges and improper behaviors that exist in the name, image, and likeness environment that may violate long-established recruiting rules.

"While the NCAA may pursue the most outrageous violations that were clearly contrary to the interim policy adopted last summer, our focus is on the future," Morehead said. "The new guidance establishes a common set of expectations for the Division I institutions moving forward, and the board expects all Division I institutions to follow our recruiting rules and to operate within these reasonable expectations."

The board noted that the emphasis of this NIL guidance is on boosters in the recruiting process and is not intended to question the eligibility of prospective and enrolled student-athletes involved in NIL deals. Only the most serious actions that clearly violate the previously published interim policy would have eligibility implications.

The board adopted the interim guidance last summer with an understanding that they would consider further guidance as the name, image and likeness environment developed.

At the heart of the matter is NCAA Bylaw 12.5 Purpose: New NCAA rules/guidelines permit student-athletes to benefit from the use of their names, images, and likenesses in a manner that is consistent with the NCAA guiding principles. In an effort to prioritize student-athlete well-being, these name, image, and likeness opportunities may occur in a manner that is consistent

with the core values, mission, and principles of Virginia Tech. This policy is to provide guidance as to the types of activities and circumstances with which a student-athlete would be prohibited from participating in an NIL activity.

Under the statute, student-athletes are expected to refrain from engaging in name, image, and likeness activities that are related to "pay for play," impermissible inducements, or extra benefits. Impermissible name, image, and likeness activities, include, but are not limited to

Agreements without a quid pro quo (e.g., compensation for work not performed);

Agreements where compensation is contingent on initial or continued enrollment at VT;

Agreements where compensation is contingent on specific athletic performance or achievement (e.g., financial incentives based on points scored). Note: Athletic performance may enhance a student-athlete's name, image, and likeness value but athletic performance may not be the "consideration" for a name, image, and likeness activity;

Benefits provided to student-athletes through name, image, and likeness activities must be consistent with institutional policies like Virginia Tech and commensurate with fair market value.

Student-athletes must conduct their activities in adherence to a set of ethical standards that are compatible with those of Virginia Tech's core values. VT in its sole discretion, retains the right to disapprove any activity deemed to suggest an endorsement by VT or that reflects unfavorably upon VT and/or VT student-athletes. VT retains the right to disapprove any activity that promotes or otherwise references certain prohibited categories. Specific prohibitions set forth by Virginia State law include:

- \* Any NCAA banned substances (PDF);
- \* Casinos or gambling, including sports betting;
- \* Alcohol products;
- \* Adult entertainment;
- \* Cannabis, cannabinoids, cannabidiol, or other derivatives;
- \* Dangerous or controlled substances;
- \* Performance enhancing drugs or substances;
- \* Drug paraphernalia;
- \* Tobacco and electronic smoking products and devices; and
- \* Weapons, including firearms and ammunition.

A student-athlete may not use institutional logos and/or trademarks in non-institutional name, image, and likeness activities when a student-athlete is engaging in an activity that promotes or endorses a third-party service or product without written approval from Virginia Tech Licensing and Trademarks.

All of this comes on the heels of Virginia Tech's announcing an enhanced partnership with INFLCR, the leading content and compliance software platform for elite athletes, launching the Hokies Exchange platform for student-athletes and businesses to interact and arrange a variety of name, image and likeness (NIL) endorsement deals.

Once a business, collective, or individual has registered and been approved for Hokies Exchange, it will be put into a database where student-athletes and the entity can connect for potential NIL deals. Businesses can filter through the index of student-athletes and narrow down selections using different criteria.

Women's basketball coach Kenny Brooks is thrilled that Virginia Tech and its administration have provided athletes with numerous opportunities in the NIL space.

"From education and the Hokies Exchange platform to these new NIL collectives, we are doing everything that we can to ensure our student-athletes have the resources to make informed decisions and have the confidence to approach NIL opportunities in a manner that will benefit them," Brooks said. "Our mission is to support student-athletes in all of their endeavors on and off the court. This is another step in the right direction for our department and I'm delighted to see this put together with our athletes in mind," he said.

Additionally, director of athletics Whit Babcock, has confirmed that a trio of NIL collectives has offered its services to Virginia Tech student-athletes, businesses, and donors. Babcock indicated the following three organizations have chosen to align with the Hokies: Commonwealth NIL, the brainchild of former state delegate Nick Rush of Christiansburg. He and his son, Forest, who is a Virginia Tech grad, will raise resources for NIL contracts through events, activities, and special sales with a unique focus in the Commonwealth of Virginia; Hot Route Marketing has taken a different approach from other organizations in the NIL space. Under the leadership of Virginia Tech alum Kelly Woolwine, Hot Route Marketing, LLC represents a vehicle in which business, donors and fans can invest into a consolidated pool of resources from which NIL opportunities can be arranged for student-athletes; Triumph NIL seeks to partner corporate clients with Tech student-athletes to build compelling campaigns that drive real results, in addition to offering platforms for donors and fans to support their favorite Hokies. This group is led by James Cowan, chairman at CowanPerry and also includes former Tech All-America running back, Kevin Jones.

Also, earlier this year, Virginia Tech Football, along with Fanatics and OneTeam, announced a partnership that will allow fans to buy customized jerseys that student-athletes will be compensated for.

The university has also announced a plan to reward student-athletes for outstanding academic results.

"We are pleased to be able to offer this financial incentive for our student-athletes to make the type of academic progress that will benefit them for years to come after graduation," Babcock said. "We are currently finalizing our criteria for this program and plan to roll out the details to student-athletes, their families and our coaching staffs this summer. We anticipate beginning this financial reward package in the fall of 2022. Thanks to the tremendous success of our Drive for 25 campaign and the generosity of our Hokie Club donors, we intend to be very competitive in this space to ensure Virginia Tech remains a very attractive destination for the nation's top student-athletes."

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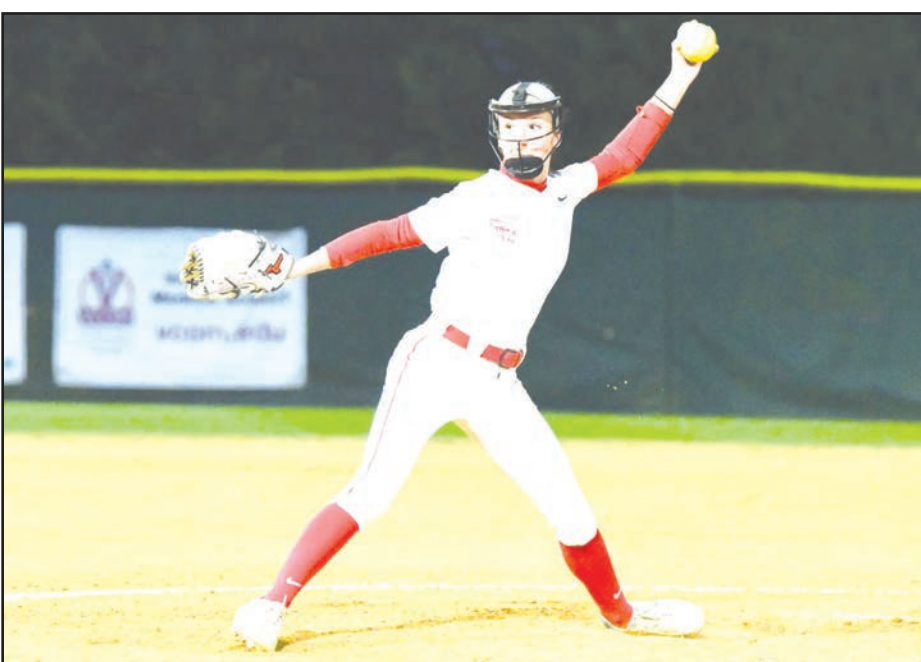

## RU's Cori McMillan named to Big South's all-freshman, all-league first teams

The Big South Conference office announced the softball annual awards Tuesday afternoon revealing that Radford's Cori McMillan was named to the first team and all-freshman team while Skylar DeHart was named to the all-academic team.

McMillan's freshman campaign has landed her among the conference's best. The Greensboro, N.C., native leads Radford in just about every offensive category including slugging 14 home runs, which is second in the conference. McMillan is one of just two players in the Big South to record 10 doubles and at least 10 home runs.

She has also been a perfect 11 for 11 in stolen bases. Her home runs, slugging percentage, OPS, runs scored, RBIs and stolen base percentage were all either best or within the top-two among Big South freshmen. Earlier this season McMillan was named a National Fastpitch Coaches Association Freshman of the Year Top-25 finalist, the lone Big

South representative on the list.

Skyler DeHart earned Radford University's all-academic award for 2022. She had a career-best 3.05 ERA in 73.1 innings pitched while striking out a career-best 30 batters. On March 9, she had her best outing of the season with seven shut-out innings against Rhode Island.

DeHart currently owns a 3.90 GPA as a nursing major at Radford.

## Tech's D'Amour ACC softball coach of the year; 11 Hokies named All-ACC

Following a regular season ACC Championship, Virginia Tech head softball coach Pete D'Amour has been named ACC Coach of the Year, the conference announced Wednesday morning. Senior Keely Rochard has also been named the Pitcher of the Year, Emma Lemley has been honored as the Freshman of the Year, and a conference-high 11 Hokies were named to various All-ACC teams.

Under D'Amour, Tech posted a 40-6 regular season record that included a 21-2 conference record, the highest winning percentage in school history. The Hokies earned their second regular season championship in four years, the first coming in 2019, D'Amour's first year at the helm.

D'Amour earned his 200th career win this season and was the fastest coach in school history to reach 100 wins at Virginia Tech a season ago. His current record at Tech sits at 145-36 (an .801 winning percentage) with a 67-17 mark in conference play (.798). The Hokies currently have 11 wins over Top 25 programs and were No. 1 in the RPI as of May 2.

For the second straight season, Rochard earned Pitcher of the Year honors after ending the 2022 conference season with a perfect 15-0 record. The senior made 17 appearances over the ACC season, with a 1.67 ERA in 96.1 innings pitched. She struck out 132 batters, allowing only 23 earned runs and a .191 opponent batting average.

Rochard leads the ACC in strikeouts with 283 total, which also ranks her fifth nationally. She is averaging 11.6 strikeouts per seven innings and has five saves on the season, which is second in the conference and ninth in all of Division I.

She was named a Top-10 finalist for USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year and earned ACC Pitcher of the Week honors twice this season. Rochard was also named First Team All-ACC.

Lemley made a big impact in the circle for the Hokies, earning Freshman of the Year honors after finishing the conference season with a 6-2 record with two saves. The right hander had three shutouts in ACC play, including then-No. 14/9 Clemson, Louisville, and Boston College to clinch the regular season championship.

Lemley struck out 83 batters in her 51.1 innings pitched in conference play, allowing just 19 earned runs. On the season, she is averaging 11.8 strikeouts per seven innings, which is first in the ACC and third in the NCAA. She has 187 total strikeouts and is allowing just 3.97 hits per seven innings.

Lemley is a Top-25 finalist for Schutt Sports/NFCA Freshman of the Year and earned ACC Pitcher of the Week three times this season. She was also named to the All-ACC First Team as an at-large selection.

Along with Rochard and Lemley, outfielder Emma Ritter and designated player Meredith Slaw were named First Team All-ACC. Slaw was huge for the Hokies in ACC play, hitting .477 over 19 games played. She hit five home runs and three doubles with an .886 slugging percentage. Ritter has been one of the Hokies most consistent batters at the plate, hitting .414 on the season and leading the team with 36 RBI's. She has struck out only twice in 133 at-bats, making her one of the toughest batters in the nation to strike out.

Four Hokies made the All-ACC Second Team: Cameron Fagan, Mackenzie Lawter, Morgan Overaitis and Bre Peck. Kelsey Bennett, Kelsey Brown and Darby Trull made the Third Team. Peck and Lemley also made the ACC All-Freshman Team.
