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Ribbon cutting June 22 for new Blacksburg police station

The Town of Blacksburg will officially cut the ribbon on its new, \$16 million, state of the art, police station (the William H. Brown Building) on Wednesday, June 22 at 10 a.m.

The current 14,000 square foot facility, located at 200 Clay Street, SW was built in 1982 to accommodate 25 officers and staff. Since then, the department has more than tripled in size with no cost-effective options for adding on to the existing building footprint.

The new police station is a modern and safe facility, offering 37,000 square feet for police operations. The building will also include a 100-seat community room for meetings and various public uses, as well as the first of its kind in Virginia, a training center named after Chief Anthony Wilson, who will retire on July 1 after 25 years with the Blacksburg Police Department.

Remarks will begin promptly at 10 a.m., followed by a ribbon-cutting ceremony and light refreshments.

Parking will be available at the Blacksburg Municipal Building at 300 S. Main St. or along Eheart and Church streets.

Todd Brewster selected as Blacksburg Chief of Police

The Town of Blacksburg has named Cpt. Todd Brewster of the Blacksburg Police Department as its new Chief of Police, succeeding Chief Anthony Wilson who will retire on July 1.

A native of Tazewell, Va., and a graduate of Radford University, Brewster began his career as a dispatcher for the Blacks-

burg Police Department in 1997 and became an officer in 1999. He continued to advance in his career with the department, working through the ranks of sergeant and lieutenant while supervising the Accident Reconstruction Team and serving as the DMV Grant Coordinator.

He was promoted to Police Services Captain

in November 2020 where he has since overseen the criminal investigations unit, accreditation, community outreach, recruiting and hiring, and the training unit. He has also served as a volunteer firefighter with the Blacksburg Fire Department and the Christiansburg Fire

VT Board of Visitors votes to offset tuition increase with one-time scholarship for in-state students

The Executive Committee of the Virginia Tech Board of Visitors set the university budget as well as tuition and mandatory fees for the 2022-23 fiscal year (July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023) at its meeting held Tuesday, June 14, in Richmond.

The budget included a three percent tuition increase for the 2022-23 academic year for all undergraduate and graduate students. However, recognizing

the financial challenges faced by Virginians and in the interest of continuing to expand access and affordability to a Virginia Tech education, the executive committee instructed the university to offset the tuition increase for the coming year with a one-time scholarship to all in-state undergraduate students, bringing the net undergraduate tuition increase to zero.

The board asked for and the university agreed to this one-time adjustment to

effectively freeze tuition for in-state undergraduate students for the coming academic year, noting that the recent rapid increase in inflation across the nation has not yet been met with a comparable increase in wages and salaries for students and their families.

The tuition increase came in the face of significant cost pressures including statewide employee compensation increases, operations and other fixed cost inflation-

ary increases, and investments to enhance the quality of a Virginia Tech education.

At its regularly scheduled meeting held June 7 in Blacksburg, the full board voted to delegate these decisions relating to tuition increases and the university budget to the executive committee to allow for further development of the state budget. Although the state budget is not yet final,

A project of the Coun-

Six of the seven markers were installed in early

June. The marker planned to be near Solitude will be installed later.

The preliminary text was developed by Peter Wallenstein, professor of history, and then revised and expanded by a diverse group of stakeholders from across the university. Leaning into their knowledge, expertise, and passion, the stakeholders shaped markers to add richness to our shared history.

“The stakeholders weighed in on not only which stories to tell, but also which wording and which images enhance our understanding of our history without reinscribing harmful stereotypes,” said Em-

ily Satterwhite, associate professor and director of the Appalachian studies program. “Many, many dozens of voices are represented here in trying to retell stories with more perspectives than have been told on some of the more long-standing markers.”

Campus Landscape Architect Jack Rosenberg led the project since its kick-off in spring 2018.

He said the new markers expand on existing interpretive signage already installed on the Upper Quad, which highlights the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets, by using the same basic structure and style.

“They’re basically the size of a normal doorway,” said Rosenberger of the sign’s size.

Visibility and accessibility were important factors to both the markers’ designs and their locations across campus. The locations were chosen in part based the areas’ role in the story each sign tells. Each marker includes a QR code and web address that will direct users to additional markers on campus.

“The most important thing was getting this information to people,” Rosenberger said.

The markers and their locations are as

follows:

- Henderson Lawn: The Early Years; Campus Over Time.
- Moss Arts Center: People and Place; Land-Grant College.
- Washington Street: Black History; Black Community.
- Eggleston Quad: Student Diversity.
- West Quad: Native Stewardship; The Monacan Peoples.
- Solitude: Enslaved People and the Prestons; From Plantation to College Campus.
- Library Plaza: Women’s History; Women on Campus.

the board and university leaders expressed confidence that the major components of the higher education budget, representing a historic investment in higher education and Virginia Tech, will remain in the final state budget.

“Virginia Tech would like to express appreciation to the General Assembly and the administration for the largest investment in higher education in recent history,” said Virginia Tech President Tim Sands. “Their increase in support will help Virginia Tech avoid passing on the full extent of inflationary costs to our students and their families.”

“This decision helps us to balance access and affordability for students and their families who seek a Virginia Tech education while investing in world-class faculty and campus programs and preserving the quality of a Virginia Tech degree,” said Rector Letitia “Tish” Long. “The state’s investment in higher education has helped us keep costs to our students and families down.”

Over the past four years the consumer price index has increased 20.4 percent while in-state tuition rates at Virginia Tech have increased 5.9 percent.

Base tuition for Virginia undergraduate students will increase \$353, to \$12,104 annually while a one-time tuition mitigation scholarship will offset this increase, bringing the net tuition increase down to zero. Out-of-state undergraduate tuition will increase \$925, totaling \$31,754 annually.

Mandatory fees will increase \$138 for a total of \$2,562 next year. Annual room and board charges will increase by 4.9 percent, or \$506 per year, to a total of \$10,756.

When adding tuition and mandatory fees with room and board costs, the total cost in 2022-23 for a Virginia undergraduate student living on campus will be \$25,069 after the one-time tuition mitigation scholarship. The total cost of an out-of-state undergraduate living on campus will be \$45,676.

Virginia Tech ranks 10th of the 15 Virginia public

universities in terms of total overall cost for resident undergraduate students. Virginia Tech continues to have the lowest mandatory fees for Virginia resident undergraduate students amongst all public four-year institutions in the commonwealth.

To further support low- and middle-income families who seek a Virginia Tech education, the university will allocate approximately \$5.1 million in additional resources toward undergraduate financial aid programs next year, raising the total institutional support to more than \$39.4 million for 2022-23. This is in addition to the one-time tuition mitigation scholarships.

Virginia Tech’s Funds for the Future program provides 100 percent protection from tuition and fee increases for returning students with a family income of up to \$100,000, resulting in a predictable and unchanging net tuition and fee package for all four years of their undergraduate study at Virginia Tech.

Including university-funded support, Virginia Tech undergraduates received \$140.4 million in grants and scholarships last fiscal year.

Students enrolling at the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine this summer will have a total annual cost of \$57,721, an increase of \$1,696.

In addition to setting tuition and fees, the board approved a \$1.89 billion university budget for the next fiscal year, which would represent an approximately 3.7 percent budget growth compared with the adjusted 2021-22 budget. The proposed operating budget includes increases in student financial aid, a 5 percent stipend increase for graduate assistantships, and faculty and staff compensation increases contingent upon final state budget approval.

Department.

VDOT ROAD WATCH

The following is a list of forecasted highway projects that may impact traffic traveling in the 12-county Salem Transportation District this week. Work schedules and construction project timelines are always subject to change and weather dependent. The Salem District covers Bedford, Botetourt, Carroll, Craig, Floyd, Franklin, Giles, Henry, Montgomery, Patrick, Pulaski and Roanoke counties.

MONTGOMERY COUNTY

I-81 NORTHBOUND AT EXIT 105 NEW RIVER BRIDGE REPLACEMENT IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY – Traffic on northbound I-81 has been switched onto the newly constructed bridge over the New River at the Montgomery/Pulaski County line. Lane and shoulder closures may be in place near exit 105. Lane closure may be in effect during the week from 8 p.m. to 7 a.m. Shoulder closures may be in effect at any time during the week. Slow rolls may be performed on I-81 in the north and southbound lanes from mile marker 98 to 109. Speed limit is reduced to 60 miles per hour in the work zone. Shoulder closures will remain in place though the duration of the project. Project completion is estimated by summer 2023.

LANE CLOSURES: Nighttime alternating lane closures will be in place on I-81 northbound between mile markers 104-106 from 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. the following morning.

SLOW ROLLS: Slow rolls may be utilized periodically on both the northbound and southbound lanes from mile marker 98-109 for structural steel deliveries and setting beams.

ROUTE 615 CULVERT REPLACEMENT – Route 615 (Pilot Road) is undergoing a culvert replacement located at the intersection of Pilot Road and Old Pike Road, across from the Pilot Post Office. Lane closures on Route 615 maintained by utilizing temporary traffic signals are expected to be in place through August 2022. Flagging operations may be in place. Route 615 will be limited to one 10 foot lane. Expected completion is October 2022.

ROUTE 641 CULVERT REPLACEMENT – Route 641 (Wayside Drive) will be closed at 8 a.m. on June 21 for a culvert replacement over Spring Branch. Drivers should watch for signage. The road will reopen on July 22 at 5 p.m., weather permitting.

ROUTE 114 TURN LANE CONSTRUCTION – Road improvements on Route 114 (Peppers Ferry Road) are underway for the construction of a new entrance to Belview Elementary School. Motorists should expect daily lane closures controlled by flagging forces. Work is expected to last until August 2022.

PAVING OPERATIONS – Weather permitting, crews will pave, patch and repair pavement on various routes. Lane closures may be in place and flaggers may control traffic at times during daylight hours. Drivers should watch for signs and expect possible delays.

Route 765, both east and west lanes, will have a flagging operation in place for paving from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily.

INTERSTATE 81

INTERSTATE 81 LANE WIDENING CONSTRUCTION PROJECT EXIT 137 TO EXIT 141 – A \$179 million design-build project to widen both directions of I-81 between mile markers 136.6 and 141.8 from two to three lanes is set to begin. Continuing into the early summer, work will be performed on the inside and outside shoulders along a five mile section of both northbound and southbound Interstate 81 in Roanoke County and the city of Salem. The shoulders will be built up before a barrier wall can be installed for road crews to work behind. A barrier wall will be installed along the shoulders in the spring and summer. Two lanes of I-81 traffic in each direction will remain open during the project with periodic lane closures scheduled during nighttime hours or outside of peak travel times as needed. Drivers can expect the following lane closures and upcoming impacts on northbound and southbound I-81:

BARRIER WALLS: Barrier wall installation is

in process. Nighttime lane closures will be in place and lane widths will be reduced to 11 feet.

Until mid-June, nighttime right lane and shoulder closures will be in effect between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m., Sunday through Thursday

To mid-June, alternating left and right lane and shoulder closures will be in effect during nighttime hours between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m., Sunday through Thursday

Nightly lane closures may be in place along the right lane with possible nightly ramp narrows as needed for guardrail and shoulder strengthening.

Northbound I-81 lane closures from mile marker 138 to 142

Northbound I-81 exit and entrance ramp narrows possible at Route 311.

The project also includes replacing six bridges, widening two bridges, installing approximately 2.6 miles of sound barrier walls along northbound I-81, improving the southbound exit 137 off-ramp intersection at Wildwood Road and adding interchange lighting at exits 137, 140 and 141 are also included in the project. Expected completion in early 2026.

I-81 TROUTVILLE REST AREA CLOSURE – The Troutville Rest Area located on southbound Interstate 81 near mile marker 158 in Botetourt County is currently closed until Sept. 2, 2022. Signage indicating the closure has been posted in the rest area. During the closure, a temporary concrete barrier wall will be installed in front of the facility. The rest area facility, ramps and parking lot will be closed to the public. This project will extend the ramp into the rest area by 500 feet and the ramp out of the rest area by 2,100 feet. It will also include expanding the truck parking area at the facility by about 10-13 spaces. Work is expected to be completed in early fall 2022.

REST AREA OPTIONS: While the Troutville Rest Area is closed, southbound I-81 drivers can use the Fairfield Rest Area at mile marker 195 in Rockbridge County or the Radford Rest Area at mile marker 108 in Montgomery County. In addition, the Troutville Weigh

Station, located on southbound I-81 at mile marker 149, will have portable toilets and parking will be temporarily available for commercial vehicles.

INTERSTATE 81 LANE WIDENING CONSTRUCTION EXIT 141 TO EXIT 143 – A project to widen the lanes on I-81 in Roanoke in both northbound and southbound directions between Exit 141 to Exit 143 has been underway. All lanes are now open and will remain open through the winter with periodic lane closures at night as needed. The final surface paving and markings for northbound will resume this summer. Drivers can expect rough pavement. The estimated completion date of the project is summer 2022.

I-81 PAVING OPERATIONS – Weather permitting, crews will pave, patch and repair pavement on various routes. Lane closures may be in place during nighttime hours, 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. the following morning. Drivers should watch for signs and expect possible

delays.

I-81 BRIDGE DECK REPAIRS – Weather permitting, crews will repair bridge decks on Interstate 81. Between mile markers 138 to 152, right and left lane closures will be in place northbound and southbound during nighttime hours, 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. the following morning. Drivers should watch for signs and expect possible delays.

I-81 POTHOLE PATCHING OPERATIONS – Weather permitting, crews will patch potholes along southbound and northbound Interstate 81. Mobile right and left lane closures will be in place and moving along northbound and southbound lanes during nighttime hours, 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. the following morning. Drivers should watch for moving vehicles and equipment. Expect possible delays.

INTERSTATE 581 ROUTE 581 BRIDGE WORK OVER WILLIAMSON ROAD – On Route 11 (William-

son Road) drivers can expect intermittent and alternating lane closures between the intersections with Rutherford Avenue and Wells Avenue. Intermittent daytime and nighttime lane closures between the intersections above might be required, and will be in place utilizing flagging operations. Any impacts to I-581 will be minimal. The project is expected to be completed in the fall of 2022.

- o A left lane closure will be in place on northbound and southbound I-581 from mile marker 0-1, Monday at 7 a.m. through Wednesday at 7 p.m.

- o A right lane closure will be in place on northbound and southbound I-581 from mile marker 0-1, Thursday at 7 a.m. through Saturday at 7 p.m.

- o A left and center lane closure will be in place on northbound and southbound I-581 from mile marker 0-1, Saturday at 5 p.m. through Sunday at 2 p.m.

 One of the best to ever step on the field, Helen Negrey paved the way for the players who followed her through the Radford women's soccer program. A defender, she was named an All-American by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) in 1982, making her the first Highlander to earn the distinction. She led the team in points with 30 that season and ranks fourth in program history for single-season assists,

tallying 10 during the 1983 campaign.
ART PARAKHOUSKI
 Men's Basketball 2008-10
 Art Parakhouski was a Highlander for only two seasons, but his list of broken records and awards won show just how dominant he was. The 6'11" center from Minsk, Belarus, is the program's all-time leader in six different statistical categories, averaging 18.7 points and 12.2 rebounds per game for his career. He was twice named Big South Player of the Year

and was an Associated Press Honorable Mention All-American in 2010 after leading the entire nation in rebounds. Parakhouski scored 1,195 points in his Radford career and ranks third all-time in field goal percentage at .561 and sixth all-time in blocks with 115.
PATRINDA TONEY
 Women's Basketball 1987-92
 Toney is a standout among a long list of illustrious women's basketball players at Radford. The quick-cutting

guard was a three-time All-Big South selection and was named Big South Co-Player of the Year in 1991-92 before earning a place on the conference's All-Decade Team for 1990-99. She ranks second in program history for career points per game with 17.1, and is fourth in Big South history with 2,020 points scored. Her play on the court led the Highlanders to four Big South regular-season titles and four Big South tournament titles as well.
