LewisGale Medical performs successful permanent heart transplant

LewisGale Medical Center has announced it successfully performed a permanent heart implant in a patient with non-valvular atrial fibrillation (AF) to reduce stroke risk.

The procedure uses technology known as WATCHMAN FLX™ to close off an area of the heart called the left atrial appendage (LAA) which will prevent harmful blood clots forming in the LAA from entering the bloodstream and potentially causing a stroke. By closing off the LAA, the risk of stroke may be reduced and, over time, patients may be able to stop taking blood thinners.

B. John Hynes, MD, a board-certified cardiac electrophysiologist with LewisGale Physicians —Electrophysiology, recently performed the first procedure at LewisGale Medical Center.

"Patients describe atrial fibrillation, often referred to as AFib, as a quivering or irregular

heartbeat, called arrhythmia," said Dr. Hynes. "Arrhythmias can lead to blood clots, stroke, heart failure, and other heart-related complications. The majority of stroke-causing clots that come from the heart are formed in the LAA. That's why closing off this part of the heart is an effective way to reduce stroke risk."

Hynes added that the procedure is done under general anesthesia and takes about an hour. Patients commonly stay in the hospital overnight and leave the next day. The implant is about the size of a quarter and made from very light, compact materials commonly used in many other medical implants.

AF is a heart condition where the upper chambers of the heart (atrium) beat too fast and with irregular rhythm (fibrillation). AF is the most common cardiac arrhythmia,

Study: Virginia is #1 state in country for playing video games at work

A survey of 2,000 gamers by northstarinbound.net found that Virginians are among the most obsessed players in the country when it comes to video games.

Among the findings: Virginia is the third-most gaming-obsessed state in the country with an average of 15 hours per week spent gaming. The commonwealth ranks no. 2 when it comes to where gamers play on their computers daily

(37%) and no. 5 where gamers play on their phones daily (53%). According to the survey, 59% of Virginia's gamers play during work hours, making it the #1 state where gamers play during work hours.

The survey found that Virginia's gamers play an average of six hours weekly on their consoles, five hours weekly on their phones, and five hours weekly on their computers.

Virginia Tech and Zimbabwean paleontology teams lead discovery and naming of Africa's oldest known dinosaur

An international team of paleontologists led by Virginia Tech has discovered and named a new, early dinosaur. The skeleton — incredibly, mostly intact — was first found by a graduate student in the Virginia Tech Department of Geosciences and other paleontologists over the course of two digs, in 2017 and 2019.

The findings of this new sauropodomorph — a long-necked dinosaur — newly named Mbiresaurus raathi were being published today in the journal Nature. The skeleton is, thus far, the oldest dinosaur skeleton ever found in Africa. The animal is estimated to have been 6 feet long with a long tail. It weighed anywhere from 20 to 65 pounds. The skeleton, missing only some of the hand and portions of the skull, was found in northern Zimbabwe.

"The discovery of Mbiresaurus raathi fills in a critical geographic gap in the fossil record of the oldest dinosaurs and shows the power of hypothesis-driven fieldwork for testing predictions about the ancient past," said Christopher Griffin, who graduated in 2020 with a Ph.D. in geosciences from the Virginia Tech

College of Science.

Griffin added, "These are Africa's oldest-known definitive dinosaurs, roughly equivalent in age to the oldest dinosaurs found anywhere in the world. The oldest known dinosaurs — from roughly 230 million years ago, the Carnian Stage of the Late Triassic period — are extremely rare and have been recovered from only a few places worldwide, mainly northern Argentina, southern Brazil, and India."

Sterling Nesbitt, associate professor of

geosciences, also is an author on the study. "Early dinosaurs like Mbiresaurus raathi show that the early evolution of dinosaurs is still being written with each new find and the rise of dinosaurs was far more complicated than previously predicted," he said.

The international team at the heart of this discovery include paleontologists from the National Museums and Monuments of Zimbabwe, the Natural History Museum of Zimbabwe, and Universidade de São Paulo, São Paulo, Brazil.

BRIDGE REPLACEMENT IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY – Traffic on northbound I-81 has been switched onto the newly constructed bridge over the New River at the Montgomery/Pulaski County line. The old bridge is being demolished. Lane and shoulder closures may be in place near exit 105. Lane closure may be in effect during the week from 8 p.m. to 7 a.m. Shoulder closures may be in effect at any time during the week. Slow rolls may be performed on I-81 in the north and southbound lanes from mile marker 98 to 109. Speed limit is reduced to 60 miles per hour in the work zone. Shoulder closures will remain in place though the duration of the project. Project completion is estimated by summer 2023.

ROUTE 615 CULVERT REPLACEMENT – Route 615 (Pilot Road) is undergoing a culvert replacement located at the intersection of Pilot Road and Old Pike Road, across from the Pilot Post Office. Flagging operations may be in place. Route 615 will be limited to one 10 foot lane. Expected completion is October 2022.

INTERSTATE 81

INTERSTATE 81 LANE WIDENING CONSTRUCTION PROJECT EXIT 137 TO EXIT 141 – A \$179 million design-build project to widen both directions of I-81 between mile markers 136.6 and 141.8 from two to three lanes is set to begin. Work is being performed on the inside and outside shoulders along a five-mile section of both northbound and southbound Interstate 81 in Roanoke County and the city of Salem. The shoulders will be built up before a barrier wall can be installed for road crews to work behind. The barrier wall will be installed along the shoulders in the spring and summer. Two lanes of I-81 traffic in each direction will remain open during the project.

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VT

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Lane Stadium underneath a 35-foot wide orange archway on Washington Street. currently affecting up to 6 million Americans.

Stroke is the most common complication of AF, and AF-related strokes are more frequently fatal and disabling. In people with non-valvular AF, more than 90% of all stroke-causing clots that come from the heart form in the LAA. The most common treatment to reduce stroke risk in patients with AF is blood-thinning medication, such as warfarin. While very effective at reducing the risk of stroke,

blood thinners increase the risk of serious bleeding over time and come with certain requirements and restrictions.

with periodic lane closures scheduled during nighttime hours or outside of peak travel times as needed. Drivers can expect the following lane closures and upcoming impacts on northbound and southbound I-81:

- Nighttime lane closures may be in place and lane widths will be reduced to 11 feet.

- Nightly lane closures may be in place along the right lane with possible nightly ramp narrows as needed for guardrail and shoulder strengthening.

- Northbound I-81 lane closures from mile marker 138 to 142

- Northbound I-81 exit and entrance ramp narrows possible at Route 311.

The project also includes replacing six bridges, widening two bridges, installing approximately 2.6 miles of sound barrier walls along northbound I-81, improving the southbound exit 137 off-ramp intersection at Wildwood Road and adding interchange lighting at exits 137, 140 and 141 are also included in the project. Expected completion in early 2026.

I-81 TROUTVILLE REST AREA CLOSURE - The Troutville Rest Area located on southbound Interstate 81 near mile marker 158 in Botetourt County is currently closed until later in the month of September. Supply chain issues have delayed manufacture

and delivery of metal bases for the new lighting poles that must be installed before the facility can be reopened. The Virginia Department of Transportation's contractor Branch Civil Inc. has developed a plan to install temporary lighting. It will take additional time to install the temporary lighting, so reopening the facility will be postponed until later in September.

Signage indicating the closure is posted in the rest area. A temporary concrete barrier wall will remain in place in front of the facility. The rest area facility, ramps and parking lot are closed to the public. This project will extend the ramp into the rest area by 500 feet and the ramp out of the rest area by 2,100 feet. It will also include expanding the truck parking area at the facility by about 10-13 spaces. Work is expected to be completed in early fall 2022.

- **REST AREA OPTIONS:** While the Troutville Rest Area is closed, southbound I-81 drivers can use the Fairfield Rest Area at mile marker 195 in Rockbridge County or the Radford Rest Area at mile marker 108 in Montgomery County. In addition, the Troutville Weigh Station, located on southbound I-81 at mile marker 149, will have portable toilets and parking will be temporarily available for commercial vehicles.

WalletHub: Virginia is 2022's sixth-hardest-working state in America

With Americans working an average of almost 1,800 hours per year and leaving an average of 4.6 days off unused last year, the personal-finance website WalletHub has released its report on 2022's Hardest-Working States in America.

To determine where Americans work the hardest, WalletHub compared the 50 states across ten key metrics. The data set ranges from average workweek hours to share of workers with multiple jobs to annual volunteer hours per resident.

When the website completed its survey,

At the opposite end of the rankings are the ten states WalletHub ranked as the states that are the least hardest working: 41. Oregon 42. Ohio 43. New Jersey 44. Massachusetts 45. Connecticut 46. West Virginia 47. Michigan 48. New York 49. Rhode Island 50. New Mexico.

the Camels will meet in the Dedmon Center with fans in attendance for the first time since early 2020.

In the back stretch of conference play, five of the final nine games will be on Radford's home court. The women will play host to USC Upstate (Jan. 28), Presbyterian (Feb. 1), Charleston Southern (Feb. 11), Longwood (Feb. 18), and High Point (Feb. 22). Overall, the Highlanders enter the 2022-23 season with a 344-206 (.625) Big South record, which is first in the all-time standings.

RU softball program names new assistant coach

The Radford University softball program has announced that Krystal Goodman has joined the team as an assistant coach for the 2022-23 season.

Goodman will bring to the New River Valley an impressive playing and coaching résumé. She was competing as a professional athlete in Italy and the Netherlands.

While there, she performed in competitive A1 leagues with Club Forli and the Amsterdam Pirates. She also helped instruct younger players on pitching fundamentals, observing cultural differences in pitching fundamentals along the way.

Goodman earned CoSIDA Academic All-District Honors and CoSIDA Second Team Academic All-American during the 2020 season.

During her final collegiate campaign in 2021, Goodman made 12 appearances including a win over 13th-ranked Louisiana and finishing a combined no-hitter against Alabama State in the NCAA Regionals.
