

As the exhibit's opening nears, Lawson said, "Thanks for taking your time to see the world through my lens.'



Tips to stay safe outdoors this hunting season

Fall is hunting season in Virginia, similar to most of the United States, the time when hunters are most likely to be in the woods. Hunters can take advantage of some basic tips to avoid huntingrelated accidents:

Wear blaze orange to increase their visibility and to help distinguish them from a targeted animal.

Use the buddy system. Never be in the woods

Know where the public hunting lands are and the exact dates for the various hunting seasons. Research ahead of time where hunting is

and is not allowed. Make an itinerary and give a copy to someone who will be hunting somewhere other than with you. Make sure he knows what you are doing, where you plan to be, and when you expect

to be back. The Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries offers hunter education courses with both in-person and online modalities. The courses are designed to teach hunting safety, principles of conservation, and sportsmanship.

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Flamenco master Farruquito brings poetic passion to the Moss stage

From bold and explosive to soft and intense, the poetry and passion of the Spanish flamenco dance will be on display when Farruquito, heir to a renowned flamenco dynasty, brings his newest production, "Íntimo," to the Moss Arts Center on Friday, Oct. 28, at 7:30

The performance will be held in the center's Anne and Ellen Fife Theater, located within the Street and Davis Performance Hall at 190 Alumni Mall.

Described by The New York Times as "the greatest flamenco dancer of this new century," Farruquito returns to North America with a coast-to-coast tour of "Íntimo." Recounting the origins and history of flamenco, the Spanish dancer, along with his cast of dancers, musicians, and vocalists, introduces the audience to traditional distinguished flamenco styles such as tangos, "soleá," "bulerías,"

and "alegrías," evoking a journey through flamenco full of sensations and freedom.

The son of flamenco singer Juan Fernández Flores ("El Moreno") and dancer Rosario Montoya Manzano ("La Farruca"), Farruquito was immersed in a unique form of flamenco founded by his grandfather Antonio Flores Montoya Farruco").

He made international appearance at the age of 4 on Broadway alongside his grandfather in the hit show "Flamenco Puro." At the age of 11, he was featured in the film "Flamenco," produced by the legendary film director Carlos Saura, which launched Farruquito's career. In 1992, he had the honor of sharing the stage with his grandfather at the inauguration of the Paralympic Games of Barcelona.

When he was 15, his

grandfather died, and Farruquito became the heir to the Farruco flamenco lineage. That same year he created his first show, "Raíces Flamencas (Flamenco Roots)," which not only distinguished his mastery as a dancer but gave him the opportunity to showcase the traditions of his prodigious flamenco

Farruquito has enjoyed many successful seasons of performances and tours around the world. In 2010, he premiered "Sonerías" at the Bienal de Flamenco of Seville, where his audiences experienced the raw roots of flamenco infused with a theatrical flair. In 2013, he created "Improvisao," a fusion of singing, guitar, and dance, which was followed by an invitation in 2015 to dance with the Los Angeles Philharmonic in four sold-out gala concerts of an adapted version of "Amor Brujo" directed by Gustavo Dudamel at the Walt Disney Concert Hall.



He is survived by his wife, Pauline, sons Matthew and Benjamin; brother Stephen Fields; numerous California



Preseason ACC Poll: VT men picked seventh; women picked second

The Atlantic Coast Conference has released its preseason basketball poll, and the VT men were placed in the number seven spot while the Virginia Tech women were picked to finish second, the Hokies' highest preseason ranking ever. All voting was conducted by the media covering ACC Tipoff in Charlotte last week.

The conference also announced its preseason men's basketball awards live on ACC PM with Virginia Tech forward Justyn Mutts earning All-ACČ Preseason

Mutts was named to the second team after averaging 10.1 points and 7.3 rebounds per game in 2021-22. He enters his third season in Blacksburg with 107 games started, the thirdmost in the ACC.

After exploring his professional options, Mutts opted to return to Blacksburg for the 2022-23 season. The Millville, N.J., native scored in double figures 17 times last season, including a season-high 24 points vs. Notre Dame on Jan. 15, 2022. He dialed up Tech's second-ever triple-double behind 12 points, 14 rebounds and 11 assists vs. Syracuse on Feb. 12, 2022.

On the women's side, Taylor Soule and Ashley Owusu were put on award watch lists and Elizabeth Kitley was picked as the preseason ACC Player of the Year.

Last season, Kitley was among the league leaders in scoring (18.1), rebounds (9.8), blocks (2.4) and field goal percentage(.551). Her 15 double-doubles the conference as did her 13 games of 20 or more points. She scored 34 points twice and finished the year with a 42-point performance in the NCAA Tournament, the second-most ever scored in the opening round of the competition. She recorded four or more blocks in nine different contests. Her 237 made field goals set a program record for a single season. She ranks ninth all-time at VT in scoring (1,410), fifth in rebounds (800), and

third in blocks (187).

The VT women earned their predicted second-place finish by picking up 17 first-place votes and 984 points. Three-time defending ACC champion NC State closely followed at No. 3 with eight firstplace votes and 963 points.

Notre Dame earned the final four first-place votes and 942 points while North Carolina rounded out the top-5 with 895 points. Miami placed sixth with 674 points, while Duke landed seventh at 627 Georgia Tech (623

points) followed in eighth with Florida State (553) and Syracuse (370) rounding out the top-10, respectively. Virginia (303), Clemson (275), Boston College (271), Wake Forest (256) and Pitt (187) close out this year's predicted order of finish on the women's side. North Carolina was voted the preseason


Blacksburg boys win cross-country event




