Blacksburg High School student selected for National Youth Orchestra of United States

Blacksburg High School senior Sam Woolsey is among the 109 teens invited to tour this summer as a timpani player/ percussionist with the National Youth Orchestra of the United States.

Carnegie Hall began the National Youth Orchestra program 10 years ago, and the ensemble has served as cultural ambassadors around the world ever since. NYO is celebrating its 10th anniversary this year and will be touring North America with stops from Carnegie Hall

The members of the 2023 orchestra, ages 16 through 19, hail from 31 states plus Puerto Rico and have been recognized by Carnegie Hall as being among the finest players in the country following a comprehensive and highly selective audition process.

This summer's orchestra features 13 musicians who previously played with the National Youth Orchestra and 35 musicians who gained experience through NYO2, a program for younger players ages 14-17. Both NYO-USA and NYO2 are offered free of charge, ensuring that all invited musicians have the opportunity to take part.

Woolsey is one of only three students from the commonwealth to be selected for the tour. The other two are cello player Kyle Ryu from Burke, Va., and bass player Joshua Thrush from Vienna,

Conductor Sir Andrew Davis will lead the national youth orchestra at Carnegie Hall and on its North American Tour that will feature a trip to New York in early July for an intensive two-week training residency at Purchase College, State University of New York (SUNY).

Davis will also lead the teen orchestra at the annual Carnegie Hall concert (July 14). The tour will include stops in Groton, Mass.; Joliette, Quebec; Dallas, Texas; Jackson, Wyoming; Stanford, Calif.; and San Diego, Calif.

Violinist Gil Shaham is the guest soloist for the orchestra's performance at Carnegie Hall and for five performances on the tour. Violinist Hilary Hahn joins as guest soloist for two tour performances.

The orchestra's tour repertoire will include a new work written for the ensemble by Valerie Coleman, commissioned by Carnegie Hall; Berlioz's Symphonie fantastique; and Barber's and Tchaikovsky's violin concertos.

Tickets for the Carnegie Hall concert will go on sale for the general public on Monday, April 24. Tickets can be purchased at the Carnegie Hall Box Office and/or by calling CarnegieCharge at 212-247-7800.

NRCC Concert Series presents Blue Ridge Girls, Adam McPeak & Mountain Thunder

The music of Adam McPeak & Mountain Thunder and the Blue Ridge Girls will be featured during New Community College's Concert Series event today, Saturday., March 11, 2023, with the music beginning at 6 p.m. in 117 Edwards Hall at NRCC in Dublin.

Adam McPeak & Mountain Thunder is composed primarily of young bluegrass musicians Virginia, mandolin player Adam at the helm. Members of the band are Mike McPeak, Adam's father, who plays guitar and sings lead and harmony vocals; Nikki Wright who plays fiddle and sings lead and harmony vocals; David Chrisley who plays bass and sings harmony vocals; and Steve Chrisley, David's father, who plays banjo.

The group began at fiddler's playing conventions and then went on to play their own shows and participate in competitions. They placed ninth and tenth at Society for the Preservation of Bluegrass Music in America National Band Championship events in Nashville. They have also appeared on public television's "Song of the Mountains."

The Blue Ridge Girls, like their name, invoke a picturesque simplicity with their take on traditional mountain music. The trio features Martha Spencer, Jamie Collins, and Brett Morris and features a variety of old time, bluegrass and country songs, flatfooting to fiddle and banjo tunes, original songwriting, and

unique takes on other familiar crowd-pleasers. All three women grew up in musical families and are working to preserve and promote the Blue Ridge's rich musical heritage. The Blue Ridge Girls traveled to historic Muscle Shoals, Alabama, during the summer of 2021 to record their first album.

After being shut down by COVID, the NRV's Intellectual Disability Agency schedules fundraisers

Intellectual Disabilities Agency of the New River Valley (IDA), established in 1965, supports therapeutic, educational, social, and recreational programs for persons with Intellectual

Disabilities in the New River Valley. During COVID, IDA had to cancel all programing for its clients as they were more vulnerable to the disease. The lack of outside activities negatively affected them physically and mentally as well. Funding for the programs was greatly restricted.

Under new Executive Director Denise Helland, expanded activities are underway including two fundraising events: the annual wine/beer tasting and silent auction on Friday, April 21, from 6 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. and the annual golf tournament on Monday, Aug. 14, in the

Both events will take place at the Blacksburg Country Club in Ellett Valley. The IDA is seeking auction items for the silent auction as well as tee sponsors and prizes for the golf tournament.

Earl Brown, President of the IDA's Board of Directors, says the IDA provides important quality of life benefits for its clients.

"The children and adults who participate with this agency will always need these services," Brown said. "When children begin participating with IDA, they will most likely be accessing these activities for their lifetime. In fact, most adults have been participating with IDA since they were children. Participation has steadily grown over the years, which reflects the quality of the

activities and programs."

In the upcoming weeks, IDA members will be contacting business owners and individuals regarding donations for the two fundraisers.



JM is only a Class 2 school but has dominated opponents this year with only three wins by fewer than 40 points. The Justices have also scored 100 points 11 times this season including last week's 112-49 win over Brunswick.

Radford is coming off a 17-point comeback that ended in an overtime win over Floyd this past Monday.

Radford High's Rick Cormany is the winningest active coach in the commonwealth, but for Radford to win, he will have to figure out how to slow down an offense that definitely knows

JM did have three close games this season, all in big invitational tournaments, including 69-62 over Dematha and 65-53 over Greensboro Day School. For the season, the Justices outscored their

opponents 2,307 to 1,335.

Three players are shooting 38 percent or better from behind the three-point arc. 6-8 freshman Latrell Almond had 83 blocks this season to go with 214 rebounds. His average is 3.5 blocks and nine rebounds per game.

The NCAA awards up to 126 postgraduate scholarships annually. The scholarships are awarded to student-athletes who excel academically and athletically and who are at least in their final year of intercollegiate athletics competition.

The one-time non-renewable scholarships of \$10,000 are awarded three times a year corresponding to each sport's season (fall, winter and spring). Each sports season 21 scholarships are available for men and 21 scholarships are available for women for use in an accredited graduate program.

All former student-athletes who earned an undergraduate degree from an NCAA member school are eligible to be nominated by that school for an NCAA graduate degree scholarship, regardless of when they received their undergraduate degree.

"In order to provide Ms. Wollmann with the best reference possible, we had a series of Zoom interviews

and email exchanges," said Radford Athletics' NCAA Faculty Athletics Representative Holly Cline. "I have enjoyed getting to know Jessica on a personal level," Cline said. "She is smart, kind, and extremely impressive. She has a clear vision as to why she is pursuing a PhD. And it is no wonder why she competed so fiercely in her sport. Within ten minutes of talking to her, I could tell that she was driven to achieve her graduate degree and destined to be successful."



Lady Hokies win ACC championship

Virginia Tech's women's basketball team won their first championship of the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) Sunday by defeating Louisville 75-67 Sunday at Greensboro Coliseum and is now headed to the 2023 NCAA basketball tournament, possibly as a number one seed. But that will not be known until the seedings are announced later this week.

This is the Lady Hokies' third straight appearance in the NCAA tournament. VT head coach Kenny Brooks and the Hokies will be part of the live broadcast of the NCAA Selection Show from Cassell Coliseum on Sunday, March 12.

Doors will open at 7 p.m. with the event beginning at 7:30. The Selection Show will air live on ESPN at 8 p.m.

Coach Brooks and his team will host

NCAA action in Blacksburg for the first time since 2004. The Hokies are expected to be playing at home during the postseason.

In the finals against Louisville, Georgia Amoore collected 25 points and Elizabeth Kitley added 20 to lead the Hokies to the tournament crown and the clinching of an automatic bid for the NCAA

The Hokies (27-4) entered the tournament as the No. 3 seed and defeated Miami (Fla.), Duke and Louisville enroute to the league tournament championship. Tech's 1994 National Player of the Year, defense was fantastic yet again, holding Louisville shooters to only 37.3 percent from the field.

The Hokies never trailed after taking a 21-14 first-quarter lead. Amoore, Kitley, and Taylor Soule combined to account for 77 percent of the Hokies' points.

Virginia Tech had a 35-34 edge on the boards in the win and got a teamhigh seven rebounds from Cayla King.

Amoore made 14 three-pointers during Tech's three games in Greensboro, setting a new tournament record and clinching tournament MVP honors.

The Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) announced the five finalists for the 2023 Lisa Leslie Award, and for the second straight season, Elizabeth Kitley was a finalist.

Named after three-time All-American, and Class of 2015 Hall of Famer Lisa Leslie, the annual award in its sixth year recognizes the top centers in women's NCAA Division I college basketball.


The other four finalists are Mackenzie Holmes (Indiana), Monika Czinano (Iowa), Jessika Carter (Mississippi State),

and Aliyah Boston (South Carolina). Kitley was named the ACC's Player

of the Year for the second consecutive season, the conference office announced Tuesday evening. She became the tenth woman in ACC history to win the award in consecutive seasons.

The Summerfield, North Carolina, native ranks fourth in the conference in scoring per game (18.78), second in field-goal percentage (.569), first in rebounds per game (10.74), first in blocks per game (2.3), first in doubledoubles (18) and is the only athlete in the conference to record a 20-rebound

She won ACC-Player-of-the-Week honors four times, the most of any athlete, including each of the last two weeks as she has recorded four consecutive 20-point double-doubles while shooting 60.2% from the field.
