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## Annual Eastmont Tomato Festival draws a record crowd this year

A tomato talent show, tomato eating contest, TomatOlympics, and of course, fried green tomatoes were just some of the highlights of the Eastmont Tomato Festival, held Aug. 19 at the Meadowbrook Center in Shawsville.

Celebrating their 16th anniversary this year with a record number of attendees, Eastmont Community Foundation along with Red Sun Farms and the Meadowbrook Library sponsored and supported the event. Along with the sponsors, the ACCE students and The Hokie Way athletes from Virginia Tech University also volunteered their time and energy in making the event spectacular.

Ellen Ryan, Treasurer of Eastmont Community Foundation, shared how the event had developed over the years.

"It just kind of grew out of the farmer's market and they ran it for a little while," Ryan said.

Eastmont Community Foundation took over the organization of the tomato festival. With tomatoes being center stage at the event, freshness was important too.

Volunteers from the organization could be found picking green tomatoes, fresh from the vine, as volunteers stood ready at stations to serve up hot fried green tomatoes. Branch Manager of Meadowbrook Library Cindy Minnick has served up the delicious fried treats every year as one of the volunteers.

The tomato tasting was open to attendees as well and showcased many varieties of tomatoes, 27 in fact. Participants could vote for their favorite after tasting each one.

"My hope is that we'll grow some that are the favorite and use them next year,"

Ryan said.

Festival goers could purchase tickets for food that included options for homemade pizza, fried green tomatoes, tomato sandwiches, and hot dogs, as well

The pizza maker that had previously baked for the event was not available this year, so Ellen Ryan's son Adam Ryan stepped up. Adam Ryan had just moved back from New Orleans and provided a tasty homemade pizza with a variety of toppings, including of course, delicious fresh tomatoes. Volunteers worked steadily in the kitchen, at the stations, and even outside at the grill to keep the food moving for participants.

Meadowbrook Community Center, that once was a retirement home, holds a large kitchen equipped with lots of space for a large event. However, some

equipment is showing its age.

"We are babying our Hobart dishwasher," Ryan said. "We will quit when the dishwasher quits."

Families joined together also in making the event special for everyone. Ellen Ryan's other son, Givens Ryan, stayed busy at the outdoor grill to be sure everyone had a chance to savor the fresh fried green tomatoes at the event.

A local celebrity that appears every year to offer his volunteer services is the "Boogie Woogie Man," Jimmy Valiant, a World Wrestling Federation wrestler who began his career in the 1960s. Valiant still runs a wrestling camp in Shawsville and is a supporter and volunteer for the Eastmont Tomato Festival.

"Every year he comes, and he is so sweet," Ryan said. "We all have our little niche'. Robert Pilkington has run the

## U.S. Representative supports Franklin for 41st District in Blacksburg canvass kickoff

BLACKSBURG - Lily Franklin, democratic candidate for the newly drawn Virginia House of Delegates District 41, kicked off her canvassing campaign on Aug. 19 in Blacksburg. U.S. Representative Abigail Spanberger and Paul Bradfield, Southern Regional Director for Run for Something, provided remarks at the event.

Run for Something is a political organization that is dedicated to "recruiting and supporting young progressives" in running for political offices, according to their website at

runforsomething.net.
This will be the first election with the newly drawn district lines, establishing the 41st district for the Virginia House of Delegates. According to the website www.maps/montva.com, Montgomery County's boundaries divided between districts 41 and 42. In December 2021, the Virginia Supreme Court approved new redistricting of maps for Virginia's Congressional, House of Delegates, and State Senate Districts. District 41 encompasses parts of Montgomery County (including Blacksburg, Shawsville and Riner) and Roanoke County (including parts of Catawba, Glenvar, Windsor Hills and Cave Spring).

Franklin was nominated for the 41st House of Delegates District as the Democratic candidate in early April. Since then, Franklin and her

committee have been working to set up a local campaign office in Blacksburg, canvas neighborhoods and announce her candidacy through marketing advertisements and yard signs.

Franklin's campaign focuses on the economic needs of the family at different stages of life and regardless of class level.

Our economy should allow everyone to build a sustainable future for their families, regardless of their background or zip code," Franklin's webpage states at lilyfordelegate.com.

Other issues that Franklin wishes to address if chosen as the House of Delegates representative are the ongoing mental health crisis, education, access to affordable healthcare, and environmental issues including a focus on chemicals in Roanoke's drinking water.

Chris Obenshain, a republican, will be opposing Franklin. Obenshain's priorities are addressing issues of economic growth with preserving the Virginia's Right to Work status, supporting parent's true choice to schools, addressing environmental issues, and focusing on cost of living for Virginians. obenshainfordelegate.com. Franklin will continue knocking on doors to speak to 41st District voters on Aug. 26 and 27 in Blacksburg and in Roanoke on the 27, meeting at the South County Library Parking lot. Supporters that wish to join Franklin in her mission should visit her webpage for more

a bowl of tomatoes while traversing over, under, and through obstacles as quickly as they could.



According to the museum's website montgomerymuseum.org, Montgomery Museum of Art and History was previously located in the circa 1852 Christiansburg Presbyterian Church manse. In June of 2022, the museum reopened in its new location in the old bank building on Main Street, Christiansburg. The bank vault makes for an interesting exhibit that museum attendees can walk into and observe the old bank deposit boxes along with artifacts from the region's past.

The 300 Peppers St. location is the Montgomery Museum Garden. Many childrens' activities, additional food options, and a petting zoo could be reached via a hayride. Emerald Downs Farm provided animals for viewing and petting as well.

"We have two buff Orpington hens, a bunny from the pound of mysterious origins, three Nigerian Dwarf goats, and my Haflinger horse who loved all of the attention," Melissa Downs said.

A big event that was also a great fundraiser for the museum was the silent auction held inside the museum. Paintings, baskets of wine, books, and other items were up for bid. As the auction was ending at 3 p.m., anxious bidders held their breath to see if their offering would win or be outbid. It was all great fun with money going to support the museum.

Museum Curator, Sherry Wyatt, could be seen behind the old teller counter collecting money for the gift shop and helping to coordinate the day's events. The funds collected by those visiting the museum's gift shop and the silent auction will help to continue the

community programs such as educational programming and maintaining and curating historical and cultural artifacts.

"Just looking to expand our programming and continue with the work we've been doing to offer history and art for the community," Wyatt said. "Except for 2020, we have been doing this event for many years."

Many organizations were present to support their community in a variety of ways. The New River Valley Quilts of Valor Quilters are a group of members who come together to create patriotic quilts that will eventually be presented to a veteran who has been nominated in honor of their military service.

"We're part of a national organization and what we do is, we are a group of volunteers, we make quilts," said Gloria Smith, NRV Group Leader. "We're here today, just to get the word out. We're looking for veterans to give them the information, but we're also looking for quilters who would like to support the cause by making quilts, or making quilt tops and we will get it quilted."

Another local business, providing

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## Virginia gas prices increase slightly in past week

gallon in the last week, averaging \$3.66/g today, according to GasBuddy's survey of 4,081 stations in Virginia.

Prices in Virginia are 24.4 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand 1.8 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has risen 2.1 cents in the last week and stands at \$4.297 per gallon.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Virginia was priced at \$3.09/g yesterday while the most expensive was \$4.49/g, a difference of \$1.40/g. The lowest price in the state yesterday was \$3.09/g while the highest was \$4.49/g, a difference of \$1.40/g. The national average price of gasoline is unchanged in

the last week, averaging \$3.82/g today. The national average s up 26.0 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 4.5 cents per gallon lower than a year ago, according to GasBuddy data compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

Historical gasoline prices in Virginia and the national average going back ten years:

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Every purchase of a Fightin' Hokies beer helps a Hokie taste success. That's because a portion of the proceeds from each sale of the popular beer, created by Hardywood Park Craft Brewery under license with Virginia Tech, goes to fund scholarships, study abroad, and research opportunities for Virginia Tech students. This year, three undergraduate students in the

College of Agriculture and Life Sciences' Department of Food Science and Technology received Fightin' Hokies Lager Scholarships toward tuition, room, and board. They are pursuing degrees in food science and technology with the food and beverage fermentation option, one of only seven four-year degrees in the nation recognized by the Master Brewers Association Scholarship recipient Sofia Palacios, a sophomore

from Falls Church, Virginia, is the first member of her family to attend college.

"This scholarship will help me greatly in being able to afford to attend college and lessen the burden on my family," Palacios said. "The Department of Food Science and Technology has introduced me to numerous careers in food and beverages and opened many doors for me in pursuing fermentation. I ultimately hope to have my own bar or bakery where I can make alcoholic and nonalcoholic beverages and bake bread, all while experimenting with different

Sam Steele, a sophomore from Maryville, Tennessee, said he was "honored and humbled" by the scholarship.

'The knowledge that support for my educational pursuit goes beyond my family and encompasses faculty, alumni, and even just casual consumers of a really good beer is inspirational," he said. "I have had the opportunity to see the practical application of academic excellence both through my class work at Virginia Tech and by visiting the West Creek location of Hardywood. I hope to honor the privilege provided by this unique cooperation between the academic and business community."

The scholarship was also awarded to Shannon Hacker, a junior from Alexandria, Virginia. "This scholarship is a huge help because I am an

independent student with the responsibility of all my financial needs," Hacker said. "Fermentation has been a great interest of mine ever since a family member worked at a winery. I would go after school and help in the vineyard picking grapes. It was an amazing experience and ignited a passion in me. I hope to work with a brewery or winery, whether it's working behind

the scenes in labs or on site. It's a truly unique and wonderful atmosphere around this industry and I can't wait to be a part of it." Made by Hokies for Hokies, Fightin' Hokies Lager

hit the market in 2021 and emerged as Virginia's best-

selling new craft beer during its first year. It followed

up that success by earning a silver medal in the Munich-style helles category at the 2022 Australian Beer Awards - the largest annual beer competition of its kind. Virginia Tech and Hardywood are working to expand the beer's distribution nationally and to unveil more specialty beers in the future. Virginia Tech's partnership with Hardywood, along with its more recent collaboration with Homestead

Creamery, brings innovative food science research to market and also shares the proceeds with students in the form of scholarships, experiential learning, and research opportunities. "One hundred percent of everything we are bringing back to our department goes toward our students," said

Herbert Bruce, master brewer and assistant professor of practice for undergraduate education, who serves on the Fightin' Hokies Lager Scholarship committee. Bruce is also co-creator of Fightin' Hokes Lager with colleagues Brian Wiersema, manager of Virginia Tech's food processing pilot plant, and Sean O'Keefe, professor of food science and technology. "Through our industry collaborations like Fightin"

Hokies Lager and Hokie Tracks, we've found another way of serving students by sharing some of the proceeds of our research and innovation," Bruce said.

The Department of Food Science and Technology is recognized as one of the top food science programs in the country. Students enjoy a near-100 percent job placement rate and average starting salaries of \$77,000. Notable alumni include the current president of Kansas State University, the director of the Panamanian Food Agency, and the former U.S. Under Secretary of Agriculture for Food Safety.

Bruce said the demand for food scientists is at an all-time high, making it more important than ever to

help students succeed in the field.
"We look at these scholarships as part of Virginia Tech's legacy of Ut Prosim, That I May Serve," he said, referring to the university's motto. "It's a way to give back to our students that ultimately makes their lives easier and more successful, so they have the chance to give back down the road."

## 2023 high school season kicks off this Friday

High school football kicks off this Friday night with several interesting games to start the 2023 season.

One of the biggest changes in the Virginia High School football this year was seen during Friday night's scrimmage between Christiansburg and Giles. Officials enforced pants below the knee. At least 18 times, players were sent off the field because their pants legs were not over their knees.

Here are other rule changes:

Clarification that towels do not have to be the same solid color for each player — Player towels may contain one manufacturer's logo and/or one school logo neither exceeding 21/4 square inches. Towels must be a solid color but now do not have to be the same solid color for each player. Towels may not be ball- or penalty-flag colored.

Clarification when a player is inbounds after being out of bounds — This change clarifies when a player

is inbounds after being out of bounds. There is no change to any foul or subsequent penalty provisions, or any rules related to illegal participation or the provisions regarding eligibility to catch a pass.

Addition of a list of criteria to help identify players who should be defined as defenseless receivers — This change adds to the list of criteria to help identify players who should be defined as défenseless receivers related to application of unnecessary contact. This clarification should help game officials and coaches by defining allowable contact against defenseless

grounding exception Intentional - This change permits the exception for intentional grounding to the first and only player to possess the

ball after the snap ends. Removed "intentional" pass interference -- By removing intentional" from pass interference, this change puts the rule in line with how it is already enforced which is a 15yard penalty.

Changes in basic spot penalty enforcement — This change restructures and clarifies the amendments to Rule 10 to eliminate the excessive penalty enforcements for offensive fouls that occur behind the line of scrimmage. This revision stipulates the basic spot for enforcement of fouls behind the line of scrimmage is the previous spot rather than the spot of the foul unless otherwise specified by rule. Current penalties for illegal kicking, batting and participation fouls, and provisions for offensive fouls occurring in the end zone that may result in a safety remain

Clarification on the ball being handed forward on a running play — The change allows the ball to be handed forward on a running play, including to the guards/ ends, while prohibiting handing the ball to the snapper provided both players are behind the neutral zone.

In a move to achieve one of the committee's fundamental tasks of maintaining a balance between offense and defense, this revision stipulates the basic spot for enforcement of fouls behind the line of scrimmage is the previous spot rather than the spot of the foul. Current penalties for illegal kicking, batting and participation fouls, as well as provisions for offensive fouls occurring in the end zone that may

result in a safety, remain intact. As an example, with the change in Rule 10-4, a team on offense at its own 40-yard line that is called for holding 10 yards behind the line of scrimmage at its own 30-yard line, would be faced with first and 20 from its 30-yard line rather than the almost insurmountable task of

first and 30 from its own 20-yard line. "This is an excellent rule change that the majority of game officials and coaches requested and that our NFHS Football Rules Committee members approved unanimously," said Richard McWhirter, chair of the NFHS Football Rules Committee and assistant executive director of the Tennessee Secondary School Athletic Association (TSSAA). "I believe this change will make the rule clearer for coaches and

He will assist in every aspect of the Hokies' recruiting efforts, including overseeing campus visits while hosting prospects, families, and guests.
