Blacksburg Transit makes major route changes

Blacksburg Transit and Virginia Tech will implement a significant enhancement to campus transportation with the launch of a new Campus Shuttle (CAS) route.

This initiative is a major step forward in making travel around the Blacksburg campus more convenient for students, faculty, and staff.

The project marks the culmination of over a decade of planning led by the Town of Blacksburg in collaboration with Virginia

The new Transit Center, located in the North Academic District near Perry Street, spans over 6 acres and includes a 13,000-squarefoot, two-story building. It will serve as a central hub for various modes of alternative transportation, including Blacksburg Transit (BT), Virginia Tech's Sustainable Transportation and Hokie Bike Hub, and other partners such as the Smart Way bus and Virginia Breeze.

The center features two paved bus loops, which will

be the new central hub for all BT buses on campus. The Campus Shuttle will operate using these loops, running in opposite directions around campus. The Orange Loop, located to the west of the building between West Campus Drive and the Perry Street Garage, and the Maroon Loop, situated to the east between Stanger Street and the Perry Street Garage, will facilitate easy

Blacksburg to participate in Find Waldo scavenger hunt celebrating shopping locally



BLACKSBURG- The Town of Blacksburg will be participating for the first time in the annual nationwide Find Waldo Local event created by Candlewick Press and the American Booksellers Association.

Candlewick Press and the American Booksellers Association have held the Find Waldo Local event for 12 years by partnering annually with over 300 independently owned bookstores each year. This year is the first in which they have partnered with Blacksburg Books and brought this event to Blacksburg and its residents. The event is part of an initiative to support local businesses and have fun in the community. Similar to the books by Martin Handford, residents will search 25 Blacksburg stores for the iconic Waldo. This event is entirely free to participate in and lasts all month long starting July 1, 2024.

With each miniature Waldo they spot, searchers get their card stamped or signed by the participating shop. Collecting store stamps or signatures at fifteen or more businesses will entitle diligent seekers entry into a grand-prize drawing for Waldo books and other prizes, including gift cards! All participants are welcome to attend the celebration party at Blacksburg Books on July 31st at 3pm. Mayor Leslie Hager-Smith of Blacksburg will be there to hand out the grand prize!"

Blacksburg Books and its follow Blacksburg small businesses like the Lyric Theatre, Our Daily Bread and



Fringe Benefit, will have stamp cards for participants to begin their searches for the red-and-white striped shirt and black glasses that have been popular since the 1980's.

"Each of the participating businesses will have a six-inch Waldo figure," Ellen Woodall, manager of Blacksburg Books said, "hidden somewhere on their premises. Participants have the entire month to find the Waldos and get their cards stamped. Those who

Tourism director discusses **Montgomery County** Tourism office efforts

MONTGOMERY COUNTY- David E. Rotenizer, Executive Director of Tourism for Montgomery County, says the tourism office has been busy since September 2023 when ARPA Funds were used to build a foundation for tourism.

Rotenizer explained roughly \$50 million in American Rescue Plan Act funds went to the general assembly who then allocated the funds by county and city. Montgomery County received \$180,000 to be used for tourism.

Building toward a future for Montgomery County tourism, the ARPA funds allocated to five projects: obtaining a spread in the 2024 Virginia State Travel Guide, having two media or "FAM" Destination Optimization, an asset inventory of outdoor tourism; and focusing on messaging and strategic recommendations.

With the anticipation passenger arriving in Blacksburg via Amtrak, a process that has been on-going for well over a decade, Rotenizer and his team focused the ARPA funds on optimizing tourism opportunities, educating local businesses highlighting and abundance the tourism opportunities Montgomery County has to offer. With each of the five projects, the Montgomery County Tourism Office focused on aspects of tourism that needed to be addressed and ways to spread the word about the wonders one can find in Montgomery County.

The two-page spread

in the 2024 Virginia State Travel Guide was a first for Montgomery County, Rotenizer said, adding Montgomery County had never been highlighted in the guide before, let alone in the Southwest Virginia: Blue Ridge Highlands portion. The content highlights the arts and culture of Blacksburg, Christiansburg and the rest of Montgomery County as well as recreation, dining and

the universities. "It's marketing," Rotenizer said, "but, to me, it's also foundation building. Now that we have secured this, we have first right of refusal if we ever want to advertise here again and build a presence there."

On June 7, 2024, Atmos Energy Corporation ("Atmos" or "Company") completed the filing of an application ("Application") pursuant to § 56-603 *et seq.* of the Code of Virginia ("Code"), known as the Steps to Advance Virginia's Energy (SAVE) Plan Act, for approval of its annual update of its SAVE Rider, consisting of a revised Infrastructure Replacement Current Rate ("Projected Factor") and an Infrastructure Replacement Reconciliation Rate ("True-Up Factor"), under the Company's approved SAVE Plan. Pursuant to Code § 56-604 E, the Commission shall approve or deny, within 90 days, a natural gas utility's proposed SAVE rider adjustment.

In support of its Application, Atmos states that, pursuant to the Commission's prior orders regarding its SAVE Plan, the Company is filing this Application for approval to implement updated SAVE Rider rates, effective with the first billing cycle in October 2024. Atmos has requested a Projected Factor revenue requirement of \$2,428,914 for the upcoming SAVE Plan year as well as a True-Up Factor revenue rec guirement of \$84,298 related to the Company's fourth year of investment under its SAVE Plan, for a combined 2024 SAVE Rider revenue requirement of \$2,513,212. As proposed, the 2024 SAVE Rider rate for residential customers will be \$2.99 per month, an increase of \$0.90 over the current rate of \$2.09 per month for such customers.

The details of these and other proposals are set forth in the Company's Application. Interested persons are encouraged to review the Company's Application and supporting exhibits for the details of these proposals.

TAKE NOTICE that the Commission may adopt rates that differ from those appearing in the Company's Application and supporting documents and may apportion revenues among customer classes and/or design rates in a manner differing from that shown in the Application and supporting documents.

to the CDC, the tick bite triggers a molecule named galactose-a-1,3galactose which is found in most mammals. This makes it so that when people eat red meat or other mammalian products, their body reacts to it as an allergen, hence why it is commonly referred to as the

"Red Meat Allergy".
"This could mean," explained regarding reaction, "anaphylaxis. It could mean GI distress. It could mean nothing. So, a certain percentage of people will get bitten and will actually contract Alpha-Gal syndrome, but will have no symptoms whatsoever."

Debbie and Candice explained that their reactions to this allergy are on the severe side to the point where they are both fume-reactive, meaning they can have an allergic reaction because they are in a space where meat is being cooked and they breathe in those particles and it sends their bodies into distress.

'Alpha-Gal is different," Matthis explained, "because you look at other tick-borne diseases; they're bacterial or viral. Alpha-Gal is not. It's an IGE response. It's an allergy. When you research Alpha-Gal, other animals, most other mammals, carry it [the molecule galactose-a-1,3-galactose] naturally. They genetically have this carbohydrate, which we [humans]

The allergy reacts to mammalian byproducts, which from its nickname makes people believe that it is just food based, however Debbie and Candice explain that mammalian by-products like tallow, gelatin, or dairy, exist in our everyday lives in household products like soap, laundry detergent, candles, paint and even crayons and therefore this allergy cause an entire lifestyle change where its not solely about watching what you eat. The Two Alpha-Gals explained that this even restricts what kind of medicines someone who lives with Alpha-Gal Syndrome can use as gel capsule medications often have gelatin in them which is a pork byproduct. This can also mean, because companies can change their chemical formulas, that a product that was once safe can become no longer safe

for people with this allergy. Since 2019, the Two Alpha-Gals have been spreading knowledge, doing research and advocating for people with this allergy as they explained that it is not on a typical allergy table or a tick-borne disease test. Matthis and Nichols explain that oftentimes people react to this information with shock and awe or revelation because it shows people who have been struggling with the symptoms that this syndrome is a possible cause for their ailments. The test for Alpha-Gal is typically covered by insurance and they advise adding it to a tick-borne disease test if you suspect being bitten.

'If you're in a place," Nichols said, where you're potentially getting bit by deer ticks that give you Lyme, you're probably in a place where you have the potential to get bit by lone star ticks, so people with Lyme who are not seeing relief from their symptoms; it would be worth it to check for Alpha-Gal syndrome because the symptoms can also be joint pain and all these symptoms that look like Lyme and other tickborne diseases, and the lifestyle shift [need if you have Alpha-Gal] makes all the difference."

The Alpha-Gals mission is to give people the tools, education, confidence and empowerment to live with Alpha-Gal Syndrome. As there is no medical way to prevent Alpha-Gal Syndrome, those who have it will have to make a lasting change to their lives and work with medical professionals to help give them relief from their symptoms. The Alpha-Gals also tackle the mental health and holistic aspects in their endeavors and try to help grow awareness in the overall community. As more research is occurring rapidly regarding Alpha-Gal, Matthis and Nichols have a food allergy mentorship program they run and advocate for others. They have a podcast, blog, and many social media platforms they use to help spread information and educate. They are in the process of launching a non-profit which would be a bigger and louder platform for them called the Alpha Gal Foundation where they can fundraise to help more of the Alpha-Gal Syndrome community and bridge that gap between healthcare, the underdiagnosed and lifestyle change. They aim to help more people.



Delegate urges fix to Virginia Military Survivors and Dependents Education Program

This past week, the Senate of Virginia had an opportunity to take the first real step in fixing the Virginia Military Survivors and Dependents Education Program (VMSDEP), a topic that I have written about several times over the past months. During hours of work in Richmond, the Senate failed to even consider any legislation to fix the program. To say that Senate Democrats made a hash of last week's session is an understatement.

Both the committee hearing for this legislation and session itself began hours late, and neither considered any bills. This was a huge inconvenience to the hundreds of Virginians who travelled to Richmond in order to testify in favor of VMSDEP's importance to veterans and their families. As multiple senators noted, there was a bill pending that would have repealed the VMSDEP changes that have caused consternation, which would have cleared the way for the House to act on that same legislation when we return to Richmond on June 28. This would have given peace of mind to those Gold Star, combat disabled, and first responder families who depend on this program for their children's education. Yet for some reason, the

senate took up no bills at all, either in committee or on the floor, leaving VMSDEP families in limbo for even longer. Democrats in the Senate insisted that they are simply acting to preserve the viability of the program, yet as Senate Majority Leader Louise Lucas said in her opening remarks, Democrats coupled VMSDEP legislation to skill games legislation, possibly to use it as leverage to force that bill's passage.

The most recent analysis of the program by General Assembly Appropriations staff shows that VMSDEP has grown to serve more than 8,300 Gold Star families, at a price tag of \$84.9 million this fiscal year. Legislators on both sides of the aisle agree that the program needs

reform, but most believe that the reform needs to happen during a regular General Assembly session where stakeholders can play a major role in the process.

The solution is simple. We must adopt bipartisan legislation that will repeal the changes passed in the budget, utilize the Preserving VMSDEP Task Force to issue recommendations, and then return in January and work through the legislative process to reform the program. A bipartisan majority in the House is ready to return on June 28 to do just that. What is vitally important to me is that we keep our promises that we make to the Commonwealth's Veterans and their families. Their sacrifice means they deserve nothing





Another Blue Demon headed to Concord

Another Christiansburg High School baseball player is headed to Athens, West Virginia to play for Concord University.

Rising senior Gavin Dow announced his commitment this past weekend to play at the school. Of course, CHS and Concord are no strangers on the diamond.

Concord recently appointed Drew Bailey, a Christiansburg graduate, as its new head baseball coach. In four seasons previously at Bluefield State, Bailey compiled a record of 95-79, highlighted by the most successful season in program history as BSU went 33-15 this spring and won its second HBCU World Series last week in Montgomery, Alabama—the second such title in the last four seasons.

Under Bailey's guidance, Bluefield State steadily improved from 15 wins in his first season to the program-record 33

While Bluefield State was Bailey's most recent head coaching stop, the Christiansburg native brings nine years of coaching experience to Athens. From 2014-17, Bailey was an assistant coach at Bluefield University where he helped the Rams to a 32-21 record in his final

The first head coaching opportunity Bailey received was for the 2018 season at Division III Averrett University in

Danville, Virginia.

Beginning in 2018, Bailey was the head softball coach at Bluefield University. After his stint as the head softball coach in Bluefield, Virginia, Bailey was a volunteer assistant coach for Concord during the fall of 2020 before being hired away by Bluefield State in January 2021.

Meanwhile Concord has become Christiansburg-West with as many as four other former Blue Demon players dotting the school's baseball roster over the past three years. Those include MJ Hunter, Connor Brizendine, Dawson Gragg and Marshall Basham. Recent graduate Jeremiah Thompson is also headed this fall to Concord and its baseball program.

The Bailey and Christiansburg connection is a main reason for Dow in making his decision.

"The main reason I chose Concord is because I wanted an opportunity to play for coach Drew Bailey," Dow said. "Also, they have my academic major and the other key part was their nice facilities and the upgrades there making to them."

Concord University is a public university and has a current enrollment of 1,375 students. The university is known athletically as the Mountain Lions and is an NCAA Division II school, and a member of the Mountain East Conference.

Dow has primarily played third base while on the field at CHS but moved over to shortstop this past year. He was second team for the River Ridge and Region D all-star teams after leading the team in hits and average (.375).

"In college, I hope to continue to grow as a player and contribute to the success of the team," he said. "I also hope to accomplish winning the conference championship and make the NCAA Division II tournament.



Two years ago, Sean Gaynor was coaching an all-star travel softball team and was helping with the program at a dominant Auburn High School, who had won as many as five of the last seven state

Turn the clock to last summer when the opening at Christiansburg High School popped up. Gaynor did not think twice and applied for the job.

"I've always coached softball and in all honestly, I feel more comfortable in being in the dugout or the dirt. Saw it as an opportunity," he said.

Gaynor led Christiansburg to its first ever state championship, rolling through regional and district competition to finish with a 24-3 record. Max Preps ranked them as number four in the entire state across all six classes. Two years ago, Christiansburg was 12-9 and was 33-21 combined over the past four seasons.

(on the softball field)," he said.

The key toward the end of the season, he said was telling the girls they were playing their best ball and, "I told them they would be just fine."

Last week, Gaynor was named the Class 3 coach of the year. Purdue-commit and Christiansburg's ace pitcher Kadyn Camper was named the state's player of the year. Christiansburg teammate Addison Reasor (third base) joined Camper on the first team.

"It was super exciting and super humbling," Gaynor said in winning the state's top honor.

"God has smiled upon us." Camper won 20 games and 277 strikeouts this

season and 600 in her career. He sang Camper's praise. "It was nice having

such a dominant ace in the circle." Gaynor is optimistic the future is bright for the Christiansburg program as they only lose four seniors. Of course, it includes the graduating Camper, but the cabinet is not bear. Seven starters return to a team that has depth including the UVA-commit in Reasor. The state run also included bringing up two talented players from the junior varsity.

"I feel really good about that. I've got several good pitchers coming back so we should be good. Kinda excited what we've got going," he

from Oregon State and Miami (Ohio). The rising senior at Irmo High School had an impressive junior year that included 2,932 yards


and 45 touchdowns with only two interceptions. He also rushed for 1,13 yards and 17 touchdowns.

If Brand does work out at QB, he could play multipositions as he has been listed as an overall athlete in this recruiting process.


