Town council approves agreement for Blacksburg Museum Citizens raise concerns about the facilities' leadership

BLACKSBURG - The Blacksburg Town Council voted to approve a resolution regarding the operating agreement between The Blacksburg Museum and Cultural Foundation and the Town of Blacksburg at its meeting Aug. 13, 2024.

The operating agreement between The Blacksburg Museum and Cultural Foundation and the Town of Blacksburg states the town owns the property and the facilities on the grounds. This includes the Alexander Black House and the St. Luke Odd Fellows Hall. The agreement is to last five years. "The parties intend for the general responsibilities,"

the operating agreement reads, "of the foundation to include (i) providing resources for the renovation and restoration of the facilities through a commitment to fundraising, including capital, endowment, and potential on-going annual fundraising; (ii) serving

as an advocate for other town historic properties; (iii) advising on long- range planning and vision for the facilities and the other historic properties; (iv) serving as an ambassador in the community and region by advocating on behalf of historic preservation, arts and culture; and (v) having members serve on committees or task forces, as needed; more specifically, the foundation plans to develop an ambitious program to study and record the history of Blacksburg, as well as to promote and facilitate the visual and performing arts in Blacksburg.'

Citizens were invited to speak openly on this topic during citizen comments and many of the residents who spoke to this agreement said they are disheartened by many of the goings-on regarding St. Luke and Odd Fellows Hall and the other facilities. This includes qualms with the public communication and direct communications with committee chairs of the facilities.

"There has been a lack of transparent communication," Jody Daniels, a citizen, said, "with the public regarding

how the museum executes its mission and manages both the Alexander Black House and the St. Luke and Odd Fellows Hall equitably. The exclusion of interested parties and community members continues and there seems to be no accountability or effort to address this issue.'

Christine King, a descendant of Gordon Mills who helped build the hall, spoke to the town council regarding the treatment and communications she's had with those in charge of the building. King also expressed frustrations with the St. Luke and Odd Fellows Hall committee.

"If you don't have a vision for the future of the hall," King said, "perhaps there is a need for a change in leadership. The deed clearly outlines numerous positive outcomes for the building, which she seems to disregard which is unacceptable.'

Although this operating agreement was approved, the community members said they would like to see, at minimum, a change in communication and inclusion.



obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) is a common lung disease that causes breathing problems and restricted airflow. Typically, it is caused by longterm cigarette smoking.

Harry Collins was one of those individuals, a long-time smoker where many relatives had died from cancer, including his mother.

"I know smoking was killing me, but I liked it so much I willing to take the risk," he said in a recent interview. "I always thought I could not live without a cigarette when, in fact, the opposite was true.

After a trip to the hospital, Collins was told he might not survive.

Now, Collins is sharing his struggle. Medical experts say the serious side of COPD will prevent individuals from daily activities like walking and taking care of themselves. Collins was determined to change things.

"I hope my story provides some

obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD).

Of course, a transplant isn't a permanent cure, but it does help control the symptoms and allows the individual to live longer.

In most cases, the longevity is just averaging five years. Collins has rewritten those numbers. Many people that were in his transplant support group have passed. He says six are still living after going through similar experiences.

"It has been over 14 years since I had my transplant, and a lot of things have happened in that time," Collins says as he opens his narrative.

"There is nothing special about me. I'm just a regular 59-year-old man who was given the supreme gift in life– another chance," he said.

His story is one of survival and hope. Collins served one-term on the Christiansburg Town Council and remains active in the community.

Blacksburg Town Council comments on Watson allegations

BLACKSBURG- Mayor Leslie Hager-Smith, during the Blacksburg Town Council meeting, read the statement the town council recently released regarding Council Member Liam Watson's arrest and allegations.

"I'm going to include a statement," Mayor Leslie Hager-Smith said, "that was written a week ago by the Town Council. That is, on August 5th, the town council, in response to questions from the community, released a statement regarding the arrest of Council Member Liam Watson. I thought it'd be appropriate to share the full text of the statement tonight.

Watson was present for the council meeting and participated as he normally would with his fellow council members. The council seemed to be in good spirits throughout the evening, including sharing a laugh when Mayor Hager-Smith fumbled her words later on in the meeting, laughed and corrected herself. The Watson case is under investigation and the town council meetings will continue on their regular schedule.

The statement reads, "Recently the Blacksburg Town Council was made aware, through local news reports, of the arrest of Council Member Liam Watson. At this time the town council has no additional information regarding the allegations beyond what is contained in the indictment. We trust that our legal system, which is based on a presumption of innocence, will address this matter in a timely and just manner. The town council will take appropriate actions, as necessary, as the process unfolds and more facts become available. The town council is a non-partisan elected body committed to upholding the principles of transparency and integrity. We understand the concerns this situation may raise within our community and assure the community that the town council remains dedicated to serving the best interests of Blacksburg and its residents."

Watson was indicted in July on three counts of felony election fraud and one felony count of illegally voting.

Christiansburg Town Council receives tourism analysis presentation

CHRISTIANSBURG- The Cure Agency gave a presentation on tourism and marketing during the Christiansburg Town Council meeting held Tuesday, Aug. 13.

The Cure Agency was brought in by The Montgomery County Tourism Office to help provide suggestions and analysis on tourism in Montgomery County and the towns within it. The analyses were strategic and are meant to provide recommendations on marketing, particularly advertising, to show potential tourists what Montgomery County has to offer.

According to the presentation, the Cure Agency conducted research and analysis of "like" communities, meaning communities in other states or counties that are similar to Christiansburg. They also did interviews and community visits with facility members and community members. The Cure Agency found that Christiansburg residents feel as though Christiansburg is not being represented.

The "way forward" presented by the agency highlighted three pillars that the Town of Christiansburg could

improve upon, capitalize on and highlight to increase tourism and help Christiansburg feel represented. These were Transportation and Connectivity, Innovation and

Technology, and Group Getaways. There is so much Christiansburg has and does that would attract tourists, like drone deliveries and the recreational assets the community has. The Cure Agency explained how the use of keywords by visitors and tourists shows Blacksburg has more awareness in

comparison to Christiansburg. Some of the marketing suggestions the Cure Agency had were to create visitor experience guides

Virginia State Parks becomes first park system in the nation to install viewfinders for colorblind guests at every park

Virginia State Parks is leading the way in inclusivity by becoming the first park system in the nation to install EnChromaadapted viewfinders for colorblind guests at each of its 43 locations.

The viewfinders, made by SeeCoast Manufacturing, are equipped with special lenses from EnChroma designed to help those with red-green Color Vision Deficiency (CVD) experience an expanded range of visible color.

While people with normal color vision see over one million shades of color, those with red-green CVD are estimated to see about 10% of hues and shades. To them, colors containing red and green can appear dull, washed out and indistinguishable.

"This initiative underscores Virginia's commitment to enhancing outdoor experiences for all visitors and sets a new standard for state parks nationwide," said Matt Wells, director of the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation, which manages Virginia State Parks. "We're proud to play a role in opening up a world of vibrant color for colorblind individuals to experience nature like never before."

The installation of EnChromaadapted viewfinders at Virginia State Parks began in 2023 with Natural Tunnel State Park, an initiative that was led by Chief Ranger Ethan Howes who is colorblind. The remaining 42 locations received their viewfinders in 2024.

The purchase of the viewfinders was funded by donations received through the Round-Up for Parks Program, allowing visitors to donate to Virginia State Parks when making a purchase online or at a park. Since 2018, visitors have donated nearly \$300,000, which has been invested in improving offerings and activities.

"Seeing the world in vibrant color is a gift many of us take for granted," said Virginia State Parks Director Dr. Melissa Baker. "The EnChroma viewfinders help us create a one-of-a-kind experience for our red-green colorblind visitors and allow them to better enjoy the breathtaking beauty of our state parks."

To launch this color accessibility initiative on July 26, six red-green colorblind people traveled to Pocahontas State Park in Chesterfield, Virginia, to try the EnChroma viewfinder and share their perspectives on the experience. They included a carpenter, policy analyst, medical dispatcher, personal trainer, permit specialist and college student.

"Virginia gives visitors unrivaled access to beautiful forests, breathtaking mountain views, stunning rivers and the renowned colorful leaves in fall," said Erik Ritchie, CEO of EnChroma. "Virginia is truly for lovers of the outdoors but it's also for lovers of color too. That's why we applaud Virginia State Parks for working with EnChroma to make its colorful beauty more accessible to those who are red-green colorblind."

One in 12 men (8%) and one in 200 women (0.5%) are colorblind. In the U.S.

alone, 13 million people are colorblind and 350 million worldwide. With over 8 million people visiting Virginia State Parks annually, approximately 341,000 are colorblind.

Virginia State Parks joins over 400 organizations worldwide in supporting colorblind guests by installing the SeeCoast viewfinders with EnChroma lenses or loaning EnChroma glasses. This includes nearly 100 state and national parks across 25 states. The patented lenses are engineered with special optical filters that help people with red-green color blindness see an expanded range of visible color. EnChroma glasses are for people with deuteranomalous and protanomalous CVD. They work for approximately eight of 10 red-green colorblind people, but are not a cure for color blindness and results and reaction times vary. A study by the University of the Incarnate Word in San Antonio illustrated the benefits of the glasses.

He is now sharing the bigger picture with the release of three short novels that describe that first step of a lung transplant.

"My 2nd Chance at Life" is about the true events surrounding his bilateral lung transplant for a man who had COPD and had six months to live without a lung transplant.

Thankfully a transplant came about after four dry runs, and this book is about the true trials and tribulations of this journey. It goes through details that he thought would interest the reader.

When he had his lung transplant, there were no books to be found like this. He goes though the friendships he made with the other 25 or so people needing a transplant and the ups and downs with these folks. He even talks about one of his best friends getting his transplant and then passing away tragically. It's a great short read for information on what actually happens when you get a lung transplant when you swap out one set of problems for another set of problems.

"Since lung transplants are becoming much more prevalent, this information has become more important," Collins said.

He joined the Lung Transplant Foundation in 2010 because he felt the need to help find a cure for BOS, which is rejection. He organized the First Annual Lung Transplant Foundation Golf Tournament in June 2011 and has completed 7 tournaments since then. He has served as Vice President and since the death of our Founder, Jeff Goldstein, he has served as CEO and Chairman of the Board for this organization.

Board for this organization. Of course, all the drugs that have helped to make his transplant somewhat successful has caused many other problems.

"The steroids we take for our immune system affect our body in many ways," he said. One of those side effects is "Avascular Neucrosis", which has attacked his bones and joints. He spent several weeks earlier this year fighting this. He has had two hips and a shoulder replaced. He is waiting for a knee and ankle replacement, but doctors have warned that be troublesome because of his lung transplant.

Those same drugs have drastically affected his kidneys, and he is now on dialysis.

The most important thing in his life, according to Collins, is his family, wife, children and grandchildren. He has four children, two stepchildren, and 13 grandchildren.

When he had his transplant, he only had two grandchildren.

"That shows what great things happen with transplants," he said.

Collins had the chance and honor to meet 11 more grandchildren after his

transplant.

"I just hope people learn not to give up," he said.

But his writings didn't stop there. He has also written a short story about his battle with stuttering.

In the book, "I Was a Child Stutterer," he lets the reader into the world of how people treat stutterers. He talks about how stuttering can affect your future plans and how it affects your present-day life.

He gives examples of how people truly treat those with speech problems.

"For some reason some people think stuttering is funny," he said. "This book shows them it's not funny."

This past week, Collins released his third short novel, which discussed his third chance at life after kidney failure. "I just feel very lucky," he said.

RICHMOND - The Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) has launched a new advertising campaign to promote motorcycle safety training.

This initiative seeks to increase awareness of the Virginia Rider Training Program and encourage motorcyclists to enhance their skills through this vital training.

The campaign's centerpiece is a compelling new ad that highlights the importance of proper motorcycle training. The ad features a skilled motorcyclist enjoying a perfect ride on a quiet, scenic road. The serene atmosphere is suddenly disrupted when a car pulls out in front of him, leading to a dramatic crash. 

As of July 31 this year, Virginia has experienced over 1,200 motorcycle crashes, resulting in 976 injuries and 63 deaths. The jurisdictions with the highest number of fatalities include Fairfax County, Henrico County, Chesterfield County, Clarke County, Virginia Beach, and Augusta County. Last year, 3-outof-4 motorcyclists involved in crashes on Virginia roadways had not completed the Virginia Rider Training Program.

Ailing toy poodle recovers, delivers healthy puppies with Veterinary Teaching Hospital care

A five-pound toy poodle already doesn't have much weight margin if it stops eating, especially a five-pound toy poodle that is ready to give birth.

"A bigger dog can handle more days of not eating, a smaller dog will be in trouble faster," said Julie Cecere, clinical associate professor of theriogenology – animal reproductive science - at the Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine.

Jennifer Anders of Wytheville noticed in the pre-dawn hours earlier this summer that her toy poodle Senna was suddenly deteriorating with gastrointestinal issues, low blood sugar, and dehydration as she approached her delivery date.

"I called Virginia Tech to bring them

for incoming visitors to know what Christiansburg has to offer, how to find it, etc. This would show visitors that Christiansburg is not just a place to stay when you're in town for a Tech game, but also has fun and cool things to do in conjunction with Blacksburg as well as outside of its relationship to Blacksburg. The theriogenology team and intensive care staff were able to get

Senna the nutrients she needed plus stop her diarrhea and vomiting. She was then able to deliver four healthy puppies, all naturally.

"Thanks to Dr. Cecere and her team I have a healthy mama at home and four beautiful babies," Anders said.

"As soon as all her babies were out, she turned the corner, and started taking care of her babies and eating on her own and just doing a great job, so we sent her home on the third day," Cecere said.

There was some concern that the smallest puppy might not make it through, but "she's been the sassiest one," Cecere said.

The Veterinary Teaching Hospital in Blacksburg provides primary, specialty, and emergency patient care to small animal clients within a 35-mile radius of Blacksburg and referral service to practitioners in the region.

The teaching hospital has two boardcertified reproductive specialists and the facilities for 24-hour, 7-day-a-week care of difficult cases such as Senna's. A planned expansion and renovation, partially supported by donors' gifts, will enable the hospital to modernize and grow its services in the next few years.

"This is a great story of a good, dedicated owner who recognized that there was a problem, and then getting them here, and we just helped the process along a little," Cecere said.

"I'm absolutely ecstatic with the team and everything they've done," Anders said. "If I hadn't come here, I thoroughly believe I would have lost the mama and possibly her babies too."

Cardona on watch list

Virginia Tech's Willie Cardona was named to the 2024 ACC Preseason Watch List, as announced by the league on Wednesday.

Cardona, a native of Fort Mill, S.C., has appeared in 24 games for the Hokies, including 11 starts, since transferring from Winthrop ahead of the 2022 season.

Originally a midfielder, Cardona found his footing in an outside back role last season and started 10 matches for Tech. The senior logged 90 minutes in seven.

Wrestling schedule set The Virginia Tech wrestling team finalized their 2024-2025 schedule on Wednesday, August 14, announced head coach Tony Robie. The pre-season No. 9 ranked Hokies will face yet another formidable schedule including duals against perennial powerhouses Missouri and Oklahoma State in addition to entry in the prestigious Cliff Keen Las Vegas Invitational.

Tech will kick off the season traveling the next town over in Salem with back-to-back competitions at Roanoke College's Cregger Center – a dual opener against University of TennesseeChattanooga on November 1 followed by the Southeast Open on November 2.

The following weekend will see the Hokies send a contingent to the Mountaineer Invitational hosted by App State in Boone, NC on November 09.

Tech opens their home dual season with a continued series against national mainstay No. 10 Missouri Tigers on November 15 at Cassell Coliseum. Always a highly anticipated matchup between two top-10 programs littered with individual accolades, the last three duals between the teams have come down to the final bout.

Tech will take on a busy weekend the following week hosting No. 20 Rutgers Nov. 22 as part of a newly covenanted home-and-home series.

Season preview: Life in trenches important this season

The Hokies' defensive line is set to make a powerful impact this season as Fall Camp progresses.

With a blend of standout portal additions and returning talent, and under the guidance of associate head coach J.C. Price along with assistant coach/quality control Jan Johnson Jr., this unit aims to enhance a defense that ranked No. 20 nationally in total defense last season. Every week of Fall Camp, the position preview series, presented by Farm Bureau Insurance, will break down the Virginia Tech football roster. In this position preview, let's look at the defensive line and how it adds to the anticipation for this season's defensive potential.

Redshirt senior Antwaun Powell-Ryland is a force to be reckoned with and one of the key reasons Lane Stadium lived up to the nickname 'Sacksburg' last season. In his first year as a Hokie, Powell-Ryland played in all 13 games, starting 12, and became the cornerstone of a defensive line that was second in the ACC in sacks while consistently limiting opponents to under 250 passing yards per game. His impact was undeniable, registering 40 tackles and a teamleading 9.5 sacks— ranking second in the ACC and 14th nationally. The Portsmouth, Virginia native also tallied 14.5 tackles for loss, placing him 25th in the country and fifth in the ACC.

These numbers earned Powell-Ryland a spot on the 2023 All-ACC Second Team and a 2023 Phil Steele Honorable Mention All-American nod. The edge rusher also secured the No. 72 spot on On3's Top 100 Players in College Football. Pro Football Focus (PFF) further highlighted his abilities, ranking him as one of the highest-graded returning edge rushers in the ACC with an 80.7 overall grade.

One of the key questions surrounding this position group is who will join Antwaun Powell-Ryland in the starting rotation on the edge. Four returning players are vying for that spot: Keyshawn Burgos, Cole Nelson, Jorden McDonald and CJ McCray. Nelson brings valuable experience to the field, having played in all 13 games last season with

seven starts. He totaled 27 tackles, including 7.5 for loss and 4.5 sacks, proving himself as a consistent force on the edge. Burgos is another name to watch, especially after being listed at No. 21 on ESPN's Post-Spring Sleeper Pick Watchlist. He played in all 13 games last season, recording 21 tackles, including five tackles for loss. The Chesterfield, Virginia native made a strong case for himself during the spring game, where he notched three sacks, four solo tackles, and a pass breakup. McDonald McCray round and out the group, further offering veteran presence and potential. The competition for the starting edge position will be fierce, with each player bringing a unique skill set and the potential to make a significant impact on the Hokies' defensive line.

Other returners with limited in-game experience include Jason Abbey and James Jennette. These players have a chance to demonstrate their progress to coaches Price and Johnson, vying for more playing time. Alabama transfer Khurtiss Perry will also slate in as a potential impact player on the edge. Freshmen Deric Dandy boasts impressive high school résumé and will benefit from learning alongside this seasoned defensive line group, gaining valuable time to develop.

Joining Powell-Ryland on On3's Top 100 Players in College Football is Aeneas Peebles, a highly touted transfer from Duke.

Peebles is regarded as the biggest impact addition from the Hokies' 2024 recruiting cycle. Last season, he co-led the Blue Devils in tackles for loss (8.5), ranked second in sacks (4.0), recorded 40 tackles, four quarterback hurries, two pass breakups and one fumble recovery. These statistical achievements claimed him a spot on the 2023 Pro Football Focus All-ACC First Team and the 2023 All-ACC Third Team as a defensive tackle. The transfer also posted an impressive PFF pass-rushing grade in 2023, ranking second among players at his position—trailing only Byron Murphy II, a Texas standout and the 16th overall pick in the 2024 NFL Draft.

Peebles is anticipated to anchor the interior alongside veteran Josh Fuga, bolstered by a mix of experienced returners and promising new talent. Fuga brings four years of experience, having registered 56 tackles, three passes defended and 2.5 sacks across his collegiate career. Wilifred Pene, Ishmael Findlayter and Malachi Madison also return, with Pene appearing in all 13 games last season.

Other key additions added through the transfer portal include Iowa Western Community College's Kemari Copeland and Oklahoma's Kelvin Gilliam Jr. Copeland has already made a name for himself, breaking Virginia Tech's all-time squat record with 605 pounds for 10 reps and earning recognition on Bruce Feldman's Freaks list as well as a 247 Sports ACC spring football rising star. Perry, ranked as the No. 2 player from Alabama by 247Sports in 2021, gained experience with the Crimson Tide, including game action against Middle Tennessee. Gilliam Jr. is a seasoned lineman who saw action in all three years with the Sooners, adding depth and experience to the line.

High school recruits Gerard Johnson and Emmett Laws also join the team, bringing additional promise for the future. Laws ranked as the No. 12 overall recruit from Maryland by Rivals, should add depth and potential to an already stacked interior.

RU men picked last in preseason poll

Two-time defending men's soccer champion High Point University has been voted the favorite in the annual Big South Conference preseason poll by the league's head coaches, it was announced today by the conference office.

In addition, the coaches voted Presbyterian College forward Damorney Hutchinson (St. Thomas, Jamaica) the Preseason Offensive Player of the Year, High Point midfielder Jefferson Amaya (Charlotte, N.C.) the Preseason Midfielder of the Year, Winthrop defender Diego Candia (Santiago, Chile) the Preseason Defensive Player of the Year, and UNC Asheville netminder Charlie Farrar (Wakefield, United Kingdom) the Preseason Goalkeeper of the Year. All four players also earned spots on the preseason All-Conference team, which is listed below. High Point, which has not lost a regular-season Big South match since 2019 and is 24-0-7 in those league contests in that timeframe, was a near unanimous selection with seven of the eight first-place votes received and 62 total points to repeat as champions this fall. The Panthers, under the direction of sixthyear head coach Zach Haines, returns six starters and

15 letterwinners from last year's championship squad that finished 10-4-5 overall last season and 6-0-1 in conference play.

UNC Asheville, the 2023 Championship Runnerup, was second in the voting with 51 points for its highest-ever preseason ranking. Gardner-Webb (48 points) was third in the balloting, while Presbyterian College collected 31 points to finish fourth in the poll. Winthrop and Longwood shared the fifth position with 30 points each, just ahead of seventh-place USC Upstate (28 points and the remaining first-place vote). Radford finished in the final spot with eight points. The 2024 Big South men's soccer season begins Thursday, Aug. 22, while Conference play opens Friday, Sept. 20. The top six teams in the final Big South standings will qualify for the 2024 Big South Men's Soccer Championship, which is scheduled for Nov. 6 (First Round), Nov. 10 (Semifinals) and Nov. 16 (Championship Final), with every match to be contested at the home site of the higher seed. The champion receives the Big South's automatic bid to the NCAA Championship.
