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Students find “community spirit” working among flooding tragedy

A group of about 15 students from Marshall University and West Virginia University recently traveled to and worked in Eastern Kentucky to help victims of a disastrous flood, as part of a weeklong “God ordained and designed trip,” according to one of the ministers.

The relief trip was organized by Deacon David Lester of Saint Peter The Fisherman Catholic Church in Fairmont. Lester is a resident of Enterprise and has been in charge of relief trips such as these for over a decade.

“So after some phone calls and emails, I decided to take a trip to Eastern Kentucky,” Lester said. “And I do these mission trips in conjunction with the Greater Fairmont Council of Churches. That way we have spread a broader net. We have been doing this since 2006.”

Lester began planning the trip at the beginning of 2023 for mid-March. “I was looking for about 10 to 12 people to go on this trip. And on Feb. 9, I got my first volunteer. And it was someone who didn’t even live in that area.”

Lester continued to reach out, but over the next several weeks heard from no one. “So at the end of February there were two of us. So of course you’re thinking, ‘what am I going to do, should I cancel the trip?’”

But Lester said never once did he plan on canceling. “My prayer was, ‘God’s will be done,’ so I knew it’d work out one way or another.”

Eventually several others reached out with interest in coming, but Lester still had few signed up and only a couple weeks to go.

That’s when Kevin Sions, Baptist Campus minister for WVU, reached out.

“We (Baptist Campus Ministry) are a ministry of nine different campuses throughout West Virginia. So we had coordinating spring breaks (with Marshall University), so we wanted to do something together, the leader down there and myself,” Sions said. “It was definitely a God ordained and designed trip.”

Sions said he and the minister from Marshall, Rob Ely, would love to take about 15 of their students on a mission relief trip. They had been looking for an open door when their original plan fell

Event to help families of those with substance and mental health problems

April 22, several organizations plan to visit Shinnston to educate and provide resources about substance use disorder and mental

health problems for Making Connections With Family Resources.

“Making Connections With Family Resources is dedicated to providing resources

to a family member or caregiving who has an individual that they care for or love who is experiencing a mental health disorder or substance use disorder,” said Roxanne Chaney, lead family coordinator for the Department of Health and Human Resources’ Bureau For Behavioral Health in Charleston, in an email about their upcoming event.

The event is scheduled for April 22 at 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. at the Shinnston Fire Department. Childcare and lunch will be provided and those interested in registering must email Chaney at roxanne.k.chaney@wv.gov.

“We will be having a variety of professionals speaking during the day,” Chaney said, “and exhibitors from these professional organizations who will be there to provide resources and talk to

families/caregivers.”

A few of these professionals in attendance will include United Summit Center, Disability Rights of WV, and Birth To Three. Discussions include suicide prevention, healthy grandfamilies, and a time of Q&A and sharing.

Mental health professionals say it is vital to acknowledge a loved one or family member has a problem and after that has been acknowledged, various services can help people with substance use disorder or other mental health problems.

“The purpose of this training for families,” Chaney said, “is they will become aware of various services available in the state of WV.”

It’s a bird, no, it’s a drone!

On my recent trip to Washington, D.C., I was working in my role with Bearing Advisors, a company that was started in 2020, and we were introducing our new client, BRINC Drones, to local government officials from throughout the United States. BRINC has been getting a lot of attention due to the rollout of their newest drone, the LEMUR2, which was introduced in Seattle, the home of BRINC Drones. The video of the event is quite impressive and the LEMUR 2 lived up to its expectations by flying up to a window and breaking it and then entering the room.

Drones are fast becoming a valuable tool for public safety departments throughout the world and U.S. departments are starting to catch up. The drone can do many jobs and access many places that previously required a human being to put themselves at risk. Think of a house fire and the danger it presents when firefighters need to ensure that all occupants of the structure are out of danger. A drone can fly up to a second floor window, break it and enter and assess the situation. Or if an armed person is held up in a building and police are trying to locate them, the drone can access the building and conduct a search without a police officer having to enter the building. Once found, the drone can land and open a secure phone connection with the police outside and hopefully, peacefully resolve the issue.

BRINC is the brainchild of Blake Resnick, a 23-year-old inventor who was spurred to action when a mass shooting occurred in his hometown of Las Vegas on Oct. 1, 2017. A shooter opened

Drive safely in construction zones

Even before spring flowers pop up in our yards, orange cones appear on roadways. Crews are busy repairing our highways and city streets.

So I encourage you to take extra precautions when driving through construction zones. There are many good reasons to obey lower speed limits and use extra care.

Foremost is that, on average, more than 700 fatalities occur in work zones every year. Wherever you need to go, saving a little time is never worth another person's life. Also consider that you or your passengers could be injured or you could damage your vehicle or the construction equipment. If that's not enough to slow you down, remember that ticket amounts are double for driving infractions in construction zones.

In cooperation with other law enforcement agencies, the Public Service Commission's Transportation Division has posted extra patrols in some high traffic construction zones. Our officers are there to monitor commercial trucks and buses, but you still need to use caution. Rear-end crashes are extremely common in work zones, and large vehicles have huge blind spots and require extra space to stop. Never cut off a big truck!

To avoid accidents, follow a few common sense driving tips. Start by doing a little research so you know if there is construction on your planned route. If so, either leave early or take another route. Pay attention to all signage around the work zone. You may encounter closed lanes, reduced speeds, detours or shifts in the traffic pattern. And be prepared to stop at any time.

When there is a lane closure, move over as soon as possible. Don't wait until the last minute or try to race around another vehicle to get in front of it, especially if it is a semi-truck or bus. As you move into the correct lane, be mindful of blind spots – yours and other drivers'.

Those big orange signs that tell you what is happening ahead are hard to miss, but you have to pay attention. Distracted driving is more dangerous than ever in construction zones. Pay attention to traffic conditions – not your cellphone, the radio, GPS, food and drink, or even conversation with other passengers. Whatever it is, it can wait.

We all want the potholes and rough roads to be repaired, so let's drive safely around the people who are doing this important work.

Campaign to combat transportation barriers in substance use treatment

The "Get Paid to Pay it Forward" campaign aims to tackle the issue of transportation barriers that people seeking treatment for substance use disorder face in West Virginia, according to a news release. This issue is particularly acute in rural areas with limited public transportation options, and it can lead to delays in treatment, which is a critical concern in a state with the highest overdose rate in the nation.

To address this challenge, First Choice Services has partnered with the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources' Office of Drug Control Policy, Jobs & Hope West Virginia, and Modivcare, the state's Medicaid transportation vendor. The campaign encourages individuals in recovery to sign up as contract workers for Modivcare and offer rides to those seeking treatment, for which they are paid per mile. Providers can choose which assignments they want to accept, and they can offer a single ride or more frequent rides.

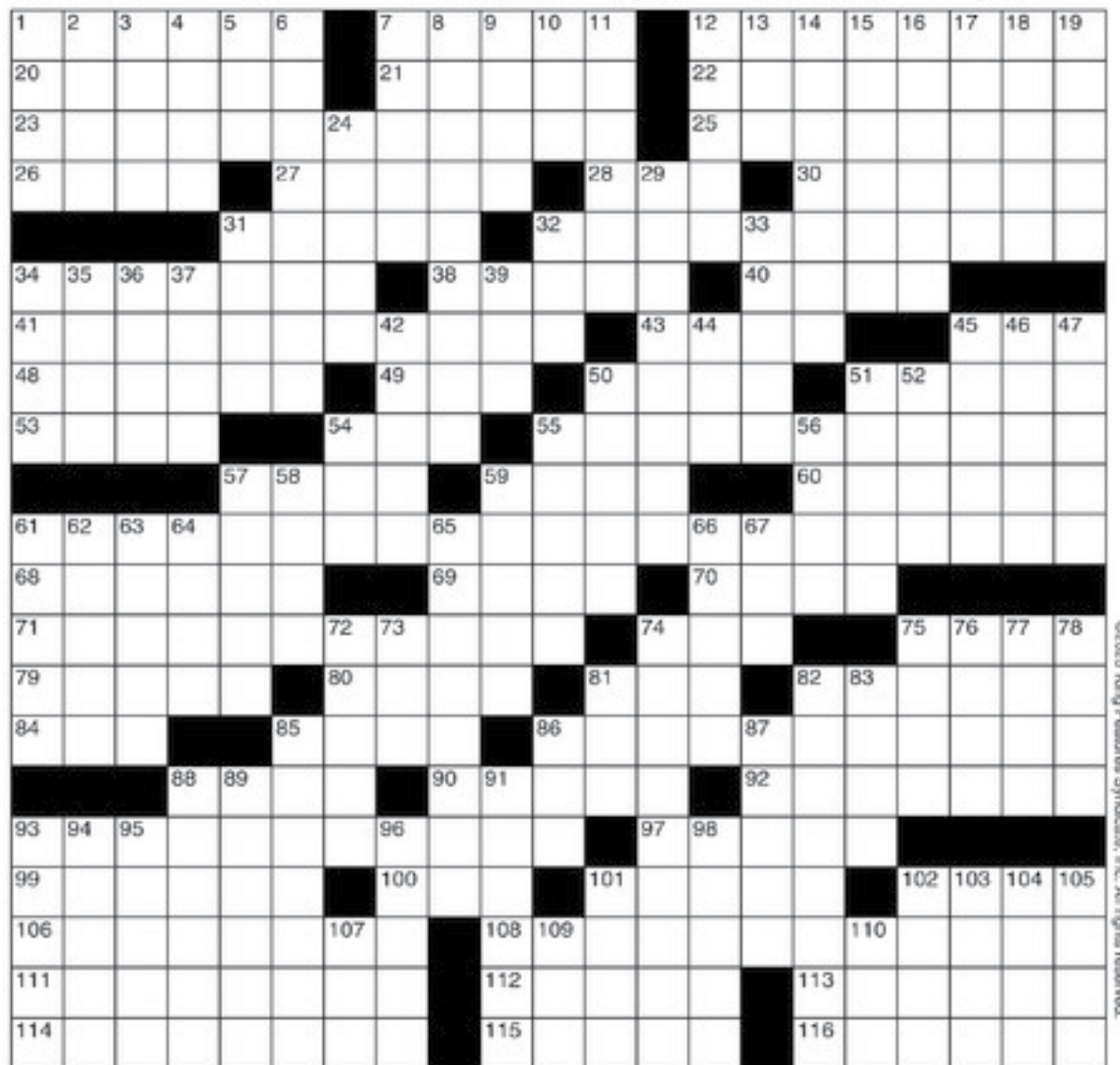
The campaign aims to formalize and strengthen the informal network of people in recovery who already offer rides to treatment, making it more sustainable. Anyone willing to provide rides can apply, but they must be at least 21 years old and own an insured vehicle.

THIS WEEK IN West Virginia History

CHARLESTON, WV – The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

April 13, 1923: Medal of Honor recipient Jonah Edward Kelley was born at Rada in Mineral County. Sergeant Kelley died while leading his squad in repeated attacks on a German position during World War II.

April 13, 1873: Lawyer, diplomat and 1924 Democratic presidential candidate John William Davis was born in Clarksburg. Davis argued 141 cases before the U.S. Supreme Court. His last case was one of the most controversial, when he argued in 1952 to continue racial segregation in South Carolina.

April 14, 1774: Surveyors met at the mouth of the Kanawha River to establish military bounty claims in Kentucky. They became involved in several skirmishes with Indians in the region. This was the start of Dunmore's War, the name given to the conflict in the Ohio Valley in the spring of 1774.

April 15, 1872: Peter Godwin Van Winkle died in Parkersburg. Van Winkle was a member of the Governor's Council of the Reorganized Government of Virginia, 1861–63, under Gov. Francis Pierpont. On August 4, 1863, Van Winkle was elected as one of the first two U.S. senators from the new state of West Virginia.

April 16, 1829: Jacob Beeson Jackson was born in Parkersburg. In 1881, he became West Virginia's sixth governor.

April 16, 1894: Leonard Riggelman was born in a Randolph County cabin. As president of Morris

Harvey College (now University of Charleston), he moved the school to Charleston in 1935 and led the college to accreditation in 1958.

April 16, 1923: Arch Moore was born at Moundsville. He was the first governor in 100 years to serve a second term, and he returned later for a third.

April 17, 1827: Outdoorsman William "Squirrely Bill" Carpenter was born on the Elk River near the mouth of Laurel Creek. Carpenter guided prominent West Virginians, including Gov. MacCorkle, through the wonders of the Elk Valley.

April 17, 1871: West Virginians approved the Flick Amendment, which allowed former Confederates to vote. The amendment also applied to former slaves, but they had been enfranchised already by the 15th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

April 18, 1861: At the beginning of the Civil War, retreating U.S. troops set fire to the national armory and arsenal at Harpers Ferry to keep them out of Confederate hands. However, Virginia militia extinguished the flames and sent much of the weapon-making equipment south before destroying the site in June 1861.

April 18, 1912: The Paint Creek-Cabin Creek Strike of 1912–13 began when coal operators rejected the demands of their unionized workers for a wage increase. The strike that followed was one of the most dramatic and bloody conflicts in the early 20th century labor struggles in southern West Virginia known as the Mine Wars.

April 19, 1896: Writer Melville Davisson Post was born in Harrison County. His best-known works are the Randolph Mason series, published in three volumes, and the more successful collection, "Uncle Abner: Master of Mysteries."

April 19, 1902: Author Jean Lee Latham was born in Buckhannon. She wrote a number of children's books, including "Carry On, Mr. Bowditch," which won the 1956 Newberry Award.

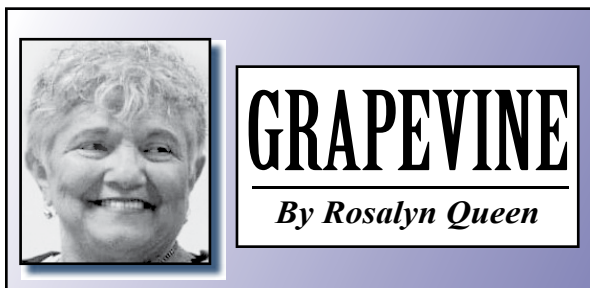
fire on a country music festival from his hotel room and killed 61 people and injured at least 413. Resnick's best friend was near the shooting and called him for help. He became obsessed with how technology could have helped first responders stop the shooting. After forming his company, he moved to Seattle to be close to a high-tech workforce.

Passing on Easter traditions

something special waiting for me and Joan. She would make baby dolls for us out of the bread. She rolled a long strip, braided it and placed an egg in the center for the face. We were so thrilled to receive this special treat on Easter.

Now I want to tell you that there was no such thing as an Easter basket filled with candy and all the stuffed animals. If there was extra money we would receive an Easter outfit. Sometimes we would get a chocolate bunny. To my sister and me, the baby doll was the epitome of an Easter gift. It became a tradition in our family even after we started getting Easter baskets.

I must tell you how we treasured these dolls. Grandma would let us draw faces on the egg. Then we would start sneaking bites from the bottom up until it was all gone. Sometimes it would take us a week to finish the doll.

So now the tradition has been passed on to my great granddaughter. She is the daughter of Hollie Queen and Ryan Jarvis and the granddaughter of Martin Queen and Linda Queen.

You know traditions are an important part of our lives, so if you have any, be sure to pass them on.

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Baker's first hire at WVU

This past week West Virginia University announced the new head coach of the women's basketball program. West Virginia University Vice President and Director of Athletics Wren Baker named Mark Kellogg as his choice to replace Dawn Plitzuweit. It was the first significant hire for Baker and it wasn't an easy decision for him to make.

As soon as Plitzuweit resigned, utilizing the one and done option, former WVU Women's Head Coach Mike Carey declared his desire to return to his old post. What seemed like a dream come true for Mountaineer fans turned out to be a nightmare for Baker. The voice of a fanbase carries substantial weight and should be a consideration in the hiring process. There are several factors that go into any hire and decisions are difficult

and that is why Baker is paid the big bucks (\$1.1 million per year for six years) to make them.

Kellogg comes to Morgantown with impressive credentials. An overall 445-120 record makes him the sixth winningest D1 active coach in the country (by percentage) and has been a frequent participant in postseason play. In his last eight seasons, Kellogg has run the show at Stephen F. Austin, compiling a 185-55 record. Kellogg has won 23 games or more in each of the last seven seasons and his teams have never had a losing season. He also has been to the big dance nine times which carries more clout now more than ever.

Since we are crunching numbers, let's take a look at the Mike Carey resume. His overall record is 735-341. His 447 wins at West Virginia are a few

more than Kellogg's career total and make him the all-time winningest coach in WVU women's basketball history. In 21 years at the helm of the program, Carey guided the Mountaineers to eleven NCAA tournaments. Carey had 14 seasons of at least 21 wins and from 2007-2019 had a program record 13 straight postseason appearances.

Baker had a rough decision to make and he didn't have the luxury of extra time to make it. He had to move quickly and he pulled the trigger in a prudent amount of time. Baker showed his commitment to the university a few weeks

ago when he and his wife donated \$100,000 to support the Mountaineer Athletics Club. Money talks, and because of that, Baker didn't have to say a word.

Since we are on the topic, Kellogg is set to make \$550,000 this year and it will increase \$25,000 each year through 2028. The five year deal works well for both parties. It gives Kellogg adequate time to implement his system and recruit the players needed to execute it properly. Baker is provided enough time to fairly evaluate Kellogg to determine if he is the right man for the job.

Carey proved over the

course of time that he could run the program because he was the man that built it. When he took over, the cupboard was bare, and the Mountaineers were 11-44 in the two previous seasons combined. WVU fans will be forever grateful for what Carey did with the program. There will never be a question about his love or loyalty to the university. He built the program with blood, sweat and tears.

Here is to the hope that Kellogg does the job and does it for a long time. I wish him the best of luck and we should support the new coach in every

way possible.

through. “It all came together,” Lester said of the trip. “And I must say it was a really, really, wonderful, group. The young people who came from Marshall and WVU were very much into it. You know when kids go on spring break, you often think that they’re looking for fun, which that’s true. In fact, one of the kids, his name was Rob, and when he came in that night, he said, ‘Deacon Lester, I’ve got one question for you.’ And I said, ‘what’s that?’ And he said, ‘are we going to have fun or not?’ And I said, ‘absolutely.’”

Lester’s group of diverse people of different ages and church denominations traveled to Eastern Kentucky March 12-17, where in July of 2022, widespread flooding had caused extreme devastation

and a death toll of nearly 40, according to a WKYT news report. Thousands lost everything. “The other unique thing about this flood was it occurred in the middle of the night,” Lester said. “People got up to their dressers floating and were wading out of their houses in water. It was a fast flood. It came up very, very, rapidly. And that rain that occurred the first day was like 13 inches. That is unheard of for that area.”

Lester said of the area where they held the outreach, “It’s a lot like Southern West Virginia because it’s all about mining there, and the mines have largely closed, so the economy is quite depressed. The people were already needy long before we arrived and the flood ever came. And the devastation

tion down there, well, they referred to it as a thousand year flood.

“We ended up going out and working in five different homes. And we worked in a community center. The center of the area we were working was Whitesburg, Kentucky. Whitesburg is a town bigger than Shinnston, but considerably smaller than Clarksburg.” He said that this area is different from others because, due to the smaller population

and the location, the communities tend to be more isolated and offered less help, making trips like this extremely important.

Lester is familiar with disaster relief from personal experience, but also from over a decade of planning and leading similar trips. “I am the one who has led the trips because my home was flooded, and I worked flood recovery a whole year in the Northern Panhandle. And I have some skills in organizing and project management and that sort of thing. But I always get people from various places that come, and we always advertise it as all people of faith.”

Sions said that this experience was important for his students to experience. “One of the great things our host people did, was they brought in a different person each evening, and they kinda shared a flood story, their flood story, with us. Just that we got to hear their stories, their personal stories, and

for the students to hear that and relate to that, it was impactful as well.

“BCM has three phrases that we use: learn together, play together, serve together.” Lester went on to say, “Whether you serve at your local food pantry or serve on an overseas mission trip or go to a neighboring state to help with disaster relief, you just learn more about yourself. Students learn more about themselves, a skill or new skill. Not that they’re going to be skilled contractors or anything, but they learn

about who they are and how to work together as a team, and working as a group. It’s just vital to do things like that. We had hard days but we had fellowship opportunities in the evening.”

The group spent a large amount of time putting down subflooring, installing drywall and insulation, working on plumbing and electric, and cleaning.

They also cleaned out a community center owned by an elderly lady who desperately wished to see the building open in time for the children’s Easter celebrations. “In the community center, it was an old school, they power washed and got rid of all the mud so it could be painted,” Lester said. “We had five people working four different days on that particular project alone. It was great for the students. It’s hard work and they were very dedicated to doing that.”

Lester said, “We were ministering to them in large part by listening to them, conversing with them, and by praying with them. And in some cases, by singing with them.” And he said that despite the fact that many of the residents had lost everything, “There was a real community spirit there.”

He also feels an urgency to get more people down to Eastern Kentucky. “Many of these people had lost everything,” Lester said. “You’re prone to depression and hopelessness, so that’s why we want to work hard to get more people there. We have a calling to help them, to not just do the work but spread the word.”

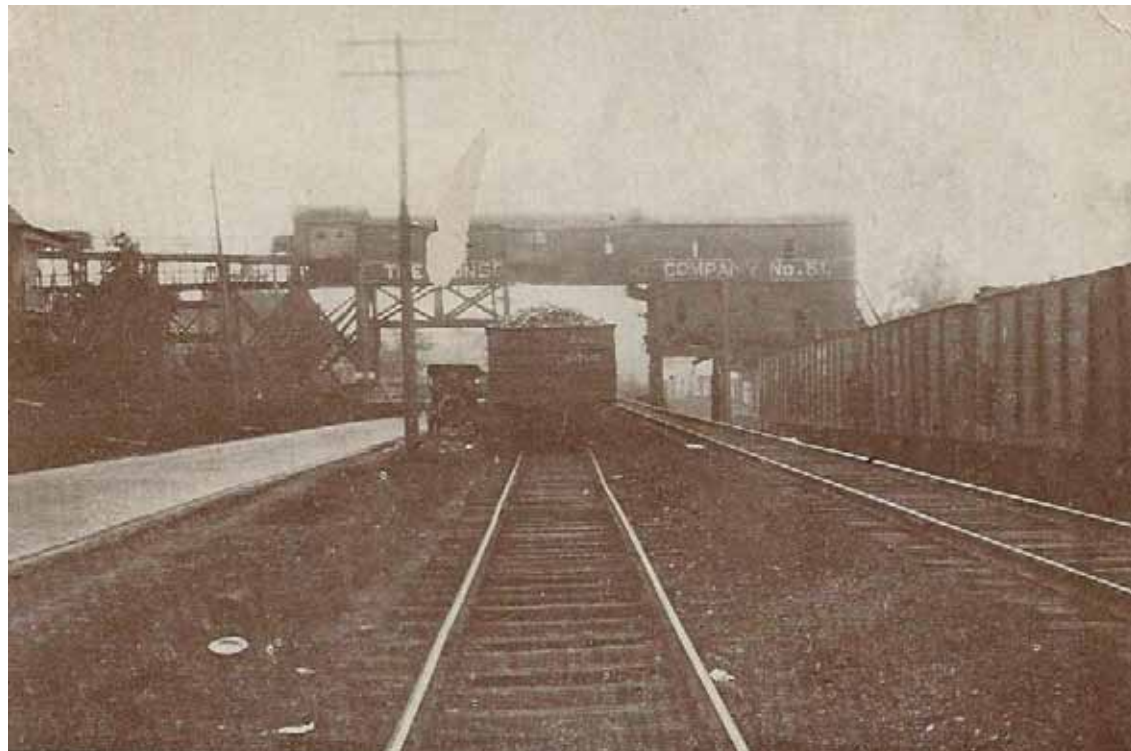

“It gives you an opportunity to meet local people, buy local goods, fresh goods in regards to produce, so you get a chance to actually put money into local people’s pockets versus putting it into Walmart and to the big big stores,” Gallagher said.

They noted that last year’s market led to brick-and-mortar businesses, including Imagination Station and Soul Miner’s Daughter, as well as vendors selling from inside other businesses, where they can sell products regularly instead of monthly.

“They kind of outgrew The Farmer’s Market and now they have other business along Pike Street which I would encourage any of the attendees of The Farmer’s Market to check out,” Cusack said.

The events will include sellers of produce.

“Last year we were very happy with the success of The Farmer’s Market,” Gallagher said. “We didn’t have quite all of the vendors we would have hoped to have, such as produce. However this year we already have produce vendors lined up and they’re very excited to be

here.” Cusack also mentioned honey, maple syrup, baked goods, and crafts.

Since some of last year’s vendors now sell at Imagination Station, they were pleased those vendors could sell from a brick-and mortar store, but were a bit worried about losing vendors, Gallagher said.

“But actually we have more vendors this year than we did last year,” he said, “and most of them are new.”

He said vendors have become “a very vital part of the community.”

“All the vendors know each other,” he said. “We all work together on different things.”

Cusack said about 15-20 vendors are expected; there is room for about 20.

The dates are May 20, June 17, July 15, Aug. 19 and Sept. 16.

The June 17 market is expected to be especially busy, since it coincides with the planned Shinnston Art Walk. That event will include food trucks and art vendors.

Vendors as of deadline included Hive and Holler, Appalachian Fiber Flow, Rain Drop Pottery, Growing with Grey,

Gray Farms, Quite Contrary Kitchen Gardens, The Emerald Goblin, Memoirs of Moo, AcroamaticAsh, Angry Irish Urban Farm, The Bryant Family Farm, Golden Dust Creations, T & C Designs, 304 Creations, Kay’s Kitchen, and 304 CandleCo, according to Cusack.

Vendors at The Farmer’s Market may set up for free, which is uncommon among similar markets, but must bring their own tables and chairs, Cusack said. She also encouraged potential vendors to bring tents, as the weather can be hot.

“We have a few vending slots left!” she said. “If you would like to set up at The Farmer’s Market in Shinnston, please email blackandtealconcepts@gmail.com.”

“See you all there!” she added.

Fairmont State University’s Vex Robotics team continues to rank well at home competition

FAIRMONT, WV — On Friday, March 10, Fairmont State University hosted the seventh annual VEX University Robotics Competition in the Falcon Center. The event was organized by NASA IV & V Education Research Center and sponsored by the NASA Robotics Alliance Project, Fairmont State University Office of the President, A3L Federal Works, Aurora Flight Sciences, and the NASA Space Grant Consortium.

This event brought together nine robotics teams representing notable universities that competed for various awards and two seats in the World Robotics Championship to be held in Austin, Texas at the end of April 2023, according to a news release.

Fairmont State’s Robotics Team was represented by students: freshmen Bradley Leonard, (a freshman majoring in Computer Science), Jacob Bonner (sophomore, Electronics), Arrington Bucklew (junior, Electronics), and faculty mentor Musat Crihalmeanu, Associate Professor of Electronics Technology at Fairmont State.

The Fairmont State University Robotics team qualified 4th placing in front of West Virginia University (Morgantown), Liberty University (Lynchburg, VA), USM at Southern Maryland (California, MD), and Baltimore University (Baltimore, MD).

Fairmont State’s Robotics team received positive rankings in the “Driving an Autonomous Robot” sections of the competition and in the “Skills” section of the contest. Fairmont State’s Robotics team is also ranked 24th on the world list.

Prior to this event, the newly started Fairmont State Robotics team showed promise in two qualifying events hosted by Northern Kentucky University (Highland Heights, KY), and Salisbury University (Salisbury, MD) where the team won second place out of six participating teams, and also received the Judges Award.

Attorney General announces settlement with Juul

CHARLESTON, WV — West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey on Monday announced his office has settled a lawsuit with Juul for a total of \$7.9 million.

That’s in addition to a plethora of stipulations, most in connection with how Juul—under the company name Juul Labs Inc.—advertises and markets its products in West Virginia. The company was accused of “engaging in unfair or deceptive acts or practices in the manufacturing, designing, selling, marketing, promoting and distributing of e-cigarettes” in the state, especially promotions targeting underage users.

In legal terms, the company was accused of violating the state’s Consumer Credit and Protection Act.

“This settlement puts

companies like Juul in check to not copy big tobacco’s playbook and gear marketing strategies toward underage people,” Attorney General Morrisey said. “In Juul’s case, we have alleged it has deceived consumers about its nicotine strength, misrepresented the nicotine equivalency of its products to traditional cigarettes and understated the risks of addiction that occur with such powerful levels of nicotine.”

Attorney General Morrisey outlined numerous issues in the lawsuit, including Juul heavily advertising through social media, finding influencers, fashion bloggers and celebrities with teenage fans, targeting underage users, just to name a few.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Juul e-cigarettes have a high level of nicotine—a sin-

gle Juul pod contains as much nicotine as a pack of 20 regular cigarettes. The Attorney General’s lawsuit disagrees with this data, arguing the overall amount of nicotine in a Juul pod “is equivalent to 1.72 packs of cigarettes.”

In 2017, 14.3% of high school students in West Virginia used e-cigarettes on at least one day in the past 30 days. Nationally the rate was 13.2%.

Data from the 2019 National Youth Tobacco Survey revealed that more than 5 million U.S. middle and high school students were currently using e-cigarettes, with 27.5% of high schoolers and 10.5% of middle schoolers reporting current e-cigarette use. Of those current e-cigarette users, 34.2% of high schoolers and 18% of middle schoolers use e-cigarettes on 20 days or more per month.

Nutrition assistance to end after summer period

CHARLESTON, WV – The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR) has received approval from the United States Department of Agriculture to issue Summer Pandemic Electronic Benefits Transfer (P-EBT), according to a news release. The federal COVID-19 public health emergency is ending, and West Virginia will issue a final P-EBT benefit for the covered summer period.

The West Virginia Department of Education website states that P-EBT “was first introduced in H.R. 6201, the Families First Coronavirus Response Act as a solution that delivers nutrition assistance on an EBT card that can be used to purchase groceries for families with school children who qualify for free or reduced-price school meals when school is out of session due to a pandemic.”

Eligible students are those who attended a West Virginia school that participates in the National School Lunch Program, were actively enrolled in the 2022-2023 school year on May 15, 2023, and qualify for free or reduced-price meals. All students who attend a Community Eligibility Provision school and receive free or reduced-priced meals also qualify for P-EBT.

If your child attends a participating school and you did not previously apply for free or reduced-price meals, or if your household situation has changed and you may now qualify, please visit www.schoolcafe.com or contact your local board of education for more information.

An eligibility letter will be mailed to each student who qualifies for Summer P-EBT. Qualified students will receive a one-time Summer P-EBT issuance of \$120 to existing WV P-EBT cards in June 2023. Only students new to the P-EBT program will be mailed a WV P-EBT card. If the card has been lost, a new card may be requested by calling 1-866-545-6502.

Promise scholarship deadline extended

CHARLESTON, WV – Although high school graduation is quickly approaching, there is still time for West Virginia's seniors to apply for the Promise Scholarship and possibly receive thousands of dollars to offset the costs of a higher education.

On March 8, the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission (WVHEPC) made the decision to extend the application deadline for the Promise Scholarship until May 1. This merit-based scholarship is open to all high school seniors who have received an ACT composite score of 21 with a minimum of 19 in English, math, science and reading, or a 1080 SAT total score with a minimum of 510 in math, evidence-based reading and writing.

According to Brian Weingart, WVHEPC senior director of financial aid, the total amount of the Promise Scholarship for the 2023-2024 academic year has been increased from \$5,000 to \$5,200. This increase will help students pay for the cost of tuition and fees at any West Virginia public four-year, public two-year and private non-profit college or university in any field of study.

"Everyone needs to find their own path and their own calling – whatever they are passionate about," Weingart said. "For some people that might be a two-year degree or a one-year degree. But, obviously there are some occupations and careers that require four-year degrees. So, if you want to be a teacher, or if you want to go on to law school or medical school, if you want to be an engineer – a lot of times those require advanced training beyond a one or two year program."

That is why Weingart said it's important to apply for scholarships – like the Promise Scholarship.

The easiest way to apply for the Promise Scholarship is by visiting collegeforwv.com and clicking on the Promise Scholarship link. However, the website also provides students with a list of all the state's financial aid programs.

Each Promise Scholarship applicant must also have a FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) on file, Weingart continued. This application can be accessed by visiting studentaid.gov, and also has an extended deadline of May 1.

Additionally, students can visit their high school guidance counselor for assistance.

"The counselor is a great place to go in the high schools not only for state financial aid, but also for private scholarship applications from their area," Weingart said. "Students can go there for a lot of great information."

This is how West Virginia State University (WVSU) Senior Kensley White said she began her journey into higher education working toward a degree in elementary education.

In middle school, White was a member of the WV GEAR UP program, a federally-funded program managed by the WVHEPC that helps students begin to achieve their dream of receiving a higher education, which is where she first heard of the Promise Scholarship. Then, while she attended Van Junior-Senior High School in Boone County, White said her guidance counselor became a huge help as she applied for the scholarship.

"She did a workshop and someone from the state came in," White recalled. "I am from a very low socio-economic area, so they brought in all the help they could to push my class to apply for things."

At that time, White said she wasn't really sure about where she wanted to go to college, but she knew she wanted to become a teacher. Later, she made her decision to attend WVSU because it was close to home, and has a great teaching program.

As for the Promise Scholarship, White said she was notified via email that she would be a recipient.

"It's literally the most low-maintenance scholarship that I have," White stated. "All I have to do

is make sure my grades and my transcripts are up-to-date and it automatically gets renewed for me. I don't have to fill out a form every year. I just have to make sure I have the minimum credit hours to keep Promise, and they check that. You don't even have to worry about that."

Each year, White explained that the Promise Scholarship is automatically renewed and paid into her account.

"They separate it into two semesters for you, so it will pay for both semesters in an academic year," White said. "Now they have even lowered the scores that you need to get Promise. It was a little more challenging when I had to get it."

White noted that the Promise Scholarship, as well as the help she received from her high school guidance counselor and those at the WVHEPC, has helped her achieve her dream of becoming a teacher.

"The last thing you want to worry about as a student, or in my case as a student teacher because you are not paid, is financial burden, and getting that money – it's \$2,500 a semester that you don't have to worry about – the financial burden is lifted off you," White said. "I am about to be a teacher, and I am very proud. It wouldn't have been possible without financial help from the scholarships I receive from the state, because I also have the Underwood-Smith Teaching Scholarship."

Upon graduation, White said she plans to teach in Boone County.

"I would love to go back and give to my little community," White said. "I feel like everyone wants to leave, no one wants to stay, but I am proud of where I'm from, and I want people to want to stay there too because that's home."

White's advice to high school seniors is to apply for every scholarship available and to talk to people who want to help.

"Don't be afraid to reach out to the university. Find someone that you can communicate with. If you have a friend, or you know someone who is going to college, don't be afraid to reach out. Those people are going to help you and give you advice."

Lastly, White noted that students should reach out to those at the WVHEPC for assistance.

"They are very helpful," White said. "If you reach out to them, they are willing to throw money your way if you are willing to apply. They have the resources."

Since the Promise Scholarship began in 2002, Weingart said that 82,049 students have received an award – totaling \$867 million.

Funding for the Promise Scholarship is provided by the West Virginia State Legislature and is allocated out of the state's general revenue and lottery funds, Weingart stated.

"I always compare financial aid to a rubber band ball," he continued. "There's not a lot of students that get just one scholarship or grant that pays for everything. So, you have to fuse together all these different programs whether it's WV Invests, the Promise Scholarship or need based programs, like the West Virginia Higher Education Grant or the federal Pell Grant. As you piece all these programs together, hopefully, it is such that college can be made affordable, and you can pursue your dreams."

Weingart concluded that although he grew up in Cleveland, Ohio, he studied secondary education specializing in math and social studies at Alderson Broaddus University in Philippi before ultimately taking on his current role helping West Virginia's students obtain the finances for a higher education.

He said that, like him, one never really knows where their degree might take them.

"That's the great thing about a college education."
