

# Art gallery opens

## Council discusses paving streets, hydrants

The April 10 Shinnston City Council meeting covered paving streets, installing fire hydrants, and updates on 2023 projects, among other topics.

City Manager Chad Edwards said that he plans to have yearly continual maintenance of paved streets, and he'd liked to see them kept up. "We're going to put out a bid," Edwards said of looking at the costs for the project. He will then bring the bid back to the Council and officials will review it and review the budget to see what the city has the ability to do.

Councilmember Bill Watson provided a list of streets to be paved to Council. Council discussed additional streets that they wished to see being paved. This included Pleasant Hill and Fleming Way. "We can put them on the list and see how it goes," Edwards said.

Mayor Rodney Strait also added that they will look at cost and see what is able to be accomplished. He said that he'd also like to see the alleys get attention as well. "The alley beside the Chinese restaurant (Robinson Court) needs to be done," Strait said. "People use that for the drive-thru and that's what they see."

"(The) sidewalk project in downtown is about halfway done, maybe a little more," Strait said. "And so far we've got a lot of compliments about how nice it looks."

Strait has also been checking on pricing for the installation of new fire hydrants. "I checked with the Clarksburg Water Board and they're going to give me a price," he said. "They do this for other cities. They install hydrants."

City Manager, Chad Edwards said that he feels that even though they have some money left over from the county for the hydrants, with the high prices the city is being given, "we might have to scale back."

## Thunderstorms and rainbows!



A rainbow last week brought Jim Hunt's granddaughter to a standstill.

After an extremely busy week, I was hit with a case of writer's block as I searched for a subject for my weekly column. I thought about some of the issues that have been in the news. School shootings, bank shootings, a move to expel three legislators in Tennessee for protesting school shootings and the specter of a Missouri Republican legislator explaining his vote to allow twelve-year old children to marry. It was then that my son texted me a picture of our granddaughter

Narcissists, empaths, and the power of expression

If you spend much time on the Internet, especially social media, you run into lots of labels.

By labels, or identifiers, I mean quick and easy ways to describe oneself or another person.

I've noticed that some people embrace labels more than others. The words could be statements of values and beliefs, inner sense of self, or even professions or disabilities.

On Facebook, Twitter and other social media sites, I've noticed two labels grow in popularity over the past several years - narcissist and empath.

Narcissism, when it includes a list of traits identified by psychologists and psychiatrists, is classified as a personality disorder in the book, the DSM-5, that mental health professionals use to classify patients by their symptoms. They also use it for billing purposes, to assure insurance companies they are treating patients for legitimate medical purposes. For someone to classify as having narcissistic personality disorder, they must meet five of nine characteristics: a grandiose sense of self-importance; preoccupation with fantasies of success, power, brilliance, beauty or pure love; belief that they are special; requires excessive admiration; has a sense of entitlement; exploitative of others to achieve their own ends; lack of empathy; envious of others; shows arrogant or haughty behaviors.

On the Internet, the word has taken on new life. It's often used to describe someone who is deliberately cruel to people in their life for selfish ends and someone who is psychologically abusive.

The other word I've noticed growing in popularity is "empath." People use it to mean someone who is acutely in tune with others' emotions, taking them on as their own, to the point they become overwhelmed with whatever that emotion is, from anger to sadness. They say they are often overstimulated in large groups because of the high number of varying emotions, creating a sense of turbulence in their minds.

According to Merriam-Webster, empathy is an action or capacity involving "understanding, being aware of, being sensitive to, and vicariously experiencing the feelings, thoughts, and experience of another of either the past or present without having the feelings, thoughts, and experience fully communicated in an objectively explicit manner."

Empathy is similar to sympathy, but while sympathy may mean commiseration and sadness, it doesn't mean feeling vicariously the sadness of another person.

The story goes, these websites and videos say, that empaths and narcissists are drawn to each other, or that narcissists target empaths.

At first, it kind of bothered me. I'm typically an empathetic, intuitive person. I've cried when I interviewed someone crying. So I would think, "Are we in a competition here?" Because I think of empathy as a good characteristic, but not an identifier or label. It doesn't define me.

As I've thought about it more, though, I remembered that language is fluid. And referring to oneself as an empath might mean someone's sense of what others see as a good characteristic, empathy, is painful for them. It might mean that they've been through traumatic events that makes that inner sense of turbulence more disruptive to their lives. It might mean having a label to express their intense emotions helps them to feel part of a community of others who are similar. Because when you find community, you can find help.

And as I've thought about it more, it occurred to me that while people might not be turning to the DSM-5 for official diagnoses of those who've hurt them, maybe the videos online about cruelty inflicted by selfish people are cathartic for them. Maybe the label, like empath, makes them feel a sense of community with others who've been hurt. Maybe those labeled narcissists, themselves, are dealing with emotional pain or mental health problems that require them to be self-focused to survive.

I've reminded myself that language evolves. It's ever fluid and changing. People use language to express themselves, and there isn't a right or wrong way to say how one feels. Expression is powerful. After watching those videos about narcissists and empaths, I worked out my thoughts on these terms through thinking, and through writing, a form of expression. Expression encourages critical thinking and connection with other humans; it helps us see similarities, like a need for connection, and other ways we aren't so different.

Because even as I wrote this column, I noticed my own feelings and acceptance of the words changing as I reached for a deeper understanding. I thought of more ways the terms could be used. I felt more compassionate. I listened to how the words are used on social media in all those videos, and I used written language to critically think and expand my perceptions. Writing is one tactic I use to critically think and put myself in other's shoes. I think that's similar to when we listen, then respond with sympathy or empathy, instead of with an instinctive reaction.

Like those who use words like narcissists or empath, I too use expression.

THIS WEEK IN West Virginia History

Charleston WV - The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

April 20, 1823: General Jesse Lee Reno was born in Wheeling. He graduated from West Point in 1846, with another cadet from western Virginia, Thomas J. Jackson, later known as "Stonewall." Reno was the highest-ranking officer from present West Virginia killed in the Civil War.

April 20, 1863: President Lincoln issued a proclamation that in 60 days, West Virginia would become a state. This occasion was marked 100 years later during the state's Centennial celebration with a special ceremonial session of the West Virginia Legislature on April 20, 1963, in Wheeling.

April 20, 1909: Fiddler Melvin Wine was born near Burnsville. A favorite of old-time music enthusiasts nationally, he was chosen as a National Heritage Fellow in 1991 by the National Endowment for the Arts, the highest recognition given to a folk artist in the United States.

April 20, 1939: Poet Irene McKinney was born in Belington, Barbour County. Governor Gaston Caperton appointed her state poet laureate in 1993, and she served in that capacity until her death in 2012.

April 21, 1908: Traditional musician Phoebe Cottrell Parsons was born in Calhoun County. Parsons's traditional clawhammer banjo style, unaccompanied ballad singing, riddles and storytelling have influenced countless numbers of younger musicians.

April 21, 1936: President Franklin Roosevelt established the Jefferson National Forest. The West Virginia portion of this forest includes 18,530 acres in Monroe County.

April 22, 1908: Marshall "Little Sleepy" Glenn

was born in Elkins. Glenn coached basketball at West Virginia University from 1934 to 1938 and football from 1937 to 1940. He was inducted into the WVU Sports Hall of Fame in 1992.

April 22, 2003: Activist Judy Bonds, a Raleigh County native, received the Goldman Environmental Prize for her fight against mountaintop removal mining. Her efforts inspired thousands and turned a local issue in West Virginia into a national cause.

April 23, 1857: Andrew S. Rowan was born in Gap Mills, Monroe County. During the Spanish-American War, Rowan, a military officer, was chosen to deliver an important message to Cuban General Calixto Garcia. The 1899 pamphlet "A Message to Garcia" made the incident famous.

April 24, 1865: McNeill's Rangers surrendered to Union troops at New Creek (now Keyser). The Confederate guerrilla force probably never numbered more than 100 men at any time but managed to inflict regular damage on Union operations.

April 25, 1863: About 1,500 Confederate soldiers under Gen. William "Grumble" Jones advanced through Greenland Gap, a deep pass through New Creek Mountain in present Grant County. The Confederates encountered 87 Union soldiers who held off several assaults before finally surrendering.

April 25, 1923: Union leader Arnold Ray Miller was born at Leewood on Cabin Creek in Kanawha County. In December 1972 he defeated Tony Boyle to become president of the United Mine Workers.

April 26, 1816: General Alexander Welch Reynolds was born in Lewisburg. He served in both the U.S. and Confederate armies. After the war, Reynolds accepted a commission as a colonel in the forces of the khedive of Egypt, which ruled Egypt under the Ottoman Empire.

April 26, 1900: Baseball great Lewis Robert "Hack" Wilson, whose 1930 single season runs-batted-in record stands today, was born in Pennsylvania. He started his pro career with the Martinsburg Blue Sox. He returned there after his retirement and is buried at Rosedale Cemetery.

watching a rainbow. A tear came to my eye when I thought about her future and the world we are leaving for her to live in. Even the symbolism of the rainbow may one day be outlawed, like the uproar over a beer company proclaiming that they support the LBGTQ community.

I grew up in the turbulent times of the Vietnam War and was at West Virginia University during the protests of the war. Four students were shot to death at Kent State in 1970 and thousands of young soldiers returned home in body bags. I wore a silver bracelet with the name of a prisoner of war and watched as men like John McClain were released with lifelong injuries and memories of the horrific treatment at the hands of the Viet Cong. The national political environment was as chaotic as anything in the past decade. In 1964, President Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas, Texas and a string of leaders were gunned down in a bloody succession. Malcolm X, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in Memphis and Bobby Kennedy in Los Angeles lost their lives, and it seemed that America was in the twilight of its existence.

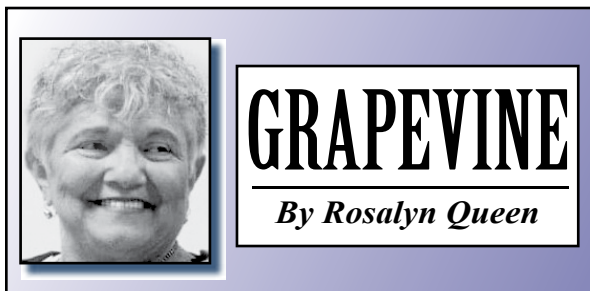
Add to that the racial unrest and the riots in Newark, Detroit and Los Angeles and I had to wonder what my father and mother were thinking when they thought about the future lives that their children and grandchildren would live. My dad worked for the city in the public works department and my mother worked as a medical technician.

They never owned a new car and scraped together enough money to buy band instruments and tennis shoes for their four children. With that backdrop, I would not have blamed my parents if they lost hope. What I remember however, is that they had an infinite well of optimism. They knew that they had done their part in raising a family and putting in a full day of work, followed by hours of clipping coupons and investing their earnings in the future lives of their children.

My parents did not have all the answers for society’s challenges in the 60s, but they never let us believe that their sacrifices were in vain. When the thunder roared and the rain fell, they gathered their little minions and ran to the back porch to look for the rainbow. I don’t want to take that from my grandchildren, no matter how difficult it becomes. I want them to believe that one day, some brave young leaders will rise up and solve the gun issue that seems to have so many of the gray-haired, pseudo patriots at a standstill. I want them to believe that who you love or what beer you drink is simply a choice that is guaranteed by the blood and sacrifice of their forefathers.

A favorite quote by an unknown author captured the essence of a rainbow. “A rainbow is a promise of sunshine after rain. Of calm after storms. Of joy after sadness. Of peace after pain. Of love after loss.”

## Farmers market plans announced

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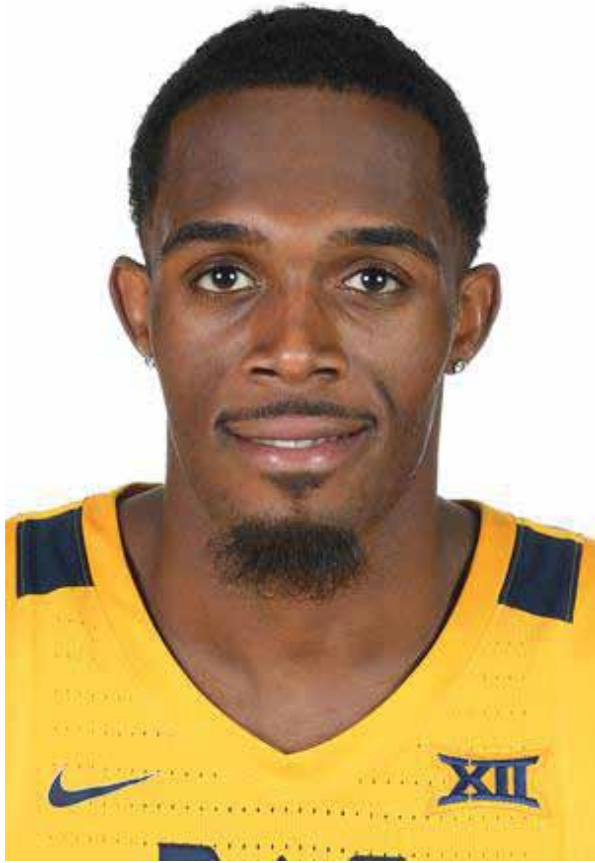

Jimmy Bell Jr. just finished up the hoops season at West Virginia University. Bell averaged 4.8 points and 5.2 rebounds in all 35 games for veteran mentor Bob Huggins. Bell had previously been a standout offensive lineman in high school and it turns out that he still has feelings for his previous love, the pigskin.

The 6 feet 10 inch, 285 pound senior had initial conversations with some football players that even further spurred his interest. WVU football coach Neal Brown and Huggins discussed Bell's future and his options and agreed to a treaty. It's not a rent-to-own situation for Brown, and Huggins leasing the big man to the football program; it's a trial run that will last through April.

There isn't a whole lot happening for hoopsters at this time of year except for conditioning and Bell is sure to get plenty of that this spring. Huggins has praised Bell's footwork and has mentioned before that he could have a future in

the NFL. This is a mini-audition for Bell and it gives Brown an evaluation period and it gives Brown an evaluation period to determine if the Saginaw, Michigan native could help his squad.

If Brown is impressed with what he sees, then the ball will be in Bell's court. He would have to decide which route he will pursue. If he stays with the hardwood, he would have one year of eligibility remaining. If he chooses football, he will have two years to prove himself.

It does look like his football future has a higher upside and if his aspirations are to play professional sports, then the best move could come with a change in scenery. There isn't much time left for Bell to make his impact felt. The Gold-Blue Spring Game is this Saturday at 1 p.m. at Milan Puskar Stadium. Bell has the interest of both Huggins and Brown and which he chooses remains to be seen. Hopefully, the decision turns out to be what is in the best interest of this exceptional athlete.

Leading up to the Gold-Blue Spring Game have been a pair of officiated scrimmages. The latter took place this past Saturday in Milan Puskar Stadium. The idea is to emulate a live game experience to evaluate talent based on performance when it matters the most. Brown welcomes a full Big 12 officiating crew to Touchdown City. Brown is laser-focused this spring with the pressure to win at an all-time high for the Kentucky native. His 22-25 record at West Virginia has been a concern and he knows that he has to come out swinging this year. Brown's offense will have to set the tone and first he needs to decide on a starter at the quarterback spot.

Saturday he had junior Garrett Greene and redshirt freshman Nicco Marchiol alternating with the first team and second team. Greene did provide a spark for the Mountaineers last season, coming in and pitch hitting at various times. He is a run first signal caller who isn't afraid to take a hit.

Marchiol has been waiting patiently for his opportunity. He has all of the tools needed and if he lives up to his hype, then look out, there could be a new sheriff in town.

If there isn't a clean cut winner in the quarterback battle for Brown, then a dual threat could be utilized. If it takes both of them playing to get the job done, Brown will use them both. Winning early is the top priority in Morgantown in 2023.

## HANDS-ONLY CPR Q&A

**About 350,000 people have a cardiac arrest outside the hospital each year and about 9 in 10 die. When a person has a cardiac arrest, survival depends on immediately receiving CPR from someone nearby, including a bystander or family member. CPR, especially if performed immediately, can double or triple a cardiac arrest victim's chance of survival. Hands-only CPR is CPR without rescue breaths. If you see a teen or adult collapse, you can perform hands-only CPR.**

### What best advice can you provide for being prepared as a bystander?

Being prepared for an emergency is more about knowledge than supplies.

Learn how to perform hands-only CPR from home by watching AHA's instructional video: [www.heart.org/handsonlycpr](http://www.heart.org/handsonlycpr).

Learn to recognize the signs of cardiac arrest. It is important to know that cardiac arrest can happen at any age. If you see a teen or adult suddenly collapse, call 911 and begin hands-only CPR.

Learn more about the Good Samaritan Law where you live. The general principle of the Good Samaritan Law provides protection from claims of negligence for those who provide care without expectation of payment. All 50 states have a Good Samaritan Law, but the details of these laws can vary from state to state.

### When administering hands-on CPR for adults, what should I do first?

Hands-only CPR is effective in the first few minutes and does not involve breathing into a person's mouth. Call 911 if you see a teen or an adult suddenly collapse. The operator on the other end of the line can assist you while getting the emergency help you need on the way.

### After calling 911, how do I begin hands-only CPR?

You are now ready to begin hands-only CPR. Pinpointing the right area of the chest to administer hands-only CPR is easy; just put your hand under the patient's armpit. Now slide your hand up and over the center of the chest. Next, push hard and fast in the center of the chest to the beat of a familiar song with 100 to 120 beats/minute. Song examples include "Stayin' Alive" by the Bee Gees or "Walk the Line" by Johnny Cash. People feel more confident performing hands-only CPR and are more likely to remember the correct rate when trained to the beat of a familiar song.

Keep giving hands-only CPR until medical professionals arrive or until a person with formal CPR training can take over.

### When administering CPR for infants, what should I do first?

As you would do with an adult, call 911 immediately and then make sure the scene is safe.

### After calling 911, how do I begin CPR for infants?

Next, place the infant on a firm, flat surface. Place two fingers in the center of the infant's chest, just below the nipple line on the lower half of the breastbone. Do not press the tip of the breastbone. Give compression at a rate of 100 to 120/minute. At the end of each compression, allow the chest to recoil completely (re-expand); do not lean on the chest. Chest compression and chest recoil times should be about equal. Minimize interruptions in compressions (e.g., to give breaths) to less than 10 seconds. After every 30 compressions, open the airway with a head tilt-chin lift and give two breaths, each over 1 second.

### Is there a hands-only option for infants and children, similar to what we discussed previously for adults?

Doing something is better than doing nothing. However, children often suffer pulselessness/arrest from airway issues, so breathing for them is critically important.

“We’ll see what the Clarksburg Water Board says first,” said Strait. According to Strait, the painting and color coding for the hydrants is nearly complete. “Next they’ll work on flushing the hydrants and redoing the hydrants where they need done, and they’re working on the schedule for that.”

Brendan Gallagher, who works on promotion efforts for Shinnston, attended the meeting and spoke briefly about a family donating money for the beautification of Shinnston. However, they needed a 501(C) in order to be able to make the donation. “But we aren’t going to be able to get that money until a 501(C) is set up,” Gallagher said. “That doesn’t just happen overnight.”

Gallagher explained that the family is, instead of donating the money directly to Shinnston, going to write the check to the The Cultural Foundation of Harrison County. The check will be allocated specifically for projects in the city. That way the city will be able to obtain the money much quicker, he said. “This also gives us the opportunity with the Harrison County cultural foundation for other people who want to donate a tax write-off for the beautification of the city,” Gallagher said. “They can donate it to the Cultural Foundation as well and it will be put in that pot. As long as they designate that check to the City of Shinnston, they will notify us. We can apply it for whatever we want to use it for.”

Council also discussed the demolition of dilapidated properties, including the list of addresses recommended by the fire chief, the fire inspector, and Edwards. “We’re looking at 101 Charles St. We’re looking at the one that burnt; that’ll be first,” Edwards said. The other top four addresses mentioned were 71 Station St., 98 Walnut St., and a building on South Pike St.

Project updates for 2023:  
The spring clean-up hasn’t been done yet.  
There are no updates on a proposed pickleball court.  
Street signs are about 30% done, according to Edwards, and “we will do what we can,” Edwards said. But he assumes that they will not all get completed due to cost.  
The city has already started looking for a location for a dog park.  
Taking over Hutchison Community Water Association is 98% done, according to Edwards, and “everything is set up for that,” Edwards said.  
Edwards said he needs to touch base with the West Virginia Department of Agriculture for updates on the location of the new boat ramp.  
Street sweeping will be continued all summer long.

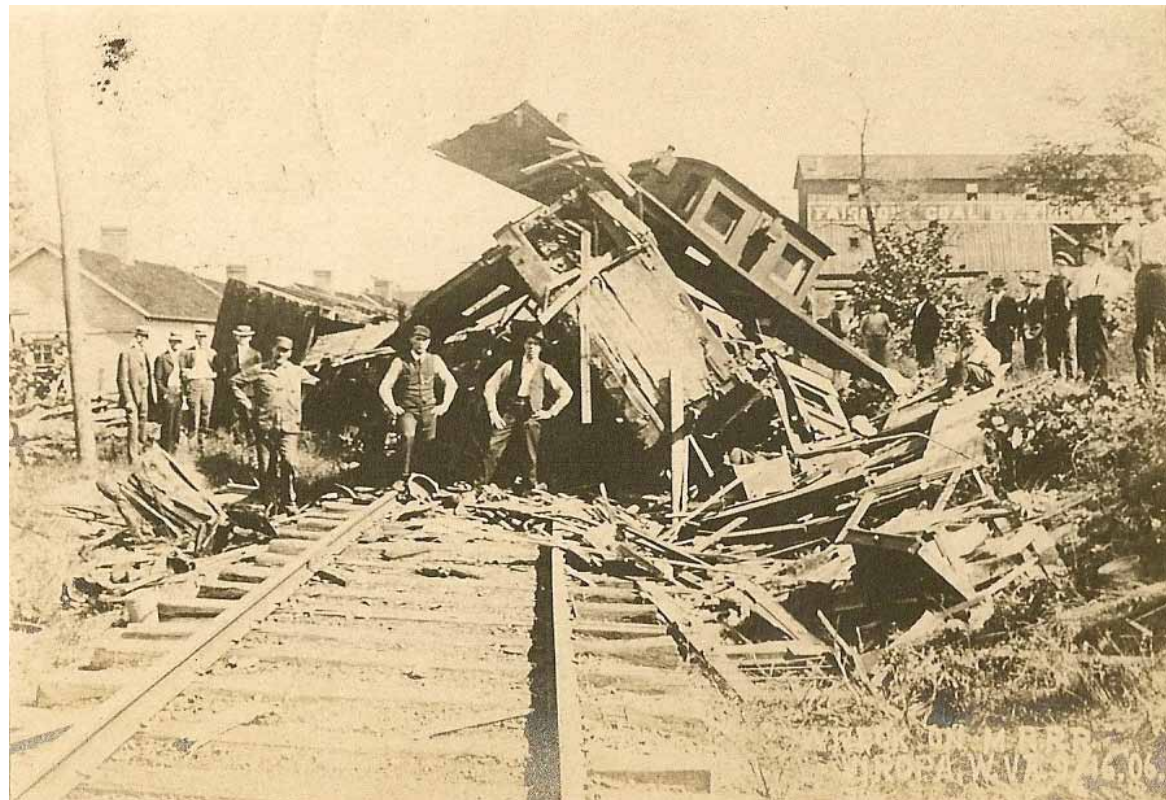

## Turkey hunting resumes

SOUTH CHARLESTON, WV — Turkey hunting returned to West Virginia with the annual two-day youth season on April 15–16. The regular spring gobbler season opened on April 17 and will run for five weeks until May 21.

During the season, hunters may harvest one bearded bird per day with a season bag limit of two, according to a news release shared by the West Virginia Press Association.

All hunters 15 and older are required to have a valid West Virginia hunting license, unless they are hunting under resident landowner privileges and carry a valid form of identification while hunting. A West Virginia hunting license can be purchased at 160 retail agents around the state or online at [WVhunt.com](http://WVhunt.com).

“West Virginia’s spring turkey season is not only a time for experienced hunters to test their skills but also an opportunity for adults to introduce the next generation to the joys of hunting,” said West Virginia Division of Natural Resources Director Brett McMillion. “While we may be looking forward to our own time in the woods, let’s not forget that experienced hunters need to share their passion and pass down their knowledge to ensure hunting remains a vital part of our state’s heritage.”

DNR officials remind sportsmen and women that hunting turkeys over bait and killing hens without beards are illegal during the spring season. Turkey hunters are encouraged to report any such activity to their local Natural Resource Police Officer or call 911 to report the violation. In addition, the West Virginia Chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation pays a \$100 reward for information that leads to the arrest and conviction of anyone killing a turkey illegally.

“Hunting is an essential part of West Virginia’s economy and we are excited to welcome hunters from across the state and beyond for the 2023 spring turkey season,” said West Virginia Department of Commerce Secretary James Bailey. “This season is an opportunity for resident hunters to enjoy the natural beauty of their state and a chance for visitors to experience all that West Virginia has to offer, from our world-class hunting and fishing opportunities to our unique cultural attractions and scenic beauty.”

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## Practice being a “Master Backyarder” this Earth Day

The TurfMutt Foundation, which advocates for the care and use of our backyards, community parks, and other green spaces, says Earth Day, Saturday April 22, is the perfect time to practice being a master backyarder, according to a news release.

“Backyarding” is the act of taking activities that we normally do inside, out to our yards and parks. Master backyarders elevate backyarding, using their personal and community green space for everything from working and exercising to entertaining and relaxing.

“Master backyarders also understand the benefits of our yards and other community green spaces to the environment,” explains Kris Kiser, president and CEO of the TurfMutt Foundation. “Every day is Earth Day for master backyarders. They plant for pollinators, know to put the right plant in the right place, and recognize their backyard as an important part of the connected ecosystem.”

This year, the TurfMutt Foundation encourages everyone to use Earth Day as an opportunity to practice being a master backyarder. Here are a few ways to do just that:

Remember the “Golden Rule” of Backyarding: Right plant, right place. Putting the right plant in the right place is the key to successful master backyarding. It goes beyond identifying plants that will do better in sun versus shade. Master backyarders select plants that will thrive in their climate zone and work to create a backyard that supports their family’s lifestyle. To learn more about selecting the right plants for your yard, refer to the USDA’s Plant Hardiness Zone Map.

Plant with pollinators in mind. Master backyarders understand that our yards and community parks are an important part of the connected ecosystem, providing food and shelter for pollinators. They plant with birds, bees, butterflies, bats, and other creatures in mind.

Water wisely. After getting their new plants started, master backyarders only water when necessary. They install watering solutions – like smart controllers on irrigation systems – to help use water efficiently while maintaining a living landscape. They remember that over-watered

grass gets lazy, growing roots in a horizontal pattern. But with less water, grass sends its roots deeper – vertically – seeking water. By working harder, grass does a better job performing its environmental superpowers like sequestering carbon and releasing oxygen.

Bone up on backyard benefits. Master backyarders are tuned into the many benefits of spending time in backyards and community parks, and they use the outdoors for all sorts of activities like dining, entertaining, working and even vacationing. For humans, backyarding benefits include lower stress, increased happiness, and improved memory. For the health of the planet, green space captures carbon, produces oxygen, and prevents runoff.

After all, no one loves and appreciates yards and green spaces more than dogs. CHARLESTON, WV – The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR), Bureau for Public Health, Office of Nutrition Services announced updated U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) income eligibility guidelines for the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC).

The new guidelines indicate a family of four can earn \$55,500 and qualify for WIC benefits, an increase of \$4,162 from 2022, according to a news release. These guidelines are adjusted for recent inflation over the past year.

“Our goal is to provide nutritional services and information that help keep West Virginia families healthy,” said State Health Officer and Commissioner for DHHR’s Bureau for Public Health Dr. Matthew Christiansen. “West Virginia WIC serves more than 36,000 mothers and young children monthly. With the expanded income guidelines, we can serve more families.”

An additional 4,600 West Virginians could be served under the expanded WIC income eligibility guidelines. Families enrolled in the program receive nutrition education, breastfeeding education, nutritious foods, and access to maternal, prenatal and pediatric healthcare services that may otherwise be unavailable. West Virginia WIC serves 86% of all babies born in West Virginia.

The new income guidelines represent 185% above the federal poverty level for all 48 contiguous states.

## Pay attention to power equipment safety

ALEXANDRIA, Va. - Spring is here and as we get out our lawn mowers and other outdoor power equipment out from storage to work in our yards, businesses and other green spaces, it’s important to keep safety in mind.

“Think safety first,” says Kris Kiser, President and CEO of the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI), an international trade association representing outdoor power equipment, small engine, utility vehicle, golf car and personal transport vehicle manufacturers and suppliers.

“I can’t stress enough to review manufacturer’s safety guidance before starting up any equipment—especially your lawn mower. Review your owner’s manual and do maintenance on your equipment,” said Kiser, in a news release.

OPEI offers these tips for readying and using your outdoor power equipment:

- Know not all lawn mowers are the same. Whether your mower is a garden tractor, zero turn mower or other, it has a unique design, requirements, weight classification, and other differences that impact how to use it safely. The newest machines have the latest safety standards.

- Know your specific machine. Many mowers may look similar but the technology is ever evolving with evolving safety systems. They vary in design, power supply, performance, operating parameters, and more. Your manufacturer-supplied owner’s manual will guide you in these differences. Read your owner’s manual.

- When using mowers on slopes follow the manufacturer’s guidance to the letter.

- Do not disable or alter manufacturer-installed safety equipment.
- Walk your yard before mowing. Slopes, wet grass and weather may impact equipment performance, as well as safe handling procedures. Pick up sticks and limbs that may have fallen to the ground over the winter and any loose objects that could be hit by a mower. Inspect trees for damaged limbs that may get in your way when mowing.

- Look over equipment before use. Check the air filter, oil level and gasoline tank. Watch for loose belts and missing or damaged parts. Replace any parts needed or take your equipment to a qualified service representative.

- Protect your power. Use only E10 or less fuel in gasoline-powered outdoor power equipment if it is not designed for higher ethanol blends. Add a fuel stabilizer if you don’t use up all the fuel in the tank right away. Burn off any fuel before storing the mower more than 30 days. For battery-powered equipment, only use battery packs specified by the manufacturer. Follow all charging instructions as outlined in the owner’s manual. Be sure to store fuel and batteries safely. Keep batteries away from other metal objects, store them in a climate-controlled area, and never stack batteries.

- Keep children and pets away from machines during operation.
- Keep your mower clean. It will run more efficiently and last longer. Always remove dirt, oil or grass before using and storing. Store equipment in a dry place, avoiding damp or wet environments.

## WVU experts warn against ramp overharvesting

MORGANTOWN, WV — Though patches of wild onions, known as ramps, may appear thick and widespread for plucking each spring in Appalachia, West Virginia University experts cautions overharvesting is a threat in many locations, according to a news release.

“Ramps are also known as wild leeks and are native to West Virginia,” said Brian Sparks, WVU Extension agent, Agriculture and Natural Resources, Nicholas and Fayette counties. “They belong to the lily family, so they are a close relative of onion and garlic. Foliage develops quickly into flat, green leaves that are two inches wide and eight inches long at maturity. Once deciduous trees begin to canopy, the leaves of the ramps quickly disappear, but the bulb, just like an onion, remains in the soil. By this time, harvest has been completed in most areas of West Virginia. In the summer, the ramp will flower with three sepals and three petals and produce seeds. Once it’s bloomed, it goes dormant and reactivates when spring comes.

“Since we know how a ramp reproduces, we can take a few precautions when we harvest,” he said. “One, only cut the leaf and leave the bulb to continue growing. Two, if you must have the bulb part to eat, when you are digging, leave some of the bottom of the bulb, where the roots are, in the ground so it can have some chance of growing back. Three, nurture a patch by taking just 10% of the ramps annually and leave the rest to continue maturing.”

Melissa Marra, associate professor, nutritional sciences, School of Agriculture and Foods, WVU Davis College of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Design, also warned against overharvesting.

“Ramps, the first green plant to emerge in the spring, were traditionally eaten by Native Americans as a tonic to replenish nutrients after the winter season,” she said. “In recent years, consumer demand has significantly increased due to local and wild food movements. They’re now considered a seasonal delicacy beyond their growing regions. Some estimates indicate that \$15 million in ramps are sold each year in just a few weeks. The local and commercial increases in demand, coupled with the fact that the plants are slow-growing, put them in danger of being overharvested in some areas. Ramps can take up to seven years to grow to maturity from a seed. When they are harvested by taking the whole plant — root and all — before seeds are produced, they don’t grow back. One study estimated that it could take 22 years for a patch to recover when 25% of the area is harvested by foraging the whole plant. In some states like Maine, Rhode Island and Tennessee, ramps are listed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as ‘plants of special concern,’ as they are vulnerable to becoming endangered.

“Traditional ways to sustainably harvest the plants were to leave the bulbs or a portion, or by taking just the one leaf from a plant. We should be conscientious about the way we harvest ramps, so they are still around for future generations to enjoy.”

## Home heating assistance available

CHARLESTON, WV – The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR) announced, in a news release, that applications for the Low-Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) will be accepted beginning Monday, April 24, and ending at the close of business on Friday, April 28, or until funds are exhausted. The federally funded program assists eligible state residents in paying home heating bills.

Eligibility for LIEAP benefits is based on income, household size, and whether the household is responsible for paying its heating bill. To qualify, households must meet all program guidelines, which include an applicant’s annual income being at or below 60 percent of the State Median Income. In situations where a heating emergency exists, applicants must be seen by a DHHR worker.

All applications must be received by DHHR or postmarked by April 28, 2023. Completed applications should be delivered or mailed to the DHHR office located in the applicant’s county of residence. Mailing the application to any other office or a utility company may delay the receipt by DHHR and prohibit the processing of the application.

## WVU prestigious fellowship award granted

MORGANTOWN, WV — Azeem Khan, a West Virginia University student committed to public service, has been named the University’s 26th Truman Scholar, the nation’s top graduate fellowship award for aspiring public service leaders.

“Azeem blends a demonstrated commitment to public service with a fierce passion for problem solving, which is an unbeatable combination when facing challenges ranging from mental health to opioid abuse,” President Gordon Gee said.

A native of Charleston, the political science major with dual minors in business cybersecurity and philosophy is acutely aware of the challenges his home state faces, especially with respect to the opioid epidemic.

“I think it’s impossible to live in West Virginia and go a single day without thinking about the impact the opioid epidemic has had on our state,” Khan said. “Growing up, it’s something we always saw impacting our communities. But in the face of incredible adversity, I always found

myself inspired by the resilience of ordinary West Virginians.”

As co-chair of the Mountaineer Fentanyl Education Task Force, Khan has led efforts to educate WVU students about the dangers of fentanyl, a synthetic opioid drug.

Composed of WVU student leaders, the Task Force primarily focuses on education about the unique dangers of fentanyl and the resources available to fight back against the deadly drug.

Since the Task Force’s inception in July 2022, student leaders have presented in many WVU first-year seminar classes, distributed free test strip kits, partnered with faculty members to host educational events, and conducted social media campaigns that reached more than 70,000 accounts.

“This task force is something that isn’t being done anywhere else in the country,” Khan said. “We have an amazing team of students who are dedicating their time and effort to this cause. They really care. They are going above and beyond

to save lives. And we always talk about if we save one life, that’s more than worth it.”

As president pro tempore of the WVU Student Government Association, Khan has led efforts to engage with state lawmakers about the importance of student mental health. And he continues to have promising conversations with legislators and WVU senior leaders to seek progress in this important area.

Truman Scholars demonstrate outstanding leadership potential, a commitment to a career in government or the nonprofit sector, and academic excellence.

Khan’s commitment to public service is rooted in his family’s story.

“My family came to the United States when my grandparents immigrated here in 1963,” he said. “The United States has given my family opportunities which would be unimaginable anywhere else in the world. That is something which is at the top of my mind every day of my life and is a reason why there is no title I am prouder to

hold than ‘American’. America has given so much to me and my family, and I feel an obligation to do everything humanly possible to contribute to improving our country.”

Each Truman Scholar receives funding for graduate studies, leadership training, career counseling and special internship and fellowship opportunities within the federal government.

An Honors College student, Khan will use the award to support his graduate studies following graduation from WVU in spring 2024. He aspires to attend law school and continue to fulfill his passion for public service.

“As Azeem joins the proud WVU tradition of Truman Scholars, we welcome him as someone with tremendous potential to make a positive difference from the campus to the courtroom to the Capitol and beyond,” said Jay Cole, senior advisor to President Gee, the WVU Truman representative and a 1993 Truman Scholar.

## Doddridge leads in voter registrations

The West Virginia Secretary of State’s Office registered 1,179 new businesses statewide during the month of March, according to a news release from Secretary of State Mac Warner.

Doddridge County led the state in the percentage of new business growth through March with a total of eight new business registrations, a 3.11% increase. The Secretary of State’s Business & Licensing Division reported that Taylor, Tyler, Morgan and Braxton Counties also experienced notable growth during the month.

A total of 15 new business entities were registered in Taylor County in March of 2023. Tyler County successfully registered six businesses. Morgan County reported 19 registrations for the month and Braxton County registered ten new businesses with the Secretary of State’s Office.

Counties that lead the state in total businesses registered for March were Berkeley, Kanawha, Monongalia, Jefferson and Cabell. Berkeley County successfully registered 120 businesses while Kanawha County reported 115 new registrations. Monongalia County had 100 businesses register. Jefferson County registered 73 new businesses while Cabell County totaled 63 new registrations for the month.

Statewide, West Virginia registered 12,972 new businesses in the previous 12-month period, from April 1, 2022, to March 31, 2023. Berkeley County led all 55 counties with an 18.87% growth rate during the one-year timespan.

## Democratic women offer scholarship
