Lancaster, Pennsylvania




News and Journal columnist Jim Hunt made a stop at City Hall during his trip to Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

This past week, I had the opportunity to visit the City of Lancaster, Pennsylvania. Lancaster is a historic city and has the distinction of serving for one day as the temporary capital of the United States during the American Revolution. The city was founded in 1729 and incorporated as a borough in 1742 and incorporated as a city in 1818. It is one of the oldest inland cities in the United States and served as capital of Pennsylvania from 1799 to 1812. The first long-distance paved road in the United States was the former Philadelphia to Lancaster Turnpike. The turnpike was paved with stone the entire distance and overlaid with gravel. The cost of the turnpike was \$450,000, a huge sum at the time.

The current city has a population of nearly 60,000 residents, with nearly a third being of Puerto Rican

This Week in West Virginia History

CHARLESTON, WV - The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

May 4, 1896: The Children's Home Society of West Virginia was formed by a group of Charleston ministers. Their goal was to place orphaned and neglected children with caring families rather than crowd them into county poorhouses.

May 5, 1923: A fire started by welders working on a new swimming pool destroyed most of Luna Park, an amusement park in Charleston. Although Luna's owners announced they would rebuild, the park never reopened. May 5, 1923: Golfer Bill Campbell was born in

Huntington. He won more than 30 championships over a seven-decade career and is considered one of the best amateur players in history. May 6, 1812: Activist and physician Martin

Robison Delany was born in Charles Town. In February 1865, he was commissioned as a major in the U.S. Colored Troops. He was the only Black Civil War officer to be given a field command.

May 6, 1968: A continuous miner machine at the Gauley Coal & Coke Saxsewell No. 8 mine at Hominy Falls, Nicholas County, cut into an

adjacent mine, which was filled with water. The resulting flood drowned four miners and trapped 21 others. May 6, 1968: Newspaper publisher and Bluefield native John S. Knight received the Pulitzer Prize

for his long record of service and his series of columns opposing the Vietnam War. May 7, 1824: Logan County was created by the

Virginia General Assembly from parts of Giles,

Tazewell, Cabell and Kanawha counties. The county seat was first known as Lawnsville, then Aracoma, and finally Logan.

May 7, 1857: William A. MacCorkle was born in Rockbridge County, Virginia, on his father's plantation. He served as West Virginia's ninth

May 7, 1928: The Keith-Albee Theater opened in Huntington. The opening program featured a comedy called "Good Morning, Judge," a newsreel, and five stage acts. But the theater itself, with its elaborate interior, clearly was the star of the evening.

May 7, 1983: The New River Gorge National Park and Preserve began operations when the first visitor center opened near Fayetteville.

May 8, 1864: Clarence Wayland Watson was born in Fairmont. Watson was a prominent coal baron and served in the U.S. Senate from 1911 to

May 8, 1998: Former U.S. Senator Jennings Randolph died at the age of 96. He was first elected to the House of Representatives in 1932 and served a total of 40 years in Congress.

May 9, 1800: Abolitionist John Brown was born in Torrington, Connecticut. His 1859 raid on Harpers Ferry galvanized the nation, further alienating North and South in the lead-up to the

Civil War. May 9, 1843: Confederate spy "Belle" Boyd

was born in Martinsburg. On July 4, 1861, Boyd shot a Yankee soldier and started her spy career. May 9, 1863: Confederate raiders arrived at

Burning Springs, Wirt County. There they set fire to 150,000 barrels of oil, oil tanks, engines for pumping, engine houses, wagons, and oil-laden May 10, 1863, "Stonewall" Jackson died from

wounds suffered at the Battle of Chancellorsville after uttering the words, "Let us cross over the river




heritage. The city celebrates its Puerto Rican economic viability of the downtown. heritage with a festival each year. The city also is well known for the concentration of Amish and Mennonite communities. Many of the residents live along tree lined streets that look much like they did over a hundred years ago. The downtown has a mix of businesses and has mixed some newer buildings among the historic stone buildings of years past. The Central Market, built in 1889, is the oldest continuously run farmers market in the United States and features handmade Amish goods that are popular with tourists.

I really enjoyed spending some time in the downtown district that featured a large town square, surrounded by stores, restaurants and the Lancaster Public Library. Red Adirondack chairs are lined up and become a popular place for people to relax and take in the sights. A feature that seemed to be popular with both young and old was swings, suspended from black metal structures. I've seen these swings in some other cities and I think they are a good attraction. The area was well kept, and a gentleman was sweeping up and keeping things in place. His blue shirt said he was part of the Lancaster Downtown Improvement District, a group founded in 1992, that keeps the downtown attractive and clean. These districts are formed and funded by the property owners and businesses in the district and can really make a difference in the Amazing city!

The reason for my visit to Lancaster was to introduce Matt Grandinetti of Duke's Root Control to officials with the city. Duke's Root Control works with many cities in Pennsylvania and is interested in meeting with city officials throughout the state to explain the innovative way to address issues with the public sewer systems. In older cities, like Lancaster, root intrusion can wreak havoc with sewer infrastructure and cause backups and service interruptions. Using Duke's system, the sewers can be treated with an environmentally friendly process that kills the roots in the pipes without damaging the trees or above ground vegetation. It doesn't involve digging up pipes in the ground which can cost hundreds of thousands of dollars and cause major disruptions.

I'm looking forward to a return visit to Lancaster, soon, to meet Mayor Danene Sorace, who is the 43rd mayor of Lancaster and only the second woman to hold the mayor's seat. Mayor Sorace worked for an environmental organization prior to becoming mayor and launched the city's first ever green infrastructure plan. I left a signed copy of my book, "The Amazing City-7 Steps to Creating an Amazing City," with her Executive Assistant Bernie Burkholder and look forward to spending some more time hearing about this historic,

Fairmont State tennis secures NCAA Championship bid

ERIE, Pa. – The Fairmont State men's tennis team continued its historic season after securing the first NCAA Championship bid in program history following a 4-2 victory over the No. 2 seed in the region, Edinboro, in the Atlantic Region #2 Championship on Saturday (April 29) at Westwood Racquet Club in Erie, Pa.

The Fighting Falcons won the doubles point and a trio of singles matches for the victory. Kan Watanabe and Alexandre Pages teamed up to claim the No. 1 doubles match, 7-5, according to a news release. The duo of Elia Barozzi and Seena Saadevandi took down their opponents in the No. 2 doubles duel and won in a tiebreaker, 7-6 (4) to swing the doubles point to the Falcons.

Saadevandi earned a 7-6 (7), 6-3 win in No. 3 singles for the second point. Alexandre Pages captured a 6-3, 6-4 victory in No. 4 singles. Mohamed El Helaly closed out the duel for the Falcons with a 7-5, 7-5 win in No. 5 singles to send the Falcons to the NCAA Championships.

The Fairmont State men's tennis team secured a spot in the 16-team NCAA Men's Tennis National Tournament, which is set to begin on May 11 at the USTA National Campus in Orlando, Fla. Seedings and match times will be released by the NCAA when all regional matches have concluded.



West Virginia's tourism education initiative to launch statewide

By Matt Young, WV Press Association CRAIGSVILLE, WV – Gov. Jim Justice, along

with several state officials, during a press conference last week at the Nicholas County Career and Technical Center (CTC), announced the launch of the "Shape Our Future" initiative – West Virginia's new hospitality and tourism education program.

The new initiative has been developed as part of the

W.Va. Department of Tourism's statewide "Tourism Works" program, and seeks to develop the workforce for the anticipated growth of tourism jobs over the next three years. Also on hand for the press conference were Tourism Secretary Chelsea Ruby, State Superintendent of Schools David Roach, and Clinton Burch, technical education officer with the W.Va. Department of

"This is one of my all time favorite projects," Ruby told the students and community members in attendance. "We've all heard people say that there are no jobs in West Virginia. That's not true, and and said, 'How do we tackle this? How do we bring today we're here to talk about the explosive growth in tourism. Today, as we speak, there are over 70,000 people in the state who are working in the tourism

According to Ruby, tourism-employment in West Virginia is projected to grow by "more than 20,000 openings" each year for the next three years, adding that "about half of those will be management level positions." As stated in data released by the Higher Education Policy Commission, these "management level positions" are expected to command a salary in the range of \$60,000.

"I'm here to tell you that there are going to be a lot of really great opportunities," Ruby said.

The Tourism Works program is being funded through a \$5.1 million grant provided by the U.S. Economic Development Administration. According to a statement from Justice's office, the "education component" of the program focuses on preparing students for the "substantial increase in job openings," and connecting them with "viable career opportunities." The statement adds that, "Tourism brought in

approximately \$5 billion in visitor spending last year – a record for the state – along with nearly \$300 million in recent private tourism investment and tourism tax credit applications, which will expand tourism

infrastructure in the state." Next to the podium was Clinton Burch, who began by praising Justice for the partnerships the governor has created between "business and education," noting

that, "Career technical education in the State of West Virginia would not be possible without partnerships like you're seeing here today." "We want to grow this opportunity across the state," Burch said. "Last year alone, the State of West Virginia

had over 50,000 students participate in a technical course in either high school or middle school. That number has doubled over the last five years.' "When you hear 20,000 jobs in tourism over the next

three years, that's why we all put our heads together

"We're going to start teaching and training our students to be ready for these jobs that are on the way, and this is just the tip of the iceberg," Justice added.

Through the Shape Our Future initiative, hospitality and tourism curriculum will soon be available in schools in all of West Virginia's 55 counties, and a "Tourism Pathway" program is currently in the pilot-stage. Once fully integrated, the Tourism Pathway program will afford high school students the opportunity to earn college credits and career certifications in hospitality and tourism.

Through additional partnerships with the W.Va. Department of Economic Development and the state's Community and Technical Colleges, the Department of Tourism plans to create additional educational opportunities through the Tourism Works program in the coming months.






