Senate Bill 415 Hot Topic at Commissioner's Meeting

West Virginia Senate Bill 415, written and proposed to allow County Commissions to impose amusement tax, was on the agenda for discussion at the most recent meeting of the Tucker County Commissioners. Present to partake in the discussion was Jessica Waldo, Executive Director of the Convention and Visitors Bureau, along with Donna Patrick. This tax would permit a one to two percent amusement tax to be added on amusement-related purchases, such as a ski

lift ticket.

Commission President Mike Rosenau stated he felt this tax would be a good option for the county and ensure the safety of our visitors. Commissioner Lowell Moore agreed as he has seen this bill presented more than once and has failed to make it through both the House and the Senate to be passed. His concern is why the legislature feels the municipalities are capable of implementing this tax, which a lot do, but the Commissioners would not be. He explained that if this would be put in place, it could be possible that the EMS Ordinance could be

eliminated and the amusement tax could be used to fund the first responders through visitors to the area instead of the residents. "It's a fair tax for tourists," he added. Rosenau added that he is glad for the one million-plus visitors that come to the area each year, but it is the locals that are "fitting the bill" for the guests.

Waldo spoke to the Commissioners beginning with an explanation of how the CVB is funding. She said the six percent hotel/motel tax is divided in half, they receive three percent, and the county the other three.

Kaycie Stushek presented the Davis Town Council with opportunities through the W.Va. Community Development Hub and how they can help prepare for potential economic impact.



Councilwoman Cindy Robeson took the roll for the Davis Town Council meeting in the absence of Recorder Andy Snyder and Councilwoman Jeannette Tekavec Ware. The meeting was dispensed from its regular meeting with a motion from Councilmen Al Tomson and John Felton to hear from guests.

Kaycie Stushek with the West Virginia Community Development Hub offered a brief presentation to the council to explain what programs they offer that the town may be of interest in. "The whole key of the program is to capitalize on the growth that tourism is having around recreation, especially in these locations," stated Stushek. "The last tourism report from last year listed Tucker County as one of three examples where it's really booming," she added. "The key is to capitalize on that market potential and economic potential and invest in downtowns so that downtowns are ready to take that investment in terms of buildings and businesses," Stushek said.

More in-depth details were given to the council for their consideration of the program, which they will review further and discuss. The grant process due date is in April, therefore a decision will be made

Since then, she flourished into a very successful business which has now outgrown her home kitchen. After Covid hit, Nestor and her classmates were sent out into the world lacking the last few months of their senior year, along with a traditional prom and graduation ceremony. During that time, she decided to take her Gourmet Apples to the next level and open a retail location.

Situated between Farm Up Table and Thomasyard on Front Street in Thomas, Nestor enlisted the help of her parents and family to bring new life to a vacant retail space to showcase her sweet and sticky treats. Nestor chose to bring her storefront to Thomas due to the high volume of tourist foot traffic in that area.

Nestor stated, "So far it's going well." Once she realized how popular her treats were, it became evident that what began as a way to earn money for prom and graduation became more of a full time position. "This will be my job," she stated.

Macy Lou's has begun offer-

ing fundraiser options for organizations looking for ways to generate revenue. She recalled a fundraiser she conducted for a dance group known as Center Stage that yielded over 600 apple orders. During the Christmas holiday season, Nestor produced over 1,000 apples, many

of which went as gifts. Nestor's mom still offers to help in the store when her schedule allows, and her Dad Rick leads the way on the renovations and construction aspects for Nestor's new endeavor. In addition to her apples, Nestor is also offering apple butter, courtesy of her grandmother Louise Waybright's recipe, and apple pies. Smaller gourmet apples will also be making their way to the menu that would be especially appealing for children. Nestor is offering Macy Lou's T-shirts for sale that she had custom made by Rocky Bottom Custom Prints.

Up until the grand opening, Nestor has worked from custom orders, now she is going to offer ready-made treats on her shelves for anyone wishing to drop by

CVNWR Reconstructing a Portion of Camp 70 Road



Canaan Valley National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) is reconstructing a road, parking lot, and trail rehabilitation project out at Camp 70 road in the town of Davis. This is a Federal Highways project that will take place at the end of Camp 70 road where the road splits to the North and enters into the refuge. This project aims to reconstruct 1000 feet of Camp Road 70 that stretches into the Refuge and reconstruct the current parking area with additional parking including parking for trailers. The Laurel Landing Trail will also be reconstructed to improve

accessibility for the existing ADA compliant canoe/kayak launch on the Blackwater River. Work is scheduled to begin April 5th, and will last approximately 6 weeks. For that duration the roadway, parking lot, and trail will be closed to the public. Two other trails that branch off this parking area, Brown Mountain Trail and Camp 70 Loop will also be closed during the construction. - Claude Daniel Caltrider, Dry Fork, was charged with one count DUI. The complaint states that on Wednesday, March 24 at approximately 8:15 p.m. Sgt. C.A. Teter initiated a traffic stop on a white flat-bed Ford pickup truck for having no registration and no tail lights along WV 32 near Thomas. Teter made contact with the driver, Claude Caltrider, and asked for his driver's license, registration and insurance. While speaking with the defendant, Teter noticed an odor of an alcoholic beverage emitting from inside the vehicle. He also observed a clear plastic baggie containing a green leafy substance, allegedly marijuana, inside the left shirt pocket of the defendant. He asked the defendant what was in the bag and he replied "oh, ****, I forgot I had that on me." He stated to the officer that it was marijuana. Teter took possession of the item and returned to his cruiser for followup. He noticed that the driver's speech was slurred and his eyes were bloodshot and glassy while speaking to him. He returned to the vehicle and began a further investigation of DUI. He asked the driver to exit the vehicle and meet him at the rear of his vehicle. The driver did so but was allegedly unsteady on his feet, stumbled a little and used his truck bed to stay upright. The officer noticed a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage was emitting from the defendant's breath as he spoke and he allegedly stated that he had only had two beers. He was asked to submit to field sobriety tests and failed all of them. The defendant was placed under arrest and transported to Parsons Police Department for further testing. Consent forms were read and signed by the defendant and he submitted to the Intox EC/IR-II and blew a .119%. The defendant was then transported to the WVSP for further processing and then on to
- charged with one count of Domestic Battery and one count of Discharge of firearm within 500 feet of a dwelling. According to the complaint on Wednesday, March 10 Chief Deputy M.J. Sigley along with WVSP was dispatched to 53 Gross St in Davis for a domestic dispute. While in-route Sigley was advised by E911 that shots had been fired. Imagine what equal pay for equal work would look like. Last week, March 24th, was Equal Pay Day which recognizes the pay gap between working men and women. March 24th is the day into the year in which it takes women on average to earn what men did in 2020. This day is important. It is a reminder that women in the US make less than their male counterparts. In West Virginia it is 74 cents. West Virginia women are paid 74 cents for every dollar their male counterparts are paid. So basically, women work for 15 months for the same pay as men who work for 12 months. It does not have to be this way.

In West Virginia less money in women's pockets has a significant ripple effect on our economy. According to the Institute for Women's Policy Research, the poverty rate for women in WV would be reduced by one-third if they were paid the same as men doing the same work. The West Virginia Center on Budget and Policy estimates that working women in West Virginia lost out on \$3.7 billion in 2017. With these lost earnings, on average, a West Virginia woman could put two years' worth of food on her family's table or pay the tuition for two years at a West Virginia community college for herself or one of her children. This is why it is essential that we adopt legislation to help eliminate the pay gap for West Virginia women and in turn contribute to West Virginia's economy.

A step in the right direction is the support of the Katherine Johnson and Dorothy Vaughan Fair Pay Act and the Pay Transparency Act. These bills, named after two prominent West Virginians—of Hidden Figures fame-- allows employees to discuss their pay with one another. Pay transparency helps assure women are not discriminated against. We must have policies that support pay equity, including pay transparency. These policies will make WV stronger and help grow our economy. Please contact your legislator and ask them to support these bills.

Mayor Doug Martin provided accounts payable to the council before reviewing the water improvement project invoices. The total invoices came to \$444,811.13 which Tomson and Felton made a motion to pay with all in favor. After reviewing the 2021-2022 budget which runs from July 1, 2021, to June 30, 2022, Martin noted, "It's up a little more from last year." It is crucial that the revenue coming in matches the expenditures, which Tomson stated, "You'll see that it exactly matches." This budget does not include the sewer or water, and the property tax amount is prepared and set by the county, not the municipality. Tomson and Robeson made a motion to approve the budget with everyone voting unanimously in favor.

Martin informed the

Council that the number two filter is down which has postponed work being done at the water plant. The contractors will need to be issued an extension due to delays also caused by the weather. It is estimated that the work in town is 75% complete with approximately 85% of work done at the plant. An invoice for a new digital pump was received in the amount of \$2,700, which Martin explained that the older style, manual pumps are \$1,850 and the money saved on chemicals for the digital will make up the difference.

The cemetery has been actively selling lots and basketball is going on at the Community Center. Felton wished to address concerns citizens have brought to him about the recently purchased trash truck not being utilized to collect trash throughout the town. It was said that the truck has summer tires on it and chains have not been purchased yet, therefore in inclement weather, it is difficult to maneuver. Helmick added that the haul road at the landfill needs to dry up as well before the truck with its current tires can get in and out safely. The dump trucks are still being used to collect trash in some of the alleys due to accessibility.

Felton also brought up the green truck and plows that have not been used. Martin said some of the plows are being used for parts. Felton suggested using what can be from the plows and truck and sell the rest. "We will clean it up," Martin assured.

Tomson included a copy of the property appraisals in the council packet in consideration of making a town park on a piece of property that will connect to the landlocked park on the other side of town. "An appraisal is important because if we get federal or state money to buy the land, the property cannot be sold for more than the appraisal, so we needed to know what the amount was that we're looking at as the ceiling," Tomson explained.

J. Helmick brought up that the kids can rarely use the park they have

now due to the excessive goose droppings. asked if there was a way to remedy the situation, which Martin said multiple efforts have been made to do so. Tomson added that "We're looking at buying the property for a couple of reasons, one is we want to keep access to the river, a big, wide access to the river, on this part of town so it doesn't get built on and filled up with buildings." Tomson made a motion to pursue the property and to come to an agreement with the current landowner with Robeson making a second. Tomson then made a motion to get the property appraisal with a second from Felton and all in favor.

She stated that there used to be a cap on the amount the EMS and Fire Departments could receive from the county's portion, however, Moore was unsure and said he would have to look into that further. Waldo met with the CVB Board who expressed concerns on what the definition of amusement and entertainment would be and how that money would be used. She stated they are firm supporters of the EMS and First Responders, but not of the bill because of too many unknowns and variables. Waldo added there must be other ways to fund the EMS versus taxing the tourists again, who already pay a 12% rental tax.

Rosenau asked if the CVB had any standards or regulations as to how their portion of the hotel/motel taxes was spent since the CVB Board seemed to want the same for the Commissioners if the bill were to pass. Waldo explained that to be an accredited CVB, they must follow certain guidelines, which they are and do. "And what makes you think the Commission would be less responsible (than the municipalities)?" asked Rosenau.

Moore wished to clarify that in the beginning, the EMS received nothing from

the hotel/motel tax because they did not have a hospital. Waldo asked if any data or statistics were proving that tourism affects the EMS or Fire Department services. Rosenau answered saying with over one million guests annually, it is highly likely to lead to more accidents both automotive-related or otherwise. He then suggested that of a \$700,000 hotel/motel tax, the CVB receives \$350,000 of that, and maybe they should consider donating to the EMS.

Patrick took the opportunity to speak saying that tourism is holding up the county as it is and the guests are the ones coming here to buy the overpriced gas and groceries on top of the 12% rental tax. She added they supply multiple jobs for the locals. "Why do we keep sticking it to the tourists?" she asked. Patrick suggested other options need to be sought or the language in the bill needs to be more specific.

Rosenau referred to an individual he knows that recently booked a rental in Myrtle Beach. Upon reviewing the receipt, a \$100 emergency service fee was applied to the overall cost, which would serve much like the Commission's intentions for the amusement and entertainment tax. He asked the individual if that deterred him from booking the rental or if that caused any issues. According to Rosenau, that individual stated it did not and he was glad to know he and his family would be safe by funding those types of services while on their trip.

Waldo stated that the CVB prides itself on being accredited and that they are continuing to bring visitors into the area to support the community. She added she felt the CVB was being singled out. Moore responded that he didn't feel it was fair that the locals had to be mostly responsible for funding the EMS services when it is so largely utilized by incoming guests.

Patrick then stated she felt the \$50 EMS Ordinance Fee was too low and referenced other counties and how they fund their She requested services. the Commission to continue their research outside of the counties and refer to other states as well for better funding ideas than the additional tax.

Commissioner Fred Davis, who also serves as a Volunteer Fire Fighter, has spoken with other individuals and referred to numerous calls received for assistance that are almost always

related to tourism, such as lost or injured hikers in the Douglas Falls area. Patrick said hikers will not be paying for anything to hike in that area, therefore that wouldn't help the tax purposes. Davis responded, "No matter what they use as a visitor, there will be somewhere to add this tax, they're going to come here no matter what." Davis then suggested the CVB support and showcase the Parsons area and that side of the county more whereas most of the focus has been on the Davis and Thomas

As the discussion continued about the bill, Moore put into perspective what it costs to run the EMS. He stated that to have two, 24-hour crews in the county, with just two EMTs, costs \$1.5 million per year to operate. This doesn't include the additional paramedics that have been working to provide additional care to those in need. He also added that if they went with the maximum of two percent, that would only be \$2 per \$100 spent.

The Canaan Valley Wildlife Refuge, represented by Ron Hollis, gave their annual update and told Commissioners that even though Governor Jim Jus-

tice is permitting full capacity re-opening, they are going, to begin with, a 50% capacity for safety.

Sheila DeVilder, the County Administrator, has continued working on filing grants and seeking out additional funding resources for the county. Mike Simmons, Assistant 911 Director, offered the report on behalf of 911, stating that new cables and equipment have been installed which EMS has stated the clarity seems to have improved. Rosenau suggested working with OEM Director Kevin White to perform a test of the system.

White followed announcing that nearly 70% of Tucker County residents have been vaccinated at the time of the meeting. The upcoming clinic will still be run at full scale, however, he foresees things to slow down as so many people are only waiting for their second vaccination. A video was taken of the Tucker County Vaccination Clinic and sent to the other 54 counties within the state to use as an example to model their system from. He has also been working with 911 to file a grant for security projects for cameras and fencing installation. As of May 1, fairs and festivals as permitted per Gov. Justice, which means the Fireman's Homecoming Parade will be held this year. White spoke with Gamble Amusement and they have confirmed extra precautions would be in place to ensure

Bailey Falls, Director of the Tucker County Animal Shelter, gave shelter statistics for March 1 through the 24. The shelter took in 36 animals, had eight adoptions, four owner reclaims, and 12 transfers to rescue partners. There were 21 trap, neuter, vaccinate, and return animals cared for, which fully vaccinates the colony on Price Street. Additional colonies throughout the county are being addressed as well, with six additional traps ordered.

Repairs are being made to the animal control vehicle and a rabies clinic is in the plans. No word has been received from the WVDA grant applied for as of the meeting. The Stanton Foundation COVID Relief Grant for canine medication is being compiled for consideration.

The wrecker vice agreement must be reviewed and renewed every three years, which Davis made a motion to approve with Moore and Rosenau in favor. A lease agreement with the Community Corrections office building was approved as presented as well as the budget proposal. Prosecuting Attorney Savannah Hull-Wilkins approved the erroneous assessments which the Commissioners signed off on. Payments were then voted on to approve as pre-

Nine bridge repair or replacement projects were also awarded, including a \$5.6 million contract for muchneeded repairs and maintenance to the Veterans Memorial Bridge connecting Weirton with Steubenville, Ohio on US 22.

The following bids were accepted and contracts awarded on March 19,

Triton Construction Inc. was low bidder for the bypass project relocating a section of WV 41 near US 19 and replacing a bridge near Beckley. Low bid was \$6,716,500.

Olympus Painting Contractors Inc. was low bid on the project to repair the Veterans Memorial bridge, with a bid of \$5,606,316.34.

Clearwater Construction Inc. was low bidder on a project to replace the North Shegon Bridge in Logan County, with a bid of \$1,394,444.44.

West Virginia Paving was sole bidder on a paving project from Courthouse to Ingleside Road in Mercer County, with a bid of \$1,955,251.20.

Kelly Paving Inc. was low bidder on a guardrail replacement project on Bonds Creek in Ritchie County, with a bid of \$81.811.

West Virginia Paving Inc. was low bidder for a resurfacing project on Elk Mountain Road in Pocahontas County, with a bid of \$569,119.80.

American Pavements Inc. was low bidder for a resurfacing project from Stoney Gap to Courthouse Road in Mercer County, with a bid of \$1,868,898.24.

Turman Morton Inc. was low bidder on a bridge replacement project on Manilla Creek in Putnam County, with a bid of \$937,006.60.

R.K. Construction Inc. was low bidder on a slide repair on Willowwood Road in Summers County, with a bid of \$718.888.59.

Bids on two projects – a project to restore a section of the Sewell Trail in Babcock State Park in Fayette County and a slide correction project on Pine Grove and Barrackville Road in Marion County – came in over estimate and are under further review by WVDOH.

WVDOH continues to hold bid lettings and contract awards remotely to

move projects forward while protecting the public from COVID-19.

Several factors are considered before awarding a bid, including whether a bid falls above or below the WVDOH Engineer's Estimate and by what percentage. In cases where a bid is above the Engineer's Estimate, WVDOH must consider the project need, repercussions of not awarding the project, additional funding sources, and whether or not sufficient reasons exist for the differences in estimates. Most projects are reviewed, analyzed, and awarded within a week of the bid letting, but the process can take longer.

When the Division of Highways has a project that is determined to be best constructed by a contractor, it is processed through the bid letting system. A letting is a scheduled opportunity for contractors to review and bid on several construction projects at one time. Lettings are held either once or twice per month and conducted through the Bid Express System online at www.bidx.com and handled through the Contract Administration Division. Contractors need to subscribe to Bid Express before

bids can be accepted on any project. As the date and time approaches for the deadline of the letting, contractors are expected to place their bids, with complete documentation as necessary. Shortly after the letting, the respective bids are reviewed. All bids are evaluated thoroughly for competitiveness and deemed acceptable through guidelines as approved by policy, reviewed, and approved by the FHWA. Award of the contracts is made based on recommendation by our Awards Committee based on the results of that evaluation and approval by the Commissioner. Proiects are typically awarded to the lowest bidder which has all proper documentation in place.

Monongahela National Forest Issues Annual Reminder on Guidelines for Collecting Ramps

Elkins, W.Va.,- Digging and eating ramps in the spring is a traditional activity throughout Appalachia and especially in the gateway communities of Monongahela National Forest. While collecting ramps for personal use is permitted on the Forest within established limits, harvesting commercial of ramps in the Forest, including re-selling ramps collected for personal use, is not permitted.

Personal use is defined as two gallons per person in possession at any one time, about the amount that fits in a typical plastic grocery bag. This equals about 180 whole plants, including roots and leaves. Individuals may not collect ramps on behalf of someone else.

We encourage people who collect ramps in the Forest to follow these guidelines to ensure abundant ramps in the future:

Collect ramps only in patches with more than 100 plants.

If you find a patch that has already been harvested, move on to another area.

When collecting ramps from a large clump, take only one-fifth of the plants. Leaving behind most of the plants will allow them to mature and go to seed, and the patch will recover faster.

If digging bulbs, use a soil fork or a small hand trowel and a knife, rather than a large shovel. Shovels disturb the root system of neighboring ramps and other plants much more than these smaller tools. To dig ramps, loosen the soil with the soil fork or hand trowel and use the knife to cut the ramp roots beneath the bulb.

After you dig a ramp, cover the bare soil with leaves. This will reduce the likelihood of invasive species taking root.

By following these guidelines for harvesting ramps, we can ensure that our children and grandchildren will be able to enjoy ramps for generations to come. Learn how to grow ramps on your property here: https:// www.srs.fs.usda.gov/compass/2017/04/12/growyour-own-ramps-2/.



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Charleston WV (March 2021) – The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www. wvencyclopedia.org.

March 31, 1919: Governor John Jacob Cornwell signed legislation that created the West Virginia State Police. The governor appointed Jackson Arnold, grand-nephew of Gen. Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson and former executive officer of the 1st West Virginia Infantry, as first superintendent.

April 1, 1884: Nurse Florence Aby Blanchfield was born in Shepherdstown. She served in the Army Nurse Corps during World War I, oversaw expansion of the corps from 1,000 to 57,000 during World War II, and became the first woman to hold a permanent commission in the regular army.

April 1, 1934: A sales tax went into effect in West Virginia for the first time. The tax of 2 percent helped fill the revenue void caused by the drop in property values during the Great Depression.

April 2, 1900: Marlinton was incorporated. The town is generally considered to be the location of the first white settlement in the Greenbrier Valley.

April 3, 1755: Frontier scout and "long hunter" Simon Kenton was born in Fauquier County, Virginia. Upon leaving home, Kenton first traveled north through present West Virginia to Pittsburgh and then explored, hunted, and trapped through much of the Ohio Valley.

April 3, 1908: Samuel Starks died in Charleston. Starks became the first African-American in the United States to serve as a state librarian when he was appointed to the position in 1901 by Governor Albert Blakeslee White.

April 4, 1980: Musician Red Sovine died in Nashville. Sovine, born Woodrow Wilson Sovine in Charleston, gained country music fame for his recitations, especially those incorporating sentimental truck driver themes.

April 5, 1856: Booker T. Washington was born a slave in Virginia. In 1865, he moved with his family to Malden to join his step-

father, who had escaped from slavery during the

April 5, 2010: An explosion at the Upper Big Branch Mine in Raleigh County killed 29 workers. Only two men escaped from the mine alive. It was the country's worst coal mining disaster since November 20, 1968, when the Consol No. 9 Mine at Farmington, West Virginia, exploded, killing 78 work-

April 6, 1938: The Civilian Conservation Corps established Camp Kanawha in the Kanawha State Forest. The CCC removed all of the abandoned houses, coal tipples, and other structures no longer in use, and constructed roads, the forest superintendent's residence, office, maintenance building, and picnic shelters.

The proposed increased rates and charges will become effective Friday, April 30, 2021, unless otherwise ordered by the Public Service Commission and will produce approximately \$2,759 annually in additional revenue, an increase of 25%. Water and sewage service will not be restored until all past due sewage bills have been paid in full and all

accrued penalties plus a reconnection charge of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) shall be paid A change in the leak adjustment allowance; this would increase the leak adjustment from \$0.98 per 1,000 gallons to \$1.32 per 1,000 gallons. This adjustment is to be used when a bill reflects unusual consumption, which can be attributed to eligible leakage on customer's side of the meter. This rate shall be applied to all such consumption above the customer's two-year historical average usage of water.

The increases shown are based on averages of all customers in the indicated class. Individual customers may receive increases that are greater or less than average. # Care for Spring Flowering Bulbs

Providing proper care to tulips and other spring flowering bulbs will extend your enjoyment and keep them coming back for years.

Bright yellow daffodils, colorful tulips and fragrant hyacinths brighten our spring gardens. Give them the care they need to extend their spring display and keep them

coming back for years. Hybrid tulips and hyacinths are shortlived stars of the spring garden. They bloom profusely the first spring, but the number of flowers decline each year. You may want to treat these like annuals, carefully removing them from the garden to avoid damaging any remaining plants. Toss these in the compost pile and start planning for their replacements. It is a great opportunity to try something new and freshen the look of your spring garden. If you are looking for a permanent replacement, consider using species tulips that are less floriferous but return each year.

Add a few years to the life of hybrid tulips and daffodils and get the most from all your longlived spring flowering bulbs with proper care. Water spring gardens thoroughly whenever the top few inches of soil are crumbly and just slightly moist. Spring rains often take care of this task, but when they don't it is easy to forget to provide spring gardens with the

water they need. Providing the right amount of water when needed will keep your bulbs looking their best.

Bulbs often receive sufficient nutrients at the time of planting or when the other plants in the garden are fertilized. Apply fertilizer to established bulb plantings, if needed, as the leaves begin to emerge from the soil. Use a low nitrogen, slow-release fertilizer to encourage slow steady growth. Follow the label directions so you apply the recommended amount for the area you are

Remove spent flowers on tulips and hyacinths you plan to keep so the energy is directed back into the bulbs instead of setting seeds. Do the same if you want to improve the appearance of daffodils. Leave allium seed heads in place to extend their beautiful contribution to the garden. Remove these before they drop their seeds if you want to limit the number of seedlings sprouting in next year's garden. The same is true for grape hyacinths and squills. The only reason to remove their faded flowers is to slow down the spread.

Leave the leaves on your bulbs until they naturally yellow and dry. The leaves produce energy needed for beautiful blooms next spring. The longer you leave the leaves intact, the more energy and better bloom for next season.

Hide the declining bulb leaves by planting annuals between the bulbs. Or add perennial flowers that return each year for a more permanent solution. As the bulbs decline, the perennials will grow and mask the declining foliage. Try mixing spring flowering perennials for double the impact or combine with summer and fall bloomers to extend the floral show.

Take some pictures of your spring bulb display and make notes of the areas where you want to add some color. Then order early for the best selection and to make sure you are ready for bulb planting season next fall.
