

Tucker County Solid Waste Authority Happy with Landfill Progression



The Tucker County Solid Waste Authority met to discuss the financials of the Landfill now as compared to this time a year ago.

After having to cancel the February meeting of the Tucker County Solid Waste Authority due to weather, the board came together to discuss the last two months of business that has taken place within the Tucker County Landfill. All members were present and the minutes from January 25 were approved with a motion from Board Member Christopher Lowther and a second from Vice Chairman Dennis Filler.

Carol Helmick, Office Manager of the landfill, went into the board reports showing January's intake was 4,257.06 ton, which is a decrease believed to be due to the weather creating hazardous travel. "This month our tonnage has been doing a lot better," said Helmick. Filler asked if

those entities just held their tonnage with Landfill Director Jody Alderman replying that some chose to take theirs to the transfer station

There were 613,340 gallons of leachate removed in January for a total treatment cost of \$15,333.50. The amount is up slightly due to 7.20 inches of rainfall received during January. Several accounts fell into the over 30 days line in the aged receivables, which Helmick said was largely due to the postal service delays as the payments were properly postmarked, just not received.

Within aged payables, only one account remains which is to Cleveland Brothers Equipment Company, with the total owed down to around \$5,000. "I'm glad we got that done," proclaimed Mark Holstine, acting

Chair of the SWA and Executive Director for the Solid Waste Management Board.

Helmick presented a breakdown of deposits and billing noting the top 10 customers remain fairly the same. A check register was provided for review showing a balance of \$558,025.21, as of January 31, 2021, an increase from the month prior. The P-Card statements were given to the board members followed by an income statement for six months ending December 31, 2020.

Mark Joseph, Certified Public Accountant, brought attention to the balance sheets to compare December 31, 2020, to January 31, 2021. The total current assets were just over \$1 million in December and are now down to \$673,000 in January primarily due to the purchase of a muchneeded dozer. "If you see the

total current liabilities....it's about \$792,254, that number now is at \$436,355," Joseph explained which is due to the accounts payable to pay off Leslie's Equipment.

The ratio between current assets and current liabilities has a goal to remain off at least 1% was sitting at 1.30% at the end of December and up to 1.54% as of January 31, 2021. "That is going in the right direction," confirmed Joseph.

Referring then to the income statement, a tonnage drop resulted in a decrease of income to the landfill, however, the overall revenue for the past seven months compared to that a year ago is up around 12%, which

is about equivalent to the rate increase. The net income for six months ending December 31, 2020, was \$85,859.91 compared to a loss of \$177,000 last year at that time. "We did incur a loss in the month of January," continued Joseph which is primarily due to expenses directed towards equipment repairs. "That was quite an impact to the bottom line," he added. "The summary is that we're moving in the right direction, there are still issues we're going to have, there will be bumps in the road, but a \$210,000 swing year to date from last year to this year is good to see," commented Holstine.

Waybright Found Guilty by Jury

After nearly two hours securing what both parties felt to be a qualified jury of 12, Circuit Court Clerk Sharon Moats swore them in for the trial of Deanna Waybright, being charged with two counts of uttering, which is a felony charge. The Honorable Judge James Courrier offered some pre-trial instructions for the jurors before the Assistant Prosecuting Attorney gave an opening statement.


Bush told the jury what they will find at the conclusion is that on January 22 and again on 23, 2020, the defendant Deanna

report, Holstine began discussing the issues that have been ongoing with the Department of Environmental Protection. "We have come to an agreement with the DEP on the civil and administrative penalty," he began, which started out at approximately \$167,000 in violations. After a meeting and filing a report of explanations along with their current financial status, the final penalty was reduced to \$2,500. "That has been paid," Holstine confirmed. There are still some disagreements relating to inspection frequency that he hopes will be addressed at a later date.

Unfortunately, there are still some violations that need to be addressed at the landfill, which Alderman has already completed a plan of corrective action with a timeline that has been submitted to the DEP. Holstine noted that any violations that are incurred due to leachate are due to the pre-existing condition and until a better solution is discovered for leachate containment and treatment, future violations are inevitable. A copy of the plan will be provided to the board with most timelines set at the end of August 2021.

Alderman took over with an update on equipment purchases that, since the last meeting, only consists of an additional road tractor that was ordered in October. The landfill now has three tankers, one of which is still being altered to meet their needs, but the other two are operational. "We're trying to haul six loads a week between the two trucks, last week we've been hauling eight loads," said Alderman. The new pickup truck is expected to be delivered in Charleston on April 10 and the backup compactor is hoped to be completed by the end of the week as far as repairs and rebuilding.

The application for the Solid Waste

\$25,000 has been compiled with hopes to assist with the landfill's cost of leachate. It was requested that the SWA make a motion to approve the submission of the application, which was done so by Lowther and a second from Board Member Diane

Hinkle with all in favor. The landfill

received \$10,000 from the same grant

last year.

Alderman brought a suggestion to offer a dental and vision plan for the landfill employees through the West Virginia Association of Counties. A diagram of how much each current employee's rate would be per month. The monthly cost for the landfill would be \$568 with an annual cost of \$6,816 if the costs were incurred solely by the employer. Alderman stated, "This isn't only a recruitment tool but also a retention tool, too." Commissioner Fred Davis made a

motion to provide this service to the

full-time employees with a second

from Lowther and all in favor.

It was also requested to purchase a mailing system to offer a simpler way to mail, ship, and track mail and packages. Helmick had a meeting with the company recommended by the Postal Service and felt the SendPro C Lite would meet the needs of the business side of the facility. Alderman explained this would save for the need to continuously purchase stamps and weights for each envelope. Filler asked how much is spent yearly on postage with Alderman replying last year was just over \$600. After discussing the lease options and supplies for the unit, Davis and Hinkle made a motion to purchase the office equipment with unanimous agreement.

The scale house is also in need of a credit card reader to offer that form of payment to their customers. After speaking with Grant County Bank,

options were discovered on fees that would be associated with utilizing the system. To use the system, customers would have to pay a 3.7% plus a ninecent transaction fee. If over \$5,000 is made using that system per month, it doesn't cost the landfill anything, but if less than \$5,000 it will cost \$30 for

that month.

Joseph spoke up stating they would need to research through the PSC on passing these charges on to the customers and if that would be permissible. Alderman stated that where he was formerly employed there were no issues, but everyone agreed to contact the PSC would be the best option. Pending PSC approval, Davis made a motion to approve the credit card option with the customer paying the fees with a second from Board Member James Alford and all were in agreement.

The landfill has been in contact with Atlantic Broadband to bring their services into the landfill, which Holstine felt would open up a lot of benefits and opportunities for the facility. Alderman called around to find out what the reliability of the service is like and he stated it came highly recommended. Hinkle added her only issue with Atlantic Broadband was getting technical support, though a business account would be handled slightly differently. The proposal quoted a monthly recurring fee of \$492.94 and a one-time installation fee of \$5,500 which Filler confirmed from experience the price is cheap compared to other options. Filler and Lowther made the motions to move forward with the project with all in favor.

With no further business to discuss, the meeting was adjourned with the next meeting scheduled for Tuesday, April 13 at 3 p.m. at the Tucker County Courthouse Courtroom.

Temporary Road Closure






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Willard Blaine McVicker

WVDEP still accepting water quality data from state waters

Data must be submitted by Friday, April 30, 2021

CHARLESTON, WV – The West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection (WVDEP) is accepting water quality data collected from the state's waters for the development of a combined 2018/2020/2022 Integrated Report.

The report fulfills the reporting requirements of the federal Clean Water Act, Section 303(d) to provide a list of impaired waters and Section 305(b) to provide an overall assessment of West Virginia's waters to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The term "waters" refers to lakes, wetlands, and streams.

WVDEP staff will evaluate any existing and readily available data collected from July 1, 2012 to December 31, 2020 that is submitted by Friday April 30, 2021. Any data submitted previously for the development of the Integrated Report will automatically be considered and does not need to be resubmitted.

During the development of the report, the Section 303(d) list of impaired waters will be available for public review and comment.

After deliberating for an hour and 20 minutes, the jury could not reach an agreement on a verdict. Judge Courrier asked them to return into deliberation and further discuss with attempts to come to a unanimous agreement.

ment to the jury as well. She began by defining memory and how it works, stating that the case is based solely on the memory of one person on an incident that took place approximately two weeks after the incident, and it was not based on any physical evidence such as fingerprints. Bright continued that an individual went into Jim's All-Star on January 22 and January 23 and presented a \$120 check and \$80 from the same bank account and was not deemed as suspicious. It wasn't until two weeks later that a report was filed with Magistrate Court. She said Jim Propst identified her client within those two weeks, stating, "So then it becomes a question of memory and the recollection of what happened."

Bright added that the jury would hear testimony from other individuals stating that Waybright was not in the area at the time of the incidents. She suggested that at the end of the trial and all evidence is presented, that Waybright be found not guilty, "Because memory is simply not reliable enough to convict her of these two

The first witness called by the State was James Propst, brought in by Tucker County Sheriff's Office Chief Deputy M.J. Sigley. He took the stand and was sworn in by Circuit Court Clerk Sharon Moats. Propst has been managing Jim's All-Star for 40 years, including the dates in question. Bush and Propst confirmed the location of the store and asked Propst if he had an encounter with Waybright on the dates in question, to which Propst confirmed he did. Bush asked Propst to identify Waybright, which he did by pointing, and he stated he has known her since before the incidents along with her family and estimates seeing her

Propst stated that on January 22, "She (Waybright) came in with one of the Boyle's," parking at the gas pumps, came in to purchase cigarettes, pop, groceries, and gas, and Waybright then handed him a check. Bush referred to evidence labeled State Exhibit 1, and asked Propst to identify the documents which he recognized as the check that the store received back from the bank. He was asked by Bush to read the signature line, to which Propst responded, "T something." Attached to the check was a letter from the bank stating that the account was invalid.

It was noted that the amount the check was made out for was more than that of the bill, and change was given. Bush asked Propst to read the establishment name and the other information on the check, which included a driver's license and phone number. He stated that all of the information, including the signature, was filled before Waybright entering the store, and confirmed he did not witness her filling out any portion of the check. "Are you sure that it was Deanna (Waybright) that presented the check to you?" asked Bush. "Yes, it was," he responded.

States Exhibit 2 evidence was the second check, dated for January 23 in the amount of \$80, along with the note from the bank. The information on the second check matched that of the first. Bush asked if Propst recollected the second check being presented, which he stated he did, and that the amount the check was made out for warranted the return of change. Once the checks were returned as insufficient, Propst went to the Tucker County Magistrate, which he claims is his standard practice, to begin the report.

The Defense took the opportunity to cross-examine Propst, and began by stating the report was filed against Kisner's Pit Stop and asked how the accusations trickled down to her client. Propst couldn't recall if he used Waybright's name on the report, then Bright handed him a copy that did not list any individual names. Bright

asked if Propst gave a statement to the police, and he could not recall. Bright asked how Propst could recall that Waybright gave him the check, but couldn't remember giving a statement to law enforcement.

Bright then turned her attention to the individual that was allegedly accompanying Waybright in the convenience store on those dates. Propst said he knew it was "one of the Boyle's," but he didn't know which one. He admitted that the check raised concern for him as he was under the impression Waybright was unemployed. Bright asked if the report was in Propst's handwriting, which he denied and thought the Prosecuting Attorney's Office filled out the report for him, but confirmed it was his

"Was it possible that Mr. Boyles gave you the check?" Bright asked. "No," Propst quickly responded. When Bright asked why, he responded, "Because I've never seen a Boyles have a check," adding they always pay in cash, "That would have caught my attention." Propst said he knew the incident was suspicious but claimed he couldn't do anything at the time.

Bright asked if the business had video surveillance, which Propst confirmed they do, however, the recording is on a seven-day loop and after the seventh day, the data is overwritten and recorded over. According to Propst, the recording had been obsolete before he was made aware of the checks being rejected. Bright asked if Propst recalled a subpoena being issued to retrieve the recording, which he said he

Moving forward, Bright asked if Propst had any health conditions. He said he suffered from a hernia, stomach, and liver issues. Bright asked if he frequently consumes alcohol, to which he responded, "No I do not," and added he hasn't in nine to 10 years.

When asked how many customers come through Jim's All-Star on a typical day, even though an official count has not been done, Propst said they average 175 debit card transactions per day before adding payments received by other forms of payment. He admitted he does not remember every customer but does remember Waybright coming in because it was after 6 p.m. when he is the only staff member on duty, and they were the only ones in the store. He said he reviewed the check which was filled out properly, but knew she wasn't Trina Kisner, though couldn't do anything about it at the time. Bright asked if he asks all customers to give a phone number or driver's license number when paying by check. "No, it's a small town, I know where to find them," he responded.

Bush noted a typographical error on the report that was listed as February 7, 2019, which should have read 2020, about 15 to 16 days after the checks were written. Referring to the second question on the report, Bush asked Propst who handed you the checks. "She did," he replied. After discussing how Propst knew the defendant and Boyle's, Bush asked, "Are you mistaking who gave you the checks on January 22 and 23?" "No, I am not," said Propst.

Bright referred again to Propst's psoriasis of the liver and asked if he ever experiences drowsiness, confusion, or memory loss. Propst admitted he gets tired, but it's because he works seven days a week. With no further questions from the State or Defense, Propst was excused from the

The State then called Sherry Bonner, Assistant Branch Manager of the Grant County Bank in Harman for 21 years. She explained that GCB bought out Stockman's Bank, the financial institution on the checks in question, in 2000. She said that any accounts through Stockman's

were giving six months to transition their accounts to GCB or another bank of their choice before those accounts were closed. Bonner was handed both of the State Exhibits and she explained the documents. She said no records were kept from Stockman's and she doesn't even recall Kisner's being in operation when she began working at GCB. She was unsure which bank the checks were sent to considering Stockman's is no longer in service, therefore she assumed they were sent to and returned by the Federal reserve since the routing number was associated with a non-existent

Bright asked Bonner if any forensics were completed on the checks to collect fingerprints. Bonner wasn't aware of any and also confirmed she does not know the defendant.

Trina Kisner, former co-owner of Kisner's Pit Stop in Harman, took the witness stand and informed the Court that she and her late husband opened the store in 1994 and it was shut down between the end of 1999 and the beginning of 2000. She confirmed they had an account with Stockman's Bank for the business, but closed it when they closed the store over 20 years

Kisner was given a copy of the checks used at Jim's All-Star and was asked if she recognized it. She stated the business and bank information were the same, but the size of the check was incorrect. "Is that your signature?" asked Bush. "No, not even close, no sir," she responded. Bush asked what happened to the checkbook from the Pit Stop once the store closed. Kisner said that all documents were destroyed after they were retained for the required amount of time, but she was unsure if that included the checks. She assured that she did not give out any checks nor did she make out a check to Jim's All-Star. "No, I don't even know what that is," she said. She was asked if she knew the defendant, which she denied, adding she didn't even recognize the name and even if she did, would not have given her a check or anyone else.

When the defense took the floor, Kisner told Bright she knew Kisners Pit Stop checks were circulating around Randolph County and as soon as she found out, she reported it to the W.Va. State Police. One individual was caught and is in the court process for the charge, and she knew of over a dozen other individuals who were supposedly indicted in another county for using the checks as well. With no further questions, she was excused.

The State rested with no further witnesses and a recess was taken for lunch.

Shortly after 1 p.m., the Defense called its only witness, Norma Louise Pritt from Montrose, the mother of Waybright. When questioned, Pritt recalled she was home on January 23, 2020, with her daughter, the defendant, and her granddaughter. She claimed that the three cleaned the house and moved furniture that day. Pritt said Waybright arrived at her house late the night of January 22 and did not leave until late on the night of January 23. She said she recalls the dates because while moving furniture, a beloved vase was accidentally broken.

Bush asked Pritt if she was employed during the timeframe in question, which she stated

She was not. He asked how she recollected the specific time Waybright left her home the evening of the 23. She responded that she remembered asking her to stay the night with her since it was so late, but she didn't, she assumed she and her granddaughter went home. Pritt was then excused from the stand.

No other witnesses were called and none

were needed for recall. Judge Courrier, Bush, Bright, and Waybright retreated into the Judge's Quarters for a brief discussion away from the jury. Upon return, Judge Courrier gave the jury their instructions before releasing them for deliberation. He reiterated they must come to a verdict beyond a reasonable doubt. "If any reasonable doubt, you should find Ms. Waybright not guilty," he said.

Bush took the floor for his closing argument, referring back to Propst's testimony and recapping

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the alleged incident. He brought back Bonner's statements about the closing of Stockman's Bank and Kisner stating she did not sign the check nor issued any to the defendant. "That there is beyond a reasonable doubt," Bush assured. As for the defense's argument of relying on memory, Bush stated it was only about two weeks from the time of the incident until the report and that Propst was able to properly identify Waybright because he knew her. He stated again that Waybright is not accused of forging, just passing the forged checks. "How could she not know?" he concluded.

Bright's opportunity to leave a last impression on behalf of her client followed, saying there was no dispute that the checks were faulty, but what is to be disputed was who actually gave the check to Propst and it was merely assumed Waybright knew they were forged, not fact. She suggested that the State did not prove probable cause, that the only argument they (Bush) had was the testimony of Propst who couldn't recall a lot of information. "There is no fingerprints, no video surveillance, it is solely on the memory of Propst," Bright added.

She referred to Pritt's testimony stating that Waybright was with her all day. "It is up to you to decide who you believe, whose testimony is more reliable," Bright stated. "Ladies and Gentlemen, the State has not proved its case beyond a reasonable doubt," she added, and asked that they find Waybright not guilty.

As per law, Bush being the prosecutor in the case had the opportunity to make a final remark. "We're relying more than on Mr. Propst's memory, we're relying on his written statement, made about two weeks later," he said. He read a portion of the written report, which read, "They (Waybright and Boyles) did this twice, a couple days apart." Referring back to the testimony of Pritt, Bush said, "If anyone is biased, it's going to be the defendant's mother." "Deanna Waybright has no connection to Kisner's, no reason, no evidence that Ms. Kisner gave a check to Waybright," he concluded.

The sixth and final stage of trial had come, the jury deliberation. They entered into sequestered conversation at 2:05 p.m. before informing the bailiff, Chief Deputy M.J. Sigley, they had reached a verdict at 3:25 p.m. Those in attendance entered back into the courtroom and Judge Courrier announced that the jury was unable to agree upon a verdict. He again asked that the courtroom be vacated to allow more time for the jury to discuss in the instance someone may change their mind.

Returning again at 3:55 p.m., Judge Courrier announced that the jury has reached a verdict. "On count one, we the jury unanimously find the defendant guilty of uttering, and on count two, we find the defendant guilty," the Judge read. He confirmed that the verdict he was read as correct, which it was. The jury was then excused from their duties.

Bush recommended the defendant be taken into custody by the TCSO and recommended a pre-sentencing investigation. Bright objected as her client is out on bond and asked that she remain as such. Judge Courrier ruled that Waybright can stay out on bond since the convictions were nonviolent until they return on May 19 at 11:15 a.m. for sentencing. The potential sentence for the felonies is one to ten years

Bright motioned for acquittal of the case once more and made references to support her motion. Judge Courrier stated he would take that into consideration for the next hearing.



April 7, 1927: A. James Manchin was born in Farmington. In 1984, Manchin ran for state treasurer, but he fell into trouble once elected. With a stock market downturn in 1987, Manchin bore much of the blame when the state lost nearly \$300 million in investments.

April 7, 1947: Medal of Honor recipient Thomas W. Bennett was born in Morgantown. Believing it was wrong to evade the draft while others had to serve in Vietnam, he volunteered as a noncombatant medic. He was killed by gunfire while trying to drag a wounded soldier to safety.

April 7, 2004: Bob Wise signed legislation that transformed four colleges into universities. They were West Virginia State University, Shepherd University, Fairmont State University and Concord University.

April 8, 1891: The town of Paw Paw was incorporated. Strategically located on the Potomac River, the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad and the C&O Canal, Paw Paw was named for the banana-like pawpaw fruit that grows in the area.

April 8, 1951: An Air National Guard transport plane crashed near Kanawha (now Yeager)

Airport, killing 21.

April 9, 1900: Physician Margaret Byrnside "Dr. Maggie" Ballard was born. She actively pursued her interest in genealogy and local history and was one of the founders of the Monroe County Historical Society.

April 10, 1848: John Kenna was born in Kanawha County. In 1883, the state legislature elected him to the U.S. Senate, unseating the powerful Henry Gassaway Davis. Kenna is one of two West Virginians memorialized by a statue in the U.S. Cap-

April 10, 1932: Entertainer Blaze Starr was born as Fanny Belle Fleming in Wayne County. The owner of a burlesque club rechristened her "Blaze Starr." She became known as "Queen of the Strippers."

April 11, 1821: Congressman Jacob Beeson Blair was born in Parkersburg. Blair was the first West Virginian to be told by President Abraham Lincoln of Lincoln's support of the admission of West Virginia into the United

April 11, 1909: Writer Hubert Skidmore born at Laurel Mountain in Webster County. In his novels, Skidmore depicted stoic endurance by mountain people in the face of misfortune and economic exploitation by outside interests.

April 12, 1865: The 36th Virginia Infantry, known as the Logan Wildcats, disbanded. The Confederate company was created at Logan Courthouse on June 3, 1861, and consisted of about 85 men. The company saw its first action in the Battle of Scary Creek in Putnam County.

April 12, 1885: Photographer George James Kossuth was born. After he opened his Wheeling studio in 1909, he achieved broad fame for his insightful portraits of many of the world's celebrities, including Richard Strauss, Jascha Heifetz, Leopold Stokowski, Clarence Darrow and Richard Nixon.

April 13, 1923: Medal of Honor recipient Jonah Edward Kelley was born at Rada in Mineral County. Sergeant Kelley died while leading his squad in repeated attacks on a German position during World

April 13, 1873: Lawyer, diplomat, and presidential candidate John William Davis was born in Clarksburg. Davis argued 141 cases before the U.S. Supreme Court. His last case was one of the most controversial, when argued in 1952 for the continuation of racial segregation in South Carolina.



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

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

The NRC (Nuclear Regulatory Commission) regulates the safety of nuclear materials, and performs inspections every three years. NRC inspects multiple areas that include; training of personnel, radiation protection, radiation dose records, and security of nuclear materials.

Nuclear Medicine is a specialty branch of Radiology imaging that uses radiopharmaceuticals to assess

organ function and to help diagnose and treat diseases. Radioisotopes are either injected, inhaled or ingested by patients for these imaging proce-

Nuclear Medicine Technologists need to be board certified and required to complete continuing education requirements every 2 years. In addition, the technologist at Davis Medical Center go through an annual DOT (department of transportation) and Radiation Safety Training Program that is conducted by our NPC (National Physics Consulting) group

that comes for quarterly reviews.

Davis Medical Center does a wide range of exams that include; Nuclear Stress Testing, Hepatobiliary Imaging, Gastric Emptying Studies, Bone Scans, Thyroid & Parathyroid Imaging, Liver Imaging, Tumor Imaging, MUGA Scans, and Renal Scans. Most generally these procedures are covered by insurances, however, depending on the type of insurance.



WVDOH: Nearly \$1 million in pothole patching already completed this spring

CHARLESTON. WV West Virginia Division of Highways road crews have spent 18,185 hours, \$988,214 dollars, and used 3,769 tons of asphalt patching potholes in the Mountain State since asphalt plants began to reopen at the end of February.

This year, as each asphalt plant opens around the state, crews are ready and waiting to fill trucks and mill and fill (rather than "throw and go") the potholes.

Of the state's ten highway districts, seven have asphalt plants open already. Crews must rely on the availability of asphalt within approximately an hours' drive in order to patch. Districts with no asphalt plants currently open are continuing to move forward with other parts of their core maintenance plans.

Attorney General Morrisey Warns Consumers of Increase in Social Security Scam Calls

CHARLESTON — West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey urged consumers to be cautious and protect their personal information following a recent increase in Social Security scam activity.

This prevalent scam involves unsolicited calls from someone who claims to be with the Social Security Administration. The impostor tells the consumer their account has been frozen or compromised and will sometimes threaten arrest.

The Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division reports the Social Security scam is particularly active across West Virginia at present. Numerous West Virginia consumers report having recently given out their Social Security numbers. Multiple others have reported losses of \$3,000 or more.

Some consumers have reported that

last four digits of their Social Security number, so they believed it truly was a legitimate call.

"People who fall prey to this scam often do so because they are scared to lose their Social Security benefits, but that's a threat scammers use to trick consumers into handing over personal, identifiable information," Attorney General Morrisey said. "Don't give into intimidation tactics and never give out your Social Security number."

Impostors may also ask consumers to verify personal information, including their Social Security number, to replace a Social Security card, fix an issue with their online account, process a cost-of-living adjustment or rectify benefits that have been underpaid and need adjustment.

Consumers should always verify the impostors already had some of any information by calling the Social

their personal information, such as the Security Administration's legitimate telephone number and never make payments using wire transfer, gift cards or cash. Most government agencies and reputable companies will not seek personal information via an unsolicited phone call or email.

West Virginia Legislature Passes Term **Limits on Congress Resolution**

Charleston, WV -- Today, the West Virginia Senate passed HCR9, a resolution applying for a national convention to propose term limits on Congress. Since the state house passed the same measure last week, West Virginia becomes the fourth state to pass the term limits only application following the lead of Florida, Alabama and Missouri.

The application is officially heading to Congress to be counted towards the 34 state applications required to call a term limits convention. The effort was sponsored by West Virginia state Senator Randy Smith and house Delegate Jeff Pack. This success is part of a national, nonpartisan movement led by U.S. Term Limits to fight careerism in

Washington, D.C. Senator Randy Smith commented on the victory, "I'm glad to see West Virginia moved one step closer to reeling in career politicians and a runaway Congress by passing HCR9 this morning and sending a message to D.C. that a majority of the citizens in this state are fed up with their deaf ear to we the people."

"After two years of partial success, the West Virginia Legislature has finally passed our US Term Limits Resolution. HCR9 is in response to the majority of West Virginians who have demanded their legislature take action to rein in the federal government," said Del. Pack. "We are now one state

closer to limiting the number of terms members of Congress may serve. This is a necessary first step in controlling the runaway federal government. I thank all of the members who cosponsored this amendment and all of those who voted for it," Pack concludes.

Article V of the U.S. Constitution provides state legislators with the power to impose term limits on Congress without congressional approval. For the term limits amendment convention to be called, 34 states must pass similar resolutions. Once a term limits amendment is proposed, 38 states must ratify it for it to be added to the U.S. Constitution. This process allows the states to completely bypass Congress.

The President of U.S. Term Limits, Philip Blumel said "Eighty percent of Americans support term limits on Congress, including huge majorities of Democrats, Republicans and Independents. This is a rare, truly nonpartisan issue with national appeal." HCR9 was supported by both Democrats and Republicans and passed easily through both chambers of the West Virginia Senate.

"Senator Smith and House Delegate Pack have been an integral part of the process in West Virginia. Their efforts helped make West Virginia the fourth state in the nation to call for a convention for the exclusive purpose of proposing term limits on Congress,' Blumel added. "Other battleground states are well on their way to passing this important election reform. The progress here today has laid the groundwork for future successes."

After weeks of seeing almost daily increases, the national gas price average is showing signs of stability, holding steady

at \$2.88 for the last 5 days. Today's average is the highest price since May 2019 and is more expensive on the week (+2 cents), month (+25 cents) and year (+74 cents).

A decrease in demand and a simultaneous increase in supply and refinery utilization has contributed to slower movement in gas price increases. In its latest weekly reports, the Energy Information Administration (EIA) shows demand decreased from 8.7 million b/d to 8.4 million b/d, and gasoline supply increased from 231.6 million barrels to 232 million barrels.

Also, crude oil prices have decreased. At the close of Friday's formal trading session, West Texas Intermediate settled at \$61.41. Prices declined on the week largely due to market concern that demand may stumble as some countries restart coronavirus restrictions to curb growing infection rates.

In the week ahead, motorists can expect fluctuation at the pump. However, with crude prices moving lower, large increases at the pump are not likely.

Post Winter Care for Your Lawn

As winter gives way to spring take a walk around the yard. Check the lawn for damage and provide a bit of early season care to help it recover from winter.

Use a leaf rake to lightly lift and separate the matted grass blades. This helps speed drying, increase airflow, and reduce the risk of pink and gray snow mold developing and damaging your lawn.

These fungal diseases are most common when heavy snowfalls or ice covers non-frozen turf or after late winter snowstorms. The damage is usually seen where snow lingers late in the season.

Symptoms appear as circular areas of matted brown grass. You may even see a gray or pink cobweb-like growth over these areas. Fortunately, lawns eventually recover. Reduce the risk of future problems with proper timing of lawn fertilization.

Remove any leaves or debris that ended up on the lawn. Large leaves on the grass capture moisture and prevent sunlight from reaching the plants below. Use leaves you collect as mulch in the garden or add to the compost pile.

Look for vole trails in the lawn. These small rodents travel beneath the snow and over the grass in search of food all winter long. Their travels create trails of bare or dead grass. The surrounding grass will eventually fill in the damaged areas. Speed recovery by sprinkling grass seed over the trails. Just mix a handful of grass seed in a mop bucket of topsoil to make a lawn patch. Sprinkle the mixture in the trails, gently tamp and water.

Check areas along walks, drives and the street for deicing salt damage. Even if you don't apply deicing salts, passing cars can spray it onto your lawn. Your car also brings home salt as it travels along salted roadways, depositing salty snow onto the drive.

Make sure these areas receive sufficient water this spring. Regular spring showers often do the job. Thoroughly water these areas during dry springtime weather to help wash the salt past the grass roots into the soil below. Consider shoveling first and using plant-friendly deicing salts in the future. This will reduce the need for deicing salts and reduce the time and money spent repairing salt-damaged plants.

Use this time to sharpen your mower blades. Using sharp blades to cut the grass results in a healthier and better-looking lawn. The clean cut made by a sharp blade closes quickly, reducing the risk of disease problems. Sharp blades also save time as you can cut the grass more efficiently. And speaking of savings, your mower will consume 22% less fuel and the lawn will use up to 30% less water when using sharp blades.

Soon it will be time to mow the lawn. Mow high and often, leaving grass clippings on the lawn to add organic matter, moisture, and nutrients to the soil. Always sweep clippings off walks and the drive to keep this valuable organic matter out of waterways

Take care of winter damage now before the even busier garden season begins. Investing time now helps improve your lawn's health and beauty, allowing you more time to enjoy the summer.

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


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
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Celebrating 70 Years
