# Waybrights have transformed home into quiet oasis in the heart of the mountains

Jenningston - Tucker County resident Katherine Pratt Salovaara (PK) cared for her Jenningston home until she no longer could. But the home that once sat in the middle of a booming logging town wasn't left to fall into disrepair; it has taken on new life as the Laurel River Club B&B.

Marsha and Kendall Waybright

saw something special in the historic three-story farmhouse. "This is the last house standing from the original town of Jenningston. We felt it needed the proper care so the history of Jenningston would never be forgotten and the Salovaara family, who own the property, felt the same way," Marsha said. Even though Katherine "did not know of our plans to open a B&B," she no doubt would have approved.

The Waybrights, as property managers for the

Salovaara family, felt they could transform the house into a comfortable B&B. With a little elbow grease and a lot of determination, they knew their dream could come true. The B&B has been up and running since Memorial Day 2020, having been booked throughout the COVID pandemic. Marsha said the B&B "stays very busy so it is good to book your reservation early."

The B&B offers four spacious bedrooms for overnight guests,

each decorated with period pieces that add to the country charm. Guests are treated to special meals using foods grown on the farm, which the Waybrights want to promote as working educational farm complete with chickens, turkeys, pigs and cattle.



# Commission Discusses Voting Precinct Changes; Hears How ARP Money Is Being Spent

The Tucker County Commission meeting began with a presentation by Aimee Verdisco of the Canaan Valley Volunteer Fire Department. Verdisco, on behalf of all fire departments and Emergency Medical Services in Tucker County, is applying for a grant from FEMA that would give Tucker County a set of new radios. According to the federal government, said Verdisco, the radios that Tucker County currently employs are well past their shelf life by several years. "They're the Star Wars type," Fire Chief Bob Metzger added. The commissioners voted to support Verdisco's "firefighter assistance" application, and signaled its willingness to supply the five percent match required by the grant. As Verdisco explained, for \$64,000 dollars of taxpayer money, the grant would provide a value of over one million dollars to the county. "She's got a PhD in economics and no you can't have her," said

Metzger. Next, Metzger gave a report on how the Canaan Valley Public Service District is using the \$314,500 thousand dollars worth of American Rescue Plan money that the county commission awarded it in September. Metzger reported that they've been using the money to perform water infrastructure maintenance that had been ignored by the previous stewards, Timberline Four

# Waybright, Nestor, Watson Appear in Court

Recently, Melissa Waybright appeared before the Honorable Judge Courrier for sentencing. Waybright was sentenced to the following: on each of the five counts of the felony offense of "Child Abuse Resulting in Bodily Injury," Waybright was sentenced to not less than one nor more than five years in a state correctional facility and a fine of \$100. On the one count of the felony offense of "Child Abuse with Resulting in Serious Bodily Injury," Waybright was sentenced to not less than two nor more than 10 years in a state correctional facility and a fine of \$1,000. On each of the two counts of the felony offense of "Child Abuse with Risk of Serious Bodily Injury," Waybright was sentenced to not less than one nor more than five years in a state correctional facility. For one count of the felony offense of "Child Neglect Creating Risk of Serious Bodily Injury," Waybright was sentenced to not less than one nor more than five years in a state correctional facility. The Court granted the State's request to run each count consecutively to one

another, for a total sentence of not less than 10 nor more than 50 years incarceration and a fine of \$1,500. Additionally, the Court ordered that she not have contact with the minor victims and that she not reside with anyone under the age of 18 upon her release. Waybright will also be required to register with the child abuse registry for a period of 10 years following her release from incarceration.

Pamela Lynn Nestor appeared before the Honorable Lynn Nelson and entered a plea of guilty to one count of the felony offense of embezzlement. Nestor was sentenced to not less than one nor more than 10 years in a state correctional facility, however that prison sentence was suspended, and Nestor was placed on probation for a period of five years with the condition that she pay restitution to Jim's Allstar.

Jeremy Clinton Watson appeared before the Honorable Lynn Nelson and entered a plea of guilty to the felony offense of "Felon in Possession of a Firearm." Mr. Watson was sentenced to four years in a state correctional facility for this offense.

# **Judge Nelson Continues Four Out of** Five Cases In Court; Judge Courrier Grants an Extension and Jail Release

The Honorable Judge Nelson recently presided over five cases. Joseph Dice accepted a plea deal on a felony forgery charge. He will be on two years probation with Probation Officer, Butch Dibacco.

Judge Nelson set the trial date for Travis Cooper. Prosecutor, Savannah Wilkins, informed the court they do plan to proceed with the trial. At this time they are having testing done on the firearm. Cooper will appear before Judge Nelson on December 21, 22, and 23, 2021 for his trial.

Peter Babala, Jr. will be back before Judge Nelson on January 18, 2022. Brent Easton, Babala's attorney, informed the judge that

they are not at a point to move forward with this trial. Babala has other charges in Maryland and Easton wants to determine if the charges in Maryland qualify in West Virginia. Wilkins sent a request for additional information. She has also sent a plea offer, which the defendant and attorney have not had time to look over yet.

Haley Jones was only in the defendant's chair for a few minutes. Wilkins said more time was needed. Jones will be back in court on December 14, 2021.

Jeremy Watson appeared with his attorney, Bright. Watson has been incarcerated since 2017. Bright asked the court to waive fees for his ankle monitor as he does not have the funds to cover it. Wilkins received a report back that Watson has no cause of diminished capacity and extended a new plea offer to Watson. Wilkins left it up to Judge Nelson, as Watson would reside in Preston County if he is released. Judge Nelson informed Watson's attorney to contact Preston County and if they waive the fees he sees no problem with it. Watson has a trial date set for December 14, 2021.

Judge Courrier presided over the following cases.

- · Heather Nicole Watson, Parsons, was charged with one count Driving Revoked for DUI 2<sup>nd</sup> Offense. According to the complaint, on Friday, Dec. 10 at approximately 12:13 p.m. Sheriff J.E. Kopec was pulling out onto US219 on Water St. when he observed the accused, Heather Nicole Watson, traveling north on US219 in a red Subaru. From previous traffic stops he remembered that she was a suspended and revoked for DUI driver. He followed her for a short ways and she pulled into her sister's driveway on Quality Hill. While calling 911 to check the status of her operator's license, he asked her if she had gotten her license valid yet in which she responded "no." A record check through 911 indicated active DUI conviction from 11-30-17 and a driving revoked for DUI conviction of the same date. 

Charleston WV – The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

Dec. 22, 1928: Radio station WMMN of Fairmont began operations as one of West Virginia's pioneer stations. For nearly two decades beginning in 1935, WMMN was an important outlet for country and western music performers. The highlight of this era was the "Sagebrush Roundup," a Saturday-night live-audience show which began in December 1938 and was broadcast weekly for nearly ten years.



Dec. 23, 1987: Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme escaped from the Federal Prison Camp in Alderson. Fromme, who was serving a life sentence for trying to kill President Gerald Ford, was captured two days later near the prison.

Dec. 24, 1852: The last spike was driven on the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad between Baltimore and the Ohio River. The event occurred at Rosbys Rock near Moundsville. To mark the spot where the final spike was driven the following words were carved upon the rock: Rosbbys [sic] Rock Track Closed Christmas Eve 1852.

Dec. 24, 1942: The Committee on Fair Employment Practices ordered that Jehovah's Witnesses be reinstated to their jobs at Pittsburgh Plate Glass in Clarksburg. The workers had been fired for refusing to participate in union-sponsored flag-salute ceremonies at the plant.

once they were up and running, they chartered a railroad from Pocahontas to Randolph County. As buildings and employee homes were being built, so was the house that would become Laurel River Club B&B. It was built in the main town square for company superintendent Bishop Worth and his wife Ella Castle Jennings.

Even though they were highly prosperous for a time, tragedy struck in 1906 when B.W. Jennings died unexpectedly. His son, William Worth Jennings, took over his part of the business.

B. W.'s brother C. H. had a hard time coming to terms with the fact that his brother had died. On July 1, 1909, C. H. sold all of the property to the newly formed Laurel River Lumber Company for \$1,400,000. This included 18 miles of railroad, 400 million feet of uncut timber, the mill, store, hotel, all houses, and animals. The purchasing company was owned by E.W. Mealy of Hagerstown and J.A.G. and E.M. Allen of Darlington, Maryland. C. H. and his wife, Mary Bowman, had moved to Townada, Pa. three years earlier to live on a 1,000 acre property near Towanda

Due to severe flooding, fires and the depletion of all trees in the area because of the logging industry, life in Jenningston slowly came to a standstill. Even the railroad left, with no industry to sustain the once thriving community. The official end of the Laurel River Lumber Company took place on January 18, 1923.

The Waybrights have preserved this history in the B&B by show-casing mementoes such as company script and many photos of the area in its heyday as a logging town. Even though the black and white photos tell the history quite well, Marsha is only too happy to share her knowledge of the area also, making one feel as if the town's residents would at any minute walk straight out of 1906 and into her parlor for a cup of tea to share the day's news with visitors.

The Salovaara family still owns the 220-acre farm surrounding the B&B. Kendall's family farm adjoins the B&B property and Marsha grew up 15 minutes away in Middle Mountain.

The quiet little town Katherine Pratt Salovaara settled in decades ago has not lost its charm. Along with her children and husband J.J., she came from Chicago to become caretaker of a rich history that many had forgotten. The Waybright's have taken up

that history and hospitably opened the doors of Katherine's former home to let visitors experience the peace and tranquility of the Laurel River Club B&B.

# A guide to cooking with kids

Children may start their culinary careers crafting mud pies in their backyards, but that creativity and imagination soon may translate into foods they can eat. Many kids love cooking because it can be fun and messy, which are two qualities that children find hard to resist.

Parents can foster their children's love of cooking and help them along the way with these tips.

Be patient. Going into the cooking experience knowing there will be a mess, typically when young children are involved, can help you prepare. Toddlers have not yet mastered manual dexterity, so they're bound to spill and drop. Put a plastic tablecloth under the work area and on the floor to help catch what falls. Also, cooking with youngsters likely will take more time than it normally would, so set aside extra preparation and cooking time.

· Teach kids good hygiene. Hygiene is important and can prevent foodborne illnesses. Make sure everyone in-

volved in cooking, including children, washes his or her hands before cooking begins and continues to do so after handling foods, particularly raw meat and poultry. Hair should be tied back, and separate prep surfaces should be designated for produce and meats.

Assign age-appropriate tasks. Consider age and maturity levels when assigning tasks in the kitchen. Even children as young as 3-years-old can chop food if they are provided a serrated butter knife with a rounded point and soft vegetables or fruits. This helps teach knife skills that kids can develop more thoroughly in the future. Children can

mix and add ingredients as well. As kids get older, parents can decide the right time to let them use the stove.

Experiment with dough. Kids can have a blast with dough, particularly rolling out pie crusts and pasta. They also can make dumplings and then fill them with vegetables. Many cookware retailers sell small rolling pins that are easy for kids to manage.

· Practice measuring together. Let children read the recipes and be in charge of portioning out ingredients. This reinforces classroom lessons about temperature, ratios and fractions.

Move on to more sophisticated tasks. Around age eight or

nine, children can take on jobs like opening cans, scooping batter, pounding poultry, proofing yeast, skewering kabobs, and slicing bread, according to cooking educator Julie Negrin. Negrin notes that children between the ages of 10 and 12 can start working independently in the kitchen so long as an adult is in the home.

Children also can be involved in cooking by helping to draft shopping lists and taking trips to the supermarket. This shows kids the complete process of gathering ingredients for meals, what they cost and how they are made before foods make it to the dinner table.

# Monongahela National Forest Closing Dolly Sods Roads for Public Safety January 1

**PETERSBURG, W.Va.,**— Monongahela National Forest officials will implement the annual winter road closures in the Dolly Sods area by closing the gates on Forest Roads 19 and 75 on Jan. 1. These roads are closed to motor vehicle use from January to early or mid-April every year to provide for public safety due to variable road conditions in the winter months. Non-motorized use of the roads is allowed.




Both roads are usually open again by mid-April. "We will monitor road conditions in March and April, and reopen the roads as soon as weather permits," Morgan said.



# Minority Students Encouraged to Apply for Dominion Energy Educational Equity Scholarship

RICHMOND, Va. — Through its Educational Equity Scholarship Program, Dominion Energy is awarding \$500,000 in scholarships to 60 students in 2022. In its second year of the six-year \$10 million initiative, the program assists with undergraduate higher education expenses for underrepresented minority students who reside in the company's service area.

"We recognize the importance of education as an equalizer in society," said Robert M. Blue, Dominion Energy's president and chief executive officer. "This program helps reduce the financial hurdle many underrepresented students face, which allows scholarship recipients greater access to post-secondary education and additional opportunities to propel their futures."

The scholarship application period is open Nov. 30, 2021, through Jan. 25, 2022, 4 p.m. Eastern Standard Time.

To be eligible, students must:

- self-identify as Black or African American; Hispanic or Latino; American Indian or Alaska Native; Asian; or Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander with higher education expenses,
- be high school seniors or graduates, or current college undergraduates residing in Connecticut, Ohio, West Virginia, Virginia, Maryland, North Carolina, South Carolina, Idaho, Wyoming or Utah, with plans to enroll full time at an accredited two- or four-year college, university or vocationaltechnical school for the entire

upcoming academic year; and

• have a minimum grade point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale (or its equivalent).

In all, 60 scholarships totaling \$500,000 will be awarded in 2022. Of those, 20 scholarships of \$5,000 each will be made available for students enrolled in two-year schools, while 40 scholarships of \$10,000 each will be awarded to students enrolled in four-year schools. Scholarship recipients will be able to renew scholarships as they progress in school, provided they meet certain criteria, such as GPA requirements and residence in an eligible state.

The program is administered by Scholarship America, a nonprofit specializing in managing scholarship and tuition assistance programs. Scholarship America will support Dominion Energy in the selection of finalists.



CHARLESTON — Attorney General Patrick Morrisey encouraged West Virginians to give to charity this holiday season but to exercise caution before making any donations.

"As we get closer to the holidays, a lot of people tend to give to charitable causes," Attorney General Morrisey said. "We want people to continue to do that, but it's also important that they take steps to make sure they're not getting ripped off by those who would prey upon the goodwill of others. Donate with your heart, but don't forget to use your head."

Anyone with questions about the legitimacy of a charity or organization can review the Secretary of State's website to see if the charity is registered to solicit donations in West Virginia. Consumers may also research the charity on websites such as CharityNavigator.org or GuideStar.org.

Those interested in knowing if a donation is tax-deductible can access the U.S. Internal Revenue Service's Tax Exempt Organization Search at <a href="https://apps.irs.gov/app/eos/">https://apps.irs.gov/app/eos/</a>.

Those making an online contribution should make sure the website starts with https:// when visiting the donation portal. This verifies a secure connection, making it less likely that personal information will be stolen.

Additional tips to keep in mind during the season of giving are:

Never feel pressured to donate immediately.

Be wary of charities that ask for donations in cash or via wire transfer.

If the organization is unfamiliar, research as much information as possible.

Beware some scams may use sympathetic-sounding names that are similar to the names of legitimate

Be suspicious if organizations will not give additional information about their mission, how they use donations or proof that a contribution is tax deductible.

If a donation request is for a local chapter of an organization, verify it is authorized to solicit funds on behalf of the parent organization.

Go directly to the charity or organization's website

instead of clicking on a link to the desired group.


