Several members of the Tucker County workforce presented either a monthly or yearly report to the Tucker County Commission. Each had information and updates pertaining to their particular department. Many items ranging from new truck signage to the relocation of four voting precincts were discussed. The Commissioners thanked everyone for their arduous work and dedication given to the citizens of Tucker County.

Tucker County Assessor, James 'Chris' Michael, reported to the Tucker County Commission on the plans of the assessor's office. Michael explained the office would be doing door to door assessments for the Dry Fork and Davis Districts. The assessor's office has also acquired new software called iasWorld. The new software is the most comprehensive property assessment and tax administration software available. The assessor's office will be closed April 25, so the staff can train on the new software.

Elizabeth Smith with the Little League Association thanked the commissioners for their donations toward a new pitching mound. The league now has seven little league teams, and the new mound has been essential in helping the players. Smith said: "With everything going on, I know I'm a little late with this thank you, but I still wanted to come to say thanks from all of us."

Parsons Volunteer Fire Department Chief, Kevin White, reported new road not suitable for large trucks signs will be updated around June after working hard for them over the last five years. The new signs will coincide with

the current ones already in place. The signs will contain the picogram logo of a truck with read circle around it and a red slash through the truck. White said: "We hope to stop trucks from going onto roads that aren't big enough to accommodate them and keep everyone safe."

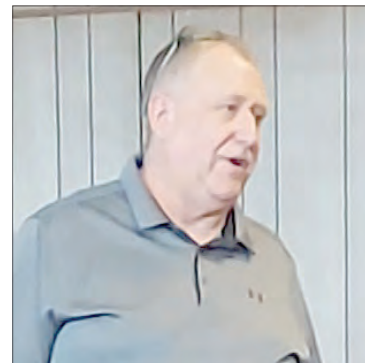
White also gave a COVID-19 update for the Tucker County area. Numbers are on the decline over the last week across the county and state. There were 2,080 confirmed positive cases since the beginning of the pandemic. That equals to about 29.7 percent of Tucker County's Population.

Since nearing peak capacity in early February, COVID related hospitalizations in West Virginia are down 90.8 percent. ICU patients are down 85.8 percent and patients on ventilators are down 88.4 percent.

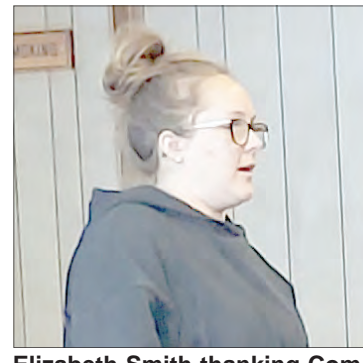
The second COVID booster is available to anyone 50 and older and 12 and under. These individuals are required to have had an organ transplant or living with conditions that are considered as equivalent level of immune compromised. They would also need to be four months since their last vaccine.

White has filed for two portable programmable signs with the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP). This is an extremely competitive state grant that receives many applications a year. White hopes to know the outcome of the grant by October. These signs can be used to announce events, direct traffic, or even prepare for severe weather and disasters. The portable signs will be remote controlled through a cell phone and solar powered. A single charge can last up to 30 days or continuously through solar power.

Commissioner Lowell Moore thanked White for everything he has done for the community and additional signage he has acquired. Moore stated that: "Every year it's improved." White answered that with: "Well it has been a team; everybody has

had a little piece in this. It is not just one person. I took the ideas and direction from other people and ran with it. Hopefully, I did you well."

Animal Shelter Director Bailey Falls was not present to report this time because she was busy picking up \$20,000 worth of stainless cages donated by another orga-

nization in Parkersburg. Commissioner Fred Davis said in her absence that: "this animal shelter thing is going to be a showcase for West Virginia. Because of the way they are working on this and doing some wonderful things. Remember this, the citizens are not paying for this. It is amazing

WVDEP requesting public comment on statewide water quality report

Comments will be accepted until June 1, 2022

CHARLESTON, WV – The West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection (WVDEP) has developed the Draft 2018/2020/2022 West Virginia Integrated Water Quality Monitoring and Assessment Report, which includes a 303(d) list of impaired stream and lake assessment units, and is requesting input from the public. An impaired water is a water body that fails to meet state

water quality standards and cannot support one or more of its designated uses, such as public drinking water supply, aquatic life propagation and maintenance, or contact recreation.

The report fulfills requirements of sections 303(d) and 305(b) of the federal Clean Water Act to provide a list of impaired waters and an overall assessment of West Virginia's waters to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The term "waters" refers to lakes, wetlands, and streams.

Both the report and the 303(d) list are available on the WVDEP web-

site: https://dep.wv.gov/wve/watershed/ir/pages/303d_305b.aspx.

To allow public participation in the 303(d) listing process, public comments are being accepted until 5 p.m. on Wednesday, June 1.

The health and well-being of Tucker County children, family, friends and visitors is a public safety priority. The primary mission of Tucker County EMS is to provide emergency care to those who need it, when they need it.

The upcoming election is critically important to the residents and visitors of Tucker County who depend on Tucker County EMS to respond in a timely manner for what could be a life-threatening situation. The May 10 ballot, will provide an opportunity to vote in support of the EMS levy proposed by the Tucker County Commission.

Public meetings hosted by the Tucker County Ambulance Authority Board have addressed questions and misinformation that continues to circulate throughout the county. A detailed budget has been presented. Labor has been identified as the largest expense item, even though salaries of Tucker County EMS employees are below state and national averages and not competitive with surrounding counties.

To optimize response time, the Ambulance Authority Board and the Medical Director for TC EMS recommend staffing levels that provide no less than 2 crews operating 24/7. In order to maintain this standard of service, funding from the EMS ordinance or TC EMS Levy is essential.

There is a serious shortage of EMS personnel throughout this state and country; competition for these personnel is fierce and their morale is low. Tucker County must be postured to retain our current staffing while attracting new employees to make up shortfalls.

The Ambulance Authority Board needs your help to ensure adequate operational support to continue staffing 2 crews 24/7.

Justice Department Announces New Rule to Modernize Firearm Definitions

Rule Addresses ‘Ghost Gun’ Proliferation

WASHINGTON – The Department of Justice announced that it has submitted to the Federal Register the “Frame or Receiver” Final Rule, which modernizes the definition of a firearm. Once implemented, this rule will clarify that parts kits that are readily convertible to firearms are subject to the same regulations as traditional firearms. These regulatory updates will help curb the proliferation of “ghost guns,” which are often assembled from kits, do not contain serial numbers, and are sold without background checks, making them difficult to trace and easy to acquire by criminals.

“One year ago, the Department committed to address the proliferation of ghost guns used in violent crimes,” said Attorney General Merrick B. Garland. “This rule will make it harder for criminals and other prohibited persons to obtain untraceable guns, will help ensure that law enforcement officers can retrieve the information they need to solve crimes, and will help reduce the number of untraceable firearms flooding our communities. I commend all our colleagues at the ATF who have worked tirelessly over the past 12 months to get this important rule finalized, and to do it in a way that respects the rights of

law-abiding Americans.”

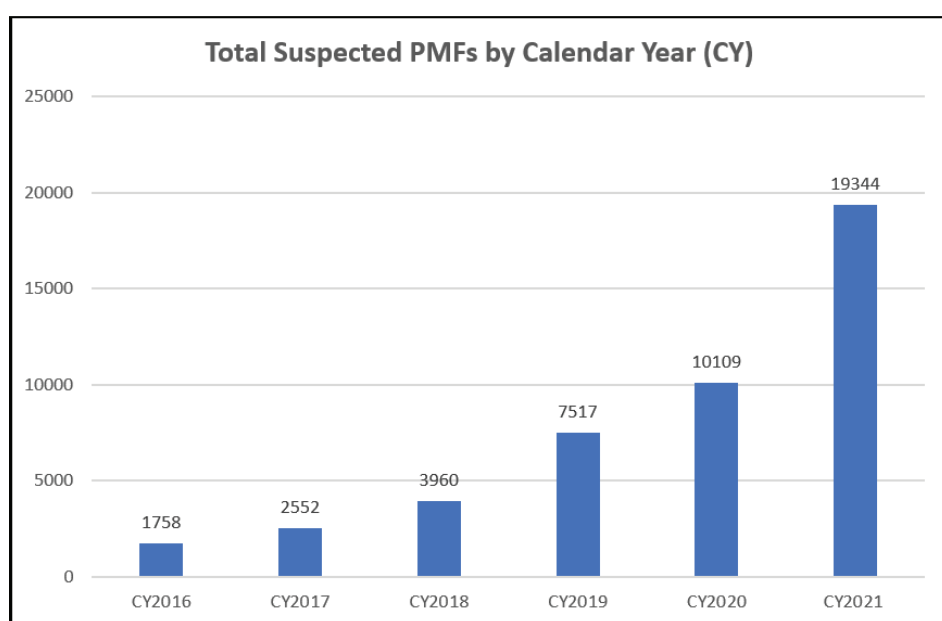
The rule goes into effect 120 days from the date of publication in the Federal Register, and once implemented, will address the proliferation of these un-serialized firearms in several ways. These include:

To help keep guns from being sold to convicted felons and other prohibited purchasers, the rule makes clear that retailers must run background checks before selling kits that contain the parts necessary for someone to readily make a gun.

To help law enforcement trace guns used in a crime, the rule modernizes the definition of frame or receiver, clarifying what must be marked with a serial number – including in easy-to-build firearm kits.

To help reduce the number of unmarked and hard-to-trace “ghost guns,” the rule establishes requirements for federally licensed firearms dealers and gunsmiths to have a serial number added to 3D printed guns or other un-serialized firearms they take into inventory.

To better support tracing efforts, the rule requires federal firearms licensees, including gun retailers, to retain records for the length of time they are licensed, thereby expanding records retention beyond the prior requirement of 20 years. Over the past decade, ATF has been unable to trace thousands of firearms – many reportedly used in homicides or other violent crimes – because the records had already been destroyed. These records will continue to belong to, and be maintained by, federal firearms licensees



while they are in business.

As the final rule explains, from January 2016 to December 2021, ATF received approximately 45,240 reports of suspected privately made firearms recovered by law enforcement, including in 692 homicide or attempted homicide investigations. The chart pictured demonstrates the total annual numbers of suspected PMFs recovered by law enforcement over the past six years.

Today’s announcement marks one year since the Attorney General directed the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) to issue a proposed rule within 30 days that would address the proliferation of unmarked firearms increasingly being used in crimes. On May 7,

2021, the Department of Justice issued a notice of proposed rulemaking, and during the 90-day open comment period, the ATF received more than 290,000 comments, the highest number of comments submitted to a proposed rule in ATF’s history. Today’s announcement is also the latest in a series of steps the department has taken to address violent crime and gun violence.

Also, if you would like to teach a class in knitting, crocheting, sewing, etc. we’d love to hear from you. We’ve had a request for someone to do a writing class for us.

Volunteering for a short time will help you and make our seniors happy. Please consider what you might do to help.

Prevention

The mission for the RTCAC is to work together with the community partners to support healing and justice for children and families who have been victimized. Staff and team members helped 121 new children on-site at the CAC in 2021. The staff also made 3,932 advocacy contacts with caregivers, maintaining connections with families. Thus, ensuring families receive the support they need from the beginning of an investigation and through the court process until the conclusion of the case.

The CAC provided Child Sexual Abuse Prevention to 897 children and 82 adults. There were 46 children seen at the CAC and referred for trauma informed mental health services.

Sandra Bohon, also of the CAC,

read the proclamation for April to be proclaimed Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Month to the Commission. Bohon said: “During Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Month, we renew our commitment to prevent child abuse and neglect and to work to enable our children to realize their full potential. Childhood is a formative time, and abuse and neglect can have devastating long-term effects on young lives. Family members, educators, public officials, faith-based and community organizations all play important roles in helping to ensure that children are safe and can grow surrounded by love and stability.”

Mike Rosenau, Commissioner, finished with the proclamation with: “The Tucker County Commission is

committed to supporting children and promoting safe and stable families. As we observe Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Month, we underscore our commitment to building a community where all children can thrive, develop character, and learn to be responsible citizens. By honoring our obligations to support and protect our young people. We all have an opportunity to make a positive difference in the life of a child and build a brighter future for our communities.”

Mike Rosenau, Fred Davis and Lowell Moore, the Tucker County Commissioners, all signed the proclamation proclaiming April 2022 as Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Month in Tucker County, West Virginia.

Voting

the donations people and organizations give to the shelter. So, if you see something new going on in the county, please do not think it is coming out your pocket cause this mostly all fundraising and people donating.”

An election updated was presented by Sherry Simmons. Simmons explained how election site issues for the physically impaired have been resolved by working with the West Virginia Disabilities Act. Simmons had received some concerns and hopes those concerns have been addressed. Simmons stated that: “Voting is one of our nation’s most fundamental acts. It is a right. Yet, for so long many people with disabilities have struggled at our polling places.”

Some places have issues with such things as ramps, door handles, and paved parking areas or spaces. On August 26-28, 2021, exterior assessments were conducted on all of Tucker County’s precincts. Tucker County was

given 60 days starting Sept 21, 2021, to assure that the citizens with disabilities were given access to polling locations. All the precincts have been addressed.

There are five main precincts that had to be relocated. Precinct One in Hendricks, and Precinct Two in Hambleton are relocated to the Tucker Valley Elementary gymnasium entrance area. This area hosts plenty of parking and is located on the other side of the St. George School-Based Medical Clinic. Simmons said: “This is to ensure people have a safe and an accessible area to go in.”

Other areas addressed were Precinct 10 in Sycamore Grove and Precinct 24 at St. George Methodist Church. These locations are being relocated to the St. George Pavilion adjacent to the clinic with plenty of parking. Simmons stated: “We have worked hand in hand with St. George Medical Clinic. It is a lovely location called the Pavilion Area. It is a brand-new facility and

is completely accessible. And I thank St. George Medical Clinic for working with us.”

Also, the voting Precinct Five that was at The Tucker County Annex has been moved to the Precinct 4 Tucker County Courthouse. Simmons went on to apologize for any inconvenience these changes may cause but asked to please put any concerns aside for the benefit of a disabled person being able to vote. Simmons also recommended other voting options such as early voting starting April 26 and to note that the changes were required by federal and state law.

Simmons finished by thanking her staff for their demanding work and dedication.

The next meeting of the Tucker County Commission will be held on April 27 at 4 p.m. The meeting is located at 211 First Street, Parsons, in the third-floor courtroom and is open to the public.

Social Security Administration to Resume In-Person Services at Local Social Security Offices

Online Services and Telephone Remain Most Convenient Ways to Contact Agency

"I am pleased to announce that local Social Security offices will restore in-person services, including for people without an appointment, on April 7, 2022.

To avoid waiting in line, I strongly encourage people, who can, to use our online services at www.socialsecurity.gov, call us, and schedule appointments

in advance rather than walking in without an appointment. Phone appointments can save you a trip to a busy office. I thank the public for your patience as we work to increase service.

Customers who walk in without appointments may encounter delays and longer waits at our offices. Be aware that our offices tend to be the busiest first thing in the morning, early in the week, and during the early part of the month, so people may want to plan to visit at other times.

Given that many of the people we serve

have health vulnerabilities, and consistent with our union agreements, we are continuing to require certain safety measures including masking, physical distancing, and self-health checks for COVID-19 symptoms. We will provide masks to the public and employees if they need them.

Thoughtful planning and preparation have shaped our process to restore in-person services. Social Security employees are dedicated to serving the public, and we are ready to welcome the public back to our offices. Our local managers understand and can address the needs of their communities. We have also implemented office-to-office support as well as brought recently retired employees back to assist the public. We thank the many interested stakeholders including the Department of Health and Human Services' Administration for Community Living and national advocate organizations for your help.

Throughout the pandemic, millions of people have used our secure and convenient online services and received help by phone. People who have access to the internet should first try our online services before calling us or visiting an office.

As we transition to a new modern phone system, some people may experience a busy signal or be unintentionally disconnected from their call. We sincerely regret this disruption and recommend people call when our National 800 Number may be less busy, such as before 10 a.m. or after 4 p.m. local time or later in the week. Like our offices, our waits are generally shorter later in the month.

Additional Information

Most Social Security services are available to the public online at www.socialsecurity.gov and with a *my* Social Security account, or by telephone. And most Social Security services do not require the public to take time to visit an office. People may create their *my* Social Security account, a personalized online service, at www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount.

People who set up their *my* Social Security account have access to additional personalized services. They can request a replacement Social Security card online if they meet certain requirements. If they already receive Social Security benefits, they can start or change direct deposit online, request a replacement SSA-1099, and if they need proof of their benefits, they can print or download a current Benefit Verification Letter from their account.

People not yet receiving benefits can use their online account to get a personalized *Social Security Statement*, which provides their earnings information as well as estimates of their future benefits. The portal also includes a retirement calculator and links to information about other online services, such as applications for retirement, disability, and Medicare benefits.

WorkForce WV encourages West Virginians to apply for the Job Jumpstart Program, announces more than 12,500 approved applicants

CHARLESTON, WV — WorkForce West Virginia encourages West Virginians who are returning to work to apply for the Job Jumpstart Program (JJP). Since its launch in January, 14,685 West Virginians have applied and 12,533 have been approved to participate in the program. The JJP provides a one-time, \$1,500 payment to eligible West Virginians. Payment distribution to approved applicants began in late February.

"The Job Jumpstart Program has had a very successful kickoff and we encourage West Virginians who are returning to work or who have completed a training or certification program to continue to apply for these funds," said Scott Adkins, acting commissioner of WorkForce West Virginia. "Currently, nearly 86 percent of applicants have met the requirements and qualify for this program. WorkForce West Virginia remains committed to assisting West Virginians experiencing unemployment and providing access to necessary resources."

The JJP was created to assist West Virginians returning to the workforce. Those eligible for the program include:

- West Virginia residents who have not previously received a JJP payment and one of the following:
- Receive Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits

or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), were unemployed or underemployed and have become employed since January 1, 2022 and maintain employment for 8 consecutive weeks working 32 or more hours per week, or enroll and complete an approved certification program and/or approved WorkForce West Virginia training program from January 1 to August 12

- Were unemployed or underemployed (working less than 32 hours per week) and have become employed since January 1, 2022 and maintain employment for 8 consecutive weeks working 32 or more hours per week
- Enroll and complete an approved certification program and/or approved WorkForce West Virginia training program from January 1 to August 12

Individuals are required to register with WorkForce West Virginia and complete the pre-screening questionnaire. WorkForce West Virginia will review all submitted applications and required verification documents to determine eligibility. Once an application is reviewed and approved, the \$1,500 payment will be processed and distributed.

Charleston WV - The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to *e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia* at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

April 20, 1863: President Lincoln issued a proclamation that in 60 days West Virginia would become a state. This occasion was marked 100 years later during the state's Centennial celebration with a special ceremonial session of the West Virginia legislature on April 20, 1963, in Wheeling.

April 20, 1909: Fiddler Melvin Wine was born near Burnsville. A favorite of old-time music enthusiasts nationally, he was chosen as a National Heritage Fellow in 1991 by the National Endowment for the Arts, the highest recognition given to a folk artist in the United States.

April 20, 1939: Poet Irene McKinney was born in Belington, Barbour County. Governor Gaston Caperton appointed her state poet laureate in 1993, and she served in that capacity until her death in 2012.

April 21, 1908: Traditional musician Phoebe Cottrell Parsons was born in Calhoun County. Parsons's traditional clawhammer banjo style, unaccompanied ballad singing, riddles and storytelling

have influenced countless numbers of younger musicians.

April 21, 1936: President Roosevelt established the Jefferson National Forest. The West Virginia portion of this forest includes 18,530 acres in Monroe County.

April 22, 1908: Marshall "Little Sleepy" Glenn was born in Elkins. Glenn coached basketball at West Virginia University from 1934 to 1938 and football from 1937 to 1940. He was inducted into the WVU Sports Hall of Fame in 1992.

April 22, 2003: Activist Judy Bonds, a Raleigh County native, received the Goldman Environmental Prize for her fight against mountaintop removal. Her efforts inspired thousands and turned a local issue in West Virginia into a national cause.

April 23, 1857: Andrew Summers Rowan was born in Gap Mills, Monroe County. Rowan, a military officer, was chosen as the messenger when President McKinley wanted to send a message to Cuban General Calixto Garcia. The 1899 pamphlet, *A Message to Garcia, made the incident famous.*

April 24, 1865: The McNeill's Rangers surrendered to Union troops at New Creek (now Keyser). The Confederate guer-

rilla force probably never numbered more than 100 men at any time, but they managed to do damage to Union operations.

April 25, 1863: About 1,500 Confederate soldiers under Gen. William "Grumble" Jones advanced through Greenland Gap, a deep pass through New Creek Mountain in Grant County. The Confederates encountered 87 Union soldiers who held off several assaults before finally surrendering.

April 25, 1923: Union leader Arnold Ray Miller was born at Leewood on Cabin Creek in Kanawha County. In December 1972 he defeated Tony Boyle to become president of the United Mine Workers.

April 26, 1816: General Alexander Welch Reynolds was born in Lewisburg. He served in the armies of the United States and the Confederacy. After the war, Reynolds accepted a commission as a colonel in the forces of the khedive of Egypt, the ruler of Egypt under the Ottoman Empire.

My heart goes out to all of Ukraine and the losses they have to face. The abuse that is being piled on these human beings is unspeakable. The hate that is in this man's heart is far beyond the scope of reason. *Momma Said*, "In this month of Easter and rebirth I hope God and his angels shed light on Ukraine."

I would like to take this time to let the voters of Tucker County know what my feelings are about this upcoming excess levy for the EMS. First, let me say that I'm not against the county having an EMS. I'm against the way that the county is trying to fund it and the way it is run.

To me, the county commissioners need to first remember that they work for the taxpayers of the county and should do more to ensure that all parts of the county government is not wasting money. Then, they need to set a priority of what is needed and what is not. I think that having an EMS would be high on that list. Then, take the money that they saved from spending on things we really don't need and put it towards funding the EMS. But at the same time, they need to ensure that the Ambulance Authority is very transparent with their books so the people can see where the money goes if they want. I think their new accountant is working on this. But there are a lot of other things that needs to be spelled out before I as a voter would vote for the levy.

I understand that these are volunteers that make up the authority, but just because someone volunteers for something doesn't mean they should be put in charge of it. You need to screen them thoroughly and ensure the county has oversight of the way everything is being run. I have never met a businessperson that would set up a million + dollars business and let it be run the way this one has been. The only time the commission has control over the authority is at budget time, other than having a commissioner on the authority. I realize that the personnel that work for the EMS must have the training to qualify them for the job, but they also must be physically able to do the job.

When talking to voters throughout the county, a lot of them ask why the Tucker co ambulances are setting in the Walmart parking lot, or at a restaurant, sometimes for over an hour and they are always running. When you work for the taxpayers, you really need to pay attention to what you are doing, because the taxpayers are paying attention.

You as voters have an opportunity during this election that you don't normally have with this excess levy. If you are unhappy with the way the commissioners are running the county and the way the ambulance authority is run, then vote against it and do it with large numbers to let them know you want changes. Tell them to cut waste, have transparency throughout the county, and to ensure that they find a fair way to pay for it. The reason that I'm running for county commissioner is because I think the taxpayers need someone to look at the job from a different perspective and not be as quick to spend the taxpayer's money. If you elect me as your next county commissioner, I promise that I will make sure that there is transparency of county government and that you know where your money is being spent. I will work with the other commissioners to try make changes as needed but remember I will be just one vote out of three.

There are other agencies within county government that also needs attention. One of them is Hamrick PSD. Just a couple of months ago they needed to get a notification out to the customers. They typed up the notification and then had their employees take them around to each customer, it took them over 2 weeks, hard to tell how many man hours wasted and I don't think they ever did reach all the intended customers. When asked why they didn't mail them, they said they couldn't afford the stamps. I've been told of other problems within the PSD that I don't want to address at this time. Someone needs to be providing oversight to the boards that the commission appoints. You would think that it would have opened their eyes when the state took over the land fill a few years ago. There has not been a commissioner attend the PSD meeting in over 4 years.

The only area in the county that has the land that will allow real growth is on the mountain and the only way it will grow is if there is infrastructure built. I think the county commission should work with the towns of Thomas and Davis and help them develop infrastructure that would handle both towns and all future growth.

We need some changes made in county government.

I encourage everyone to get out and vote, even if it's not for me.

West Virginia's spring gobbler season opens



SOUTH CHARLESTON, WV — West Virginia's spring gobbler season continues for five weeks to May 22, according to the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources (WVDNR). Hunters can harvest one bearded bird per day with a season bag limit of two.

All hunters 15 and older are required to have a valid West Virginia hunting license, unless hunting as resident landowner, and a valid form of identification while hunting. A West Virginia hunting license can be purchased at retail agents across the state or online at WVhunt.com.

WVDNR officials remind sportsmen and women that hunting turkeys with bait and killing hens is illegal. Turkey hunters are encouraged to report any such activity to their local Natural Resource Police Officer or call 911 to report the violation. In addition, the West Virginia Chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation pays a \$100 reward for information that leads to the arrest and conviction of anyone using bait to kill wild turkeys.

PSC to Increase Work Zone Safety Enforcement

CHARLESTON, WV — The Public Service Commission of West Virginia, along with the West Virginia Department of Transportation and officials from other law enforcement agencies around the state today gathered to recognize National Work Zone Awareness Week.

The group collectively announced a statewide joint effort to increase patrols and enforcement in road work construction zones across West Virginia during the upcoming 2022 highway construction season. Law enforcement officers, including PSC officers, will be targeting work zones on Interstate 70, Interstate 68, Interstate 64, Interstate 77, Interstate 79 and Interstate 81. The effort follows a tragic increase in accidents and fatalities in work zones over the past several years.

Nationally, commercial motor vehicles are involved in more than 30% of fatal work zone crashes on urban interstates and more than 50% of fatal work zone crashes on rural interstates, according to data from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. In West Virginia there were 18 fatal crashes in West Virginia work zones from 2018 to 2020. Ten of those fatal crashes involved trucks. There were only 15 fatal crashes in the entire seven year period preceding 2018, three of those crashes involved trucks.

"Any fatality in a work zone crash is a preventable tragedy," said PSC Chairman Charlotte Lane. Our officers will be out there every day patrolling the

work zones, watching for unsafe drivers, particularly those traveling at excessive speeds. We will do everything in our power to make our highways and our work zones safe for the traveling public and those working to repair our roads."

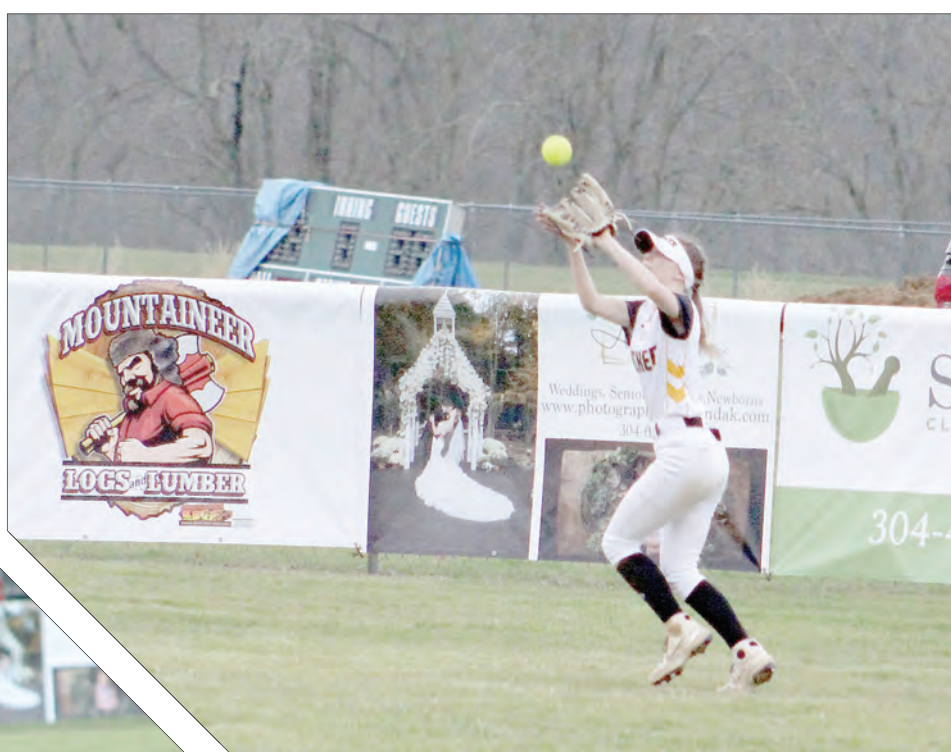

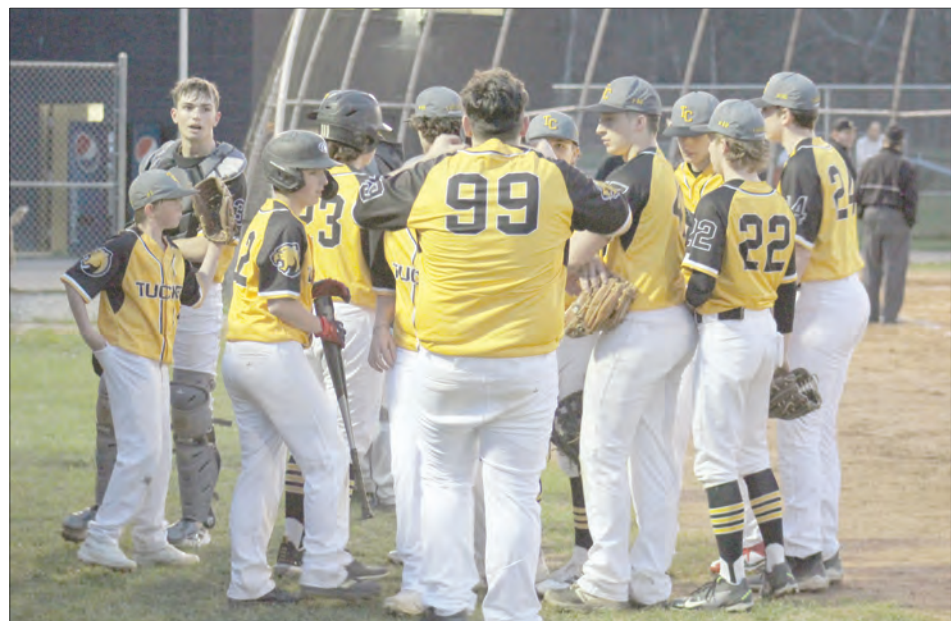

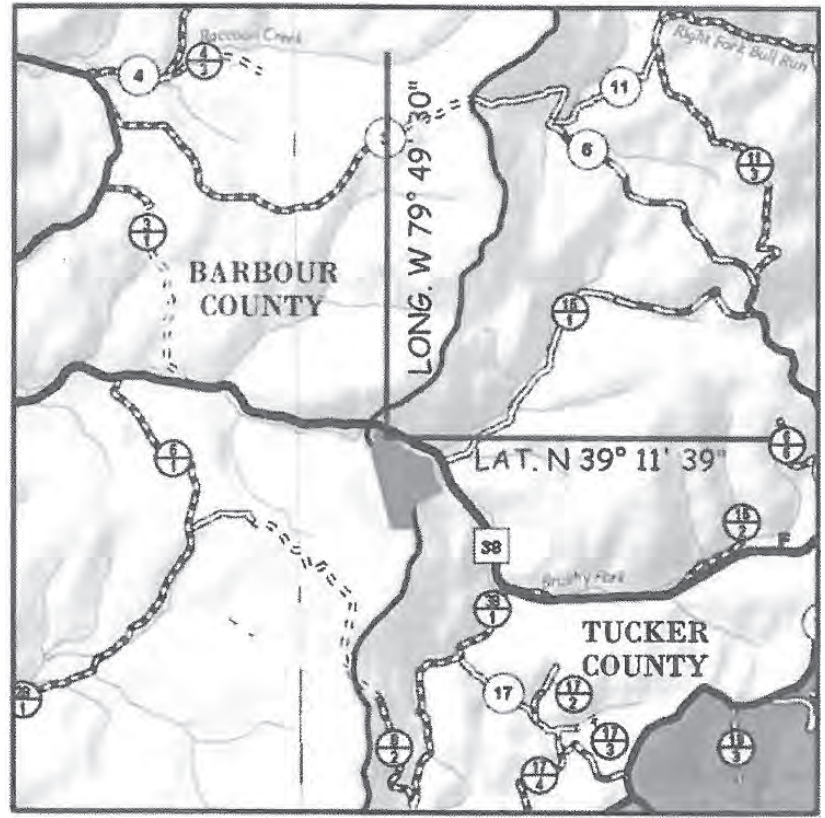
