One Ambulance Crew or Two? The Vote Yah or Nah for the Levy Tax is yours to Decide

Tucker County Ambulance Authority Treasurer, Chris Davis, explained the need for the Tucker County EMS levy tax. Currently the residents of Tucker County pay \$50 once a year ordinance fee. The ordinance was put into effect for the need of more funding for the EMS program. The new proposed levy tax will change the amount paid and the way the tax is paid. Davis explained the reasons as to why the levy is needed at the special meeting held by the Tucker County Commission.

The biggest need is for two EMS stations staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and 365 days. Currently there are only two facilities open for medical treatment during the week,

the St. George Medial Clinic and Mountain Top Health Clinic. There are limited weekend hours with absolutely no medical facility to cover anything for a substantial portion of the county. Davis stated, "And so when we look at EMS, we have to offer 24-hour service because even though medical facilities are open, there's a lot of times people may go there and then are transported to the hospital."

With two stations in a drawn area, one up on the mountain and one in Parsons, residents are at risk of not having the needed EMS services available. For example, if Station One must travel clear to the other end of the Tucker County or vice versa with Station Two, it is going to be difficult to get there in a timely man-

Training in leadership, public speaking, growing food, and working collaboratively came from Dad, and from years in 4-H and FFA, as well from Mrs. Rigney's Drama Club, Mr. Lee's band, Mr. Wimer's vo-ag, Mr. Lloyd's civics, and Mrs. Roy's Coed-Hi-Y Club. Serving as Central District FFA President and West Virginia's Coed-Hi-Y youth governor, I got my first glimpses at the complexities of county, state, and federal government. - Daniel Lee Simpson, of Parsons, was charged with one count Battery. The complaint states that on Thursday, March 10, at approximately 4:54 p.m. Trooper C.A. Hawkins and Cpl. J.J. Cornelius were dispatched by Tucker County 911 to an altercation located at 197 Center St. in Hambleton.

They explain the rules and regulations for the wilderness and the principles of Leave No Trace TM practices. Trailhead Stewards often assist new visitors in planning a route or location that pro-

vides a "Dolly Sods experience" and works for their level of preparedness and available time. Stewards are stationed at the busiest trailheads during the busiest times on weekends and holidays.

Being a Trailhead Steward requires no specific background, skills or expertise, other than a desire to support Dolly Sods. New Stewards receive training from staff of Monongahela National Forest and West Virginia Highlands Conservancy and work with an experienced Trailhead Steward for practice. There is no minimum time commitment, and those who live far away or who can only occasionally volunteer their time are welcome. West Virginia Highlands Conservancy provides a convenient means for volunteers to schedule themselves online for trailheads and shifts that work for their schedules. Stewards can join a private Facebook page and occasional gatherings for Stewards to share experiences and learning are planned.

One of the first Congres-

sionally-designated wilderness areas in the eastern United States, Dolly Sods is a unique high elevation plateau containing habitat similar to areas of Canada. Its scenic qualities and rugged beauty have attracted a steadily increasing number of visitors since its designation in 1974, and like many natural areas has seen a large influx of visitors during the pandemic. As a result, there has been increasing impact on its natural qualities and wilderness character.

Dolly Sods Wilderness Stewards was formed in 2021 to leverage volunteer action to assist the Monongahela National Forest with managing and protecting the wilderness character of Dolly Sods. By educating visitors about the values of wilderness and low impact practices the Stewards hope to preserve the wilderness for the enjoyment of future generations and avoid the need for restrictions on visitor access that have been implemented in other popular natural areas.

The Wilderness Stewards program also needs

volunteers for other activities, such as maintaining trailhead registration boxes; monitoring encounters and opportunities for solitude on backcountry trails; taking a detailed inventory of campsites; and maintaining trails under the direction of Forest Service staff. Teams will be forming for some of these projects in early summer.

Charleston WV - The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

April 6, 1938: The Conservation Civilian Corps established Camp Kanawha in the Kanawha State Forest. The CCC removed all of the abandoned houses, coal tipples, and other structures no longer in use, and constructed roads, the forest superintendent's residence, office, maintenance building, and picnic shelters.

April 6, 1944: Guitarist David Morris was born in Ivydale, Clay County. With his brother John on fiddle, the Morris Brothers founded music festivals, supported union and environmental causes, and promoted West Virginia traditional music nationwide.

April 7, 1927: A. James Manchin was born in Farmington. In 1984, Manchin ran for state treasurer, but he fell into trouble once elected. With a stock market downturn in 1987, Manchin bore much of the blame when the state lost nearly \$300 million in investments.

April 7, 1947: Medal of Honor recipient Thomas W. Bennett was born in Morgantown. Believing it was wrong to evade the draft while others had to serve in Vietnam, he volunteered as a noncombatant medic. He was killed by gunfire while trying to drag a wounded soldier to safety.

April 8, 1891: The town of Paw Paw was incorporated. Strategically located on the Potomac River, the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad and the C&O Canal, Paw Paw was named for the banana-like pawpaw fruit that grows in the area.

April 8, 1951: An Air National Guard transport plane crashed near Kanawha (now Yeager) Airport, killing 21.



April 9, 1900: Physician Margaret Byrnside "Dr. Maggie" Ballard was born. She actively pursued her interest in genealogy and local history and was one of the founders of the Monroe County Historical Society.

April 10, 1848: John Kenna was born in Kanawha County. In 1883, the state legislature elected him to the U.S. Senate, unseating the powerful Henry Gassaway Davis. Kenna is one of two West Virginians memorialized by a statue in the U.S. Cap-



April 10, 1932: Entertainer Blaze Starr was born as Fanny Belle Fleming in Wayne County. The owner of a burlesque club rechristened her "Blaze Starr." She became known as 'Queen of the Strippers."

April 11, 1821: Congressman Jacob Beeson Blair was born in Parkersburg. Blair was the first West Virginian to be told by President Abraham Lincoln of Lincoln's support of the admission of West Virginia into the United States.

April 11, 1909: Writer Hubert Skidmore was born at Laurel Mountain in Webster County. In his novels, Skidmore depicted stoic endurance by mountain people in the face of misfortune and economic exploitation by outside

April 12, 1865: The 36th Virginia Infantry, known as the Logan Wildcats, disbanded. The Confederate company was created at Logan Courthouse on June 3, 1861, and consisted of about 85 men. The company saw its first action in the Battle of Scary Creek in Putnam County.



April 12, 1885: Photographer George James Kossuth was born. After he opened his Wheeling studio in 1909, he achieved broad fame for his insightful portraits of many of the world's celebrities, including Richard Strauss, Jascha Heifetz, Leopold Stokowski, Clarence Darrow and Richard Nixon.

Lasagna Cups

Ingredients

- 18 medium wonton wrappers
- 2 large Italian sausages (You can use mild to hot depending on your preference.)
- 1 cup Ricotta (or cottage cheese)
- 2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper 1 tablespoon oil for frying
- 2 tablespoons fresh basil, chopped
- 1 cup grated mozzarella
- 1 cup Marinara (or pasta sauce)

Directions

- 1. In a pan over medium-high heat, add in the sausage, crumble up, and fry until cooked through and browned.
 - Pour in the marinara sauce, bring to a boil, and allow to simmer for a

- couple of minutes. Set aside.
- Place the ricotta in a mixing bowl followed by the Parmesan, salt, and pepper. Mix until well combined.
- Spray about 9 muffin wells with baking spray.
- Place a wonton wrapper into a muffin well followed by a second wrapper opposite the angles on the first.
- Repeat this process for all 9 of the muffin wells.
- Place about a heaping tablespoon of the ricotta into the bottom of each wrapper followed by the same amount of sauce.
- Spread mozzarella over the top and some chopped basil.
- Place the lasagna bites into a 375 degree F or 190 C preheated oven for 12 minutes.

Simply Natural, LLC Herdsharing Program Seeking New Members

Jenningston, WV -Kendra Waybright has been an entrepreneur from a very early age. As a homeschooled teenager, West Virginia native, and country girl, Kendra has been milking and tending to goats and cows since she was four years old. She has always loved making allnatural products, cultured food, herbal medicine, and healthy recipes for her and her family and has combined all of this into a business, Simply Natural, LLC. Kendra's most recent venture is participating in a herdshare program. For the second year in a row, Simply Natural herdshares are now available to the public, but the herdshares are limited!

Kendra loves sharing her journey and knowledge of sustainable agriculture, natural health, self-sufficiency, living off the land and more. In 2020, "I purchased two pregnant twin Jersey heifers. I purchased them to produce milk for me and my family," Kendra said. "Before they calved, I realized with two cows we were going to have a lot of extra milk! I heard about herdsharing, but I really didn't know anything about it. I decided to do some research and I found that there was a large demand in our area and so I decided that it was something that I wanted to do."

She used to raise goats, but now focuses on Jerseys. "I wanted to get Jersey cows because they are a relatively small breed, and are known for their high butterfat content, as well as being great mothers, having docile temperaments, and they have superior grazing abilities compared to other breeds of dairy cattle. Jersey cow milk has a higher protein content and is naturally higher in nutri-



ents and vitamins compared to most other milks. As of right now, I have four Jersey cows."

Imagine reaping the benefits of owning a cow without having to do all of the work? With a heardshare you can do just that. Owning a heardshare is like purchasing a membership or a "cow share". It allows you to get raw milk from "your own cows" (which Kendra owns and tends) by making you a partial owner of her herd of cows. Because the direct sale of raw milk is illegal in the state of West Virginia, distribution of raw milk from off the farm is legal only through herdsharing. The concept is easy: a herdshare is the purchase of a milk interest in the herd in which one herdshare is one-twentyfifth (1/25) or four percent (4.00%) of a cow, allowing the herdshare purchaser to receive raw milk according to their level of milk interest purchase.

The herdshare agreement requires a written agreement signed by all parties that must be filed with the West Virginia Commissioner of Agriculture, and must be renewed annually. A buy-in fee and boarding fee must be paid at the time of initial contract signing. Kendra offers a half share, which has a buy-in fee of \$20 and \$15 per month boarding fee. This half share entitles the buyer to one half gallon of milk every week. A full share has a \$20 buy-in fee and a \$30 per month boarding fee. The full share entitles the buyer to one gallon of milk every week. Kendra's raw milk is put into glass bottles that Simply Natural provides. Delivery is not available, so the milk must be picked up at a designated area. Each week participants bring their

Kendra even offers Farm Tours for shareholders. "When herdshare participants come on a tour they will get to see the cows that will be producing their milk, the milking parlor, etc. As I show them around the farm, I will explain the milking process in detail. A tour is for the shareholder only and is no extra charge," she said. Farm Tours must be arranged in advance and by appoint-

ment only. As an added bonus, her mother Marsha Waybright, who is property manager for the Laurel River Club B&B, offers a temporary herdshare only for guests of her B&B. "This allows guests to experience farm life on a whole new level," said Marsha."For a small fee, guests can buy a temporary herdshare, drink their own milk, and learn





WV Div. of Forestry urging West Virginians to take caution while burning outdoors, follow all spring fire season guidelines

CHARLESTON, WV — Following a series of fires throughout West Virginia, the Division of Forestry (WVDOF) is urging West Virginians to take extreme caution while burning outdoors, especially throughout spring fire season.

On Wednesday, March 30, WVDOF fire personnel, with assistance from local fire departments, responded to active fires in Cabell, Putnam, Boone, Lincoln, McDowell, Mercer, Summers and Fayette counties. These fires occurred in the midst of a Red Flag warning issued by the National Weather Service which ended at 8 p.m. on Wednesday. Many of the fires are still active today, with WVDOF personnel and fire departments on site working to control

A Red Flag warning means that fires are likely and can spread quickly, usually due to warm temperatures, low humidity and strong winds. While this warning is in effect, outdoor burning is highly discour-

"Even without a Red Flag warning in effect, it is very important that spring fire season guidelines be followed," said Jeremy Jones, assistant state forester for the WVDOF. "Since the beginning of the fire season, more than 7,390 acres of land have burned throughout West Virginia. At least 39 percent of these fires have been caused by debris burning."

Statewide burning restrictions will remain in effect until the close of the spring fire season on May 31. The WVDOF's burning guidelines include:

Burning is prohibited during fire season from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. If burning has occurred during permitted hours (5 p.m. to 7 a.m.), the fire must be completely extinguished by 7 a.m.

- All fires must have a ring or safety strip.
- The safety strip itself must be cleared of burnable material and be at least 10 feet wide.
- Fire must be attended until completely extinguished.
- Only vegetative materials such as leaves, brush and yard clippings are permitted to be burnt (no trash).
- Spark-throwing machinery such as power shovels or sawmills operating on land subject to fire must contain an adequate spark arrestor.
- Inflammable waste disposal areas must annually remove all grass, brush, debris, and other inflammable material adjacent to disposal areas to provide ade-

quate protection, preventing the escape of fire to adjacent lands.

Additionally, commercial burning during prohibited periods requires a permit, which are issued by local WVDOF offices. A permit is required for each commercial burning site.

Any person or company who causes a fire on any grass or forest land must reimburse the state for costs to suppress the fire. Fines for forest fires caused by negligence range from \$100 to \$1,000 with an additional civil penalty of \$200.

Violations of fire season guidelines can be reported to the WVDOF's Special Operations and Enforcement Unit by calling 304-558-2788 and selecting option 9, or on the website at wvforestry.com/ report-a-violation.

We need to attract and retain qualified EMS personnel to Tucker County by paying a reasonable competitive wage. After all our lives are in their hands." The present Tucker County EMT salary is \$13.50 per hour. Paramedic's salary is \$16.00 per hour. Both are some the lowest in the state. Davis and the other board members are working towards a goal of \$16 per hour for EMTs and \$19 for paramedics.

With the monies from the ordinance fee changes have been made. Those changes include going from one station being fully staffed and every now and again on different days at the other station to have staff at both stations on a regular basis. There are 100 to 120 calls per month and 40 percent of them are non-billed calls. The state mandates the EMS stations must respond to car wrecks whether the crew does anything or not and regardless of it is 30, 20 or five miles away. During these calls if no one is injured or transported for medical treatment then the call in non-billed.

To help with money management the Ambulance Authority Board has engaged an outside accountant to provide financial guidance. The accountant also provides professional services to support decision making to manage costs while delivering the best possible quality services to Tucker County citizens and visitors. Part of the budget going forward is to build an escrow account to keep ambulances up to date with the hopes of buying a new or low mileage ambulance every couple of years. These newer ambulances will replace the one getting in bad shape.

The proposed budget for the 2022/2023 year for the Ambulance Authority falls short of needed funding. The expenditures include Labor (\$976,063), Administrative (\$115,800), Equipment O&M (\$93,000), Equipment Replacement (\$146,000) and Miscellaneous Expenses (\$52,207) total to \$1,383,070. Revenues include Medical Billing Receipts (\$480,000), Tucker County Commission (\$110,000), a capped Hotel/Motel Tax Collection (\$100,000), and EMS Ordinance (\$200,000) totals \$890,000. This leaves a shortfall of \$493,070, and the reason for the proposed

Davis stated, "Asking for help from the community for the levy. That is where the levy is at least going to make up a portion of the budget difference. To make things a little bit easier to improve."

The proposed levy on personal and real estate property, starting July 1, 2022, for four years will have the following rates: (cents per \$100 of assessed value):

Class II 3.88 cents (Personal Residence/

Farms)

Class III 7.76 cents (Rental Business/All

Class IV 7.76 cents (Municipality)

There will be a capped levy amount of \$401,872 and the proposed levy tax will be in place for the years 2022 to 2025. After 2025 the new levy will have to be passed to continue funding via this mechanism. Rates are based upon 2022 assessed values and as value goes up, rates go down to maintain levy cap. Assessed value is 60 percent of the appraised value and most households will be in the Class II category.

Some examples of the levy tax are:

Assessed Value \$50,000 for Class II the tax will be \$19.40, Class II and Class III \$38.80;

Assessed Value \$75,000 for Class II the tax will be \$29.10, Class II and Class III

Assessed Value \$100,000 for Class II the tax will be \$38.80, Class II and Class III \$77.60;

Assess Value \$275,000 for Class II the tax will be \$106.70, Class II and Class III

Davis explained the need for the levy tax by saying: "Looking at the two ambulances running. The concern being is if one is running and that is all we have running, and there is a call. And they may be on a call for six to eight hours, especially if it is a transport situation. And if that call turns into an eight-hour situation what if something else happens in the county. If something else happens there may not be anything for anyone to be able to do other than throw them in your truck and drive them to a hospital yourself. And unfortunately, that is where we are going be if we do not get that funding. And that is our concern. Understand it is a cost for the tax, but we are looking at the detriment of the community or the county would need paramedic and EMT team in each rig for 24 hours with one located in Parsons and the other on the mountain covering each end of the county."

The public was able to comment on the live video played on the Tucker County Commission Facebook page and it may answer questions some residents may have concerning the levy tax. Those comments

Chad Duran from Thomas asked: "I pay the fee every year as I feel it is vitally important as well as the fire fee and WVSP fee on my phone bill. Why are we doing away with the fee??? Can the commission just keep it in place??" The Commission responded to his question with this answer: "Per State Code, The Special EMS Ordinance Fee was put into place after three readings by the County Commission. There was no requirement for a vote by the public. Commissioners at that time felt that was what was best to provide services to the citizens of Tucker County.'

Duran in return asked: "I fully understand that, and I agree with its implementation. My statement was questioning its replacement with a levy. What happens if the levy fails? Does the fee stay in effect?" The Commission answered by saying: "it is a County Ordinance that remains in effect until it is either amended or repealed. It is up to the current Commissioners what they choose to do, if anything, dependent upon the results of the levy."

Keith Strausbaugh from Davis commented: "The levy is the way to go it

Chantel Jones from Parsons: "I think that the voters just want a budget of how the money is distributed before they vote...If the EMS could be transparent with the funding, I think it would help the voters decide."

Mandy Simmons: "If we do not have the levy, we will be down to one crew. The 50 is out the window the moment that you vote either way. So, either you vote for two crews or one that is the choice. The levy everyone will have to pay no exclusions. And if you believe that the county can run on one crew then vote no to the levy. It is that simple. No one from another county is going to come in to run EMS. Have tried and failed. The one ran transports and took the money commission gave them and ran. Again, you are essentially voting for one or two crews. Yes or No." Sue Smith responded to Mandy Simmons comment with: "this sums it up perfectly. As a full time, resident, and voter in Tucker County, I would love to see three crews, but understand that is not currently in the cards. Two is better than one."

Eric Rudy said: "If the levy is for Ambulance service, then it should be for emergency services only not transport. Transport should be an outside service." Dennis Filler responded to Rudy with: "As a matter of policy, we not in the transport busi-

Jim Riley had this to say: "I oppose the levy 1. because our HOA was duped by the Authority into supporting the Fee, then closed the Canaan Valley station anyway, and 2. the levy wording does not rescind the Fee. If their intent is to rescind the fee, put that in the levy, but do not expect us to take you on your word that proved worthless. Citizens, vote this down." Scott Kennedy responded to Riley by saying: "the closing of station three was not the decision of EMS. That was beyond our con-

trol." Davis'

comment included: "The one question that seems to be coming up is funds. Realize that each year an audit takes place by an outside organization to go over where funds are spent and to account for everything. All of the audits have been done and each year have passed. No misappropriation of funds is happening. All money collected with the fee that was enacted by the county commission has been used to improve coverage of the county at two stations not one which is what was taking place before the fee was in acted. As per the Canaan Valley Station the authority have worked hard to keep two stations running. We do not have the staff for three stations but was using station three at times as my understanding. Canaan Valley fire department made the decision to not extend our rent of the space to the authority any longer. We attempted to work out a schedule to use the facility as a reasonable accommodation, however they went ahead with the decision and we were asked to vacate the premises. I realize that the past concerns are there, but many members of the authority are new and are working hard toward helping with understanding.

The Tucker County Commission will host a special meeting on Tuesday, April 5, 2022, at 6 p.m. The meeting is open to the public and will be held in the Courtroom of the Tucker County Courthouse located on the third floor at 215 First Street, Parsons. The meeting will also be streamed live on Facebook on the Tucker County Commission page to allow for greater county-wide and COVID friendly participation. The purpose of the special session is to discuss the budget of Tucker County Ambulance Authority, the proposed levy and Commission funding. The session will be followed by a question/answer session.

AMENDED NOTICE OF FILING AND EVIDENTIARY HEARING

On December 17, 2021, Monongahela Power Company and The Potomac Edison Company (collectively, Companies) requested that the Commission approve an environmental compliance program to meet effluent limitation guidelines (ELG) at Ft. Martin and Harrison power stations, as described in the filing, and implementation of an associated cost recovery Surcharge to recover costs. Details of the proposed project construction and proposed Surcharge can be found on the Commission's website at http://www. psc.state.wv.us.

The ELG compliance plan is needed to comply with ELG rules issued by the United States Environmental Protection Agency and involve water treatment for bottom ash and flue gas desulfurization processes. The proposed plan is needed for those power plants to operate beyond 2028. The incremental revenue increase due to the Surcharge is estimated to be initially \$6,545,986 in 2024 when the Surcharge begins and is expected to total \$26,154,891 by 2026 when all the installations are complete. The Surcharge is proposed to be reviewed annually by the Commission beginning September 2024. The Surcharge estimated rates for 2024-2026 by rate schedule are shown below:


