Third and Final Round of Discussions on the Proposed Levy Tax

Tucker County Ambulance Authority Treasurer Chris Davis and Commissioner Fred Davis were on deck at the Davis Fire Hall to discuss any questions pertaining to the proposed levy tax. The levy tax will be voted on by the citizens of Tucker County in this election ending May 10. Early voting has already begun.

The biggest concern for all of those in attendance seemed to be where the money is spent that is allocated for EMS. C. Davis explained the budget for the EMS is at a shortfall and extra funding is needed in order to maintain quality service throughout Tucker County. C. Davis stated:

"All audits have been turned into County Clerk Sherry Simmons, at this time and are available for the public to review."

C. Davis explained the need for two ambulances and qualified EMT and paramedic personnel. At the current time the Tucker County EMT salary is \$13.50 an hour and \$16 for paramedics. The goal is raising those salaries to \$16 for EMTs and \$19 for paramedics. With those proposed salaries EMS will be able to obtain qualified personnel. Two running, full equipped ambulances would allow those qualified personnel to operate at higher standard and cover more ground in the county.

The proposed budget for the 2022/2023 year for the

Ambulance Authority falls short of needed funding. The expenditures include Labor (\$976,063), Administrative (\$115,800), Equipment O&M (\$93,000), Equipment Replacement (\$146,000) and Miscellaneous Expenses (\$52,207) total to \$1,383,070. Revenues include Medical Bill-

ing Receipts (\$480,000),

Tucker County Commis-

sion (\$110,000), a capped

Hotel/Motel Tax Collec-

tion (\$100,000), and EMS

Ordinance (\$200,000) totals

\$890,000. This leaves a

shortfall of \$493,070, and

the reason for the proposed

levy tax.

The proposed levy on personal and real estate property, starting July 1, 2022, for four years will have the following rates: (cents per

\$100 of assessed value):

Class II 3.88 cents (Personal Residence/Farms) = .000388 X accessed value

Class III 7.76 cents (Rental Business/All Other) = .000776 X accessed value Class IV 7.76 cents (Municipality) = .000776 X accessed value

In other words, you take your assessed value from your tax and multiply it by .000388 for Class II, .000776 for Classes III and IV for the total levy due.

Example C. Davis gave an example was his own

tax bill from where he lives in Parsons. C. Davis stated: "My appraised value was at \$88,400. My assessed value was at \$53,040 at Class II. I would multiply those times .000388. Which gave me owing, the proposed levy taxes for my house and property, \$20.58. (53,040 X .000388 = 20.58)

My personal property like my car, camper, etc. is classified as a Class III. So, I would multiply that by .000776. With my couple of vehicles and camper my assessed value was \$28,555.

Which gives me a total of \$21.15. (28,500 X .000776 = 21.15)

All together that would put me owing \$42.73 (\$20.58 + \$21.15 = \$42.73) for the levy."

There will be a capped levy amount of \$401,872 and the proposed levy tax will be in place for the years 2022 to 2025. After 2025 the new levy will have to be passed to continue funding via this mechanism. Rates are based upon 2022 assessed values and as value

Commissioner Davis Announces Slated Shut Down of Veteran's Affair Clinic

Commissioner Fred Davis gave the devastating news that the Veteran's Affairs clinic in Parsons, is on the list to be shut down within the next ten years. Davis was highly upset at this news and has reached out Washington, D.C. to see what can be

done to prevent this from happening.

When Davis called to find out why the clinic may be closing, they stated the clinic in Buckhannon would be the main hub for the area. Davis disagrees saying, between the local veterans and the ones from surrounding areas, the Parsons clinic was

already a main hub for the area.

While talking to D.C. Davis explained the EMS situation currently in Tucker County and all of West Virginia. The spokes person in D.C. said they were not aware of the situation but would investigate it and get back to Davis by the end of the week.

Davis also reported that leachate from the Davis landfill would be transported to the Thomas landfill starting on Monday. There will be a limited amount taken in by Thomas landfill, but every little bit helps the Davis landfill.

Commissioner Lowell Moore reported the new John Deere lawn mower ordered for Camp Kidd will be delivered next week. The mower has been on order since February 3, 2022.

White thanked the Commission, as a fellow community member, for everything the Commission has done for Camp Kidd. White said: "Being the only shelter on this of the county it's a relief to know it's there if we ever need it." Rosenau said they will continue to work on the shelter in Thomas so that "God forbid anything was to happen, we will be prepared."

Rosenau excitedly announced the finding of the old Pulper Cemetery in Camp Kidd. Rosenau and Moore stated they have lived here all their lives and have never been able to find the cemetery. Rosenau said the way you could tell the cemetery was there were the sunken graves, for there were no markers or stones. Rosenau would like to look further into a project to preserve the graves from further damage.

Barb Means in the audience of the Commissioners meeting and spoke to them about the EMS audit. Means stated when she obtained a copy of the audit report it was only a summary of the money spent

by the EMS. Means requested there be a break down of every dime spent so the community knows where the money has been spent.

Commissioner Mike Rosenau suggested to Means that she go to the office of CPA Mark Joseph, and he should have any information she wished to acquire. Commissioner Fred Davis also stated that he would try to get an itemized copy of the audit as well. Davis said he would he get a copy to Means when obtained one himself.

Means stated: "Time is of the essence, voting on the levy is just a few days away. The community wants to see where the money is being spent before they vote yes or no."



the care of Mountain Hospice. He had been in declining health.



this levy if it passes is definitely going to increase what I pay, I'm happy to do it. Because I think it's really important that we do have reliable ambulance services. I am somebody who my son was 13 months old when I had to call an ambulance back in Arlington, Virginia and his life was saved because of EMS. I am very supportive of the levy because it's just basic stuff that we have to have."

Howell went to explain she reached out to Shelia Marsh of EMS to find out about response times to Canaan Valley. Marsh explained to Howell there were 41 calls to her zip code and 11 of those calls came to the valley. Response times ranged from 10 minutes to 78 minutes with an average of 27 minutes and if you the longest and shortest times off the average is 19 mins.

Howell expressed her concerns about 19 minutes being a long time waiting for an ambulance and what could be done to get an ambulance service back in Canaan Valley. C. Davis responded to inviting Howell to the Ambulance Authority meetings. C. Davis also explained that it was Canaan Valley that revoked their rental agreement for the building they

were using for EMS, and they have yet to find another building suitable.

Scott Kennedy went on to explain why the ambulance were stationed in Davis and not Canaan. Kennedy said that way the ambulance was either 12 to 15 minutes away from Canaan or 12 to 15 mins away from Parsons.

Next Jenny Helmick, who has lived in the Tucker County area since 1956, expressed a concern. Helmick stated: "I understand the lady's concern about the time the ambulances show up. It's a rural area and I know you are doing the best that you can. The problems have been the concerns of the residents of the town. There's been longer response times. They have not been equipped to where they can do anything to check the patients once they get there. This happened in my own family with my sister-in-law, who just happened to be a nurse. Her daughter fell out a truck window and they couldn't do anything because they didn't have the people on board, and they had to call Oakland to have them meet them to care of it. So, that's a problem.

Another concern the people had was seeing the ambulances parked at the Shop N Save, the Dollar Store, a restaurant or yard sales. I've worked multiple jobs my entire life. You eat your meals before you go to work, you schedule your lunch, you do it like you're supposed to do it. You're getting paid for an eighthour shift or whatever that's where you need to be. We don't want to see the ambulance parked anywhere else unless it's on a call."

Helmick went onto express what she felt was the biggest concern. That

concern for Helmick was: "Being there was no mention of if this levy passes, that the \$50 a year fee is going to be resumed. So now we're looking at a double whammy possibly. I know yal need money and if it comes down to one station, I also feel you should use the newer building that more equipped, that's centralized. Hopefully it doesn't come to that, but it may."

Helmick continued about expressing sympathy for the failure of legislation not passing the proposed Amusement Tax that could have been a solution for the problem.

C. Davis explained that the EMS crews were on shift for 24 hours with no scheduled lunch and regardless of where they are at the time if they receive a call, they respond immediately.

Sam Eichelberger who used to be a County Commissioner for 12 years gave a long and lengthy spell about his concerns. Eichelberger stated during his vears as Commissioner: "We were hit with this and that time we were all volunteers. There wasn't a paid person or anything. We had to try to get it by the horns and get it work. It was a slow step by step by step and we were trying to do it with the monies that were in place, so we fought."

Eichelberger went to explain how he and the other Commissioners at that time introduced what they called RAT (Recreational the Amusement Tax) tax back in 1996. Eichelberger said: "We fought like the devil and told them just as you did and that we are small county of 9,000 people.

That it didn't matter if you made one call to the ski resort you must have an ambulance that's available.

It doesn't matter how many runs you made. The more you made the better. But the thing of it is, we're supporting the whole county. How many calls were just for accidents besides ski accidents? There are all kinds.

Now we're supporting all these people. You know how with 9,000 people here, most of them are retired, living on a fixed income paying \$3.20 for a carton of eggs that was \$1.15 one year ago. And that's pretty hard to digest. So, what I'm saying is we got to look for other ways. I'll pay. I'll pay something, but I just don't see how we can fund it all."

Eichelberger went to explain that most of the elderly did not understand the concept of the levy tax. Those elderly just knew their taxes were going to increase and without confirmation of what the levy tax would consist of those elderly would vote against the levy tax.

Dennis Filler provided some information regarding the number of residents in Tucker County. The current total of residents is 6,850 not 9,000. Filler stated: "It used to be at one time, but on average we've been losing, on average, 40 residents of Tucker County on an annual basis. Doesn't mean we don't have a lot more homes here, but they are normally second home or VBRO's that kind of thing."

Filler went on discuss his take on the EMS situation by saying: "The amusement tax is one thing that we've tried. Freddie (F. Davis) and I met with McKinley last week. We are trying to see if there's a combination of state and federal and local funding to solve this problem. The real thing is that we have not yet been successful on that. Yes, the governor announced a byproduct of I think the Cares Act or one of those Acts from COVID. That there's a \$100 million dollars set aside out there. That sounds like a lot of money. On a per capita basis, I did the math, and it came out to be about \$38,000 is what Tucker County would see on a per capita basis of that \$100 million dollars being distributed equally across all

55 counties." Filler explained that along with the Commission they were trying all avenues to solve this problem. The levy isn't the only solution. If they didn't get it on the ballot for this election it would be another two plus years before they could present a solution again. Filler said: "That doesn't shrink the problem. It continues to grow, and the challenges continue to increase."

Filler then addressed staffing concerns mentioned earlier in the meeting. Filler stated: "That's why we are

proposing the staffing we are proposing to make sure. Because the nearest hospitals for us are either in Elkins or up in Maryland. It's a long way away.

If it takes 19 minutes for us to get to there, we have a magic hour classically. It's the golden rule we use to try to get folks to a triage treatment facility where they can receive care. It's why we want to make sure we have an ALS crew. Which is the top tier of performance that we can deliver on every running rig.

So, that's why in our budget we have built up that kind of staffing. So, if you don't aspire for that level of service, we certainly aren't going to be able to even come close to providing it."

F. Davis finished up the night by announcing the news of the ten-year plan to close the Veteran's Affair clinic in Parsons. F. Davis stated: "We have veterans in this county, and we have the VA clinic down in Parsons. We're on the list to be closed down. The VA people, they're trying to shut us down. I've got friends that let me know this. I said to them, "You can't do this to us." So, what they are wanting to do is send all the VA's in five or six counties to Upshur County and to Buckhannon We're on the list to be shut down in the next ten years and I really got upset. Everything is going wrong here. You talk about our EMS and hospitals and now they want to take away from our Veterans."

F. Davis went to explain that as a commissioner he would vote get rid of the \$50 fee if the levy passes. F. Davis also said he didn't have all the answer but wished he did. As County Commissioner F. Davis said he would continue to do what he could for the citizens of Tucker County.

F. Davis finished the meeting by saying: "The main thing about this, you've got the say. You're going to have the pencil to write yes or no. It's your choice. It's not going to be the Commissioner's choice. We did give you guys the choice this time.

So, if you're worried about how much you're going to pay. You can get ahold of Chris and he can tell you exactly what it is and it is on your car. If you got a ticket, just so you know we aren't hiding anything here, with a four-wheeler and you got a ticket coming in for that or your camping trailer, car, truck, and your house you're going to pay on them. So, nobody thinks I'm lying to them, if you have a tax ticket you pay for it. If you want it, vote for it. If you don't, you spoke. And if we win or lose, the people have spoken."

The hard-working women and men of the EMS, our Emergency Ambulance Service, are an essential service and they deserve our thanks - but they also need our support.

The County Commission has put on the ballot on May 10th a levy to provide extra tax dollars (just over ~\$400,000) per year from July 1, 2022 to July 1, 2025. While this means a small increase on our tax tickets, it's worth it, for the peace of mind of knowing that an ambulance service is available when there's an emergency. I will be voting FOR THE LEVY, and urge everyone to do

The information provided at recent public meetings has been clear and to the point: we have a shortfall due to several factors, and this temporary levy is the tool we need to use at this time to address the \$400,000 shortfall. These funds will help pay for this essential service, providing reasonable coverage for our large county (two crews) and other operational expenses, including pay rates for paramedics and EMTs that will help us retain the qualified personnel needed to run the service.

With no hospital in our county and no 24-hour emergency department either, the ambulance service and its EMTs, paramedics, staff and volunteers all work to fill that gap in emergency medical care.

I live on Limestone Mountain, near Saint George, which is near Parsons. Like many in the county, I have firsthand experience with loved ones who have needed to utilize emergency services and am so grateful that the EMS and all its affiliated and essential services - fire, EMO, and all else--have been there when needed.


Thank you, Tucker County, for having such dedicated paid and volunteer workforces.

Charleston WV - The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

May 4, 1896: The Children's Home Society was formed by a group of Charleston ministers at the YMCA. Their goal was to place orphaned and neglected children with caring families rather than crowd them into county poorhouses.

May 5, 1923: A fire started by welders working on a new swimming pool destroyed most of Luna Park, an amusement park in Charleston. Although Luna's owners announced that they would rebuild, the park never reopened.

May 5, 1923: Golfer Bill Campbell was born in Huntington. He won more than 30 championships over a seven-decade career and is considered one of the best amateur players in history.

May 6, 1812: Activist and physician Martin Robison Delany was born in Charles Town. In February 1865, he was commissioned as a major in the U.S. Colored Troops.

He was the only African-American Civil War officer to be given a field com-

May 6, 1968: A continuous miner machine at the Gauley Coal & Coke Saxsewell No. 8 mine cut into an adjacent mine, which was filled with water. The resulting flood drowned four miners and trapped 21 others.

May 7, 1857: William Alexander MacCorkle was born in Rockbridge County, Virginia, on his father's plantation. He served as West Virginia's ninth governor.

May 7, 1928: The Keith-Albee Theater opened in Huntington. The opening program featured a comedy called "Good Morning, Judge," a newsreel, and five stage acts. But the theater itself, with its elaborate interior, clearly was the star of the evening.

May 7, 1983: The New River Gorge National Park and Preserve began operations when the first visitor center opened near Fayetteville.

May 8, 1864: Clarence Wayland Watson was born in Fairmont. Watson was a prominent coal baron and served in the U.S. Senate from 1911 to 1913.

May 8, 1998: Senator Jennings Randolph died at the age of 96. He was first elected to Congress in 1932 and served for 40 years.

May 9, 1843: Confederate spy "Belle" Boyd was born in Martinsburg. On July 4, 1861, Belle shot a Yankee soldier and started her spy career.

May 9, 1863: Confederate raiders arrived at Burning Springs, Wirt County. There they set fire to 150,000 barrels of oil, oil tanks, engines for pumping, engine houses, wagons, and oil-laden boats.

May 10, 1908: The first official observance of Mother's Day was held at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton and simultaneously Philadelphia. The holiday resulted from a vigorous campaign by Anna Jarvis who wanted to commemorate the spirit of her mother's work as a social

May 10, 1960: John F. Kennedy defeated Hubert Humphrey in the West Virginia primary. It dispelled the widely held belief that being a Roman Catholic was a crippling handicap for a presidential candidate.



Counselor Godfrey worked closely with Nanette Seligman, Chairwoman of the TCCC committee for Career Day to invite and secure area Employers, Trade





