
other staff members that helped our class. But mostly I could not have done it without the help of my own classmates."

Sandra Bohon from the Family Resource Network petitioned the Tucker County Commission for the proclamation.


Director of St. George Medical Clinic Behavioral Mental Health, Amber Gump, presented the proclamation to the Commission and the audience.

The proclamation said metal illnesses affect every family in America with millions of adults and children are disabled by mental illnesses every year. People with mental illnesses recover if given the necessary services and supports in their communities and in return make contributions to families and communities.

Stigma and fear discrimination have kept many individuals who would receive help from mental health services from seeking help. Research shows that the most effective way to reduce stigma is through personal contact with someone with mental illness. Greater public awareness about mental illnesses can change negative attitudes and behaviors toward people with mental illnesses.

Davis' Comprehensive Plan Moving Forward

What is a comprehensive plan? According to the draft comprehensive plan for the Town of Davis, "A comprehensive plan is the foundation for future development, redevelopment, and conservation in a community. Without a plan in place, communities often struggle to make informed resource and land use decisions. The comprehensive plan for Davis will serve as a tool to enhance the quality of life of residents and to guide investments regarding the town's

future. For each chapter, an existing conditions section will illustrate what has happened in the community in the past and what is occurring in the community today, so that the future trends may be determined. The following section will assess the needs within the community for the chapter's theme. What are the strengths and opportunities? What are the challenges and threats? The last section in each chapter is an action plan that addresses the needs and that helps the community realize its vision.

alize its vision.

The term comprehen-

sive is used because the plan looks at all facets of a community: Infrastructure, transportation, housing, land use, economic development, parks and recreation, natural resources, and community services.

A comprehensive plan does not create laws or ordinances for the municipalities; it does not create any regulations. It is, instead, a tool that recommends action plans to achieve the plan's goals."

The comprehensive plan is broken down into seven chapters and three categories for each chapter. Each chapter includes past and status of the town, a needs assessment, and an action plan. Board member Jeanette Ware listed the seven chapters included in the plan as land use, housing, transportation, economic development, infrastructure, public services, and tourism.

At the next Town of Davis Planning Commission meeting the members will discuss the survey results that were sent out six weeks ago and input from the public meeting held in Davis.

After the members feel they have made all necessary changes to the docu-

The following criminal complaint has been filed in the Tucker County Magistrate office:

Christopher St. Clair, Davis, was charged with one count of Attempted Petit Larceny. According to the complaint on April, 25 at 10:19 p.m. Sgt. V.J. Pyles received a call from Tucker 911. The call was from the assistant manager at Shop-n-Save in Davis. Pyles was advised that the store was now closed but they had a larceny type complaint involving an employee.

On April 26 Pyles made contact with the original caller and complainant, Jodi Drenning. She advised that one of her employees, Christopher St. Clair had been caught in possession of several cartons of cigarettes and other soon to be noted items which he did not pay for. Video footage was said to be available and ready to be picked up on April 28. She advised that the subject in question was staying at Q&A Associates and also that Caleb Johnson (Mentor) and Keith Bishop with the Q&A responded to the store and gained more items stolen from the vehicle of the defendant. All unconsumed items were recovered on April 25 at the store upon closing. On April 28 Pyles met with the manager, Jack Shaffer. He provided Pyles with a list of alleged stolen/recovered items. ment, they will send a draft copy to the Town of Davis Council for review. If the Davis Council sees the document is satisfactory the Council will then host a public meeting for further comments. A 90-day period for amendments follows before the Town Council either rejects or adopts the plan.

President of the Town of Davis Planning Commission Brian Sarfino summed his reasoning for being on the board as, "Growth is inevitable and desirable. But the structure of community character is not. The question is not whether your part of the world is going to change. The question is how."

Board member Samantha Gravelle explained that printed copies of the purposed comprehensive plan can be found in the Davis Town Hall office and on the Town of Davis website. Gravelle said, "We very much encourage you to open the document. Look at it. Because we really need everybody's input and feedback to make sure we are planning for the future of our town."

Pat Nichols was in attendance and said, "I do not see this as a Davis issue. I see it as a Mountain Top issue." Nichols questioned whether

the Davis Planning Commission had been working with the Thomas Planning Commission. Sarfino explained that both entities were working together until COVID-19 started in the area. Since then, Thomas has stopped working with Davis, but Davis has continued to work to complete their plan.

Unidentified members of the audience asked questions or expressed concerns to the Planning Commission. One person questioned if the plan would be put up for vote. The Commission explained that per state code the Comprehensive Plan was not allowed to be placed on a ballot for vote.

Another expressed concern about jobs in the area that were beyond tourism jobs. This audience speaker said, "People need jobs here. Not have to leave to get jobs. We have an industrial park with no industry. Bring good paying jobs back to the area." The Commission explained this area of concern is mentioned in the economic development portion of the plan. Having manufacturing brought into the area to boost economic growth was a goal of the plan. Along with getting houses for workers.

The Town of Davis Planning Commission encourages the public to attend the next meeting on June 6 at the Davis Town Hall.

the well-being of families, communities, schools, and businesses. St George Medical Clinic supplies a wide variety of mental health services to children, adults and families according to Gump. Gump said, "We have a great staff of phycologists. We do groups with substance abuse problems. We have our main clinic, our school-based clinic and on June 1we will have our clinic in Canaan. We care a lot about our patients and want to supply services for the people of this community. That's our passion and our mission."

During the audience comments of the Commissioner's meeting guest speaker Okee Eye stood to address the commission requesting a disclosure of the EMS expenditure reports from 2019 to present. Eye said he has made several requests to get the information requested but has "received nothing but a run around and do not want to show us the books." Eve would like to see the reports that show where every dime is being spent for the EMS and requested the Commission to put a hold on the money being requested by EMS during the meeting.

Commissioner Lowell Moore explained they could not hold money that already belonged to the EMS. Moore said, "We are waiting on legal advice. We must do what legal says. The \$50,000 they are asking for is their money not ours. It is in a Tucker County EMS fund. It is their money."

Commissioner Mike Rosenau backed Moore by saying he had talked to the EMS treasurer and

was informed the money requested was for payroll. Rosenau said, "I can not sit here and not actually have the person that has worked not receive a pay check because I am holding their funds."

Rosenau went on to inform Eye that if he feels like there is something illegal going on then he can report those suspicions to the Secretary of State. Once the determination is made by the Secretary of State and has reached out to the party in question, that party must respond to the Secretary of State in a prompt manner and explain why they have not complied.

Rosenau said, "The information we have received (from EMS) has been the best we have ever received in the past six months."

Eye stated, "I do not care if they want to buy the zip drive and put it (the request expenditure report) on there and I will pay for the zip drive. But I think it is entirely hypocritical of these folks (EMS) to come in here and beat us for money and we wanted to give them money. We need the EMS. I understand that along with any other person here with common sense. But be open with us, be honest with us, and show us what it is."

Commissioner Fred Davis agreed with Eye and said he would pay for a copy himself and get it to Eye as soon as possible. Davis said the EMS should have to just given Eye the copy of the information he was requesting because, as far as public opinion goes, it would look a lot better for EMS to do so. Davis also agreed with Rosenau

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and said, "The people that is doing the books now and the board they have now is doing an excellent job. But what they did in the past scares us to death, and I understand what you are saying."

In other Commission news:

Moore was re-appointed to the Corridor H board effective July 1 through June 30, 2025. Moore has been on the board since the very beginning of the Corridor H construction. Moore thanked his fellow Commissioners for the reappointment.

Davis was re-appointed to the Solid Waste Management Board effective July 1 through June 30, 2026. Rosenau stated that Davis has done an excellent job on the board, and it was good to still have a voice on that board.

Director of Tucker County's Homeland Security Emergency Management (OEM) Kevin White has been appointed by Senator Randy Smith to the First Responder's Honor Board. According to state code 29-32-2, the purpose of the board is to recommend to the Legislature firefighters, law-enforcement officers, and emergency medical services personnel in West Virginia who have distinguished themselves conspicuously by gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of their lives above and beyond the call of duty in the performance of their duties to be awarded a Medal of Valor, Medal of Honor, or a Medal of Bravery.

The next Tucker County Commission meeting will be held on Wednesday, June 8, 2022. Meetings are open to the public.

15, 2017, in Parsons, he married Tammy Lynn Harrison Snider, who survives.



Charleston WV - The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

June 1, 1880: The bareknuckle prize fight for the championship of the world was held in the Brooke County town of Colliers. between defending champion Joe Goss and challenger Paddy Ryan. Boxing was illegal in every state, and matches were often held in railroad villages to avoid big city police.

June 1, 1935: Musician Hazel Dickens was born in Mercer County, the eighth of 11 children. She was a pioneering old-time and bluegrass musician, known for preserving the traditional vocal styles of West Virginia.

June 2, 1951: Cornelius Charlton died of the wounds he received in battle during the Korean War. Charlton, a Raleigh County native, was awarded the Medal of Honor posthumously.

June 3, 1856: Harriet B.

Jones was born in Pennsylvania. After attending Wheeling Female College and graduating from the Women's Medical College of Baltimore, she opened a private practice in Wheeling, becoming the first woman licensed to practice medicine in West Virginia.

June 3, 1936: The first Strawberry Festival was Buckhannon. held in More than 6,000 spectators attended the festivities, which also included a parade of 30 princesses down Main Street.

June 4, 1975: Clark Kessinger died in St. Albans, Kanawha County. Kessinger was among the most prolific and influential fiddlers of the 20th century, and one of West Virginia's most important traditional musicians.

June 5, 1859: A great frost killed crops in the Preston County fields. The fields were replanted with hardy buckwheat, which was successful and became a staple crop, celebrated in the annual Buckwheat Festival in Kingwood.

June 6, 1919: Histo-

rian Otis Rice was born in Hugheston, Kanawha County. Rice was named West Virginia's first Historian Laureate in 2003.

June 6, 1989: During the Pittston strike, about 60 miners embarked on a four-day march from Logan County to Charleston, retracing the path of the 1921 Armed March on Logan.

June 7, 1899: Congresswoman Elizabeth Kee was born in Radford, Virginia. She became West Virginia's first female member of Congress in 1951.

June 7, 1926: An explosion at a sand mining operation in Morgan County killed six men. Their deaths were the inspiration for the ballad "The Miner's Doom."

WVDA Awards over \$400,000 in Farmer & Ranchers Stress **Assistance Grants**

CHARLESTON, W.Va. - The West Virginia Department of Agriculture (WVDA) has awarded three projects a share of \$401,834 in 2021 West Virginia Farmers and Ranchers Stress Assistance Network (FRSAN) grants. The purpose of the FRSAN program is to establish a network that connects individuals who are engaged in farming, ranching and other agriculturally related occupations to stress assistance programs. Projects had to focus on initiating, expanding or sustaining programs that provide professional agricultural behavioral health counseling and referrals for other forms of assistance.

"These are federal COVID relief dollars appropriated to states to help mitigate the impact of the pandemic. Given rising energy costs, inflation and supply chain issues, many farmers are feeling increased anxiety and stress," said Commissioner of Agriculture Kent Leonhardt. "Ensuring we continue to keep our agricultural production high is essential to the economy of our state and the security of our citizens. These projects aim to improve the mental health outcomes of our producers."

The following projects were funded:

- Coalfield Development Corporation (Lincoln and Wayne Counties)- \$197,616: "From the Ground Up: Connecting Farmers and Ranchers with Community Supports for Stress Reduction"
- West Virginia Military Authority (Statewide)-\$102,040: "Patriot Merging Guardens: Mental Health and Stress Assistance with Agriculture Production"
- West Virginia University Research Corporation (Statewide) - \$101,554: "West Virginia Network for Rural Mental Health and Farm Stress"

Grant recipients have 18 months to plan, implement and gather data on their respective projects. The USDA awarded \$28 million to individual State Departments of Agriculture or such equivalent departments.

Fish & Wildlife Service, US Army Corps of Engineers), Groups and Individuals This is to give notice that the City of Parsons has determined that the following proposed action under HUD's Community Development Block Grant program and federal award 20CDBG0005 is partially located in the 100-year floodplain, and the Parsons City Council will be identifying and evaluating practicable alternatives to locating the action in the floodplain and the potential impacts on the floodplain from the proposed action, as required by Executive Order 11988, in accordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 Subpart C Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Management and Protection of Wetlands. This project is proposing to create a connection between the City of Parsons' and Hamrick PSD's water distribution systems in the Bretz area of Tucker County to provide a secondary source of potable water to customers during an emergency. Activities located in the floodplain will be limited to

installation of necessary waterlines and will generally occur within existing road rights-of-way. There are three primary purposes for this notice. First, people who may be affected by activities in floodplains and those who have an interest in the protection of the natural environment should be given an opportunity to express their concerns and provide information about these areas. Commenters are encouraged to offer alternative sites outside of the floodplains, alternative methods to serve the same project purpose, and methods to minimize and mitigate impacts. Second, an adequate public notice program can be an important public educational tool. The dissemination of information and request for public comment about floodplains can facilitate and enhance Federal efforts to reduce the risks and impacts associated with the occupancy and modification of these special areas. Third, as a matter of fairness, when the Federal government determines it will participate in actions taking place in floodplains,



Immune-compromised persons such as those with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) included rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in sources water before we treat it include:

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, livestock operations and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming. Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as storm water run-off, agricul-

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or the result of mining activity.

Organic contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and also come from gas stations, urban storm water run-off, and

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulation which limits the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. We treat our water according to EPA's regulations. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Our water system has an estimated population of 1739 and is required to test a minimum of 2 samples per month in accordance with the Total Coliform Rule for microbiological contaminants. Coliform bacteria are usually harmless, but their presence in water can be an indication of disease-causing bacteria. When coliform bacteria are found, special follow-up tests are done to determine if harmful bacteria are present in the water supply. If this limit is exceeded, the water supplier must notify the public. Water Quality Data

The following tables list all of the drinking water contaminants which were detected during the 2021 calendar year. The presence of these contaminants does not necessarily indicate the water poses a health risk. Unless noted, the data presented in this table is from the testing done January 1- December 31, 2021. The state requires us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. Some of the data, though representative of the water quality, is more than one year old.

Terms & Abbreviations

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG): the "Goal" is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to human health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety. Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL): the "Maximum Allowed" MCL is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Secondary Maximum Contaminant Level (SMCL): recommended level for a contaminant that is not regulated and has no MCL

Action Level (AL): the concentration of a contaminant that, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other

requirements. **Treatment Technique (TT)**: a required process intended to reduce levels of a

contaminant in drinking water.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL): the highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Non-Detects (ND): lab analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present. Parts per Million (ppm) or milligrams per liter (mg/1)

Parts per Billion (ppb) or micrograms per liter(ug/l)

<u>Picocuries per Liter (pCi/L)</u>: a measure of the radioactivity in water.

Millirems per Year (mrem/yr): measure of radiation absorbed by the body.

Monitoring Period Average (MPA): An average of sample results obtained during a defined time frame, common examples of monitoring periods are monthly, quarterly and yearly. Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU): a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is

just noticeable to the average person. Turbidity is not regulated for groundwater systems.

Running Annual Average (RAA): an average of sample results obtained over the most current 12 months and used to determine compliance with MCLs.

Locational Running Annual Average (LRAA): Average of sample analytical results for samples taken at a particular monitoring location during the previous four calendar quarters.
