

Knotts, Stiles take Commission Nominations; Levy Fails

It's Primary Election time already and the votes have been counted. This is considered an off year and there are few challenged races. The item that has generated a lot of discussion this year has been the EMS Levy, this levy will provide funds for the EMS only.

The levy was the County Commissioners way of allowing the citizens to have a say in funding the EMS. The EMS Fee that was imposed upon the counties citizens has not generated the funds that were anticipated. The proposed Ambulance Excess Levy is capped at \$401,000.00 in any fiscal year. If the levy is passed, it will allow for the levy for the fiscal years of 2022, 2023, 2024

and 2025 only. The levy would then end. Then, the Ambulance Excess Levy would have to be put back on the ballot for another vote. The voters could then either vote to renew or end the levy at that time. On the current ballot, voters had the option to mark For The Levy or Against The Levy.

According to the unofficial vote totals, the Ambulance Excess Levy failed. The vote was 919 for the levy and 1,137 against the levy.

I received the following message from the Ambulance Authority. "On behalf of the Tucker County Ambulance Authority and the professionals of the Tucker County EMS, we would like to thank the residents of Tucker County for the election turnout and their consideration on

Woodlands Development Group Working to Renovate School Board Building

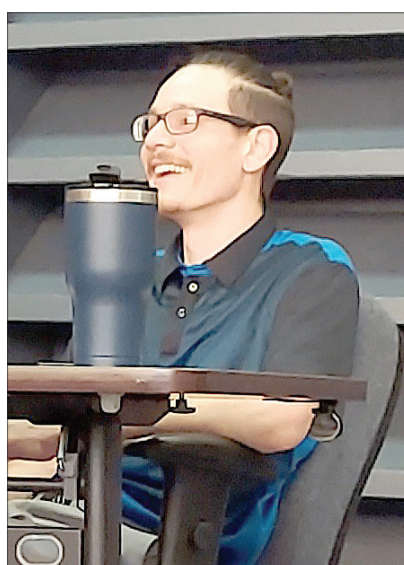
Emily Wilson-Hauger and Dave Clark updated the Board of Education on the progress being made in transferring the School Board building to Woodlands. Woodlands has tried to obtain financing for the building, but it is not working out. To find funding to keep the non-profit organizations and the current businesses in the building has been challenging according to Clark. Clark hopes to pursue a couple other fronts including the State Historic Preservations supporting the building being named a historic building.

The other avenue Woodlands is attempting to pursue would be housing tax credits. They are competitive tax credits that are administered through the public housing authority. Clark stated it is estimated to be about 2.5 mil to renovate the building. In order to complete the application for the tax credit Woodlands would need to sign the Board approved transfer of property and a discloser document.

The transfer will state it

is contingent upon everything working out including the finances. The discloser document states that the Board understands that they are transferring to Woodlands for the renovation of the building for apartments and businesses.

Reachable green space will be needed in order to reach appropriate scoring with the tax credit. That entails having a space of the property that is flat and on the same parcel as the building. Clark stated the old playground area would provide the needed green space. This space

Honorable Judge Jordan Reigns Over Cases for Spitznogle, Roy, and Mook

Circuit Court Judge Jordan reigned over court for Judge Courrier in the matter of State verses Darrell Spitznogle. Courrier was out sick but is due back in court soon after recovery. Spitznogle, of Davis, 53 at the time of arrest, has been charged with three counts of sexual abuse and one count of sexual assault after a minor told authorities they had been abused by the accused for a period of three years.

The minor stated that Spitznogle had sexually abused him during multiple incidents throughout the time he was nine to 11 years old, according to the complaint, and during that three-year period, there were three incidents.

These incidents, deputies said, occurred at the Sawmill Lodge, during which Spitznogle allegedly touched

Progress made on projects for Parsons

Progress is being made in the demolition of the old Paint Store in Parsons. Dave Clark updated the City Council by stating the Woodlands Development Group has made headway. Clark and Emily Wilson-Hauger have been diligently working to find grants and funding for the demolition.

One such source could be the Small Town Grant for demolition in small towns. Clark stated: "Don't know when the money will roll out. The state has \$10 mil to allocate for demolitions. It will come. Just a question of when."

Clark, Wilson-Hauger, and the City of Parsons want to ensure that the building is unoccupied. The current tenants will be given the opportunity to remove any items out of the building that they wish to keep.

Then the first three steps of the process can begin. First, Woodlands will secure the building. Then, they will obtain ownership. Finally, clean-up can proceed. The clean-up process most likely will include asbestos removal. An asbestos test has been conducted on the building and the results should be ready this week. Clark mentioned the removal of asbestos before demolition was more cost efficient than finding it during the demolition and having to stop to remove the asbestos.

Honorable Judge Nelson Presides Over Plumley, Riggs, and Heckler Cases

Honorable Judge Nelson presided over three cases in Circuit Court this week. Two cases involving Jason Plumley and Travis Riggs were status decisions. The case of Dylon Heckler verses Estate of Wanda Freeman was a pre-trial motion.

Jason Plumley walked into court facing charges stemming from a stolen woodchipper from First Energy in 2019. Plumley's attorney Mr. Nichols represented Plumley and entertained a motion for discovery. Nichols went on record to say the current discovery did not contain all the information obtained by the Parsons Police Department.

Tucker County Prosecuting Attorney Savannah Hull Wilkins went on record to show that the requested information was indeed included in the discovery. Wilkins named the pages on which the information could be found. Wilkins stated: "At this point Mr. Nichols has what he has requested."

The Judge set trial for July 13 and 14 at 9 a.m.

Travis Riggs represented by attorney Phil Isner were in court to place

a motion for bond. Bond was denied based on Riggs breaking the rules of a protective order in place and contacting victim. Information of pending charges in Randolph County (eight pending) and Magistrate Court (six pending) were also considered.

Riggs is charged with home confinement violation (house arrest) in January of 2022 and bond violation in November of 2021. Judge Nelson set trial for August 30 and 31 at 9 a.m.

In the case involving Dylon Heckler verses the estate of Wanda Freeman, the plaintiff's attorney Isner was in court and the attorney for the defendant, Mr. Mohler, was present by phone. Mohler entertained a motion to not include any expert wit-

nesses in the upcoming trial to Judge Nelson.

This motion was presented due to the fact Isner had not sent the discovery of information to Moyler. Judge Nelson ordered Isner to present the discovery to Moyler on the same day court was held.

The case involves Dylon Heckler, who was involved in a serious car accident five years ago. At which point Heckler was 15 and is now 20. Heckler is suing for medical bills and PTSD caused by the accident.

Trial is set to begin on May 13 and Judge Nelson hopes both parties involved can mediate and get the issues settled.

must be 30 percent of the entire land parcel.

Board member Jessica Wamsley said: "I've seen some of the places you guys have done and it's wonderful. It's marvelous. And it should have happened a long time ago." The Board was given the opportunity to come up with a name for the building.

Amber Kyle provided an attendance report as of April 28. There are 951 currently enrolled students in the Tucker County school district. Attendance has dropped .09 percent but is normal for this time of year. Kyle said: "To not have big shifts (in attendance) is pretty good. We've gone up from the beginning of the year which is most important."

From the first semester to currently the chronic absenteeism has raised from 22.22 percent to 24.28 percent. Most of which is due to illnesses associated with this time year.

Homeschooling is on the rise with 106 students being homeschooled. Kyle reported that five homeschooled students have moved from the county, two have reenrolled in regular school,

and 13 have entered homeschooling with 10 of those being on the high school level.

The Board discussed what options could be made to encourage students to attend school on a more regular basis. Some ideas bounced around were bringing back some of the field trips the schools previously have conducted. The Board also want to make changes to the attendance rules that include a student being unable to attend school functions if their attendance is not up to par.

Other School Board business included the approval of the following: TVEMS Pre-K will take a field trip to the Pittsburgh Zoo; Megan Helmick and Valerie Eye will have a class field trip to Deep Creek Maryland on May 19, 2022.

Mike Cooper resignation as TCHS Golf Coach effective immediately was approved by the board. The open position will be posted. Angelina Downs was approved for substitute teacher for the 2021 school year. Kayla DiBartolomeo will be a long-term substitute aide for TVEMS

effective May 3 for the remainder of the school year.

The Board voted to approve new positions for the ProStart Summer School including Art, Science, Enrichment, and ATV safety teachers.

New access control panels were approved for DTEMS and TCHS. The controls will include cameras stationed through out the schools and property. There will also be a card swipe module placed to gain access to the schools.

Lastly and regretfully, the Board approved the resignation of Kevin Gills as Executive Secretary effective May 13, 2022. Gills and his family have the opportunity to become homeowners in another county. The Board wished him well and good luck on his next adventure. Julia Burnside will take over of the position as Executive Secretary effective May 3, 2022.

The next Board of Education meeting will be held on Monday, May 16, 2022, at 4:30 p.m. at the Tucker County Board of Education office. All meetings are open to the public.

We need some more people to go with us on June 2, 2022 to Johnstown, PA to see a play titled "Popcorn Falls." Broadway World called it "laugh-out-loud, comedic genius." Popcorn Falls is a small town whose only claim to fame, their namesake waterfall, had dried up. Now bankrupt, their only chance for survival is a large grant that can only be used if the town produces play in a week. One big problem: no playhouse. Another problem: no play. Led by the mayor and the local handyman, the enterprising townspeople try to rise to the challenge and prove that art can save the world. **Oh and did I mention that the 20 citizens of Popcorn Falls are played by just 2 actors?!** The current price is \$125 for the play and the bus. If we can get more people to go we can lower the price closer to \$100 per person. You will be responsible for the cost of your own dinner.

The dates for the Lancaster trip are July 19th and 20th. The cost will be \$320 per person based on double occupancy. If you have not made your first payment, the full payment is due on May 19, 2022.

We still have places for the Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta. The dates for this trip are September 30, 2022 to October 6, 2022. The total cost will be \$2400 per person based on double occupancy. Final payments must be made by June 15, 2022. We will be taking a bus to the airport so you don't have to worry about that.

The first scheduled date for a performance at the Gandy Dancer Theatre is the Legends show on Friday evening at 6:00 p.m. on July 15, 2022. The price is \$38 if you provide your own transportation and \$45 if you ride the van. We're trying to keep the prices down but as you all know, the price of gas has gone up greatly. The trip to Tygart Lake has been changed to Stonewall Lake near Weston. Their trip is 2 hours and includes a taco bar lunch. We have reserved a bus for August 23, 2022. The price will be \$90. If your name is on the Tygart Lake list and you are unable to go to Stonewall on August 23rd please let us know as soon as possible.

Progress

The Parsons Emergency Water Preparedness and Resiliency Project is also making head way for the City of Parsons and the Hamrick PSD. Mayor Dorothy Judy upon approval of Council members has signed an Intragovernmental Agreement that will enable both entities, in the event of an emergency, to purchase needed water from each other. The project has received needed approval from the State of WV Office of Environmental Health Services as well as Warren Judy to allow connection on his property on the Parsons side of the Blackfork River.

The Intragovernmental Agreement will now go to Hamrick PSD during their upcoming meeting

on May 9 at 4 p.m. Providing no majority objection the agreement will then be signed by Hamrick PSD. Three right of way agreements will need to be signed to finish the requirements for the project to go to bid.

Council Member Tim Auvil gave an update on the proposed water rate adjustment and tap fees. The Council had already voted in favor of a 10 percent increase in the water rate. This increase is to cover the debt percentage and qualify for the grant monies for the Water System Improvement Project as the City of Parsons' MHI (Medium Household Income) has raised \$6,900. The last increase of rate was 10 years ago.

There will be no change to the leak adjustments but there will be an increase in the tap fee. The current rate is \$300 and will be raised to \$600 or actual cost of installation. Auvil mentioned currently it cost roughly \$590 for a new tap in the water lines, so the city taking a loss by only charging \$300. Sewer will remain at \$400.

These changes will have to be made in the City Ordinances and must be read at three City Council meetings before taking effect. The first reading will take place at the next City Council meeting.

Parsons Police Chief Kevin Keplinger reported the new speed sign is working extremely well. Keplinger praised the sign for being easy to mount, easy to operate, and easy to transfer to different locations. Keplinger mentioned Lover's Lane, Pennsylvania Ave, and Chestnut Street as potential locations for the sign. The ball field during game times was also an option. Keplinger said: "It's a great tool."

The sign registers speeds as drivers pass by. It does not send out tickets, scan your license plates or alert the police in any way. The data gathered from the sign is used to determine high traffic areas and areas of concern. The sign will only digitally show speeds up to 40 mph but will register the data for any speed over.

Keplinger has plans to obtain a quote for a second sign and additional brackets. The second sign will be used in addition to the first sign to monitor the speeds of drivers from both lane

directions on a road.

Former City Treasurer Jason Myers gave credit to Council member Mellissa Jones for the speed sign idea. Myers said: "Thank you for the suggestion and pushing it through."

Keplinger updated the City Council on the hiring of a new patrolman by saying he only had two applicants at the current time. Keplinger believes the slow response could be that the West Virginia State Police were given a \$10,000 raise and the Tucker County Commissioners have given a raise to the deputies of Tucker County. This raise brings the deputies up to \$21 an hour.

Finishing his update, Keplinger gave praise to the new Code Enforcement Officer for already making a difference in the city and doing proactive work. Keplinger stated: "Really pleased. Works with people well." Keplinger mentioned that the Code Enforcement Officer is currently working out of a cruiser until his Traverse can be fixed and modified.

Council members voted in favor of a \$250 sponsorship to the Highlands Trail Foundation's Blackwater Canyon Half Marathon on September 10, 2022.

The next City Council Meeting is scheduled for 6 p.m., May 17, 2022, at the Charles W. "Bill" Rosenau Municipal Building, 341 Second Street, Parsons, West Virginia. If you would like to place an item on the agenda, feel free to contact Parsons Business Office at 304.478.2311.

the juvenile's genitals and forced the juvenile to touch his genitals. On one of those occasions, according to the complaint, Spitznogle allegedly sexually assaulted the juvenile, who resisted. The boy stated that he did not disclose the incidents because Spitznogle threatened him with comments such as "people will hate you," and the "business will fail without me," deputies said.

Spitznogle is being held in Tygart Valley Regional Jail awaiting trial by jury.

Trevor Roy entered the courtroom with the Honorable Judge Jordan presiding. Roy was found competent to stand trial for the domestic assault charges brought against him. Pre-trial for Roy's case was set for June 13 at 1:45 p.m. to be heard by Judge Courier.

Judge Jordan heard the case of Tammy Mook.

Mook's lawyer Mr. Easton requested additional mental records on Mook. According to the article written by Heather Clower (writer for *The Parsons Advocate*) in October of 2020: "Tammy Mook, of the Dry Fork area, was arraigned on four counts of burglary and one count of arson.

Representing T. Mook was Defense Attorney Brent Easton. Judge Courier informed her of the potential sentences associated with these crimes, which are one to 15 years per each burglary charge, and a definitive sentence of two to 20 years for arson.

According to case files, a confident, cooperating informant (CI) made several calls from Tygart Valley Regional Jail, knowing the calls were recorded, the CI spoke of multiple burglaries that coincide with an increase in crime of rental

and vacation dwellings in the Canaan Valley area. On May 22, 2020, (Prosecuting Attorney at the time of indictments) Ray LaMora requested Investigator Kevin Keplinger to obtain copies of the recordings in preparation for a bond reduction hearing.

On June 11, 2020, Keplinger received the recording which included 89 phone calls ranging in times from eight minutes and 53 seconds to 22 minutes and 32 seconds to various people. On recording number 40, which lasted six minutes and eight seconds, the CI spoke to a female subject when the topic of burglaries was brought up. "It was Tammy...Tammy Nelson (Mook)...and me," said the CI.

During an interview with the CI, details relating to the burglary and arson, taking place on February 28

of 2019, of a dwelling on 1675 Dry Fork Road were provided where Nelson allegedly told T. Mook to burn the house. The report said Nelson stated he had been trying to purchase the property and the value would decrease and the owners may agree to sell. According to the interview, T. Mook and the CI allegedly entered the dwelling, removed numerous items, including "a really old registration," before T. Mook and the CI allegedly placed rags in the sink, poured cooking oil on the rags, and then struck matches to start the fire. The CI further stated that he/she had a video on Facebook Messenger detailing the crime, which was then provided. The CI also referred to L. Mook using walkie talkies and monitoring scanner traffic as the crimes were taking place.

On July 21, 2020, a search warrant was issued and performed at the residence of the CI which uncovered several of the items described as stolen from the dwelling, including owl decor and an old registration with the last name of Huffman.

Canaan Valley Fire Department Chief Robert Metzger was consulted about the fire they responded to where he stated the structure was fully involved when they arrived at 6:41 a.m. The owner of the property is listed as Martinsburg resident, Mary Rouse. Upon contact, she acknowledged that the property was a family-owned vacation dwelling, and the grandfather's last name was Huffman. Rouse then recalled some owl decor and other items that would have been in the dwelling that was found at the residence of the CI.

Rouse was asked if she had any idea of someone with a motive to set fire to the property. She responded by saying the only person she could think of was James Nelson. She said that Nelson (allegedly) had been asking if the property was for sale and he had been told no. According to Rouse, Nelson had approached several family members asking about purchas-

ing the property and was told it was not for sale and re-approached the family just days after the fire and (allegedly) asked, "Since the house burnt down, and the property value was less if they would be interested in selling now."

On September 23, 2020, Investigator Keplinger and Tucker County Sheriff B.K. Wilfong escorted the CI to the Dry Fork Road and Flat Ridge area of Tucker County where he/she proceeded to identify several residences (allegedly) burglarized by T. Mook and the CI, including the residence of Linda Eddings in Red Creek. The CI stated that during the Eddings burglary, he/she dropped off T. Mook where she entered the residence by a back porch door. The CI then drove to Canaan Valley Store and waited approximately one hour before returning. At that time, T. Mook (allegedly) drug a yellow portable generator set taken from the residence to the vehicle driven by CI. The CI further stated that the last known location of the generator was (allegedly) on Allmosta Road, at the residence of Lester and Tammy Mook.

Mook's status hearing was reset for June 13 at 2 p.m. to be presided over by the Honorable Judge Courier.

Letter to the Editor

I am reacting to the Letter from Ms. Deborah McHenry in the April 27th issue of the Advocate. First I appreciate bringing the issue to the fore as we citizens who are affected and interested need to be involved and aware. Your letter comes across as one of highly responsible civic duty. But without knowing you, nor biased by any published data other than the public information on the Corridor H website, you also come across as one more thinly disguised activist whose main goal is delay. Is that true? I have followed this project for 40 years which is literally half of my life. I have dreamed of the day when my family and I could use Interstate quality highway for safer and faster travel both directions --East and West --

from Canaan where I have owned property since 1970. At least once a month I travel among my childhood farm in Harrison County, my place there in Canaan, and my home in southern Maryland. I care that Corridor H gets done. I'd really like to see it done while I am still able to drive. I have seen infuriating and senseless delays, 2 inch thick Environmental Impact documents, obscure zoological oddities and all manner of historical artifacts used to delay the project and they have largely succeeded. Absurdly so.

Now to some of the specific claims you made in your letter. The highway «bisects Thomas and Davis and will harm their character and economies? " Balderdash ! Nothing could be further from the truth. Virtually every resident there, all of us really, know that it will improve, not harm, their economies with long term benefit to the entire region. It will positively affect jobs, cash flow in most businesses and tourist activity. You claim DOH is "bent on crossing the canyon" whatever that means. You never explain. No such aspect shows on the latest published maps or news releases. Currently posted 2017 Alignment and Resource Location Plans show the "Preferred Alternative" routing none of which resembles "cannibalizing the communities of Thomas and Davis" that you mention. I think that gave away your true role. In fact the route appears to carefully avoid both towns. You are grasping at straws regarding "unstable reclaimed mine soil" and the highway leading to acid mine drainage which is flimsy speculation. Raising these issues 5 years after the alignment plan now that the schedule improved seems to me like an attempt to cause more delay.

It seemed to bother you that the construction date for the Parsons-Davis section has been moved up by 7 years from 2031 to 2024 as if that were some kind of dastardly deed. I say it means I may be able to use that section while I am still alive after all. I'm in favor of that.

Raspberry Lemonade

A refreshing summer drink made with freshly-squeezed lemon juice and raspberries.

- 1 cup fresh raspberries
- 1 cup warm water
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 ½ cups lemon juice about 10 lemons
- 6 cups cold water

Instructions
In a blender or food processor combine the raspberries, warm water and granulated sugar. Blend until pureed. With a bowl underneath to collect the mixture, pour the raspberry mixture into a fine mesh sieve. Use the back of a spoon to press the mixture into the sieve to remove as much liquid as possible, you should get about 1/4-1/3 cup raspberry liquid. Set aside.

Juice the lemons. With a bowl underneath to collect the mixture, pour the lemon mixture into a fine mesh sieve. Use the back of a spoon to press the mixture into the sieve to remove as much liquid as possible, you should get about 1 & 1/2 cups lemon juice.

In a large pitcher combine the lemon juice, raspberry juice and cold water. Taste and add more water if needed.

You can use fresh or frozen raspberries. If using frozen raspberries, thaw them first.

How to store: Store leftover lemonade in a covered pitcher for 3 to 4 days; give it a good stir before serving.

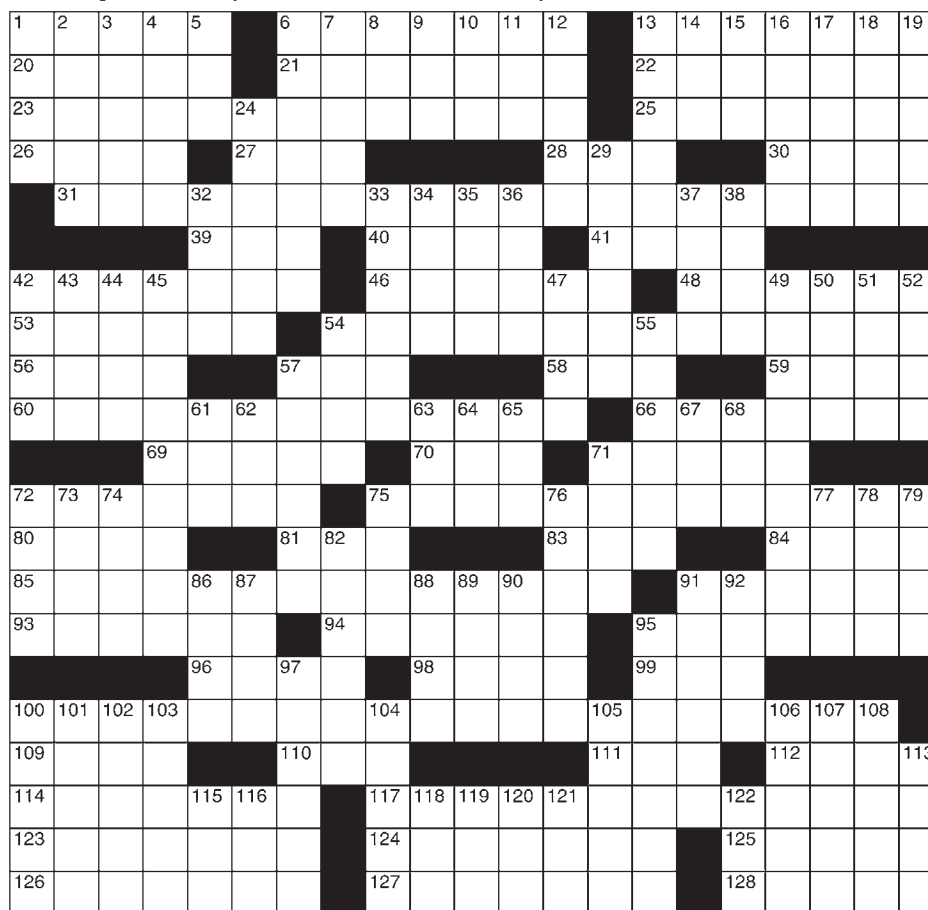

Charleston WV – The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

May 11, 1909: Filmmaker Ellis Dungan was born. After years of working in the feature film industry in India, he settled in Wheeling, where he shot documentaries and produced films for the state and the region.

May 11, 1930: Physician John C. Norman, Jr. was born in Charleston. A noted thoracic and cardiovascular surgeon and researcher, he was best known for his work toward creating an artificial heart.

May 12–14, 1921: Bullets peppered down on about a dozen mining towns in the Matewan-Williamson area, and non-union miners fired back, in what became known as the Battle of the Tug. Three people were shot and killed.

May 13, 1962: Editorial cartoonist Henry Payne was born in Charleston. In 1989, Payne was the first editorial cartoonist in the country to make his work available via computer.

May 14, 1878: Photographer Rufus "Red" Ribble was born in Blacksburg, Virginia. For nearly 40 years he traveled the coalfields making panoramic photographs of miners, towns, family reunions, church congregations and school groups.

May 14, 1906: Social reformer Mary Behner was born in Xenia, Ohio. From 1928 until 1937, Behner worked in the coal camps along Scotts Run near Morgantown, fighting poverty and creating social and educational outlets for families.

May 15, 1880: The state's first telephone exchange was placed in service in Wheeling with about 25 subscribers.

May 15, 1886: Minnie Buckingham Harper was born in Winfield. She was the first African-American woman to serve as a member of a state legislative body in the United States. She was appointed by Governor Howard Gore on January 10, 1928, to fill the unexpired term of her husband, E. Howard Harper.

May 16, 1778: About 300 Wyandot and Mingo Indians attacked Fort Randolph at Point Pleasant. Unable to take the fort, the Indians proceeded up the Kanawha River toward other settlements.

May 16, 1928: Minister Robert Graetz Jr. was born in Clarksburg. He helped organize the Montgomery bus boycott, and was the only White minister in the highly segregated Alabama city to support the boycott publicly.

May 17, 1854: A violent windstorm swept up the Ohio River and severely damaged the Wheeling Suspension Bridge.

May 17, 1862: The Battle of Pigeon Roost took place in Princeton during the Civil War. Union soldiers were noisily approaching Princeton from the southeast, unaware that the Confederates were lying in ambush. The attack left an estimated 18 federal troops killed and 38 wounded.

WVDOH requesting public comments on STIP amendments

CHARLESTON, WV – The West Virginia Department of Transportation is inviting the public to review amendments made to the WVDOT Statewide Transportation Improvement Program, or STIP.

The STIP document is required under federal law, and shows all planned Federal Highway Administration and Federal Transit Administration expenditures for fiscal years 2020 to 2025. Federal law requires that additions or deletions to the STIP and certain changes to current projects or groupable programs in the STIP must undergo public review and comment before federal funds can be obligated.

WVDOT is requesting public review of proposed amendments to the

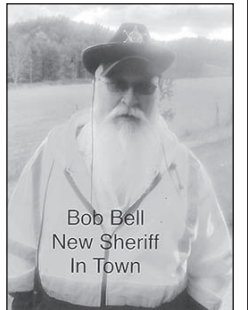

DHHR Announces Emergency Energy Assistance Program for Low Income Residents

CHARLESTON, W.Va. – The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR) announced applications for the Emergency Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) will be accepted through Friday, May 13, 2022, or until funds are exhausted. The federally funded program assists eligible state residents in paying home heating bills.

Residents whose primary source of heat is either gas or electricity must provide their shut-off notice when applying for Emergency LIEAP. Those using other primary heating sources or bulk fuel may qualify for assistance if their heating fuel is at a low level during the application period.

Households that received direct payment of regular LIEAP benefits must verify that the payment was used for home heating by submitting a current receipt with the Emergency LIEAP application. Failure to submit verification of payment may result in a denial of the application.

Eligibility for LIEAP benefits is based on income, household size and whether the household is responsible for paying its heating bill. Income limit for fiscal year 2022 is 60% of the State Median Income. In situations where a heating emergency exists, applicants must be seen by a DHHR worker.

To qualify, households must meet all program guidelines and be in an emergency that will disrupt the primary heating source if not met.

The maximum allowable gross income levels for Emergency LIEAP Fiscal Year 2022 are as follows:

For each additional person, add \$567. Households whose income exceeds the maximum amount are not eligible; however, some types of income may be excluded for LIEAP. Social Security and Veterans income will be excluded for the current LIEAP application period.

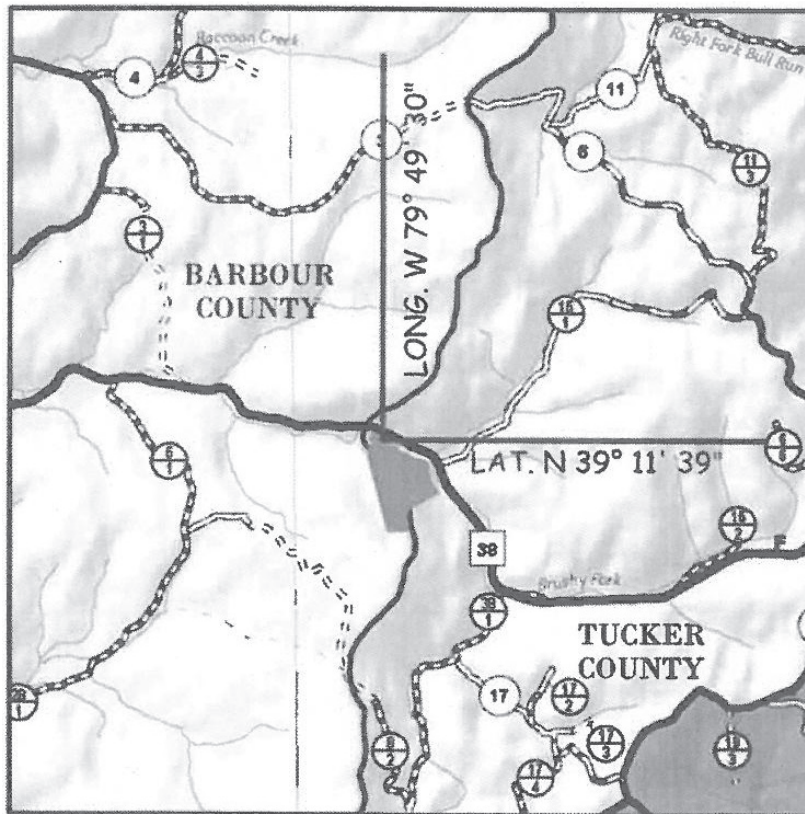
