\$50,000 Allocated for New PSD for Davis and Thomas

Jim Roy from the West Virginia Conservation Agency along with Don Whetzel presented the Tucker County Commission with a proposal to enter into an agreement to obtain land rights to property on Barrel Wallop Creek. Roy had found a house on the stream that is qualified for federal and state funding to fix. The stream is currently five to six feet from the creek and under an addition added to the house. A contract between West Virginia Conservation Agency and the commission would include a signed 7-1-3u form. This form is the state code that gives the county commission the right to address issues such as streams, rivers, and flood issues.

This agreement will allow the state agency and the commission to work together and address any concerns. It does not mean the commission will have to provide any funding for the project, but as suggested by the state the commission would have to obtain the land rights from the landowner or representative of the landowner. Someone from the state will accompany the commission to answer any questions the land owner may have concerning the flood restoration project.

According to the West Virginia State Code the 7-1-3u code is stated as the following, “To protect people and property from floods, counties and municipalities are hereby empowered to rechannel and dredge streams; remove accumulated debris, snags, sandbars, rocks and any other kinds of obstructions from streams; straighten stream channels; and carry out erosion and sedimentation control measures and programs.

For stream treatment to prevent floods as provided in this section, counties and municipalities are hereby further empowered to levy, within all Constitutional and statutory limitations; acquire property by purchase, exercise of the right of eminent domain, lease, gift or grant; accept any and all benefits, moneys, services and assistance which may be available from the federal and state government or any private source; issue and sell bonds within the Constitutional and statutory limitations prescribed by law for the issuance and sale of bonds by counties and municipalities for public purposes generally. Any such levy shall be equal and uniform throughout the county or municipality.

The power and authority granted in this section, may be exercised by any county or municipality in cooperation with each other or separately as provided in section three-i of this article. Any county or municipality which exercises any power or authority set forth in this section shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal and state laws and rules and regulations lawfully promulgated thereunder.

The term “stream” as used in this section means any watercourse, whether natural or man-made, distinguishable by banks and a bed, regardless of their size, through which water flows continually or intermittently, regardless of its volume.”

Commissioner Lowell Moore motioned for the

BOE President Daniel Chopper Evans explained to Hood that the board could listen to her but could not

Ambulance Authority Uses DATA to Improve EMS

EMS Director Shelia Marsh reported to the Ambulance Authority board members that over half of the staff at EMS was out sick with COVID or other illnesses. Marsh herself had been sick and was just starting to get well. Marsh said they were still trying to keep crews in the field.

Marsh also reported that they were having issues getting needed narcotic medications for the ambulances. Marsh said she was working with other hospitals to see if they can order the needed medication from them since St. George Medical Clinic can no longer place the order for them.

A new part-time crew member is being hired. The new hire is not currently trained so she will be working with either Marsh or Scott Kennedy on Wednesday’s.

Marsh stated to the authority, “There has been some talk about the medical chase vehicle, and I do not think either one of us (Marsh and Kennedy) is going to do that. That is actually our certification on line when we go out like that by ourselves. If one of us feels uncomfortable doing that then we are going to stick together as a team and not do that.”

A medical chase vehicle is described as a non-transporting EMS vehicle, also known as a fly-car, response vehicle, quick response vehicle (QRS) vehicle, or fast response vehicle, is a vehicle that responds to and provides emergency

medical services (EMS) without the ability to transport patients.

Marsh explained by saying, “The state legislature states that when an emergency medical vehicle rolls out the door it is to be properly staffed and that is not with one person taking a vehicle and going to a scene by their self. Before that would be considered a chase vehicle which means chase and not going before the ambulance does to take of people.

Ambulance Authority President Dennis Filler then reported on 911 call analytics. Filler said, “We have sliced and diced 14 months of 911 data. The reason we are using the 911 data is because that is where our business originates from. When a call comes in, we are only allowed to take someone in an ambulance if they call 911 directly and from that an incident is logged in. We have partnered with the call center to get data out of their system as best as they can provide. We are making additional data calls but working out the mechanics of it, this is the data we have been able to obtain.”

From the data collected the authority was able to determine that were seven mutual aide calls in July and 13 in August. That is 20 in two months verses 21 total for all of last year. Mutual aide calls are when another county responds to a call when the local EMS is unavailable. There is basically one crew three quarters of the time with two crews only running on two days a week.

The table of data codes categorizes the

calls not the treatment assessment. There were 58 codes listed with the highest percentage in the personal injury category. The data showed that there were fewer calls during the middle of the week and between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. is when 69 percent of the calls come in to 911 last week.

Authority members discussed what would be the biggest return of investment when placing crews to work. The data shows that during the 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. shift one crew can handle 50 percent of the load, while the other crew is possibly taking transports. Transports are classified as pre-arranged transportation taking patients to doctor’s appointments and/or hospitals or a hospital requesting a transport of a patient to a higher facility.

The authority is continuing to work on fundraising by placing an ad in the local newspaper and mailing out flyers asking for donations. If the EMS Levy passes on this November’s ballot, the authority

board hopes this will be a one-time request of the residents in Tucker County.

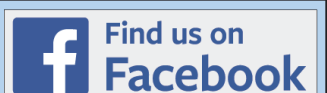
The authority is also working on two questions and answers public meetings to be held before the election. They will announce the dates in the upcoming weeks.

Commissioner Mike Rosenau informed the authority of the legislator law that restricts the Commission from publicly speaking for or against the proposed EMS Levy tax. Per state code 3-8-11, “By any other means attempt to intimidate or exert any undue influence, in order to induce such a person to vote or refrain from voting, or on account of such person having voted or refrained from voting, in any election.” “Good government is not for it or against it, we are for the people’s choice.”

The next Ambulance Authority meeting will be held on October 4, 2022, at 5:30 p.m. in the Tucker County Courthouse, 211 First Street, Parsons, WV, 26287.

agreement between the two entities be accepted and signed by the commission. The motion passed. The next step includes the state assigning a number to the project and then the two entities signing a sub-contract agreeing to work together.

Tucker County Sheriff J. E. Kopec addressed the commission asking for the approval to hire Brent Gidley as Deputy Sheriff. Kopec stated that Gidley was already state certified and would save the county money with his hiring. Gidley was put through a strict hiring process and was originally a deputy with Taylor County. A motion to hire Gidley as Deputy Sheriff was presented by Commissioner Mike Rosenau and motion passed unanimously.

Chris Michael from the Tucker County's Assessor's Office updated the commission on Amendment 2 that is to be placed on the ballot in November. Michael explained that the Amendment 2 that is being proposed would exempt machinery and equipment from businesses and corporations as well as personal property on vehicles state wide. This exemption would be 27 percent of the tax base for the State of West Virginia.

Michael said, "Right now the funding that comes from towns, counties, and schools has been constitutionally protected since the 1930's. So, what this will do will give them the authority to take that money, do away with it or do whatever they want. They would have control and we wouldn't have any more control locally. The amount of money we are talking about; they put out some numbers and I was on a task force for six months or so to try and figure out these numbers and there are numbers over \$500 million of that \$1.5 million is Tucker County.

Some other findings could include public utilities become a part of this and we are pretty sure that the railroad is protected and that would probably drag other into it. That could add another \$200 million to it. So, we could be looking somewhere in the \$700

to \$800 million range if it all of this is enacted. If they would just tell us if there was a plan to backfill the counties and town for the future."

Rosenau asked if there was a plan to backfill the counties and towns. Michael responded by saying, "They were supposed to come to us three weeks ago, but they never have. The Association of Counties got together with all different offices and the bill as written has no guarantees of a backfill. The association cannot support the bill as it sits right now. The association recommends that is to vote "no" against Amendment 2.

There are no guarantees. We have had a couple of good years but that is because of all the money the federal government has handed out. And we all know when things go up, they must come down."

According to wvpolicy.org, "While the total potential cost of Amendment 2 and subsequent property taxes exemptions is \$515 million per year, the state's school aid formula would automatically make up many of the regular school levy funding losses. Even so, school districts, county governments, and municipal governments could lose nearly \$350 million if the taxes under consideration in Amendment 2 are exempted, putting at grave risk school funding, local public services including EMS and fire response, and services that make our communities great places to live like parks and libraries."

Shelia DeVilder reported that she has been working on a Courthouse Facilities Improvement Grant due to the bricks that are

disintegrating in the clock tower from the outside facade damage that is now repaired. DeVilder said, "The bricks are falling off the walls. A 2012 report states that is a low bearing structural wall and if the bricks continue to fall it is going to cause the clock tower to fall at some point in time and that in addition to the floor around the area, because of the water leakage in the bricks, needs to be repaired."

Trenton Helmick was appointed to the Health Department Board and Jody Flanagan was appointed to finish Steve Leyh's five-year term on the Corridor H Authority Board.

Shane Whitehead updated the Commission on the creation of a new PSD that will serve the Davis and Thomas area along the Corridor H. Whitehead said, "We are trying to obtain funding and progressing that plant because there is going to be a new wastewater plant serving that area. In trying to get funding we have come across a few hurdles. Everybody at the state level wants us to get the PSD created and get that entity established, get more board members appointed, and at that point we can obtain more funding to do the project, for designing

the project, implementing the project and so forth. With that being said there is really no funding they are going to be some costs to get that PSD created. Ultimately, the first thing we need to do is to get the PSD approval to do that, and we are estimating \$50,000 to get that where an actual PSD is created and approved by the Public Service Commission. So, I'm asking to see if the Commission is willing to allocate \$50,000 from their Arbit funds to get the PSD created this will cover all the legal fees and the hearings with the Public Service Commission to get that created."

Rosenau said, "This is the first step that we have to do this will get the legal stuff in place so we can get approved for the PSD and at that point we can start applying for grants to obtain the new PSD." Rosenau made a motion to approve up to \$50,000 but not to exceed \$50,000 for the request made by Region VII for the creation of the PSD. Motion passed unanimously.

The next regular Tucker County Commission meeting will be held on September 28, 2022, at 6 p.m. in the Tucker County Courthouse Courtroom, 211 First Street, Parsons, WV, 26287.

We Get Letters

To The Editor:

I recently spoke with one of the Tucker County Commissioners regarding the levy for the Ambulance Authority to be voted on in the November Election... I asked two questions and they were (1) Have accounts in default for non-payment of services performed by the EMS been sent to a collection agency or what efforts are or have been made to collect these funds? (2) Will the \$50 fee paid by taxpayers over the past three years be credited back to their tax accounts?

Many taxpayers paid this fee but there were also taxpayers who refused to pay. It was stated in the billing that fines and liens on property would be placed IF NOT PAID... which, personally, I perceived to be a result to me and my property if I did not pay.

The Commissioner I spoke with said he was not on the commission when the \$50 fee was assessed and could not speak to whether or not anything would or could be done to reimburse the taxpayers who complied with this fee as he and I had done. The fee had been assessed unlawfully and thus the reason to stop the fee and try again to pass a levy to help fund the EMS. He also stated that he is not aware of how the Authority goes about trying to collect on the accounts that are delinquent. I asked if the accounts were sent to a collection agency or reported to the credit bureaus and again he responded that he did not know this either.

BEFORE the election the citizens of Tucker County need to have these very basic questions responded to by the commission and the Ambulance Authority. I am not saying how I plan to vote on this levy I just feel, strongly, that these questions need to be answered and would appreciate an open answer to the public.

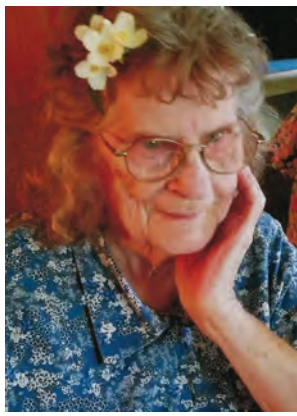
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OBITUARIES

Morrisey Joins Coalition Questioning Legality of Visa, Mastercard, American Express Eying New Category for Gun Shop Sales

CHARLESTON — Following his letters urging Visa, Mastercard and American Express to reconsider their bid to apply a new merchant code to distinguish firearms purchases at gun shops, West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey has joined a coalition raising concerns over the legality of the proposed action.

The letter, signed by 24 attorneys general, was sent to the CEOs of Visa, Mastercard and American Express. Recently, the International Organization for Standardization voted to create a Merchant Category Code for gun stores to use when processing credit and debit card transactions.

“This move has nothing to do with public safety and was done to appease radical

gun control groups and others who are anti Second Amendment after years of pressure,” Attorney General Morrisey said. “Tracking legal gun sales from law-abiding merchants and consumers is nothing but an infringement on our constitutional right to keep and bear arms.”

The coalition argued in the letter sent Sept. 20 that creating a list of gun buyers “creates the obvious risk that law-abiding consumers’ information will be leaked, discovered, hacked or otherwise obtained and misused by those who oppose Americans exercising their Second Amendment rights.”

In separate letters Attorney General Morrisey sent Sept. 15, he said the deci-

sion by Visa, Mastercard and American Express “displays hostility to your cardholders that choose to exercise their Second Amendment right to keep and bear arms, especially at a time when violent crime is on the rise.”

Visa, Mastercard and American Express are among the world’s largest payment processors. The Attorney General said giving gun sales its own category puts an unnecessary red flag on otherwise legitimate purchases. Currently, gun store sales are under “general merchandise” as far as credit card purchases are concerned.

The coalition advised the companies to keep in mind “that we will marshal the full scope of our legal authority to protect

our citizens and consumers from unlawful attempts to undermine their constitutional rights.”

Attorney General Morrisey joined the letter with his counterparts in Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Hampshire, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia and Wyoming.

respond because of legality regulations that restricted them from discussing any item that is not presented on the agenda. Hood started off by saying, “This is a big problem and I have had this in my heart for a long time. I do not know why the kids in this county do not have a track. I know it is a big item. I know location is a problem. There is some place in this county for a track. That was the main reason I came.

I would like to see a pool in this county for the kids. I was originally from Bridgeport but have lived in Canaan Valley for 35 years. But I go by Quiet Dell and as little as they are they have a pool for the kids.

Starting out with some items that could be taken care of now. I look at the field house and even though I have never been it I have been told it is notorious. I have been in the women’s bathroom, and it is terrible. My husband has been in the men’s bathroom, and he told me that there are two blocks for the little boys to stand on to use the bathroom. These are things that can be fixed. They are not big money items like a track is. I know it is a little bit of money but with the millions of dollars this county seems to have.

I do not know if I, one person, can get it done. I have talked to other people and they share the same concerns. I was told that

would come and nothing was done.”

Hood also mentioned to the BOE that there were safety concerns with the chemistry lab at the high school. Hood reported a student’s parent had spoken to her about how the chemistry teacher has had to tell the students not to open a bottle that was in the chemistry lab because the teacher was worried that the bottle would explode. Hood also said that the chemistry lab was severely outdated.

BOE members also discussed with Lambert the issue of dock days for staff. Lambert informed the members of the board that the legal attorney has advised against making staff pay for health benefits if they were going to choose to take dock days. Lambert said, “We did inquire about that. We are allowed to. However, I was given some caution with that and a reason as to why we have not done this in the past.

Currently the procedure reads for a serious illness, if they do not have enough calendar time working for us to qualify for FMLA. Those were two things the board could grant them unpaid leave. If we were to make a procedure where we would make them have to pay for their benefits, then we could no longer issue unpaid leave to people that may really need it and need to keep their benefits but may not be able to pay for that.

A lot of times dock days are abused, and people use them for the wrong reasons and that is what leads us to try make up a policy, practice, or procedure with that, but we also do not want to hurt the wrong people.”

During the academic updates section of the agenda Lambert excitedly presented to the board members the results of the Promoting Equitable Access to Teachers (PEAT) data and based on the general sum of adjustment. Lambert said, “I would be remised if I did not say our scores are not where we want them to be. We have got a way to go. They are not where we want them to be. However, this is the first time in nine years that Tucker Valley has not been identified as either a focus support school or a targeted intervention school or most recently a CSI (Comprehensive, Support, and Improvement) school.

I really want to celebrate their success. They have put in a lot of hard work. The kids knew the meaning of the test when they took it this time. They scored very well in comparison to the state.”

CSI school means your state education agency has identified it as one of the lowest-performing schools in the state. This is based mostly on students’ academic performance. Also, any high school with a graduation rate of 66 percent or less is a CSI school.

Lambert continued by saying, “No school in our country is on any list and that is something that I am very proud of for our teachers, for our administrators, and our students. We are little ole Tucker County, but we are doing ok. We are going to continue to push forward. Constantly being a school of improvement bogs you down and it deflates you and you wonder if what you are doing is making a difference. So, I hope that this that moment that Tucker Valley needs to kind of reset and think we can do this, and we are doing this, and we will use it as a launching pad moving forward.

I applaud them for their efforts, and I hope you (board members) do too, when you get the chance to see them, and let them know their hard work does not go unnoticed.”

BOE member Cathy Hebb said, “We are the only county that does not have a school on any list!”

Sept. 28, 1955: Labor activist Sarah "Mother" Blizzard died at the age of 90. Blizzard was deeply involved in the United Mine Workers of America, from the organization's early beginnings in the late 19th century.

Sept. 29, 1861: The Kanawha Valley experienced severe flooding. The Kanawha River reached 46.87 feet in Charleston, more than 16 feet above flood stage.

Sept. 29, 1927: Artist June Kilgore was born in Huntington. She was an abstract expressionist painter who spent 30 years as an art professor at Marshall University.

Sept. 30, 2010: Facing

an economic downturn and foreign competition, Wheeling-La Belle Nail Company closed. The company was founded in 1852 as LaBelle Ironworks. By 1875, the city was known as the Nail City, and La Belle was Wheeling's leading nail producer.

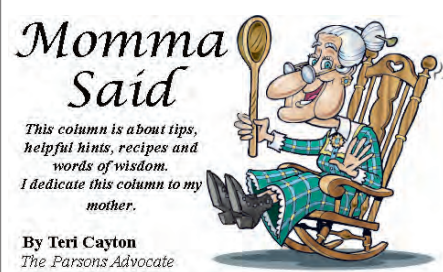

Applesauce Cake

Ingredients

- CAKE**
- 2 ¼ cup all-purpose flour
 - 1 ½ tsp. baking powder
 - 1 ½ tsp. baking soda
 - 1 tsp. salt
 - 2 tsp. cinnamon
 - 1 tsp. nutmeg
 - ¼ tsp. ground cloves
 - ¼ tsp. allspice
 - 1 cup applesauce, unsweetened or regular
 - 1 cup brown sugar, packed
 - ½ cup vegetable oil
 - 3 large eggs
- CREAM CHEESE FROSTING**
- 8 oz. brick of cream cheese, room temperature
 - 1 stick unsalted butter (1/2 cup), room temperature
 - 1 ½ tsp. vanilla extract
 - 3-4 cups powdered sugar
 - optional: 1/8 tsp. salt and dash of milk or heavy cream

Instructions

1. Preheat the oven to 350° F. Spray a 9x13 inch pan with non-stick cooking spray.
2. In a small mixing bowl, combine the flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg,

3. cloves and allspice.
3. In a separate larger mixing bowl, combine the applesauce, brown sugar, vegetable oil and eggs, whisk together. Using a spatula, gently mix in the dry ingredients until just combined.
4. Pour the batter into the 9x13 inch pan. Bake for 30-32 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Note: if using a metal pan, the baking time may be shorter.
5. Allow the cake to cool for 1 hour before adding the frosting.

CREAM CHEESE FROSTING

1. Place room temperature unsalted butter and cream cheese in a mixing bowl. Use an electric mixer on medium and beat together for 1-2 minutes, until whipped and fluffy.
2. Add in the vanilla extract and powdered sugar (and optional salt) beat again on low for 1-2 minutes, scraping down the sides of the bowl, until everything is incorporated.
3. If the frosting is too thick, add a splash of milk or heavy cream, beat until creamy. Spread the frosting on top of the cake.

what it does for me. Shelby does the art, the creation of the design and everything artistic. And that is what makes her happy.”

Moore who has lived here her entire life is not new to business adventures. Moore previously ran a day-care and a trucking company. This is the first adventure for Emerson who moved to the West Virginia in 2016. Emerson said, “West Virginia saved my life! I was coming from an awful place in life and there is something about Tucker County that saves your soul. The neighborhood. The Community. The people. The woods and nature. Those are things that really saved me.”

To answer the question of why the duo started the new bakery and general store, Emerson responded by saying, “The community. The whole reason why we wanted to do the store was created for more of a community together. So, people like in an old general store can come have a bite to eat and a coffee, talk, and meet.”

Both Emerson and Moore say their families, friends, and the

community are their biggest supporters. Emerson said, “We have had so much help and kindness from the community and our family.”

On the bakery side the cinnamon rolls are the specialty, but on the general store side a customer can find creations made by local artist. Moore said, “We do a lot of commissions. 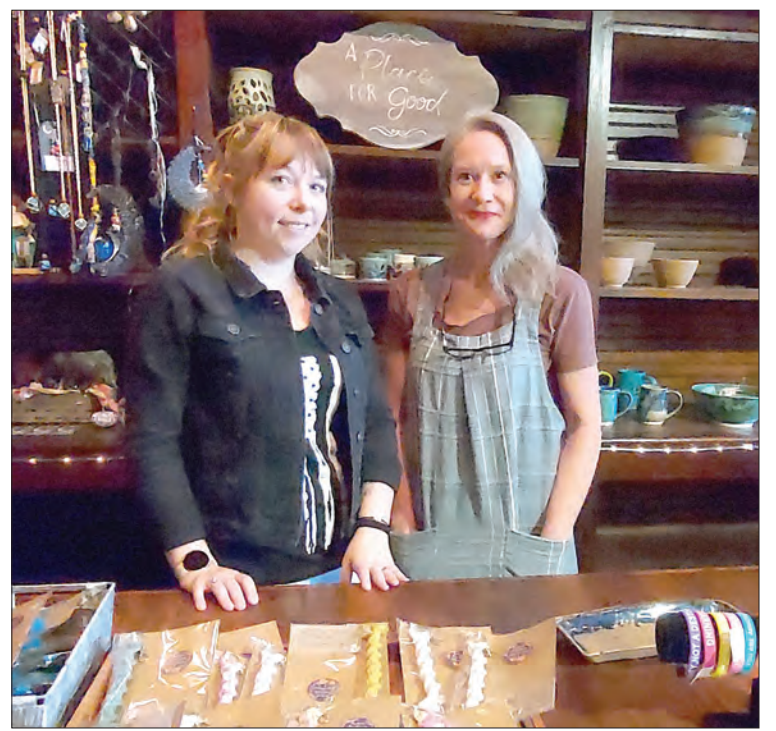

On August 25, 2022, Monongahela Power Company and The Potomac Edison Company (collectively, Companies) requested that the Commission initiate its annual review of Expanded Net Energy Costs (ENEC), including a review of actual costs and recoveries for the review period of July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022, and to establish new rates to go into effect on January 1, 2023. The Companies request that the Commission approve rates that will result in a projected total annual revenue of \$183,796,693. This amount consists of a deferred ENEC under-recovery balance of \$144,861,585 as of June 30, 2022, and a projected \$27,338,472 under-recovery for the 2023 forecasted rate effective period. The proposed increase also includes continued recovery of boiler modernization capital costs for MATS/CSAPR compliance in the amount of an \$11,596,636 revenue requirement for 2023. In support of the rate request, the Companies filed direct testimony from five witnesses.

The proposed ENEC rates represent a 12.2% increase in total rates with an impact to the average residential customer using 1,000 kWhs per month being an increase in monthly bills from \$115.05 to \$126.10 or 9.6%.

This matter is scheduled for an evidentiary hearing on Thursday December 8, 2022. The hearing will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the Howard M. Cunningham Hearing Room at the Public Service Commission, 201 Brooks Street, Charleston, West Virginia. The Commission may cancel the evidentiary hearing for good cause shown. Interested persons intending to attend the hearing should monitor the Commission web docket.

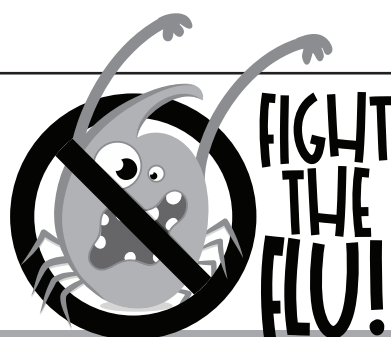
