The original document was approved by the Tucker County Commission in December of 2012 with a revision approved in August of 2014. At that time the Planning Commission members were Ben Herrick as President, Keith Strausbaugh as Vice President, Robin McClintock was the Secretary, Rob Burns was the Treasurer, Kim Bennett, April Miller, Jonathan Hicks, and Diane Hinkle as the County Com-

according to the Comprehensive Plan is, "The comprehensive planning process for Tucker County initially began in 1992 with the preparation of the original Comprehensive Plan. In 1995, the County worked with the Canaan Valley Institute (CVI) to

redraft the Comprehensive Plan. In 2008, the Planning Commission continued the planning process with the forwarding of a survey to gain information from the residents.

Leyh Seeks Grant for Agriculture Food Businesses

Tucker County Development Authority Executive Director, Steve Leyh, presented board members with grant information from the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) regional food business center. Leyh said, "Frostburg



State University, Md., along with Potomac State College is working on a grant application called the Northern Appalachian Food Business Center. It is the USDA, basically, what they are looking at is a way to build up agriculture by using a hub sort of system with spikes going out and to build up food type of businesses/farming food businesses. It is a massive amount of money that does not require a match, so it is a big regional effort and Frostburg State University is leading it.

It could help with USDA inspection programs, technical expertise, and helping processes for businesses. This is actual money that could go to businesses if it is awarded. They help with inventory market access, cold storage, meat, dairy, incubation, logistics, and it includes a grant for up to \$100,000.

It could be very beneficial for our county to partici-

According to the www.ams.usda.gov website, "The USDA Regional Food Business Centers will support a more resilient, diverse, and competitive food system. These Regional Food Centers will support producers by providing localized assistance to access local and regional supply chains, including linking producers to wholesalers and distributors. They will provide technical assistance needed to access new markets, access to federal, state, and local resources, and will assist small- and mid-sized producers in overcoming barriers to market access, with a focus on underserved farmers, ranchers, and food businesses. No match is required.

USDA Regional Food Business Centers will have three main responsibilities:

Development Authority Discuss Projects

Tucker County Development Authority Executive Director, Steve Leyh, presented board members with an update on his current activity for the county. Leyh started with providing the record low unemployment rate of 3.4 percent for the month of September. This is a significant drop from the 4.1 percent in August. The county added 77 small business entities thus far in 2022 making the growth rate of 13.39 percent.

The real estate market in Tucker County is on a downward trend. In October the median listing price for a home was \$269,900 with a selling price of \$255,000. That is a -15 percent year-over-year.

In regard to the newly elected government officials Leyh said, "I did send out some emails to our newly elected officials. Tim Knotts is our new county commissioner. I sent him a congratulatory email. We have a new delegate. Delegate Hott, (John), and we have a new Senator, Senator Jay Taylor. I sent each one a congratulatory email and received a response back from Taylor." The consensus from the board members present was that Taylor was a good person and would do good things for the county.

The development authority has received their economic development grant. Leyh said, "It has been deposited into our checking account, so that is good news."

Leyh attended the Central West Virginia Development Authority meeting. Leyh said, "This is the group that is doing the broad band project the last couple of years. Nothing came of that project. We rejoined that group as part of going for a reconnect grant. That never happened because the USDA would not allow us to do wireless, but they are trying to wrap up the grant from a couple of years ago."



The Tucker County Development Authority members met in the Five Rivers Public Library in Parsons, West Virginia for their December meeting.

Leyh stated he attended the October 26 PSD hearing and county commission meeting. A more in-depth conversation was held later in the meeting with the board members. Leyh explained

Today's board members are Tim McLean (formerly referred to as McCloud, please forgive the misprint from before) as President, Emily Hauger Wilson as Vice-President, Robin McClintock is the Secretary, Marti Neustadt is the Treasurer, Angie Shockley, Ben Herrick, Jonathan Hicks, William "Bill" Shahan, and Mike Rosenau is the Tucker County Commission representative.

Each board member has voluntarily taken assigned designated sections of the plan to work on between the monthly Planning Commission meetings. And although it may take a while to update the document the members of the board are in hopes that the process will go smoothly since they have a former approved document to use as a reference.

McLean said, "It is going to take all of us and take a while to write this thing. I believe it would be easier if you all agree to take a piece of it and work that piece. As our meetings come and go, we can come back in say: what is your progress on your piece of it; are there any speed bumps; I can only get this far with it; I have come to a dead end, and that is how I see this thing working." McLean asked all members to be forthcoming with their progress so that everyone stays on schedule or gets help if needed.

Discussed in the plan are the goals, objectives and purpose of the document. According to the Comprehensive Plan, "The goal of the Comprehensive Plan is to achieve a balance between bringing prosperity and business development to the county while continuing to safeguard the natural beauty and the resources that are available within the county. Goals are concerned with the long term, and often describe ideal situations that would result if all plan purposes were fully

Objectives are specific statements that carry out a plan in the short term. Objectives are measurable benchmarks that can be used to assess incremental progress in achieving the broader purposes expressed in the goals. The objectives will we individually set forth in each section of the Comprehensive Plan.

The Comprehensive Plan is authorized by the West Virginia Code Chapter 8A, Article 3. The purpose of preparing a Comprehensive Plan is to: (1) promote the coordinated development of land and improvements to meet the future needs of the county; (2) achieve sound planning to assist the governing body in preserving quality of life and enhancing that quality of life to adapt to the future needs of the county relating to economic, physical, or social changes; (3) promote the health, safety, morals, order, convenience, prosperity, and general welfare of county residents; and, (4) promote efficiency and economy during the development process.

The Comprehensive Plan is a policy guide for the Tucker County Planning Commission and the Tucker County Commission as they assess the location, character, and the extent of future development for the county. The plan contains proposed policies and other recommendations to be implemented over time through a variety of decision-making actions including subdivision of land, and the location and construction of public infrastructure improvements, among other things.

The Tucker County Comprehensive Plan was developed so that decisions affecting the county's lands should be made in a coordinated and responsible manner to capitalize on the county's geographic location and its desirable physical features.

The Comprehensive Plan shall set forth goals and objectives to allow an informed decision-making process, ensure consistency in government, and coordinate the various arms of the local government. It will create conditions positive for vital resources, reduce resource waste relating to haphazard development and sprawl, preserve historic landmarks and other resources, and promote a sense of community character and identity. It will promote the most efficient utilization of available resources, coordinate development into well-planned communities, and advocate cost-effective development of facilities and services."

McClintock said, "So, when we did this originally before 2010, we had a meeting with all of the stakeholders in the county. We asked them to write a couple of paragraphs of what they do and what their resources are. So, every one of those sections actually originates with the people that is about."

McClintock gave EMS, and the Development Authority as examples, and said, "And then we fine-tuned and when we were updating we sent the sections back to the stakeholders. We assigned a member to usher that through and then brought the edits back to the group (Planning Commission). McClintock continued by saying that are certain obvious things that have to done such as housing.

Rosenau said, "The Comprehensive Plan, I was on the original, so it is not really as much as the public but what our county sees as the need. It is not so much as what we would like as what we have to see. It is what we actually have so, that is the Comprehensive Plan and if we want to do something beyond that is a whole different ball game than our comprehensive plan. This is what we actually have in our county now and what we plan to use."

The next Planning Commission meeting will be held on January 9, 2023, at 1 p.m. as the members voted to cancel December's meeting. The meeting will take place in the Courthouse Courtroom located at 211 First Street, Parsons.

Leyh mentioned that office space was needed in Thomas, Davis, and Canaan Valley if anyone had any available to please reach out to him.

The board members voted to approve a work session for the industrial park protective covenants and restrictions. Preservation easements may be called a "covenant" or "restriction," depending on jurisdiction. Regardless of what the document is called, a preservation easement will be recorded with the property title and is a required part of all development (construction) grants, including projects ground-disturbing archeological work.

Protective Covenants must state who is responsible for the constant supervision of the park's covenants and restrictions, i.e.: owner/developer, municipality, or major property owners. In all cases, the management entity of the park will have the authority to enforce the covenants and restrictions on all tenants and future tenants of the park.

This work session will be held on December 1, 2022, at 4 p.m. and located at the National Youth Science Foundation Center, 494 Riverstone Drive, Davis, WV 26260.

The authority will be conducting strategic planning sessions as well. Leyh asked for approval from the board that allow a previous executive director of Randolph County Development Authority to assist in the planning. Leyh

stated that this person had many years of experience and knowledge to help. The goal of the plan is to determine the priorities of the board, what the board wants Leyh focused on, who are is the board trying to serve, and the main thing the boards want to see accomplished.

The December meeting of the Tucker County Development Authority has been canceled by vote of the board members. The meeting will recommence in January. 
Preceding him in death besides his parents was a brother, Michael Bilby.





Coordination - The Regional Food Centers will act as regional hubs coordinating across geographic areas with USDA, other federal, state, and tribal agencies with relevant resources, regional commissions, stakeholders, and the other Regional Food Centers. They will engage with stakeholders and partners to develop and implement strategic and funding plans for serving the region through technical assistance and capacity building. They

will conduct outreach to underserved communities and businesses.

Technical Assistance -The Regional Food Centers will provide direct business technical assistance to small- and mid-sized food and farm businesses (producers, processors, aggregators, distributors, and other businesses within the food supply chain) and food value and supply chain coordination. Each Regional Food Center will identify priority areas for technical assistance (e.g., aggregation/distribution, specialty crop processing for institutions) for the region it plans to serve.

Capacity Building – The Regional Food Centers will provide financial assistance through business builder subawards up to \$100,000 to support projects focused

on regional needs and businesses that are working towards expansion and other investment. These subawards may support staff time, business planning activities, software implementation, the purchase of special purpose equipment, such as food safety, processing and packaging equipment, and value chain coordination, and other expenses associated as outlined in the RFA.

This program is to operate a Regional Food Business Center through a cooperative agreement with USDA. The Regional Food Centers will coordinate, offer technical assistance, and provide capacity building grants to businesses in the region. The capacity building grants can be up to \$100,000 and we anticipate that the Regional Food

Centers will make multiple awards throughout the five-year cooperative agreement. An award to an individual organization can be a maximum of \$100,000 over 5 years. The minimum award is \$15 million, and the maximum award is \$50

million."

The deadline to apply is December 15, 2022. Leyh has already sent in the paperwork and will keep the board updated as to what the outcome will be. Leyh stated that the authority would help identify potential recipients if the award is funded, coordinate technical services, and serve on an advisory board for three or four meetings a

Leyh said, "It is huge. It can be a game changer for the region."



WVDOH awards 21 construction contracts

CHARLESTON, WV – Two bridge replacement projects were among 21 construction projects awarded by the West Virginia Division of Highways (WVDOH) on Tuesday, Nov. 8, 2022, and Thursday, Nov. 10, 2022.

The contracts were awarded from a bid letting held Tuesday, Oct. 18, 2022.

Rock Forge Bridge Company was awarded at contract for \$2,999,002.55 to replace the Caney Branch Bridge in Mingo County. The bridge currently carries a three-ton weight restriction, and would leave local residents stranded if not replaced.

SMH Construction Company Inc. was awarded a contract for \$2,178,679.44 to replace the Burnsville T-Beam Bridge in Braxton County. The bridge, built in 1929, was closed to traffic in 2019 due to its deteriorated condition.

"Unfortunately, this bridge came to the end of its service life before funding was available to replace it," said WVDOH State Bridge Engineer Tracy Brown, P.E. "Gov. Jim Justice's Roads to Prosperity program has made additional funding available to help us replace some of these older structures before they get to the point of requiring closure, which we realize can sometimes severely disrupt people's daily lives."

Several factors are considered before awarding a bid, including whether a bid falls above or below the WVDOH Engineer's Estimate and by what percentage. In cases where a bid is above the Engineer's Estimate, WVDOH must consider the project need, repercussions of not awarding the project, additional funding sources, and whether sufficient reasons exist for the differences in estimates. Most projects are reviewed, analyzed, and awarded within a week of the bid letting, but the process can take longer.

When the Division of Highways has a project that is determined to be best constructed by a contractor, it is processed through the bid letting system. A letting is a scheduled opportunity for contractors to review and bid on several construction projects at one time. Lettings are held either once or twice per month and conducted through the Bid Express System online at www.bidx.com and handled through the Contract Administration Division. Contractors need to subscribe to Bid Express before bids can be accepted on any project.



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

Weaner Among West Virginia Folklife Apprenticeship Participants

Charleston—The West Virginia Folklife Program, a project of the West Virginia Humanities Council, announces its 2022-2023 cohort of apprenticeship participants in the third round of the West Virginia Folklife Apprenticeship Program. Seven apprenticeship pairs from across the Mountain State will study and practice traditions including soul food cooking, fiddle repair, and mushroom foraging. The Folklife Apprenticeship Program offers \$3,000 to recognize and honor West Virginia traditional artists or tradition bearers working with qualified apprentices on a year-long in-depth apprenticeship in their cultural expression or traditional art form. Participating apprentices are supported with \$500 to pay for starting expenses such as necessary tools and materials. These folklife apprenticeships facilitate the transmission of cultural knowledge, artistic techniques, stories, and traditional practices.

The 2022-2023 West Virginia Folklife Apprenticeship Program participants:

Sharon Briggs of Paw Paw in Hampshire County will lead an apprenticeship in mushroom foraging with Anthony Murray of Capon Bridge. Sharon, a full time farmer and mycologist, owns and operates Peasant's Parcel Mushroom Farm and Mycology Lab. She has been foraging and mapping mushroom locations in the Eastern Panhandle and Potomac Highlands for over 20 years. When Anthony moved to the area, Sharon began to teach him how to identify and forage for mushrooms. He has been interested in mushroom hunting ever since. Anthony also helps Sharon on the farm and operates an apiary there.

Chris Haddox and Mary Linscheid, both of Morgantown in Monongalia County, will hold an apprenticeship in fiddle repair. A longtime musician, Chris studied luthiery from West Virginia instrument builders including Bob Smakula, John Blisard, and especially Gilbert Stiles, whom he apprenticed through the West Virginia Folk Arts Apprenticeship Program formerly supported by the Augusta Heritage Center. Mary is a multi-instrumentalist, song-writer, poet, and gardener whose art is

inspired by Appalachians' connection with their homeland. Mary is excited to learn fiddle repair because the practice empowers her to fix her own fiddles and those of the community, which helps to ensure the continuation of local music-making.

Joe Herrmann of Paw Paw in Hampshire County will lead an apprenticeship in clawhammer banjo with Dakota Karper of Capon Bridge. Herrmann is a founding member of the Critton Hollow String Band and has taught old-time music to many students. Dakota has been playing old-time fiddle for over 20 years and currently tours with the band Hemlock & Hickory. In 2019, she opened a traditional roots music school in Capon Bridge called The Cat and The Fiddle. Joe and Dakota apprenticed together previously in

2004 when Dakota was 11 years old through the Augusta Heritage Center's former West Virginia Folk

Arts Apprenticeship Program, and again in 2020 to study old-time fiddle with the West Virginia Folklife

Apprenticeship Program.

Bil Lepp of South Charleston in Kanawha County will lead an apprenticeship in Appalachian storytelling with James Froemel of Maidsville in Monongalia County. Bil has been writing and telling stories on

stage for over 30 years. He became a full-time touring professional teller by 2003 after performing at the National Storytelling Festival in Jonesborough, Tennessee in 2000. Bil is a five-time champion, and James a three-time champion, of the West Virginia Liars contest. James is also an accomplished storyteller and actor, having performed at multiple festivals and schools. They have both participated in the West Virginia Storytellers Guild.

Enrica McMillon of Elkins in Randolph County will lead an apprenticeship with Barbara Weaner of Montrose in Tucker County to study fiber arts. They will specifically study fiber processing, dyeing with natural dyes sourced from locally harvested plants, and spinning fibers using a variety of tools for knitting and weaving. Enrica grew up in Helvetia, during a time when traditional practices of the 19th Century were not still commonly taught. Enrica learned spinning, dying, and weaving at a young age from both of her grandmothers and has since utilized this knowledge as a foundation for her artwork. Enrica also researches large antique wheels traditionally used in West Virginia and has created a database of over 6,000. Barbara first learned to spin under Enrica's teaching in 1980. Over the years, Enrica and Barbara have both been active members of the Mountain Weaver's Guild in

Gerry Milnes of Elkins in Randolph County will be leading an apprenticeship in old-time West Virginia fiddle tunes and techniques with Annick Odom of Morgantown in Monongalia County. Gerry is a documentarian, teacher, writer, and award-winning musician. He started documenting traditional musicians and singers in Webster, Braxton, and Nicholas Counties in 1976. For 25 years, Gerry traveled widely as the Augusta Heritage Center's Folk Art Coordinator, presenting old-time musicians at festivals throughout the country and producing traditional West Virginia Music recordings and films of West Virginia folklife. Annick is a Belgian-American musician born and raised in West Virginia. While she grew up playing classical violin, Annick is now a professional performer-composer, songwriter, and multi- instrumentalist with a strong interest in learning about the fiddle traditions of her home state.

Born in Beckley of Raleigh County where he still resides, Xavier Oglesby will lead an apprenticeship in soul food cooking with his niece Brooklynn Oglesby, also of Beckley. Xavier is a professional caterer and credits his knowledge of recipes and love of cooking to four generations of family members including his mother, father, and grandmothers. In the Black community, food traditions are often celebrated at church dinners and picnics. Xavier and Brooklynn are excited to work together so that this cooking tradition will remain in their family and in their community. In 2018, Xavier participated in the West Virginia Folklife Apprenticeship Pro-

gram as an apprentice to Doris Fields (aka Lady D) of Beckley to learn and carry on the tradition of blues and Black gospel music.

The West Virginia Folklife Apprenticeship Program is administered by the West Virginia Folklife Program at the West Virginia Humanities Council in Charleston and is supported in part by the National Endowment for the Arts. West Virginia Folklife is dedicated to the documentation, preservation, presentation, and support of West Virginia's vibrant cultural heritage and living traditions. MOOREFIELD, W.Va. – The Class A Commercial Driver's License (CDL) training program at Eastern West Virginia Community and Technical College has recognized its first scholarship winner, Steven Beard of Mineral County.

Beard is part of the current class of trainees in the CDL program, which has nine students enrolled. Another eight students completed CDL training earlier in the fall.

The Workforce CDL Scholarship is managed by the college's Foundation and was created by donors Stephen Roberts and Lisa Polisar through a one-time gift. Roberts and Polisar recognized the economic need for trained drivers, and they support workforce training programs like Eastern's CDL program to help close those gaps.

There are enough funds in the scholarship program to cover costs for another student taking CDL training at Eastern in the spring, so the scholarship application has been re-opened for interested applicants. 

It's the Peak Time of Year for Deer Collisions

The average AAA Insurance vehicle damage claim for a deer incident is about \$5,000

Cooler weather and shorter days mean more

Virginia's roadways. The number of deer-vehicle collisions increases in October and peaks in November and December. To reduce inconvenience, costs, and potential danger, AAA East Central cautions motorists to be especially vigilant on the

road in animal-prone areas.

"More collisions between vehicles and deer occur now than any other time of the year," says Jonathon King, vice president of Insurance sales, AAA East Central. "One of our top claims as winter approaches is for vehicles that have been totaled from hitting animals, and the costs can be stagger-

ing." According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, there are about 1 million car accidents with deer each year that kill 200 Americans, cause more than 10,000 personal injuries, and result in \$1 billion in vehicle damage. Additionally, the most dangerous times for collisions are dusk and dawn when deer are most active. Because of reduced visibility, these are the times when it is tougher for motorists to spot the animals.

AAA's Recommendation: Check Your Coverage.

AAA Insurance reports that it's average deer-related claim in the region is about \$5,000, though costs can be much higher depending on the damage to a vehicle.

Collision coverage pays for damage to a vehicle that results from a collision with

an object (e.g., a telephone pole, a guard rail, a mailbox), or because of flipping over. AAA East Central recommends motorists opt-in for comprehensive coverage, which is for damage to vehicles covered by disasters "other than collisions" (in this case, contact with animals).


"While adding comprehensive coverage may add a small amount to your premium, it could save you money down the road," continued King.

To help prevent a crash or to reduce damage from an animal collision, AAA suggests motorists:

- Pay attention to road signs. Yellow, diamondshaped signs with an image of a deer indicate areas with high levels of deer activity.
- Keep focused on the road. Ditching distractions is one of the easiest ways to be ready if a deer comes out of nowhere.
- Be especially attentive in early morning and evening hours. Many animals, especially deer, are most active from 5-8 a.m. and 5-8 p.m., prime commuting times for many.
- Use high beams when there's no oncoming traffic. Animals can be spotted sooner and the light reflecting off their eyes will often reveal their location.
- · Slow down and watch for other deer to appear. Deer rarely travel alone, so if there is one, more are

likely nearby.

- Resist the urge to swerve. Keep both hands firmly on the wheel and don't change lanes. Swerving away from animals can confuse them so they don't know which way to run. It can also put motorists in the path of oncoming vehicles or cause the vehicle to crash into something.
- If the crash is imminent take your foot off the brake. During hard braking, the front end of a vehicle is pulled downward which can cause the animal to travel up over the hood towards the windshield. Letting off the brake can protect motorists from windshield strikes because the animal is more likely to be pushed to one side of the vehicle or over the top of the vehicle.
- In the event of a deer strike, AAA recommends:
- · Call the police.
- Avoid making contact with the animal. A frightened or wounded animal can hurt people or further injure itself.
- Put the vehicle's hazard lights on, whether it's light or dark outside.
- If possible, immediately move the vehicle to a safe location, out of the roadway, and wait for help to arrive.
- Motorists should contact their insurance agent or company representative as quickly as possible to report any damage.

Morrisey Fights to Keep Title 42 in Place CHARLESTON—West Virginia Attor- thousands of migrants to try and keer

CHARLESTON — West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey asked the United States District Court for the District of Columbia to permit a group of states led by Arizona and Louisiana to intervene in Huisha-Huisha v. Mayorkas, a case in which a judge terminated the Title 42 policy. This policy is one of the last remaining tools at the southern border.

"We will keep fighting the Biden administration's utter disregard for protecting our southern border," Attorney General Morrisey said. "Biden's open border policy is a danger to our homeland, and we will do everything within the boundaries of the law to set this administration straight."

Title 42 allows border officials to turn away migrants because of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. The policy has been in effect since March 2020 to turn away

thousands of migrants to try and keep communicable diseases, like COVID-19, out of the country.

Without the Attorney General's intervention, Title 42 will cease to exist on Dec. 21, dramatically worsening the border crisis right before Christmas. As the states' motion explains, termination of Title 42 will exacerbate "the costs imposed on the States. Allowing intervention will ensure those interests are represented."

Joining Attorney General Morrisey are the attorneys general of Arizona, Louisiana, Alabama, Alaska, Kansas, Kentucky, Mississippi, Nebraska, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Texas, Virginia and Wyoming


