Blackwater Ministerial Food Pantry searches for a new location, seeks donations

The high demand for food assistance in the Davis, Thomas, and Canaan Valley areas is even more challenging for Blackwater Ministerial Association Food Pantry volunteers this winter as the group prepares to move to a temporary location.

Starting Jan. 1, the food pantry will relocate to St. John's Lutheran Church (The Big Green Church), the corner of 3rd Street and Blackwater Avenue in Davis. The group will begin moving the non-perishable and perishable food, supplies, and equipment after its regular Wednesday, Dec. 7, food distribution.

Veronica Staron, director of the Blackwater Ministerial Association Food Pantry, said the new space is smaller than desired. Still, it will allow the organization to continue its mission of providing food assistance to individuals and families in the area.

"It is a blessing for the food pantry to be back at St. John's Lutheran Church, even on a temporary basis," Staron said. See FOOD PANTRY page 4A

The following criminal complaints have been filed in the Tucker County Magistrate office:

- · Carmela Kay Knight was charged with one count fraudulently obtained food or lodging. The complaint states that on Nov. 22 the Tucker County Magistrate requested to speak with Deputy C.R. Summerfield of the Tucker County Sheriff's office. The magistrate informed Summerfield that he had received a complaint about an individual at the Alpine Lodge in Davis. The Manager at the Alpine Lodge stated that a female subject, namely Carmela Knight, had been staying there and was behind on payment. Summerfield responded to The Alpine Lodge and spoke with a male subject, namely Greg Downing, who stated that he is part of the Management Team at The Alpine Lodge. The officer obtained a handwritten and signed statement from Downing which stated that the defendant checked into the lodge on Oct. 18. She was paying for a few nights at a time and had gotten behind on the balance. Downing stated they were trying to be accommodating because she had no vehicle or anyplace to go. He stated she is behind on payment in the amount of \$1,031.69. The officer also obtained documentation from The Alpine Lodge showing her current balance, along with her making a payment of \$187.58 on Nov. 21.
- Heidi Ann Flynn was charged with one count of Battery. According to the complaint, on Thursday, Nov. 10 at approximately 10:12 p.m. Tucker County 911 dispatched Law Enforcement to a fight in progress located at the Tucker County Football Field near 100 Education Lane.

PFC N.C. Gigley of the Parsons Police Department was the first officer to arrive on scene and observed a large group of people in the Curve of the road at the top of the hill. The fight appeared to have broken up at the time individuals were dispersing. Trooper C.A. Hawkins of the WVSP and Deputy D.M. Gidley of the TCSO also responded to the call and arrived shortly after.

Through multiple witness accounts, it was stated that a physical altercation occurred between a Tucker County football player, an East Hardy football player and the East Hardy football player's mother in which she had The Tucker County football player on the ground in a choke hold from behind while her son struck him multiple times.

Joseph Strosnider, and East Hardy Middle School coach, in summary, stated that he and his daughter were exiting the parking lot of the football field and observed a group of people in a verbal argument. He stated the East Hardy player struck the Tucker County player starting the physical altercation. At this time Strosnider exited his vehicle and pulled the East Hardy player away from the altercation. He stated that the mother had the Tucker County player in a choke hold. He said that other individuals ran over and the altercation broke up.

The Tucker County player stated that upon hearing his sister yelling, he observed his mother and sister in what appeared to be a verbal confrontation with a female individual. He stated he attempted to move his sister and mother away from the female while trying to calm them down. That is when the East Hardy player struck him in the face with an unopened can of Coke. He then states that he began to fight back against the male, when the mother jumped on his back and placed him in a headlock.

He states that while she had him in a headlock and was choking him, they went to the ground while he still had a hold on the other player and the physical altercation continued. He states that is when someone pulled the male off him and the mother continued to keep him in a headlock. He described the situation as her having him around the neck area with both arms, her forearms against his throat and neck area. He states that the individuals that pulled the male off of him were East Hardy affiliated individuals. He states that he then left the area in order to compose himself before Law Enforcement arrived in order to speak to them.

Neil Kisamore II stated that around 10:08 p.m. he witnessed a female wearing a green East Hardy hooded jacket and a younger female exiting the field area and yelling at a younger female that was Tucker County Affiliated. He states the he observed a family walking behind the group saying something in the effect of

"Stop". He said he did not see the initial physical altercation however, when he heard yelling, he went running over to help. He states that he then observed the same female as mentioned above pull down a Tucker County player in a choke hold around his neck. He said that both individuals went to the ground. He states that while she choked the player, a young boy punched him twice before he could get over to them to separate the parties. He then stated that he grabbed the Tucker County player and took him away from the situation.

Morrisey Calls on UPS, FedEx to Clarify Gun Purchase Tracking Policies

CHARLESTON — West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey and 17 other state attorneys general are asking major shipping companies to clarify new policies that allow them to track firearm sales with unprecedented specificity and bypass warrant requirements to share that information with federal agencies.

Reports indicate that UPS and FedEx are now burdening those who hold Federal Firearms Licenses by requiring them to ship separately and track firearms, firearms parts and firearm products so gun purchases can be tracked and retain documents about what specific items those shipments contain and make that information available to the companies upon request.

"These demands, in tandem, allow [UPS/FedEx] to create a database of American gun purchasers and determine exactly what items they purchased... In doing so you, perhaps inadvertently, give federal agencies a workaround to normal warrant requirements. This allows [UPS/FedEx] to provide information at will or upon request to federal agencies—information detailing which Americans are buying what guns," Attorney General Morrisey joined in writing. "Additionally, we recommend that you consider taking actions to limit potential liability moving forward, including the immediate cessation of any existing warrantless information sharing with federal agencies about gun shipments." In addition to requesting updated FFL-

related shipping policies from the two companies, Attorney General Morrisey asked them to clarify the following:

• Did UPS/FedEx enact these policies with the goal of information sharing

with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) or any other federal agency?

• Did UPS/FedEx enact these policies at the request of officials in ATF, a different federal agency, or on its own initiative?

• If UPS/FedEx implemented these policies at the request of a federal agency, please identify that agency, the officials who made that request, the nature of that communication, and any legal authorization cited by those officials.

• If UPS/FedEx changed its policies on its own initiative, please explain why it made those changes.

• Did UPS/FedEx communicate or coordinate with each other in making

these changes?

• Did ATF or other federal agency employees help draft the updated shipping agreements?

Attorney General Morrisey joined in the Montana-led letters with his counterparts from Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, Florida, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Hampshire, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Texas, Utah and Wyoming.

PSC Issues Interim Rates for Mountaineer and Hope Gas

CHARLESTON, WV – The Public Service Commission today granted much lower interim purchased gas cost (PGC) rates for Mountaineer Gas Company and Hope Gas dba Dominion Energy West Virginia than the companies had requested.

Mountaineer Gas had originally requested a PCG of \$9.85 per Mcf for residential customers. Under the requested rate, the average residential customer using 13 Mcf per month would have received a \$197.93 winter monthly bill, an overall increase of 38%, as opposed to the current \$143.59 monthly bill that customer is now getting. The Commission granted a PGC of \$6.547 per Mcf which will result in an average monthly residential bill of \$165.59, an overall increase of 15%.

Hope Gas had originally requested a PCG of \$9.87 per Mcf for residential customers. Under the requested rate, the average residential customer using 13 Mcf per month would have received a \$219.50 winter monthly bill, an overall increase of 62%, as opposed to the current \$135.51 monthly bill that customer is now getting. The Commission granted a PGC of \$5.856 per Mcf which will result in an average monthly residential bill of \$173.89, an overall increase of 28%.

The rates ordered today are interim rates. The Commission will continue to review the price of natural gas and the impact of these interim rates and make further adjustments, if necessary, before setting final rates. These rates will be subject to a true-up in future 30C cases. Natural gas utilities are required to file PGC cases annually to reflect changes in the purchased gas component of their rates. The prices that natural gas utilities pay their suppliers for gas are not regulated by the Commission or the federal government, but are determined by the market. The Commission does examine the gas purchasing practices of gas utilities, reviews the reasonableness of requested increases and ensures the utility did everything possible to

obtain a reliable gas supply at the lowest possible market price. The PGC does not include any profit for the company.

Mountaineer and Hope/ Dominion are the two largest natural gas utility companies in West Virginia, collectively serving almost 89% of all natural gas utility customers in the state. 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\$18.7 million to strengthen public health infrastructure across West Virginia

Washington, DC – Today, U.S. Senator Joe Manchin (D-WV), member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, announced \$18,732,882 from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR). The funding was made possible in part by the American Rescue Plan and will help West Virginia strengthen its critical public health infrastructure by supporting the recruitment, retention and training of the public health workforce, improving organizational systems and advancing public health data modernization efforts.

"Our healthcare providers continue to go above and beyond to care for their fellow West Virginians, and I'm pleased the CDC is investing more than \$18.7 million to strengthen the public health infrastructure and workforce across our state," said Senator Manchin. "The funding announced today will help expand the existing public health workforce, advance efforts to modernize the use of public health data, improve organizational systems and prepare for future health risks to our state. I look forward to seeing the positive impacts of this investment and as a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, I will continue advocating for funding to bolster public health infrastructure across the Mountain State."



DHHR Announces Major Rate Increase for WV Ambulance Services

CHARLESTON, W.Va. – The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR), Bureau for Medical Services announced a 10% increase in ambulance ground transportation rates which will provide more than 200 West Virginia ambulance providers with \$11.8 million in additional reimbursements per fiscal year.

"We have so much gratitude for West Virginia's ambulance and emergency medical services workers, especially during the last two years of the COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting stress on the state's health care system," said Bill J. Crouch, DHHR Cabinet Secretary. "Together with Gov. Justice, we requested this increase because these funds are critical to our local ambulance services, many of which operate in rural areas where access to healthcare is limited. I am proud to make this



announcement today because I know how much it will mean for all our EMS workers, and all the West Virginians who rely on them to respond when they're needed most."

Effective now and retroactively beginning July 1, 2022, West Virginia's ambulance rate will now be paid at the same rate as Medicare. This is the maximum rate that Medicaid is allowed to pay by statute. Reimbursement is the same for both governmental and private providers.

DHHR's Bureau for Medical Services submitted the State Plan Amendment on September 8, 2022, and the amendment was approved by the U.S. Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services on November 9, 2022.

bers Filler said, "I have been trying to collect resources to help with our work on getting policies and those kinds of things like bylaws. I know the subcommittees have been working on it, but I have been spending some time with Randolph County EMS. I spent about a day in a half looking at their operations and having a discussion with their director. Yesterday I went to their ambulance authority board meeting. Some things are going to come up and there is potential changes forthcoming in the new calendar year with a mutual aid agreement."

Filler explained he received a drafted copy of the agreement where Randolph County is potentially going to be charging a \$200 or \$250 intercept fee. Randolph County does not currently charge for taking EMS calls for Tucker County. Filler explained further by saying, "There is no fee right now for mutual aid but, they (Randolph County EMS) have had discussion with the West Virginia Office of Emergency Services (WVOES) and their ability to impose a fee. Tucker County is not the sole source of this but, needless to say we are a major contributor to some of the burden they are having."

According to Filler the mutual aid calls have raised dramatically in recent months and the responding out of county EMS can not recover the cost back through traditional ambulance charges particularly if they make a call or run to Tucker County and it is a non-transit call.

Filler went on to say that the WVOES has tried to reach out to the Tucker County Commission several times but had received no response. After the meet-

ing Commissioner Mike Rosenau reached out to Director of WVOES Jody Ratliff to verify if this was true and after his conversation with Ratliff it was determined to be a false statement. Ratliff informed Rosenau he had not been trying to call but had sent one email. Rosenau informed Ratliff that the commission's office had not received that email.

EMS Director Shelia Marsh stated that she was under the impression that the Tucker County Commission would be responsible for the intercept fee, and Filler responded by saying that he was unsure if that is how it worked but the details of the agreement would have to be worked through. Randolph County EMS will continue discussion of the agreement at their January meeting.

Filler then introduced an idea to the board about providing Timberline Sky Resort with paid on-site EMS services. The crew would stay on-site at the sky resort for six hours a day for a per hour fee during the weekends. The resort would need the services from late December to around March as needed. Filler explained this would be a potential revenue offset and additional work for the EMS staff.

Treasurer Chris Davis presented the board with the financial standing of the organization. At the current time the authority is on track to make it through the fiscal year and into the next. If nothing is changed from the one crew running 24/7 then the authority has the funds to last until August of 2023 with the over \$200,000 still in their escrow account. Filler accredits the extended exhaustion date that was reported before was due to the mass reduction in staff. For the third portion of the fiscal year the authority stands at a 5.4 percent debt ratio.

The authority has received 305 donations for the total amount of \$31,510 and after expenses for the donation campaign the account has a balance of \$29,819.89.

Davis reported that was an estimated \$400 difference between the charges per run and the cash collected per run. From a cash accounting standpoint, the authority is \$84,000 in the red with the difference in cash flowing in and out. This is not a projected accrual budget for the fiscal year. The fiscal year runs July 1 to July 1.

Board member Diane Hinkle wished to thank the community for acknowledging and donating to the campaign by saying, "We just wish to acknowledge and thank everyone that has been appointed to the donations campaign. It has done pretty much as expected." Hinkle continued by saying, "We need to know what the direction is going forward. If we can leverage the donated money so we can maximize its use. I hope that the commission can help with that. Any time you run a donation campaign you always want to maximize those dollars and if you can leverage other dollars it sends a strong message to other potential donors. It is a good use of the money and I think we need to be very transparent in how we are using the money because donors also like to have that information."

Filler followed up with explaining he was working in his spare time to create a website for the Tucker County EMS to get the information out to the public.

The board voted accepted a sealed bid, from Angie Eldridge, for \$1,500 for a Dodge Durango (\$500) and a totaled 2009 Ford ambulance (\$1,000). They had also received a bid for the ambulance for \$1,000. Taking the offer for the \$1,500 was the obvious choice for the board.

The next Ambulance Authority meeting was not scheduled during the meeting.

"We are still searching for a larger space, 1,400 to 1,500 square feet, with hot and cold running water, a cement floor, and a toilet. Additionally, most of our volunteers are older, and having a single-story building with parking nearby is vital in the search."

"If anyone knows of a space in the Davis, Thomas, and Canaan Valley area, please give me a call at 304-621-4389," she added.

Staron said that higher food prices and rising inflation are forcing more community residents to ask for help putting food on the table. The Blackwater Ministerial Association Food Pantry served more than 90 households in October, an increase of 10 percent over what the organization helped in September.

"We have seen a steady increase in the number of people needing and asking for food assistance each month," Staron said. "The food pantry relies on grants and donations to keep up with the rising demand in the community, especially during the holidays and winter. Our generous donors allow us to serve each individual or family in need, plus provide a special Christmas meal."

Donations to the food pantry in Davis can be made out to Blackwater Ministerial Association and mailed to Treasurer Cathy Thomas, P.O. Box 58, Davis, WV 26260.

The Blackwater Ministerial Association Food Pantry gets its food in multiple ways, including buying it themselves, Mountaineer Food Bank, and collections from individuals, groups, and churches. The volunteers plan and source the items for the distributions six months to a year ahead of time.

"We like to plan by counting and tracking our inventory carefully so we know what we can give out each month to individuals and families," Staron said. "We buy as much as we can locally from Shop'n Save or other area grocers and get our fresh fruits and vegetables from local farmers."

The food pantry rotates the monthly staples and non-food items a family receives. One month a family may receive paper towels, and the following month they may receive toilet paper or toothpaste.

"Each month, we try and give each family some kind of meat, whether it be chicken, beef, or pork," Staron said. "We also try and give out a little bag of goodies if there are children in the household."

The food pantry relies heavily on volunteers for its monthly food distribution day, the first Wednesday of each month starting at 1 p.m. The volunteers prepare and fill the bags for distribution on the first Tuesday of the month from 9 to 10:30 a.m.

"We always need volunteers to help and welcome anyone who wants to donate time," Staron said. "If it weren't for the volunteers and the people in the community donating, we wouldn't be able to serve families in our area."



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

Dec. 8–11 in the state's 51 counties open to deer firearms season. The next segment of the bear firearms season will open Dec. 5 and run through the end of the year.

"The year may be coming to a close, but there's still plenty of chances for folks to

enjoy a hunting adventure and fill their freezer with nutritious wild game," said WVDNR Director Brett McMillion.

Hunters are reminded to wear at least 400 square inches of blaze orange when hunting in a county with an open deer firearms season. Hunters must also check big game at a license agent, by calling 844-WVcheck or online at WVhunt.com. For more information about these hunting seasons, open counties and regulations, hunters should consult the Hunting and Trapping Regulations Summary, available to download at WVdnr.gov/ hunting-regulations.

Antlerless Deer Season

All antlerless deer taken during the season must be taken on a Class N or NN stamp or with a Class DT license. Landowners hunting on their own property do not have to purchase a Class N or NN stamp. Only one antlerless deer may be taken on each stamp. For bag limits by county, hunters should consult the Hunting and Trapping Regulations Summary.

A final segment of the ant-



lerless deer season will be open Dec. 28-31. Bear Firearms Season

Starting Dec. 5 and running through Dec. 31, all or parts of 26 counties will be open for bear hunting with or without dogs and all or parts of 35 counties will be open for bear hunting without dogs. For a complete list of these counties and portions thereof, check page 39-40 of the Hunting and Trapping Regulations Summary.

All bear hunters are required to have a Class DS stamp. Hunters also are reminded that they are required to send a first premolar tooth from each harvested bear to the WVDNR Elkins Operations Center or their local district office by Jan. 31. Hunters who harvest a female black bear are encouraged to save the reproductive tract and entrails.

Hunters who harvest a female black bear should save the reproductive tracts or entrails by keeping them cool or freezing them and contact the closest WVDNR district office to arrange a pickup. Hunters who submit a complete reproductive tract will be eligible for a \$20 gift card.

Hunters can get a bear tooth envelope at


all district offices and the Elkins Operations Center.

Two deer may be taken during the season and hunters who purchase a Class RM or RRM stamp or a Class DR license may take one additional deer. For more information about the deer muzzleloader season, hunters should consult page 30 in the Hunting and Trapping Regulations Summary.

To participate in these seasons, hunters are reminded to purchase their stamps to go along with an appropriate hunting license. Hunting licenses and stamps may be purchased at license agents around the state or online at WVhunt.com.

FCC Launches New National Broadband Map; West Virginia Prepares to Challenge by January 13, 2023

CHARLESTON, W.Va. -The new National Broadband Map was released by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) on November 18, 2022. The West Virginia Office of Broadband and the West Virginia Broadband Enhancement Council ask that all West Virginians review their location data and broadband availability data on the new map to help ensure accuracy. The FCC will accept challenges through January 13, 2023.

According to the FCC, the new National Broadband Map is a "pre-production draft," identifying broadband availability at the address level. The new map is the first iteration designed under the FCC's new Broadband Data Collection (BDC) program. The map displays Internet services across the United States, as reported by Internet Service Providers (ISPs) to the FCC. States, local governments and consumers have less than two months to submit challenges.

The FCC map will be used to calculate the amount of funds allocated to the State of West Virginia by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) through its Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) program. This program will provide historic funding for broadband deployment nationwide under the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). The greatest share of funding, \$42.5 billion, will be allocated nationwide under the BEAD program. Each state will receive a minimum of \$100 million and final allocations will be based upon several factors, including an analysis of unserved locations as shown on the FCC map. Unserved locations are those without reliable service of at least 25 Megabits

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
"It is vital that all West Virginia addresses are included in the FCC mapping data, especially when funding allocations will be based on the number of unserved locations in our State," said Governor Jim Justice. "Every West Virginian and every West Virginia address should be counted, especially those that lack real broadband service. I have directed the West Virginia Office of Broadband to challenge the FCC data whenever and wherever possible to ensure that all West Virginians gain access to crucial infrastructure."

The West Virginia Department of Economic Development, Office of Broadband, has already submitted more than 138,000 missing addresses to the FCC, as part of the State's official challenge to the FCC Broadband Serviceable Location (BSL) Fabric, in November 2022. The BSL Fabric provides the foundation for the new broadband availability map. Missing locations can still be added. Additionally, multi-family addresses with incorrect unit counts can be corrected.

There are several distinctions between the FCC map and the WV broadband map. The WV Office of Broadband has utilized the Statewide Addressing and Mapping System (SAMS) and parcel data to create West Virginia's address-level broadband map, which includes 1,094,392 unique address locations in

West Virginia. The FCC map initially included 902,699 address locations. In addition, the WV Office of Broadband does not include satellite service in its served category. However, the FCC map is showing satellite areas as served. The

"Participation in the challenge process will help ensure that all West Virginians are accurately represented on the FCC map," said Economic Development Secretary Mitch Carmichael. "All West Virginians should review their location on this new FCC map and submit a Location Challenge if their location is missing. Concerns about internet service are also extremely important and should be included in an Availability Challenge."

West Virginians are encouraged to submit a Location Challenge to indicate that an address is missing, or an Availability Challenge to indicate that availability is incorrect.

Please follow the instructions below on how to submit a challenge:

How to Find Your Address:

Visit https://broadbandmap.fcc. 1. gov/home.

Using the search bar, type in 2. the address you wish to review. The map should automatically zoom to your location.

After finding your location, a 3. side-panel on the right-hand side of the screen will populate location and service information.

If your location is missing, ensure 4. to select the building footprint or space of your location to submit a Location Challenge.

How to Submit a Location

Challenge to the FCC:

After searching a location, select 1. the building footprint or space to where the point location layer is missing.

Once the location is found, select "Challenge Location."

You will be required to fill out 3. a form regarding information about your location.

4. After a challenge is submitted, you will receive a confirmation email informing you that it has been received by the FCC.

5. If a location is available on the map that includes inaccurate information, navigate to "Location Challenge" in the side-panel to complete the form.

How to Submit an Availability **Challenge to the FCC:**

After searching a location, select 1. "Availability Challenge" in the side-panel. Select the provider (ISP) you 2. wish to challenge.



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


