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## Town of Davis Updates on Major Leak at Industrial Park

During the committee reports Town of Davis Reporter, Jennie Helmick, presented the council members with an invoice for \$29,601.54 for the emergency replacement sewer project. The project is for a major leak that occurred at the industrial park. Mark Burns presented a report that stated Doug Martin, RK&K, two of the three contractors that bid on the project as well as himself met to open the sealed bids on December 8, 2022.

All bids received were opened and read aloud and checked to ensure all documents were provided. The low bid of \$135,100 was from Blue Ridge Construction Group, Inc. The total cost for the repairs will be \$191,000 with some items being backordered. Those items will need to be delivered for the project to begin as well as approval of the bids by the funding agency.

It was reported that the cleaning of the water tank will begin once the new slightly higher quotes from Liquid Engineering Corporation are signed. The need for the cleaning is because stormwater was found in the tanks.

The Planning Commission reported that the requested amendments from town council had been received and responses to those amendments were presented back to the council. A work session between the commission and council will be held on December 28 at 4:30 p.m. and will be located at the Davis Town Hall.

Parks and ecreation committee member/councilman Martin motioned for Wi-Fi to be installed at the community center for a camera system due to vandalism to new park equipment and a keyless lock system to ensure more control over who enters the building. Motion carried. There will be new doors installed at the community center as well.

The council regretfully accepted the resignation of their water/sewer operator Burns (Digger). In his letter of resignation to the council Burns said, "I am incredibly grateful for the opportunity the Town has given me and I value the insights I have learned. I am certain it will help with my future endeavors. I would also like to thank the Town for being supportive of my professional opinions. I have enjoyed working with the Town, the citizens, and its employees. I have made lasting friendships that I value tremendously."

Burns also mentioned in his letter that if the Town of Davis ever needed his help he would do what he could when he can. Helmick went on record to say, "We are really missing a really good operator. He is probably the best I have worked with since I have worked for the Town. He kept updates on everything. He found things that hadn't been taken care of for years and he has been very efficient in his job."

Mayor Alan Tomson was not in attendance to present any updates.

Two building permits were approved by the council. The first was for a new home on lot 2 at 6 Riverwalk Place for Nathalie Cataisson. The second was for a 30 x 125-foot metal building at 166 Fifth Street for Dustin Luzier. Luzier is constructing a new laundry service.

The next meeting of the Town of Davis Council will be held on January 11, 2023, at 6:30 p.m. The meeting is held at the Davis Town Hall located at 505 William Ave.

## **Attempted Robbery** at Davis Bank

Dec. 20, 2022 at approximately 1 p.m. the Davis Branch of the Grant County Bank, in Tucker County, called Tucker 911 to report a bank robbery in progress involving a white male.

The Tucker County Sheriff's Department and the Parsons Detachment of the West Virginia State Police responded to the scene and arrested the alleged bank robber in the facility.

Tucker County Sheriff, J.E. Kopec said, "A post investigation revealed the male was 21 years of age and from New Jersey. He allegedly passed a note informing the bank teller that this is a bank robbery, give me money or else. The bank teller told the alleged robber to leave. He refused and verbalized that this was a bank robbery and to give money or else."

The alleged bank robber was identified as Noah B. **Shafron,** of Wyckoff, NJ, was charged with one felony count of Robbery or Attempted Robbery. His bond was set at \$100,000 and he is housed in the Tygart Valley

No one was hurt in the incident and no money was given by the bank staff. The investigation is being handled by the Tucker County Sheriff's Department.

## TCHS Principal Looking to Revive the CNA Program

Tucker County High School Principal Alex Cork presented school board members with an update on the first nine weeks academics. Cork stated he intentionally waited to report because he wanted to have the most up to date information that included the PSAT scores for the students. The entire school, grades nine through 11, took the PSAT at the end of October. Only a third of the students took the test state wide as most schools do not use a yearly test for benchmarking.

Cork said, "We are not where we want to be but the thing that makes me excited about this is we know we are not where we want to be NOW, not in April. We can identify where students are weak now, not after they have taken the formal test. That is the big advantage of doing this." Six students passed the math section with a score

of 510 or more with and estimated 16 or more students that were only a question or two away that score.

Cork also explained that he had met with Courtland Acres in order to get the Certified Nursing Assistant course started once again. It had been shut down since

COVID. There is also a \$13,000 grant from Eastern Medical College to help the students go to Cortland Acres, train to be a CNA, become certified and potentially start employment immediately afterwards.

According to Cork, several teachers at the high school mentioned that there was a huge turn out for the parent/teacher conference night. Teachers had sent out letters to parents and those parents were lined up down the halls to speak with the teachers.

The high school hosted a fall career fair.

## Up to \$4.7 Million for Livestock Management Project Through West Virginia University

He was a member of the Tucker County Development Authority where he had served as President for the past eleven years and had been influential in development within the county.

He had a passion for farming, raising Black Angus cattle and taking care of the land he loved. He had been going to Sucre, Bolivia with a mission team since 1991 helping with the building of a Christian University, two orphanages, re-hab center, church and currently a school. He had always seen his mission in life to be of service to his fellowman.

includes not only Tucker County but also Barbour, Braxton, Calhoun, Gilmer, Harrison, Lewis, Marion, Randolph, Pocahontas, and Upshur counties.

Henry-Vance explained that the goals of the YEP program is to increase environmental awareness among young people and energize them to take steps in becoming responsible stewards of the environment. She also works with solid waste authorities throughout her district to promote recycling education opportunities. Henry- Vance said, "There are several activities and presentations about environmental topics available for students in preschool through high school. Plus, members can compete for more than \$15,000 in awards annually, including a \$2,500-peryear college scholarship for one lucky high school senior. The YEP offers Junior Conservation Camp each June for ages 11 to 14, as well as the Youth Environmental Conference during a weekend in October."

In addition to the YEP program, the DEP has many programs aimed at fulfilling its mission of promoting a healthy environment. Some of those programs include the Adopt-A-Highway, Adopt-A-Spot, and Make it Shine litter cleanup programs. Henry-Vance explained more information can be found on the YEP or other DEP initiatives by visiting the DEP web-

Another guest of the authority was Jeffery Craig of the Renewable Natural Gas Company. Craig presented the authority with information on the possibility of placing a gas collection system plant on the property of the landfill. The plant will operate unmanned except for any upgrades or repairs needed, and the authority will have the option to purchase the plant for \$1 from RNGC. Craig said, "Municipal solid waste landfills are the third-largest human-generated of methane emissions in the United States."

RNGC is the developer and operator of landfill gas to energy projects that produce pipeline quality renewable natural gas for the compressed natural gas vehicle fuel market. RNGC developed their first landfill gas to renewable natural gas in 1999. According to Craig, "Those projects have operated continuously for the past 22 plus years and RNGC has created a unique development strategy aimed at increasing the universe of potential development sites and mitigating the risks that is the cause of economic under performance of some projects. RNGC has assembled a team with extensive project development, execution, and operating experience to exe-

cute the strategy."

Benefits to the local community and the environment were discussed. Local community benefits include the royalties the landfill would receive from the plant could be in the ball park of \$150,000 to \$200,000 per year for 20 plus years. The county would receive an estimated \$130,000 in personal property taxes and the project would reduce local greenhouse gas emissions by 40 percent.

The project captures landfill gases in lieu of the release of the methane into the atmosphere and converts it into renewable natural gas. This energy source is utilized in place of non-renewable energy source creating a domestic, renewable, clean fuel and energy supply with the lowest carbon of any fuel on a lifecycle basis. Renewable natural gas offers the lowest greenhouse gas emissions of any commercially available fuel and reduces lifecycle greenhouse gas emissions by

70 to 300 percent as compared to conventional diesel or gasoline.

Renewable natural gas is a market item for companies such as UPS Inc., Amazon, and Waste Management. UPS Inc. announced in 2020 it spent \$450 million to add 6,000 vehicles powered by compressed natural gas as well as supporting infrastructure. In 2021 Amazon ordered 1,000 compressed natural gas vehicles and increased the number of compressed gas vehicles available to its partners. Also in 2021, Amazon ordered hundreds of trucks that run on compressed natural gas as it tests ways to shift its United States fleet away from heavier polluting

The project teams include Lee Enterprises Consulting, Chemex Global, and Greenlane Biogas. Solid Waste Authority President Mark Holstine motioned for the board to vote on whether to have RNGC prepare a proposal for the gas collection plant that will pro-

vide further information on what will be needed and included to install the plant on the landfill's property. The board voted in favor of the motion.

Upon formal acceptance of a proposal RNGC will provide drafts of all of the agreements necessary for the purchase of the landfill gas, project construction and operation, as well as more definitive project schedules. Upon execution of the agreements, it will take three to six months to design and permit the landfill gas compression system and depending on the time of year, it generally takes three months for construction. The energy project generally takes 10 to 12 months start to finish.

The next TCSWA meeting will be held on January 10, 2023, at 3 p.m. The meeting is open to the public and will be held at the TCSWA office located at 284 Landfill Road, Davis.

34 different participants. We had several no shows so we can push for 40 in the spring."

School Superintendent Alicia Lambert said the 2021/2022 school year accountability ratings were completed. There were a couple of red flags, but Lambert explained that all school systems received a couple each time. If a school receives more than three red marks or more they have to go before the state board and present what they are doing for improvement. Tucker County does not have to do this.

One of those red flags was during the COVID epidemic to where even though school was back in session students still missed a large number of days due to quarantines

The other struggle was for math. The schools had switched to Math 1 2 3 4 but then switched by back to a traditional pathway. With the Math 1 2 3 4 students were

only taught a limited amount in the early grades because it was taught more in depth in the following school year, and this was determined not to be the best practice.

The accountability rating is devised to determine when the state should step in and gain control over a failing school system. According to https://wvde.us/ accountability, "The Office of Accountability monitors and implements the West Virginia System of Support and Accountability in accordance with WVBE Policy 2322. Services coordinated by the Office of Accountability are based on the West Virginia Standards for Effective Schools and support continuous improvement. The office supports schools and counties and encourages districts to become outcomefocused, innovative, and accountable learning organizations.

A variety of data, including the WV Balanced Scorecard and WV Accountability

System (WVAS) Efficiency Standards, are monitored, and analyzed to identify relevant school and district improvement priorities and build the capacity for county operational effectiveness. Additionally, the Office of Accountability annually recognizes schools and counties for student academic growth, school quality performance and growth through the WV Distinguished Schools Recognition Program, National Blue Ribbon Schools, WV Sustainable Schools, and National Green Ribbon Schools programs."

Lambert said, "Obviously we have some things we need to improve on, but I think you will see our attendance jump because we are not quarantining anymore. We obviously still have kids that miss but it is not near the numbers like we were seeing last year and the year before."

The Tucker County Solid Waste Authority has established the **first Thursday of each month as free disposal day.** If the first Thursday falls on a holiday, the following Thursday is designated as free day. Any person who is not a resident of West Virginia may only participate in the monthly free day upon proof that his or her state of residence would likewise allow West Virginia residents to dispose of residential solid waste in the same substantially similar manner.

• UP TO ONE (1) PICK-UP TRUCK LOAD OR ITS EQUIVALENT PER HOUSEHOLD OF HOUSEHOLD RESIDENTIAL WASTE WILL BE FREE OF ALL CHARGES AND FEES (MAXIMUM WEIGHT OF 516 POUNDS) All loads over 516 pounds will be subject to the Landfill regular gate rate. All loads are subject to random screening and weighing. No preferential treatment will be given to either paying or non-paying customers on free day. Free day is only available to persons not in the business of hauling or disposing of solid waste.

- $\bullet$  WE ACCEPT COMPUTER MONITOR OR TELEVISION at no charge.
- NO DEBRIS (Lumber, Dry Wall, Paneling, Roof Shingles, Fencing, Yard Waste, etc.) Only household residential waste is free of charges. Cost for disposal or debris is \$53.50/ton.
- NO CHEMICALS, BATTERIES, OR FREE FLOWING LIQUIDS including, but not limited to oil, paint, gas, and fuel oil. Paint cans must be empty, or paint dried out with lids removed.
- NO APPLIANCES ACCEPTED CONTAINING FREON. Customers must provide proof of Freon removal for the appliance to be accepted by the Landfill. All appliances will be accepted with the Freon removed (refrigerators, freezers, etc.) or that has no Freon (sinks, stoves, hot water heaters, microwaves, washing machines, dryers, etc.)
- NO SCAVENGING. Scavenging is prohibited by law and will be strictly enforced.
- DEBRIS MUST BE CONTAINED. Residential solid waste is not required to be bagged. However, all loads must be secured by a tarp or covering in a manner to present windblown material. Unsecured loads will not be permitted to dump.

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

## WVU Potomac State College receives US Department of Justice Grant

The United States Department of Justice, specifically, the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) will award \$10,688,200 through 36 grants to colleges across the nation. The funding will be used to help educate, address and prevent domestic violence and sexual assault on college campuses as well as enhance services through the "Grants to Reduce Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, ing Violence and Stalking on Campus Program."

West Virginia University Potomac State College recently received official notification that it's application for this program has been funded for \$299,964 for three years, beginning October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2025. The College will partner with the Family Crisis Center, Inc. in Keyser, the Keyser Police Department and with WVU to implement this initiative.

"Studies show that approxi-

mately one in five women surveyed have been victimized by sexual assault while in college," said Associate Attorney General Vanita Gupta. "We need to support college campuses with the resources to create a campus culture that is not tolerant of sexual assault or dating violence. These grants will help colleges and universities develop prevention policies, offer survivor-centered services, and train campus police to meet the needs of their students.

"This grant allows Potomac State College to be proactive and a leader among its institutional peers, to develop preventative measures, education and training to help eliminate sexual assault and dating violence in this nation," said Potomac State College Interim Campus President Chris Gilmer. "While we pride ourselves on having a very safe campus, this grant will also allow us to enhance our services to ensure

that any victims receive high quality, confidential support and care."

The Campus Program supports higher education institutions in developing services and programs that are designed to educate, address and prevent sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking on campus. Grantees are required to adopt a multidisciplinary response program that involves student affairs, student health, athletics, residence life, law enforcement and victim service providers. They also provide incoming students with prevention and educational programs about sexual and domestic violence, training for campus police and security and training for judicial and disciplinary board members.



## Deer season for youth, senior, class Q/QQ hunters opened Dec. 26

SOUTH CHARLESTON, W.Va. — The final segment of West Virginia's special antlerless deer hunting season for youth and senior citizen hunters and Class Q/QQ permit holders opened Monday, Dec. 26.

During the two-day season, hunting is permitted on private and public lands in the 51 counties with a firearms deer hunting season. Deer hunting with a firearm is prohibited in Logan, McDowell, Mingo and Wyoming counties.

"This special antlerless season provides an excellent opportunity to pass on hunting traditions to youth hunters," said West Virginia Division of Natural Resources Director Brett McMillion. "This season also provides a tremendous opportunity for seniors and hunters with a Class Q/QQ permit to enjoy this unique hunting experience at a time when there are fewer people in the woods."

Youth hunters 8-17 may participate in this special season. Senior citizens 65 and older, who have a resident Class XS lifetime hunting,

trapping and fishing license, may also participate.

#### **License Requirements and Hunting Regulations**

Resident youth hunters 8-14 don't need a hunting license, stamps or hunter safety education card, but must be accompanied by an unarmed, licensed adult who may not hunt. Resident youth hunters 15-17 must comply with all licensing requirements, but don't need a Class N Stamp.

Nonresident youth hunters need a Class XXJ/Class AAHJ license and a CS/LW Stamp or a Class DT license. All accompanying nonresident adults must have a Class E License with a CS/LE Stamp. Resident and non-resident hunting licenses and stamps can be purchased online at WVhunt.com.

All hunters participating in this season, including adults accompanying a child, must wear at least 400-square inches of blaze orange.

season is one antlerless deer per day. A total of four antlerless deer may be harvested during this season. Deer harvested during this special season do not count toward a hunter's annual deer season bag limit. Class N/NN stamps are not required for this special season.

Each deer must be field tagged and electronically registered within 24 hours of the close of each segment of the split season and before pursuit of any additional deer. Deer can be checked online at WVhunt.com, at a license agent or by calling




