

# Simmons, Falls Address Tucker County **Commission; Levy Rate Approved**



Michael Simmons updates the Commissioners on the latest developments with Tucker County 911.

"Right now, as a team we call it with every organization, I'm pretty pleased with it," Tucker County Commissioner Fred Davis said at the regular meeting of the Tucker County Commission.

Michael Simmons and Bailey Falls updated Tucker County Commissioners at the regular scheduled meeting Wednesday, April 27 at 4 p.m. at the Tucker County Courthouse Court Room.

Simmons, Interim Director of Tucker County 911 provided

an update on the latest developments within his department. "So far for this month, the first of April through today, the 911 Center has taken a total of 988 calls," Simmons said. "87 of those required EMS to respond, 124 of them were for law."

Simmons also informed the Commission of an upcoming project to replace/update the door intercom system. "That's required by law with us being a secure facility, to have not only a camera that sees there, but also a way to communicate," Simmons said. "It's a push button intercom system and it

will interact with the dispatchers inside. They will have not only a phone, but they can open the door with the computers."

Simmons said the new system would improve employee safety after dark. "If someone comes to the door in the middle of the night with a black hood on and they're standing at the door ringing the bell to get in, we have the ability to talk to them and not jeopardize ourselves or any of the sensitive data in there," Simmons said.

Commissioner Rosenau asked when the existing system was installed. Simmons informed the Commission

that the existing system was installed during construction of the 911 Center. "That's the original system that was put in when the 911 Center was built," Simmons said. "So we are updating a system that has never been updated," Rosenau said.

Bailey Falls, Director of Animal Shelter, updated the Commission on the shelters recent Rabies Clinic and funding for a new facility. "We had a bigger turn out then we ever had before," Falls said.

She informed the Commission that the event vaccinated 263 pets and provided 79 microchips. "We planned for a three-hour bubble between the events," Falls said. "It was supposed to run from 9 to 11 a.m.at Parsons, then 2 to 4 p.m. at Thomas. We finished at 1:30 p.m. in Parsons." The event was staffed by 17 volunteers between the two locations.

"This is also the first year that we did everything from our internal software system," Falls said. "We had a crash training course...to print out the official certificates and we have copies of everything and See COMMISSION page 6A

The Randolph-Tucker Children's Advocacy Center hosted its annual awards banquet at the Elk's Lodge in Elkins. The organization th was celebrating its 20<sup>u</sup> year. Board Member Raymond Godwin gave the opening remarks and announced the award winners. Music for the event was provided by the duo Wish Awake.

Executive Director Margot Evick acknowledged those in attendance that had made the event and the organization's goals possible. The banquet honored four previous Executive Directors: Iestyn Bright, Melody Himes, Sharon Bedford, and Lydia Johnson Grady. "This is our 20<sup>th</sup> year," Evick said. "...The CAC you see today was built from the foundations laid well before me. I, along with the Board of Directors, would like to acknowledge the previous Executive

Tucker County Family Resource Network was the recipient of the Community Partner Award. The Community Partner Award is awarded to an organization or individual that partners or collaborates with the CAC to assist in their response to the abuse of children. The Tucker County Family Resource Network is a nonprofit founded in 1995 and provide local resource coordination. "These col-

laborations, resources, or personnel that strengthen our response to abuse and neglected children," Godwin said. "That being said, it is no surprise that the Tucker County Resource Network is nominated for this award....The FRN does so much for children in our community."

The Professional Award was awarded to Rob Huffman. The award is bases on professionalism, accuracy in care and integrity. "There are countless times that he went above and beyond," Godwin said. "He is one of a kind in the world of Social Workers."

The evening concluded with the live auction of donated items.

The Randolph-Tucker Children's Advocacy Center was founded in 2003 as an organization that brings together child protection workers, treatment professions and criminal justice workers to investigate and hold accountable child offenders in Tucker and Randolph Counties.

The CAC facilitates partners collaborate response, arranges family visits including support services such as transportation, conducts forensic interviews, provides family advocacy and crisis intervention services and ensures appropriate medical treatment. The CAC provides services free of charge to every client and has served over 100 children since their inception.





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# **News of Record**

#### The following criminal complaints have been filed in the Tucker County Magistrate office:

- Clayton K. Mallow, of Dry Fork, was charged with one felony count of Unauthorized Use of a Controlled Access Device. According to the complaint on Oct. 21, 2022 Sgt. V. Pyles was contacted by a female regarding a fraudulent charge located on her Mountain Valley Bank statement. She was alerted to the possible fraudulent charges by her daughter. The records show that on Oct. 17, 2022 an individual attempted to transfer \$10,541.44 from her bank account to an Apple Card (Goldman Sachs Bank). Through the information provided by the victim, Pyles was able to gain the holder's identity with a search warrant to Goldman Sachs Bank. He discovered that Daniel Mallow was the name that appeared on the account. There was no cell phone or email for the individual. The phone number associated to the Apple Card is that of Clayton Mallow who resides with Daniel Mallow at the same address. Daniel Mallow denied ever having an Apple Card.
- Further investigation revealed the defendant is employed in Parsons at Nationwide Insurance. The victim has Nationwide insurance and will go to the location in person to pay her premium monthly by CHECK. A check will contain enough information for an individual to attempt an electronic transfer of funds "EFT" or will show as "ACH" on banking records. The Apple Card had the victim's banking information attached as a payment method. A notice was sent to the defendant stating that the account had been removed as a payment method due to the unsuccessful transaction. The transaction was denied due to the amount and lack of funds. It is alleged that the defendant had access to the victim's personal information and used the same to attempt a large money transfer "ACH" commonly known as "EFT" on one occasion which is unauthorized use of a control access device.
- Christopher Lee Cunningham, of Winchester, VA, was charged with one count Driving Revoked for DUI. The complaint states that on April 7, 2023 Deputy B.M. Gidley resp0nded to a motor vehicle accident on US219 around 4362 Seneca Trail. Once he arrived on scene, Trooper C. Hawkins was on scene obtaining vehicle information and driver information. Hawkins radioed Tucker Communication for the driver's information. 911 responded and advised that the defendant's driver's status was revoked for DUI  $2^{\mbox{nd}}$  through Virginia effective date May 5, 2021.' The defendant was with EMS getting medically cleared. After he was medically cleared Gidley asked if he knew his license was revoked for DUI. The defendant advised he knew it was at a point and did classes to get them back. Gidley advised him that his license was still revoked for DUI through

CHARLESTON - West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey announced a representative from his office will meet with north central West Virginia residents in May to discuss consumer-related issues and answer any potential questions.

"These public events are a great way for consumers to talk one-on-one with our consumer representatives," Attorney General Morrisey said. "Residents can easily get questions answered, learn what is going on in their area and how to keep personal information safe and secure." Pam Krushansky, a consumer outreach and compliance specialist with the office, will host the events on May 31: Noon to 1:30 p.m. - Flanagan Hill Community Center, Route 72, Red Creek.

Virginia so he was still going to be placed into custody for driving revoked for DUI in West Virginia. The defendant was transported to WVSP Parsons Detachment for processing.

- Jordan Douglas Brown, of Parsons, was charged with one count of Domestic Battery. According to the complaint Patrolman First Class N.C. Gidley received a call from Tucker County 911 regarding a domestic disturbance at BFS, located at 200 First St. in parsons. Tucker 911 advised that an employee with BFS called in and stated that a female came into the store fighting with a male subject and was bleeding.
- Tucker 911 also advised the WVSP Trooper Hawkins was en-route as well from the Elkins area and had requested for PFC. Gidley to be contacted to respond. Gidley had Tucker 911 contact EMS and have them respond due to the female bleeding and not knowing the extent of the injuries. Gidley arrived on scene and spoke with the BFS employee who in summary stated that the woman had come running into the store screaming and was being chased by a male subject. He stated that he would not let the male subject come into the store and he left walking in the direction of Chestnut St. The employee saw that the female was bleeding and called EMS.
- Gidley made contact with the victim who stated that she had gotten into a verbal argument with Jordan Brown which then turned physical when she attempted to take some medicine for a headache. She stated that Brown allegedly took the bottle of medicine and threw it across the room. When she attempted to pick up the medicine He slapped the bottle out of her hand. She stated that she then attempted to untangle a cord when he grabbed the cord and hit her with it, which left a mark on her leg. She said that Brown allegedly grabbed hold of her which resulted in her shirt being torn. She said that she then left the apartment and ran to BFS. This altercation occurred at the Tucker Manor.
- Gidley observed a red mark on the left leg of the victim as well as red marks on her wrists and arms and a tear on the left shoulder of her shirt. He also observed that the victim was bleeding from her foot, which she stated happened when she was running from Brown. The victim did not wish to be checked by EMS and Tucker 911 was informed to cancel their response. Hawkins arrived shortly after and obtained a written statement from the victim and made contact with Tucker 911 in regards to contacting Women's Aid in Crisis.
- After the Women's Aid in Crisis worker arrived on scene Gidley and Hawkins proceeded to Tucker Manor and made contact with Brown who stated that the altercation was about her attempting suicide with a knife and possibly pills. Brown state he did grab hold of her wrists in order to keep her from using the knife but

denied any additional physical contact with the victim. Brown was then placed under arrest for domestic battery. He was then transported to the WVSP Barracks for processing by Gidley and transported to TVRJ by Trooper Hawkins.

All the above incidents occurred in Tucker County and all individuals are presumed innocent until proven otherwise in a court of law.



# **Canaan Valley Program Tells** the Story of Tucker County **Moonshiner Ab Crossland**

Expert speakers and local citizens will discuss an exciting 1970 legal battle that was waged - and won! -- by Albert "Ab" Crossland (1884-1973), a legendary Canaan Valley "moonshiner." Crossland's victory was publicized around the world. ## **New Hire**

Michael Simmons, Interim Director of Tucker County 911 petitioned the Commission to hire a new part-time dispatcher for the 911 Center. "We had a lady put in an application a while back," Simmons said. "Her name is Hailey Tuttle. She is a local girl. She is looking to remain local. She wants to put down permanent roots in the county and get a job started where she can grow it into a career."

According to Simmons, he interviewed her and feels that she would be a good fit to the center. "She's willing to pick up shifts, she can work any shifts, and she's willing to start out part time to get her foot in the door," Simmons said. Simmons told the commission that the center currently has two part time employees. Of those, one has limited availability and the other is looking to become full time. The center also has eight full time dispatchers according to Simmons. "I anticipate having an opening here in the near future," Simmons said. "People move, they want a change of environment. It's a stressful job." Simmons said it takes a minimum of 90 days to train a new employee. "In the past, we never took enough foresight," Simmons said. "We had phones become available, but no one ready to step in and fill the hole...I'd like to avoid that." Simmons and the Commission said they were impressed by her work ethic, willingness to be a part of the team and do whatever is needed to help, and her prior work with

only benefits the county, in my opinion," Simmons said. The Commissioners approved the part time hire effective May 1.

Also approved at the meeting was funds for an OEM Carport from Coal Severance Funds in an amount not to exceed \$10,000. The purpose of the carport is to shelter equipment, including the mobile command trailer and several generators, from the elements.

"Right now, our equipment basically sets out in the weather all winter," Tucker County Commissioner Mike Rosenau said. Simmons said the equipment included the Mobile Command trailer, several generators, and cargo trailers. "There's a lot of money wrapped up in that command vehicle. A lot of equipment," Simmons said. The Commission also addressed a request by county homeowners to rename their road at the meeting. "We received an application from several homeowners," Michael Simmons said. "It is an existing road in Hendricks...Current name is King Fisher Road. There are four residents on that road. They've all signed and agreed. Their one of preference is Katmandu Blvd. There is no existing Katmandu Blvd in the county currently." Rosenau said, "And all the land owners on that road are in agreement that Katmandu Blvd is acceptable." Simmons said the name was one of a list that the residents had submitted for consideration. Accord-



Charleston WV - The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

May 3, 1843: U.S. Postmaster General William Lyne Wilson was born in Smithfield, Jefferson County. Wilson joined President Cleveland's cabinet as postmaster general in 1895. The following year, he introduced Rural Free Delivery in Jefferson County, an experiment which was quickly instituted nationwide.

May 3, 1917: Fire destroyed the West Virginia Preparatory School in Keyser. The school was rebuilt, and it evolved into the institution now known as WVU Potomac State College.

May 3, 1948: The plane of test pilot Howard "Tick" Lilly, a Raleigh County native, crashed on takeoff in California. Lilly was the first of many government test pilots to die in the line of duty. Six weeks earlier, he had become only the fourth person to break the sound barrier.

May 4, 1896: The Children's Home Society of West Virginia was formed by a group of Charleston ministers. Their goal was to place orphaned and neglected children with caring families rather than crowd them into county poorhouses.

May 5, 1923: A fire started by welders working on a new swimming pool destroyed most of Luna Park, an amusement park in Charleston. Although Luna's owners announced they would rebuild, the park never reopened.

May 5, 1923: Golfer Bill Campbell was born in Huntington. He won more than 30 championships over a seven-decade career and is considered one of the best amateur players in history.

May 6, 1812: Activist and physician Martin Robison Delany was born in Charles Town. In February 1865, he was commissioned as a major in the U.S. Colored Troops. He was the only Black Civil War officer to be given a field command.

May 6, 1968: A continuous miner machine at the Gauley Coal & Coke Saxsewell No. 8 mine at Hominy Falls, Nicholas County, cut into an adjacent mine, which was filled with water. The resulting flood drowned four miners and trapped 21 others.

May 6, 1968: Newspaper publisher and Bluefield native John S. Knight received the Pulitzer Prize for his long record of service and his series of columns opposing the Vietnam War.

May 7, 1824: Logan County was created by the Virginia General Assembly from parts of Giles, Tazewell, Cabell and Kanawha counties. The county seat was first known as Lawnsville, then Aracoma, and finally Logan.

May 7, 1857: William A. MacCorkle was born in Rockbridge County, Virginia, on his father's plan-

tation. He served as West Virginia's ninth governor.

May 7, 1928: The Keith-Albee Theater opened in Huntington. The opening program featured a comedy called "Good Morning, Judge," a newsreel, and five stage acts. But the theater itself, with its elaborate interior, clearly was the star of the evening.

May 7, 1983: The New River Gorge National Park and Preserve began operations when the first visitor center opened near Fayetteville.

May 8, 1864: Clarence Wayland Watson was born in Fairmont. Watson was a prominent coal baron and served in the U.S. Senate from 1911 to 1913.

May 8, 1998: Former U.S. Senator Jennings Randolph died at the age of 96. He was first elected to the House of Representatives in 1932 and served a total of 40 years in Congress.

May 9, 1800: Abolitionist John Brown was born in Torrington, Connecticut. His 1859 raid on Harpers Ferry galvanized the nation, further alienating North and South in the lead-up to the Civil War.

May 9, 1843: Confederate spy "Belle" Boyd was born in Martinsburg. On July 4, 1861, Boyd shot a Yankee soldier and started her spy career.

May 9, 1863: Confederate raiders arrived at Burning Springs, Wirt County. There they set fire to 150,000 barrels of oil, oil tanks, engines for pumping, engine houses, wagons, and oil-laden boats.

•Treat clothing and gear with products containing 0.5% permethrin. Permethrin can be used to treat boots, clothing and camping gear and remain protective through several washings. Alternatively, you can buy permethrin treated clothing and gear.

Please conduct tick checks on yourself, pets, and children after being outside; even

in the skin after removing the body seek medical attention. In most cases, the tick must be attached for 36 to 48 hours or more before the Lyme disease can be transmitted. Typical symptoms of Lyme Disease include fever, headache, fatigue, muscle and joint aches, and swollen lymph nodes. A characteristic "Bull's-Eye" rash occurs in about 70-80 percent of infected persons. Seek medical attention if you notice any of these symptoms or if a rash develops.

# **City Encourages Responsible Floodplain Management**

Parsons, West Virginia - The City of Parsons and its residents are no strangers to the effects of flooding: the dollar losses, the inconveniences, the damaged homes, the closed businesses.

It's for that reason that the City takes floodplain management seriously.

The City is one of just 13 communities in West Virginia to participate in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Community Rating System (CRS).

As a participant in the CRS, city residents receive discounts on their flood insurance. As those premiums rise, that discount becomes more and more important.

One element of the CRS program is making sure that residents are aware of floodplain management regulations and what those mean for them. The foundation of the City's floodplain management program is the City of Parsons Floodplain Regulations.

Designed to promote the general health, welfare, and safety of the community, the regulations require the use of construction practices that can prevent or minimize flood damage. Most recognizably, the regulations require a permit for any development, new construction, substantial improvement, repair of substantial damage, other repairs, or the placement or relocation of any structure (including manufactured homes) within the City. Where the land proposed for these upgrades is partially or fully in a special flood hazard area (or floodplain), a site plan with elevation data must be submitted to and approved by the City's floodplain administrator. floodplains must ensure structures are not in floodways, and that the lowest floors of structures, to include basements, ductwork, and utilities, are elevated to two feet above the base flood elevation for the site.

Residents can view the floodplain ordinance either at City Hall or on the internet at https://codelibrary.amlegal.com/ codes/parsonswv/latest/parsons\_wv/0-0-0-17515.

The City also encourages residents to visit the West Virginia Flood Tool at www. mapwy.gov. The flood tool shows the special flood hazards in the Parsons corporate limits, and it serves as a first step to understanding one's risks with respect to flooding.



Joint Petition for Consent and Approval of Hope's acquisition of Peoples and the merger of Peoples into Hope

**NOTICE OF FILING AND OF HEARING** 

On February 28, 2023, pursuant to W.Va. Code § 24-2-12, Hope Gas, Inc. (Hope), and Peoples Gas WV LLC (Peoples) (jointly Petitioners) filed a Joint Petition for Consent and Approval (Petition) for Hope to acquire all of the issued and outstanding membership interests of Peoples and to merge Peoples into Hope. Peoples currently provides natural gas sales to approximately 12,917 customers in 15 counties in West Virginia.

The Petitioners assert that the acquisition transaction will have no adverse effect on Peoples' or Hope's customers, other public utilities, or the public in general. Following the transaction, the former utility assets of Peoples will be owned and operated by Hope, subject to the Commission's continuing jurisdiction and regulation. Upon the closing of the acquisition, the former customers of Peoples will become customers of Hope.

Upon the closing of the transaction, Peoples' customers will continue to pay Peoples' existing base rates and PGA rate, until future filings are made by Hope as part of integrating Peoples' assets and customers into Hope. Hope will not file its next Rule 42T base rate case to change base rates until a date on or after January 1, 2025. Peoples' customers will begin paying Hope's Pipeline Replacement and Expansion Program (PREP) rate increments upon the closing of the transaction. At close, Hope projects the below average monthly bill impacts for Peoples' customers:

All requests to intervene or protest should briefly state the reason for the request to intervene or protest and comply with the rules set forth in the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure. 



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


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
