## End of Fiscal Year, 2023-24 Budget Addressed by Tucker County Ambulance Authority

Recently, the Tucker County Ambulance Authority met to address issues concerning the end of their fiscal year and heading into the coming 2023-2024 fiscal year in July. The Tucker County Ambulance Authority submitted an operating budget increase to the Tucker County Commission for fiscal year 2023-2024. The Ambulance Authority's budget increased from the 2022-2023 budget of \$1,040,050 to a proposed budget of \$1.4 million for the 2023-2024 fiscal year. "We had a meeting with the county commissioners last week," Dennis Filler said. "It was a fruitful meeting. The County Commission has offered us this year's additional money of

\$72,000."

Long term goals for the Ambulance Authority focused on the need for a second crew. Plans for one station fully manned 24-7 with a second station manned from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. were discussed. "We know that from all our data that most of our calls, three-quarters of them, are happening from about 8 a.m. to about 8 p.m.," Filler said. "So, by staffing that, we get the biggest bang for our investment."

The County Commission has not yet approved the amount to be allocated. Amanda Simmons, Interim Director, said at the meeting that she would follow up with the County and make sure that the measure was on the next County Commission meeting agenda.

## City of Parsons Offers \$500 Reward; Discusses GS Millwork Request

During the regular City of Parsons council meeting, the council approved a \$500 reward for the prosecution and conviction of the individual or individuals responsible for the vandalism of a city park, continued discussion of a request submitted by GS Millwork, and approved the purchase of a new mower.

Police Chief Kevin Keplinger updated the council on the recent string of vandalism in the city. "The Homewood destruction of property investigation has been completed," Keplinger said. "We're finished with our interviews and our meetings. It's going to culminate in the charging of one adult and two juveniles for multiple charges."

Chief Keplinger also updated the city on the remain-

ing destruction of property investigation. "The River City Park destruction of property charge, we have pretty well exhausted leads on that," Keplinger said. "Area canvas, neighbor canvas, there was a mention of a potential consideration of a reward. I am in favor of that...If we're going to offer a reward, it needs to be paid out

upon prosecution and conviction."

Council Member, Timothy L. Auvil stated that the estimate to fix the destruction would cost the city half of what they had already put into the area. "We got an estimate because of all the destruction that was done to the hydro-seeding," Auvil said. "It's going to cost us \$2500 to reseed that.



That is literally half of what we paid to have it done. That's considerable." Keplinger informed the council that due to the estimate, felony charges could be levied in the case. "That is considerable and it also rises to the level of a felony," Keplinger said. "Any destruction of property over \$2500."

Avil agreed to the idea of

a reward in the case. "I think it wouldn't be a bad idea to offer a \$500 reward leading to the arrest and conviction of the parties involved in that destruction. We need to nip this vandalism stuff. We did a real good job a while back. It was going on with the parks and other areas and then we got the taskforce out there." Auvil

## Tucker County School Board Addresses Absenteeism

"It's better than it was last year," Tucker County School Superintendent Alicia Lambert said of absenteeism in the county at the May 1 Tucker County School Board meeting. Amber Kyle gave the Tucker County School Board an update on the state of absenteeism in the county at their meeting. "My goal is to stay over that 93%," Kyle said. "Tucker Valley is the only one that's hitting that for me. Davis Thomas is close, but we're not there." Kyle reported the attendance rate for the county was 92.366% for the school year

with Davis Thomas at 92.190%, Tucker Valley at 93.243%, and the high school at the lowest at 91.208%.

"I told a parent today on the phone, I am doing my job," Kyle said. "Your child is of mandatory attendance age. If you don't let us know where your child is and why your child is not in school, I must be doing my job, file truancy charges on your child." Kyle said that she has had a lot of court cases lately for truant students. "I have been a little bit happier with the court system," Kyle said. "We have found some families guilty this year. In the past, it more like ok, but we have found families guilty

## Tucker County Animal Shelter Boards Talk Funds

Representatives from both the Friends of the Tucker County Animal Shelter and the Tucker County Advisory Board met at the Tucker County Animal Shelter during a regular meeting of the Advisory Board to discuss recent fund raising efforts, the upcoming Golf Tournament and the overall operations of the shelter. "Just to clarify, the Advisory Board is the group that oversees the function of the shelter as a county entity," Bailey Falls, Shelter Director said. "The Friends of the Tucker County Animal Shelter is a separate 501C-3 that fund raises on behalf of the Animal Shelter. As a county, we can-

not do any fund-raising activity, but the boards can assist each other. The Friends helps us out with some shelter functions and the Advisory Board can help with fund raising functions as well."

The main topic the Boards addressed was an upcoming fund raiser in the form of the Putts Fore Pets Golf Tournament on Saturday, May 20 at Holly Meadows Golf Course in Parsons. The event is sponsored by the Friends of Tucker County Animal Shelter.

The Animal Shelter also received a \$25,000 grant from the PetcoLove Foundation. The funds are to assist in the construction of a new animal shelter. "It was a grant that I had written quite a few

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# News of Record

## The following criminal complaints have been filed in the Tucker County Magistrate office:

- **Jason Ryan Sines**, of Hambleton, was charged with one count DUI Second Offense and one count Driving Revoked DUI. According to the complaint, on April 29 at approximately 7:52 p.m., Trooper B.K. Riffle was dispatched by Tucker County 911 for a dark blue SUV driving recklessly toward Parsons from Davis. Riffle observed the vehicle to be stopped on US219 with the keys in the ignition and the engine running. The officer observed a white male sitting in the driver's seat, appearing to be passed out. The officer opened the door and could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emitting from the vehicle along with empty beer cans on the floor. He removed the male identified as Jason Sines. Tucker 911 advised that the defendant's license had been revoked for a prior DUI in Garrett County, Md. in 2018.
- The officer asked the defendant to perform a number of field sobriety tests, which he failed. He complied to take a PBT test and the breath sample provided a BAC of .197%. He was placed under arrest and transported to Parsons City Hall for further processing where a secondary chemical test was performed and the breath sample yielded results of .190% BAC. The defendant was then transported to TVRJ to await arraignment.
- **Corey Eileen Kinzy**, of Parsons, was charged with one count of Removal, injury to or destruction of property. The complaint states that on Wednesday, April 5 Patrolman First Class N.C. Gidley and Chief K.L. Keplinger received a call from Tucker 911 in regards to a destruction of property complaint at the intersection of Merrill St. and Highland Lane in Parsons.
- Both officers arrived on scene and spoke to the complainant who stated that he had parked his UPS delivery vehicle to deliver tires to a nearby residence when a female subject, identified as Corey Kinzy, of 111 Merrill St. spoke to him making a comment about the tires. He stated that he then took the tires to the neighboring residence and as he returned to his vehicle, he observed Ms. Kinzy walking away from the driver's side of the vehicle and putting something in her pocket. He then stated that Ms. Kinzy made a comment to him before returning to her residence. The complainant states that he observed scratches down the driver's side of the vehicle, consistent to what is commonly known as "keying", that appeared to be fresh. He states that he spoke with his manager who informed him to call Law Enforcement.
- PFC Gidley then inspected the UPS vehicle for damage and observed scratches down the driver's side of the vehicle from approximately the rear wheel well and extended toward the back of the vehicle. It also appeared that a word was written out into the side of the vehicle however it is not clearly legible.
- Chief Keplinger went to Ms. Kinzy's residence and spoke with her while Gidley obtained a written statement from the complainant. Keplinger returned and stated that Ms. Kinzy admitted to the destruction of property and stated that she had written her name into the side of the vehicle. A statement was taken from Kinzy by Gidley during which time she verbally stated the she originally intended to drive the vehicle into a mailbox but the driver did not leave the keys in the ignition. She

stated, "I waited nine minutes then put my name on your vehicle."

- **Travis Nathaniel Bailey**, of Milton, was charged with one count of Malicious or unlawful assault. The complaint states that on Friday, Dec. 2, 2022 Trooper C.A. Hawkins was dispatched via Tucker 911 to Seven Islands Rd for an assault that occurred prior to the initial 911 call.
- Hawkins obtained a written statement from Calvin Smith who stated that Travis Bailey and Dustin Conrad came onto Landbok Rd and Travis started a fight with a club. Smith stated that Bailey hit him in the side of the head and arm with a club. He advised the officer that the club he used was in the trunk of the vehicle that he was in. Hawkins observed a wooden club approximately 28 inches in length with several markings across the length and what is believed to be a piece of lead embedded in the top. The club was collected and entered into temporary evidence storage.
- Smith advised the officer that he had a small wooded baseball bat during the incident. Hawkins observed the bat in the trunk and observed blood across the bat and Smith advised him the blood was his. Smith advised that Bailey had been recording the incident on a digital camera and the camera had been left at the scene. It was also collected for evidence.
- On Sunday, April 9 Corporal J.E. Garren with the WVSP Winfield detachment arrested Bailey for an unrelated offense. While in custody, Bailey made a statement that was unprompted by specific questioning, he stated that his old lady called and said Smith was beating on her and wouldn't let her leave, so he found a ride and went up there to get her.
- He stated that when he got there Smith was approaching him with a miniature T-Ball bat in his hand. He further stated that he got out of the vehicle and Smith allegedly got in his face and swung at him. He stated that he protected himself and the altercation ensued. A copy of the Body Worn footage of this statement is attached to this report.
- On Monday, April 17 Hawkins obtained a phone statement from the female who stated that Bailey was not supposed to be there. She stated that she contacted Bailey to have Dustin come get her, but she specifically told Bailey not to come. Hatfield further stated that once Travis showed up, she told him to get back in the car and that is when Bailey and Smith started to fight. That is when Bailey pulled out a stick.

## Tucker

Members of the Tucker County Development Authority met at the Five Rivers Public Library in Parsons to discuss the issues facing business in Tucker County and how the Development Authority can help. The meeting was the second and final work session for the group. Facilitator Karen Jacobson chaired the brainstorming session with members of the Tucker County Development Authority, County Commissioner Mike Rosenau, and Tucker County Development Authority Executive Director Steve Leyh in attendance.

The Board discussed the Taproom project in Thomas. Board Member Sandra Frank explained the project as a community partnership with Woodlands. The project is expected to house nine offices and house six to eight start-ups along with two stories of affordable housing with a total of 10 housing units and parking in the alley behind. “The idea is that it works as a community partner,” Frank said. “Woodlands bought that

building and realized it was a tear down and so tore it down...They engaged with us and Steve at the development authority and realized it’s a great spot for Steve to have his office and start-up businesses.” On the issue of the cost for the Development Authority’s use of the first floor, Steve Leyh said, “It hasn’t really been worked out...but it will be reasonable.”

Five year goals for the Development Authority includes: providing business incubator services to help businesses grow in the community, gather input and strategies from the Tucker County community and have open communication, support and facilitate future opportunities for local residents or groups of local residents, use the Industrial Park to provide the best community benefits, become more financially sustainable and collaborate through communication with the public so the community knows what the Development Authority does and provide support to assist in meeting the authority’s broader goals.

“I was just thinking, when we’re tackling these issues, as important as they are, I think the more minds that are going into the mechanics of it, the better,” Board Member Jr. Helmick said.

The Authority’s most urgent goals includes the need for the group to remain financially sustainable and viable so they can be in a better place to assist the business community. Plans for the Industrial Park in Davis were discussed with the main focus being that the Woodlands building offices would be a transitional measure to help businesses grow before moving into larger facilities such as the Industrial Park. The need to support local businesses as well as those from outside the community to bring in new business was also discussed.

No action was taken by the board as the meeting’s purpose was as a think tank for the group to plan its future.

No other meetings are currently scheduled.

this year and that does help a lot because that needs to be what happens and second offense can be jail time. That’s not what we want for our families, but they need to understand the importance of being to school.”

Kyle did suggest an approach for next year to help combat student absenteeism. “The numbers are similar or worse throughout the state,” Kyle said. “We are on the higher end. I would like to see us use that social probation a little bit stronger next year and really not allow students

to have some after school activities because of attendance. But unfortunately, that has to be at the school level. There’s only so much I can do. I can provide them the data, but that does have to come from the school.”

The Chronic Absenteeism rates for the district were reported by Kyle to be: Davis Thomas at 26.395%, Tucker Valley at 18.693%, and TCHS at 34.219%, for a district wide total of 25.265%. Kyle explained that the numbers reflected all absences, whether excused or not. “Those are any absences,” Kyle said. “Those are kids who aren’t in the seats no matter what the reason.”

Kyle also supplied data on what steps had been taken to target chronic absenteeism in the district. In total, Kyle said she had sent 733 three-day attendance letters to parents with 187 going out to Davis Thomas parents,

275 to Tucker Valley, and 271 to TCHS. There was a total of 103 scheduled parent meetings in the district with 25 from Davis Thomas, 27 from Tucker Valley, and 51 at TCHS. “Because I do meet with the students at the high school before I meet with parents, I have had 79 student meetings at the high school,” Kyle said. “I do let the parents know when they are in excess of their parent notes.”

There were 11 families in Tucker Valley that were notified of excessive parent notes, 17 at Tucker Valley, and 20 at TCHS for a district wide total of 48 notifications. “Unfortunately, we see after the SAT school day, kids start dropping off,” Lambert said. “They kind of consider themselves being done. Look it’s April, you’re not done. So, we’ve had those conversations...I think prom coming off of that, spending time decorating for prom, getting everything ready for prom when it’s in the school hurts that as well because we are not utilizing class time effectively. Kids feel like they don’t need to be there.”

Kyle reported to the Board that her efforts are ongoing, even this late in the school year. “I have a meeting tomorrow, I have a meeting on Wednesday with a parent and we’re talking 30, 40, up towards 50 doctor’s excuses,” Kyle said. “We have, I would say, 10 to 12 students that have an excess of 30 doctor’s excuses this year and I can’t do anything about them.”

“We’ve talked to health facilities as well,” Lambert added. “Stop excusing these kids, but their take on it is, if they come in, we have to (tell you they were here). I’m like, can they come back to school on the same day so that we’re not giving them a whole day off? But they are like, if they come in, we have to give them an excuse.”

Kyle reported that nine families in the county were involved in the court system for truancy. Two families from Davis Thomas, two from Tucker Valley, and five from the High School. Kyle admitted there are families that take advantage of the doctor’s note for absences. “Unfortunately, we have families that use that,” Kyle said. “We have families that are, ‘Oh, my kid didn’t go to school today, I better go or Mrs. Kyle is going to be on my butt.’”

The Tucker County School Board will next meet on Monday, May 22<sup>nd</sup> at 4:30pm at the Tucker County Board of Education office located at 100 Education Lane in Parsons.

“So, they’ve offered \$72,000 at that meeting,” Chris Davis, Tucker County Ambulance Authority Treasurer said, “which would put us with the Commission total of what they normally give us \$182,000 because they normally give us \$110.”

Davis also discussed the additional money the Ambulance Authority anticipates receiving from hotel/motel tax. “With hotel/motel, it looks like they’ve raised that to 160 from what I gather,” Davis said. “That’s really a great bump. It’s a huge bump. Plus, they gave money for the cot.” The County Commission had previously given the Ambulance Authority funds to purchase a Stryker Cot Unit at a cost of \$67,000. The cot has an anticipated installation of June.

EMS Director Amanda Simmons updated the Ambulance Authority on a variety of recent developments. Included in her report were the Stryker Cot, maintenance and updates to the radio system, two upcoming multi-departmental training, a community CPR class that the EMS conducted that was attended by 13 individuals and a Pediatric EMS class that was attended by 14 EMS personnel.

“Community CPR class was conducted here recently,” Simmons said. “We had 13 individuals come out. One attendee was 13 years of age and the oldest was in their 90s. Actually, we had one couple that

stated that if they hadn’t had the class, they would not have been able to receive their granddaughters over the weekend because they had been informed that they only had so many hours to complete the class or they would be placed in foster care. It was amazing. They had been placed in emergency foster care and they got the call. They had to have the class and there was a community class right there. It was wonderful.”

Simmons also told the Ambulance Authority that while cleaning and organizing, two AEDs were discovered. While these units were outdated and not able to be used by EMS, they were functional and could be refurbished and were donated to the Parsons PD. “The AED were out of date. They weren’t something we are allowed to have on the

trucks anymore, however they can be refurbished and recertified,” Simmons said. “So, we knew that Keplinger, down here at the local PD needed AEDs.”

Simmons also informed the Ambulance Authority that one of the units was involved in an accident on the road. “March 27 Unit 5-4 was involved in an accident,” Simmons said. “They were on their way back from a call. We were right on the Barbour County line... A rock truck came right into their lane, they swerved. It was either the mountain or the rock truck. They chose the mountain.” Simmons said insurance is covering the damage and most of the repair work has been completed, but the truck is waiting on a set of steps that will arrive in a month. Simmons said a tie rod, tires, a siren, and other parts have been replaced on the damaged truck.

The Authority reviewed the findings of an audit conducted by Ferrari & Associates, PLLC, a firm located in Morgantown. “It talks about deficiency and it has the obligatory, as I call it, Segregation of Duties clause,” Tucker County Ambulance Authority President Dennis Filler said. “It says normal things would require us to have more separation of duties, but because we have limited staffing, we do what we do with what we have. It is a finding I see on almost every board in the county. So, it’s not a finding we can do really anything about.” The Authority did take action on the report. An invoice in the amount of \$3,900 was approved for payment to Ferrari & Associates for the completion of the audit.

The Tucker County Ambulance Authority will have a total of three vacancies on the board for the 2023-2024 fiscal year. Three members of the board have expiring terms and have elected to not renew, according to Filler. “I have been informed that we will have a total of three vacancies,” Filler said. “I have asked Dr. Elaine Moore to consider coming on board as a board member...In my personal opinion, she would be a wonderful addition to the job we’re doing.”

The Tucker County Ambulance Authority will next meet on Wednesday, May 24 at 5:30pm at the Five Rivers Public Library in Parsons.

**May 10, 1863:** Just before dying of wounds suffered at the Battle of Chancellorsville, Stonewall Jackson uttered the words, "Let us cross over the river and rest under the shade of the trees." He is buried in the Stonewall Jackson Cemetery in Lexington, Virginia.

**May 10, 1908:** The first official observance of Mother's Day was held at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton and simultaneously in Philadelphia. The holiday resulted from a vigorous campaign by Anna Jarvis, who wanted to commemorate the spirit of her mother's work as a social activist.

**May 10, 1960:** John F. Kennedy defeated Hubert Humphrey in the West Virginia primary. It dispelled the widely held belief that being a Roman Catholic was an insurmountable obstacle to becoming president.

**May 11, 1909:** Filmmaker Ellis Dungan was born. After years of working in the feature film industry in India, he settled in Wheeling, where he shot documentaries and produced films for the state and the region.

**May 11, 1930:** Physician John C. Norman, Jr., was born in Charleston. A noted thoracic and cardiovascular surgeon and researcher, he was best known for his work toward creating an artificial heart.

**May 12-14, 1921:** Bullets peppered down on about a dozen mining towns in the Matewan-Williamson area, and nonunion miners fired back, in what became known

as the Battle of the Tug. Three people were shot and killed.

**May 13, 1962:** Editorial cartoonist Henry Payne was born in Charleston. In 1989, Payne was the first editorial cartoonist in the country to make his work available via computer.

**May 14, 1878:** Photographer Rufus "Red" Ribble was born in Blacksburg, Virginia. For nearly 40 years he traveled the coalfields making panoramic photographs of miners, towns, family reunions, church congregations and school groups.

**May 14, 1906:** Social reformer Mary Behner was born in Xenia, Ohio. From 1928 until 1937, Behner worked in the coal camps along Scotts Run near Morgantown, fighting poverty and creating social and educational outlets for families.

**May 14, 1943:** Alan Mollohan was born in Fairmont. Mollohan served in the U.S. Congress from 1983 to 2011.

**May 15, 1880:** The state's first telephone exchange was placed in service in Wheeling with about 25 subscribers.

**May 15, 1886:** Minnie Buckingham Harper was born in Winfield. She was the first Black woman to serve as a member of a state legislative body in the United States. She was appointed by Governor Howard Gore on January 10, 1928, to fill the unexpired term of her husband, E. Howard Harper.

**May 15, 1893:** Albert Sidney "Sid" Hatfield, controversial police chief of Matewan and martyred hero to union coal miners, was born near Matewan, on the Kentucky side of Tug Fork.

**May 15, 1953:** George Brett, the Hall of Fame third baseman for the Kansas City Royals, was born in Glen Dale in Marshall County. Along with Hank Aaron, Willie Mays, and Stan Musial, he is one of only four players in Major League history to accumulate 3,000 hits, 300 home runs and a .300 career batting average.



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## Solar Training & on Campus Solar Education Advancement Grant Approved For Eastern College

Moorefield, W.Va. – Eastern West Virginia Community and Technical College (Eastern) applied and was granted \$157,614 for the Solar Training & On Campus Solar Education Advancement through West Virginia State Advance Grant. The program’s main goal is to provide affordable and accessible education of solar technology to the Potomac Highlands region of West Virginia. This will allow easier access to completing the Photovoltaic Installer–Level 1 (PV1) Certification, which will help both industrial and agricultural workers from the increased usage of solar technology in these fields. Initiation of the solar education program will be on July 1, 2023, and will run through until June 30, 2025.

Jay Warmke, Founder of Blue Rock Station in Philo, Ohio, will lead the program with plans to train up to 40 individuals to become solar applicator technicians. Individuals will be trained to use a Photovoltaic Installer–Level 1 (PV1) Certification,

which is needed to become a solar applicator technician. Mountain View Solar and Solar Holler, clean energy companies in West Virginia, will also be providing additional support for this program, such as assisting students who complete this program with career pathway development and job placement. Students will be able to connect with Mountain View Solar’s leadership and technical support staff to help students learn about career opportunities. Along with this, there will be in-person technician visits which will give students a chance to talk with them about this career path. Both companies are willing to connect with the community to share information about their company and job opportunities. Students who are a part of this program will benefit from Eastern’s Career Services department as well. Between 2019-2021, there was a 12.1% increase in solar technology jobs, which can also be found in all fifty states in the United States. West Virginia’s solar energy

job placement rate grew at 19.6%, higher than the national average. The average wage and benefits upon job placement is similar to other industries, like construction, with an average wage of \$18.16 per hour. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the median hourly wage for solar installers is \$22.92 an hour.

Eastern’s secondary goal with this program is to expand the array of solar technology that the campus is equipped with. The added array of educational technology on-campus will bring added engagement from students from the hands-on learning experience with solar panels, racking, inverters, sensors, displays, charging ports, lighting, and knowledge of the cost savings that utilizing solar energy brings. EnGoPlanet solar benches will be placed throughout the campus for student and community use. These benches will allow an individual to connect to the internet, charge their phone wirelessly and by USB, and connect to Bluetooth.



also said the public was also instrumental in the effort to combat vandalism alongside the taskforce. “It really diminished when they had some eyes on the place,” Auvil said. “And just the general public besides the taskforce, also participating. I was out there after one of the concerts and this lady comes driving by and ‘Oh, I just wanted to know who you were.’” The coun-

cil will be using \$500 from the pond project to pay for the reward. The council also continued their discussion of a request from GS Millwork LLC. The council said they have not been able to contact the FEMA lease property owners about the lots that the request includes. “We signed a lease with them on January first,” Auvil said. “So legally,

we are bound to honor the lease, unless there’s a particular legal reason why we could terminate, but that has not happened. So, it would be a voluntary thing.” City Administrator Agnes Arnold informed the council that the city could terminate the lease with a 30 day notice due to a provision in the document. “There is something in there that says you have to

give them a 30 day notice,” Arnold said. “Either party can withdraw with a 30-day notice.” Auvil said, “I don’t want to start a bad precedent either. I’d rather see this go voluntarily with everybody in a cooperative manner to assist a business.” Other items of discussion on the issue included the need to protect the Butternut tree in the area since

it is endangered and designated the largest in the state. “The only way with GS Millworks to work this out is if you leave a buffer zone around the tree to where there’s a parking area,” Auvil said. “You protect the tree, and people can still come and go in that picnic area and everything else around the tree. The guys at Millworks were very open to that idea.” Council Member Melissa Jones expressed concerns over the request by GS Millworks LLC. “I, myself, would still like to see some kind of a notification that they’ve contacted FEMA about all this construction and everything,” Jones said.

“When we met with them this last time,” Auvil said, “...we mentioned all that to them that they’d have to get hydrologists in there to do the study.” Jones also asked about whether the proposed sites would need to be surveyed. Auvil said the entire site would need to be surveyed. “So would they be willing to pay half of the survey on the lot that they are going to use for parking?” Jones asked. “In my opinion they need to pay for all the survey,” Auvil said. “This is their request. I don’t think the city should

be paying anything as far as that’s concerned.”

With concerns to the lots in question with the request, Auvil said there were legal issues that would keep the city from outright selling the land in question. “That would have to be a lease in itself,” Auvil said. “The city isn’t allowed to just outright sell property anymore. As we found out with that backhoe, anything over a thousand bucks has to go out on this state...gov deals or whatever and you’d be required to pretty much accept the highest bid. So, anyone could just put a bid in there, so it would have to be a lease, a long-term lease. There’s a lot of legal details.” The council moved to continue the issue of GS Millwork’s request to the next session.

In other business, a new Kubota BX 2680 with a 60” mid mower in the amount of \$12,500 from PARCS Salem Kubota was unanimously approved by the council in regular session. The mower will be going to the Parks Department.

The City of Parsons City Council will next meet May 16 at 6 p.m. at the Charles W. “Bill” Rosenau Municipal Building at 341 Second Street in Parsons.

months ago for the construction of the new shelter,” Falls said. Falls said she would look into whether the county is keeping a separate fund for the shelter construction or if the county will allocate the funds to the Friends. The issue arose from the designee of the check the shelter received. Since the grant was written through the county, with county financial information, the check was made out to the County Commission. “This was a grant that was written as the Tucker County Animal Shelter as the Tucker County Commission. So, the name on the check is Tucker County Commission,” Falls said.

Board Member Robert Elkholtz asked if the Commission was keeping a separate fund for the shelter construction. “That’s what I’ve been trying to find out the past couple of days,” Falls said. “I am just

waiting to hear back...that’s why I’ve still got the check here. Because the Friends account is where all of the money is going for the new shelter construction project, it makes sense for it to go there, but the commission would have to make the donation to the Friends. It is what is most possible.” Elkholtz voiced concerns over the commission donation option. Elkholtz said, “It makes it sound like they’re giving the 25,000 to us, which isn’t the case.”

There was another option to deposit the money, according to the Falls, but not one she wanted to do.

“I don’t necessarily want it sitting the dog and kennel fund, which is the only other place it can go because the Commission doesn’t have a fund set up for construction of the shelter at this point, but maybe they will set that up.” Falls



said she wasn’t concerned about the money going to the construction project. According to Falls, it is just a matter of accounting. “Either way, its money designated for the construction of the shelter,” Falls said. “So, whether it’s a fund through the commission, whether the commission authorizing putting it in the Friends account pending building, I just have to hear back from Sheila and the Commission about that.”

According to the Falls, there is a possibility of another Stanton Foundation Grant for next year. Last year, the Stanton Foundation donated \$10,000 for canine medicine. Falls said she was informed that the Foundation was looking to do some capital funding again. “There’s hopeful information that the Stanton Foundation is doing another grant,” Falls said. “We got \$10,000 last year and \$5,000 the year before. It was specific for canine medicine. We were able to do a lot with that. We were able to set up our medical intake area with that and really, really save a lot of money on preventative medicine which is specific for canines, but things such as microscopes and that kind of thing can be used for cats and dogs. So, that was really, really helpful.”

Falls said she was informed of the possibility when she turned in her final report to the Stanton Foundation. “One of the board members for the Stanton Foundation told me when I turned in my final report, that they are looking to do some capital funding. So, that’s exciting. I

don’t know whether it will be more than \$10,000, but it will be something more, hopefully.”

In other business, the Boards heard that a part time position currently has an opening due to the advancement of a current employee to a full-time position as the Animal Control Officer. Falls said she anticipates the part time position to be filled this summer when the need will be greatest. It is a county position with the shelter being able to make recommendations. “At this point, our animal volume is not requiring another staff member, but moving into the summer we are going to fill that position,” Falls said.

## WVDOH District 8 Hosts Informational Open House

Representatives of the West Virginia Department of Transportation held an open house to discuss the ongoing Corridor H highway project, as well as to address community concerns at the District 8 Headquarters in Elkins. “There’s a lot of good people we have in Tucker County,” District 8 WVDOH Representative Tommy Collins said. “We have a good workforce in Tucker County. I think that’s what separates you from some of the other counties when it comes to the quality of your roads.”

Collins said that District 8 receives a total of \$27 million for core maintenance of existing roads through what is called the Annual Fund. “Four million is going to Tucker County right now for the core maintenance issues,” Collins said.

Collins said there was also additional funds through other programs that benefit District 8 roads. “We have some other funding avenues as well,” Collins said. “We have what is called the Nonfederal Aid Others Program, which is also state funds. These are a little larger project, a little larger paving, a little larger slab projects, a little larger drainage projects. The district typically gets about \$5 million and that gets divvied up between our counties and projects that are necessary.”

“Above that 32 million dollars is typically our Federal Aid Program,” Collins said. “This is now federal funds. Everything before was state funds. We typically look at another \$5 million district wide. Again, that’s for the paving types of projects, those kinds of things, general maintenance stuff at a higher level.”

Collins said that the increase in work within Tucker County has been the result of federal funding allocated through area representatives. “You’ve seen a lot of paving over the past couple of years in Tucker County,” Collins said. “You’ve really seen a lot of paving in the past 10 years in Tucker County. The last couple of years, it’s important to know where that funding comes from. That basically has been your legislator, your Senator Smith. They’ve been real good to the Division of Highways with some additional funding straight out of their budget.” Collins said that 100% of core maintenance for Tucker County had been completed by the county. “What we asked the county to do, they did 100%,” Collins said. “That is something they really should be praised for.”

Collins also provided information on the amount of paving completed within the district.

“The district paving totals, so 192

miles of pavement the district paved last year,” Collins said. “That’s an extraordinary number. It wasn’t too long ago that a good number for a district was 20 or 30 miles. A lot of it is the effort that your local legislators and the governor put in to make the roads better. A lot of it was the folks in this district executing the plan that was put in front of them.”

Collins said the new direction the DOH’s effort will be heading in pertains to bridges in the area. “The theme for the 2022 through 2025 for the Division of Highways is going to be bridges and bridges and bridges,” Collins said. “There’s a lot of funding going towards the bridges, trying to get our national infrastructure and our state infrastructure up to speed.”

According to Collins, Tucker County currently has 67 bridges. Collins said a bridge is defined as being over 20 feet. “Corridor H is going to make that number a lot larger as soon as they come online, Collins said. “We have 102 under 20 structures. We probably have more than 120 under 20 structures. We need to get out and identify what these structures are...That’s one of the concentrations we are going to have.”

Collins said the Federal Infrastructure Jobs Act will be adding additional funding for existing bridges. According to Collins, there are lots of bridges that are classified as being in “Poor” condition. However, Collins stated that does not make it unsafe. “We have a lot of bridges that are in poor condition,” Collins said. “I do want to be clear that because a bridge is in poor condition does not make a bridge unsafe. Its been a system we have used for a long time to rate bridges. If you go back, we probably should just change the word because someone says poor it means I shouldn’t be on it. That’s not what it means, but it does mean its heading in that direction that it is going to need replaced. This will take care of a lot of those bridges.” Along with the bridge work, according to Collins, the federal bill has a stipulation for diversification of vehicles that will result in the construction of charging stations for electric vehicles.

The WVDOH District 8 also uses the SWAT system to address complaints. Collins said he personally reviews each SWAT call along with other high-ranking staff. “We only had 452 SWAT complaints this year,” Collins said. “It’s really low for us. We like to think that’s because we’re doing a better job out there. But on the other side, if we don’t hear your voices, we might be missing something. So, please, you won’t offend us by calling. We all review. Adam and I review

every SWAT complaint that comes in.” “We’re staffed quite well, but there are still opportunities,” Collins said. “If there are folks in your community that need a job, we’re looking to hire.”

Collins also emphasized that this year the DOH is focused on increasing Work Zone Safety in the area. In the past five years, a total of 1,794 work zone crashes occurred in West Virginia that culminated in 15 fatalities, 509 injuries and 1,270 reports of property damage. “It’s just found unacceptable to the Division of Highways and to our governor,” Collins said. “So, when its unacceptable, we’ve been asked to figure out how to stop this, figure out how to make things better.” Collins said the DOH will be issuing

communications and engaging in outreach to the community. There will also be an increased in enforcement in work zones, according to Collins. “You’re going to see us reevaluate how we set up traffic patterns,” Collins said. “The minimum isn’t going to be good enough. We’re going to be looking at ways to improve that beyond what the minimum standards require.”

Collins said District 8 is seeking a variety of workers from CDL drivers, to entry construction inspector trainees, beginning level designers and office workers.

District 8 is comprised of Pendleton, Pocahontas, Tucker, and Randolph Counties. Each county had its own informational session.



On May 25, 2023 at 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. at the Town of Davis, the Town Council will hold public hearings.

The public hearing is on a proposed zoning ordinance for the Town of Davis.

The purpose of zoning is to help maintain the character and charm of the Town of Davis. We are already feeling the effects of growth in our area. Note that everything existing in town may continue; all uses are grandfathered. Instead, our community plan clarifies preferred land uses while defining the land uses for future development. One goal of zoning is to minimize the adverse effects of businesses in traditionally residential neighborhoods by limiting the types of business allowed in residential areas.

The goal is to prevent uncontrolled growth. Zoning defines the best use of the limited developable land available in the town. Having managed growth will maintain the town's character while allowing for and encouraging a balance between protecting residential neighborhoods and locating quality businesses in the Town of Davis. Zoning encourages business development patterns along U.S. Highway 48 (Corridor H) and Route 32. It determines how to allocate the available Industrial Park land, allowing new businesses and workforce housing. The zoning ordinance also encourages the development of green space for outdoor gathering and recreational purposes.

Copies of the proposed zoning ordinance may be examined at the Davis Town Hall.

Written objections to the proposed ordinance may be made and will be heard at the public hearings and must be filed with the Town Clerk.

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# Town of Davis donates \$10,000 to Blackwater Ministerial Association

The Town of Davis Council unanimously voted on April 12 to give \$10,000 to the Blackwater Ministerial Association.

The funds will support the purchase of property and the building of a permanent and independent food pantry to serve the

residents in the area.

“We are very thankful and appreciative of Mayor Al Tomson and the Town of Davis Council members for this generous donation,” said Veronica Staron, director of the Blackwater Ministerial Association Food Pantry. “Once completed, the planned construction project will allow us to serve better individuals and families who are food insecure now and those who will be in the future.”

The food pantry is currently located in St. John’s Lutheran Church (The Big Green Church), the corner of 3rd Street and Blackwater Avenue in Davis. The organization serves 80 to 90 households a month, which has steadily increased over the past year.

“We have seen a steady increase in the number of people needing and asking for food assistance each month,” Staron said. “The food pantry relies on grants and donations to keep up with the rising demand in the community. Our generous donors allow us to serve each needy indi-

vidual or family.”

Donations to the food pantry in Davis can be made out to Blackwater Ministerial Association and mailed to Treasurer Cathy Thomas, P.O. Box 58, Davis, WV 26260.

The Blackwater Ministerial Association Food Pantry gets its food in multiple ways, including buying it themselves, Mountaineer Food Bank, and collections from individuals, groups, and churches. The volunteers plan and source the items for the distributions six months to a year ahead of time.

The food pantry relies heavily on volunteers for its monthly food distribution day, the first Wednesday of each month starting at 1 p.m. The volunteers prepare and fill the bags for distribution on the first Tuesday of the month from 9 to 10:30 a.m.

“We always need volunteers to help and welcome anyone who wants to donate time,” Staron said. “If it weren’t for the volunteers and the people in the community donating, we wouldn’t be able to serve families in our area.”

## Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program Seeks to Improve Health Outcomes

CHARLESTON, W.Va.

The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR), Bureau for Public Health’s Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program (BCCSP) is conducting research to better understand health disparities and health inequities among West Virginia women.

BCCSP is gathering data through a short online survey and seeks female participants ages 21 - 64 years from 11 West Virginia counties: Berkeley, Gilmer, Lewis, Jefferson, Kanawha, McDowell, Mercer, Mingo, Raleigh, Tucker and Wayne. The survey can be completed anonymously; those who choose to share contact information will be entered in a drawing to win one of six \$50 Visa gift cards.

“The goal of the West Virginia Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program is to decrease cancer incidence, morbidity, and mortality by focus-



ing on populations who are underserved and who have increased cancer risk due to health inequities,” said Charlene Hickman, BCCSP director. “Completing this survey helps provide insight into the needs of specific communities and helps to target life-saving screenings and services to West Virginia women who are most at risk.”

Those eligible for services through BCCSP include West Virginians who are uninsured or underinsured, at or below 250% of the federal poverty level, age 40 to 64 years for breast cancer services, and age 21 - 64 years for cervical cancer services. Those who are symptomatic or high-risk under the age of 40 years and those over the age

of 64 who do not have Medicare Part B may also receive services through the program.

The survey is funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention’s Comprehensive Cancer Program and will be open from May 2 - 19, 2023.
