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Parsons Updated on Water Project

Project Manager Eric Sherrard and Staff Engineer Zac Musgrove from the Thrasher Group updated the City of Parsons City Council on the progress of the Parsons Water System Improvements Project at the Council's meeting.

Council Member Tim Auvil commented on the importance of the water system improvements during the meeting. "This particular project is really vital and important because this is replacing the last 25% of the lines that we have not replaced in this town so far for one," Auvil said. "And number two, that 25% doesn't have the adequate fire protection necessary because most of its all on four-inch lines and you can't hook a fire truck up to a four-inch line. And that's critical. That will now

cover all our customers with this project's completion."

Sherrard said the project is a credit to the city. "The fact that you are replacing all that water line is a real credit to the city," Sherrard said. "To try to get ahead of this because a lot of places are way, way behind. Extreme water loss. Lines in difficult areas."

According to Auvil many of the lines slated for replacement are over a hundred years old. "These particular ones, a lot of them are over 100 years old," Auvil said. "Literally over a hundred years old. And about fifteen years ago, our accountability for our water was about 52% and now we're running, what, 88. All the rest of it was going in the ground because of bad lines. That's why it's so critical to replace them."

Thrasher Updates City of Parsons on Sewer Improvement Project

Project Manager Eric Sherrard and Staff Engineer Zac Musgrove from the Thrasher Group updated the City of Parsons on the progress that has been made on the Parsons Sanitary Sewer System Improvements Project.

Thrasher has been working with the Department of Environmental Protection, according to Sherrard. "We've been working with DEP," Sherrard said. "We've addressed comments on the Facility Plan, which is their version of the planning document. That is going back in this week."

Sherrard said once approval is received, plans and specifications on the project can be submitted. "Once we have their approval on that, we will be able to submit plans and specifications to them, as well," Sherrard said.

According to Sherrard, plans should be available to the council by next month. "So, we should be able to bring a set of plans around here hopefully by your meeting next month to go through with this group before we submit to the DEP. That's our plan," Sherrard said.

According to Sherrard, the specification documents are almost ready, but the plans take longer to complete. "We have all the spec documents about done," Sherrard said. "Pulled all the specifications, front end documents, which has all the bid requirements stuff through DEP. All that part is done. Plans are what takes the time to get done because of the CAD time."

Council Member Tim Auvil asked about documentation outlining the Inflow and Infiltration reduction of the sewer project. According to carrollengineering.com, I&I is excess water flowing into a sewer

The Tucker County 911 Center will be hosting an open house to showcase the latest technological advances the center had implemented. The event will be held October 25th at the Tucker County Courthouse in Parsons. 911 Center Director Michael Simmons updated the County Commission

on the event at the Commission's meeting. According to Simmons, the event will have media coverage. "There should be an ad in next week's paper," Simmons said. "I already have confirmation from Chan-

nel 5 and Channel 12. They will be here." The event will be sponsored by Motorola, Simmons said. "And Motorola is going to sponsor it," Simmons said.

Simmons said the event would coincide with the Commissions 4 p.m. meeting at the end of the month. "That will be our four o'clock meeting," Simmons said. "It switches from six to four at the end of the month."

Tucker County Commissioner Fred Davis commented that he is often asked why so much money has been spent on the 911 Center. "People have questioned me why we're spending so much money on the 911 Center," Davis said. "Don't know exactly why we did it and how nice it is."

Tucker County Commissioner Mike Rosenau said he encouraged everyone

to come to the event. "I want everyone to know they are welcome to attend this meeting to see exactly what their tax dollars are paying for," Rosenau said.

Simmons said there would be a full demonstration involving other agencies to showcase the Center's teamwork. "We will have full display," Simmons said. "All intentions are we will have other agencies here with their mobile devices and be able to demonstrate how we are all interoperable now and connect independently, but still as a team. Where before we did not have the ability."


Rosenau said the upgrades were the results of years of financial planning and saving. "We can also explain to the public

that it is not something that we just incurred out of our budget this year," Rosenau said. "This is something that's been ongoing for years. Saving money to try to get this updated. So, to me, we've done the little things to put patches on things, but we've saved money all these years, this County has – I thank all the people who are responsible for doing that in the past – but it finally came that we could do it now."

Tucker County EMS Offers EMT Classes, Partners with TCHS

Tucker County EMS Training Officer Joe Strait updated the Tucker County regarding the latest EMT classes and a new partnership that EMS has with the Tucker County High School.

"Just so you know, across the state, 40% of EMS providers, all types of EMS providers, have left the industry," Strait said. "Naturally, it's a crisis."

Strait said a new class was beginning on Monday. "This is a class we are starting Monday," Strait said. "Over here at the Fire Hall at six o'clock. It is basically my first EMT class since I have taken over as training officer for Tucker County. "

According to Strait, he was in the final stages of obtaining his Adult Education license. "The paperwork is going through

right now," Strait said, "for me to get my official Department of Education license for Adult Ed and to become an instructor

Josh Tompkins is going to be the primary instructor in the course, according to Strait. "He's going to be the primary instructor," Strait said. "Being as I just got my instructor certification; I truly don't want to step out going into it first time. I want to give these students the proper education."

Strait said that he and EMS Director Amanda Simmons have met with Tucker County High School Principal Alex Cork about beginning an EMT training program at the school. "This morning, Mandy and I had a meeting with Mr. Cork and Mr. Weaver at the High School," Strait said. "What they're wanting to do is eventually take something like that and make it one

Blackwater Bicycle Association Addresses Traffic Woes in Davis

Thomas resident Matt Marcus of the Blackwater Bicycle Association addressed the Tucker County Commission regarding bicycles and traffic patterns in Davis, as well as proposed additions to the trail network designed to alleviate bicycle traffic through the town.

Marcus introduced himself to the Commissioners and explained his association to the area and the bicycle club. "I just wanted to introduce myself," Marcus said. "I'm Matt Marcus. I work in Davis at Blackwater Bikes. I'm the manager. I live in Thomas. Used to own the bike shop, but really today I come by representing the bike club which is called Blackwater Bicycle Association."

According to Marcus, the bicycle association helped with extracting an injured mountain biker recently. "The whole reason I'm here," Marcus said. "I've been talking with Commissioner Davis over the years and we had a little extraction we had

to do. We had a mountain biker break his tib-fib out on a trail near Camp 70 Road and we were involved in the extraction."

Marcus said his group had been considering safety and how they could assist local EMS. "We were talking about what we could do the help EMS extracting people," Marcus said. "Since then I have had a meeting with the Volunteer Fire Hall in Davis, their Fire Department...We have also sent a list of names down to the 911 Center...So if we had to do a bike related extraction of somebody, that we could assist in finding

According to Marcus, the group already has equipment to assist with rescue efforts in the woods. "We also have a litter that we use with a wheel under it that we have gotten people out of the woods with," Marcus said. "That's what we used to get that guy out to where the helicopter came to get to

According to Marcus, there is a dire need to get pedestrians and bicycles off of the roads in the Thomas-Davis area, especially on Route 32. "We're really concerned with

According to Sherrard, the project is in a waiting phase due to funding requests. "Design wise, we are about the same amount along," Sherrard said. "But we are waiting. We applied for a Drinking Water State Revolving Fund money for the water, which is the counterpart to Clean Water State Revolving Fund Sewer money."

Sherrard said the funding program has merged under the Department of Environmental Protection. "That program just merged all under DEP," Sherrard said. "Where it used to be through the Health Department."

According to Sherrard, Thrasher is awaiting word on who the reviewer assigned to the project will be. "So we are waiting to see who our reviewer is and make sure they aren't going to implement other things on us before we can submit anything to

cause that will reduce the flooding issues over there, besides getting a lot of the I&I out. Most of the storm water that is over there is just going in the sewer now."

According to Sherrard, his team is working on environmental documentation for the EPA as part of the project's funding. "We're also working on the Environmental piece for the EPA portion of the funding," Sherrard said. "You guys are one of the first round of EPA, the earmark funding that was applied for. That is a whole fund process. Has all of its own federal guidelines that we're working on following. One of the last pieces we have are in there are the NEPA (National Environmental Policy Act) documentation, which we are putting together and go on our Environmental Evaluation to get that clear."

Sherrard said on Thrasher's side, it meant that a detailed report would need submitted. "Our end of it, it's just a detailed environmental report to submit," Sherrard said. "We're expecting that we'll get...exclusion from them when it's done, which basically eliminates any other environmental steps we have to take. But they could come back and require a finding of significant impact in which, you advertise, you do a little more evaluation, you have public meetings."

said. "So the technology is awesome." Davis said the GPS capabilities has been useful to Fire and Emergency Services. "Being a Fireman, if the person (that) is lost calls you and you get a hold of Kevin or us, you can put us

right on top of them now," Davis said. "Without sending out 500 people, you know you can right up on top of that person because we've done this how many times since we've had it."

Simmons said the GPS capabilities of the new system was recently used to guide crews during a helicopter extraction. "We actually had to airlift someone here a while back, where they couldn't get in," Simmons said. "We gave Trooper 5 GPS coordinates and they just dropped their own personnel out of the helicopter down in to take care of it and scoop them up."

Simmons said Tucker County strives to be a leader in the State and the Center is now the first to have a system to automatically switch over in the event of main line communication failure. "You're always telling us you are trying to lead things in the State compared to other places, being a small county," Simmons said. "This automated failover system at the tower, we're the first one our I.T. company knows of that has the automated failover. There is a couple that have two connections, but it requires them switching a wire at the Com Center and then driving to the tower site and then switching the wire. Ours is completely automatic."

Rosenau said that people across the State are impressed with what Tucker

County has done. "I'll tell you, we, the Commission attends a lot of meetings outside of our county and its so good for us to say, look at this program we have in our county and they're in awe. They have not even thought about it or they don't do it."

Rosenau used a discussion the Commissioners had in Charleston about Jail costs and the County's Community Corrections Program as an example of how the County has led the State on issues. "I've talked about our meeting we were just to in Charleston," Rosenau said. "They were talking about jail costs. This is just an example. We talked about jail costs and I was like, 'Well, our County, we have a program called Community Corrections and that saved our County hundreds of thousands of dollars because the County took the initiative to go ahead and start the program."

Rosenau said he feels good that the County is doing well. "We have a 911 Center that is top of the state," Rosenau said. "Because we have planned ...the Commissions have planned, through the years to get it to this point. So when your Commission goes to represent Tucker County at these various meeting throughout the State, it's a good feeling to know our County is doing well."

Refreshments will be provided, according to Simmons.

trail leads you over to Balckwater Falls," Marcus said. "Now there's a hiking trail or biking trail that goes upstream all the way out to Camp 70. So that's a trail head there. That will be hooked in and you won't even have to get on Route 32 once that bridge is built. You'll be able to ride from Thomas all the way into Blackwater Falls without getting on the road."

"Now what kind of support are you asking," Tucker County Commissioner Mike Rosenau said.

According to Marcus, he was seeking a letter of support from the Commission. "You're only the second entity that I have come in to ask for support," Marcus said. "But like the Davis Volunteer Fire Department, they thought that was a great idea. And if you guys could write a letter of support. I'll try to get this more formalized, obviously. This is the most important piece we have because I know, you know how beneficial the trail is down here and how many people that attracts and how its great for the health of all our residents."

"Just so they know, tell them how many bikes come through Davis every Thursday," County Commissioner Fred Davis said.

According to Marcus, as many as 100 bicyclists can be in the area. "Sometimes 50, 100," Marcus said. "When we do our festival down there, it was a couple of hundred people, just on Thursday night."

Davis commented that the Association is a volunteer organization. "The main thing is, they do most all their work for nothing," Davis said. "The volunteers do all of the trail building themselves."

According to Marcus, their group is small and usually has the same five people volunteering. "Which is unfortunate," Marcus said. "Because we are such a small community that the same five people show up twice a month to do trail work and a lot of these land managers don't do a whole lot."

Marcus gave credit to the State Parks for their efforts in maintaining the areas under their control. "The State Parks are the best," Marcus said. "I will give them a lot of credit for actually doing something. They're talking about building a little trail system along the river near where the bridge is going to go. The pedestrian bridge. On that hill where the water tank is for Davis. And that would be nice to have another little trail just to ride around town."

According to Marcus, he wants to coordinate with the State on the project, but is seeking local support for the project. "But really, I just wanted to be able to when I try and coordinate with the State, because that is really my biggest fear is they have come in and said, 'Oh, yeah we're going to build this trail, well, they need to be talking to us.' Gov. Justice announces fall trout stockings and return of Monster Trout Contest

The WVDNR will stock 35,000 pounds of trophy-size trout and 6,500 pounds of monster trout during weeks of Oct. 16 and Oct. 23.

CHARLESTON, WV — Gov. Jim Justice announced today that the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources will begin fall trout stockings during the weeks of Oct. 16 and Oct. 23. The state's second annual Monster Trout Contest will also return during the same time.

During these two weeks, the WVDNR will stock more than 40,000 pounds of trophy-size and monster trout at 43 lakes and streams around the state. Of that total, 35,000 pounds of trout weighing 1-2 pounds and 6,500 pounds of monster trout weighing 3-6 pounds will be stocked. Out of the monster trout, five fish will have a tag that can be redeemed for a grand prize.

"This is one of the best announcements of the year as we stock our lakes and streams, and we have created an exciting element by adding the Monster Trout Contest," Gov. Justice said. "This also provides an excellent opportunity for all of our anglers to catch fish and potentially win some great, great prizes. So, gear up and get out there during this amazing time of year."

Anglers who catch one of the five tagged fish and submit a photo with the tag number will be eligible to win a weekend cabin stay at a West Virginia State Park or a Cabela's prize package. Entries must be submitted by Friday, November 17.

Learn more about the Monster Trout

"We're excited to bring back our Monster Trout Contest for a second year and continue to provide anglers and their families some of the best fishing experiences in the country," Brett McMillion, director of the WVDNR, said. "These stockings will go by quickly, but anglers should expect ideal trout fishing conditions to continue for several weeks, especially in larger streams and lakes where trout have more room to disperse."

Wheeling Creek in Marshall and Ohio County and Glade Creek of Mann (Babcock State Park) has been added to the fall stocking list. Upper Shavers Fork will not be stocked on FS Service Road 209 due to road construction by the U.S. Forest Service. The remainder of the Upper Shavers Fork stocking locations will receive fish.

For a complete list of waters receiving a fall trout stocking, anglers should check pages 14-15 in the 2023 Fishing Regulations Summary. The WVDNR also posts trout stocking updates online.

Special Elk River Fall Trout Stockings In November and December, the WVDNR will also stock trout on the Elk River in Webster County as part of a pilot program to evaluate the economic impact of trout stocking in the area. Stockings, which will occur at the usual stocking locations, will include 750 rainbow trout each month for a total of 1,500 additional trout stocked in the Elk River.

"Thanks to Gov. Justice's vision, West Virginia's trout stocking program has become not only a source of pride for our state, but also a cornerstone of our economy and a magnet for tourism," James Bailey, secretary of the West Virginia Department of Commerce, which oversees the WVDNR, said. "This pilot program is just one of the ways we're increasing tourism and economic activity in Webster County. Thanks to the dedication and sound management practices of the WVDNR, we're able to stock trophy trout in even more waters and continue to showcase West Virginia as a world-class destination for outdoor adventure."

Criteria used to determine what waters receive a fall stocking is based on stream flow and if the water temperature is below 68 degrees. Because of these factors, waters included on the fall stocking list are primarily located at higher elevations and in areas that have a consistent volume of cold water during October.

All anglers 15 years and older are required to have a West Virginia fishing license, trout stamp and a valid form of identification while fishing for trout. Licenses and stamps can be purchased at 160 retail locations across the state or online at WVfish.com.

Upcoming youth, Class Q and senior citizen special split antlerless deer seasons

Special season is open on public and private land in 51 counties open to firearms deer hunting

SOUTH CHARLESTON, W.Va. — The first segment of West Virginia's special antlerless deer season for youth hunters, Class Q permit holders and senior citizens with a Class XS license will be open Oct. 21-22 on public and private land in the 51 counties open to firearms deer hunting. A second segment is scheduled for Dec. 26-27.

"This special season is an excellent opportunity for youth, seniors and other eligible hunters to pursue antlerless deer when deer hunting pressure is significantly lower," said Brett McMillion, director of the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources. "Providing opportunities like

this is just one of the ways we are making sure that hunting in West Virginia is inclusive and accessible to everyone regardless of their age or ability. We hope eligible hunters will take advantage of this time to get out and enjoy a hunting adventure."

Youth hunters ages 8-17 may participate in this special antlerless deer season. Hunters 8-14 must be accompanied by a licensed adult who may not hunt or possess implements for the taking of wildlife. Hunters 15-17 must comply with all licensing requirements. Hunters 65 and older who have a lifetime hunting, trapping and fishing license (Class XS) may participate in this special antlerless deer season. Hunt-

ers with a disability must have a Class Q permit.

Hunters who still need to purchase a license may do so at WVhunt.com.

All hunters participating in this season, accompanying adults and all other hunters afield during these four days must wear at least 400 square inches of blaze orange. The daily bag limit is one antlerless deer per day and no more than four antlerless deer may be harvested during the season. Deer harvested during this special season do not count toward the hunter's annual deer season bag limit. Class N/NN licenses are not required for this antlerless deer season.

Each harvested deer must be field tagged and electronically registered within 24 hours of the close of each segment of this split season and before the pursuit of additional deer. Deer can be checked online at WVhunt.com, by calling 844-WVcheck or by visiting a license agent.

Oct. 21, 1918: Hulett Smith was born in Beckley. In the 1964 gubernatorial primary Smith carried 53 of the state's 55 counties, receiving more votes than his three opponents combined.

Oct. 22, 1693: Lord Thomas Fairfax was born in Kent, England. He inherited five million acres in Virginia, land that

included much of present West Virginia's Eastern Panhandle.

Oct. 22, 1734: Frontiersman Daniel Boone was born in Pennsylvania. In 1788, Boone and his family settled near the mouth of the Kanawha River at Point Pleasant. He represented Kanawha County in the Virginia General Assembly in 1791.

Oct. 22, 1821: Collis P. Huntington was born in Harwinton, Connecticut. In 1869, Huntington purchased the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway and set about extending its tracks from Richmond across southern West Virginia to the Ohio River. There, in 1871, he established a new city bearing his

Oct. 22, 1977: Construction of the New River Gorge Bridge was completed after three years of work. Fayette County's New River Gorge Bridge is one of West Virginia's best-known landmarks. It is the third-highest bridge in the United States and third-longest steel span in the Western Hemisphere.



Apple Fries with Caramel Cream Dip

Ingredients

- 3 Pink Lady or Honeycrisp apples peeled, cored and cut into 8 wedges
- ½ CUP flour
- 3 eggs beaten
- 1 CUP graham cracker crumbs

- 8 OUNCES whipped cream cheese

4. While apples are cooking make caramel cream dip. Combine the whipped cream cheese and caramel sauce, mixing well. Transfer the Caramel Cream Dip into a serving bowl and drizzle additional caramel sauce over the top.

5. Serve the apple fries hot with the caramel cream dip on the side. Enjoy!

The electronic payment method utilized previously, PayConnexion, is no longer available.

"This secure SmartPay method will make it easier and more convenient for parents to fulfill their child support obli-

gations," said Garrett Jacobs, BCSE Commissioner. "The upgrade is part of BCSE's commitment to ensuring the well-being of children and simplifying the child support process."

Local History Celebrated in Town of Davis

Twenty-two new historic signs, featuring high-quality images from the past, have recently been erected in the Tucker County, WV Town of Davis. The signs were officially unveiled on October 6, 2023, when a festive crowd of several dozen people met at 3:00 PM at the Davis Town Hall.

A brief talk about the history behind the signs was followed by a walking tour of William Avenue -- which has twelve of the new signs. Participants enjoyed pointing out historic images -- including long-gone relatives and friends. Mary Quattro pointed out photos of her grandmother and aunts in the sign illustrating the Davis Lunch Restaurant and Jim's Bar. Mary herself is pictured dressed as a 5-year-old princess in the 4th of July float.

Tour participant Pete Barmer's family appears on two signs in front of the old Shop and Save. Both grandfathers and his parents are shown. Pete, as a fifth grader, is mentioned in a story about the Coketon "Colored School," which he attended.

The tour ended with cake and lemonade -and for some people, a meal at Sirianni's. Judy Rodd, the Director of Friends of Blackwater, which organized the event, said: "There were wonderful reminiscences on the walking tour. There was also great enjoyment by people hearing some local history for the first time. It

was a nice mix."

Local residents and history experts researched and fact-checked the images and text on the new signs, which are professionally built to National Park Service standards.

In addition to the William Avenue signs, there are five signs in what is now Davis's Riverfront Park, featuring images of the huge sawmill complex that was located there.

An additional four signs are in Blackwater Falls State Park, just across the Blackwater River from Davis. These signs also illustrate important industries of Davis at the turn of the last century: the pulp mill, the tannery, and the sawmill. They can be accessed by entering the Park on the road to the right, just after the Davis Bridge on Route 32.



According to Strait, the program may reasonably begin next January, although he would like it to start sooner. "Optimally, pie in the sky, we would like to start it this January," Strait said. "But we're looking at realistically the next January."

The course would be taught, according to Strait, by himself or another instructor at the High School. "It would be taught by me or another instructor," Strait said. "Three hours a day, five days a week. It could be done inside of four months, at the most."

According to Strait, teens age 16 and up can obtain their EMT Certification, but are not allowed to ride in the back alone until they are 18. "The students, teenagers 16 years of age, or older, can get their certification as an EMT," Strait said. "But they cannot ride in the back by themselves until they are 18."

Strait said he has had a lot of positive feedback since becoming the training officer. "Overall, since I've taken over as training officer, I'm getting a positive feedback from our members, on the training" Strait said. "We're trying to do training once, maybe twice a month. Generally, we are working towards regional rotation stuff right now. But, overall, I've been having positive feedback from the people within the agency."

Tucker County Commissioner Mike Rosenau asked Strait how many people were currently signed up for the EMT Class. "Right now, I believe we have 15," Strait said. "But that doesn't mean all of them are going to be there. I was hoping to have more students. I do have three students from the High School that are coming to it."

"I just think it's wonderful that there are 15 people willing to step up and take the class," Rosenau said.

Strait acknowledged that the \$650 fee can inhibit some students, but he is looking into ways to mitigate the cost. "If you look down at the bottom," Strait said, "it is a \$650 fee, but that includes books, tuition, testing, Cert test and national testing and stuff like that. That's a concern for some people, but I'm working on scholarships and stuff so the individuals can get help paying for it."

Rosenau requested that Strait arrange for a meeting with the EMS board president to discuss options for the County to assist in the fees. "Its \$650," Rosenau said. "I would like for the President of your organization to request a meeting with us. Sometimes there's – we have in the past – if there is a dedication to our county, an obligation, that we may help with the funding of it. If that EMT will sign a form that he or she will work in our county for a certain amount of years or whatever."

According to Strait, two of the current students are drivers for Tucker EMS and the organization is paying their cost to obtain their EMT. "Two of the students that are in that class are already drivers for Tucker EMS," Strait said. "The proviso is, they have to get their EMT and we pay for it."

Rosenau said that the County have assisted others in the past with education expenses. "We have done that in the past for like Sheriff's Deputies and things like that," Rosenau said. "If there was an understanding that will bring benefit to our county, for a certain amount of time, that we may be able to help with their education. So, if you would have Mandy contact her board and set up a meeting with us, we would appreciate that."

The next meeting of the Tucker County Commission will be held October 11th at 9 a.m. in the Tucker County Courthouse Old Courtroom.

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month

Each year, the month of October sheds light on a reprehensible truth we continue to face, as many Americans are no strangers to domestic violence. According to the National Resource Center on Domestic Violence, one in four women and one in nine men have experienced domestic violence in their lifetime. Many times, the first abuse experience happens before the age of 18. It is a horrible reality. While law enforcement should always be the first point of contact for victims in danger, there are measures state government can take to prevent abuse from happening. Individual efforts can become even more impactful when combined with others as part of a

The Secretary of State's Office facilitates the West Virginia Address Confidentiality Program (ACP). The ACP provides a substitute mailing address and mail-forwarding service to survivors attempting to escape from domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking. Participants are able to conduct business with government agencies and other entities without having to risk disclosing their physical address, which helps prevent abusers from using public records to locate their victims.

The ACP is not a crisis center or direct service agency. It works by teaming up domestic violence and sexual assault programs throughout the state. Advocates who work in the programs can voluntarily register with the Secretary of State's office as an application assistant, who assesses the benefits of the ACP for their clients' overall safety plan. When it fits, it can be an important tool.

Once enrolled in the program, a survivor can use the substitute address to do things like apply for and receive child support, enroll their children in public school, get a West Virginia driver's license or ID card, and vote. When it comes to utilizing some of these services, it once again becomes a

team effort. It requires cooperative support from other agencies, the schools, the DMV, and the county clerks. Each of us plays a role in the safety of a survivor.

A program participant once shared a harrowing experience she had with a member of our office. She was on her way home from work and needed to make a quick stop at the grocery store before picking up her children. At a distance, she thought she saw her abuser. She immediately panicked. Her legs felt weak, but she slowly backed up and left the store. She said she was glad she did not have her children with her, because she didn't want them to see her fear. She was never sure if the person she saw was her abuser. Most of us take for granted the ability to do routine tasks without incident. This keeps me mindful that there are people living in fear of being found on a daily

There are simple things we can all do to make a difference. Some tips from the National Resource Center on Domestic Violence include providing nonjudgmental support to a friend or family member who is being abused, listening to them, letting them know the abuse is not their fault; supporting your local domestic violence program with donations of financial support or volunteer time; speak up about abuse; and educate yourself and others. Each small effort will add to the greater good.

Please join me and the Secretary of State, Mac Warner, in recognition of Domestic Violence Awareness Month this October. Show support to a survivor in whatever way you can. I would also like to express appreciation for the dedication and tireless efforts of the staff and volunteers at the domestic violence and sexual assault programs in West Virginia. Working together, we really can prevent domestic violence.

Natural gas heating prices to fall this winter

CHARLESTON, WV – Most West Virginians who heat their homes with natural gas will see lower gas bills this winter. The Public Service Commission has issued its rulings on how much the various natural gas utilities may charge to purchase gas for this heating season.

Each year, natural gas utilities must file purchased gas adjustment cases (PGA) with the Commission, indicating how much they anticipate they will pay for gas in the coming year. The price utilities pay their suppliers is not regulated by the Commission nor the federal government. Rather, it is determined by the market. The Commission reviews the amounts requested and often adjusts the amount it will permit the companies to charge their customers.

The purchased gas component typically makes up less than half of the total amount of a residential gas bill. Last year, however, the market was particularly volatile, which resulted in a significant increase in the purchased gas component of residential bills.

This year, the market has begun to settle and the prices requested have decreased. The amount approved for Mountaineer Gas is down by almost 20 percent, and Hope Gas saw a decrease of nearly 40 percent for their respective PGAs. Those two companies serve almost 89 percent of gas customers in the state. Of the 12 gas utilities in the state, only Peoples Gas and Standard Gas requested increases in their PGAs. Across the board, the average amount requested decreased by 11.30 percent, while the average amount granted decreased by 19.29 percent.

"It is gratifying to see the wholesale prices coming down this year," said PSC Chairman Charlotte Lane. "I know this will make a big difference to West Virginia families this winter, and that means a lot."

Gas Prices Tumble in West Virginia

The average price for gasoline across Northern West Virginia is 10 cents lower this week at \$3.437 per gallon, according to AAA East Central's Gas

The decline in pump prices accelerated a bit since last week, with the national average falling 11 cents to \$3.70. The primary reasons are slack demand and the lower cost of oil, which is hovering near \$85 per barrel. Today's national average is 12 cents less than a month ago and 21 cents less than a year ago.

According to new data from the Energy Information Administration (EIA), gas demand dropped significantly from 8.62 to 8.01 million barrels per day last week. On the other hand, total domestic gasoline stocks increased substantially by 6.5 million barrels to 227 million barrels. Growing supply, amid low demand, has pushed pump prices down.

At the close of Wednesday's formal trading session, West Texas Intermediate decreased by \$5.01 to settle at \$84.22. Oil prices fell sharply due to rising market concern that if interest rates continue to increase, the economy could tip into a recession. If a recession occurs, crude demand and prices would likely drop. Additionally, the EIA reported that total commercial crude stocks decreased by 2.2 million barrels to 414.1 million barrels last week.



ORDINANCE AN ORDINANCE OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF THOMAS ENACTING A FIRE SERVICE FEE

WHEREAS, the City of Thomas, by and through its Common Council, has the plenary power and authority pursuant to W.Va. Code § 8-13-13 to provide, by ordinance, for the continuance, maintenance, and improvement of fire protection services, and to make reasonable regulations of the service, and to impose by ordinance upon the users of the service reasonable rates, fees, and charges to be collected in the manner

WHEREAS, the City of Thomas has determined that the mandatory imposition of a fire service fee to provide for the continuance, maintenance, and improvement of fire protection services within the City of Thomas is in the best interest of the City's residents; and

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained and enacted by the City of Thomas, that the City Code for the City of Thomas be amended to include the following:

ARTICLE ____: FIRE ___.01 LEGISLATIVE PURPOSE, MAINTENANCE. : FIRE SERVICE FEE

(a) Fire protection service shall be continued, maintained, and improved by the City, in part, at the charge and expense of the owners of buildings and structures of every kind within the corporate limits of the City, which is also within the Fire Service District (First Due Area) of the City Volunteer Fire Department as designated by the State Fire Commission and State Fire Marshal. Owners are declared to be users and beneficiaries of fire services as contemplated by W.Va. Code 8-13-13. Fire services shall be provided by the City of Thomas Volunteer Fire Department as hereinafter defined within the geographic area established by

the State Fire Commission as the first due area of the City of Thomas Volunteer Fire Department.

(b) The charges and expenses with respect to each of such users as set out in this article shall be based and imposed, in part, by the classification of the structure(s)

.02 DEFINITIONS.

(a) For the purposes of this article, the following terms shall have the meaning respectively designated unless it is clear from the context that a different meaning is intended.

INDUSTRIAL STRUCTURE. All buildings that are derived from or used for industry or the commercial manufacture of goods. The fee shall be effective upon commencement of construction.

MULTIPLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL UNIT STRUCTURE. A residential unit structure having more than two family dwellings or units within such structure. Such structure shall include, but not be limited to, apartment buildings, condominiums, or boarding houses. Such structures shall exclude hotels, motels, rest homes, tourist homes, hospital rooms, and the like. Residential rental property shall be classified as commercial property for the purpose of fee assessment. The fee shall be effective upon commencement of

NON-RESIDENTIAL UNIT STRUCTURE. All other buildings not included within the definition of "residential unit structure". Such structures shall include, but not be limited to, all commercial establishments, schools, government buildings, hotels, motels, rest homes, and the like. If structure has multiple uses such as residential and commercial it will be classified as a NONRESIDENTIAL UNIT. The fee shall be effective upon commencement of construction.

RESIDENTIAL UNIT STRUCTURE. Any structure or unit which is used or intended by the nature ofits construction to be used as a one- or two-family dwelling by persons for living or sleeping quarters, but shall not include unit structures intended primarily for transient lodging, including without limitation, hotels, motels, rest homes, and hospital rooms. The fee shall be effective upon commencement of construction. .03 IMPOSITION AND RATE.

There is hereby levied, imposed, and assessed upon owners of all residential, commercial, industrial, and governmental buildings of every kind and nature, as defined herein a Fire Service Fee. Beginning on , 2023, the fees are as follows. **Fire Service Fees:**

Classification

Rate

Industrial structure \$12.00 per month

Multi-family residential unit structure \$8.00 per month

Non-residential unit structure \$8.00 per month

Residential structure \$5.00 per month

.04 BILLING AND COLLECTION OF FEES.

- (a) All fees and charges for fire protection service shall be billed and collected by the City and shall not be pro-rated for less than 30 days. The City shall be charged with the duty of mailing a statement to each owner to be charged the fee as hereby imposed, but failure to mail any statement for charges shall not be grounds for avoiding payment.
- (b) Charges for the fire protection service may be billed on a monthly, quarterly, or annual basis by the City and all charges shall be billed in advance of the services being rendered. (c) To avoid the late payment penalty imposed by paragraph (e) below, payment for any fire protection

service fee imposed by this article shall be paid within 20 days of the date of the bill for services mailed.

- (d) For the purpose of multi-family buildings and nonresidential unit structures that are subject to a written lease agreement, the fire fee thereon shall be considered a utility as may be defined in said lease (e) Any charge for service remaining unpaid 20 days after the billing date shall be deemed delinquent
- and a late payment penalty of 10% of the unpaid charge for that billing period shall be assessed. In the event that any delinquent charge remains unpaid for 12 months, an additional penalty equal to interest at the rate of 10% per annum of the billing shall be assessed. .05 CHARGE OR FEE DEBT DUE CITY. The fee or charges provided for by this article shall be a debt due the City. The City may collect any such

fee or charge and all accrued penalties by action against the owner of property against whom the services charges have been assessed by action before the Magistrate Court of the county or by appropriate proceedings in the Circuit Court of the county .06 CHARGES ARE RESPONSIBILITY OF PROPERTY OWNER; OWNER'S RESPONSIBILITY.

(a) Each and every property owner of one- and two-family residential unit structures, multiple- family residential unit structures, commercial, industrial, and governmental buildings shall be responsible for payment of the fire service fee charges assessed, imposed, and levied under this article. (b) It shall be the responsibility of the owner or owners of all one- and two-family residential unit struc-

tures, multiple-family residential unit structures, commercial, industrial, and governmental buildings within the corporate limits of the City, to notify the City of any change in ownership and other items requested by the City within 30 days of such change. (c) The City will utilize information supplied by the property owners for purposes of billing this fire service fee. It shall be the responsibility of the owner of the buildings to review these charges and to notify

the City of any changes within 60 days of the billing. Failure to notify the City of any discrepancies will void the owner's right for reduction of previous billings. If the owner determines that the City is not billing at the correct rate, the owner must notify the City within 60 days or the owner will be subject to a penalty in the amount of the lesser of all fire fees for the duration of owner's ownership of the property from the enactment of this article, plus penalties and interest at the highest rates allowed by law, or five years of fire service fees, plus interest at the highest rate allowed by law. (d) The provisions of this article shall not apply to any buildings owned by the City.

(e) The fire service fee charge will be invoiced through a utility bill issued by the City.

.07 PROTESTS. The owner of any such building above may protest a charge or fee imposed for fire protection by giving

written notice to the City setting forth his or her objections on or before 35 days after the billing date. The City shall forward such protest to the Fire Service Appeals Board, which shall set a time for the hearing within 30 days of filing such protest. The Fire Service Appeals Board shall render a decision based on the record made at the hearing within a reasonable time, giving notice in writing of its decision to all parties concerned. The amount, if any, due the City under such decisions shall be due and payable 30 days after service of the decision. Any person aggrieved by such administrative decision may within 30 days from service of the decision file a petition duly verified with the Circuit Court of the county, requesting review by certiorari; otherwise, such decision becomes final and conclusive. .08 FIRE SERVICE APPEALS BOARD.

There is hereby established a Fire Service Appeals Board consisting of three members, one shall be a member of City Council appointed by the Mayor, one shall be the Fire Chief, and the third shall be a resident of the City appointed by City Council. The members' terms, except for the Fire Chief, shall be for a term of three years. Any vacancy for whatever cause shall be filled as soon as possible, but no longer than 30 days after the vacancy occurs

.09 RESTRICTED USE OF REVENUES; FUTURE RATES AND CHARGES.

All revenues received from the collection of fire service fees provided in this article shall be placed in a Fire Service Fee Fund. These funds shall be used only to defray the cost of and the continuance, maintenance, and improvement of fire protection services within the first due area of the City of Thomas Volunteer Fire Department as designated the State Fire Commission and the State Fire Marshal and no part of such revenues shall be used for any other municipal purpose. Any future adjustment of the rates and charges imposed by this article shall be determined by applying the same adjustments equally to all rates and charges imposed by this article.

All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, deemed inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistencies and should any section, clause, sentence, or provision of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this ordinance. acres, something like that. Our bike club actually manages that. We have an agreement with the power company so we have a really good relationship with them."

Marcus said representatives from Mon Power toured the area recently and are on board with the proposal. "They had a couple of their big wigs in town last week or two weeks ago, I think Al Tomson went out with them also. We showed them around and they're behind it, too," Marcus said.

According to Marcus, he was approaching the Commission for input prior to approaching the State. "So we kind of contacted everybody. I wanted to get you guys in on it, knowing what's going on and what I'm trying to do

and I could kind of tell the guys at the Division of Highways that the County Commission is behind this," Marcus said.

Marcus said the Visitor's Center was behind the project as well. "Also, if the Visitor's Center does end up buying from Cooper, I know that they are behind it and I would think that that would be a great place for extra parking, too, and to be a trail head. If we can get a trail there, then we could have trail head parking there. Because parking is becoming a huge issue in Davis."

Rosenau asked Marcus about potential impact on private property. "So from where that ends, the proposal from the State," Rosenau said. "How much private property would the proposed trail go?"

Marcus said he had spoken to the two private land owners in the area that would be inpacted by a trail. "When I talked to Pat Nichols, he was talking about doing an easement," Marcus said. "He thought it was a great idea. I talked to John and he was like, 'We're kind of in negotiations right now. I can't really say anything.' So, that's where I stand with those two guys."

Rosenau asked about Dillan and Davis. "That's power company back there," Marcus said. "You know where their little sub station is behind the trees there? So that's power company all the way around back until you hit Pete Johnson, which is behind the Bistro and

the distillery. He owns that, but it is all a conservancy down low and that is where he wants to put the trail. So, that would not be available for development. So he's already had that trail planned. He even named his little development after that. Its called River Walk."

Rosenau said that the Commission would provide a letter of support for the proposal. "I think that if you need a letter of support from the Commission," Rosenau said. "I'm pretty sure the Commission would have no problem doing that, Matt."

The next meeting of the Tucker County Commission will be held October 11th at 9 a.m. in the Tucker County Courthouse Old Courtroom.

Flu and COVID-19 vaccines don't affect donor eligibility

As cold and flu season quickly approaches, the Red Cross is reminding donors that they can still give blood after receiving a flu vaccine, so long as they are feeling healthy and well on the day of their donation. Likewise, there is no

deferral or wait time for those receiving

the updated COVID-19 vaccine. **How to donate blood**

A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

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
