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Youth Suspension at Wellness Center Sparks Dissension for City of Parsons

Courtney Barb addressed the City of Parsons Council on November 14th to discuss the issues surrounding the suspension of her 15 year old son from the Wellness 24 Hour Center in Parsons. The facility is a key club styled center operated by the City of Parsons under the Parks and Recreation Board. Barb outlined the issues surrounding her son's suspension in a November 18th interview with the Parsons Advocate.

Barb admitted that her son had been made aware of the rule after he had been verbally warned in the past and that she and her husband had made it clear to him that he had to have an adult with him at the Wellness Center. "He goes to the Wellness Center," Barb said. "He's supposed to have supervision because he's only 15 and he has been warned of that verbally before and we have made it very clear to him that he is not to be working out in there without an adult."

According to Barb, she was shown the footage from the incident on October 8th that led to her son's suspension, but that the footage she saw did not show her son using the weight equipment. "So he went into the gym on October the 8th with a friend of his who is 17," Barb said. "I watched the video, the only video footage that was shown to me at the time, he walked around the gym and he was stretching and preparing to work out, but I never saw him work out. He didn't lift any weights in this video."

Barb said that city personnel said that her son had left

in the video. "I was told by the office specialist, who was the person showing me the video, that he left," Barb said.

Her son had been reprimanded for being in the building and waiting for adult, according to Barb. "I was upset because they reprimanded him for being inside the building when he was just waiting for an adult," Barb said. "And I didn't think that was very fair."

Mayor Kolsun has reached out to Barb regarding the incident, Barb said. "So when I approached them at the meeting, they were adamant that he was not even allowed to be inside the building, which was contradicted yester-

Davis Resigns Parsons Park Board

Following controversy surrounding the suspension of a 15 year old Wellness 24 Fitness Center member, Chris Davis has resigned the Parsons Park and Recreation Board after eight years of service. The Parsons City Council addressed Davis' resignation at their regular November 14th meeting. Davis addressed the issues surrounding his decision to resign in an interview with the Parsons Advocate on November 18th.

According to Davis, he and Courtney Barb talked after the Park Board Meeting on November 13th. "Me and Mrs. Barb actually following the Park Board meeting, had an opportunity to talk," Davis said. "And I think there was a lot of miscommunication and lot of things you know looked at differently. We've had some past things that needed talked out and we were able to do that and at least get on some common ground."

Davis said that he felt he came to some common ground with Barb following the meeting. "We both apologized," Davis said. "That's not the way things were coming across. We weren't targeting anybody. There were things from another matter that were untrue and I think she kind of felt the same way."

The resignation letter was sent prior to his conversation with Barb on the 13th, according to Davis. Davis did acknowledge that prior to his resignation letter that there had been social media posts made, but did not identify any

Community Stunned by Walgreens Closure Announcement

Residents of Tucker County were blindsided Wednesday morning, November 15, by the announcement that the Parsons Walgreens will be closing as of 3 p.m. on December 14. Community members reached out to their public officials over the issue in droves that morning. "It was like I just found out about it," Steve Leyh of the Tucker County Development Authority said. "It wasn't like there was some kind of forewarning that I got. (Tucker County Commissioner) Freddy Davis called me on the way to the Commission meeting and asked, 'Can you look into this?' and then I

found the story."

According to Davis, the Commission and Leyh have been addressing the closure since word first came to their attention as well as coordinating with several other governmental entities. "Just to let people know," Davis said, "that we have, Steve and I have been working and talk-

Mook Appears for Sentencing

Tammy Mook appeared in Court November 15th with her attorney Brent Easton to be sentenced in a three year long case involving stolen goods. Mook had plead guilty to a misdemeanor charge of Receiving and Transferring Stolen Goods as part of a plea agreement that dismissed the felony charges against her.

Late in the sentencing hearing, Mook experienced a medical emergency and emergency services were contacted for assistance.

The WV State Police were the first to respond to the dispatch. Tucker County EMS Director Amanda Simmons arrived soon after. Simmons assessed Mook and attempted to keep her comfortable as she reassured both Mook and her daughter until the EMS crew arrived.

Previously in the proceedings, the issue of Mook's health issues had been addressed with the defense calling Mook's daughter to the stand to testify to her mother's various health issues. Mook's daughter testified that she transports and attends appointments with several doctors in both Garrett County and The Cleveland Clinic, as well as listed a number of conditions and procedures her mother had endured.

The prosecution did not cross examine the witness, but did bring up the various requests that both she and the court had made for documentation of Mook's health status. According to Wilkins, there had been no documentation presented. Mook's attorney Brent Easton disputed the statement that no documentation had been submitted regarding Mook's health conditions. According to Easton, Mook's documentation and repeated inpatient care led to several continuances during the case proceeded by the now retired Judge Nelson.

Also presented at the proceedings Wilkins had shown a video from recent charges in Randolph County involving theft at a Dollar General in Harman. The video evidence was from a June 28 incident. Mook was charged with Petty Larceny in the incident.

In the video, Mook was seen in sunglasses, a wig and hat with a cart with several items. The video also showed Mook examining items and then concealing

day by the mayor," Barb said. "I got a phone call from the Mayor."

Barb acknowledged that the city states they sent two written warnings, but that since they were not sent certified, there is no proof one way or the other. Barb also said that other people have claimed they did not receive a second warning, either. "It just doesn't seem very fair," Barb said. "I don't even remember receiving the second warning. I know there are others who also say that they've never received a written warning. They don't send it certified so we can't prove whether they're following that second protocol or not."

Barb asserts that neither the Parks Board nor the City Council have viewed the original video and that it was deleted shortly following her request to view it. "Nobody has watched the video, either," Barb said. "No body has watched the video and the video was deleted within 48 hours of me asking to watch the video, the video is gone. The entire video is gone and the only images or video footage that we have left are from another Park Board Member's personal cell phone zoomed in only on my son and you can't see the rest of the gym."

Barb said her son claims he waited twenty minutes for an adult to arrive and just walked around the facility and stretched. "As far as I know, my son told me that he waited for an adult to show up," Barb said. "He waited for 20 minutes. He was in there for 20 minutes walking around and stretching and he waited for an adult to show up."

Barb claims that no one knows the full story, not even her. "I thought it was a little extreme of a punishment or reprimand without anyone actually knowing the full truth," Barb said. "I still don't know the full truth."

On November 14th, the City Council discussed the issues in open session as part of the resignation of Parsons Parks and Recreation Board Member Chris Davis. "This all boils down to the Barb boy," Council Member James Humphrey said. "He's getting punished for six months because he was being honest. He put is five dollars into the envelope."

Council Member Melissa Jones stated that the youth had violated the policy. "That may be true, but what has happened is a violation to the rules that he has signed," Jones said.

According to the City, the youth was seen on camera without adult supervision. The City also ascertained that two written warning were issued with the second being delivered certified mail. There was some debate over whether both letters had been sent and if so, if both were sent certified mail. According to Barb, the Parks and Recreation Board had informed her that both letters were certified and that she would be supplied with receipts. However, at the meeting, the City ascertained that only the last letter was certified, but that a copy of the first letter did exist, but there would not be a receipt due to it not being sent certified."I totally agree with the rules you are saying," Humphrey said. "But six months and we have no proof we sent him a letter?"

Council Member Tim Auvil said that the letter had not been sent certified. "That wasn't sent certified is what we said," Auvil said.

Humphrey stated that it was said in the meeting that the letter had been sent certified. "It was said in the meeting and three council members set in here and heard somebody say it was certified,' Humphrey said.

City Administrator Agnes Arnold said that she had believed the letter to have been certified, but verified in the office the following day and was informed that she had been mistaken on the fact, "I believed it was certified until I verified with Mistee today," Arnold said.

go by. "That is up to the Park Board to review those issues and we did agree that we would review them," Auvil said. "You can't go backward and say change the rules for what has already happened, but for the rules moving forward, yes there can be discussion about possibly changing. '

Jones said that Barb had agreed to bring suggestions before the Parks Board for consideration. "His mother has suggestions and she's coming to the Park Board with these suggestions," Jones said. "And she was understanding of the Parks Board's position last night."

The issues surrounding the suspension involve Wellness Center regulations surrounding youths under 16 and their use of weight training equipment. Under the current regulations, anyone under 16 must be accompanied by an adult to use the weight equipment. "Under 16 years old you have to have an adult, period," Auvil said.

According to Auvil, the rules exist to comply with the insurance requirements for the facility. City Attorney Tim Stranko supplied the Council with insurance documentation prior to the meeting. "It states frankly in here that juveniles under the age of 16, in most facilities, they aren't even allowed in there. Period. And there is nothing wrong with our policy that anyone under 16 has to have an adult in there with them. That's the rules we made up when we made that a 24 center."

City Treasurer Quinnlan Buckley asked the Council how much of an increase the City would see if they dropped the age requirement to 14. "It doesn't matter," Jones said. "The papers that they sign and go in there on, if they get hurt over there without an adult working out, those papers if you go to court don't mean nothing ... we wouldn't have no insurance. They would drop us."

Auvil asserted that everyone agrees to the rules when they sign up for membership and if they did not, they do not have to become a member. "Everybody signed it," Auvil said. "If they didn't agree with those rules, don't sign the paper, don't pay your dues and don't use the facility."

According to Jones, Barb;s husband was at the meeting with the Park Board and was informed that he was welcome to accompany his son to the Wellness Center and just sit there as adult supervision without having to pay a fee for himself. "I have to say that Nick (Barb) was here last night to discuss it," Jones said. "And he was informed that he can go with his son anytime he wants to, with his son, he can sit in there as adult supervision and not work out and he doesn't have to pay anything."

According to Auvil there have been a total of seven suspensions in the past year and a half at the facility due to rule violations. "There's been suspensions in the last year and a half, two years," Auvil said. City Administrator Agnes Arnold also said there had been a couple of warning sent to individuals that resulted in no further violations from them.

According to Auvil, prior to the facility becoming a 24 hour Center, the Center was operating at a large financial shortfall. "The whole point was whenever it came to that point, the facility wasn't even open half the time because it had to have a full time employees there all the time. After we made it a 24-7 facility, we dropped the membership dues. We haven't touched them since. They've remained the same. We also gave extra benefits and discounts to veterans and disabled and seniors. It practically costs nothing. Equipment is expensive, but our membership doubled. We have twice as many members over there then we ever did have when it was only open part time."

Auvil said that the rules could possibly be changed in the future, but for the time being are what the Board has in place and what must be enforced. "The rules could possibly be changed in the future," Auvil said. "But that is what is in place with the policy right now and that is what has to be enforced because that is what has been enforced with everybody else." The next meeting of the Parsons City Council will be held December 5th at 6 p.m. at the Charles W. "Bill" Rosenau Municipal Building located at 341 Second Street in Parsons.

Humphrey maintained that he felt the city was failing the children of Parsons. "We're supposed to be helping our kids, not hindering them," Humphrey said.

Both Auvil and Mayor Bruce Kolsun said they felt the accusation that they were failing the children was unwarranted. Auvil said that the Park Board had agreed to review the policies, but the current policy is what the Board has to

ing on the phone with the other Commissioners about Walgreens."

Leyh has been acting as a point of contact between entities on the issue. Leyh said he has been reaching out to City and County officials, as well as Walgreens store manager about the announced closure. Leyh said, "I reached out to the store manager. It's going to affect 10 people's livelihoods."

Leyh said he extended an offer to help with employment resources for any displaced workers. "I wanted to extend an invitation to try and connect them to employment resources if the store closes," Leyh said.

As well as assisting those displaced by the closure, Leyh has also extended assistance to the local property owner as well. "Also extended an offer to the property owner, the woman that owns the building, and said if you need help securing another tenant, let me know and we can help you in that regard," Leyh said.

As well as working with local officials, Leyh has also been in contact with State officials, as well. "I informed the business and retention rep at the Economic Development at the State level to let them know that we're losing a business," Leyh said.

Parsons newly appointed Mayor Bruce Kolsun has also been contacted by Leyh and is making calls on the issue. "I know Bruce (Kolsun) is the new mayor," Leyh said. "I just spoke with him and said if there is anything I can do, just let me know. He's making phone calls obviously."

Leyh has also been in contact with both Senators on

the issue to let them know of the impact the closure will have on Tucker County. "We did reach out to both Senators and let them know that this is an issue," Leyh said. "And that it is going to impact not just Parsons but everybody that is going to have to drive to Elkins."

At the heart of the issue, Leyh said the closure represented a quality-of-life issue for the community. "It's a quality-of-life issue," Leyh said. "It's a healthcare issue and it stinks, but it is what it is."

In the end, the closure comes down to corporate decisions, according to Leyh. Leyh said the future is uncertain on the issue, but Tucker County is making an effort to ease the transition. "I don't know what will come of it," Leyh said. "But, we're making an effort. So, if nothing else, we will try to transition the best we can for folks and try to find somebody to fill the space, if that's what's needed."

"I'm really disappointed in the closing of Walgreens," Tucker County Commission President Mike Rosenau said, "It's a big hit to our county."

Rosenau said the Commission was dedicated to working with the Development Authority. "We'll be working with the Development Authority to see if there are any additional things we can do to bring additional business into the area."

Walgreens had announced in late June that it intended to close 150 US locations. The Parsons Advocate has reached out to Walgreens Public Relations for comment on the issue, but has not received a response as of press time.

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



The national average for a gallon of gas dropped five cents since last week to \$3.36. Parked in the mid-\$80s per barrel a week ago, oil is now hovering around the mid\$70s. Since it is the main ingredient in gasoline, less expensive oil usually leads to falling gas prices. Pump prices have fallen or remained flat every day since September 19. Today's national average is 26 cents less than a month ago and 41 cents less than a year ago.

For this week, the Energy Information Administration (EIA) delayed its scheduled data releases, including its weekly estimates of gasoline supply and demand, to complete a planned systems upgrade. The EIA will resume its regular publishing schedule next week.

At the close of Wednesday's formal trading session, West Texas Intermediate decreased by \$2.04 to settle at \$75.33. Oil prices fell this past week due to a stronger dollar and reduced market concerns that the conflict in the Middle East will escalate, which could lead to a reduction in regional oil production and higher prices.

several of the items, as well as removing items from packaging and then placing the empty packaging on shelves. "You will see her put those in her pocket," Wilkins said. "She just placed the packaging back onto the shelf there."

The Harman incident involved a long list of items totaling \$71.39. "That's the mascara on the list. She opens up the mascara and then that item goes into her pocket," Wilkins said. "This is just two months before she came in to plea on this case."

Wilkins pointed out that Mook appeared relatively well in the video evidence. "She seems to be perfectly mobile. She is well enough to disguise herself in a hat, sunglasses and wig to go out and steal items."

During the proceedings, Wilkins asked the court for a year in jail, the maximum for the misdemeanor charge Mook plead guilty to. According to Wilkins, Mook is currently on probation from a case presided by Judge Nelson. Wilkins said Mook was sentenced to three years probation in May of 2022. "She's on probation," Wilkins said. "Obviously it didn't stick. She has money to pay for these items. I don't know whys she does it. I don't know if it's the thrill." There was some discussion that perhaps a mental health evaluation was warranted due to the repeated behavior according to Wilkins.

Easton requested that the court consider an alternative sentence for his client due to her health and the nature of the charges. "This is the type of case that should receive an alternative sentence."

According to Easton, his client has been targeted several times in very similar cases. Easton said that in each instance, the evidence pointed to others' guilt more strongly, but it was his client that was prosecuted. Easton described the charges as "barely prosecutable." "There was a second person involved that was equally culpable," Easton said. "But it is Miss Mook that the State went after."

Wilkins disputed the allegation and informed Easton and the Court that charges were brought against others in another case, but were later dropped. The case in question, according to Wilkins, was prior to when she became Prosecuting Attorney. Wilkins said. "It is out of my hands." According to Easton, the others involved did testify as witnesses in the previous case.

Due to the emergency, Mook was not sentenced by the court. Mook was transported to the hospital by EMS. There is no word on her condition.



No Bake White Chocolate **Raspberry Pie**

Ingredients

Graham Cracker Crust

• 2 cups Graham cracker crumbs

• 3/4 cup butter, melted NOTE: You can also use a pre-made

graham cracker crust

- White Chocolate and Raspberry Filling
- 2 cups white chocolate , chopped
- 1/2 cup cream
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/4 tsp. vanilla paste
- 1 cup fresh raspberries
- · White chocolate shavings and extra raspberries for garnish

Instructions

• Butter and line a 9 Inch Cake Pan with 2 layers of cling wrap, allowing extra to hang off the sides. This will ensure you can lift the pie out easily once set. Set aside.

• In a large bowl combine the Graham cracker crumbs and melted butter. Using a spatula stir until the Grahams are fully coated and have absorbed all the butter.

• Transfer the crust mixture to the prepared cake pan. Using the back of your spatula press the crumbs down into the pan until you have a compact even crust. Set in the fridge to firm up while you make the filling.

· In a large microwave-safe bowl combine the white chocolate, butter, and cream. Microwave in 30-second increments until fully melted, about 1 1/2 - 2 1/2 minutes. Once melted, whisk in the vanilla paste until smooth.

• Remove the prepared crust from the fridge and arrange the raspberries on top of the crust. Lay them on their sides so they are not sticking up.

· Gently pour the white chocolate filling over the raspberries. Carefully transfer the pie to the fridge to set until firm, this will take a minimum of 8 hours but I like to leave it overnight.

• Once ready to serve, lift the pie out using the cling wrap. Gently peel the cling wrap back and place the tart on a serving platter. Garnish with more fresh raspberries and white chocolate shavings.

• To store, cover the pie in cling wrap and place in the fridge for up to 4 days. Before serving let it sit at room temperature for at least 30 minutes to take the chill off it. Slice and enjoy!



individuals. "As I sent that in, there were some posts made on social media that were untrue. I'm not sitting in my home watching people on a video stream from my home."

Council Member James Humphrey said he felt that Davis was wronged by the Parks and Recreation Board in regards to the incident. "In my opinion, I felt he got thrown under the bus by the rest of the Parks Board," Humphrey said."We are losing a big asset to this city because, in my opinion, the Park Board dropped the ball on Chris Davis."

Council Member Tim Auvil denied that the Parks Board had wronged Davis in any way. "No, it was not us, believe me," Auvil said. "I think that's a false accusation. I talked to him. We exchanged text."

Council Member Melissa Jones clarified Humphrey's position on the controversy surrounding the incident. "What (Humphrey) is trying to say is that the Park Board, when it became a big Facebook post and accusations about (personal issues), well, the Park Board and the City did not take a stand to back him."

Humphrey said he blamed the City of Parsons for what was happening. "I'm not only blaming the Parks Board," Humphrey said. "I blame the whole City of Parsons."

Auvil acknowledged that Davis was the target of unjust comments. "I agree," Auvil said. "There was unjust criticism, unjust accusations, thrown at him and that's why he's resigning. He dedicated eight years. He was on the Park Board for eight years. I agree 110% we are losing a valuable asset."

According to Humphrey, Davis had said he tried to contact the rest of the board and his phone calls were not returned. "I was told that nobody contacted him," Humphrey said. "He tried to contact everybody. Nobody would answer his phone calls." Auvil denied the allegations. "No, I

talked to him," Auvil said. Humphrey questioned Davis' role in

regards to reviewing footage from the Wellness Center. "I would like to know why he was the one in charge of running the cameras," Humphrey said.

Auvil said that Davis was not the person designated to review camera footage. "No, he wasn't the one in charge of overseeing the cameras," Auvil said. "They are reviewed at the Wellness Center and here at the office."

According to Humphrey, Davis had video evidence from the incident on his phone. "He showed me videos on his phone," Humphrey said. "How did he get the videos on his phone if doesn't have access to cameras?"

According to Auvil, Davis had become involved only if a violation was suspected. "If there is a violation, then he had asked to help to determine that because he's there all the time," Auvil said. "He's over there more than all of us put together."

Council Member Kathy DiBacco questioned Davis' dual role at the Wellness Center. "I have a question," DiBacco said. "When he's working for Elkins Physical Therapy why is he policing the Wellness Center? I mean is Elkins Physical Therapy ok with that?"

Jones said that Davis did not police the facility when he was there as an employee. "From what I understand, I wouldn't say it is policing," Jones said. "From what I understand, it had been brought to the Park Board and Park Board requested that he keep an eye on things and if Mistee would call and say, 'hey, so and so doesn't have a membership' he would graciously help."

Humphrey said that Davis should not have been put in that position. "That shouldn't be his job," Humphrey said. DiBacco agreed. Auvil stated that Davis

was a member of the Park Board, but state that Davis acknowledged that he was not a Park Board member while negotiations with Elkins Physical Therapy were ongoing over the use of the facility and abstained from any votes pertaining to his employer while on the Board. "He had nothing to do with that and it gives the Center 12-Grand a year that helps stay fiscally viable," Auvil said.

Davis in his interview addressed DiBacco's concerns about his role at the gym as a physical therapist. "That's the big thing is everyone is saying that I'm policing the thing when I was there. The reality is I didn't do anything like that when I was there. I think that's some miscommunication, too," Davis said.

Davis went on to say that the only time he would intervene at the facility was at the request of the City and then only in his position at a Park Board Member. "I'm not targeting anybody," Davis said. "I'm not harassing anybody. The reality is unless Mistee over at the City would call and ask me to do something as a Board Member, that was about the only time I ever would say anything regarding rule stuff to people in the gym. Just because I'm there treating for physical therapy. That's my main job. I'm a volunteer as a board member. "

Davis clarified the arrangement that Elkins Physical Therapy has at the Wellness Center. "The reality is we rent space," Davis said. "So what I do there has no bearing on the City. Its nothing they are going to have any association with."

Davis also addressed the concerns over perceived policing at the facility. "The reality of me leaving is its hard to do both," Davis said. "If I'm just there working, I can't be policing in a facility...I really didn't say anything to anybody. That's not what I'm there for."

According to Davis, he spoke to everyone in the facility, but not in an official capacity. "I think that misconception that

I am harassing all these people, I talk to everybody. If I said hi to them that might be what it is. There's a few people there that didn't like me from different things and that's ok, too. I'm not running up and harassing them saying anything."

Davis denied ever saying anything to Barb's son at the gym. "Even with the Barb situation, you can say I was harassing him. I didn't say a word to him when I saw him in there because I didn't want this crazy, harassing situation talked about. Unfortunately, everybody took it that way and it kind of blew up on social media. And its disheartening that the public takes one word on things."

During the meeting, Council Member Melissa Jones asked City Attorney Tim Stranko if the council could enter executive session to discuss the resignation. However, Jones was informed by Stranko that there was no exemption for the discussion in executive session because Davis was a park board member and not an employee of the City. As a result, the council was not legally allowed to hold discussion in executive session and instead was required to have an open meeting discussion on the matter. "You cannot go into executive session for this discussion.," Stranko said. "It is not qualified as an exception."

Davis outlined the reason for his resignation in a letter read into the record and supplied to the Council. "Due to recent circumstances and the personal attack against Me and my family as a Park board member, Consider this my resignation as of October 30, 2023 at 12:01 am. It has been my honor to serve with a good group of people and a city organization that is looking to improve things. Our parks system is one of the best in the area and the City Council and parks and recreation are to thank for that," Davis wrote.



PSC Initiates General Investigation into Gas Outage

CHARLESTON, WV - On Thursday, the Public Service Commission of West Virginia launched a general investigation into a water line break and natural gas outage that affected hundreds of customers in Charleston.

On Nov. 10 a widespread natural gas outage occurred, that has left hundreds of customers of Mountaineer Gas Company on Charleston's west side without service. On the same day, there were several water main breaks on the West Virginia-American Water Company lines in the same area. The water main breaks caused outages for many customers and required boil water advisories to be issued.

Commission staff has been ordered to investigate the cause of the water main breaks and the gas outage. Within 20 days of Thursday's order, staff will make recommendations for information and evidence that West Virginia-American Water and Mountaineer Gas will be required to file formally with the Commission. The utilities will then have five days to respond to those recommendations. The Commission will establish further proceedings after the information has been filed.

"We want to see this matter resolved as safely and as quickly as possible," said PSC Chairman Charlotte Lane.
