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DiBacco Named to Four Year Ward Two Vacancy, Resigns Two Year City Council Seat

Tuesday, February 6th, the Parsons City Council held a special session to interview three candidates vying to fill the remainder of a four year term vacated by the appointment of Tim Auvil to the post of City Recorder. The appointment will fill the Ward Two seat until June 30, 2026. Seth Rosenau and Kathy DiBacco appeared before the Council in person with candidate Richard "Rick" Lemons appearing via telephone.

Each candidate was interviewed using a pre-selected list of questions so that each person would be asked the exact same questions. The questions ranged from name and address, how long the applicant has resided in Parsons, occupation and educational background, to governmental and committee experience and whether the applicant has any relatives currently in government. Other questions centered around the candidate's goals and how they plan to communicate with constituents.

Only one applicant at a time were in the council chambers during the interview, with the remaining applicants waiting outside the chambers. "It is an open meeting," Mayor Bruce Kolsun said. "One applicant will be in here at a time. The others will be dismissed."

Candidate Seth Rosenau was the first to be interviewed by the Council. Rosenau said he had resided in Parsons for 39 years and is the son of Tucker County Commission President Mike Rosenau. Rosenau is a graduate of Tucker County High School and attended WVU and Fairmont State. According to Rosenau he has extensive coaching experience and said if appointed, his main goal would be to give the youth a voice. "Everyone has something they could bring to the table," Rosenau said.

The second interview was via phone with Candidate Rick Lemons. Lemons said he had been a resident since 2019, but had lived in Parsons previously from 1996 to 2003 before being moved to the eastern panhandle for work. Lemons said he has extensive governmental experience from his work with OSHA through the State of West Virginia and his 15 year service in the WV Army National Guard. Lemons also said he attended the WV Police

Academy and was a graduate of Buckhannon High School. Lemons said he would like to see the City prosper again and would like to try to bring back industry and help retain a workforce population. "I would like to see our town grow back to what it used to be," Lemons said.

Candidate Kathy DiBacco was the final interview of the evening. DiBacco said she had been a resident of Parsons for 22 years, but had been a Tucker County resident her entire life. According to DiBacco, she was on the Board of Education for six years and has had a seat on the Parsons City Council since 2022. DiBacco said her objectives were to listen to the people and be fiscally responsible. DiBacco said her main goal was to see the City was run properly and she felt the most important services the City could offer were proper water and sewer. "The two most important things our residents have in the City are adequate water and adequate sewage," DiBacco said.

During the regular session following the special session, the Council voted for DiBacco to fill the unexpired four year term as an appointment pending her resignation from her current two year seat. The requirement for DiBacco to resign prior to official appointment is required by West Virginia law, according to City Attorney Tim Stranko. The official resignation from the two year seat by DiBacco will be taken up at the next Council meeting. "If you chose Council Member DiBacco to fill that seat, it would be a conditional appointment," Stranko said. "Conditional upon her resigning her current seat. She cannot hold two seats at a time."

The two year term that is to be vacated by DiBacco will remain unfilled by the Council and will be placed before a vote by the City as part of this year's elections in June with filing in April. Both Rosenau and Lemons were encouraged to apply to be placed on the ballot by City Administrator Agnes Arnold. "I would recommend, let the public decide," City Recorder Tim Auvil said. "We've got several good applicants here."

The next meeting of the City of Parsons Council will be held Tuesday, February 20th at 6 p.m. at the Charles W. "Bill" Rosenau Municipal Building located at 341 Second Street in Parsons.

Landfill Plans for Storm Water Pond Development

Tucker County Solid Waste Authority Presiding Chair Mark Holstine updated the members of the Board on the status of various engineering projects at the landfill. According to Holstine, both he and Jody Alderman had been in contact with an engineering firm regarding several urgent projects. Top of the list was plans for a Storm Water Pond at the facility. "We had talked to our consulting engineer about (the fact that) we need to up the schedule on the Storm Water Pond, design" Holstine said.

According to Holstine, both he and Jody Alderman has been in contact with an engineering design firm over plans for the Storm Water Ponds "We were in conversations with him prior to the meeting today to get him started on it," Holstine said.

The main goal of the call was to begin to determine how much space the pond will eventually require, according to Holstine. Holstine said they were not so much worried about the full design currently, but more the general scope of the project in terms of overall size. "The storm water pond, not complete design, but we need to know how much room we need," Holstine said.

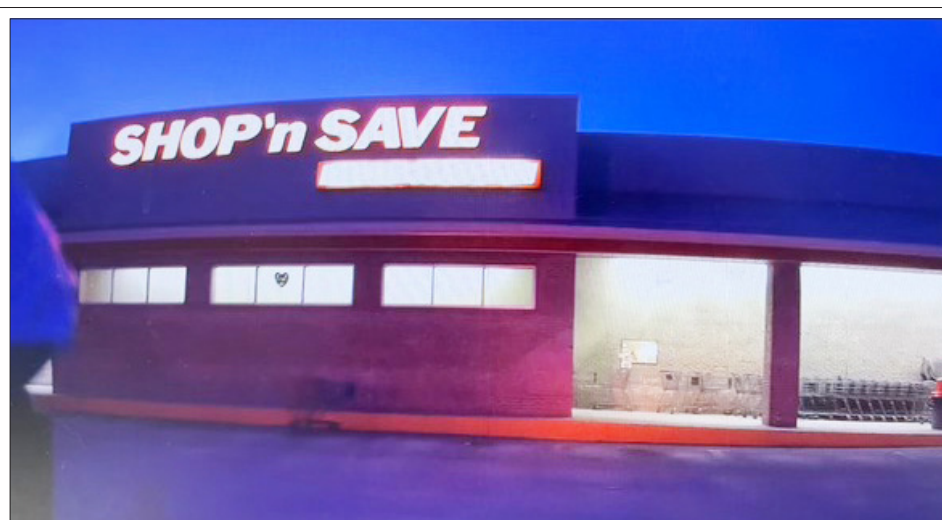
Concerns over size, according to Holsine, stems from the need for future land acquisition for the project. According to Holsine, once the space that will be needed is known, he and the board can approach Western Pocahontas about purchasing additional land. "Because we have to go back to Western Pocahontas with what we need," Holstine said. "I think they are willing to entertain us purchasing some of that off of them, but we can't tell them yet what that is, how much."

The exact size of the project is currently not known, according to Holsine, but will depend on design and intended use. "It depends on what we do and how we do it," Holstine said. "That pond could be extensive in size."

Holsine said he hoped to only need to construct one pond, but depending on what the engineers determine, two ponds may be needed. "We may not be able to build just one pond," Holstine said. "We may have to build two, don't want to do that."

According to Holsine, he intends to only build one pond, if at all possible. "If we could just get it into one pond, that's what I'd like to do," Holstine said.

Parsons Shop 'n Save Victim of Cooler Fire

Parsons Volunteer Fire Department responded to a fire at the Shop 'n Save located on D and W Lane in Parsons. According to Store Manager Greg Burner, the fire had been contained to a produce case and both the Parsons Volunteer Fire Department and the Fire Marshall were at the scene, but foul play is not suspected in the incident with a determination of Undetermined being the official finding.

According to Burner, the fire had been contained to a single cooler on the sales floor in the produce section. Burner also stated that the fire did not result in any structural damage or need for an access hole to be made in the roof. Burner said that a large amount of the smoke was from burning plastic in the area. "There was no structure damage," Burner said. "There was no hole cut in the roof. It was contained to the produce cooler itself on the sales floor. It did not get into the walls; it did not get in anywhere else."

There were no injuries sustained from the fire, according to Burner, as everyone was able to safely evacuate the building. "The Fire Department came," Burner said. "Nobody was hurt, everybody was

evacuated."

The State Fire Marshal and Health Department had evaluated the scene the following day, according to Burner. Burner also said that the owner was onsite conferencing with the authorities and Parsons Fire Chief Kevin White. "The State Fire Marshall is here, as we speak," Burner said. "Health Department's been here. Told us what we got to pull out of the building. That's what we are doing now, pulling and cleaning."

Parsons Volunteer Fire Department Chief Kevin White said his department and the Fire Marshall were involved due to a State mandate due to the high dollar loss due to the fire. "That's just standard procedure due to anytime there is a high dollar loss," White said. "Something like large inventory, large structure, things like that. That's something that the State mandates we do."

White said there was a "great response" from both the Parsons VFD, as well as surrounding departments to the fire. "We were fortunate," White said. "We had a great response from our department and the surrounding departments also."

The fire has been classified as Undetermined, according to White, however, it

TCSWA Updates Gas Monitoring Plan

The members of the Tucker County Solid Waste Authority board heard plans to update the Landfill's Gas Monitoring Plan. The update was part of the board's meeting at the Landfill Office in Davis. Presiding Chair Mark Holstine provided the specifics as part of the Director's Report.

According to Holstine, Jody Alderman has been working on the details concerning the plan. "Jody has been working on the gas monitoring plan," Holstine said.

Alderman plans to monitor the methane produced by the landfill, in house. The measure will not only allow the landfill to have immediate access to the data, but will also save the Solid Waste Authority money by not hiring outside consultants or contractors to conduct the testing. "Jody is going to be doing that himself instead of paying a consultant or anybody to do gas monitoring," Holstine said.

The Landfill does not have a current Gas Monitoring Plan, according to Holstine. "Nowhere, anywhere could be find an approved gas monitoring plan," Holstine said.

Holstine said there is a plan for the Landfill, but it is extremely old. So old, in fact, that buildings have been constructed at the site since it was first put into place, according to Holstine. "We have a plan

out there. Its old, old, old," Holstine said. "And we know the points they were testing on, but it is so old that we have structures on site that have been built since that plan started."

Holstine said he and Alderman are committed to bringing the plan up to date. "We are going to bring the plan up to date," Holstine said.

Alderman has already purchased the equipment to complete the tests and will be submitting the results to the Department of Environmental Protection, Holsine said. "Jody has bought a monitoring tool to do it with," Holstine said. "He's going to do it and submit those on a quarterly basis to the DEP."

The purpose of the plan, according to Holstine, is to monitor what kinds of methane are moving within the landfill and to make sure no methane is leaching into buildings at the site, as well as ensuring the gasses are contained at the landfill site. "Its to see what kind of methane is migrating on site or off site," Holstine said. "You need to check your structures to make sure gas is not finding its way into your buildings to become a hazard and then you check around the perimeter to make sure we don't have any migration out."

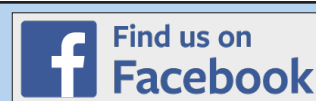

was not suspicious. “It was nothing out of the ordinary,” White said. “Undetermined at this time. We do know that it started in a produce section in a cooler area, one of the produce stands, but that’s basically where it is going to be left at.”

Burner said that the store’s sprinkler system worked as intended during the event. However, the store did experience water and smoke damage as a result of the fire, according to Burner. “The sprinkler system actually worked as it is supposed to,” Burner said. “There was some water damage obviously and some smoke damage.”

While an exact date for reopening of the store was not available, Burner said it would reopen as soon as safely possible. Burner said, he also was unsure to what extent the reopening would be. “As soon as we can get reopened, we’ll be reopened,” Burner said. “Now to what extent and when that will be, I’m not exactly sure.”

2024 Canaan Valley Master Naturalist Classes

Canaan Valley Master Naturalist classes will begin in May. Prospective students are encouraged to attend the Wild Yards program on March 16 listed above. To become a certified WV Master Naturalist, you must complete 62 hours of instruction and 30 hours of approved nature related volunteer work. Class topics include: Aquatic, Wetland and Terrestrial Habitats, Mammals, Insects, Wildflowers, Fish, Geology, Trees, Amphibians and Reptiles, Habitat Improvement for Wildlife and many others. You can complete the coursework

part of the program in 5 full weekends, but you have up to 4 years to complete coursework and volunteer hours. There are no tests.

The state program is sponsored by the WV Division of Natural Resources (WV DNR), and the Canaan Valley chapter is a committee of the Friends of the 500th of the Canaan Valley National Wildlife Refuge. Classes are generally held at the Canaan Valley National Wildlife Refuge Visitor Center and usually include a lecture and field portion. Participants

generally say the program is a great way to learn about the area’s nature and to meet others with similar interests.

Weekends for classes this year will be: May 17 – 19, June 7 – 9, July 12 – 14, August 16 – 18 and Sept 20 – 22. The cost of the program is \$175 which includes all classes until you are certified (up to 4 years). Scholarships are available.

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Gas Prices Soar in West Virginia

The average price for gasoline across Northern West Virginia is 14 cents higher this week at \$3.056 per gallon, according to AAA East Central's Gas Price Report.

Trend Analysis:

The national average for a gallon of gas rose four cents over the past week to \$3.14. The upward trend is a combination of oil costs edging into the upper \$70s per barrel and normal seasonal increases as winter eases and demand for gas creeps higher. Today's national average is six cents more than a month ago but 33 cents less than a year ago.

According to new data from the Energy

Information Administration (EIA), gas demand increased from 7.89 to 8.14 million barrels per day last week. Meanwhile, total domestic gasoline stocks rose by 1.1 million barrels to 254.1 million barrels. Higher gas demand and fluctuating oil prices have contributed to increasing pump prices.

At the close of Wednesday's formal trading session, West Texas Intermediate decreased by \$1.97 to settle at \$75.85. Oil prices declined amid a strengthening dollar and no indications of new attacks in the Red Sea. Earlier in the week, attacks against shippers raised prices as commercial ships transiting the Red Sea sought longer, more expensive routes to avoid violence. Additionally, the EIA reported that total domestic retail crude stocks increased by 1.2 million barrels to 421.9 million barrels.

Peter E. (Pete) Barmer



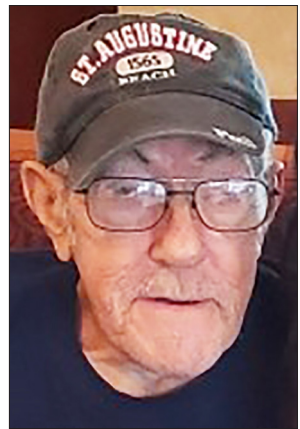

Potholes Can Be a Black Hole for Your Wallet

Pothole damage repair costs Americans billions each year

While tire-hungry potholes are typically a sign of spring, this winter's frequent temperature swings and bitter cold snaps have taken an early toll on the nation's roadways. AAA East Central advises motorists to take proactive steps to avoid costly repairs caused by hitting potholes.

"Not only do potholes pose a safety risk to motorists, they can also result in unexpected and costly repair bills," says Mike Hoshaw, vice president of automotive services, AAA East Central. "It can cost anywhere from \$250 to as much as \$1000 to fix problems like tire punctures and bent wheels along with more expensive issues like suspension damage."

A recent survey from AAA found that one in ten drivers sustained vehicle damage significant enough to warrant a repair after hitting a pothole. With an average price tag of almost \$600 per repair, damage caused by potholes costs American motorists almost \$3 billion each year.

Potholes form when moisture collects in small holes and cracks in the road surface. The moisture expands and contracts when

temperatures go up and down. This breaks up the pavement and, combined with the weight of passing cars, eventually results in a pothole.

To minimize vehicle damage from potholes, AAA East Central offers the following tips:

- Inspect tires: Properly inflated tires can act as a "cushion" when hitting a pothole.
- Look ahead: Make a point of scanning the road ahead for potholes so there is enough reaction time to avoid hitting a pothole.
- Slow down: If a pothole cannot be avoided, reduce speed safely without abrupt braking.
- Beware of puddles: Puddles often disguise deep potholes.
- Recognize noises/vibrations: A hard pothole impact can dislodge wheel weights, damage the tire or wheel, and even break suspension components. Any unusual noises after a pothole hit should be inspected immediately.
- Check for a spare: Many newer cars do not have spare tires. Check to see if the vehicle is equipped with a spare, and make sure to regularly check its PSI.

Charleston WV - The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

Feb. 14, 1866: Grant County was created and named for Gen. Ulysses S. Grant, who later became the nation's 18th president.

Feb. 15, 1898: Musician John Homer "Uncle Homer" Walker was born in Mercer County. Among the last in a tradition of Black Appalachian banjo players, he played the five-string banjo in the claw-hammer style.

Feb. 15, 1930: Sara Jane Moore was born in Charleston. On Sept. 22, 1975, Moore attempted to assassinate President Gerald Ford in San Francisco.

Feb. 15, 1975: Elizabeth Kee, the state's first female member of Congress, died in Bluefield. Kee was elected to Congress in 1951 after the death of her husband, John. She retired in 1964 and was succeeded by her son, James.

Feb. 16, 1821: Morris Harvey was born near Prosperity in Raleigh County. Harvey's gifts to the Barboursville Seminary led to its name being changed to Morris Harvey College in 1901. The institution is now known as the University of Charleston.

Feb. 16, 1917: The legislature established the West Virginia State Colored Tuberculosis Sanitarium for the care of Black TB patients. It was built at Denmar in Pocahontas County.

Feb. 16, 1951: Second Lieutenant Darwin Keith Kyle of Boone County died during an intense exchange against Chinese forces in Korea. He was awarded the Medal of Honor.

Feb. 17, 1735: Morgan Morgan of present-day Berkeley County was commissioned a captain of militia in the 201st Field Artillery, which is considered the oldest military unit in the United States.

Feb. 18, 1843: Ritchie County was created from portions of Wood, Lewis, and Harrison counties. The county was named for Virginia journalist and politician Thomas Ritchie.

Feb. 18, 1890: Ellison Mounts, a cousin to the Hat-



Feb. 20, 1875: The legislature approved a bill to move the state capital back to Wheeling.

field family, was hanged for murder, ending the Hatfield-McCoy Feud.

Feb. 18, 1969: Hundreds of miners in Raleigh County went on strike over the issue of black lung. Within days, the walkout spread throughout southern West Virginia.

Feb. 19, 1908: Orval Elijah Brown was born near Lizemores in Clay County. Brown, a free-spirited individual, gained notoriety as the "Clay County Wild Man" during the Great Depression for

his untamed physical appearance, which included a flowing beard and the wearing of little more than a self-made loincloth.

Feb. 19, 1943: Author Homer Hickam was born in Coalwood, McDowell County. Hickam's second book, Rocket Boys: A Memoir, was published in 1998 and became a runaway bestseller.

Feb. 20, 1995: The legislature voted to make the Golden Delicious apple the official state fruit.

People are forgetting the older ways so quickly that it is a scary thought. I bet there are not many people out there that even know how to bake a loaf of bread. It is so much better for you than the store

bought kind with all the additives, but people are just too busy today to do the simple things. Momma Said, "Someday it is going to be a matter of survival."

I am going to help you out some this week by giving you a very simple way to bake bread that is not hard at all. Just slow down enough to make this recipe one time and you will be amazed at how good it tastes compared to store bought bread. Momma Said, "All you have to do is get some butter and jam, sit down and enjoy the moment." And your house will smell wonderful as it bakes. If you want plain bread just omit the tomatoes, olives and rosemary.

No Knead Bread with Sun dried Tomatoes, Olives and Rosemary

Ingredients

- 3 CUPS all-purpose or bread flour
1 CUP whole wheat flour
3/4 TEASPOON active dry yeast
2 TEASPOONS salt
1/2 CUP chopped sun-dried tomatoes
1/2 CUP olives sliced
1 TABLESPOON chopped fresh rosemary
1 1/2 TO 1 3/4 CUPS water

Instructions

- Combine the flour, salt and yeast in a large bowl. Stir to combine and add the sun-dried tomatoes, olives and rosemary. Stir to distribute all the ingredients well. Add the water and stir everything together. The dough should be shaggy and a little sticky. Just stir and turn the dough over until there are no traces of dry ingredients.
2. Cover the bowl and let the dough rest at room temperature for 12 to 18 hours. The longer you let it sit, the more flavor is developed. After 18 hours, the dough will have risen and may be a shade darker than it was when you started.
3. Place a piece of parchment paper on the countertop and dust very generously with flour. Wet your hands and fold the dough over on itself a few times to release the

air inside the dough. (Wetting your hands will help prevent the dough from sticking to you.) Shape the dough into a round and place it on the floured parchment paper, seam side down.

4. Dust more flour on the top of the dough and cover the dough by inverting the mixing bowl over the top. Let the dough rest like this for up to 2 hours. After the dough has rested for 1 hour on the countertop, place a lidded cast iron Dutch oven into your oven and pre-heat the oven to 500°F for 30 minutes.

5. Then, working carefully, remove the Dutch oven from the oven and take off the lid. Slash the top of the bread using a baker's lame or a serrated knife if you want to. Use the parchment paper to lift the shaped dough into the pot, paper and all, and cover with the lid. Return the pot to the oven and reduce the temperature to 450°F and bake, covered for 30 minutes.

6. After 30 minutes, remove the lid from the Dutch oven and let the bread continue to bake until it is nicely browned on top - about 15 to 20 minutes. Remove the pot from the oven and let the bread sit in it for about 5 minutes. Then, transfer the beautiful loaf to a cooling rack to cool. Although it is tempting to dive right in, let the bread cool for 30 minutes before enjoying.

GLENVILLE – The Tucker County Girls’ Basketball team traveled to #2 Gilmer County on Wednesday February 7th for a JV and Varsity contest. Gilmer County would pull away late for a close win in a classic back and forth game 56-51.

The game started as expected close and competitive by both teams with the Lady Titans leading after one quarter 17-13. The visiting Lady Mt. Lions fought back in the second quarter as they outscored the home team Gilmer County 13-10 to cut the halftime lead to 27-26 Lady Titans.

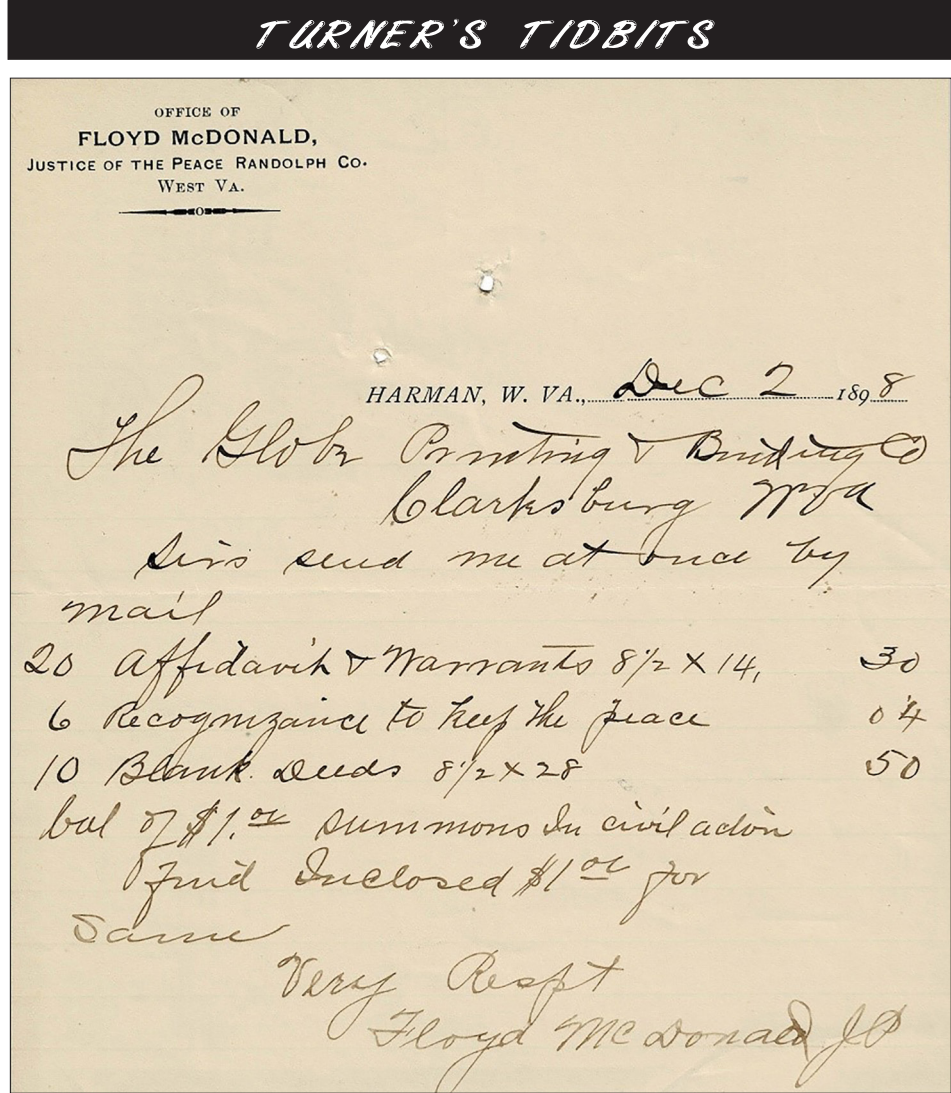

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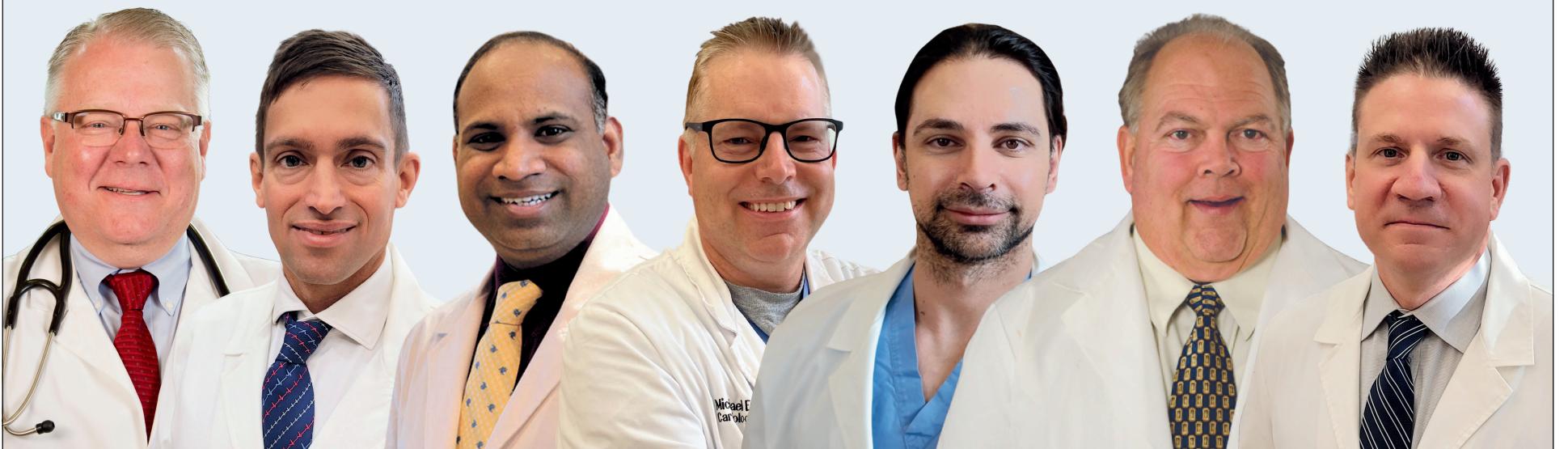
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
